BRIDGES OVER THE EAST RIVER.	
No. 1—Brooklyn Bridge.	
The addition of an extra car to the bridge local trains has increased the train capacity 9,000 passengers an hour during rush hours. Five-car bridge local trains are now being successfully operated for the first time in the history of the Brooklyn Bridge.	
Additional stairways erected in the Brooklyn station by the railroad company have enabled the company to separate and distribute the passenger traffic in the terminal, and thereby considerably reduced the crowding on the platforms.	
During the quarter the through train service on the bridge railway has exceeded that of previous summers. The transient or holiday travel during the months of July and August was almost 25 per cent. greater than during the corresponding period in 1905. This growth was made possible by the continuous operation of five-car elevated railway trains from nine separate lines running across the bridge on short headways, averaging fifty trains per hour for many hours during holidays, Saturdays and Sundays.	
The trolley car service has increased. There are now being operated across the bridge 300 trolley cars during each of the rush hours, against 280 last year.

No. 2—Williamsburg Bridge.

Construction.

The construction of the added trolley slips at the Manhattan end of the bridge was completed during the quarter, with the exception of the back wall of the new platform. The track platform has been replanked and the roadway planking is being renewed. The added trolley slips provide eleven stations or platforms in place of five for the loading and unloading of passengers using the Brooklyn trolley cars. They have made possible an increase in the number of cars operated during rush hours from 140 an hour last year to 184 an hour, which is the number now being operated during rush hours.

Maintenance.

The bridge lighting plant has been in successful and satisfactory operation during the quarter, it having been unnecessary to draw current from any outside source for light, power or heat on the bridge.

Considerable repainting of the structure has been done during the quarter.

For the accommodation of pedestrians on the bridge additional settees have been placed along the footwalks, making now a total of 200 available. Two drinking fountains have also been placed on the footwalks.

The roadways and footwalks of the bridge have been open continuously throughout the quarter, except closing the footwalk from 5.40 to 6.30 p. m. on July 4, 1906, on account of a bad fire in a building adjacent to the bridge at Cannon street, Manhattan.

Railway service on the bridge has suffered no serious interference. The service of the New York City Railway Company has been continuous, except for some short delays, due mostly to derailments on the Brooklyn plaza. The railway company has been requested to run additional downtown and crosstown lines over the bridge.

The opening of the additional trolley slips at the Manhattan end of the bridge has improved the Brooklyn Heights and the Coney Island Railroad Company's service, and the advantages thus far resulting from the increased loading space is shown as follows:

There are now being operated nine car stands, compared with five before the new slips were opened. Of these there were originally two double stands, and since the opening of the additional slips there have been five double stands.

No. 3—Manhattan Bridge.

In the preparation of plans the general plan of the approaches is about completed, ready for submission to the Art Commission.

On the construction of the Brooklyn anchorage work of laying the various classes of masonry has progressed. Similar work has been progressing on the Manhattan anchorage. Both the anchorages are in readiness for the steel required to be placed in them.

The contractors for the steel superstructure of the Manhattan Bridge have subcontracted the manufacture of the steel work to the Phoenix Bridge Company of Phoenixville, Pa., and the first delivery of material under this contract will be made by October 15, the date prescribed in the contract.

No. 4—Blackwell's Island Bridge.

On the contract for the steel superstructure, work has progressed more satisfactorily. The manufacture and fabrication of the steel required is being pushed so that there will be no lack of material ready at the bridge site. Steady and continuous erection of the structure is in progress.

The construction of the masonry anchor piers is nearly completed.

The cutting of stone for the attics is progressing, but this stone cannot be laid until after the steel cantilevers are partly erected.

The Art Commission, on September 18, 1906, approved the design for the Queens approach.

Bridges Over the Harlem River and in the Borough of Manhattan.

The bridges under maintenance in this division have been operated without accident or delay to the traveling public during the quarter. Considerable necessary repairs and painting have been done.

The construction of a temporary bridge for the Madison avenue traffic during the building of a bridge to replace the present Madison Avenue Bridge was begun in July, and this construction is now approaching completion.

The construction of the University Heights Bridge has progressed and there is prospect of its completion within contract time.

At the Ship Canal Bridge the new draw span and two approach spans built by the Rapid Transit Construction Company, under the plans of the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission, have proved satisfactory in operation. The subcontractor for this construction is at present doing work in the way of completing the adjustments and the equipment.

Bridges in the Borough of The Bronx.

The bridges under maintenance in this division have been operated without accident or serious delay to the traveling public during the quarter.

Necessary repairs and painting have been done.

A contract has been entered into between The City of New York and the Godwin Construction Company for completing the piers and abutments and building the arches, draw spans and approaches of the new Pelham Bridge, and that construction is now under way.

Bridges Over Newtown Creek and in the Borough of Queens.

The bridges under maintenance in this division have been operated without accident or serious delay to the traveling public during the quarter.

Necessary repairs and painting have been done.

The new bridge over Flushing creek is about completed and will be ready for traffic in October.

The construction of the new Borden Avenue Bridge has continued. The temporary bridge for use at this point during construction of the permanent bridge is being built by the contractor for the new bridge.

Bridges in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Richmond.

The bridges under maintenance in this division have been operated without accident or serious delay to the traveling public during the quarter.

Necessary repairs and painting have been done.

Under date of October 27, 1906, Chief Croker reported as follows:

"In my opinion fireproof shutters are actually necessary on windows of this building."

On motion, report received and approved; appeal denied.

Appeal 42 withdrawn by appellant and new papers filed. See Appeal 44.
Appeal 43 of 1906, New Building No. 1, of 1906, premises east end of Barren Island, Brooklyn, Albert E. Connors, appellant.

"No. 1. The floor area of one-room structure exceeds the number of square feet which according to law admits of a wooden planking on roof."

The building is wholly of brick, concrete and steel, except said roof, which is specified 1½ inches by 8 inches tongued and grooved spruce. It replaces a building which previous to the fire in May, 1906, was wholly of wood. The location is on the company's property, many hundred feet from the buildings on any adjoining property.

The nearest company's building is approaching 100 feet away and this structure is wholly fireproof; i. e., concrete and steel, and between which and structure in question is a 12-inch brick wall extending above roof three feet.

May we remove the two 12-inch transverse fire walls indicated on plans that divide structure up into three sections 100 feet by 100 feet and leave the inclosed space of entire building open in one room 100 feet by 300 feet?

That the material stored here is piled between long aisles through which cars travel, entering one end of building and passing out the other end. Walls would prove a great interference.

Mr. A. E. Connor appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over for one week.

Appeal 44 of 1906, Alteration 2232 of 1906, premises north side One Hundred and Second street, about 100 feet from northwest corner First avenue, Manhattan, Chas. Baxter & Sons, architects and appellants.

"Amendment to application No. 2232, Alterations, 1906, is disapproved, with the following objection, viz.:

"Objections No. 1 and No. 6 are repeated.

"1. Building with proposed addition exceeds area allowed for non-fireproof buildings. (Section 32 of the Code.)"

"6. Walls are of unlawful thickness. (Section 32 of the Code.)"

However, this question, as well as the previous, we respectfully submit to the superior judgment of your Honorable Board.

That we are of opinion the extension applied for will add to the safety and utility of the whole structure. That it is desired to do the work before the severity of the weather will prevent.

That the tenants require the extension. That as the present frame shed has to be removed it would be unjust to prevent us replacing the same with a substantial brick structure.

Mr. Chas. Baxter appeared before the Board.

On motion, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report with recommendation.

In the matter of the application of the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, and said Nassau Electric Railroad Company, for the construction of an electric railroad on portions of Atlantic avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The petition of the undersigned respectfully shows:

First—By chapter 256 of the Laws of 1832, the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was organized and empowered to construct a railroad, "with such appendages as may be deemed necessary for the convenient use of the same," between Brooklyn and Jamaica.

In addition to the general powers given by law, the corporation was authorized to prescribe the manner in which the railroad should be used, and by what force the carriages to be used thereon may be propelled.

Second—that thereafter it constructed a steam surface railroad upon a right of way which it acquired by purchase or condemnation proceedings, portions of which line were included within the limits of what is now Atlantic avenue.

Third—By chapter 178 of the Laws of 1834 the Long Island Railroad Company was organized and empowered to construct a railroad from Greenport to a point on the waters adjacent to Brooklyn, "with such appendages as may be deemed necessary for the convenient use of the same," with power to prescribe the manner in which its road shall be used, and by what force the carriages to be used thereon may be propelled.

Fourth—By chapter 94 of the Laws of 1836 the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was authorized to lease its railroad from Brooklyn to Jamaica to the Long Island Railroad Company, and it was provided that the use of the said Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad, under such lease, should be taken as a performance of the obligations on the part of the Long Island Railroad Company to construct its road from Greenport to Brooklyn.

Fifth—This lease was made of all the corporate rights and franchises of the said Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company, and has been extended from time to time, and now has seventy (70) years to run. The Long Island Railroad Company under it and under its own charter has been for many years operating a double-track steam railroad over the right of way formerly of the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company, situated in the centre of what is now Atlantic avenue, from the junction of Atlantic and Flatbush avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn to Jamaica and points eastward thereof.

Sixth—The Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was foreclosed and its property conveyed to the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn, and said Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn was, on or about January 26, 1899, merged with the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, and the Nassau Electric Railroad Company is now possessed of all its property and franchises.

Seventh—By chapter 499 of the Laws of 1897, for the improvement of Atlantic avenue and for the removal of the steam railroad of the Long Island Railroad Company from the surface, it was provided that the railroad of the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn, "now leased and operated by the Long Island Railroad Company," between Flatbush avenue and Atkins avenue, should be changed by said companies "by depressing the same from Flatbush avenue to near the easterly side of Bedford avenue, so as to leave the surface free from the steam railroad tracks, fences and gates of the steam railroad of the Long Island Railroad Company then existing thereon." From this point the right of way of the railroad should be operated in an open cut, to a point between Bedford and Nostrand avenues.

From there running east the tracks should be raised and run on an elevated structure to the easterly side of Ralph avenue. From Ralph avenue the tracks were to descend to the grade of Atlantic avenue, at a point between Ralph and Howard avenues. From there they were to be operated in an open cut to the west side of Cooper place. From there they were to be placed below the surface of the street to a point near the east side of Stone avenue. From there the right of way should be through an open cut to a point near the westerly side of Jardine place, where it should coincide with the grade of Atlantic avenue. From there eastward it should be operated on a surface grade to near the easterly side of Snediker avenue. At this point the tracks were to be elevated, passing over Williams avenue at a height of eight feet, and over Alabama avenue at a height of twelve feet, and from the easterly side of Alabama avenue the tracks should be operated over an elevated structure to a point near Linwood avenue. From there they should descend to the grade of Atlantic avenue, near Atkins avenue, and from that point eastward should be operated on the existing grade.

Eighth—Said act also provided that when completed the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn, was authorized and directed to run its trains "over such improvement and the road of such railroad as constructed and authorized by law," and no cars of other companies, without permission of the said the Long Island Railroad Company, shall be run thereon or thereunder.

Ninth—By chapter 497 of the Laws of 1899 it is provided that whenever any right of way, grade or tracks of any steam railroad in any street, in any city of the first class, are required by law to be changed or altered by elevating or depressing the same for the purpose of discontinuing the use of steam power upon the surface of said highway or street, such alteration or change of grade shall not be deemed to curtail or affect any right which such company, or its lessees or assigns, may have to maintain and operate a surface passenger railroad within the limits of the right of way so depressed or elevated, and over or under the railroad tracks so depressed or elevated, with all turnouts, sidings or tracks necessary to secure the continuous connection of portions of such surface railroad. In the event that any such turnouts, sidings or

tracks shall extend beyond the lines of the right of way of such railroad corporation whose tracks have been so depressed or elevated in or upon any of the streets or highways aforesaid, such turnouts, sidings or tracks so extending beyond the lines of such right of way shall only be constructed upon condition that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded, and the consent also of the local authorities having the control of that portion of such street or highway upon which it is proposed to construct such turnout, siding or tracks, shall be first obtained. No such railroad shall be operated by steam locomotives, and shall not be used except for passenger traffic.

Tenth—That the change of grade provided in and by the aforesaid acts for the improvement of Atlantic avenue has been duly made, such portions of the aforesaid track required by said act to be depressed below the surface of the street have been so depressed, and such portions as were required to be elevated have been elevated, that the connections between the same have been constructed, and the trains of the Long Island Railroad Company are now being operated thereon by electricity.

Eleventh—That the tracks for an electrical railroad have been laid upon the aforesaid right of way of the said railroad, over or under the said improvement, with the exception of the following portions thereof, viz:

1. From the westerly side of Bedford avenue to a point midway between Nostrand avenue and New York avenue.

2. From a point opposite Columbus place to a point near Louis place.

3. From a point opposite Olive place to a point nearly opposite Alabama avenue, with the exception of the portion of the south side of Atlantic avenue, between Snediker and Georgia avenues, occupied by the tracks of the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company, over which the Long Island Railroad Company has the right to operate.

At these points, where either the cuts are located (being the portions of said right of way by which the trains from the depressed subway reach the surface), or the inclined portion of the elevated structure extends from the grade of the avenue to a place where there is sufficient headroom for the cars to pass thereunder. At these points the existence of these obstacles make it impossible to operate a continuous railroad upon the surface of said right of way.

Twelfth—That in order to secure a continuous connection and operation of said surface railroad, it is necessary that a turnout or siding, consisting of a single track on each side of said right of way, should be constructed in the various portions of Atlantic avenue lying between the points aforesaid, and also that the same should be connected with the tracks of the street surface railroads intersecting the same. That such sidings and connections have been duly located, and that the portions of the streets proposed to be occupied thereby are, and the general line of the improvement is designated on the blue print hereto annexed, marked "A," Drawing No. R-4. Maps showing each one of such sidings in detail are also hereto annexed, marked "B," "C," "D," "E," and "F" show the location of the poles carrying the electric wires.

Thirteenth—That your petitioners are advised and believe that under the statutes aforesaid, and under the provisions of law relative to the subject, your petitioners are authorized to construct said turnouts and sidings and to operate an electric railroad over the same in connection with the line constructed upon the surface of the aforesaid right of way as aforesaid, upon obtaining the consent of the local authorities of The City of New York, and the consent of the majority of the owners of the property abutting on said sidings, or, in lieu of the latter, the consent of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.
