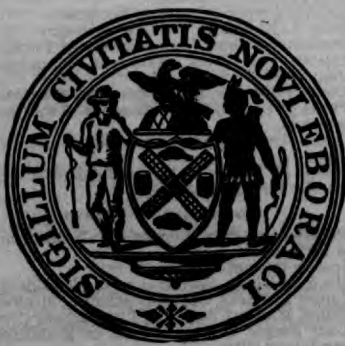

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION, No. 299 BROADWAY, NEW YORK, September 13, 1906.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN OF the proposed amendment of the Rules and Classification of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of the City of New York, as follows:

1. By striking from Rule XIV. (Transfers) clauses 1 and 2, and substituting therefor the following:

"1. A person who has been permanently appointed to a position in the Competitive Class may be transferred without examination to a similar position in such class, or to a position of the same grade thereof, if it be in a graded service, in any other department, office or institution; provided that for original entrance to the position proposed to be filled by transfer there is not required by these rules, in the judgment of the Commission, an examination involving tests or qualifications essentially different from or higher than those required in an examination for original entrance to the position from which transfer is sought; or provided that if such person entered the service without competitive examination he shall have served with fidelity for at least three years in the position held by him, or in a similar position."

2.
