Note—Owing to the increase in the numerical strength of the Fire Department, as to Firemen and Engineers of Steamers, it has been possible to grant them additional time off for recreation, so that they are now receiving a day off in every five in addition to three leaves of twelve hours each per month throughout the entire year. The Chief Officers, Foremen and Lieutenants, however, during vacation season (owing to their limited number) are precluded from receiving the three twelve-hour leaves each month, from May to December; therefore, subordinate members of the Department are receiving more time off than their superiors. If it is the desire of the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment to permit the officers of the Fire Department to receive additional time off, say one day in every four, with no short leaves, it will be necessary for the Fire Commissioner to increase the uniformed force in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (by process of promotion) with 1 additional Deputy Chief, 4 Chiefs of Battalion and 63 Assistant Foremen, and the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens by 1 additional Deputy Chief, 3 Chiefs of Battalion and 33 Assistant Foremen.

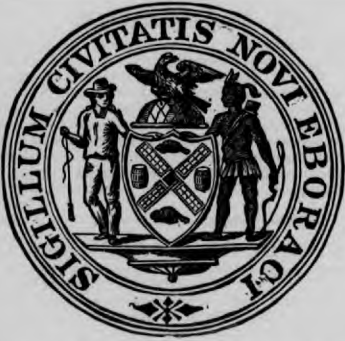

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT THE Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, having caused an inquiry to be made, pursuant to chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, of the State of New York, upon the application presented to the Board by the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company for a grant to such company of the right or franchise to construct, maintain and operate a railroad across certain streets, avenues and highways in the Borough of The Bronx by such company, as is more particularly set forth in its petition dated May 29, 1905, will, at a meeting of said Board, to be held in the Old Council Chamber, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on November 24, 1905, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., consider said application and hold a public hearing thereon, at which citizens shall be entitled to appear and be heard; and

Notice is hereby given that questions raised as the result of the inquiry, and which it would seem pertinent that the Board should decide, are as follows:

1. Should the application be denied upon the grounds that the City may furnish such additional transportation as is required on lines which may be built as extensions to the existing or proposed rapid transit railroads, and thereby retain the power and fix absolutely the rate of fare within the City limits?

2. Should the application be granted as applied for, the City making an additional provision that a four-track road shall be constructed from the City limits to the Harlem river, and denying the right of connection with the existing rapid transit railroad, upon the grounds that such connection would place more traffic upon the rapid transit railroad than it could bear?

3. Should the application be granted upon the route applied for, or should the company be obliged to change its route between the Bronx river and the City line and adopt a new map and lay out a route adjoining that of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company, previously granted a franchise by The City of New York, and thereby avoid the mutilation of the street system in the Borough of The Bronx east of the Bronx river?

4. Should the application be granted as applied for?

Subject to such changes as may be required when decisions are reached on the above questions, the Bureau of Franchises of the Department of Finance has submitted the following:

PROPOSED GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS.
For the grant of a franchise or right or privileges to construct, maintain and operate a railroad across, either above or below the grades of certain streets in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, along the following routes: [Technical Description of Main Line and Branch to be inserted.]

—and being more particularly shown on a map adopted by the Board of Directors of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company on February 8, 1904, and filed with the County Clerk of New York County May 6, 1904, or any lawful amendment thereof, consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company shall be bound by the following terms and conditions: 1. The provisions of section 6 of the Railroad Law shall be fully complied with, and in addition to the maps required to be filed with the Railroad Commissioners, it shall be incumbent upon the grantee to file with the Comptroller of The City of New York a map or maps

showing the number of tracks and length of same, including crossovers, switches, turnouts, sidings and stands, such lengths to be accurately determined by measurements to be taken after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad.

2. The said right to cross the streets and the privilege to construct and operate said railroad shall be held and enjoyed by said railroad company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date of signing this contract, without privilege of renewal.

3. Upon the termination of this grant, all rights and privileges hereby granted to cross the said streets shall cease and determine, unless the said railroad company, its successors or assigns, shall have previously procured a new grant for the same from The City of New York.

4. The New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this privilege to The City of New York the following sums of money:

During the first ten years, commencing from the day when this contract is signed, an annual sum of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000), and during the succeeding fifteen years, an annual sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000).

From the date of the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad until the end of the first ten years of this grant, an additional sum of ten cents (10 cents) per linear foot of single track, including all crossovers, switches, turnouts, sidings and stands, and for the succeeding fifteen years an additional sum of twenty cents (20 cents) per linear foot per annum, in lieu of said sum of ten cents (10 cents). All said payments shall be made to the Comptroller of the City in equal payments at the end of each quarter year, on the first day of January, April, July and October of each year.

5. The said annual charge or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of the privilege hereby granted, as hereinbefore provided, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railroad company providing for payments for railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant. Nothing herein contained shall apply to any mortgagee or mere lienor, but shall apply to any purchaser upon foreclosure or under or by virtue of any provision of a mortgage or lien.

6. The rights and privileges granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents. This provision, however, shall not apply to the making of a mortgage, but shall apply to a sale under foreclosure.

7. No street or railroad shall be crossed by the railroad at grade. All streets now open or in use, and streets hereafter opened crossing the line of the railroad shall be carried over or under the said railroad by the grantee at the sole cost and expense of said grantee. The cost of all changes in grades of all approaches to such crossings, and all damages to property injured thereby, or by said railroad crossings, shall likewise be borne and paid by the grantee. All damages to property along the line of said railroad or contiguous thereto, caused by reason of the construction or operation of the said railroad, shall be borne and paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns, and The City of New York shall assume no liability for any damages so caused.

The City shall have the right at any time it so desires, to open across the route of the railroad company, any new streets other than those now open or in use, and the railroad company hereby gives its consent to said opening.

8. All viaducts over streets and all tunnels under streets and all bridges necessary to carry the streets over an open cut, shall be constructed at the expense of the grantee, and in such manner as shall not interfere with the ordinary use of the street as a public highway. All viaducts over streets shall have a height of at least sixteen feet in the clear throughout, and in the case of arch construction not less than sixteen feet in the clear at the centre and ten feet in the clear on the building or side line of said street. In the case of tunnel construction under a street, there shall be at least four feet between the grade of the street and the exterior surface of the arch of said tunnel.

9. Any superstructure of the railroad crossing a street and having a length of one hundred (100) feet or less, shall be constructed in a single span; if more than one hundred (100) feet in length, intermediate columns to support the structure may be placed in the street in such manner as may be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The width of such superstructure of the railroad shall not exceed sixty (60) feet when measured over all.

10. The plans for all structures over or under any street must first be submitted to and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and all such structures shall be constructed of steel, concrete or masonry, or a combination of these materials. Such structures shall be floored throughout and shall be watertight.

11. The railroad shall be constructed in the most modern and approved manner of railroad construction. The roadbed shall be ballasted throughout its entire length within the limits of The City of New York, with a sufficient quantity of either blast furnace slag or broken trap rock of a hard and durable quality, and no dirt, sand, gravel or cinders shall be used in such ballast.

12. The roadbed within the limits of The City of New York shall be watered daily whenever the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit. Should, however, watering the roadbed in any way injure electric line equipment which has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, then other means of preventing dust shall be used, which shall be first approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. For any failure to comply with the foregoing the railroad company shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day.

13. The entire right of way of the company within the City limits, except at stations, shall be fenced throughout.

14. All abutments or foundations for bridges, viaducts and stations and the stations proper, except intermediate supports for viaducts, as hereinbefore provided, shall be placed on the land of the company.

15. There shall be constructed along the line of the route of the main line of the railroad as proposed, for the accommodation of local passenger traffic, at least six stations between the Harlem river and the Bronx river, and at least six stations between the Bronx river, and the northerly line of The City of New York, as now fixed. On the branch line there shall be constructed at least three stations east of Morris Park avenue.

16. Said railroad may be operated by electric power or by any other mechanical motive power, which may be lawfully employed upon the same, except locomotive steam power. If electrical power is used the railroad company shall, before the commencement of any of the construction of the electrical line equipment, file with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment plans showing such proposed construction, including all methods of insulation, position of contact conductor and all feed wires, conductors or cables, with method of carrying the same, and said plans must be approved by the said Board before construction thereof shall begin. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby retains the right to make such conditions relative to construction of such line equipment as it may see fit at the time of the approval of such plan.

17. No wires for the transmission of power shall be permitted unless they be placed in conduits or carried in a manner which shall have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The New York and Port Chester Railroad Company shall provide, for the exclusive use of the City, two conduits upon the property of the company which may be used for carrying wires or cables; said conduits to be at least three inches in diameter.

18. The railroad company shall not carry wires or conduct power on its structures or along its right of way for any purpose except for the operation of its railroad and except, as provided above, for the use of the City.

19. The railroad company shall maintain a train schedule on the main and branch lines of at least sixty (60) trains on each line in either direction daily, stopping at all of the stations within the City limits, and at no time, either day or night, shall there be greater headway between such trains than thirty (30) minutes; provided, however, that said railroad company during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad shall not be required to operate its trains within the City limits between the hours of 1 o'clock and 4 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall determine, after a hearing had thereon, that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during such hours.

20. All cars on said railroad shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and any failure to keep the temperature of any of the cars of the company above 50 degrees Fahrenheit, shall make the company liable for a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each offense.

21. All cars operated by the company shall be vestibuled and the system of lighting same shall be adequate and be made satisfactory to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. For any failure to comply herewith the railroad company shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each violation.

22. The grantee shall light the space beneath any superstructure which it shall erect across streets and the approaches to stations, in a manner which shall be satisfactory to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

23. During the term of this grant the rate of fare upon said railroad within the limits of The City of New York, as now fixed, shall not exceed five cents (5c.) for any passenger. The said company shall not charge any passenger more than such sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railroad, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, and controlled by it, to any point thereof or of any such connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of The City of New York, as such limits now exist, during such term. The company shall operate cars over the route hereby authorized, and the company shall not operate cars over the route of any other railroad company within the limits of The City of New York until it shall have received authority for such operation from the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it shall not permit cars of any other company to run over the railroad hereby authorized. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment reserves the right to fix the compensation to be paid by such other company as shall be authorized to run cars over the route hereby authorized for such privilege, and said Board further reserves the right to fix the compensation to be paid to The City of New York by said "Port Chester Company" for the privilege of operating cars over the route of any other railroad company.

Whenever the "Port Chester Company" shall have entered into a contract with another railroad company, permitting the cars of said company to run over the route hereby authorized, or whenever the said "Port Chester Company" shall receive from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority, permission to operate cars over the route of said other railroad company, a single fare of five cents (5c.) shall be the maximum charge by either company to a passenger desiring to make a continuous trip in either direction between any two points within the limits of The City of New York, on the lines of said companies. For every refusal to comply with the requirements of this section, the corporation so refusing shall forfeit \$50 to the aggrieved party. Two or more penalties may be recovered in one action.

The rates for carrying of property upon the routes of the grantee within the limits of The City of New York shall, in all cases, be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successor or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

24. The said railroad company shall carry free within the limits of The City of New York during the existence of this grant all letter carriers of the United States Government and members of the Police and Fire Departments of The City of New York, when such employees are in full uniform.

25. The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters, under the Charter of the City.

26. In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by

the Corporation Counsel, provided that in case of any such violation, breach or failure to comply with any of said provisions the said City shall cause notice in writing thereof to be served upon said company, and said company shall remedy such violation, breach or failure within ten (10) days thereafter, and in default thereof, then, and not otherwise, said right of forfeiture shall accrue and may be enforced by the said City; provided, further, that if the said railroad company, grantee hereunder, shall within said ten (10) days commence to remedy said violation, breach or failure, and shall prosecute the work of completing such remedy with diligence and with the utmost practicable dispatch until the same shall be completed, then no right of forfeiture shall accrue.

27. The grant of this privilege shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions to any other person or corporation.

28. The said railroad company shall commence actual construction within one year from the date of the signing of this contract, and shall complete a four-track railroad upon the main line, from the northerly line of the City to the southerly terminus, as hereinbefore described, within five years from said date; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

The said railroad company shall expend the sum of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for construction within the limits of The City of New York within two years from the date of the signing of this contract, which sum shall be exclusive of any moneys expended for land acquired for the right of way.

A statement of moneys so expended for construction shall be submitted to the Comptroller of The City of New York, who shall, after investigation, report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment his opinion as to whether such sums have been actually expended, and if in the opinion of the said Board the grantee has not proven an expenditure of the said sum within the time given, then said Board may declare that this grant has ceased and determined, and the said action of said Board shall be prima facie evidence of said forfeiture.

Any portion of the route covered by this grant which shall not be completed and in full operation within seven years from the date of the signing of this contract shall be deemed to have been abandoned, and all rights hereby granted in and to such portions of said railroad shall cease and determine, and The City of New York may exact such sum of money by way of liquidated damages as is hereinafter provided.

A majority vote of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be prima facie evidence in regard to the forfeiture of any or all the rights under this grant, as provided for in this section. Before action is taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under the provisions of this section, the grantee shall have at least thirty (30) days' notice of the intention of said Board to take action and at such time as is appointed shall be allowed a hearing. In case any or all of the rights hereby granted are forfeited, it is a condition of this grant that all sums theretofore paid to The City of New York, together with the deposit of \$50,000 and the deposit of \$150,000, as provided for in sections 39 and 40 of this contract, and all structures erected by said grantee, its successor or assigns, within the lines of any street, shall be forfeited to and become the property of The City of New York.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have power to extend the time provided for in this section for the completion of the railroad and for the work to be performed and expenditure to be made, as above, for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate two years, but such extension shall not be made unless the reasons given by the grantee for non-fulfillment are, in the opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for causes over which the grantee had no control and was in nowise responsible.

29. The grantee shall assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the railway, and the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property by reason of said construction, maintenance or operation.

As a condition of this grant, the grantee, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the railroad company, its successor or assigns.

30. Any portion of the right of way of the said railroad company falling within the lines of a street now shown on the map of The City of New York, which it may be necessary for the City to subsequently acquire, shall be ceded to the City, without cost to it, subject to the company's easement therein.

31. Said company shall not operate cars over any extension of any length whatsoever not specifically hereby authorized, and shall not make any connection with any other railroad company either by means of extensions or branches or by means of a platform building, unless it shall have received authority therefor from said Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority, and upon such terms as shall be fixed by said Board.

32. In case any of the streets as now shown on the map of The City of New York and crossed by the said railroad above grade are altered or widened after the grantee has completed its railroad, and such widening requires the alteration of the superstructure of the railroad, the grantee and The City of New York shall each pay one-half of the cost of such alteration as may be necessary.

33. In case the route as laid out shall make it necessary in the opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to change the map of The City of New York in order to avoid unnecessary or undesirable crossings, or for other reasons, purely on account of the location of the railroad, and by such change or alteration additional streets bounding the grantee's right of way are determined upon, then the grantee shall acquire such streets and cede them to the City without cost.

34. Any alterations which may be required to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any sub-surface structures, pipes, etc., laid in the streets, on account of the construction or operation of the railroad, shall be made at the sole cost of the railroad company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

35. The railroad company shall cede, without cost, to the City a strip of land 50 feet in width, along the side of the right of way; said strip beginning at the easterly side of White Plains road and extending along the right of way to the City line. The railroad company, at its own expense, shall regulate and grade said strip of land to such grade as shall be hereafter fixed by the City authorities, such regulating and grading to be done from time to time as directed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

36. All construction of railroad crossings shall be done in such manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any street as a public highway, and all streets in any way disturbed by such construction shall be restored to their original condition. In case of failure on the part of the grantee to restore such streets within a reasonable length of time, The City of New York shall have the right, under resolution of the Board of Estimate and Appor-

tionment, to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished after due notice and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the fund hereinafter provided.

37. The company's property and structures shall not be used for advertising purposes in any way, under a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each offense. Such restriction shall not apply to the interior of stations or cars.

38. Whenever and as often as the company shall have actually completed one mile of single track, a certificate showing the completion of construction of such track shall be prepared by the engineer of said company, and such certificate shall be delivered to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The said Board shall, as soon as practicable thereafter, verify the correctness of such certificate and either accept such certificate as correct, or if it finds it to be incorrect, return said certificate to said company, specifying in writing the respects in which it finds such certificate to be incorrect. Upon the verification of the correctness of any such certificate, or if any such certificate shall be found to be incorrect, upon its being corrected, and subsequently verified, the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall thereupon prepare and certify a voucher in due form for payment to said company the sum of \$2,000, and the amount so certified by said Board shall be forthwith paid by said Comptroller from said fund to said company, upon the completion of the work of construction of the said mile of track. This procedure shall be followed by said company as often as it shall complete an additional mile of single track.

Upon the completion of the construction of the entire track authorized hereby, a final certificate shall be prepared by the engineer of said company and approved by the president thereof, showing the fact of such completion and the fact that the road is ready for operation. Such final certificate shall be delivered to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and shall be subject to a like verification as the certificate hereinbefore mentioned. Upon the verification of the correctness of such final certificate, or if such final certificate shall be found to be incorrect, upon being corrected, the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall thereupon prepare and certify a voucher in due form for the payment by the Comptroller to the said company of the balance of said fund of \$150,000 remaining in his hands.

If such final certificate, certifying to the completion of the entire construction of the road, shall not be delivered to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on or before the expiration of five (5) years from the date of signing this contract, and if the construction of the entire road authorized hereby shall not have been completed by said date, the balance of said sum of \$150,000 shall be forthwith delivered by the Comptroller to The City of New York, and thereafter said company shall have no claim or cause of action therefor.

In case of failure of the said company to comply with the terms of this contract or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events the said company shall pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a penalty of \$1,000 for each violation; and in case of any violation of the provisions relating to the lighting of cars, watering of roadbed, advertising signs, heating of cars and vestibuling of cars, the said company shall pay to the Comptroller of said City such penalties as are herein provided.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties provided in the grant shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of The City of New York, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify said company through its president to appear before him on a certain day, not less than five days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If said company fail to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appear in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or, where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the said company shall, upon ten days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of \$50,000, and in default thereof the contract may be revoked at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of the grant shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

The right of The City to collect any penalties imposed for non-compliance with the terms of this grant, or with any law or ordinance now in force or hereafter adopted, shall not be limited to the

said sum of \$50,000, and the enumeration or reservation of any rights by the City herein shall not operate to the exclusion of any other rights belonging to the City, either in law or in equity.

41. That if the said New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, its successor and assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures, and all street crossings in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of said streets, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City may give written notice to said company, specifying any default on the part of said company and requiring said company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of said company to remedy its said default within a reasonable time, said company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to The City of New York the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed and liquidated damages, or the said City in case said structures over or under streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the company, in which case the said company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon; all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinbefore provided.

The said company shall not operate cars over any portion of the route designated herein until it shall have received a certificate from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the effect that all of the antecedent conditions herein have been complied with, and to the further effect that the road has been constructed satisfactorily to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and to the further effect that all the parts thereof which it shall have been possible for the grantee to construct have been constructed.

44. This grant shall take effect from the date of the signing of the contract by the Mayor of The City of New York.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

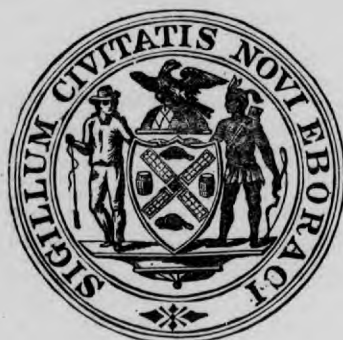

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Department of Health, City of New York,
Southwest Corner of Fifty-fifth Street and Sixth Avenue,
New York, September 1, 1905.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith the Departmental Estimate of the Department of Health of The City of New York for the year 1906.

The Board of Health most urgently requests your critical consideration of this estimate, for they feel that the more you investigate the requests for the various funds the more you will be convinced that they are reasonable and necessary, and that the sums, if so appropriated, will not only be used wisely but their use will result in great and demonstrable benefits to the City.

The enormous growth in the work of the Department of Health during the last few years must be attributed in a large measure to the rapid development of scientific medicine. The Department of Health of The City of New York has come to be recognized the world over as the pioneer in the administrative control of the infectious diseases. Its methods are regarded as models to be everywhere imitated. This very creditable reputation it has been enabled to attain and to hold through the means made available by the liberality of your Honorable Board. As is well known, the advance in our knowledge of infectious diseases and their causation has been very rapid in recent years. The methods thought to be the best ten years ago are to-day relegated to the background. In order to keep pace with the growth of the City and to hold the lead in all sanitary matters the Board of Health must have a material increase in its available funds.

While it may appear to your Honorable Board that the sums expended by the Department of Health are large, the Board of Health feels confident that a careful study of the results attained will convince you that the cost is really insignificant as compared with the benefits secured. It is not necessary to more than mention the obviously tremendous economic value to the City of low morbidity and mortality rates, which are not only low, but steadily decreasing. Since the introduction of scientific methods for the care and prevention of contagious and communicable diseases the death rate has decreased more than 25 per cent. This represents a saving of some 25,000 lives annually. Who can estimate the value of this number of human lives saved annually to the City, to say nothing of the corresponding decrease in the amount of sickness, especially among the poor?

Employees chargeable to the above appropriation:

It cannot be stated with absolute mathematical accuracy that with the additional appropriation of any given number of dollars, a human life can be saved; nevertheless the Board of Health respectfully submits what it considers as a very significant fact, viz., that during the years 1892, 1893 and 1894 the death rate averaged 25 deaths to every 1,000 of the population, while in 1902, 1903 and 1904 the death rate averaged 19 deaths to every 1,000 of the population, whereas, during the same period the appropriations have increased but \$665,000, and the population of the City has increased more than (since January 1, 1898) 510,000. The Board of Health is confident that the ratio of increase in the annual Budget to the decrease in the death rate will surely be maintained should your Honorable Board consent to the award of our estimate as herewith transmitted.

Your attention is also called to the comparatively insignificant sum appropriated for the health of the entire City to the enormous sum granted each year for the education of but a portion of the population. The Board of Health makes the statement without fear of contradiction that health is of paramount importance.

Since the introduction by the Department of Health of The City of New York of bacteriological diagnosis of disease, the sanitary control of tuberculosis, the medical inspection of school children, the establishment of a nursing corps in the schools, and many other features of the present work of the Department, many other cities, both in this country and abroad, have recognized the value of these methods and have embodied them in the work of their health departments. Where New York leads all the world will follow.

There is no point at which any one can say that the Department of Health has reached the limit of its sphere of usefulness. This sphere is not and never will be defined, for with new discoveries constantly being made along the lines of hygiene and public health, the opportunities for useful activity in a department having the responsibility for the health and lives of 4,000,000 of people are constantly and rapidly expanding.

The Board of Health respectfully requests your earnest consideration of the facts above mentioned and of the explanations interspersed throughout this estimate with particular reference to each fund.

The increased amount estimated for this fund over that shown for the positions actually on the July pay-roll covers new positions which the Board of Health considers absolutely essential. The correspondence of the Department has grown to such an extent that an additional Stenographer and Typewriter and a Filing Clerk will be needed for next year.

In no other office in the Department has the work grown with such giant strides as in the Chief Clerk's. An increase of work in any branch of the service is im-

mediately reflected in this office. The combined growth of every division of the Department therefore throws a very great amount of work on the Chief Clerk. The additional Clerks requested are required both for the natural growth of work and for the additional work which will shortly come in connection with the opening of the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Mt. Hope and the new buildings about to be opened at the hospitals under the control of the Department located in the City.

The great number of buildings which the Department is now constructing at such widely separated parts of the City makes it impossible with the present corps of Inspectors to properly inspect the work as it progresses. This matter of inspection is very vital and the additional men are very urgently needed to protect the City's interests.

The establishment of a drug laboratory has proven such a success and has been the means of saving so much money to the Department that it is planned to extend its work to the Tuberculosis Sanatorium and to all the tuberculosis clinics. With an expected daily census averaging over 400 patients in excess of present conditions, the amount of drugs consumed will greatly increase. The Apothecary and Laboratory Assistants are required to prepare the supplies for this increased demand.

The additional Clerk in the Sanitary Superintendent's office is to properly care for the natural growth of the work there.

The Scarlet Fever Hospital will probably be opened around November 1, 1905. This being entirely new will require the employees mentioned to properly care for the patients to be treated, estimated at about 275 daily.

Preparatory to alterations begun in August on the Willard Parker Hospital Building, the number of patients treated was gradually being diminished and the employees dropped so that the July roll, as shown above, is not the full quota. When these alterations are complete, which will be about November 1, 1905, the capacity of this hospital will have been doubled. This means, of course, a much larger number of employees. The necessity of this increased capacity for treating contagious diseases is discussed in the explanation of the increase requested in the Hospital Fund.

The Medical Clerk requested is to fill a vacancy for which there has not been sufficient funds to enable a new appointment to be made. The Tabulator is necessitated by the great growth in the number of records received in this borough.

The Typewriting Copyist is requested so that all transcripts from the records may be typewritten, where now only a portion can be so copied, the balance being written by hand.

The additional Bacteriologist and Laboratory Assistant asked for in the Research Laboratory are required for extended research work in connection with typhoid fever, malaria, dysentery, etc. The Laboratory Assistant in the Vaccine Laboratory is to cover an existing vacancy, one man having been transferred to assist in the Drug Laboratory. The Medical Inspectors requested are required for work in connection with pneumonia, cerebro spinal meningitis, typhoid fever and for the inspection and investigation of the bacteriological aspect of the water supply question. The reports of the respective Commissions in pneumonia and cerebro spinal meningitis, to which more specific reference is made under notes on "Laboratory Fund," make it incumbent upon the Department to exercise supervision over these cases

with a view to lessening their number and severity. At the present writing there is an unusually large number of typhoid cases in the Greater City and especially in certain sections of the Borough of Brooklyn. It is with the hope that the increase in this dread disease may be checked through efficient inspection that these men are requested. Two of the number are required for bacteriological investigations along the watersheds. By keeping in touch with this situation much may be done to prevent the spread of typhoid fever and other diseases communicable through the water supply.

The additional Bacteriologist is required to assist in the great volume of examinations now made in the Diagnosis Laboratory. The work in this laboratory has increased 100 per cent. in the last three or four years and still no additional Bacteriologists have been appointed.

Up to the present time the Physicians in the Tuberculosis Clinic have been volunteers without compensation. This has been most unsatisfactory. No discipline could be enforced and the doctors came and went as they chose. When private business interfered they did not report at all. Good men would not serve continuously. It has been considered necessary therefore to alter the system so that the Department can control these men and get sufficient service. Special reference to the work of the clinic is made under the heading of the "Tuberculosis Fund."

No phase of the Department's work in recent years has been watched with more interest nor been pregnant with better or more important results than that of the Medical Inspectors in the schools. With uniform success the Department has conducted its campaign in the schools, first with the object in mind of preventing or reducing to a minimum the spread of infectious diseases among the school children, it being recognized that in no other place were conditions so favorable for the transmission of contagion; second, with the introduction of the School Nurse, who has proved her worth and is now a fixture, whose particular field is to supplement the Inspector, giving treatment where practicable and instructing the parents of the children excluded, how to carry out the Inspector's orders and in the quickest possible time to have the child returned to the school; and now, third, by the appointment of more Inspectors, to examine the children for defective vision, spinal troubles, throat and ear troubles and other physical defects, and thus place such children in the way of having their defective bodies rectified and made more useful to them.

How many hundreds and thousands of children have been condemned by their teachers as stupid or worse, whose lack of ability to keep up with their schoolmates was due to the fact that they could not see sufficiently well to read the lessons on the blackboards and charts or who could not understandingly hear what their teachers said. Over thirty per cent. of the children in the public schools of this great City have defective vision. Over forty-five per cent. have some physical defect. A very large proportion of these could be permanently cured or helped. What an opportunity for raising the standard of intelligence in our school system! Health and education should walk hand in hand. This corps of physicians and nurses is maintained to foster this intimate relation. The range of its usefulness has not yet been definitely ascertained. By eliminating a large proportion of the so-called stupid children the City will gain in intelligent citizenship, and this gain should show on the right side of the ledger containing the records of criminal offences.

It is hoped that the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment may see this work in its true light and grant the full amount requested.

The practice for years past has been to transfer the School Inspectors to the Summer Corps work. The work of the Summer Corps is confined to July and August. Since 1898 the money for the Summer Corps has been appropriated by bond issue. There seems no good reason why this should be so as the corps is recognized as a

fixture in the Department's work. The salaries of the Medical Inspectors are, therefore, shown for a full year instead of ten months as heretofore, the two additional months being for the Summer Corps work.

The school Nurses, at first an experiment, have been so useful that it is extremely desirable that, so fast as is practicable, the service be extended to all the schools.

An increase in the number of Sanitary Police is urgently needed. The present squad of 67 men is wholly inadequate to promptly and efficiently do the work assigned to them. The appropriation allowed in 1904 (\$71,600) provided for 51 men. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, recognizing that this number was insufficient, appropriated an additional \$17,000 by Special Revenue Bonds. In the Budget for 1905 the appropriation was increased to \$76,000, enough for 54 men. Again recognizing that this was insufficient, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$21,838.08. The number thus provided is still too small to properly do all the work required by the wonderfully rapid growth of the City and the Department. Special attention is called to the great increase in transportation facilities, particularly the subway, which means an increased amount of work for this corps. There is constant sanitary supervision of all transportation lines.

The work performed by this squad includes special inspections in the tenement house districts; obtaining evidence for prosecutions of violators of the provisions of the Sanitary Code and Health Laws; serving important papers; assisting in night and early morning inspections of milk and foodstuffs; enforcing the orders of the Board for the vacation of premises declared unsanitary by the Department; assisting in vaccination service and in the enforced removal of contagious disease patients; inspections of lodging-houses; enforcement of the spitting ordinances; investigating the sanitary condition of the streets and public places, including the storage of wagons thereon; inspection of smoke nuisances, etc., etc.

"Supplies and Contingencies."

The actual expenditures charged against this appropriation during the year 1904 amounted to \$56,648.79. This was in excess of the amount asked for 1905 by about \$1,200. The indicated expenditure for 1905 is approximately \$60,000. To this has been added a small amount for the natural increase in the work of the Department, and \$5,000 to provide for additional mezzanine floors in the Manhattan office building to relieve the overcrowded condition existing thereat. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized Revenue Bonds to supplement this appropriation in 1904 to the amount of \$18,378. In 1905 the appropriation was increased by about \$9,000, and was further supplemented by Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$7,500, thus establishing the fact that the necessity for an increased appropriation exists.

In general it may be said that the records of the Department will show greatly extended and increased service in every line of work necessitating expenditures from this appropriation.

The Department has just completed a new laboratory building which will be occupied before this Budget is finally fixed. In this building there have been pro-

vided increased facilities for chemical research. The Department has been conducting some experiments in the matter of food and drug adulterations and substitutions and is convinced as a result of this work that the conditions found are a grave menace to life and health. Such substitutions as wood alcohol for grain alcohol, acetanilid for phenacetine, and others of like kind, are extremely serious. The adulteration of food products with large quantities of preservatives, all more or less harmful, and with other foreign substances, is becoming the general practice rather than the exception. All these matters the Department considers as very important, and with additional help and better facilities much work can and will be done toward checking this growing criminal practice.

The Department has been conducting a campaign of education among the members of the medical profession through the medium of circulars and pamphlets. This campaign will be extended the coming year to other people with whom the Department comes in contact, and the warfare for good sanitary conditions, which means life and health, pushed aggressively along the entire line. It is estimated that this will mean a considerable increase in the postage account.

"Disinfection"

The sum requested for disinfection is practically the same as that included in our request for 1905. The amount allowed for 1904, namely, \$34,700, was entirely inadequate, and recognizing this fact, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$55,000, to supplement the appropriation. In 1905 the appropriation was increased to \$63,050. This increase, namely, \$28,350, was still insufficient, and the Board of Estimate again recognizing this fact, authorized the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$26,000. The increase of approximately \$12,000 requested for next year over the amounts allowed by appropriations and bonds for the years 1904 and 1905 is due to increased work along this line. Specifically might be mentioned the disinfection in cases of cerebro-spinal men-

ingitis, an entirely new departure. Disinfection is now general in tuberculosis where before it was only done in special cases. The history of measles in this City shows a largely increased number of cases reported every other year. The year 1906, if precedents are followed, will be the year in which we may expect a great many cases. It is the present intention to disinfect after every case of measles, which, of course, will add materially to the cost. A more thorough organization of the work of disinfection, in the boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond, which is being effected, will mean more disinfections performed and, therefore, more expense. Up to two years ago no efficient disinfection was performed in the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond. All of which the Board of Health hopes and expects will have its proper effect on the death rate.

In our explanation of the large increase in the 1905 estimate for this purpose we called attention to the fact that the hospital appropriations for a number of years had been insufficient, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in recognition of this fact had supplemented the appropriations by authorizing the issue of Special Revenue Bonds. In 1901, \$43,000 was so appropriated; in 1902, \$37,000; in 1903, \$42,000; in 1904, \$102,500; in 1905 (thus far), \$67,000. The appropriations in the meantime have increased from \$91,500 in 1901 to \$147,596.48 in 1905, or a gain of \$56,096.48. In the same time the average daily census at the hospitals (not including the eye hospital) has jumped from 357 patients in 1901 to 380 patients in 1904, and 450 patients for 1905. An average of over 70 of these patients in the year 1904 and 1905 have been tuberculosis patients. The cost per patient for tuberculosis cases is more than double that for the other contagious diseases. In 1904 there was added to this the expense of the Hospital for Contagious Eye Diseases at One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Pleasant avenue and the Dispensary for Contagious Eye Diseases at Gouverneur slip. At the former of these places there was a daily average of 10 operative cases and over 150 clinical cases. At the dispensary only clinical cases were treated, and of these there were many hundreds daily.

To this explanation for the increase in expenditures from 1901 to 1905 might be added a word as to increased efficiency. In 1901 the quality of the service, the character of the help, the quality and quantity of the food and other supplies had reached a very low ebb and was the subject of much comment. Since that time all these conditions have been vastly improved, so that all the institutions are conducted in a manner to be a credit to the Department and to the City. They may be now regarded as model hospitals for the care of contagious diseases.

Presuming the cost for conducting the hospitals in 1905 to be \$214,596.48, as shown above, there is still to be explained the difference between this sum and the amount shown in our estimate for 1906, namely, \$140,578.52. This additional amount is required to cover the cost of maintenance of the new Scarlet Fever Hospital at the foot of East Sixteenth street, Manhattan, to be opened this fall, accommodating 275 patients; the enlarged facilities at the Willard Parker Hospital, increasing the capacity there about 60 patients, and the new Scarlet Fever Pavilion at the Kingston Avenue Hospital, just opened, having a capacity for 80 patients—in all an increase of 415 patients per day, or nearly double the present capacity. Estimating the cost of maintenance per day at approximately \$1.28, as may be calculated from the figures given, it will be seen that the additional amount required for the 415 patients in excess of the present daily census would be \$531.20 per day, or \$193,888, whereas we modestly ask for but \$140,578 additional, in the hope that in handling larger numbers we may materially decrease the cost per capita.

The facilities for the care and treatment of cases of contagious diseases prior to this date have been entirely inadequate. The Department has been for several years preparing to meet this deficiency and is only just now completing some buildings which will in a measure meet this emergency. It is manifestly necessary for the control of contagious diseases in the tenement houses that all cases should be moved to the isolation hospitals. Proper isolation can never be enforced in the tenement houses. The City of New York is far behind the great cities of Great Britain and the Continent in this matter of isolation hospitals for contagious diseases. Our facilities as compared with such cities as London, Berlin, Paris, Munich, and even Boston are very unfavorable. Boston, by the general removal of all cases of contagious diseases since the completion of their isolation hospital, has been able to reduce its death rate 50 per cent. There is no question but what considerable reduction in the death rate of this City can be made if the facilities are sufficiently great to remove all cases of contagious diseases from the tenement districts.

In accordance with the English estimate of the proper facilities for caring for contagious diseases, there should be at least one bed to every 1,000 of the population. If this standard were followed in this City we should have accommodations for about 4,000 patients, whereas we actually have, with the new buildings considered, only a trifle over 1,000 beds. The best authorities agree that one of the main points of difference between the death rates of London and Berlin and that of New York City is due to the greater prevalence of contagious diseases in this City. If the death rate here could be reduced to that of the cities mentioned it would mean a saving of 12,000 lives each year.

Since the service at the Bellevue and Gouverneur Hospitals for the treatment of contagious eye diseases has been withdrawn there have been no adequate facilities for the treatment of these cases. The small hospital building which the Department of Health operates at One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Pleasant avenue is

only sufficiently large to accommodate cases which arise in the upper section of the Borough of Manhattan. The request for \$10,000 for the care, maintenance and treatment of patients suffering from purulent ophthalmia, trachoma and other contagious eye diseases is intended to cover the cost of treatment of these cases at private hospitals. When it is considered that from 40 to 45 per cent. of the cases in our blind asylums and institutions are there because, when suffering from some of these diseases, there were no facilities for their proper treatment, the importance of this work can be readily understood.

The total number of visits for treatment at the eye hospital at One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Pleasant avenue and the dispensary for the treatment of contagious eye diseases at Gouverneur slip since these places were opened a little over a year ago is 335,983.

The rapid growth in population in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens has made it necessary to increase this emergency ambulance service in these boroughs. Service has been established at three new points, and the additional sum of \$3,300 requested covers this additional expense.

"Laboratory Fund, Borough of Manhattan."

The expense of conducting the bacteriological laboratories of the Department has been met since their inception by the receipts from the sales of the antitoxins and other laboratory products. These receipts for some years have remained about the same. On the other hand the work of the laboratories has increased immensely. The Department is, therefore, placed in the position of being compelled to enter the commercial field and endeavor to increase its receipts by increasing its sales. This is contrary to the spirit of the charter and objectionable in many obvious ways. Not only so, but the effect has been to retard the natural and necessary progression of the laboratory work to the great detriment of the Department. This lack of sufficient working funds has been met in part in the last few years by the issue of Special Revenue Bonds. In 1903 there was appropriated for this purpose \$6,000; in 1904, \$27,000; in 1905, thus far, \$12,000 has been issued, while a request is pending for \$15,000 additional to carry this work through the year.

We would respectfully suggest to your Honorable Board that it is only right and proper that the City should provide directly the funds necessary to produce these products and to carry on the research, diagnosis and other work of these laboratories. We further suggest that when such funds have been provided, the City establish the

policy already in operation in other municipalities and in some States, of manufacturing only sufficient of the various products as may be necessary for the use of our own citizens, and that this be distributed free upon proper requisitions of the Department's officers or practicing physicians. In this connection it might be well to add that already the Department is distributing free or using in its own hospitals three-quarters of the products manufactured, so that the step to an absolutely free basis would not be a large one.

Special attention is called to the amounts included in this fund for the continuation of the work of the special commissions appointed for the investigation of pneumonia and cerebro-spinal meningitis. The preliminary reports of these commissions are now in the printer's hands. That with reference to pneumonia is considered by those who have seen it as the most important scientific contribution published in recent years.

It has been shown conclusively that cerebro-spinal meningitis is a communicable disease and the method of its transmission has been practically determined. The work of these commissions has not yet been entirely completed and it is very important that it should be continued for another year so that a basis can be worked out for intelligent sanitary control of these diseases.

The increase in this fund is requested for the purpose of conducting the same work with reference to the extermination of the breeding places for mosquitoes that the Department is at present undertaking in the Borough of Richmond. It has been proved in certain sections of the country, notably the Newark meadows, that when properly drained and ditched, the breeding places on the marsh lands may be entirely exterminated. When it is considered that beyond reasonable doubt mosquitoes are the means of communicating certain diseases, the importance of continuing this work becomes apparent.

"Tuberculosis Fund."

It is hoped and expected that the Department will be able to open its sanatorium for tuberculosis patients before the end of the present year. This sanatorium will be located at Mount Hope, Orange County, N. Y. The land is now being purchased and with the buildings now on the site for a basis, and with the construction of a number of small tent buildings suitable for the open air treatment, which can be quickly constructed, 200 patients can be cared for at one time.

Assuming this daily census on the same per capita cost as that shown in our other hospitals, it would take approximately \$93,500 for maintenance. The additional amount requested is to cover the first charges for furniture, horses, wagons, clothing, etc., and the item of transportation.

The funds for conducting the work of the tuberculosis clinic opened during 1904, has been appropriated by the issue of Special Revenue Bonds. Provisions is made in the estimate for this fund and the expenses of the clinics in the several boroughs, all of which are expected to be opened during the coming year.

Since the Department took up the sanitary supervision of the cases of tuberculosis in the City there has been a reduction in the mortality of some thirty-five per cent., or an approximate saving of 5,000 lives annually. The number of cases treated in the clinic in the Borough of Manhattan since its opening is 16,314.

This is the first municipal clinic ever established for the treatment of this disease in this country. Its success has surpassed all expectations. There are now being treated over eighty patients daily.

Attention is called to the following table, which shows the appropriations from 1898 to 1905, the Special Revenue Bonds issued to the Department of Health in the same period and the total of these two, which is the amount made available for the running expenses of the Department each year:

In addition to these amounts the Department has received on an average \$30,000 yearly from the sale of its laboratory products (vaccine virus and the various anti-toxins), and an average of \$25,000 yearly from the United States Government for the care, maintenance and treatment of immigrants ill with contagious diseases. In another section of this budget we have explained that the sums received from the sale of the laboratory products were used to provide the means for conducting the scientific work of our laboratories. No appropriations have been made for this work except when these receipts were insufficient, at which time they were supplemented by the issue of Special Revenue Bonds. We believe that the maintenance and extension of the scientific and preventive work of our bacteriological laboratories should not be dependent upon the sale of our products.

Notice was served on the Commissioner of Immigration under a previous administration that the United States Government must provide a place for the treatment of its own cases of contagious diseases, as the Department of Health could not continue to take these patients. Money has been appropriated by Congress for the building of a new island in this harbor on which to erect hospitals, and plans are now being drawn for the buildings.

If the recommendation of distributing the laboratory products free is approved, and the United States Government completes its hospitals during the coming year, the Department's resources will be reduced practically \$55,000 per annum.

Assuming that the receipts for 1905 from these two sources will reach the previous average amount viz., \$55,000, the actual increase in the Budget will be as follows:

In considering this large increase it is well to bear in mind that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has in a measure committed itself to a larger appropriation to the Department of Health. The following large sums have been appropriated for the erection of new buildings for increasing the accommodations for patients ill with contagious diseases:

A certain well-known philanthropist estimates that it takes 10 per cent. per annum on the cost price of the buildings to maintain the libraries which he is building in the cities and towns all over this country. The cost of conducting a contagious disease hospital is obviously greater. It would therefore appear that the Department's Budget from this one cause should be increased at least \$307,000.

In the explanations to the salary funds attention was particularly called to the new positions in excess of those actually on the July roll. Of the total increase in the salary funds, viz., \$747,264, a total of \$431,558 was accounted for in this way. The greater part of the balance remaining is explained by the appointments made during the year, which have been chargeable to the Special Revenue Bonds authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The amount of bonds so authorized in whole or in part for salaries is \$291,059.80. The remaining sum of \$24,646.20 can be accounted for by the fact that the appointments charged to the bond issues covered for the greater part only portions of the year, whereas the estimate assumes the positions to be filled for the entire year. The following table in brief shows the explanation for the salary increases:

Special attention is called to the fact that no money is requested for the purpose of increasing salaries.

The increases requested in the funds for purposes other than salaries have been carefully considered at the close of the tabulation for each particular fund. It is worthy of note, however, that of the \$509,740.52 representing the increase requested in these funds, \$131,338.08 was granted the Department in 1905 by issues of Special Revenue Bonds. The balance is more than accounted for by the money requested for conducting the new hospitals about to be opened within the City, and the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Mt. Hope, for the payment of the salaries of the additional Sanitary Police and for the amount required to conduct the scientific work in the bacteriological laboratories.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to herewith transmit the Departmental Estimate of the Department of Bridges for the year 1906. The estimates have been reduced to the very lowest point at which proper service can be maintained with economy.

The estimate for 1906 is larger than the appropriation allowed for the current year, but in order to maintain, repair and operate the bridges under the jurisdiction of this Department for the year 1905, and keep within the appropriation, it has been found necessary to omit, or at best to only partially make, certain urgent repairs thereto.

The largest increase is in the matter of maintaining the bridges over the Harlem river, and this amount is only \$77,475.88. Included in this item is \$27,920 for salaries, etc., for the new One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge, which has been opened to traffic this month. Deducting this amount, the increase asked for the proper maintenance of all these important structures, which have cost millions to construct, is only \$49,575.88.

The greater part of this sum is expected to be paid out for painting these bridges—something which they absolutely need to save them from deterioration, and which if unattended to will speedily, in the future, cause a much greater outlay. The fender piers and pavements of Willis Avenue and Third Avenue bridges require immediate and extensive repairs.

The increase asked for the Newtown creek bridges is mainly for maintaining and operating the new Vernon Avenue Bridge, which will be opened to the public this fall. This structure is over 1,700 feet in length and 58 feet in width, and compares in many respects with the bridges over the Harlem river.

The increase of \$11,478 in the appropriation for "Maintenance of and Repairs to Bridges in the Borough of Brooklyn" is made necessary by the request of the Fire Department to have this Department man Union, Carroll and Third Street bridges, over Gowanus canal, for the full twenty-four hours daily. At present there are no Bridgemen on duty at these bridges from 5.30 p. m. until 7.30 a. m. The reasons of the Fire Department for this request are more fully set forth in a copy of their correspondence which forms part of Schedule "E" of the Budget, to which I would most respectfully and earnestly call your attention.

The small increase asked for in the Borough of Queens is necessary to put the old and badly worn bridges in this borough in a fairly safe condition.

Attached to and forming part of the accompanying estimate are full explanations of any increase or decrease in the respective accounts to which I respectfully direct your attention.

There will be no unexpended balance for the year 1905.

The difference in the amount of the appropriation for 1905 and the total above shown has been caused by the transfer of two Assistant Engineers, one Transitman and one Draughtsman to the several boroughs and Divisions from the appropriation of Salaries, General Administration.

The request for the additional Clerk for 1906 at \$1,500 is necessary, because on August 1, 1905, I appointed a Clerk at this salary. His name does not appear upon the July roll, but he is at present employed by and working in the Department, and it is necessary to provide for his compensation.

The extra Clerk at \$1,050 asked for is to take the place of a Cashier at \$1,350, who was transferred to the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn. When this vacancy is filled, it will be at a saving of \$300 per annum.

The few increases in salaries asked for are to recompense a couple of faithful employees who have been long with the Department, and to put them on an equality with persons in other Departments doing similar work, and receiving compensation equal to that asked for.

It will be necessary soon to apply for a transfer of at least \$1,000 from some other appropriation to that of "Supplies and Contingencies, 1905," in order to get through the current year. There will be no unexpended balance for the year 1905.
The increase in the Newtown creek estimate is due to the maintenance of the new Vernon Avenue Bridge which will be opened for the public this fall. This structure is 1,700 feet in length and 58 feet in width. For the proper care thereof an increase of the force is necessary for properly cleaning the roadway, etc., and also the cost of maintaining, painting, etc., must be taken into consideration.

The apparent increase of one Bridge Keeper is only to fill a vacancy in a position which has existed for years, but in which there was no incumbent during the month of July, 1905.

The increase of \$3,500 for the salary of the Engineer in Charge of the Borough is due to his transfer from construction accounts of new work to the pay-roll of the Borough of The Bronx. For several months back he has been paid out of the former funds because the Board of Estimate and Apportionment provided no money to pay him from the account to which his salary is properly chargeable, although asked for last year.

The increases requested for laborers and skilled labor and materials are necessary for the proper conduct of the work. The appropriation for 1905 was the same as for the three preceding years, although the work has been increased by the opening of new bridges and by the growing needs of the old ones that are wearing out. Some urgent repairs must be left undone unless the money be provided for in this appropriation.

I feel justified in asking that the Bridge Tenders in the Borough of The Bronx be given equal compensation with those in the other boroughs. At present they receive less than any others of their grade. They perform the same services as the men located elsewhere, and some of them, who are called "tide men," are on duty twice each day at high tide, with "swings" of eight hours intervening. I recommend that they be paid uniformly \$839.50 instead of \$730 per year. This increase of salary and the filling of two vacancies caused by transfer of men to other boroughs accounts for the additional expense for 1906.

The increase of \$3,500 is the salary of the Engineer in charge of the Borough of Queens. This amount was asked for last year, but not allowed by the Board of Estimate, which allowed only the same appropriation as had been given for the year 1904. The appropriation allowed for this year was absolutely inadequate to do the work of maintaining and repairing these old and badly worn-out bridges scattered throughout the Borough of Queens.

Every year makes more and greater repairs absolutely necessary, and it will be a very false and expensive economy to reduce this estimate for the year 1906, as it has been figured to the very lowest sum consistent with safety.

The proposed increased salaries for the members of the clerical staff are deemed only fair compensation for the services rendered.

An issue of revenue bonds permitted the appointment of ten additional hostlers from August 1, 1905, so that the increase in this class of employees is actually thirteen instead of twenty-three, and the extra number are required on account of the increase in the number of horses.

The twelve engineers for four launches are required in order that policemen now performing that work may be returned to their appropriate duties in the uniformed force.

The increase of \$160 each for the two elevators at the Central Office, Manhattan (which would make their rate of wages about \$2.75 each per day), is requested for the reason that they are constantly on duty, on tours of twelve hours each, including Sundays and holidays.

The increase in the number of mechanics will permit of a more economical and satisfactory prosecution of the general work of repair and alteration than is at present possible.

"Supplies for Police."

The estimated requirements for this account for the year 1906 are based upon the actual expenditures for the year 1904 as compared with the actual expenditures and the estimated expenditures and necessities for the year 1905. The items of increase and decrease, in comparison with the amounts allowed for 1905, are shown in the estimate submitted, and the following statement shows the actual and estimated requirements for 1905 and also the estimated requirements for 1906.

Items of increase appearing the foregoing statement, which are not specially referred to, are provided to make allowance for the normal enlargement of the requirements of the department.

"Police Station-houses—Alterations, Fitting-up, etc."

The following statement will explain the necessity for the amount requested for this account:

1. Painting, etc..... \$90,000 00

Fifty-seven station-houses to be painted, interior and exterior, and the plastering and woodwork of same to be repaired, and three station-houses to be partially painted, with necessary repairs to plastering and woodwork, at the estimated cost of \$1,500 each. None of the surfaces covered by this work have been painted or repaired within the last eight years, and many of them for as long as fifteen and twenty years.

2. Masonry, etc..... \$20,000 00

The walls, copings, chimneys, sidewalks and basement floors of several station-houses are in a cracked and defective condition. In most cases these conditions have existed for some years owing to lack of sufficient appropriation to make necessary repairs. The conditions are more or less dangerous and from the standpoint of safety, sanitation and economy should receive immediate attention.

3. Plumbing, etc..... \$25,000 00

During the present year more than \$30,000 will be expended in making repairs to defective plumbing throughout the Department. In very many instances modern plumbing should be installed as the old sewer and water connections and plumbing fixtures in station-houses erected years ago are antiquated, unsanitary and inadequate.

4. Steam heating, etc..... \$10,000 00

The repairs to steam heating plants during the present year will cost, approximately, \$9,000, of which over \$6,000 has already been authorized. The additional steam heating plants installed during the year, together with the old plants, which will require more or less repairs at the close of the winter season will bring the amount required fully up to that asked for 1906.

5. Roofs, etc..... \$8,000 00

The roofs of several station-houses are in more or less defective condition and may be kept in repair for the balance of the year, but will have to be thoroughly overhauled, and in many cases entirely renewed, during 1906. In addition, modern galvanized iron ventilating skylights should be furnished and installed to replace old wooden ones, and others provided in cases where extra ventilation is required.

6. Carpenter work, etc..... \$15,000 00

The present wardrobe facilities in several station-houses must be increased to meet the demands caused by continual additions to the Police Force; the carpenter work in general will require more or less repairs, and new bookcases, stationary desks, partitions, etc., will have to be furnished.

7. Locks, etc..... \$500 00

The locks of prisons, etc., in several of the ninety odd buildings occupied by this Department are in a more or less defective condition. In many cases new locks of modern pattern will be required to replace those installed several years ago. Sidewalk and desk railings require extensive repairs, and new railings, grating, window guards, etc., are necessary.

8. Steamer "Patrol" and launches..... \$10,000 00

It is estimated that this amount will be required for alterations and repairs to the steamer and launches of the Department. Extensive repairs will be necessary on some of the launches in order that they may be in a more serviceable condition for the work required of them.

"Contingent Expenses of Central Department and Station-houses, etc."

The amount of \$50,000 is asked for this account because it is for the proper transaction of Police business. The amount expended for which bills have been received, amounts to \$30,017.29, and it is estimated that \$20,000 more will be required for the balance of the year.

"Additions to Mounted Squad."

A request is made for twenty-five additional horses for mounted service at the price which is now being paid, and for the necessary equipments. The extension of this service is desired to promote the efficiency of the Department.

"Extra Telephone and Telegraph Supplies."

An explanation of the amounts asked for this account is contained in schedule annexed marked "B."

"Police Station-houses—Rents."

The items for this account are for rentals for which leases have been authorized by the Sinking Fund Commissioners, with an additional amount of \$4,000 for "Additional Station-houses—Approximated," which is asked for in order that additional buildings may be acquired if necessary for the needs of the Department.

"Police Pension Fund."

This appropriation is asked for in pursuance of subdivision 12 of section 353 of the Charter, and an explanation relative to the amount required is contained in schedule annexed marked "C."

It is now estimated that there will be no unexpended balances of appropriations made to the Department for the year 1905. Should a surplus exist in one account it will be necessary to request a transfer from that account to another where a deficiency will exist.

Dear Sir—In the Departmental Estimate for 1906 I respectfully recommend that the following extra appropriations be asked for the maintenance and extension of the Police Telephone and Signal Service:

For placing police lines underground in Borough of Brooklyn.....	\$40,000 00
For maintenance and extension of underground cables in Manhattan and The Bronx, and for placing wires underground in Queens and Richmond	15,000 00
For rental of street patrol telephone lines and instruments.....	9,000 00

Total..... \$64,000 00

In 1904 and 1905 the Board of Estimate granted each year the sum of \$36,000 for placing wires underground in Brooklyn. With this appropriation (\$72,000) we have placed in the subway all trunk lines for which there is subway accommodation, twenty-five (25) miles of cable, containing from 2 to 68 conductors, 225 miles of conductors. These trunk lines connect Police Headquarters with the police stations, police courts, hospitals and City departments. The work is still in progress and by January 1 next will have been completed.

The \$40,000 is required in order to begin the important work of placing the police signal lines in this borough underground. This work is costly, as the existing subways are not available, consequently there will be considerable subsidiary construction work in each precinct.

In Manhattan last year with the appropriation of \$28,000 we repaired the police cables which were damaged by the enormous amount of underground construction during the past several years; also placed all the police wires underground in The Bronx.

This year we ask for only \$15,000 for maintenance and extension of underground cables in Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, and in order to place the police wires underground in the more thickly inhabited sections of Queens and Richmond.

The sum of \$9,000 is asked for the rental of lines and telephones for police patrol service in eight precincts in the Borough of The Bronx, viz., Thirty-fourth, Thirty-fifth, Thirty-sixth, Thirty-seventh, Thirty-eighth, Thirty-ninth, Fortieth and Forty-first.

This service was installed in Manhattan a year ago, and has given satisfaction; upon recommendation of the Superintendent of Telegraph, the Police Commissioner has approved of the extension of this system of communication to The Bronx.

The appropriations herein requested are absolutely necessary in order to maintain efficient telephone and signal service, and to enable this Department to co-operate with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in the removal of poles from the streets.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith the departmental estimate of the amount of money that will be required to conduct the business of the Fire Department for the year 1906, in accordance with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter. The original of this estimate has this day been forwarded to the Mayor, and a duplicate to the Board of Aldermen.

The amount asked for the year 1905 was \$6,854,363.50—the amount allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the Budget was \$6,265,864.74. The total amount asked for the year 1906 is \$6,876,491.25, an increase of \$610,626.51 over the amount allowed in the Budget for 1905. Of this increase \$423,131.64 alone will be required for the payment of salaries of members of the uniformed force appointed and promoted during the year 1905, for advancements in grades, and for the purpose of extending the paid system in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond. The necessity for the other increases are specifically stated in the several bureau estimates.

Note—Owing to the increase in the numerical strength of the Fire Department, as to Firemen and Engineers of Steamer, it has been possible to grant them additional time off for recreation, so that they are now receiving a day off in every five in addition to three leaves of twelve hours each per month throughout the entire year. The Chief Officers, Foremen and Lieutenants, however, during vacation season (owing to their limited number) are precluded from receiving the three twelve-hour leaves each month, from May to December; therefore, subordinate members of the Department are receiving more time off than their superiors. If it is the desire of the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment to permit the officers of the Fire Department to receive additional time off, say one day in every four, with no short leaves, it will be necessary for the Fire Commissioner to increase the uniformed force in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (by process of promotion) with 1 additional Deputy Chief, 4 Chiefs of Battalion and 63 Assistant Foremen, and the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens by 1 additional Deputy Chief, 3 Chiefs of Battalion and 33 Assistant Foremen.

Dear Sir—Complying with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, I transmit herewith, for the consideration and action of your Board, the annual estimate for the appropriation of funds to the Department of Street Cleaning for the year 1906, amounting to \$6,880,721.13, and embracing the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn.

In placing this estimate before your Board I desire to invite attention to the following facts:

First, I wish to point out that the population of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn on July 1, 1904, was..... 3,570,012

—and it is only reasonable to suppose that next year we will have at least an additional 345,000 loads to collect and dispose of over 1905, the ratio of increase for each year being approximately the same.

I wish to invite the attention of the Board especially to the above exhibits.

No single borough has at any time had sufficient funds to properly conduct the business of this Department or give the satisfaction that the inhabitants have every right to expect.

Second—I have provided for an increase in the general administration account, amounting in all to \$2,500, an increase over the amount appropriated for 1905, in the salaries to a few underpaid officers of the uniformed force, who hold responsible positions and whose services are worth more to the City than they are now receiving, which increase has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by resolution adopted April 28, 1905.

Third—There are also some slight increases in the administration account, all boroughs, of \$56,700, due in part to providing for the pay of a Mechanical Draughtsman at \$1,800; the payment of an additional Messenger at \$900; and also in part to the payment of officers in the uniformed force that have never yet been appointed in the Borough of Brooklyn, and which are very much needed.

I have provided in this estimate for an increase of pay to the District Superintendents now in charge of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Borough of The Bronx. In the first instance, for the Borough of Brooklyn, this increase is \$700, and for the Borough of The Bronx it is \$450. These two officers are both in charge of boroughs and perform the duties which would be performed by Deputy Commissioners, did they exist in them, and are consequently held to a very strict responsibility, and should most certainly receive an increase commensurate with their work and responsibilities. These increases have also been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the resolution of April 28, 1905.

Fourth—The increase for all the boroughs in the sweeping account, of \$377,295.04, provides not only for a much needed increase in the number, and it provides also for extra pay at the rate of \$2 per day per man for Sunday work, which I believe to be a simple act of justice, and it is highly recommended.

Fifth—The increase in the carting account for all boroughs amounts to \$477,317.94. This increase is also to pay for a much needed increase in the number, and it provides also for an increase in the pay of a Driver from \$720 to \$800 per annum, and for extra pay for the Driver for Sunday work on the same basis as the Sweeper. The increase of annual pay for the Drivers I have found to be absolutely necessary, as the work is very much heavier, the hours considerably longer, and my experience has been that it is exceedingly difficult to secure the number of Drivers required at the present rate of pay. While these men are at work they are charged with a living responsibility, that of the horse. They have under their immediate charge at that time a considerable amount of public property besides the horse—the cart, harness, etc., and taking all these facts into consideration and the added fact that we cannot get them unless their pay is higher than that of a sweeper, I have increased their salary for the reasons herein stated, and unless this increase is allowed it will become more difficult, from time to time, to secure the services of Drivers at all.

Inviting attention to the increase for Sweepers and for Drivers in regard to the matter of pay for labor upon Sunday, I would say that the work of cleaning under certain conditions of weather becomes a work of mercy and necessity, which must be carried on upon Sunday as well as upon other days. For this work I firmly believe the Sweepers and Drivers should receive extra compensation.

Sixth—In the final disposition account in all boroughs the increase is \$187,119.99, which I have put at the lowest figure at which this work can be properly performed.

Seventh—In the account of wages, supplies, rents and contingencies in all boroughs, the increase is \$86,875.96. This increase is due to the necessity of providing proper quarters for the increased number of Sweepers and Drivers and adequate stabling for the horses. Attention must be called to the fact that there is a decrease of \$17,097.95 between what was estimated for 1905 and what is estimated for 1906.

The total increase in all accounts in all boroughs, namely, \$1,185,283.37, appears on the face of it to be a very large one over what was actually allowed for 1905, but it is an increase of but 6 per cent., approximately, over what was asked for for 1905, to wit, \$6,561,271.53. It must be clearly seen from the figures of increase in population, increase in area and amount of work done, that a relative proportion of at least 6 per cent. is very reasonable.

This account has been made up with the greatest possible care and with due regard for economy. The Department has never been supplied with adequate funds, and the growing needs of this most rapidly growing City can only be met by a large expenditure.

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith, for presentation to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, an estimate of the expenses of the Municipal Civil Service Commission for the year 1906, amounting to \$130,630.

The appropriation allowed this Department for the year 1905 was \$115,000. The increase asked for over that amount is \$15,630, which includes the salaries of two Commissioners fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at \$5,000 per annum on March 1, 1905. The remaining \$5,630 is to provide for additional help, increased postage and raises in salary of some of the employees of this Commission.

In showing the expenditure of the appropriation for 1905, based on the expenses of this Department for the first seven months of this year, the same would amount to a total of \$120,560, being \$5,560 in excess of the appropriation allowed us. This amount, however, is reduced by \$2,820, an item paid for postage, which was provided from an excess of last year's appropriation, leaving an excess of \$2,740, which we hope by some economical management to reduce to nothing, thereby keeping within our appropriation of \$115,000.

Supplies and Contingencies.

The amount called for under this heading is based on the actual consumption (with a small percentage for natural increase in the census) by the various subdivisions of the Department, and is absolutely necessary.

Our estimate for 1905 under this appropriation was cut \$121,381.69. The estimate was submitted on a form as recommended by the Commissioners of Accounts and as prescribed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in accordance with which this estimate is made. The appropriation allowed for the year 1904 was not sufficient to meet the necessities of the Department, and a further appropriation was allowed. The appropriation for the current year will not be sufficient for the actual necessities of the Department, and will be the subject of a request for a further appropriation before the close of the year.

This is due to several causes. First, may be mentioned the cut in the amount asked for; second, the increase in the census is larger than anticipated, and, third, we have been called upon to pay for the care of patients from New York City in the New York State Hospital for Incipient Tuberculosis at Raybrook, Essex County, N. Y., for which no provision was made in the estimate submitted for the current year. This will amount to at least \$12,000 for the year, based on the bills to hand to July 1, 1905.

Alterations, Additions and Repairs to Buildings and Apparatus.

The appropriation requested for the above is \$239,750. This is an increase of \$137,250 over the amount allowed under this heading for 1905. This amount is not large when it is considered that most of the buildings of this Department are old and in constant need of repairs. The Department is never allowed money enough under this heading to do all the necessary repairs in any one year, consequently only the most urgent are made each year. If all the buildings could be put in first-class condition in one year it would not require so much to keep them in repair afterward. It will be seen by examining this list that the money is requested to repair roofs, gutters, window sashes, ceilings, plumbing and the heating systems at the various buildings. These are the most urgent, and all should be done, for they cannot be neglected any longer. Again, owing to the constantly increasing census, the Department has to resort to all kinds of expedients, such as fitting up for temporary use abandoned buildings in order to care for the poor and sick that apply for aid.

Dear Sir—Responding to your communication dated July 13, 1905, the Board of Management of this Institution respectfully submits the following as their Department Estimate for the year 1906. This conservative estimate of the several amounts necessary for the maintenance and support of this institution we trust will receive more favorable consideration than the estimates which we presented to the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the past two years.

The sum of \$48,000 is found insufficient, after exerting the most careful and economic expenditure consistent with efficient service, for the support, education and discipline of a largely increased population, although the per capita expense has been reduced each year for the past four years until it has reached the sum of \$192.04, based on a population of 275.27, an amount less than that of any other institution of a similar character under City or State control; and when we consider the large advance in the cost of a number of articles of supplies in our contracts for 1905 we anticipate an advance in our cost for support during the year 1906, and regret to state that it will be necessary to have an application made to the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a further sum over the amount assigned for 1905 to carry us through the year, as the present appropriation will be exhausted by November 1, 1905.

A review of the population received and discharged during the past year, dating from August 1, 1904, to August 1, 1905, will be sufficient to explain the excellent efforts of your Board of Management of this institution to keep the same within the desired limit, and is as follows:

During the past year we cared for 426 boys, a number largely in excess of anything accomplished before. We received from the courts 135 boys, and discharged to their parents or employment 145, a number in excess of those received. The population on July 31, 1905, was 281, and the average daily school attendance during the year was 275.21, and the capacity of the institution, under the supervision and certified by the Board of Health, is now enlarged to 325.

We estimated on January 1, 1905, as suggested by your Honor, that the population of the school would be reduced to 250 boys, but the large assignments from the courts of Kings and Queens counties have made this impossible, and if we can judge the future by the past, with this constant increase of commitments, the estimate of the population for the year 1906 should be placed at 325.

It is gratifying to report that we have received replies from 107 boys discharged, 40 of whom are employed and self-supporting, 43 attending school or awaiting the reopening of the same in September, and less than 4 per cent. of the entire number discharged have reached other institutions by commitment. If this report of those released can be accepted, the standard of management of this institution will compare favorably with that of any other institution in the City, State or nation, and we trust that an effectual cure has been made in the boys discharged, which will prevent the creation of candidates for the penitentiary and State prisons, and thereby remunerate the taxpayers and the administration of our municipality for the amount expended in the discipline, education and reformation of the boys committed to this institution.

Dear Sir—Pursuant to the resolution of your Board of June 30, 1905, I beg to submit schedules showing the officers and employees of my Bureau and their salaries in 1906. The amount allowed me for my contingencies for 1905 and the amount required for 1906 also appear in said schedules.

The sum required by this Bureau for the year 1906 is an increase of \$618 over the amount allowed and apportioned last year by the Board.

Mr. Frederick Monk, my storehouse custodian, occupies a position of responsibility and is inadequately recompensed, and I desire to increase his salary by \$120. Mr. Monk is a valuable assistant in this branch of my Bureau; large assets constantly pass through his hands. If this small increase is not granted I may lose Mr. Monk.

In regard to the increase of \$218 for supplies and contingencies, the amount allowed by your Honorable Board has for three years proven insufficient, particularly as now office furniture, supplies, etc., have to be paid for therefrom, and at the end of each year I have been forced to apply to your Board to cover a deficiency.

Pursuant to a resolution of your Board of June 16, 1905, approved by the Board of Aldermen, June 20, 1905, and approved by the Mayor, June 27, 1905, the salary of Mr. Owen A. Keegan, the Messenger in this Bureau, was increased from \$720 to \$1,000 per annum, and this increase is a part of the total increase of \$618 which I request for the year 1906.

From personal attendance and observation I am convinced that the expenditure for music is a wise one, and I am satisfied that the increase asked for is fully warranted.

The largest playground and out-door gymnasium on the parks has been completed and will be opened to the public within a few weeks, and later in the season, another will be added in Thomas Jefferson and DeWitt Clinton Parks, respectively. These parks also contain new and elaborate comfort stations and bathhouses. It must be clear to your Honorable Board that these new features cannot be maintained without added cost, and I beg to remind you that it is work which cannot be left undone or even curtailed in the event of an insufficient appropriation.

The increase asked for is not desired to permit of an increase in expenditure on this item, but simply to meet the actual cost of this work as established on the present economical basis.

Care and Preservation of Street Trees.

Estimate for 1906..... **\$94,150 00**

The trees of the City streets and avenues having by law (chapter 453, Laws of 1902) been placed under the care of this Department, I desire to again call attention to the importance of making a liberal provision for their care and maintenance, as well as planting new trees and replacing dead and diseased ones.

The present condition of the trees is very unsatisfactory, as well as the method of caring for them. The trees on the streets in many sections of the City have been neglected for years, and the soil about them has become impoverished and needs fresh mould and manure.

For a systematic and intelligent care, etc., of these trees it will be necessary to divide the City into sections, the whole work to be under the charge of a man especially appointed for this work, as follows:

Owing to heavy rains washing away certain portions of the slopes of Riverside Park it will be necessary to reshape the same and to spread top soil and lay sod. The Engineer's estimate is \$10,000.

Riverside Retaining Wall Repairs.

Estimated for 1906..... **\$15,000 00**

It is found that the dry rubble retaining wall on the westerly side of Riverside drive is bulged in places and is settled in others. These defects should be remedied in order to prevent the possibility of damage to park property and settlement in the roadway and walks of the drive. It is the intention to take down and erect this wall, and to restore the pavements where necessary; also the lawns. The estimated cost is \$15,000.

Repairs to Drainage, Central Park.

Estimated for 1906..... **\$3,000 00**

Examinations have been made of the general drainage system of Central Park, and it is found that the same in certain sections is very defective. It is the intention to properly restore the same by making the necessary repairs at an estimated cost of \$3,000.

Maintenance of Asphalt Roadway Pavements.

Estimated for 1906..... \$10,000 00

There will be required, in order to properly maintain and repair the different asphalt roadways under the jurisdiction of this Department, upon which guarantee has expired, for the year 1906, the sum of \$10,000.

Repairs to Park Walks.

Estimated for 1906..... \$15,000 00

The asphalt and cement pavements have been found very defective and in need of repair. The sum of \$15,000 will be required to properly restore the same in the above described territory.

Central Park Terrace.

Estimate for 1906..... \$30,000 00

I feel it a duty to renew my request of last year for an appropriation for this purpose. This amount is a careful estimate of the cost of restoring and waterproofing the

ornamental stone work of the terrace, a work long neglected. If this expensive and beautifully artistic structure, costing originally a very large sum, is to be saved and preserved, it must be taken in hand without further delay. The sandstone carvings have become broken in many places and worn by the climatic changes of years. They should be restored before further damage is done. The stone work should then be treated with a waterproofing process of applying paraffine similar to the treatment applied with such good results to the Obelisk some years ago. The attention of the Department is continually called to importance of saving this beautiful park feature, and I would urge upon your Honorable Board the wisdom and economy of making this appropriation.

Children's School Farm in DeWitt Clinton Park.

With the funds provided for this work for the current year the school farm has been conducted by Mrs. Parsons in a manner which seems to meet with popular approval.

The beginning made under the auspices of this Department in DeWitt Clinton Park has been followed in many other cities all over the country, and great public interest in the work has been excited. The same amount is, therefore, asked to carry on this work during the coming year.

The development of park territory, especially in the neighborhood of Bronx, Pelham Bay and Van Cortlandt parks, has greatly increased the demand for and sale of adjacent territory, and I firmly believe has been a great factor in the real estate "boom" of our borough, and it has added materially to the increased valuations of real estate in the immediate vicinity of our great parks.

For these reasons an increased appropriation for maintenance, etc., is urgently requested.

Music.

In preceding years the appropriation for music was \$12,480. The previous administration reduced this amount to \$9,360. Instead of 16 bands, with 22 pieces, leader and soloist, with 12 concerts in each park, we were enabled to employ only 9 bands of 16 pieces for 10 concerts.

I know of no expenditure that gives so much pleasure to so many people as our Sunday concerts. The attendance in some cases aggregates 10,000 people at a concert. The large increase in population and the increased attendance at our concerts, I believe, would warrant the restoration of the original amount appropriated, viz.: \$12,480.

For the purchase of all necessary supplies, coal, tools, machinery, repairs—including both contract and emergency purchases—horseshoeing, feed, etc., the average expenditure for the past four years has been \$25,000 per annum. The same amount will be required for the ensuing year.

With each recurring year the area of park territory devoted to public purposes has largely increased, lands have been opened up and developed, lawns have been made, new roads and paths have been constructed, additional flower-beds have been planted, and a largely-increased number of trees, shrubs and plants have been purchased and set out. This necessarily involves an increased outlay in the maintenance account that should be provided for by increased appropriation.

Supplies and Contingencies.

There has been appropriated annually for the necessary contingent expenses of the Department, and for the purchase of such supplies for office purposes as were formerly furnished by the department having such matters in charge, the sum of \$1,500. It is requested that the same amount be appropriated for the ensuing year.

Surveys, Maps and Plans.

For the continuation of the necessary surveys of the large parks the preparation of the necessary maps following the surveys, the making of plans, etc., for new work there has been annually appropriated the sum of \$6,000. The sum named is comparatively small, and it will take several years, with the exercise of due economy, to complete said work. These surveys and maps are largely used, not only by this Department, but by other departments, in the necessary performance of public improvements, as well as by others intrusted with the development of the territory adjoining park lands.

Forestry Work.

For the past three years an appropriation of \$5,000, for the care and preservation of our old forest trees, has been made. Experts have been employed, and good results have followed the work. It is requested that the same amount be set aside for the ensuing year.

New York Botanical Garden.

Herewith is transmitted the estimate of Dr. N. L. Britton, Director-in-Chief. It seems to have been carefully prepared. I would respectfully suggest that the amount named, \$97,500, be appropriated.

New York Zoological Garden.

The estimate of Mr. W. T. Hornaday calls for an appropriation of \$154,572 for the next year. The necessary details will be found in his communication.

The phenomenal growth of the borough during the past few years has necessitated increased work in the development of our great park system. Construction work that was originally intended to spread over a series of years we were compelled to hasten to meet the public demand. This, of course, required increased expense for maintenance.

The work of the Department has had much to do with our increased population. Every improvement has been met by an immediate demand for home sites in the immediate vicinity. The result has been that every dollar spent in improvement has been returned to the City in increased valuations and increased volume of taxes.

I respectfully submit that the great public improvements—bridges, tunnels, etc.—to take people out of our City should be met by increased facilities to keep them in. There is no better way to accomplish this than by a just, fair and, if possible, liberal treatment of our suburban borough.

There has been no increase in the amount allowed for maintenance in three years. During this time the area of finished lawns and of plantations has been increased by about forty-five acres, which requires the work of more Gardeners, Laborers and Drivers, and the grounds thus under high cultivation will be further materially increased by the summer of 1906.

The conservatory collection of living plants and the collections in the museums have been much augmented, requiring more help in these departments.

The continuous development of the garden necessitates additional expenditures for supplies, and the buildings and steamheating apparatus, no longer new, require many repairs.

Additional Keepers and Guards are needed for the proper protection of the plantations and natural woodlands, owing to the very large number of visitors.

We have found the present annual appropriation of \$70,000 quite inadequate for the satisfactory maintenance of the institution, and respectfully recommend that it be increased in accordance with the foregoing estimate.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith the New York Zoological Society's estimates of the cost of properly maintaining the New York Zoological Park throughout the year 1906.

Your attention is respectfully called to the fact that no increases in salaries are proposed, and the only increase asked on account of labor is for the employment of additional help in the care of the new buildings and grounds.

The principal cause of need for an increase under that head is found in the following new buildings, some of which are now nearly complete, the others under construction or contract.

Large public comfort building at subway entrance, two Attendants.

Two small public comfort buildings (east side), two Attendants.

New boat-house, one Attendant.

Pheasants' aviary (to be completed September 10, 1905).

One new entrance, ready in 1905, one Attendant.

One new entrance (subway), ready in 1906, one Attendant.

New camel house, ready in 1905.

The increase asked for under this head is so small, yet so necessary, I earnestly hope it will be granted.

The increase asked for in supplies is to meet the daily wants of the Zoological Park establishment as augmented by the necessary growth of the collection, and the increase in buildings, aviaries, etc.

We have never attempted to figure separately the cost of repairs generally, and the upkeep of our very-large amount of out-door ironwork, roads, walks, etc., but it is to be noted that this work alone demands annually, for labor and materials, the expenditure of several thousand dollars, and its demands are so imperative that they cannot be ignored.

The second section of the Museum Building at Eastern parkway and Washington avenue, which is twice the size of the first section, was opened for the first time on June 1. This section when fully occuined the coming winter and thereafter will require an increased number of Attendants, Cleaners, and men in the engine room. The proper care of the building and its machinery power plant cases furniture and fixtures requires the services of a Mechanic and Painter. The additions to the collections require skilled preparators, and the demand for instruction in botany require a Curator of the Department. The experience with the new heating plant has demonstrated that the increase in the amount of coal required will be what is stated in the foregoing table, and the increase in the collections will require all that is recommended for cases to be made from time to time during the year adapted to the special nature of the exhibits.

Increases in Administration Account.

The increase in the salary of the Telephone Operator from seven hundred and fifty dollars to nine hundred dollars is asked for so as to make her pay the same as that paid for similar positions elsewhere in the City service.

The increase of five hundred dollars in the salary of the Chief Clerk, fifty dollars in that of the Assistant Paymaster, and fifty dollars in that of the Property Clerk is asked so as to restore the salaries of these positions to what they were previous to 1902.

The increase of six hundred dollars in the salary of the Assistant Engineer is asked for on the ground of the increased amount of business transacted in this Department, which has largely added to his duties as well as his responsibility.

The new positions of Rodman, Topographical Draughtsman and Junior Clerk are all required in the Engineer's office, and the money for the same should be granted.

Increases in Labor, Maintenance, Supplies and Care of Trees.

The increase shown in the labor, maintenance, supplies and care of trees account is explained by the fact that the parks and parkways under the jurisdiction of this Department are patronized by a number of people largely increasing from year to year. As a result the wear and tear is very much greater, requiring the renewal of paths, roads, gutters, etc., on a greater scale, and requiring the services of a greater number of men for their maintenance.

This Department has again asked for an item of fifty-seven thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars for the creation of a Department of Arboriculture. During the last year especially the creation of this bureau has become an absolute necessity. Chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902, placing the care and preservation of all street trees throughout the City under the care of the Department of Parks, should at last receive the attention it deserves. Requests for the removal of dead trees, planting of new ones, trimming, cleaning and otherwise preserving the street trees throughout the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens have been exceedingly numerous. It has been impossible on account of the very limited means at the disposal of this Department to accede to all the demands made upon it. The Department, furthermore, undertook the spraying of a great many trees throughout the two boroughs in order to rid them of insect pests, but it requires a special appropriation, as asked for, to cope with this question successfully.

Resoiling of Trees—The trees in the older parks under the jurisdiction of this Department have for a number of years shown signs of stagnation, and many of them have become diseased, and finally died. I have investigated this matter very carefully and come to the conclusion that in order to save the remainder of the older trees it is absolutely necessary that the soil surrounding the same, which has in the course of from twenty to thirty-five years become vitiated and useless, should be renewed. A plan has been devised whereby this work could be done during a period of two years at a total cost of one hundred and twenty-seven thousand and ninety dollars and forty cents, one-half of which, amounting to sixty-three thousand five hundred and forty-five dollars and twenty cents, has been asked for next year. The importance of this matter can hardly be overestimated, and your Honorable Board is urged to grant the sum asked for.

The amount requested for salaries shows an increase of \$8,360 more than the appropriation granted for the current year. Said increase includes recommendations for increases of salary and such additions to the force of this Department as are absolutely necessary. It will be noted that the increased amount requested will be confined to the "General Administration Account," which account for years has been annually allowed the sum of \$232,500, and no provision made for the large and constantly increasing volume of criminal business. By an act of the Legislature, chapter 563 of the Laws of 1904, a new bureau was added to this Department on July 1, 1904, and designated the Bureau of Special Sessions Informations. This bureau employs ten persons, whose

salaries aggregate \$17,700 per annum, and this office is put to considerable additional expense in furnishing supplies, defraying expenses of County Detectives, and other general expenses incurred by said bureau. The additional appropriation of \$17,760 granted in 1905 was only sufficient to pay the salaries of the persons appointed in said bureau; therefore it cannot be claimed that there was any increase in the appropriation for the general business of this office. Wherever the designation "General Administration" appears in this estimate, it refers to this Department as it existed prior to the addition of the Bureau of Special Sessions Informations, and is still maintained separate and distinct from said bureau.

I respectfully recommend to your Honorable Board that the small sum of \$3,960 be allowed, which I could use to increase the salaries of the above-named Clerks and Messengers. The proposed increases are in recognition of the exceptionally valuable services rendered by these gentlemen, mostly all of the Clerks having been in the employ of this Department many years, some of them over twenty years in the service, and by reason of their long experience have become very valuable to the office; the work performed by each of them being of such a character that they should receive a compensation commensurate with the important duties devolving upon them, and it is only reasonable and fair that there should be some suitable recognition of their services. In reference to the proposed increase of salary of the Chief Stenographer from \$1,600 to \$2,500 per annum, I desire to state that in addition to fulfilling his duties as Chief Stenographer in charge of the Stenographic and Typewriting Bureau of this Department, he is also an attorney-at-law, and in charge of the Complaint Bureau, which Bureau was created by me shortly after my advent into office, for the purpose of receiving and investigating the complaints of those people who claimed to have been defrauded by certain loan agencies and the many other questionable enterprises, designed purposely to defraud the general public, and especially the poor and ignorant, who could not afford to employ counsel to protect their rights. Since the creation of the Complaint Bureau in 1902, it has entailed greatly increased labor on this office, requiring the constant attention of several Deputy Assistant District Attorneys and other employees, to keep pace with the large and ever-increasing volume of business devolving on the bureau, which has proven a valuable addition to the public service. This bureau is open to the public every day and night in the year, excepting Sundays and holidays, the night sessions being held at my residence, No. 3 Rutgers street. Some of the most important cases and convictions during my administration are the results of complaints made to this bureau. It is very evident that this work requires a high degree of intelligence and a thorough knowledge of civil and criminal law. Therefore it appears to me that the proposed increase for the Chief Stenographer is not unreasonable.

The salaries of some of the Clerks and Messengers mentioned herein for an increase of salary were reduced by me in April and May, 1902, as follows: Entry Clerk, from \$1,100 to \$1,000; Messengers, from \$1,000 and \$900 to \$600 per annum each. It is now proposed to increase the Entry Clerk from \$1,000 to \$1,200, and the Messengers from \$600 to \$720 per annum. Strong recommendations have been made to me to recommend a larger number of increases for employees who have been receiving the same salaries for years and who are undoubtedly deserving of recognition, but as I am desirous of keeping my estimate as low as possible I regret being compelled to disregard these recommendations.

Increase of Force.

The present force of Stenographers and Typewriters employed in this Department is totally inadequate to keep up with the large volume of work, and necessitates an extraordinary amount of night work, which they have been and now are performing, in addition to working on Sundays and legal holidays. Owing to this lack of stenographic force many of my professional staff in the preparation of their cases for trial, such as the taking of statements, affidavits, etc., of witnesses, have been and now are compelled to take same in longhand. Therefore in order that this Department may be properly equipped to transact its ordinary business it is essential that at least three Stenographers and Typewriters be added to the limited force employed at present.

That your Board may see at a glance the reasonableness of my request for the small increase of \$8,360 for salaries to the "General Administration Account," I beg to submit the following comparative statement showing the appropriations granted for salaries for "General Administration" of this Department during the years 1900 and 1905, and the number of persons on the pay-rolls for the months of July, 1900, and 1905, chargeable to that account, and the amount requested for 1906:

It will be observed that there were 128 persons employed in the year 1900, and that our present force consists of only 110 persons. The recent official census shows that there is a population of 2,371,099 in the County of New York, which is an increase of 320,499 since the year 1900. Even with this enormous increase in the population of this County and the constantly increasing business of this Department, the amount requested for salaries for 1906 for "General Administration" is considerably less than the amount granted for the year 1900. In order that your Board may have an idea as to the large volume of business which now devolves on this office, I beg to state that formerly an average of 4,500 cases were received annually, all of which were disposed of in the Court of General Sessions and the Supreme Court, Criminal Trial Term, Part I. By chapter 563 of the Laws of 1904, the Legislature enacted that after September 1, 1904, all cases prosecuted in the Court of Special Sessions in this County shall be tried upon information filed by the District Attorney. One of the provisions of the new law provides that the defendants in misdemeanor cases would no longer be tried on papers presented by the Magistrate, but in each case the District Attorney is required to prepare what the statute designates as an "information," the form of which the law provides, and which is substantially identical with an indictment, save that instead of being filed with the Grand Jury, it is prepared by the District Attorney. Under the new law, during the past year over 10,000 additional cases, triable in the Court of Special Sessions, have been carefully investigated and prepared by this office before they are ready for trial, making a total of over 14,500 cases disposed of annually, an increase of over 10,000 cases per annum, which does not include the thousands of complaints investigated by the Complaint Bureau.

Supplies and Contingencies, Including Arrearages.

The amount requested for supplies and contingencies (1906), including arrearages, is \$50,000. This amount is barely sufficient to meet the ordinary expenses arising against this account. Such contingent expenses can never be estimated in advance, for no one can anticipate what crimes may be committed, the prosecution of which will entail great expense on the County. Should such cases arise, it would necessitate an additional appropriation. If ordinary conditions prevail during the remainder of the current year, I believe there will be a few thousand dollars remaining unexpended of the \$50,000 allowed for supplies and contingencies for the present year. As an offset to the \$50,000 allowed for contingent expenses, it is proper to add that during the present year I have collected on forfeited recognizances the sum of \$29,140, and hope before the close of the year to add greatly to this amount. The amounts collected on forfeited recognizances under my administration of this Department during the years 1902, 1903, 1904, amounted to \$14,808.58, \$53,644.41 and \$62,013.04, respectively, these latter amounts being the largest sums that have ever been collected under any administration.

The conviction of Albert T. Patrick for the murder of William Marsh Rice was affirmed by the Court of Appeals on June 9, 1905, and the date of his execution was set for August 7, 1905. On July 22, 1905, Justice Dennis O'Brien signed an order to show cause why an order for a reargument of the appeal in this case should not be granted, and the argument on the order to show cause is set for October 2, 1905. No request will be made for an appropriation for this account under present conditions.

On May 24, 1904, Richard C. Flower, one of the above-named defendants, failed to appear for trial and is a fugitive from justice. His bond, amounting to \$20,000, was forfeited on that date and on June 7, 1904, \$20,000 in cash was paid over to the City Chamberlain. Since then efforts have been made by the Detective Bureau of this City and private detectives engaged by this office to locate the said Richard C. Flower, but without any success.

In the conduct of the criminal actions against Charles F. Dodge and others, the people have been put to extraordinary expense, if you recollect the long and expensive legal proceedings it took to finally extradite Charles F. Dodge from the State of Texas. The defendants involved in these cases have retained the most eminent and skillful counsel that money can procure, and they have delayed the trial of these cases by filing all sorts of motions, orders, appeals, writs of prohibition, etc., and they now apply for a change of venue. Every subterfuge that adroit counsel can devise is being used to prevent their clients going to trial. I do not believe it necessary at present to request an additional appropriation for these cases.

I desire to state to your Honorable Board that when I entered upon the administration of this office on January 1, 1902, there were 861 indictments pending, and I am

pleased to inform you that, notwithstanding the unusual demands made upon this office since then, that number has been reduced about 60 per cent. To be exact, there was pending on July 1, 1905, 368 indictments, in addition to keeping abreast of a volume of business greater than that disposed of in a corresponding period during any previous year. During the month of July, 1905, there were 105 prisoners confined in the City Prison awaiting trial in the Court of General Sessions, which number has been the lowest in many years. It was usual under previous administrations during the summer months to have an average of 28 persons confined in the prison charged with homicide; whereas, during last July, the number of prisoners confined there charged with homicide had been reduced to 7. The average time taken to dispose of prison cases from the date of their arrest until final disposition is six days.

The public business in this office is in such a state of forwardness that the Hon. Joseph E. Newburger, Judge of the Court of General Sessions, in discharging a panel of Grand Jurors commended this condition of affairs in the following remarks:

"Mr. Foreman and Gentlemen of the Jury:

"I have just received the statement of the Clerk, which informs me that you have disposed of 442 cases this term. You are to be congratulated indeed for the immense amount of work which you disposed of.

"It is possible that some member of the Grand Jury may have been under the impression, at the beginning of the term, that the Court was perhaps a little harsh in insisting too much upon the Jurors meeting at an earlier hour than they had been accustomed to do, but knowing a great many of the panel personally, I feel confident that you will all agree with me that the satisfaction of knowing that you have disposed of this large amount of work will somewhat make up for whatever feeling you may have had from my breaking in on the old-established rules of the Grand Jury.

I want to say at this time, and I cannot permit the opportunity to pass, that now that we are to begin the summer vacation, I know and I feel that I express the feelings of every one of my associates in this court when I say that we feel proud of the record of the work which has been disposed of by the Court during the past year. To think, in a population of over two and a half millions, composed as it is of such a cosmopolitan character, that we have left for disposition but 259 cases, which includes bail and prison cases, is indeed a cause for pride. We have at this time but 133 prisoners in the Tombs awaiting action on the part of this Court, and I know that I speak for my associates when I say that while we feel satisfied with the work which we have done, a great deal of the credit is due to the District Attorney of this county, and his associates and assistants, for the manner in which they have presented the cases to us, and the work they have done in handling the cases and bringing them speedily to trial, and the situation is now in this county for the first time in a great many years—certainly the first time during my connection of nine years with this court—such that cases can be tried within two or three days after a person is indicted, a record which, of course, will meet with the approval of every well-thinking man in the community.

"I make this statement in favor of those who are associated with us in disposing of the work which comes to us."

That your Board may realize the amount of business now conducted through this Department, aside from cases on appeal in the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, the Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court of the United States, writs of habeas corpus and certiorari, orders to show cause, and motions for stays, and certificates of reasonable doubt, applications for inspection of minutes, motions to dismiss indictments, examination and approval of bail bonds, appearances in Magistrates' Courts, Coroners' inquests, Lunacy Commissions, reports to the Governor on pardon applications, I submit the following report, which is a synopsis of the work performed by this Department from my advent into office January 1, 1902, to the vacation of the Courts, July 1, 1905:

In order to accomplish these results with my present force my entire professional and administrative staff have been laboriously employed early and late, without any regard to the regular hours prescribed for the opening and closing of this office.

I therefore request that the various appropriations be granted, and it is reasonably certain that the appropriation of any less amount than that asked for will result in a deficiency at the end of the year and will seriously embarrass the general business of this Department.

Dear Sir—In compliance with section 226 of the revised Greater New York Charter, as amended, and with the resolution adopted by your Board on June 30, 1905, and the instructions conveyed in the circular letter of July 15, 1905, from the Comptroller, I have the honor to present herewith my estimate of the appropriations required to conduct the business of this Department for the year 1906. Form "A," salary schedule, and Form "B," appropriations, hereto annexed, give the details as required by said circular letter.

Salaries—General Administration.

Last year I made application to reorganize the present system of supervision of the City lighting, placing all the bureaus now maintained for that purpose in the several boroughs directly under central control. With the incoming year it is earnestly desired to establish the office of Chief Engineer of Lighting at an annual salary of \$5,000; this office will include all the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and means only an actual increase of \$2,000. This improvement and the maintenance of the present pay-roll necessitates the increase of \$2,544.75.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

This increased amount is necessary to pay the present force at present rates.

This additional force is absolutely necessary if the City is to receive its full compensation for the use of its water, and because it is necessary to re-examine the entire City, together with the fact of the increased number of meters installed for which meter ledgers must be opened. I wish also to increase the salaries of 49 Inspectors, necessitating an annual increase of \$9,800. This increase is asked for on account of the nature and growth of the work required of them and in recognition of their faithful and efficient services.

Some few increases of salary are proposed other than the above, but only in cases where the men are, in my judgment, at present underpaid.

I have requested the larger amount, \$1,500, for that purpose, thinking thereby to get the most competent appointee. If you do not deem it advisable to accept this proposition, I would ask that you appropriate a sum sufficient to establish and maintain a laboratory, as required by section 519 of the Charter.

It is estimated a plant of this kind would cost, with maintenance for the year, \$33,868.

I have asked for a larger amount for 1906 on this account than allowed for 1905, because next year the most of the work now under construction by the Aqueduct Commission will be transferred to this Department. This will necessitate a much larger outlay for men and material by this Department. A larger force of men will be required to take care of the New Croton Dam, Muscoot Dam, New Croton lake, Shaft 25, at High Bridge, etc. We will have to take care of about 5,000 acres of land acquired around Croton lake and streams flowing into the lake, fence walls, banks, lands, new roads, etc.

The amount required also for taxes, which will be chargeable to this account, will be largely increased on account of transfers from the Aqueduct Commission of new lands in the Croton watershed and The Bronx watershed.

The appropriation asked for for the year 1906 includes the amount needed for the emergency or night gangs (for which the sum of \$42,560 was specially assigned to this Department for the latter part of this year). It also provides for the payment of the Caulkers, the prevailing rate of wages for the year 1906. (During the present year it became necessary to provide for the increased rate, and Special Revenue Bonds, amounting to \$13,255, were issued.)

Our appropriations for repairs to pipes, stock-cocks, etc., have been inadequate for the past year, and I beg to call attention to the fact that in the year 1904 it became necessary to transfer the sum of \$23,703.35 from other sources or appropriations to keep our repair work going on. In 1903, \$70,725 Special Revenue Bonds were issued for the maintenance of our system east of The Bronx. We will this year be obliged to make the necessary repairs in this section of The Bronx from our regular appropriation. The detailed items are as follows:

It is, therefore, evident that this is a very important pumping station.

At no time since the City acquired this plant has there been a sufficient appropriation to properly improve and man the station. Because of this lack of means in the past it has now become important that considerable repairs be made. The appropriation for the present year has necessarily been augmented by transfers of \$2,250 from other appropriations. The increase asked for next year is, therefore, not so large.

In addition to the appropriations shown in the above table, in 1904 an issue of Revenue Bonds, of date August 2, for \$140,000, was allowed for the lighting of the Department of Education during that year. This made the total appropriation for 1904, \$3,417,438.13. This Revenue Bond Fund was divided among the five boroughs in the amounts as shown in the table giving the appropriation and expenditure of all Boroughs.

It will be noted that the total appropriation allowed for 1905 in Manhattan and The Bronx was actually less than that allowed for 1904, including the Revenue Bond Fund for the Department of Education; the appropriations for the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond for 1905 were below the most conservative estimate of the cost of lighting installed at the beginning of this year. This was so apparent that it was presented to your Honorable Board in the early part of 1905, and in a communication of date February 15 permission was given the Department to maintain the lights then installed and to add such additional new lights as were deemed absolutely necessary.

Had the present prices been maintained and no relief afforded during the year the deficit for all boroughs in the "Lamps and Lighting" appropriations for 1905 would have been about \$200,000. During the first half of the year the Legislature passed certain laws affecting the price of electric lighting and gas lighting throughout the Greater City. These laws went into effect July 1, 1905.

Pending advice from the Corporation Counsel, the adjustment of prices according to these laws has not yet been taken up with the lighting companies, but the expenditures for the years 1905 and 1906 have been estimated on the prices established by these laws, with suitable provision for adjustment and safety. In the year 1905 we have only the advantage of six months, but during the year 1906 we have the advantage of the reduced prices for a year. The saving in the six months in the year 1905, however, has been sufficient to wipe out the deficit which we faced the first of the year.

So that you can make comparisons, the following table is submitted, showing the appropriations and expense for 1904 and 1905, and the estimate for 1906:

In view of the fact that the appropriation this year is considerably less than last year, although it includes necessary allowances for additional lights in reasonable quantity, I would request that the salary appropriations, both for "General Administration" and for "Lighting and Electricity," may be increased as requested for the ensuing year. The Department is doing much more work in these lines than formerly, and the additional men requested are needed to develop the full efficiency of the Department in lighting the Greater City.

No contracts having been made for the year 1905, the estimated costs given in the tables are based on the bid prices of that year for the first six months, and the legislative prices, with a margin of safety, for the last six months. So that, if there is no favorable adjustment of the old prices by the courts, the estimates will cover the expenditures.

In each borough, the estimate for 1906 includes a reasonable amount for the extension of the lighting systems. The additional lights allowed for are sorely needed in all five boroughs, particularly The Bronx, Queens, Brooklyn and Richmond, where the increasing population is getting more insistent and emphatic than ever in its demands for lights. The boroughs of The Bronx and Brooklyn have received additional lights in previous years, but until this year the boroughs of Queens and Richmond have practically had no new lights for the preceding three years. The reason for this was that their appropriations were less than the expenditures necessary to pay for the lighting in service, without increases. Such a condition of affairs serves no good end, and in view of the saving in the cost of lighting, it is hoped that the Department may be allowed to improve these boroughs in 1906, according to the necessities existing.

Included in the amounts given is the cost of lighting the Department and Public Buildings and the Department of Education. The change in prices made by the Legislature affects the cost of lighting these buildings, and the advantage appears in the much smaller increased expenditures for 1906 over 1905, although the percentage of increase is just the same as between 1904 and 1905.

The following comparative table gives the expense for lighting public buildings in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx in 1903, 1904, 1905, and the estimated expense for 1906, by Departments. It gives the estimated expense in 1905 and 1906 for the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, also by Department.

The lighting of public buildings is always increasing, and any economies we can make serve to lessen the increases each year, but the large number of buildings being added constantly by the different departments and the increased demand for lighting same under the present system make annual increases inevitable.

It should be explained that the deficiency in the appropriation for the Department of Education in each of the years 1903, 1904 and 1905 has practically been supplied by the surplus appropriation of the Borough of Manhattan.

In view of the increasing demand for lighting, the necessity for a detailed supervision over the whole lighting field—particularly with the opportunity now given by the decreased cost of lighting—and the necessity for a careful supervision of the adjustment of prices allowed under the new laws, as well as for the reasons stated in the Budget last year, I would again request that I be allowed to place the lighting of the Greater City in all boroughs under a Chief Engineer, who will devote his entire attention to these important matters, under my general supervision.

The adoption of the above Budget, with the suggestions made, will, in my opinion, remove many of the causes of complaint now justly existing in the various boroughs. It will supply the detailed inspection in certain boroughs now greatly needed and will effect a considerable saving of money in the cost of lighting by reason of careful and systematic control. It is practically impossible for the Commissioner, with his numerous duties, to control the details of such a system without the constant supervision of a Chief Engineer as requested above.

As closely as I can estimate, there will be no unexpended balance of the appropriations for the use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity at the end of the year 1905.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to transmit herewith a Departmental Estimate of the amount of expenditures required to conduct the public business of the Register of the County of New York for the year 1906, with a statement in detail of the objects of such expenditures, including a statement of each of the salaries of the officers, clerks and subordinates.

I beg to make the following explanations in reference to certain of the items:

My estimate for 1906 for the payment of the Recording Clerks or folio writers, who are paid at the rate of five cents per folio, is \$55,000. This is substantially the same amount which will be expended during the present year 1905. My estimate for this item for 1905 was cut down by your Board, so that it became necessary to procure an issue of Special Revenue Bonds of \$25,000 to meet the deficiency. Of course the amount to be paid for folio writing can only be estimated; but the folio writers are paid at the rate of five cents per folio, while the fees collected are at the rate of ten cents per folio, so that it is self-evident that for every dollar expended the City receives two dollars in return for folio writing, in addition to the extra fees collected for indexing and certificates. As I have already stated in previous communications to your Board, the work of recording continually grows from year to year and has increased enormously, especially in the last year, so that a larger number of Recording Clerks, Index Clerks, Examining or Reading Clerks, Delivery Clerks, Bookbinders and other employees becomes essential to the proper performance of the work of the Register's office.

I have in my estimate asked for \$6,000 to pay five additional Examiners at \$1,200 each. These Examiners compare the records written by the folio writers with original instruments, and the work of comparing and returning instruments is now a long time in arrears, for the first time during my administration, because of the lack of Examiners to do this very important work.

For like reason I have requested an appropriation of \$6,000 to pay the salaries of five additional Index Clerks at \$1,200 each. The work of indexing is also long in

arrears for lack of Clerks to do this work, which, under the block system, is of the highest degree of importance and requires the utmost accuracy.

During the past year the Examiners and Index Clerks, as well as other employees, have been compelled to work long after hours; yet notwithstanding they have been unable to catch up with the work.

I have also asked \$1,200 to pay the salary of a Machinist who will repair and adjust the typewriting machines used in the office. This will be more economical than to have the minor repairs made by the manufacturers of the machine, and will save any occasion for idleness and delay on the part of the Recording Clerks.

As years go by the work of the Bookbinders increases constantly; bindings deteriorate more rapidly with increased age and long public use. The three Bookbinders heretofore employed have been unable to keep up with the work, and I therefore ask an allowance of \$1,080 to pay for an additional Bookbinder. I also ask \$1,200, instead of \$1,080, for the salary of one of the present Bookbinders, who is in charge of such work.

The salary of one Clerk is increased from \$900 to \$1,000, and the salary of another Clerk is increased from \$800 to \$1,200. These Clerks are competent men who are underpaid, who have been long in the service and who perform the same work as Clerks who receive larger salaries. No other Clerk received less than \$1,000.

The salary of one Custodian is increased from \$1,360 to \$1,500, because he is a competent employee who has been long in the service, who has general charge of the Custodians and who deserves such increase.

The Register's office is about to be removed from No. 116 Nassau street to the new Hall of Records, where it will occupy about three floors. The rooms are commodious, but they are so separated and subdivided that more Custodians and Watchmen will be needed to guard the valuable records, to assist persons using the office in finding libers, documents and maps, and to prevent the alteration, mutilation or loss of records. I have therefore requested \$3,000, to pay the salaries of three additional Custodians, at \$1,000 each.

I have also asked, under the head of contingencies, a special allowance of \$4,500 to pay the cost of removing the Register's office to the new Hall of Records. This is slightly less than the sum which was appropriated and used for removing the same office from the old Hall of Records to No. 116 Nassau street. I have been advised by the Corporation Counsel that inasmuch as I am personally responsible for the safe custody of the records, the work of removal should be done by the Register rather than by another department.

Under the head of Preservation of Public Records, I have asked a further sum of \$5,000, to pay for work of copying old maps. This is the same amount which was last year appropriated by your Board, and which will, I believe, be wholly expended within the present year. Last year I requested a special appropriation of about \$31,000 to do this work, but was allowed \$5,000.

The clerical force in the Bureau for the Preservation of Public Records is insufficient to keep up with the constantly increasing work of copying condemned volumes of old records, and there is required an additional Clerk for the work. I have requested \$1,200 to pay his salary.

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REGISTER'S OFFICE, KINGS COUNTY.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Herewith I send estimate for the office of the Register of Kings County for the year 1906. The total estimated increase is \$85,120.

The largest item of increase is \$32,800, on the appropriation entitled "Compensation of Copyists and Recording Clerks." Your Board allowed only \$27,200 for the year 1905. But this was clearly an oversight.

Mandatory legislation required that at least the sum of \$42,000 be allowed. The deficiency this year must be supplied by application to the Board of Aldermen, and your Body, after action of said Board, for an additional appropriation of \$14,800.

The number of Copyists in the office is thirty-five (the number permitted by Laws of 1901). Up to July 1, 1904, their compensation was five cents per folio. Chapter 699 of the Laws of 1904 fixed their compensation after July 1, 1904, at \$1,200 a year. This, you will see, calls for at least \$42,000, to wit, thirty-five Copyists, at \$1,200 each.

The force of thirty-five Copyists is inadequate for the present needs of this office. It is respectfully requested that the force be increased to fifty. The volume of business in this office has doubled since 1901, when the act was passed providing for the force of thirty-five.

With the increase in business the work of copying has fallen steadily behind. On January 1, 1902, a recorded instrument would be returned to its owner about four weeks after being left at this office; now it takes from nine to ten months to return a recorded instrument.

This is really a scandalous condition and calls for immediate remedy. And so many mortgages were recorded in the few days before July 1, 1905 (when the new Mortgage Tax Law went into effect) that a much worse condition will arise in the year 1906.

I had prepared a bill providing for more Copyists to meet this situation, which bill passed the Legislature of 1904, but was vetoed by Governor Odell. It again passed in 1905, and was again vetoed by Governor Higgins. The Governor in a written memorandum stated that the situation could and should be relieved by the action of your Honorable Board. I sincerely trust that your Honorable Board will afford the much needed relief by providing for fifty Copyists.

I hope to introduce the typewriting system of copying in this office before the end of the month, and am confident the advantages will be apparent before your Board takes action on the item of \$25,000 for typewriting machines.

An increased appropriation is asked for recopying old and mutilated records, and the amount requested is \$9,200.

Up to July 1, 1904, Copyists on this work were paid five cents a folio. By chapter 171, Laws of 1904, the power to fix their compensation was given to the Commissioner of Records of Kings County. He has fixed the rate of compensation at eight cents a folio, an increase of 60 per cent.

As in the case of the current Copyists, your Board overlooked this law, and the deficiency that will arise this year must be supplied by an additional appropriation granted by the Board of Aldermen and your Board.

The additional Clerks, Comparers, Messengers and Custodian asked for are urgently needed. There has been no increase in the number of employees of these classes or titles since 1902, although the business of the office has been doubled. The office has never had a Telephone Operator or Stenographer, although both are much needed.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—An estimate of the amount of the appropriations necessary for the maintenance of the Surrogates' Court and office and the transactions of the business thereof during the year 1906 is herewith submitted.

The same amount appropriated for the present year for the Clerks employed, pursuant to chapter 57 of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 467 of the Laws of 1890, in the preservation of the public records, will be required for the year 1906. Eight Clerks are so employed at a salary of \$1,200 per annum each, and a Superintendent and Examiner at \$1,500 per annum. These Clerks the Surrogates were authorized by chapter 704 of the Laws of 1904, amending said chapter 57 of the Laws of 1883, to employ in preparing, making and copying indexes of the office records, in addition to the work necessary for the preservation of the public records. Two hundred thousand cards for preparing directory or lexicographical indexes, at a cost of \$300, and \$100 for stationery, will be required next year for the prosecution of the work provided for by the laws mentioned.

The necessity for the work for the preservation of the public records has been duly certified in accordance with those laws. Certain of the certificates are referred to in our communications of August 5, 1902, of August 15, 1903, and of August 12, 1904, submitting the estimates for those years, and seven others were transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 18, April 20, May 16, June 8, July 7 and July 19, 1904, and April 11, 1905, respectively.

We ask for an appropriation for salaries for next year of \$167,600, the same amount as that allowed for the same purpose for the current year.

For "Supplies and Contingencies" \$2,550 are required for next year. The same amount for the same purpose was allowed for the current year. Of this amount \$1,350 are required for office contingencies and \$1,200 for the purpose of procuring the supplies which previously to January 1, 1902, were furnished by the Board of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies. Schedule A, hereto annexed, indicates the character of such supplies.

One thousand dollars are needed for the payment of the Sheriff for services in serving citations and orders in proceedings commenced by the Surrogates to compel accountings of delinquent guardians, executors and others. This is the same amount that was appropriated for the same purpose for this year.

The total appropriation required is \$171,550, being the same as that allowed for the current year.

The salaries of the Surrogates are fixed by chapter 200 of the Laws of 1889, and chapter 642 of the Laws of 1892. The salary of the Stenographer receiving \$3,000 per annum is fixed pursuant to section 2512 of the Code of Civil Procedure, and section 1193 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and the salaries of the Record Bond Clerks, pursuant to section 237, chapter 686 of the Laws of 1892, being chapter 18 of the General Laws, and chapter 461 of the Laws of 1904. The salaries of the other Clerks and employees, except those engaged in the preservation of the public records and in preparing, making and copying indexes of the office records, are designated and fixed pursuant to chapter 530 of the Laws of 1883, and chapter 642 of the Laws of 1892. The compensation of the last-mentioned Clerks is provided for by chapter 57 of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 467 of the Laws of 1890, and chapter 704 of the Laws of 1904, above referred to.

It is impossible at the present time to state the amount which may probably remain unexpended at the end of the year 1905 of any of the appropriations made for that year.

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SURROGATE'S COURT, KINGS COUNTY.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—In submitting, under the provisions of the City Charter, and in compliance with the circular letter of the Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller of The City of New York, dated July 15, 1905, the accompanying estimate of the amount of expenditures necessary to carry on the work of this court and office, I beg to recall to the attention of your Honorable Board the fact that there is now pending and upon your calendar an application asking for the regrading of the clerical force of my office, the changing of several titles of positions in the same, the increasing of some salaries and the creating of several new positions.

The matter of the reorganization of the office with some increase of force was presented to your Honorable Body in my estimate for the year 1905, under date of September 12, 1904, and again on May 3, 1905, in the application above referred to now pending. The reasons which necessitate the increase of force and other changes requested have been fully set forth in my communications heretofore made to the Board.

In connection with this subject, I beg to call your attention to the report made to the Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, by Mr. Charles V. Hervey, Auditor of Accounts, Investigation Division, under date of July 11, 1905, in which Mr. Hervey, after causing a careful examination to be made of the conditions existing in my office, recommends certain changes in the organization of the office force, together with some increases of salaries and establishing of new positions. The accompanying estimate is based upon the report of Mr. Hervey, following that in every particular, in so far as the question of office organization and salaries is concerned, as I am satisfied that with the additions to my office force recommended in his report I can efficiently conduct the public business. I respectfully submit to your Honorable Board that the

explanations contained in my former communications, together with the report, have placed the matter so fully before you that a further detailed explanation at the present time is unnecessary. A copy of the report of Mr. Hervey is submitted herewith.

It will be observed that there is a slight increase of amount asked for for supplies and contingencies. The amount granted last year, viz., \$1,350, has proved to be insufficient for the necessary contingent expenses of this office, and even by the strictest economy I find that it will be necessary to have the amount asked for, \$1,700, for the ensuing year. The items of necessary expense are set forth in the estimate. The telephone bill is based upon the contract in force, and the amount of extra calls which experience shows are necessary in the conduct of the business of the office. The other items of expense are similar to those of former years except that \$250 is asked for to defray contingent expenses not included in the detailed statement. I find that in the moving of the office and in the general management of the business of the court and office, there are frequent calls for minor incidental expenses, which will probably amount during the course of the year to the sum mentioned.

As to the amount asked for, \$2,500, for the purpose of recopying old and mutilated records, your Honorable Board will remember that this item has been appropriated from year to year, but no part of the same has heretofore been expended for this purpose, owing to reasons set forth in my former communications. I am, however, in hopes that when the reorganization of my office is completed, I shall be in a position to avail myself of this money and prosecute this much-needed work. There is not likely to be any unexpended balance of the appropriations for 1905, except the \$2,500 for recopying old and mutilated records.

I shall be pleased to appear before your Board and to make any explanation required as to the necessity or propriety of the amount asked for in this estimate.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—Examination has been made into the conditions existing in the office of the Surrogate of Kings County, upon which is based an application from Hon. James C. Church, Surrogate, dated May 5, 1905, and addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, asking for the regrading of his clerical force, the changing of several titles of positions in the office, the increasing of salaries and the creation of several new positions. As a result of such examination I beg to submit the following report:

The amount allowed for salaries in the Surrogate's office of Kings County in the Budget for the year 1905 was \$64,950, this amount being the same as that provided in the Budget of 1904, notwithstanding the fact that the Surrogate at that time included in his estimate for the year 1905 application for an increase of about \$20,000 in the accounts for salaries and contingencies. The Surrogate now asks that an issue of Revenue Bonds be authorized to the amount of \$20,000 to provide for proposed increases of salaries and the creation of new positions.

It appears that on April 11, 1905, the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds, as petitioned by the Surrogate, which resolution was received by the City Clerk on April 25, without the approval or disapproval of his Honor the Mayor.

From the papers transmitted to this division for examination it appears that the application for the issue of Revenue Bonds to provide new positions and increase salaries in the office of the Surrogate of Kings County was made by the Surrogate as early as the 1st of February of the current year. Since that time the only definite action which appears to have been taken is that of the Board of Aldermen on April 11, previously mentioned. If, in the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, any allowance is to be made for the balance of the year 1905, it would seem that the amounts specified in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen should be

reduced so as to provide for the payment of the increased salary account for the remaining months of the present year.

A representative of this division has conferred with Mr. William P. Pickett, Chief Clerk, who, in the absence of the Surrogate, described the conditions existing in the office, and explained the reasons for the Surrogate's request for more money to provide for larger salaries for certain of the clerical force, and the creation of new positions. He stated that for many years past, so far as the official designation given subordinate Clerks is concerned, the office has been on something of a hit-or-miss plan. A number of the titles now borne by attaches of the office were given them before the extension of the Civil Service regulations to the Surrogate's office, and in only a few instances, according to Mr. Pickett, do they properly describe the duties assigned to the several employees in the office.

In other words, several so-called court officers have, because of their peculiar fitness and qualifications for that kind of work, been assigned to the several branches of clerical work. In the same manner, other employees designated Clerks have, as a result of experience in the office, been assigned by the Surrogate to perform what may be described as Messenger or Police duties.

The schedule attached to this report shows the present title of the several employees, as well as the proposed new designation which the Surrogate asks the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve. The Board of Estimate is also requested to approve the new salary grades to go with the proposed new designation.

According to the said schedule the present salary roll of the office is \$61,900, or \$3,050 less than the amount provided for salaries in the Budget for the year 1905. From examination of the ledgers of the Finance Department it appears that the sum of \$3,048.50 remained unexpended from the salary account of the Surrogate for the year 1904; that of the 1903 salary account \$524.29 was unexpended and returned to the general fund, and that in addition, during the same year \$2,500 was transferred from the salaries fund to the account for supplies and contingencies.

The additional amount now asked for in excess of the present salary list is \$24,280, of which the Surrogate proposes to expend \$9,200 in increasing the salaries of the present force and \$15,080 in providing salaries for new positions.

In explanation of the fact that for two years past the Surrogate has failed to utilize the full amount appropriated for salaries, the Chief Clerk stated that the sum of \$5,000, in addition to the regular appropriation, was provided in 1903 in anticipation of the completion of the new Hall of Records Building and the installation in the Surrogate's office of the new system of filing and keeping the official records. Although

the new building project was undertaken in 1902, the work of reconstruction has been long delayed and until recently the Surrogate was required to occupy the old quarters on the first floor of the building, where the space facilities were such as to make impracticable the work of any larger force. In 1903 and 1904, therefore, the full appropriations for salaries were not expended and the balances previously mentioned were returned to the general fund or transferred to other accounts.

Pending the action of the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the application now under consideration, the Surrogate has also refrained from making use of the full salary account for the present year, stating that the \$3,050 which now appears as unexpended in the salary account would be insufficient to provide for the establishment of the new positions required and the payment of increased salaries to those of the present force who may be entitled to the same.

The Surrogate asks that the whole scheme of the reorganizing the office be now definitely settled. This includes not only the creation of new positions and some salary increases, but the proper designation for members of the working force and the regrading of the positions in accordance with the efficiency and merit shown by the several employees.

As was stated in the communication, Surrogate Church addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, included among the papers attached to this report, the office will require several additional employees for the proper supervision and handling of the records, there now being approximately 25,000 square feet of floor space instead of about 7,500, the capacity of the old quarters. This, it would seem, would justify the Surrogate's application for the appointment of some additional Clerks to act as custodians of records and possibly the services of an increased number of Court Officers.

It appears further that the work of recording wills and other instruments is now about six months behind. The papers filed in January of 1905 were being transcribed on Thursday, July 6, when the Finance Department representative visited the office. This is properly the work of Recording Clerks, of which, according to the existing designations, there would appear to be nine. The Surrogate desires to retain two of the present force for the work of transcribing records, and asks that three be designated as General Clerks. Two of those now bearing the title of Recording Clerks have recently been designated as Court Officers, the duties of which position they have for some time been filling. One of the Recording Clerks has for several years been performing the duties of Assistant Accounting Clerk, and it is proposed to give one other Recording Clerk the title of Court Officer. Application is now made for seven additional Recording Clerks at \$1,000 each.

Comparison has been made by the Commissioners of Accounts, as shown in a report addressed to his Honor the Mayor, June 2, 1905, between the amount of work done in the office of the Surrogate of Kings County and that done in the office of the Surrogate of New York County. It appears from the figures given in said report that the four principal classes of business transacted by the two courts during the year 1904 were as follows:

The appropriation for salaries in the office of the Surrogate of New York County was \$160,050, as compared with \$68,800 for the Surrogate of Kings County, of which latter amount it has been seen the Surrogate proposes to expend \$61,900 in salaries. There is an item of \$2,500 included in the appropriation for Kings County for copying old and mutilated records which has no counterpart in the appropriation for New York County, neither has it been utilized by the Surrogate of Kings County during the past three years, his office accommodations, as previously stated, being such as not to permit of the employment of any additional help.

An attempt has also been made to compare the salaries paid to persons occupying positions in the New York County Surrogates' office with those performing similar duties in the office of the Kings County Surrogate. The whole scheme of office organization, however, would appear to be different from that existing in Kings County, and in my judgment, any such comparison would form an unfair basis from recommending salaries to be paid in either office. Entirely different classifications are used and it would appear also from facts disclosed in this examination that there is a somewhat different division of work in the office.

Chief Clerk Pickett stated that the schedule of proposed changes and designations and grades has been submitted to the New York State Civil Service Commission and was made the subject of a special inquiry by Mr. John C. Birdseye, Secretary of the Commission. A copy of Mr. Birdseye's report to the Commission, dated February 25, 1905, was shown to your representative. In it each recommendation of the Surrogate was considered and in every instance but one the report stated that the changes could be made under the rules with the approval of the Commission and without special action. One transfer or exchange of title would, the Secretary said, probably require that a promotion examination be held. In concluding his report Secretary Birdseye said:

"I am impressed with the fact that the desire of the Surrogate is meritorious and that with a largely increased office room he is able to adjust the divisions of his Departments and arrange the work in an orderly and business-like way. I think it is not desirable to multiply titles for clerical positions as it is much easier for the head of a Department to make promotions and transfers and other changes if the positions are not too specifically designated."

Careful inquiry has been made of Chief Clerk Pickett as to the character of the services rendered by the several employees of the office to whom salary increases are proposed to be given, with the purpose in view of recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment those cases where meritorious services or the class of work performed would seem to warrant payment of larger salaries. If the accompanying schedule of new grades and new salaries for the Surrogate's office meets with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and assuming that the increases from the first of August, an authorization of Special Revenue Bonds of \$3,000 will be sufficient to meet the requirements of the new schedule for the remainder of this year.

The actual amount of increase for five months is \$5,720.81. The Surrogate has at his disposal approximately \$2,850 applicable to salaries, against which there is no charge under the existing salary schedule of the Surrogate's office.

I would therefore respectfully recommend:

First—That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution approving the new grade and designations recommended in the schedule accompanying this report.

Second—Also that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution concurring with the resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted April 11, 1905, to the extent of approving an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$3,000, instead of the amount approved by the Board of Aldermen, which was \$20,000 for increasing salaries and for compensation of new positions to be created in the Surrogate's office, Kings County.

O'Grady, the Senior Clerk in the City Clerk's office, detailed to the Board of Aldermen, who for twenty years has faithfully served the cities of Brooklyn and New York, eighteen of which have been in the City Clerk's office, and a veteran of the Civil War, at not less than the minimum rate for the highest grade in the Civil Service, viz., at \$3,000

per annum or more, he having received no increase of pay for eight years, although filling a responsible and sometimes arduous position, and Clerks in other departments far junior to him have been much more liberally treated.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—In preparing the Budget for this office for the coming year, and which is submitted herewith, there appears an item "Salaries—Sheriff's Office," \$100,750, being an increase of \$2,090 over the prior year. There also appears an item "Salaries—County Jail," \$22,132, or an increase of \$300 over the former year.

The largest increase is asked for the Cashier and the Jury Clerk. Each now receives \$2,000 a year. The position of Cashier in this Department is an important one and entails tremendous work. While the Entry Clerk receives \$2,500 a year (and that sum is well deserved for the work performed) and handles about forty or fifty thousand dollars each year, the Cashier handles ten times that amount, draws thousands of checks, and, in fact, is kept at work constantly without intermission every day in the year that the office is open and every hour in the day. Two thousand dollars a year for that position is extremely underpaid, and I therefore, subject to the approval of your Board, added \$750 to his annual salary.

I have added \$560 to the salary of the Jury Clerk. Mr. McCormick, who occupies that position, has held it since January 1, 1877, a period of twenty-nine years on the first of the year. In 1890 he received \$2,200; in 1894 his salary was raised to \$2,620; in

the final estimate of that year his salary was fixed at \$2,560 and remained so until 1896, when, I am informed, Sheriff Tamsen made application to have the salary reduced to \$2,000, and the sum of \$560 added to the salary of the Law Clerk. At that time there was a position known as Sheriff's Jury Clerk, who was receiving \$1,200 a year for his services. In 1902 the latter position was abolished and the work formerly performed by the said Jury Clerk was transferred to Mr. McCormick. A saving, however, of \$1,200 to the City was had thereby, but the labor of the Jury Clerk was largely increased. I consider the position of Jury Clerk one of the most important in this Department. Aside from his great experience, he is familiar with every other position in this office, and in the absence of a Clerk through sickness, or for any other reason, Mr. McCormick is called upon to attend to the duty of the absentee. He is a valuable and competent man, he attends to the correspondence with out of town attorneys and keeps accounts with them, keeps the real estate record of the office, prepares deeds of all sales, returns processes to attorneys and to the courts, attends to the necessary supplies of the office, prepares summonses for the Sheriff's jury, attends to the sessions of the Sheriff's jury and performs such other work as he may be called upon to discharge. I am of the opinion that this increase should be allowed.

An increase is asked for the Auditor of \$140 a year, making his salary \$3,000. The present Auditor has long been connected with the office. His efficiency is well known, his duties are onerous, and in his case I also recommend the slight increase. He is entitled in my judgment to much more.

Two hundred dollars more is asked for the Under-Sheriff's Clerk. The present incumbent is certainly underpaid for the work that he performs. I do not consider that the \$1,000 which he receives yearly is at all just or fair. He has very little time to himself, and is on the go from the time the office opens until its close. His position also is an important one. Every letter and every court order is recorded by him, then the records must be searched to ascertain who the Deputy is that may have charge of the matter mentioned in the papers, and next he is required to seek the Deputy and to inform him of the Under-Sheriff's instructions. I make the same recommendation in this case as in the others.

An increase of \$120 is asked for each of the two Van Drivers. Each now receives \$840 a year, or \$70 a month. I am asking for \$10 increase per month for these men.

Thousands of prisoners are taken to the various places of sentence by these two Drivers, and they are out in all kinds of weather. I feel they are underpaid, and an increase of \$10 is little enough, in my judgment, for the work that they perform.

I am asking, also, for an increase of \$200 for the Clerk of the County Jail, and an increase of \$100 for the Assistant Engineer. The present Clerk has occupied the position, I am informed, for six or seven years. He not only keeps the records of the jail, but is obliged, in all kinds of weather, to journey back and forth to the Sheriff's office with papers, deposits, and the like. I am satisfied that the compensation paid to him is out of proportion to the work which he performs.

The Assistant Engineer, who performs exactly the same work as the other Engineer, receives \$800 yearly for his services. I cannot myself understand why one Engineer is paid \$1,000 and the other \$800 a year. The grade is the same, and the compensation little enough. The Assistant Engineer has almost beseeched me to obtain for him this little increase, and I recommend that the \$100 additional be allowed to him.

The total increase in salaries for this Department for the ensuing year is but \$2,390. During the time that I have been at the head of the Department I have had an opportunity of ascertaining the quality of the men, and I cannot praise them too highly. I have been at the office every day from the hour of nine in the morning to the time of closing. I have looked after the details of the office, I have had occasion to observe the men for whom a word has been said by me in respect of an increase, and I am satisfied that they are deserving of the increase. It is no fair answer that there are others who might be willing to perform the work for the salaries now paid. This office is altogether too important to give a chance to amateurs to add additional perils to the Sheriff's position, nor do I agree with the statement frequently heard that the government employees are well paid for what they do. This sentiment can hardly apply to the positions that I have particularly specified.

In the incidental expenses there appears an increase of \$2,250. My judgment is that this amount will be necessary. For some years past \$2,750 has been appropriated, and the estimate of \$5,000 for last year was, without notice to me, reduced to

the like sum. I have already notified the Board that \$2,750 will not be sufficient, and that an appropriation must be made to meet the additional expense. The present offices of the Sheriff occupy a floor with a large number of rooms, each of which has been connected by telephone, and the expense has been necessarily increased. So, as I have repeatedly notified your Honorable Body, it costs more now to transport prisoners than heretofore, and there should be enough money appropriated so that my successor will not be hampered in the discharge of his duties. It should also be borne in mind that the purchase of office supplies, alterations and repairs, heretofore furnished by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, must now be paid for by the Sheriff out of the incidental expenses. Five thousand dollars is no more than is required for that purpose.

P. S.—I find in the above that I inadvertently omitted to ask for an increase of \$200 for one of the Clerks in the Entry Clerk's Department, who is now receiving \$1,000 per annum. This Clerk performs the same services as are now being performed by the Assistant Entry Clerk, who is receiving \$1,500 a year. I am of the opinion that \$1,200 is but a reasonable and fair compensation for the services rendered.

The increase in the surveying, laying out, maps and plans, etc., of \$35,223 is caused by the needed equipment of four field parties, which, with their instruments, traveling expenses and salaries of an Assistant Engineer, Transitman, two Chainmen and an Axeman, amounts to \$7,250 per party, or, for all, of \$29,000.

The computations caused by the recalculation of the district east of the Bronx river, to make its system consistent with the triangulation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, will require four Computers at \$1,500 apiece, or, in all, \$6,000.

The monumenting of the district east of the Bronx river requires 500 additional monuments, at \$3 a piece (\$1,500), a Foreman to set them, at \$3.50 per day and his expenses, amounting in all to \$2,723.

\$29,000 plus \$6,000 plus \$2,723, equals \$37,723; minus \$2,500, equals \$35,223.

The increase in the maps for street openings of \$16,580 is caused by the need of two extra field parties at \$6,800, including expenses, which would be \$13,680 (less one Assistant Engineer at \$1,800, to be supplied from the force at present), equals \$11,800, and three additional Draughtsmen at \$4,800, amounts in all to \$16,600.

The monumenting work at present is severely handicapped by the insufficient number of parties, and this, in turn, handicaps the Bureaus of Highways and Sewers, since the monuments defining the streets are not set.

The work east of the Bronx river will be seriously delayed if the Computers necessary are not obtained, as the field work will be entirely stopped.

The many large proceedings for acquiring title under way require these field parties for the purpose of making surveys for the damage and profile maps for the Commissions, and the additional Draughtsmen are necessary for the same purpose.

The appropriation asked for is required for the adequate maintenance, cleaning and repairs of sewers and appurtenances in the Borough of The Bronx, and the entire amount requested should be granted to allow for the necessary increase of force to provide for carrying on this important work adequately and continuously throughout the entire year. The length of sewers for 1906 will be about 245 miles, and the number of permanent receiving basins will be about 2,680; a large number of these basins, on account of their location, receive the wash from unpaved streets, and are consequently quickly choked with earth and sand, requiring very frequent cleaning. In addition to the care and maintenance of the sewers and basins of a permanent type, much labor and expense are necessary on account of the care of the drainage within the District of Chester, and with a large portion of the District of Morrisania, where sewers have not yet been built for the accommodation of surface and storm water.

It is estimated that the same amount allowed for 1905 will be sufficient for the maintenance, repairs and supplies for 1906, if there be but one bath in use as is the case this year. Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$10,000 were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the purpose of providing for one additional bath during 1905, but said amount proved entirely inadequate when bids for the construction of the same were received. It being too late in the season for the builders to supply the bath in time, application will be made early next year for an additional amount sufficient to provide for at least two additional baths which are very much needed in sections where the population is most numerous.

To pay salaries of the employees of this Bureau, as its working force now exists, viz.:

July, 1905. For the year 1906, the sum of \$110,050 is necessary (see list of employees and salaries of same attached hereto). Before the close of the year my full working force will have been completed, which will require an additional expenditure for a year of \$6,450, making a total of \$116,500 for salaries absolutely necessary for the use of this Bureau for the year 1906.

The amount asked for salaries for 1906 is but \$500 more than the total amount allowed for such purpose for this Bureau for the year 1905. It will be necessary to appoint a Chief Inspector with salary at the rate of \$3,000 per annum, and an additional

Construction Inspector at \$1,350. I also propose to reward a few of my staff for their faithful and energetic services during the great and continued increase in the business of this office for the past year and a half, with increases in salary ranging from \$150 for the Stenographer, a couple of Messengers and Clerks and \$300 each for the Assistant Engineer and Chief Clerk.

The proposed increases I consider fair and just and will also afford the persons receiving same a proper and reasonable compensation for the efficient services rendered this Bureau, architects, builders and the public. Also the persons whose salaries I now propose to increase have not heretofore received any advancement in salary.

The business of this office has increased over 60 per cent. in the number of operations and over 95 per cent. in cost of same in the first seven months of this year, over the first seven months of 1905, as appears by the following statement, viz.:

The present outlook indicates that plans will be filed for the year for over 2,000 new building to cost not less than \$40,000,000.

The increase in building operations brings with it a natural and consequent increase in all branches of the business of the Bureau, especially in correspondence, violations and notices issued.

The appointment of a Chief Inspector is necessary in order to keep abreast of the business of the Bureau, as the Superintendent's time is fully taken up by architects, builders and the public, and the Assistant Superintendent with matters pertaining to the plumbing business of the Bureau and inspections.

The increased amount asked for contingencies and emergencies, viz.: \$2,500 to \$3,000, an increase of \$500, is as small to my mind as is practicable for the proper management of the Bureau. Out of this fund must be paid the incidental expenses, such as carfares of inspectors and Messengers, postage, horseshoeing bills, repairs to carriages, harness, survey fees and emergency charges in unsafe building matters.

The continued increase in the business of this Bureau fully warrants the appropriation requested, and the present outlook and healthy condition of the real estate market convinces me that the building business will continue to flourish and grow in this borough.

The proposed increases in salaries are reasonable and just, not only as a proper compensation for services rendered, but also as an equalization in salaries such as is paid employees in Brooklyn and Manhattan, for work of similar character and importance.

The reason for asking for an increase in the appropriation for the payment of legal fees is that four thousand dollars is insufficient for the payment of legal fees properly chargeable to the county. The lawful fees chargeable against the County of Queens for the six months ending June 30, 1905, is between twenty-nine hundred and three thousand dollars as the records of the Comptroller's office will show.

The reason for asking for one thousand dollars for repairing and rebinding books is that many of the books can be saved by proper attention and timely repair and rebinding. If not repaired when they begin to break and loosen in the binding in a short time by constant use they become dilapidated and beyond usefulness. I ask this appropriation on the ground of economy.

The City has heretofore disallowed all claims for an appropriation for expenses incurred in this kind of work and has uniformly ruled that only charges for recopying could be properly payable out of the appropriation made for that specific purpose, and there is no other fund out of which the expenses for repairing and rebinding can be paid.

The recopying of condemned records has been continued and much work has been done during the past year, but much more still remains to be done, and I now ask that the balance of the estimate of last year be appropriated, to wit, twenty-five thousand dollars, for the completion of this work.

No books have been copied during the past year except those mentioned in the schedule of condemned books annexed to and forming part of my requisition of last year. Many of the books not included in the estimate, by constant use, are becoming dilapidated, and I urge upon the Board the advisability of making a sufficient appropriation to complete the work of recopying this schedule of books, and then making a sufficient appropriation to enable the Clerk to mend the books immediately upon the appearance of any defects in them.

The increase in the above estimate for 1906 of \$81,516.50 is partly due to the increase of the wages to the prevailing rates of the laboring force and to the increase in the prices of materials used for repairing the pavements and also for the purpose of employing the laboring force a sufficient length of time during the year to properly repair the pavements and keep them in good condition.

The maintenance of the sewer system in a condition of cleanliness and good repair is increasing in difficulty and expense. During the past few years considerable sums have been set apart for the special work of rebuilding, repairing and the entire reconstruction of the older portion of the system, and the work accomplished by the expenditure of these appropriations has resulted in great benefit to those sections of the City which were drained by sewers, constructed many years ago; especially is it true of the old pipe system, which is from 30 to 40 years old. These sewers were laid when the manufacture of sewers and drain pipe was in its infancy and the material then used was far inferior to the standard of the present day.

Methods of putting this material in place have also much improved. The entire replacement of the old pipe system should be undertaken and carried to a finish. For this purpose a liberal appropriation should be made each year. The Bureau is also engaged in rebuilding the older portion of the larger trunk sewers. These works have deteriorated not only on account of the wear and tear of long use, but on account of excavations for deep foundations of adjoining buildings and an immense amount of subsurface pipe laying; thus foundations have been disturbed and

many failures have resulted. Large sums must be expended in the future to restore such sewers to proper working condition.

It should also be remarked that the construction of numerous many-storied buildings occupied by thousands of tenants where hundreds were located before, has added materially to the consumption of water, which fact must be considered in fixing the size of sewers. For this reason many sewers should be rebuilt of increased capacity.

An equally important branch of the services is the cleaning of sewers and catch basins. This work is now done by a day-labor force, organized into gangs, under the direction of the Superintendent of Maintenance and directly in charge of Foremen and Assistant Foremen, and supplied with the necessary tools and apparatus for the purpose.

The actual work of entering sewers and digging therefrom mud and filth is not attractive to the average laboring man, and it is hard to get the number of men needed. Add to this condition the fact that during recent years the Department of Street Cleaning has substituted the system of flushing into catch basins and sewers for sweeping and carting, which increases immensely the work of the laboring force of this Bureau, and, in my opinion, improperly and unnecessarily. From this cause the number of complaints of sewers and basins stopped have increased enormously. Either this practice must be stopped or large sums expended to meet it.

It is a fair proposition to demand that the Street Cleaning Department clean all basins and remove all dirt flushed into the same by its force.

Under the above stated conditions this Bureau is much in need of young, able-bodied, willing laborers to do the actual work of filth removal from sewers and basins.

TENEMENT HOUSE DEPARTMENT.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Complying with your resolution of June 30, 1905, and with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, I beg to transmit herewith the Departmental Estimate of the Tenement House Department for the year 1906.

The Tenement House Department respectfully requests that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriate the sum of \$625,810 for the expense of the Tenement House Department for the year 1906, made up as follows:

Rents	\$20,100 00
Supplies and Contingencies.....	25,000 00
Salaries	580,710 00
Total.....	\$625,810 00

The amounts requested for "Rents" and for "Supplies and Contingencies" are exactly the same as those appropriated for the year 1905.

The increase in the amount requested for "Salaries" for the year 1906 is made necessary by the congested condition of the work of the Department, which will continue well into the coming year by the large increase in the number of new tenements; and by the prospective continuance of this increase as indicated by the unusually large number of plans filed during the present year, viz.: One thousand one hundred and sixteen new buildings in the first eight months of 1905 as compared with 548 new buildings in a similar period of 1904. These conditions show clearly the need for an increase in the volume of inspections and the other work incidental thereto.

In July last I was compelled to appeal to your Board for an additional appropriation to enable me to meet the conditions then existing in this Department and such appropriation was granted. Without this it would have been impossible to have prevented a complete demoralization of the administration of the Department. It is absolutely necessary to continue upon this basis during the coming year in order to carry out the plans now being inaugurated to bring the departmental work up to that condition where normal demands may be met.

With the above appropriation it will be possible to make a complete sanitary inspection of the existing tenement houses in the City not more often than once in every three months. Attention should be called to the fact that under the provisions of section 1344A of the Greater New York Charter, it is made the duty of the Tenement House Commissioner "to cause an inspection of every completed tenement house in the City to be made at least once in each month." This provision is mandatory and applies to all tenement houses except those where the average rental is twenty-five dollars a month or more, in which case the frequency of the inspection is in the discretion of the Commissioner.

While I am of the opinion that a monthly inspection of those buildings, popularly known as "tenement houses," is eminently desirable, I appreciate that the cost of such inspections would be so great that your Board might with difficulty feel justified in making so large an increase in the appropriation of this Department. For this reason I have refrained from submitting my estimate upon this basis, but if your Honorable Board desires I shall be pleased to submit to you a supplementary estimate as to the increased cost of complying with this provision of the Charter.

No amount of this year's appropriation will remain unexpended.

In 1903 and 1904 this office asked for an appropriation for an extra Clerk, because the work of the previous years demonstrated the necessity of an increased clerical force. The past year has again shown us that to properly perform the duties of this office there should be at least one more Clerk allowed the office. The Borough of The Bronx is steadily growing in population, and the number of accident and other cases is increasing. With but three Clerks the Coroners in office next year will not be able to keep the office open from 8 a. m. to 12 p. m. and properly attend to their cases, as it is evident that not more than two Clerks are on duty at a time and only one is during part of the day.

The Stenographer has been contending that the law fixes his salary at the rate of \$2,500 per annum, and the Supreme Court at Special Term has decided in his favor. This decision is being appealed from by the Corporation Counsel.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit to you herewith, on behalf of this corporation, estimates amounting to \$452,295.03 for maintenance of thirty-nine (39) branch libraries and traveling libraries in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, under the direction of the New York Public Library, for the year 1906.

These estimates include libraries consolidated during the year and new libraries about to be opened in the buildings being constructed under the gift of Andrew Carnegie. They do not, however, include the maintenance of the Maimonides Free Library, which has not as yet agreed to consolidate into the free public library system.

The following schedules give the items of this estimate, which have been prepared from detailed figures in tables submitted herewith for examination.

The increase over the appropriation for 1905 is partly due to the necessity to provide for the equipment with stock of books of the new branch libraries which will be opened during the next year. It is necessary that this money be appropriated so as to be available for payments when, during the year, purchases of books can advantageously be made. The increase is also due to the cost of maintaining three new branches in these buildings; to the additional cost of maintaining for the entire period of the year 1906 seven new libraries which were open during a portion only of the year 1905; to the cost of enlarging libraries moving into new buildings, and to the increased cost of general administration because of the growth of the system of libraries.

Annexed hereto are the certificates of the Regents of the State of New York as to the approved circulation of the branch libraries for the year ending June 30, 1905, of 3,584,000 volumes.

MAIMONIDES FREE LIBRARY.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—The petition of District No. 1 of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith, respectfully shows:

That it is a library association duly incorporated under the Laws of the State of New York, known as chapter 188 of the Laws of 1878, as amended by chapter 100 of the Laws of 1885, and chapter 58 of the Laws of 1896, and is located in the City and County of New York. That said association owns real estate in said City of New York, to wit: No. 101 Manhattan street, and No. 106 Lawrence street, of the value of at least \$23,000.

That the name by which the library of your petitioner is known is "The Maimonides Free Library of District No. 1, of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith," and the place where said library is established and has its offices and rooms and rooms at the north-east corner of Lexington avenue and Fifty-eighth street, in The City of New York.

Upon information and belief that it owns 85,657 volumes of books and maintains the same as a free library for the free circulation of books among the inhabitants of The City of New York.

That it has actually circulated in the twelve months next preceding this application 179,254 volumes of books, and that the aggregate number of volumes actually withdrawn from the library of said association by the people of The City of New York, for use in their homes or places of business, is 127,628.

Annexed hereto are schedules showing the different kinds of books owned and circulated by this library.

That said library was established by said association in January, 1852, and was opened as a free library in March 1, 1894.

That the establishment of said library and the circulation of books therefrom has been of inestimable benefit to many of the inhabitants of The City of New York and elsewhere, and the cost of maintaining the same is very considerable.

That the library of your petitioner has been registered in the Public Library Department of the Regents' University of the State of New York on November 25, 1896, and Certificate No. 272 by said Regents has been issued to that effect.

Whereof your petitioner prays that your Honorable Body may appropriate such sums of money as may be equitable and proper to be paid to your petitioner in accordance with law in monthly installments.

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BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals,
Foot East Twenty-sixth Street,
New York, September 1, 1905.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith the estimates for the expenditures of the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the year 1906, in compliance with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter.

In accordance with the instructions of the Honorable the Comptroller of The City of New York, in his circular letter of July 15, 1905, these estimates state specifically the object and purposes of all appropriations necessary to meet the expenses of conducting the public business of this Department for the year 1906.

The total amount of appropriations required for 1906 is \$736,600.91, which is \$121,800.13 in excess of the sum at first appropriated for 1905. This sum (\$614,800.78) proved, however, entirely inadequate for the actual expenses of administration during the year, and an additional appropriation of \$50,000 had to be asked for. The excess actually asked for at the present time amounts, therefore, only to \$71,800.13, which is distributed among the various appropriations included in the Departmental Budget. Two general reasons for this advance are the anticipated opening of one or more new hospitals in the coming year, involving the accommodation of more patients than the City has ever had to care for before, and the recent erection of four new pavilions accommodating about 100 additional patients at Bellevue. This last change has involved a considerable increase in both salary and supply accounts by reason of the increased number of employees needed to care properly for the sick now retained in this institution instead of being transferred, as was necessary under the old system, before they were really well enough to go.

It will be noted that this Board has asked for an increase of \$34,340 in the salaries of employees of the Department. Despite the greatest care and every possible effort often it has been found impossible to secure the best class of help in the hospitals for the wages that could be paid, because the City was necessarily a competitor in the market for labor, and the prevailing rate of wages for the various classes of domestic labor has so materially increased in the last few years that the Board of Trustees has been unfortunately restricted in its selection. It believes that if the appropriation is increased so that the market price may be paid for labor it will be possible to obtain a more efficient and permanent class of employees. It must be remembered that a large number of the employees are of the class usually found in domestic service, and the present discomforts that are necessarily associated with their housing and maintenance are deterrent factors in addition to the low wages that have been paid. Of the increase, \$18,564 is required to bring the wages paid to the lowest grade of employees up to the rate of \$20 per month. Many of these persons work from ten to twelve hours a day, and almost every day in the week, and the Board of Trustees thinks that you will agree that the remuneration is not excessive.

An increase of \$500 is requested for the Night Superintendent, who has a very responsible and onerous position, for which the present salary of \$1,000 appears altogether inadequate. An increase of \$260 is asked for in the salary of the Bookkeeper, to bring it up to the prevailing salary paid in other departments to an employee of his length of service and efficiency. The increase for the salary of the Foreman of Drivers will make that remuneration no more than that paid similar positions in other departments of the City government.

Two additional Head Nurses and eight Pupil Nurses are needed for the proper care of the patients. The moderate increases asked for in the salaries of the Supervising Nurses of the several hospitals is a slight recognition of the efficiency and zeal displayed by them in the furthering of the City's interests. \$6,180 is required for employees needed in the enlarged Gouverneur Hospital.

The Board of Trustees sincerely trusts that your Honorable Board will appreciate its situation in this matter and authorize the increased appropriation asked for in this matter of salaries.

The estimates for supplies and contingencies is made out in the form prescribed by the Commissioners of Accounts. The increase of \$50,780.13 is, in fact, but \$10,780.13 more than had to be expended in 1905. This estimate is based on the increased cost of supplies in general, as well as on the fact that the appropriation for 1905 was found sadly inadequate and \$40,000 additional had to be asked for to meet a deficiency. The demands on the hospitals will be appreciated by the fact that the average daily census in 1904 was 1,832 individuals; in 1905 it was 1,936, and the prospect is that in 1906 it will be over 2,000. From January 31 to July 1 of 1905 this Department received supplies to the value of \$192,390.19, while those needed to meet requisitions during that period amounted to \$199,047.81. The amount, \$401,240.21, asked for in 1906, is based on a very careful and conservative estimate of such supplies as will be actually needed and consumed during the year, and that will leave the hospitals with but a small stock on hand at the end of the fiscal year.

For additions, alterations and repairs we are compelled to ask an increased appropriation, making a total of \$31,000, \$8,000 more than was allowed in 1905. The old buildings at Bellevue require constant expenditure for repairs, and it will be noted that the chief item asked for is plumbing and gasfitting (\$6,000), for repairing the roofs, leaders and gutters (\$5,000), and for the steam-heating system (\$2,000). The present laundry equipment is barely adequate to meet the demands by constant operation of every part. In the event of accident to any machine the laundry work of the hospitals is seriously interfered with, and the new machines are urgently needed.

The amount, \$17,520, for rents is an increase of \$1,680 over the appropriation of 1905. This is required to meet the expenses of the various buildings that this Board has had to lease because of the inadequacy of accommodations in the hospitals.

\$12,500 is required for clothing for the insane, an increase of only \$500 over the appropriation in 1905, and is necessary to meet the expenses caused by the increasing number of insane who come to the hospital, and who, in accordance with the provisions of the State law, must be provided with an outfit of clothing on their transfer to State institutions.

An increase of \$9,500 is needed for ambulances, horses, etc., making a total appropriation of \$20,000. During 1906 several of the old horses will have to be replaced, and the very great wear and tear on the ambulances will necessitate the purchase of new vehicles. In this amount is included \$5,000 for the purchase of a touring car automobile to be used by the members of the Board of Trustees, and the General Medical Superintendent of the Department in visits of inspection to the hospitals. The great distances of Fordham and Harlem Hospitals in particular, require a large amount of time by present means of communication for visits of inspection, and it is deemed that an expeditious means of conveyance should be provided to enable these officials to make frequent and necessary visits of inspection, particularly while the new hospitals are in process of erection. It is also found that too much of the General Medical Superintendent's time is consumed by the ordinary methods of transportation, and it is believed that such a car will materially expedite the work of the Department.

The increase asked is due to the salary of an Assistant Clerk. Neither this district nor the Third District of this borough has such an Assistant, although every other district in the Greater City has one, notwithstanding that there is a greater volume of business transacted in these two courts than in the First District of The Bronx, the First and Second Districts of Richmond, the First District of Queens and the Sixth District of Brooklyn.

Aside from the volume of business it is an absolute necessity. It is now eight years since the Clerks of these two districts were appointed. As the courts are open during the summer, their presence is required, and they have been unable to enjoy any vacation other than legal holidays.

Besides this it is an absolute necessity for several reasons. In the first place, under the rules of the Finance Department, the Clerk has to spend half a day each month in going to New York to make his deposit of collections before he can get his salary. During this absence nothing can be done.

In the next place, when his presence is required in the courtroom during a trial in empanelling a jury and receiving their verdict, he is obliged to close his office.

Again, in sickness a like condition of affairs exists. This occurred during the past year in this district, and for several days no summonses, warrants, writs or precepts could be issued. In two instances laborers lost their right to a body execution against an unscrupulous employer. In another instance, the statute of limitations defeated a just claim, and in still another instance failure to obtain a transcript of judgment and docket it lost the judgment creditor a lien upon real estate which was conveyed before such transcript could be filed.

It is true that there is no statutory provision for the appointment of an Assistant Clerk, neither is there any for those in the First and Second Districts of Richmond. Yet they were appointed eight years ago, and have been performing their duties and receiving their salary ever since. To say that they were appointed immediately after consolidation and should not now be disturbed, and that these two districts, not having made the appointments then, should go without them now, is, I think, to say the least, begging the question. There was no provision for their appointment then, nor is there any for their continuation now, yet there is no prohibitory statute, consequently their appointment is legal, and appointments made now in these two districts would be legal. There can be no question that your Honorable Board has the right to make provision for the payment of such Assistant Clerk, and I most respectfully ask that the estimate herewith be approved.

UNITED STATES LIFE SAVING CORPS.

Nos. 63 and 65 Park Row, New York City, September 4, 1905.

Report of Work Done in 1905 and Estimate for Services for Year 1906.

The United States Volunteer Life-Saving Corps in presenting estimate for the maintenance of their New York City Department for the year 1906 beg leave to report the work done by them for the season of 1905 as follows:

We have carefully extended our work to a number of extra stations on the water front, from Whitestone on the Sound, including City Island, Flushing Bay, Hell Gate,

all the East river down to the Narrows, around to Gravesend Bay, Coney Island, Sheephead Bay, Plumb Island and all of Jamaica Bay to Far Rockaway; on the waters surrounding Staten Island and the Island of Manhattan, including Harlem river.

The distribution of our life-saving apparatus was greatly increased, but we still need a few boats at important stations. We procured a power-boat, 35 feet long, with a cabin to protect our supplies, and have been and are now using it around the harbor of New York as a United States Volunteer Life-Saving Corps supply boat. Not only is it valuable in distributing supplies, but passing through the waters at all times it is likely to be useful in making rescues. This boat we obtained at a moderate expenditure. We could do our work much better if we had this boat for the Hudson river and another such boat, or one a little larger, for the East river.

This year we doubled the time of instruction in the art of swimming in the public free floating baths, and with the co-operation of the City would like to have even more time devoted to this worthy object the coming season.

Many lives were saved by us, as you have seen by the newspapers during the summer, and we shall be glad to furnish a record if desired. Our station at One Hundred and First street and East river made several very notable rescues, which were well recognized by the press. We would like to build a boat-house for this station, and ask the assistance of the Dock and Park Departments of the City in this direction.

At Hell Gate we have built a very comfortable house for the United States Volunteer Life-Saving Corps members of the upper East river and Hell Gate, which crew numbers about forty men. Our crew at Hallett's Light, which has its house in the cove beyond, recently rescued a couple of drowning men employed on one of the City boats coming up the Gate.

We aim to build a house at the cove at Bay Ridge, where the main road runs round in a circle. We tried early in the season to get the site, but have been delayed on account of staking out a position by the Park authorities. As soon as we can get this location established we will put up a life-saving station. This we would like to be able to do next January and February, so as to have it ready by the opening of spring waters.

PROVISIONAL ESTIMATE.

Office of the Corporation Counsel, City of New York, }

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—In response to the circular letter of the Comptroller, dated July 15, 1905, I submit the following estimate of the appropriations needed by the Law Department for the year 1906, viz.:

Salary of the Corporation Counsel.....	\$15,000 00

In accordance with the instructions contained in the Comptroller's circular letter, I attach hereto a schedule marked "A" containing the list of salaries recommended, and another schedule marked "B," containing a summary of appropriations. I also desire to make the following explanation in relation to the appropriations recommended:

Salary of the Corporation Counsel.

The salary of the Corporation Counsel is fixed by section 255 of the Charter.

Contingent Counsel Fees.

I think that amount appropriated for the present year for the payment of counsel in patent cases and other matters, which cannot be handled by the permanent office force, will be sufficient, and I have accordingly asked for the same amount for the year 1906.

Supplies and Contingencies, Including Deficiencies.

In my provisional estimate for the year 1905, I asked for the sum of \$125,000, and your Board allowed me \$100,000. I now find that my original estimate was very accurate, and that the amount which will be needed during the current year will be about \$25,000 more than the amount of the appropriation, and it will, therefore, be necessary for me to ask your Board later in the year to make a transfer from some other department to cover the amount of the deficiency.

It is apparent, therefore, that for the year 1906, it will be impossible to meet the bills against this appropriation with any smaller appropriation than \$125,000, unless part of this sum can be paid from some other appropriation, and I am about to suggest a method by which I think this can be done.

Your Board is doubtless aware of the fact that there are a large number of persons employed more or less regularly in the Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, and the Tenement House Branch Office of this department, who are not paid from the salary appropriation, but whose services are furnished by agreement with private concerns whose bills are paid out of the appropriation for "Supplies and Contingencies."

This system was instituted by my predecessor, and I have been obliged to continue it, but I have never been thoroughly convinced that it was not an evasion of the Civil Service Laws.

In the Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes of this department, there are thousands of notices and papers of various kinds to be sent out, and thousands of summonses and complaints to be typewritten and served, and in the

Tenement House Branch Office there is a quantity of the same sort of work, and my predecessor instituted the practice of having this work done by special agreement with outside concerns, because he considered it more economical than to have it done by persons appointed from the Civil Service lists. The work has increased in volume each year, and now there are at various times between thirty and forty persons employed in this work who are paid by monthly bills against the Fund for "Supplies and Contingencies."

On February 23, 1905, I received a letter from the Comptroller calling my attention to the fact that the services of these persons could no longer be considered of a temporary character, and asking what authority of law there was for not complying with the Civil Service Laws and Regulations, making it obligatory upon the head of each Department to fill all positions from the eligible lists of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

On March 22, 1905, I wrote to the Comptroller at great length, setting forth the history of the whole matter, and showing how it had developed and stating that the whole responsibility in the matter was with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The work which is being performed by these persons is work which cannot be neglected. Under the amendment to the law in relation to the collection of arrears of personal taxes (chapter 624 of the Laws of 1904) all suits and proceedings for the collection of arrears of personal taxes must be commenced within one year from the date of the return by the Marshal of the warrant to enforce the payment of such taxes. If this work were neglected, the Statute of Limitation would run against all of these actions, and the City would lose hundreds of thousands of dollars. I therefore advised the Comptroller that an emergency existed because of the failure of your Board to make the appropriation to pay the salaries of these persons, and that for that reason he was justified in paying the monthly bills from the appropriation of this Department for "Supplies and Contingencies."

I stated further in that letter to the Comptroller that I had very grave doubts as to the legality of these payments, but that, inasmuch as it was imperative that the work should be done, he should continue paying the bills until I had an opportunity to present the matter to your Board. I am confident that your Board will relieve the head of this Department and the Comptroller of the embarrassment of continuing this practice (as to the legality of which there is so much doubt) by making a sufficient addition to the appropriation for salaries to pay for the greater part, if not all, of this class of work.

I stated that there were between thirty and forty persons employed more or less regularly, and I think that the sum of \$25,000 per annum added to the salary appropriation will be sufficient to pay the salaries of persons obtained by certification from the Civil Service eligible list to perform the greater part of these services.

There may be occasions when, because of the pressure of business, it may be necessary to have a small proportion of this work done by private concerns, but I am convinced that the time has arrived when almost all of the work can be done by persons regularly appointed from the Civil Service lists.

I, therefore, make my estimate of appropriations needed in the alternative. If your Board will add \$25,000 to the salary appropriation to pay for these extra Process Servers, Typewriters, etc., \$100,000 will be sufficient for "Supplies and Contingencies," if that amount is not added to the salary appropriation the amount which I have asked for "Supplies and Contingencies" must necessarily be increased by the amount needed to pay these bills and will be \$125,000; but I strongly urge your Board to add the \$25,000 to the salary appropriation, in order that this Department and the Finance Department may be relieved of the responsibility of continuing to pay these persons from the fund for "Supplies and Contingencies."

Salaries of Assistants, Clerks, Etc.

The amount of the appropriation for the current year is \$370,560.

The amount of the pay-roll now in force is \$373,170.

The present appropriation will be sufficient to pay the salaries for the current year, because some persons have not been on the pay-roll for the full year.

I have made no increases in salaries during the year among my assistants, or any of the employees receiving salaries of \$3,000 or over. The only increases which I have made have been among the Office Boys, Clerks, Stenographers and other junior employees, and they have mostly been made to fill vacancies caused by death, resignations, transfers, etc. An addition of \$2,610 to the present appropriation will be needed to pay the present salaries during the coming year.

In my Departmental Estimate for 1905 I asked for an increase in the salary appropriation, which your Board did not allow. I stated as follows:

"In some parts of the Department, especially in the Brooklyn branch office the Personal Tax Bureau and the Tenement House branch office, the work has been very seriously hampered by the lack of a sufficient office force and it is necessary to make a number of additions to the force to properly carry on our business.

"The moving of our office into the New Hall of Records will also have some effect on our needs in this respect. It has been impossible during the past few years to make additions to the force in the main office for the reason that the rooms being crowded it was impossible to find desk room. In our new quarters this objection will be removed and I recommend a number of additional appointments. As the offices in the new building are spread around much more than at present it will be necessary to have more Office Boys.

"My predecessor asked for a small addition to the salary appropriation to enable him to increase the salaries of a few of the office force, but that request was not granted. These increases were intended for a few of the employees who had been receiving the same salary for some years, and whose services had grown much more valuable and who naturally hoped for some recognition of their faithfulness and growing usefulness. Having been led to hope for this increase in salary they were naturally very much disappointed when your predecessors refused to grant the necessary funds. Another year has passed and the services of these and other young men in the Department are steadily increasing in value and it is only fair that there should be some suitable recognition of their efforts.

"The heads of the bureaus and branch offices of this Department have urged me very strongly to recommend a large number of increases, and I have no doubt that there are many instances in this Department where the salaries of employees are not commensurate with the services rendered, and that there are numerous cases where young men have been receiving the same salary for a number of years should be encouraged to greater diligence and faithfulness by an increase of salary, but as I am desirous of keeping my estimate down to the lowest possible figure, I am reluctantly compelled to disregard most of these recommendations.

"This Department contains an unusual number of young men, many of whom came into the Department as Office Boys and some provision should be made for promoting and advancing them, as would happen in any private corporation. All of the large concerns in this City, who employ numbers of clerks, make regular promotions and increases of salary and surely The City of New York should treat its employees with as much consideration as a business corporation.

"It therefore seems to me that your Board should allow a small sum of money, say \$5,000, which I could use to increase the salaries of those Clerks and subordinates in the Department who most deserve it.

"I will submit no detailed list of increases recommended, because I have not yet made up my mind just where they are most deserved, but if your Board should wish me to give any details along this line they will be gladly furnished at any time."

The reasons still exist which led me to ask for the small sum for promotions, and as another year has passed and I have not been able to give these very deserved increases in salary, I earnestly renew my request for an addition of \$5,000 to the salary appropriation for this purpose.

Additional Appointments.

In my estimate for the year 1905, I also asked for certain additions to the office force to cope with the rapidly increasing business of the Department, but my recommendations were not adopted.

The additional appointments suggested were as follows:

The foregoing list, with possibly some unimportant variations, represents the most pressing needs of the Department at the present time.

It is not necessary for me to repeat the reasons assigned in my provisional estimate last year for the increase of the appropriation for salaries so as to admit of the increase of the working force of the Department. They have become stronger during the year, and I earnestly request that this provision be made now.

The so-called Brooklyn overflow sewer cases are increasing in number, and are far beyond the capacity of the Department to care for properly. The Comptroller's office renders willing assistance, but the cases are so numerous that the present office force is inadequate for the proper protection of the City.

It is a fact that firms of lawyers have gone into the business of promoting this litigation, and have their "runners" inciting persons alleged to have been damaged to begin suits on causes of actions arising years ago. Proof to negative their allegations of damage is very difficult to secure, and there is good reason to believe that in many cases the claims are fraudulent.

A sufficient force to cope with this condition should be provided immediately. Every storm will bring its crop of new cases until relief sewers are supplied.

Even the increase of salary account requested will not be adequate to allow for the needed force, but a greater increase is not asked in the hope that these additions to the force may be conceded, which, to some extent, will better the situation.

I do not dilate on this question because it is my intention later to make extensive recommendations on the subject of the reconstruction of this entire Department so as to increase its efficiency and make it more adaptable to the requirements of the new Greater City.

This will involve considerations of salaries and general economies and will, I think, be so plain that your Board will see the necessity for making suitable provision for the plan next year.

To sum up what I have said in relation to the appropriation for "Salaries of Assistants, Clerks, etc.," I ask for the following amounts:

To pay the salaries of persons now on the office pay-roll.....	\$373,170 00

Lands Under Water In and About Jamaica Bay.

I wish to again call the attention of your Board to this very important matter, and beg to remind you of what has already been done to protect the City's rights to these lands and uplands. If prompt and energetic action is taken the City will undoubtedly be able to recover these lands.

The matter was called to my attention during the year 1904, and several conferences were held between representatives of this Department and the Finance Department.

On December 13, 1904, the Comptroller transmitted to this Department a report of the Bureau of Real Estate upon the lands under water of Jamaica Bay, stating that the Law Department had not sufficient funds to defray the necessary expenses of a proper investigation of the subject.

The Comptroller in his communication requested the Corporation Counsel to communicate to him the amount necessary in order that he might lay the matter before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

On January 31, 1905, in a communication to the Comptroller, I stated that an issue of Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$25,000 would enable me to obtain data and information so as to satisfy the Comptroller and myself as to the rights of the City, and if from investigation it should be ascertained that it would be profitable to prosecute actions, it would be necessary to formulate a general plan for the speedy institution and trial of actions, which in the course of a few years should result in confirming to the City rights which it may have in and to the lands under water.

In my communication I set forth some of the things it was necessary to do in the matter as follows:

1. The copying and transcription of maps of the several towns from the State Engineer's office at Albany.
2. The detailed examination of the town records of these several towns and possibly the translation of the earlier minutes of such towns.
3. The continuation of searches, in the Secretary of State's office at Albany, and in the various official records, from the earliest day down to the present time, against these several towns, with an abstract of the deeds made by them conveying portions of these lands.
4. An examination of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Land Office at Albany, and the preparation of an abstract of the descriptions of the parcels of land under water in these several towns purporting to have been conveyed by virtue of the alleged ownership of the State of New York and purporting to have been leased for exclusive fishing privileges.
5. An examination of the maps of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey and other public records for the purpose of determining the high-water mark at the various places on these several bays as it existed at the time of the alleged or pretended grants.
6. The making of surveys of the several properties against which ejectment suits are to be instituted.

On March 16, 1905, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution recommending that the Board of Aldermen request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$25,000 for such an investigation.

On March 25, 1905, such a resolution was transmitted to the Board of Aldermen, and at a stated meeting of the Board held on March 28, 1905, it was referred to the Committee on Finance, which reported in favor of its adoption on June 6, 1905.

Nothing further has been done with regard to the resolution.

I cannot too strongly urge that an appropriation for the purpose above mentioned be made to the Law Department to enable it to begin such an investigation.

I can only say that the Statute of Limitations is running against the City with

regard to its claims of title to the lands under water, and that without an extra appropriation for such work, the Law Department, with its present appropriation and force, can do nothing in the matter.

I infer from the fact that your Board approved the Bond issue that you appreciate the importance of this matter, and I ask that there be included in the Budget a special appropriation of \$25,000 to defray the necessary expenses of this investigation.

Fees of Expert Witnesses, and Other Disbursements in Proceedings to Review Taxation of Real and Personal Property.

I have attached to this letter for the information of your Board a schedule marked "C" showing how the appropriation for "Supplies and Contingencies" for the current year has been expended. It will be noted that the largest item in that schedule is the amount disbursed for fees of expert witnesses.

The amount which I have been obliged to spend for that purpose has been greatly increased by the payments to experts in tax certiorari proceedings. I also find that there is going to be a much greater increase in the immediate future in the amount which it is absolutely necessary for this office to spend, if we wish to sustain the assessments made by the Tax Department.

As this expenditure is neither "Supplies" nor "Contingencies" in any proper sense of the words, and as the appropriation for those purposes now appears to be so large, I have determined to ask your Board to make a special appropriation to pay the expenses of this very important litigation, and I desire to offer the following explanation:

Since the adoption of the Greater New York Charter hundreds of certiorari proceedings have been annually instituted, involving not merely the question of actual value of real estate but the question of relative value, or the average ratio of assessed to actual value.

About eight hundred of such proceedings are still pending, affecting valuations in all parts of the City, and before the end of the year the number will doubtless reach a thousand. The trial of these cases involves the employment of real estate experts, and if the City's interests are to be protected it is necessary to secure the best. The charges for expert testimony vary from fifty dollars to five thousand dollars for a single proceeding, according to the number of parcels, and the character and value of the property appraised. Even where compromises are effected without actual trial it is often necessary to secure the appraisals of competent experts before recommending a compromise. The necessity of maintaining, so far as possible, the valuations fixed by the assessors is obvious, for every reduction ordered by the court, not only affects the particular property under review, but may disturb the basis of valuation for an entire block or for several contiguous blocks, and thus affect the borrowing capacity of the City. As instances of the larger assessments under review for the year 1904, may be mentioned the properties of several sugar refining and allied corporations in the Borough of Brooklyn aggregating about \$10,000,000, and involving the valuation of waterfront, buildings, machinery and interior lots; property of the New York Dock Company aggregating about \$6,500,000, and other Brooklyn waterfront property; property of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company in the Borough of Manhattan aggregating about \$8,000,000, including entire blocks and many separate buildings; the plants of the New York Edison Company, the Metropolitan and Manhattan Railway Companies, Gas and Electric Companies, aggregating about \$20,000,000; large office buildings in the financial district; valuable hotels, apartment houses, stores and private residences in and near Broadway and Fifth Avenue. Not to mention the older proceedings still pending, the real estate assessments under review for the year 1904 alone aggregate more than \$170,000,000, and it is probable that similar proceedings will be instituted involving the assessments for 1905.

In addition to the assessments for taxation in the City of New York, it will be necessary during the coming year to litigate assessments for taxation imposed on the property of the City used for dams, reservoirs and aqueduct purposes in the several towns and counties in which they are located. This litigation will involve millions of dollars worth of property and will necessitate the preparation of maps and surveys and the services of many experts.

On account of the numerous proceedings in various localities, it may be said that a very large part of the City's taxable real estate is annually under review, either directly or indirectly.

In addition to the proceedings affecting assessments made by the local assessors, there are proceedings pending against the State Board of Tax Commissioners to review assessments upon our tax rolls of Special Franchises of corporations for the years 1900-1904. While the conduct of these proceedings is by law committed to the Attorney General of the State, any loss accruing from reduced valuations will fall entirely upon the City of New York. For the better protection of the City's interest I have agreed to co-operate in the defense of these proceedings, which involve assessments of about \$500,000,000. It is necessary to secure the services of high-class experts in order to prepare for proper cross-examination of witnesses for the relator corporations on technical subjects and to furnish testimony in support of the assessments.

Besides the charges of experts, large expenses are necessarily incurred for stenographers' minutes and exhibits. Until the present year the fees of referees and the cost of stenographers' minutes furnished for the use of the referee were not taxable against the City, even where the relator's prevailed; but by chapter 281 of the Laws of 1905, provision has been made which in many cases will involve additional expense to the City, unless the assessments for taxation are supported by competent and satisfactory evidence of experts.

The rapidly changing values of land and the construction of modern plants and buildings in this City has rendered the task of appraising real estate exceedingly difficult. It is no longer sufficient to estimate the land value and to approximate the cost per cubic foot of building, a method quite common in the days of simple and uniform construction. It is now necessary to consider with exactness the amount and cost of materials and the rates of labor, and to fortify estimates by testimony of witnesses having practical knowledge and experience. An expert who may be fairly familiar with the value of single lots or parcels of land may be wholly ignorant of the market prices of steel, iron, copper, brass, marble, hard wood, boilers, engines, electric plants and appliances, and the cost of constructing hotels, apartment houses office buildings, light, heat and power plants, overhead and underground trolley lines, and elevated railroad structures. The number of experts qualified to testify on technical matters, and available for employment by the City, is limited, because the best experts are often prevented from accepting a retainer by reason of business relations with the individuals or corporations who own the property under review.

In my opinion the sum of \$75,000 should be appropriated to provide for the expenses of the coming year in connection with our tax litigations. As the appropriation for "Supplies and Contingencies," which includes all of the necessary disbursements of the department, except for salaries and outside counsel, is only \$100,000, it would be manifestly insufficient to meet this unusual expense, and rather than ask for a large increase in that appropriation, I respectfully request that your Board make a special appropriation of \$75,000 for this particular purpose.

I am confident that the appropriation of any lesser amount would be mistaken economy. This office should be able to employ as competent experts as those retained by attorneys who are contesting assessments. The results of these proceedings depend almost entirely on the nature of the expert testimony, and the amounts involved are so enormous that it is to the best interests of the City to employ none but the most capable experts.

Method of Making Payments from Appropriations.

When I took office I found that there was little or no system in regard to incurring indebtedness against the appropriations. The assistants and heads of bureaus retained experts and incurred other expenses whenever they deemed it necessary, and as there was seldom any agreement made in advance as to the rate of compensation to be paid, there was never any way of knowing the amount of any outstanding claim until the bill was rendered, when it was too late to contest it.

Soon after taking office I issued a circular letter putting into effect an entirely new system. Whenever an assistant needs an expert witness, or supplies of any kind, or stenographer's minutes, or photographs or exhibits, or desires to incur any other expense, he is required to obtain an "authorization" therefor signed by myself or the Acting Corporation Counsel, and wherever it is possible to do so a rate of compensation is fixed in advance. This system has resulted in a great saving to the City, especially in the bills of expert witnesses, and the Department knows always approximately the amount of its outstanding obligations.

Conclusion.

To sum up my recommendations, I request appropriations for 1906 as follows:

I respectfully urge your Board to allow each of the foregoing items in the annual Budget for 1906 in order that the business of the Law Department may not be hindered by a lack of appropriation, or the Corporation Counsel put to the necessity of going before your Board to ask for a transfer to meet a deficit.

I will be very glad to appear before your Board at any time to give any further explanation you may desire.

SEALERS AND INSPECTORS OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

Bureau of Weights and Measures,
New York, September 19, 1905.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—By direction of the Comptroller of The City of New York I herewith submit the estimate of the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures for expenses for the year 1906.

This Bureau is doing excellent work in protecting the buying public from fraudulent storekeepers and merchants, as the reports from this Bureau to his Honor the Mayor will show, but the work and organization of the Bureau is seriously hampered through lack of clerical assistance. This lack is evident, inasmuch as the ordinance governing same requires that a register of the records of the Bureau shall be kept for public inspection. No provision having been made in the Budget or elsewhere for a sufficient clerical force, the work of the Bureau is seriously hampered, and the situation is only partly met at present by Inspectors assisting in such clerical work to the neglect of their inspection duties in their several districts. To properly keep the records of this Bureau, and to allow the Inspectors who are now assisting in the clerical work to devote their whole time to the work of inspection, there is urgent need for one Clerk at \$1,500 per annum. I desire to call your attention to the fact that no provision was made for Clerk hire in the organization of this Bureau, and I trust therefore that your Honorable Board will grant the above request.

The Contingent Fund is placed at \$500, which amount is necessary to cover the expenses of supplies, postage, car fare, carting of large weights, and for the purchasing of packages of tea, coffee, sugar, etc., which is absolutely necessary at times in order to secure evidence against fraudulent dealers. For some reason or another this fund was not provided for in the Budget of 1905.

In considering the appropriation of this office I beg to call your attention to the fact that there exists an offset to its expenditures in the way of penalties recovered by the Corporation Counsel in the prosecution of violations of the ordinances, which penalties amounted to \$2,886.50 during the last quarter. This, of course, represents only a portion of the total amount which would be received from this source, but the gross amount can only be calculated approximately.

The amount of the 1905 appropriation which will probably remain unexpended at the end of the year will be \$2,000, which balance was caused by failure to fill existing vacancies in the Bureau, and for which vacancies the Civil Service Commission is at the present time preparing an eligible list.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—The Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York
hereby reports that there will be required for the payment of the salaries of the
President, Professors, Instructors and Tutors of the college, for books, apparatus
and other necessary supplies, maintenance and general expenses of said college dur-
ing the year 1906, the sum of \$403,978.34, in accordance with the attached schedule.

Salaries.

No salaries have been increased except such by-law advances of \$100 each as
have been earned by Teachers below the grade of Professor by reason of one year's
added service and experience, the maximum salaries not exceeding the amounts here-
tofore and for many years paid.

The increase of 500 students (3,500 instead of 3,000 at the opening of last year)
and the increase in the number of admissions to be made next February, which has
been shown by the experience of the last two years to be at least 500 new students,
explain the added number of Teachers necessary and the addition of \$55,335 to the
Budget over and above the like appropriation of last year.

The per capita cost of teaching pupils is \$1 less than last year, and the same
as similar costs of instruction in the high schools. We cannot with any safety or
propriety reduce our salaries lower.

General Expenses.

We have commenced the occupancy of the new buildings, having placed upwards
of 1,000 students in the new Townsend-Harris Hall. We expect to move the entire
body of students during the coming year, abandoning the old buildings, which may
then be sold by the City.

The cost of maintaining the new buildings the first year can only be roughly esti-
mated, and it may be that during the year we shall have to apply to your Honorable
Body for some additional provision on this account. We have taken pains to get
the best estimates we can, and there will be required for fuel \$25,000, and for current
departmental supplies, incident to the increased facilities furnished and required by
the Departments of Chemistry, Physics and Natural History, \$9,000. Last year these
items were respectively \$2,500 and \$2,600 each.

There will be a reduction in the rent charges of \$13,333.66, and all other minor
expenses have been kept within the most economical limits.

The Trustees are impressed with the importance of administering the affairs of
the college on most economical lines, but the magnitude of the new buildings, the
increased size of the Departments of Chemistry and Physics and their demands for
the installation of apparatus and enlarged supplies, and the increased and increasing
number of students, make necessary our Budget submitted herewith.

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COMMISSIONER OF LICENSES.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—In accordance with the letter of the Comptroller under date of July 15, 1905, I herewith submit the Budget for the office of the Commissioner of Licenses for the year 1906.

This Department was created by special act of the Legislature, known as chapter 432 of the Laws of 1904. The license year from May 1, 1904, to May 1, 1905, was therefore in a sense an experimental one as far as this Department is concerned. The scope of the work in this office has reached a much larger state than was ever anticipated, and, pursuant to a favorable decision of the Appellate Division, the vaudeville agencies, who have heretofore never been licensed, are now making provisions to come within this act.

During the first year of business in this Department the office has investigated over 1,200 complaints, while in the first four months of the year beginning May 1, 1905, we

have investigated 555 complaints, showing that in one-third of this year, during a season in which a good many people are away on their vacations, and little work is to be expected, this office has investigated very nearly 50 per cent. of the number of complaints made in the year previous, thus showing that the effective work done by this office is beginning to be known by the public.

These facts must bring to you the necessity for an increase of the force of this Department, and the request for an appropriation for ten additional Inspectors is made in the light that these men are absolutely necessary for the proper conduct of the office.

I also make request for two Assisting Recording Clerks, as the clerical work of this office has increased very rapidly, and, in fact, is more than I anticipated at any time. The services of an Interpreter are necessary, as we have people of all languages calling here to make complaints.

In connection with the request for an increase of the appropriation for rents, contingencies, etc., would say that the net allowance for contingencies for the year 1905 was \$2,982, and that up to July 1, 1905, we find that we have spent \$2,000 of that, leaving us for the remaining six months of 1905 with the sum of \$982. This appropriation has been found to be totally inadequate. The office has found it necessary from time to time, to employ different people to obtain evidence against employment agencies, and to pay these people out of the contingent fund of this office, so that this fund has been depleted to a great extent long before one-half the year has gone by.

I also desire to call your attention to the fact that during the time from May 1, 1905, and August 31, 1905, there have been more licenses issued than during the whole year from May 1, 1904, to May 1, 1905.

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DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

Department of Correction of The City of New York,
Commissioner's Office, No. 148 East Twentieth Street,
New York, August 21, 1905.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—I beg to transmit herewith an estimate of expenses of the Department of Correction, boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, for the year 1906.

In this estimate the salaries of Keepers have been graded according to length of service in the Department, as follows:

Under one year's service.....	\$800 00
Under two years' and one year's service.....	900 00
Under three years' and over two years' service.....	1,000 00
Under four years' and over three years' service.....	1,100 00
Over four years' service.....	1,200 00

The considerations which have led me to make the request for these changes in the salaries of Keepers are: The greatly increased cost of living, rentals, food supplies, etc.; the long hours of service and the nature of the duties which Keepers are called upon to perform, and, lastly, the element of personal danger which their work necessarily involves. Added to this, and to my mind a most important point, the fact that higher salaries are paid to those occupying parallel or similar positions in other departments. A careful comparison of figures will prove the truth of this assertion, and the justice of my claim for increased compensation for these deserving men.

The salaries of Matrons have been placed at \$700 per annum, and those of Assistant Matrons at \$480 per annum. The salaries of Stationary Enginemen at City Prison and Pilots on Steamboats have been increased slightly to conform with the prevailing rate of wages.

In addition to the present number of employees, I have asked for one Inspector, one Driver and two Keepers.

The present pay-roll shows that there is a deficiency of \$10,119.50; this has been caused, principally, by the increase of pay to the Engineers and Stokers of the Department to the prevailing rate of wages. Later in the year I will ask your honorable Board to make provision for this, as per your letter of July 11, 1905.

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The salaries of a crew for the "Thomas F. Gilroy" for 1906 will require \$5,222. This is no increase, as the amount allowed for this purpose in 1905 (\$3,000) was for five months only.

For Supplies and Contingencies \$423,550 will be required, as accompanying statement shows. The increase over 1905 (\$53,550) is caused principally by the very large increase in the Census and by the establishment of the new reformatory on Hart's Island. The increase in the Census for this year amounts to 23.44 per cent. Provision must be made for the maintenance of these inmates, and, as the stock of groceries, dry goods, clothing, blankets, etc., will be completely exhausted before January 1, 1906, I trust that the amount asked for will be allowed in full.

For alterations, repairs and additions to buildings, apparatus and steamboats, the sum of \$25,000 will be required for 1906. The appropriation for 1905 has been already exhausted and about \$5,000 will be required for the current year. This, however, may be arranged for by transfer before the end of the year.

For transportation, maintenance, etc., of insane criminals and for donations to discharged prisoners the same amounts will be required for 1906 as were allowed for 1905.

For the improvement of Riker's Island \$25,000 will be required in order that some very necessary improvements may be carried out. The salaries of employees on this island are also paid from this appropriation.

For the reformatory for male misdemeanants on Hart's Island \$100,000 will be required for 1906. It is expected that this reformatory will be in full running order and the inmates employed by December 1, 1905. The amount allowed for the reformatory, \$25,000, was from the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, and this amount will be exhausted by the end of the year. I trust that the full amount asked for for this institution will be allowed.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

For regulating and grading the salaries of Keepers and Stationary Enginemen in this borough an increase of \$8,697.50 will be required. The present pay-roll, as compared with the amount allowed for 1905, shows a deficiency of \$1,870. This, however, will be arranged by transfer before the end of the year. The total increase in salaries in this borough for 1906 will be \$10,567.50.

For supplies and contingencies \$72,000 will be required, an increase of \$7,100 over amount allowed for 1905. This amount is necessary on account of increased Census, such increase being 13.22 per cent.

Repairs of buildings, apparatus, etc., for 1906 will require \$10,000, an increase of \$5,000 over the amount allowed for 1905. Donations to discharged prisoners and transportation, maintenance, etc., of insane criminals will require the same amounts for 1906 as were allowed for 1905.

Supplies for manufacturing purposes will require \$100,000 for 1906; this is an increase of \$30,000 over the amount allowed for 1905. As the money derived from the sale of manufactured goods largely exceeds the appropriation, I hope that the amount asked for will be allowed in full.

Owing to shortages in several appropriations for the current year (but which can be adjusted by transfers from other allowances), all available funds will be exhausted by the end of 1905.

This estimate has been made with care, and I trust that your honorable Board will pass it as presented.

Sir—In behalf of the Long Island Historical Society I beg to present the following estimate of expenditures for the year 1905 for the work of collecting, translating, etc., of documents relating to the history of Brooklyn, under Chapter 457, of the Laws of 1897, entitled "An Act to authorize the City of Brooklyn to provide for collecting and preserving materials for the history of Brooklyn." The work has continued under the appropriations made by The City of New York, the duty devolving by law upon The City of New York, for the years 1903, 1904 and 1905.

Under the act the Long Island Historical Society was duly designated to take charge of the work.

By that act the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) was authorized to be appropriated in gross, but not more than six thousand dollars (\$6,000) to be expended in any one year.

For the years 1904 and 1905 the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000), each year, was appropriated. Last year, 1904, important work had to be stopped because of the lack of appropriation and the balance on hand unexpended was less than one dollar (\$1).

The current year, 1905, because of the insufficiency of the appropriation, we shall be obliged to curtail the work for the last three months.

This work, under the supervision of the Long Island Historical Society, we have endeavored to perform with historic care and accuracy.

New and original sources of early history relating to Long Island and the Bay of New York, touched by Brooklyn, have been accurately and fully transcribed from original sources in Europe, sometimes photographic copies procured, and translations have been made of various languages. The work thus far has presented early historic materials which have never been produced in America. The importance of this to the historian and the public cannot be overestimated. The purchase of all these mate-

rials alone would exceed the meagre sums we are distributing as compensation for services to the gentlemen employed.

In addition to this work accurate copies and translations of many original documents in full have for the first time been made, and thus we have corrected very many of the inaccurate copies and meagre extracts and false translations which have passed as current history for some time.

We are bound to say that we are of the opinion that the work we are now conducting is not merely a more or less accurate transcription or collation of old documents by copyists at high salaries. The work of Arthur J. Weise, eminent as an investigator of American historic materials, in assisting this Society in this work, ought alone to be sufficient to insure the value of the work done under the guidance of the special committee of the Society in charge. This work we have prevailed upon Dr. Weise to render thus far at the meagre compensation of forty dollars (\$40) per week, this year.

We are obliged, respectfully, to ask that the appropriation for the year 1906 be six thousand dollars (\$6,000), so that we may be enabled by the use of the two assistants employed to make definite progress in the work.

The Historical Society receives no compensation for this work. The salaries paid are for Specialists, who have been decided to be such by the Civil Service Commission.

The salaries of the two Specialists for the year 1905, at \$40 a week each, would amount to..... \$4,160 00
Miscellaneous expenses for stationery, photographing, binding, cases, traveling and other sundries for the year amount to about..... 650 00

For the latter part of this year we shall be obliged to cut off an important part of our work because of the lack of appropriation.

The estimate for expenditures for the year 1906 is as follows:

Salaries, two Specialists, for the year..... \$5,000 00
Other expenses, photographing, binding, cases, special copies, stationery, stenography and traveling..... 1,000 00

Total..... \$6,000 00

With an appropriation of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) the Society will be able to make greater progress and accomplish better results, in our opinion, than could be obtained by a smaller appropriation per annum out of the total.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—In conformity with instructions emanating from the Finance Department, we beg to submit herewith our detailed Departmental Estimate of the amount needed for the uses of this Department for the year 1906, namely, \$200,000.

In a report of December 1, 1904, in which we presented to your Honor a summary of the work done by this office for 1904, we stated as follows:

"In order to reach the highest degree of efficiency and exactness, every department should be periodically examined and its methods criticised where criticism is necessary. Without this periodical examination costly errors are likely not only to occur, but to be carried forward indefinitely.

"As we are anxious to keep down the expense of this Department and of the Administration, we do not at present recommend that our force be increased to the number that will be necessary to make a complete audit of all the departments of the City at stated periods, but we call your Honor's attention to the fact that without such force there cannot be satisfactory audit of all departments, and we believe that it is merely a question of time before the City will realize that all its departments should be audited just as the departments of the other great corporations of the country are."

In the same report, after showing that our office has available only seven Chief Examiners and thirty Assistants, a total of thirty-seven, to examine the accounts and methods of all the City Departments, we further stated:

"It is manifest that such a force is inadequate to cover the entire field of City accounts, which involve the employment in all the departments of the City Government and County offices of a force numbering not far from fifty thousand. Other than the sixty odd court accounts, which we regularly examine, there are upwards of two hundred sets of accounts kept in the various departments, bureaus and other offices receiving pay from the City, and while it is well known among them all that an examination by the Commissioners of Accounts is liable to be made at any time, it is a fact that as to many of them no frequent or regular examination could be made with the force now subject to our supervision."

It is an undisputed fact that owing to the continuous growth of the City the work of all its Departments is each year greatly increased, involving larger expenditures and more accounting, which necessarily produces a corresponding increase in the amount of work to be done by both the Department of Finance and this office.

Evidence of such yearly increase as affecting the Department of Finance is shown in the yearly appropriations for that Department, the rate of increase in 1905 over 1898 being 32½ per cent.

The office of Commissioners of Accounts, on the contrary, has not been given its much needed increase, the yearly appropriations showing a decrease in 1905, as compared with 1898, of about 6 per cent.

The amounts of the yearly appropriations and percentage of increases or decreases for the two offices, for each year from 1898 to 1905, are presented in the following table:

Note—The appropriation for sweeping, carting and final disposition of material, including cremation and utilization, for the year 1904 was entirely insufficient for the needs of the Bureau of Street Cleaning, so that the amount allowed for the current year must be largely increased in order to accomplish satisfactory results, viz: To effect the removal of waste material from the residential sections of the Borough and the proper cleaning of the streets. Each succeeding year the Bureau of Street Cleaning is obliged to clean a large addition of newly paved streets and to haul the sweepings and the refuse material from an increasing population to much more distant points, so that the present force will have to be greatly increased in order to properly conduct the work in 1906. If this increase in force is not made, and it cannot be done unless the appropriation called for be allowed, there will be a large number of complaints that cannot be attended to, the health of the residents of the Borough jeopardized from partial removal of waste material and from streets. There are large sections of the Borough that are trebling in population, in view of which the estimate for sweeping, carting, etc., of \$247,890 cannot be regarded other than extremely conservative.

Note 2—The necessity for the amount asked for the removal of snow and ice, to wit: \$12,000, is but too apparent when the fact is recognized that the present street mileage of the Borough, together with those streets now being, and others soon to be, paved, will approximate seventy (70) linear miles.

Note—In asking for an increase in the Bureau of Buildings Departmental Estimate, your attention is called to the increase of building operations within the past three years, while no material additional increase has been made in the working staff of that Bureau; the building operations of this borough, within the past three years, have increased one hundred per cent. In addition to this, next year, will have to take in hand the examination of over five hundred (500) hotels, provided by chapter 697 of the Laws of 1905.

The operations year after year have increased at the rate of fifty per cent., and this proportionate increase will be exceeded this year, as we have now for the first eight (8) months exceeded by over fifty per cent. the building operations of last year. With the present number of Inspectors it will be a physical impossibility to supervise the building operations of the borough for the coming year.

Gentlemen—I submit the following estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the business of the office of the City Record for the year 1906.

In accordance with instructions contained in the circular letter of the Comptroller, dated July 15, 1905, I submit below full explanation, stating in detail the reasons for any increase or decrease in the amounts as compared with the appropriations made in the Budget for 1905. Annexed hereto are (1) a statement as to salaries, (2) a comparative statement of appropriations, both made out in accordance with the forms accompanying the circular.

The estimate of appropriations for printing, stationery and blank books is based on the understanding that the application of the Board of City Record to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of September 21, 1905, for the additional sum of \$250,000 will be favorably considered. The necessity for this additional sum to meet the liabilities of 1905 is caused, first, by the reduction made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the amounts asked for 1905; and secondly, by legislation establishing the new Board of Water Supply and affecting the Register's Office, the Tenement House Department and Bureaus of Buildings. If this additional sum is not granted the appropriation must of necessity be added to the Budget for Arrearages.

The increase in the appropriation for printing, stationery and blank books for City Departments, \$275,000, is due to the natural growth and improvements in the departments, notably the Health and Tenement House Departments; in the Fire Department to the change from volunteer to paid service in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond; to the establishment of four new Municipal Courts and the Board of Water Supply.

The increase in the appropriation for salaries, \$150, is to provide for merited promotion.

In view of the large number of patients sent by the Department of Public Charities during the past year, by inference that an equally large number may be sent to be cared for during the coming year, the Board of Managers respectfully ask that the appropriation in the Budget for 1906 be not less than sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000), and that it be determined by the work performed.

The increase in the number of City cases treated is the reason for the increase in the estimated amount necessary for the year 1906.

The hospital earned and has been paid for City cases for the first six months of the year 1905, \$3,584.62, exclusive of ambulance service. The bill for City cases for the month of July, 1905, approved for payment by the City is \$707.06. This makes the total earnings of the hospital for the first seven months of the year 1905, \$4,291.68, exclusive of monthly ambulance service.

The average monthly earnings of the hospital for City cases for the first seven months of 1905 is \$613.09, exclusive of ambulance service. Using the average monthly earnings of the first seven months of the present year as a basis of calculation, the earnings for the remaining five months of the year will amount to \$3,065.45, making the total earnings for the year 1905, \$7,357.13.

The reason for the increase in the estimate for ambulances is that since June 1, 1905, the hospital has had in service two fully equipped ambulances, whereas prior to June 1, 1905, it had in service only one ambulance, and no separate appropriation was made for ambulance, the ambulance service being paid out of the general appropriation for this hospital service.

It is estimated that there will be a deficiency in the appropriation for 1905, on account of the earnings of the hospital for City cases of \$1,357.13, and for the ambulance service \$950, making a total deficiency of \$2,307.13.

The amount of expenditures for the year 1906 for the above institution is, of course, entirely dependent upon the number of patients that may come to our care. In order to give your Honorable Board an outline of our work, we beg to state that during the last year we nursed 58 free patients on 6,068 hospital days. The aggregated hospital days, including pay patients, were 8,984 days. Our dispensary gave free treatment to about 3,000 poor. Our expenditures for last year (1904) were as follows:

The expenditures would have been much greater if the members of our Association did not donate provisions, clothing, bedding, etc. Our receipts are made up of voluntary contributions of various Lutheran congregations, which alone, however, would not enable us to carry on the work, as almost two-thirds of our patients are poor and unable to pay for their treatment and care. They would be obliged to appeal to the City for help if we would not provide for them.

The appropriation for the year 1905 is \$2,062.28, on the basis of sixty cents a day for medical and eighty cents a day for surgical patients, as per section 230 of the Greater New York Charter.

We respectfully request your Honorable Board to set aside for the use of our hospital for the ensuing year a sum sufficient to enable us to carry out our good work and thereby to lighten the burden of The City of New York.

Sir—Application is hereby made by this Society, pursuant to chapters 25 and 26 of the Laws of 1894 and section 230 (paragraph 9, subdivisions 2 and 24) of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, for an appropriation of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the year 1906.

The amount specified is ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in excess of the appropriation for the present year, and the reasons why this increase is asked for are as follows:

First—The following table shows the extent and increase of the Society's work for the ten years ending with the year 1905, the comparisons being made at the end of each five-year period, viz.:

Second—The work of this Society is of a peculiar character. It makes a complete and thorough investigation into the details of all cases of children under the age of sixteen years who may be brought before either Magistrates' Courts or the Court of Special Sessions, Children's Part. The great amount of labor and expense entailed by this work can readily be understood when it is known that during the past year the Society has had an average of twelve hundred (1,200) cases per month.

Third—The Society cares for all children under the age of sixteen years who are arrested or taken charge of by the police, or by its own officers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, providing them with proper food, clothing, and, when necessary, medical attention, pending their disposition by the Courts. During the past year the average number of children so cared for each month has been about one thousand (1,000). The cost of clothing alone, which has to be provided at Society's expense, is over five hundred dollars (\$500).

The laws of the State of New York prohibit the confinement of children under the age of sixteen years, in any prison, or other place of confinement, with adults, even their temporary detention in station-house being forbidden. Thus, should not the Society care for such children, it would be necessary for the City to provide some place of detention for them, the expense of which, it can readily be seen, would be far in excess of the total amount appropriated annually to the Society.

One phase of this matter that should never be lost sight of is that the Society does not take from the City's funds the money required for the board and care of these children. This comes out of the Society's private donations, voluntary contributions, membership fees, etc. Each year since the Society has been receiving this appropriation from the City, it has collected from other sources, as indicated above, an amount in excess of that received from the City. The City's appropriation has been used to defray the expenses of the children to and from the different Courts, and in the payment of incidental expenses connected with the investigation of cases that have been referred to it by the Justices and City Magistrates. During the past year there were transported by the Society, in its own wagon, to and from the Courts, some twelve thousand five hundred odd children, the Society being put to the expense of maintaining a wagon, team and driver for that purpose only.

The Society also, acting under orders of the Courts, collects from parents of children who have been committed to institutions, weekly or monthly payments to apply toward the care of such children, transmitting the sums so collected to the Comptroller for the credit of the City. Last year the sum so collected was twenty-one thousand eight hundred and thirty dollars and fifteen cents (\$21,830.15). This current year such payments have thus far amounted to \$17,243.75; at the same ratio the total collections for the year will be \$25,865.62. Where parents fail to obey the order of the Court to pay toward the support of their children, the Society then institutes an investigation into the cause of the delinquency, and, acting under order of the Courts, aids in the prosecution of such cases. No such sum as above stated would have been collected from parents on account of partial payment for the care of children committed as public charges were it not for the efforts of the Society, as one instance in the past proves, when the City, several years ago, took charge of these collections itself, and after a period of three months, during which it collected only three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50), deeming its efforts a failure, requested the Society to again take charge of the matter.

Fourth—The establishment of the Court of Special Sessions, Children's Part, or, as it is called, "The Children's Court," has entailed upon the Society a considerable amount of additional labor. In that Court, during the year 1904, some 7,631 children were arraigned. In the case of each one of these children the Society had to make an investigation and a report.

The Society has assumed, at the request of the Court, the duty of reporting on all parole cases, thus saving to the City the expense of Probation, or Parole, Officers, in the cases of children. The number of children placed on parole during the year 1904, and upon whose cases the Society was required to make investigation and report, was 1,098.

The Society maintains, for duty at the Children's Court alone, two officers, and a matron in charge of the girls' room, all at its own expense. The cost of their services is paid out of the appropriation from the City.

Fifth—The Society, in addition to collecting for the City and turning over to its representative, during the last year, the sum of \$21,830.15, to apply toward the maintenance of children committed, also paid to the City taxes on its (Society's) real estate to the amount of \$2,270.13 (refusing to take advantage of the law relieving it from such taxation), making a total of \$24,100.28 returned to the City by the Society out of its last appropriation of \$40,000.

In view of the above the Society respectfully asks that its annual appropriation be increased to the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), which is the amount it was originally contemplated (in the first bill introduced in the Legislature in 1894 and approved by the Board of Directors) the Society should receive from the City.

Eleven years increase of population and the changes in the Magistrates' and other Courts, have more than doubled the Society's work.

If the amount now asked for is allowed for the coming year it will be sufficient to meet the City's proper proportionate share of the Society's expenses, and it is believed that the Society, through its voluntary donations, subscriptions and membership fees, will be able to realize a sum sufficient to defray the remainder of its expenses.

By section 1, chapter 428 of the Laws of 1867 the sum of one hundred and ten dollars (\$110) per capita of the average number of persons annually maintained in said institution, was authorized to be raised in the same manner and applied in the same way as is required by section 647 of the Laws of 1866.

Considering the provisions of said act and number of children in the institution there will be required for the year 1906 the sum of two hundred and sixty-four thousand dollars (\$264,000).

This requisition is based on an estimate of two thousand four hundred children as the average number to be maintained during the year 1906.

This estimate and requisition is made to cover the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, the Borough of Brooklyn, Borough of Queens, and the Borough of Richmond.

It is further estimated that there will be about twenty-five hundred children attending school in the institution during the year 1906, who will be entitled to receive a per capita of thirty-five cents (35) per week each, under the resolution passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 19, 1903.

This will amount to thirty-eight thousand dollars (\$38,000) for the ten months of the school year.

We shall also require during the year 1906, for placing out and supervising children, the sum of eight thousand two hundred and ninety-two dollars (\$8,292).

The total amount of the requisition for the New York Catholic Protectory for the year 1906 is, therefore, three hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$310,000).

During the year ending June 30, 1905, the Long Island College Hospital has rendered, free of charge to the patients, medical and surgical aid and treatment to the poor of Kings County who applied to it therefor and were approved by the Commissioner of Charities of Kings County.

From the present indications this amount will not be sufficient to cover the charge for emergency cases that will be accepted by the Department of Charities.

The Sloane Maternity Hospital has 120 beds absolutely free, and over two-thirds of them are occupied most of the year. During the year 1904 there were received in the hospital 1,511 patients, of which 636 were accepted as public charges by the Department of Charities.

For the year 1904 the entire cost of maintenance was \$49,842.90, of which we received from the City \$13,105.18, the balance having been contributed by friends of the Institution.

The City only approves and allows for emergency cases at the rate of \$18 per case. The hospital is conducted on the most economical basis, is doing effective work in relieving the City's poor, and believes its request for an allowance of \$15,000 a reasonable one.

The amount specified is \$7,000 in excess of that appropriated for the present year, and is needed because of the constantly growing work of the Society and necessary increase in its expenditures.

It is fair to say this increase will continue and at the close of the present year, as compared with 1904, a large increase in all branches of the Society will be shown. As bearing upon the merits of this application, your attention is respectfully called to the following further considerations:

The Society at its own expense cares for all children under the age of sixteen temporarily, arrested by the police and by its own officers, and destitute children while their cases are under investigation by the Department of Charities in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, furnishing them with proper food, clothing and medical attendance, while in our custody.

Section 291 of the Penal Code provides that no child under the age of sixteen shall be detained in any place in the company of adults charged with a crime. This prohibits their detention in police station houses and institutions will not receive them temporarily.

The number of children cared for during the year was 2,601, which was an increase of 54 per cent. in children received in the Society's Shelter over the previous year, and no part of the money appropriated to the Society by the City was used for this purpose. The expenses incurred for the care of children was paid entirely from subscriptions and donations.

The great increase in population in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens the past year is largely responsible for the increase in the number of children sheltered by the Society, and to such an extent has this increase grown that the Society finds it necessary to erect a building to provide additional accommodations. Plans are under way for the erection of a five story modern, fire-proof building, 25 by 140, and the adding of an extra story to the present building, which will triple the facilities and provide dormitory space for 125 children.

The City's appropriation is used to defray the expenses of transportation of children to and from the various courts, expenses incidental to the investigation of their cases by the Society's officers, and during the year about 2,000 cases were investigated and the facts reported to the courts, which report the magistrates depend largely upon in making a final disposition.

It is also used to defray expenses made necessary by that part of the Society's work which is devoted to the collection of money from parents and others for children committed to institutions.

During the year 1904, \$4,047.25 was collected, and the first six months of the present year, \$2,810.25.

If it were not for the work carried on by this Society, it is safe to assume that only a fractional part of the money collected and paid over to the City would have reached the City Treasury.

Since the establishment of the Children's Court in 1903, it has required the daily attendance of one of the Society's representatives and the increased number of cases now coming before that Court, demands the assistance of a woman attendant and the Society hopes soon to be in a position to fill this want.

The Society details officers for duty at the different courts in both boroughs. The Borough of Brooklyn is divided into eight magistrate's courts and Queens with three. The Court of Special Sessions in both Brooklyn and Queens also require the attendance of our agents.

To properly cover the large territory within the Society's jurisdiction, it is imperative that the City increase the appropriation as the work is purely a public one and departmental in character.

The Society feels that this application for an increase has merit and is worthy of consideration by your honorable Board.

For the care and maintenance of dependent children accepted by the Department of Public Charities as proper charges against the City Treasury: For infants under two years of age at the rate of 38 per day; for dependent children from two to sixteen years of age at the rate of \$2 per week; for disbursements in placing out children with families at the rate of \$20 for each child placed out, \$12,000.

For Seaside Home (Sanitarium) of the Brooklyn Children's Aid Society, payable in twelve monthly installments, \$5,000.

Committed Children.

The larger part of the children placed in our care are boarded with private families instead of being kept in an institution. This method is strongly commended by many persons experienced in caring for dependent children and has amply justified itself during several years of trial.

Children are willingly received for short commitments and parents and relatives are encouraged to take children home as soon as possible. When the children's own homes cannot be re-established, we endeavor to find free homes or adoptive homes for them, if parents will consent, thus relieving the City of the burden of support and giving children a better chance in life.

Seaside Home.

This "Home" is in every intent a seaside hospital existing solely as a means of combatting diseases incident to the summer months among the children of the poor. Children are sent only after a thorough medical examination which determines their need. There is provided constant medical attendance, trained nursing, and careful personal oversight day and night. The medical staff consists, besides the examining physician, of an advisory and visiting board of five eminent specialists in children's diseases, a resident physician, and a corps of trained nurses. Mothers accompany and help care for the children. Sometimes only one of the family has an acute attack, but, usually, all the members are in need of constitutional or other treatment. Every endeavor is made to impress upon each mother the lesson which will help her to care for her children more efficiently after they leave the "Home."

This is the only Brooklyn seaside hospital or home and it is believed to be the oldest in the country. No rejections are made on account of religion or nationality. Illness and need are the only tests. It cares for about five hundred inmates at a time. The Seaside Home carries on a work for the Borough of Brooklyn similar to that of the Hebrew Sanitarium and St. John's Guild for Manhattan. Both of these societies receive aid from the City Treasury to a much larger extent proportionately than the amount asked for by this Society. An appropriation of the amount we formerly received, \$5,000, is absolutely necessary to plan for the proper conduct of our work; and, as you have already received evidence, this Society can be relied on to draw no more than is positively required.

That the Mount Sinai Hospital is a corporation duly organized under the Laws of the State of New York, and maintains in The City of New York the Mount Sinai Hospital, and that by chap. 719 of the Laws of 1897, entitled "An act to amend chapter 410 of the Laws of 1892," entitled, "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare local laws affecting public interests in The City of New York," and the acts amendatory thereof in relation to the Mount Sinai Hospital, and chapter 196 of the Laws of 1899, the said Mount Sinai Hospital is entitled to receive an allotment for part of cost of board, nursing, medical and surgical treatment and attendance, 60 cents per day for each medical case and 80 cents per day for each surgical case for each needy and charity patient who occupies a bed in the Mount Sinai Hospital and who receives such care and maintenance.

That for the year ending December 31, 1904, the said Mount Sinai Hospital has given 64,942 days of free hospital treatment and that the number of days of free hospital treatment as herein stated, is made up from the accounts which are kept in the said Mount Sinai Hospital.

At the present time with most of our wards open, the average number of free hospital days is 7,780 a month or 93,360 days a year.

Within a short time we shall have every available space in our Institution open for the benefit of patients, so that during the year 1906 we will give at least 100,000 days of free hospital treatment, and the estimated expense to our Institution during the year 1906 will be at least \$300,000.

We therefore respectfully request from your honorable Board an appropriation in keeping with this increased demand upon our resources, to wit: for the year ending December 31, 1906, a sum not less than \$70,000—which is based on the estimated 100,000 days of free hospital treatment, at the averaged rate of 70 cents per day.

DOMINICAN CONVENT OF OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY.

Sir—Complying with the request contained in your circular letter of July, we beg to state:

I.—This institution does not receive any fixed appropriation from the City government.

II.—It does receive from the City remuneration at the rate of two dollars per week for each child over two years of age legally committed to it, and thirty-eight cents per day for every infant under that age, while the same remains within its charge. (See section 230, Charter of Greater New York, amended by chap. 196 of the Laws of 1899.)

III.—For the year 1904 it received from the City for the care of children so committed to it \$67,434.54, but for the coming year we feel that sum would be inadequate. One bill for July, at present in the Department of Finance, amounted to \$6,415.71, and that did not include the Borough of Richmond. Taking that for a basis it would be about \$73,000 for the entire year, Richmond included.

IV.—As children are constantly being committed and discharged, it would be impossible to say what amount should be paid the institution for the year of 1906, but a safe conjecture would be that it should not be less than \$73,000.

V.—According to a resolution finally adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, charitable institutions for children now carried on in the Budget, and who give in their own buildings secular education to children resident therein shall be paid at the rate of thirty-five cents per week for each child over four years receiving such instruction, to be given ten months in the year. On a rough estimate \$900 per month would be needed here for that purpose, which would be \$9,000 for the ten months; that would make a total of \$82,000 for our institution.

The Northern Dispensary was incorporated in 1828, being the second oldest institution of its kind in New York City, and since then has furnished free medical assistance to the needy sick poor residing in that portion of the city bounded on the north by West Twenty-third street, on the east by Broadway, on the south by Spring street and on the west by the North river.

During the year ending December 31, 1904, 13,577 patients were treated, 31,361 visits were made and 20,781 prescriptions dispensed, showing an increase in patients over year 1903.

The disbursements in the year 1904 were \$7,316.39, of which \$732.42 was received from The City of New York, the remainder being the proceeds of voluntary contributions by friends of the institution.

The only salaries paid are to physicians and employees of the Dispensary, the officers and majority of physicians serving gratuitously.

The Northern Dispensary was erected by private subscription on land donated by the City for the purpose at the intersection of Christopher street and Waverley place.

The enlarged operations and constantly increasing demands upon the institution require additional aid.

The appropriation asked for is needed to assist in increasing our ability to do good; to assist in securing modern hospital furniture and supplies, with which our power to secure better results and relieve the distress of the sick poor would be greatly augmented.

Sir—In response to the circular letter of July 31, 1905, from the Department of Finance, through Hon. D. C. Potter, Examiner of the Accounts of Institutions, asking for data upon which to base estimates for appropriations to be made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to partially compensate hospitals for the care of sick and injured who would be entitled to care by the public institutions, we beg to say that under our peculiar circumstances we cannot do better than simply repeat, in substance, our letter of last year and submit our last annual report, which not only shows what we did for 1904 but contains a consolidated statement on page 55, setting forth what has been done in years past. In this connection your attention is respectfully called to pages 8, 9 and 10, where reference is made to the cost of treating patients and to the partial aid received from the City Treasury, and also to pages 18 and 19, on which details of such cost will be found.

It is our aim to practice the most rigid economy and the managers are more strict and watchful over the slender income of the hospital than over their personal affairs, and yet it is impossible to reduce the cost per day, per patient, if proper service is rendered to the sick and injured.

We trust that you will see your way to urge the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to increase the allowance to at least one-half (½) our actual outlay per day for patients, approved by the Department of Charities, as proper charges against the City—the cost per diem per patient for 1904 having been \$2.30.

We wish our treasury permitted us to carry on our work as an emergency hospital without public aid, but that is impossible.

During 1904 we received from the City Comptroller as follows:

For care of patients.....	\$8,680 58
For ambulance service.....	1,350 00

Total..... \$10,030 58

Being an emergency hospital our work varies constantly.

Although the average number of ambulance calls for 1904 is between seven and eight per day, the number varies from none to twenty or thirty on different days. This means that our service on the maximum days is taxed to the uttermost and our horses are frequently unfit for duty, and, owing to the present arrangement of the Department of Charities, we are required to make nearly all of our transfers to Lincoln Hospital instead of, as formerly, to the Harlem Hospital. As this change imposes a greater distance and a worse road to travel, we have been compelled to add an additional ambulance, horse and driver to our ambulance service.

For the current year so far our service has been the largest in the history of the hospital and our expenses have been correspondingly increased.

As we have stated on previous occasions, no matter what sum is formally appropriated, it remains in the City Treasury unless paid out on vouchers duly approved by the Department of Charities under the rules established by the City authorities.

We think, therefore, that the sum to be appropriated for 1906 should be at least \$12,000, including the appropriation for ambulance service, seeing that any unexpended portion of the appropriation for the care of patients still remains safe in your hands.

We cannot refrain from again warmly urging that some arrangement be made by which the Police Department shall fully and freely co-operate with the hospitals performing an ambulance service.

The police patrol wagons with slight alterations could be transformed into suitable ambulances, so that with their efficient horses, drivers and general equipment a great addition could be made to the emergency service of hospitals.

It is not complimentary to the charitable work, either public or private, that so much equipment should be controlled by the Police Department for use in transporting able-bodied criminals and the assets of pool rooms and gambling establishments, while the sick and injured are left to the care of hospitals alone, and, in addition, alcoholic and insane cases likewise are left to these overworked hospitals for transfer to the public institutions alone fitted to care for such patients.

We shall be pleased to make any further explanations you or the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may desire.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SUPERINTENDENTS, DATED SEPTEMBER 7, 1905, RELATING TO THE FINANCIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR 1906 FOR SALARIES OF TEACHERS AND THE SUPPORT AND MAINTENANCE OF THE JAMAICA STATE NORMAL SCHOOL.

New York, September 7, 1905.

To the Board of Superintendents:

Chapter 524 of the Laws of 1905 provides for the transfer of the Jamaica State Normal School to The City of New York and to the care of the Board of Education, to be used as a Training School for Teachers and a public school.

There are now about 250 elementary school children attending in the building under an agreement between the State Commissioner of Education and the Board of Education of this City, by which these classes form an annex to Public School 47, in the vicinity. About 450 children residing in and about Jamaica will be assigned to classes in this building in September. These classes will form the nucleus of a model school.

In order that provision may be made for the salaries of principals, teachers and employees, and for the maintenance of the school during the year 1906, certain items providing for such salaries, etc., should be added to the annual estimate.

Some changes in the organization will undoubtedly occur upon the City's taking charge of the school. It is probable that certain changes in assignment or in position will be made. At the present time, however, it is necessary to base the estimates upon the salaries to which the present incumbents would be entitled by reason of position and length of service, according to the provisions of the chapter.

The following resolutions are, therefore, offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Education be and it hereby is respectfully requested to include in the Departmental Estimate for the year 1906 the following items of moneys required to pay the salaries in the Jamaica Normal School, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 524 of the Laws of 1905:

The foregoing figures show that we will require 81,720 tons of coal and 1,240 cords of wood for schools at present in operation and new schools to be opened. The quantity required for the new schools alone represents 8,160 tons of coal and 166 cords of wood. Notwithstanding all this we are asking for \$1,523.67 less than the amount allowed for the year 1905. The prices at which the coal and wood are figured are those of current contract, and are very low. From the best information obtainable we are not likely to get as good prices in the future. There is every probability of a strike taking place on the 1st of next April. I therefore deem it advisable to recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that they add to the above amount ten (10) per cent, to meet this contingency. If, however, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment deems it unwise to add the suggested ten (10) per cent, because of conditions that may exist next April, it must be with the distinct understanding that the number of tons of coal and cords of wood are minimum quantities based on the burning capacity that the schools can get along with, and if the prices are higher than those upon which the estimates are based the Board of Estimate and Apportionment must be prepared to meet this contingency.

It is believed that the introduction of this modern means of transit will tend to greater efficiency of the work of the Building Superintendent's Department, as well as economy on the score of time.

Dear Sir—Herewith is inclosed the proposed estimate for the appropriation for 1906 for the Supreme and County Courts, Queens County.

In explanation I desire to say that while there is an apparent increase in the Salary Fund, there is no actual increase. Although prior to last year's appropriation there had been established several positions and increases, making the additional amount necessary, in excess of the former appropriation of \$5,650, and although the Corporation Counsel advised that these new positions and increases had been regularly and lawfully established under various acts of the Legislature, and the payment of the amounts were mandatory, no provision was made for them by the Board of Estimate, but for two years last past transfers from the Court Fund have been necessary. It is suggested by the present proposed estimates to simply make the transfer in advance, and establish a fund sufficient to pay these known salaries, rather than incur the necessity and trouble of a transfer later.

As to the Contingent Fund, there are additional expenses which will have to be met during the coming year, and \$400 additional is asked for that purpose.

Thus while more is asked for the Salary and Contingent Funds, the total amount of the proposed estimate for next year is the same as for the present year.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith the estimate for the expenses of this Department exclusive of the City Chamberlain's office, for the year 1906. In the schedules are given the individual salaries paid to the various employees according to the pay-roll of July 1, 1905. I do not at present propose any change in such individual salaries, both because I leave this office on the first of January next, and because, in any event, I deem that such changes can be more intelligently dealt with from time to time during the year 1906 as occasion may arise.

The expenditures of this Department, exclusive of the City Chamberlain's office, for the six years 1900 to 1905, inclusive, have been as follows:

During the first three of the above years these expenditures were met in part by the issue of Special Revenue Bonds and in part by Budget appropriations. During the last three years they have been wholly from Budget appropriations, except for some inconsiderable transfers and except that in the current year there was authorized an additional appropriation of \$25,000 for the purpose of enabling the Department to investigate the price for lighting the City, and also to build up a Bureau of Franchises. Deducting this \$25,000, which, in the main, has been spent for these purposes, from the estimated expenditure for the year 1905, will make the same \$965,730, which is less than the expenditure of the Department in the year 1900. The actual increase of expenditure for 1905* over 1903 and 1904, excluding the new Bureau of Franchises, is comparatively trifling.

The Bureau of Franchises, while originally established solely for the purpose of collating and systematizing all information concerning outstanding franchises, has practically been devoted almost entirely to work in aid of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in performing its duty as to the various requests for franchises which have been made, and is doing comparatively little work pertaining particularly to the Department of Finance. I believe there should be appropriated for said Bureau for the ensuing year the sum of \$25,000, and for the Department generally an increase of three per cent. over the sum appropriated for 1905, exclusive of the \$25,000 for the Bureau of Franchises. This increase is less than the percentage of increase in taxable resources for the City at large, and is a very moderate sum to enable the Department to perform its duties, which increase as the City increases, and which will from time to time require the employment of additional persons and promotions according to merit.

In comparison with the above figures of the expense of this Department, I desire to call your attention to the fact that the Budget of the City has increased from \$90,778,972.48 in the year 1900, to the sum of \$110,525,259.04 for the year 1905; and that the amount of the City's bond issues and expenditures for improvements has increased at a much larger ratio. These sums indicate, in the rough, the increase in the work of this Department. Other items show the comparison in the work of the Department

quite as vividly. In 1898 the number of vouchers and pay-rolls filed was 71,321; in 1905 it was 120,966. In 1900 the number of contracts registered in the Department was 1,446; in 1905 it will exceed 3,000. On July 1, 1900, the number of employees in the Department was 517; on July 1, 1905, it was 624—an increase in numbers which is substantially greater than the increase in expense.

In the course of the year I have had to materially increase the force and the expense of the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears because of the tax sales. I cannot better show the benefit which this has been than by the accompanying report of Collector Slattery, which shows collections for the year ending June 30, 1905, from 150 per cent. to 250 per cent. greater than the amounts received during any previous year since consolidation.

The change in the form of the City bonds, by which the purchasers are given the option of coupon or registered, mutually interchangeable, together with the increased amount which has been issued, has required additional clerical help in the Bureau having charge of that work.

It will be noted that in giving the expenditures of the Department I have dealt with actual expenditures, with the exception of the year 1905, and not Budget appropriations. This is because it has been found in recent years that the item for supplies and contingencies has uniformly been deficient and has had to be replenished by transfers. I have therefore dealt with actual expenditures.

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DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES (SUPPLEMENTARY).

October 9, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the last administration in its allowance to this Department for the year 1904 reduced the departmental estimate of supplies \$135,650.41. This, of course, greatly crippled the Department, but by deferring action upon everything which would admit of delay without detriment to the service and by the exercise of the strictest economy the deficiency for the year was kept below \$25,000, which your Honorable Board subsequently voted for the relief of the Department. Now another year has passed away and the conditions are financially much worse. The effect of the past two winters, very unusual as they were for length and severity, has been to largely increase the cares and responsibilities of the Department. For instance: The departmental estimate of supplies for 1905 was based upon an approximated census of 9,755 when, in fact, the average daily census for the first six months of 1905 was 10,127 or 372 persons more than the number approximated. On that basis and for that purpose the Department should receive \$38,313.46 more than it asked. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment had of course no reason to contemplate or anticipate the conditions which so largely increased the burdens of the Department and did, in fact, reduce the original amount asked for supplies \$121,318.69.

Increase in the census causes corresponding increase in other directions for supplies, salaries, equipments, etc.

No provision has been made for the Board of New York City Patients at the New York State Hospital for Incipient Tuberculosis at Raybrook, N. Y., established last year by authority of the Legislature, and the sum of \$12,000 is needed for that purpose.

The fund for Donations to Grand Army Veterans was only \$18,000, while the actual expenditures amounted to \$23,164.64 for the year 1904, hence about \$6,000 is needed to make good the deficit.

Supplementary contracts for flour, provisions, vegetables, coffee and other supplies were opened August 4 and 21, but in the absence of funds applicable thereto cannot be certified.

Your Honorable Body is therefore most urgently requested to appropriate the sum of \$120,000 and have the same added to the appropriations to this Department for the year 1905 as follows:
