CONTRACT NO. 2—CLAIMS FOR DAMAGES—OPINION OF COUNSEL.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Counsel to the Commission:

October 15, 1908.

Public Service Commission for the First District:

SIR—I have the Secretary's letter of October 1st transmitting a copy of a communication from the Corporation Counsel dated September 20th enclosing a list of claims growing out of rapid transit railroad construction in the Borough of Brooklyn. On receipt of the above I asked the Chief Engineer for any information in his possession relating to this matter and I now have from him his letter of October 12th transmitting a copy of a report dated October 9th from Division Engineer Noble, copies of which I transmit herewith.

The list of claims transmitted with the Corporation Counsel's communication contains the information requested in the Secretary's letter to him of May 15th and in my letter to him of September 17th, but as the Corporation Counsel's reply of September 21st contained no such information, the modifying agreement with the Interborough was made upon the basis of the only figures available, to wit—those furnished by the Chief Engineer. The present communication of the Corporation Counsel was received after the amendatory agreement had been executed on behalf of the Commission and I understand after the sum of \$850,000 had been turned over to the contractor. I concur with the Chief Engineer in his view that a large portion of the claims referred to by the Corporation Counsel involve damages other than those to buildings. The Chief Engineer reiterates his opinion that \$150,000 will cover all such damages and even though that amount should be largely increased, I think sufficient security has been retained, since by the amendatory agreement there was retained \$150,000 in cash, and the continuing bond of one million dollars and equipment of the road were made liable for any claims that might have been made against the million dollar construction deposit if that had not been partly returned. There is also, I understand, a substantial amount due the contractor for work done, which, if necessary, might be retained. I think on that matter, in view of what has gone before, the opinion of the Corporation Counsel might properly be asked and would advise that a letter be sent him substantially in the form enclosed.

The Chairman was thereupon authorized to communicate with the Corporation Counsel as follows:

October 15, 1908.

Hon. FRANCIS K. PENDLETON, Corporation Counsel:

SIR—The Commission is in receipt of your communication of September 20th transmitting a list of claims growing out of work of rapid transit railroad construction in the Borough of Brooklyn amounting to \$2,057,000 and in answer thereto I desire to advise you that after the receipt of your letter of September 21st, and upon information from the Comptroller that all such claims pending in his office had been secured either by bonds furnished by the contractor or by the retention of moneys due the contractor for work already done, the agreement for the return of \$850,000 out of the million dollar cash deposit as security for construction was executed, and I understand that the amount of \$850,000 was paid over by the Comptroller to the contractor before your letter of September 20th was received. As your letter of September 21st contained no statement of claims, as requested in the Secretary's letter to you of May 15th and in the Counsel's letter of September 17th, but assumed that the Comptroller's statement was sufficient, the Commission, upon the advice of its Chief Engineer as to the amount necessary to repair damages, retained the sum of \$150,000.

By the terms of the modifying agreement the continuing bond for one million dollars and the equipment of the road was also made liable for the same matters as the million dollar deposit as security for construction, so that even if the amount of damages to buildings reported by the Chief Engineer should be increased very largely, there would still appear to be ample security. There is in addition a substantial sum now due for work already done by the contractor, and possibly this amount or a portion of it might if necessary be withheld as further security.

I transmit herewith for your information a copy of a communication from the Chief Engineer of the Commission and report of the Division Engineer therein referred to, and if upon a further consideration of these claims you deem it wise that in addition to the other security current payments should be withheld to cover any of these claims, the Commission will be pleased if you will so inform it.

DEAR SIR—In the matter of the determination of Henry B. Seaman, Chief Engineer of the Public Service Commission for the First District, dated October 7, 1908, on the claims presented for payment under the contract dated June 27, 1907, between the City of New York acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for the City of New York and the Bradley Contracting Company.

Please take notice that an appeal is hereby taken by the undersigned from the determination in writing of the Chief Engineer of the Public Service Commission for the First District, one copy having been delivered to the Bradley Contracting Company on the 7th day of October, 1908. The grounds of appeal are as follows:

Generally the said determination fails to award to the contractor the reasonable value of additional work done and materials furnished in the performance of certain work referred to and designated as Items Nos. 1, 2, 4, 6 and 7 in the letter of Henry B. Seaman, Chief Engineer, dated October 7, 1908, addressed to us under head of disapproved bills, and these items were not reasonably considered or contemplated at the time the aforesaid contract was prepared and submitted to the City.

The precise award or redress desired is \$31,797.24, which is our bill to September 1st, 1908, for the items Nos. 1, 2, 4, 6 and 7 above mentioned.

Mr. A. C. Gildersleeve of New York is appointed an arbitrator on the appeal of the undersigned appellant.

## Carpenters' Work.

At Fourth District Prison—New door hung in yard; material used, 2 5-inch strap hinges and 1½ dozen 1-inch screws.

At Fifth District Prison—Glazing windows in male and female prison; 10 panes of glass, 16 inches by 18 inches, 2 pounds of putty and 2 dozen glaziers' points.

At Seventh District Prison—Glazing windows in male and female prison; 22 panes of glass, 15 inches by 16 inches, 3 pounds of putty and 3 dozen glaziers' points.

## Plumbers and Steamfitters.

At Second District Prison (by paid labor)—Overhauling water closet, repaired soil line, soldered down floor flange of water closet and reset same and flush pipe; repaired waste of basin and pointed up basin and slab, furnished new plugs and chains to eight wash basins in ten-day house; material used, 9 rubber basin stoppers, 1 nickel-plated patent basin plug, with nickel-plated piece and coupling for basin plug and trap, solder, putty and plaster; time to make repairs, 1½ days, Plumber and Helper. Installing 86 new wire spring corks; the same were fastened to wall with chains, links and bolted through wall; material used, 3 barrels Portland cement, 3 barrels of building sand and 300 common bricks. Testing of one boiler by Boiler Inspection, New York Police Department, registered as boiler 2341, certificate No. 7271.

At Third District Prison—Overhauling a "Bramhall Deane" kitchen range and furnishing the following material: 4 bricks, No. 139, 140, 143 and 89, 1 No. 742 grate, 1 grate trigger, 1 keg of mortar, 1 No. 96 panel, 10 common bricks; time to make repairs, 1 day's labor, man and Helper. Overhauling and putting in good serviceable condition 2 No. 5 Star furnaces, together with furnishing new stove pipe, etc.

At Fourth District Prison—Put on in sink in prison kitchen one ¾-inch faucet; repaired roof over coal house; three rolls tar roofing paper, 1 pound tin buttons and 2 pounds wire nails.

At Fifth District Prison—Installing of a new Ericsson pumping engine No. 20,228, with 1½-inch pump, including gas furnace, set up and connected to present pipes in exchange for old 8-foot Ericsson. Work done by staff; furnished and put on four new wheels to flushometer water closet; material used, four 1½-inch iron valve wheels for 1½-inch globe valve.

At Seventh District Prison (by paid labor)—Repaired Croton burst in laundry and furnished the necessary pipes thereto, repaired washtub faucets in sink in kitchen, also faucets and shower valves in female prison; material used, 5½ feet of 1-inch galvanized pipe, one 1-inch flange union, three sets of compression washers, eight sets of Fuller cock repairs, one valve spindle repaired; time to make repairs, one and one-half days, plumber and helper. Located leak in gaspipe, situated in wall on third floor, furnished all necessary labor and material; repaired wall where damaged and leaving everything in good condition; material used, 3½ feet of ¾-inch gaspipe, three 1-inch galvanized elbows, one 1-inch right and left elbows, one ¼-inch by 3-inch right and left nipple, one ½-inch by 3-inch nipple, one ¾-inch by 4-inch nipple, 10 pounds plaster;

time to make repairs, two and one-half days, gasfitter and helper. Repaired and put in good serviceable condition twenty-three locks on cell doors, furnished eight new springs and five machine screws; time to make repairs, two days, man and helper.

## Painting and Kalsomining.

At Second District Prison—Painting and retouching all the necessary parts of male and female prisons, also corridors; material used, 20 pounds Indian red, 20 pounds prussian blue, 20 pounds yellow ochre, 30 pounds green, 10 pounds drop black, 20 gallons raw oil, 15 gallons turpentine, 300 pounds white lead, 3 pound paint brushes and 3 sash brushes.

At Third District Prison—Painting and retouching all the prison furniture, beds, windows and prison kitchen; material used, 3 gallons white enamel, 3 gallons turpentine, 1 gallon liquid dryer, 10 pounds burnt umber, 5 gallons asphaltum varnish, 50 pounds of white lead, 1 flat wall brush and 2 sash brushes.

At Fourth District Prison—Renovating and painting the interior and exterior of prison, whitewashing airshafts and ceilings of cells; material used, 300 pounds of white lead, 15 gallons turpentine, 15 gallons raw oil, 1 gallon of liquid dryer, 15 gallons white enamel, 10 pounds of chrome green, 10 pounds Indian red, 15 pounds venetian red, 1 pound prussian blue, 2 flat wall brushes, 2 sash brushes, 3 whitewash brushes, 10 pounds kalsomine glue, 5 pounds ultramarine blue, 1 barrel finishing lime.

The prisons were cleaned of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

## By Prisoners Employed at Outdoor Labor.

Three (3) barges of ashes from the penitentiary have been unloaded, 500 cubic yards of earth removed from bank and used to back up sea wall in course of construction, and in doing this work, have made one-eighth of an acre of ground; 18 yards of sea wall was made, the measurements of same being 14 feet at base, 3 feet at top and 12 feet high; men also employed at weeding and raking the lawn and gathering crops, unloaded 317 tons of coal.

## Tinmith.

Repaired 50 pots, 80 pans in kitchen, and 25 pails, making new handles and stopping leaks on same; made 15 pans and 12 cans for kitchen; repaired roof of dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3, also roof of chapel; made and set up 4 leaders.

## Farm.

Men were employed during the quarter weeding, raking and caring for farms. The following vegetables were received from farm: 500 bushels tomatoes, 50 barrels potatoes, 5,000 head cabbage, 100 bushels lima beans, 150 bushels string beans, 50 bushels green peas, 4,500 ears of corn, 300 cucumbers, 75 barrels turnips, 25 barrels spinach, 50 barrels onions, 200 quarts strawberries, 300 bunches chubarr, 300 bunches asparagus. The following vegetables were sent to General Storekeeper: 42 crates tomatoes, 1,050 ears of corn and 60 barrels of turnips.

Hon. JOHN V. COGGEY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I most respectfully submit the report of the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter commencing July 1, 1908, and ending September 30, 1908.

The alterations and improvements covering and including the new plumbing, such as toilet and wash basins in each of the 420 cells of the male prison, the 48 shower baths for use of prisoners, the electric lighting of all the cells and prison corridors, the installing of new wire mattress cots in all the cells, and also the new kitchen, laundry and dormitory; work on all of the above is now under way and progressing satisfactorily.

The female prison has received the attention of the Workhouse mechanics, such as Painters, Carpenters and Plumbers, and is kept in as good repair as conditions in that aged building will permit.

The female prisoners housed therein are engaged in cleaning and scrubbing in and about this building, and also the offices of the Administration Building, and washing and ironing in laundry of prison.

The Carpenters have been engaged in the daily repairs and necessary alterations in and about the buildings, the making of 275 cell benches for use of prisoners in male prison and repairing furniture.

Painting accomplished during the past quarter has consisted chiefly of the storm sheds and outside building in yard, the priming and painting of 275 cell benches and painting of Head Keeper's quarters.

The foregoing work has all been accomplished by unpaid prison labor. Appended herewith please find a statement showing the number of prisoners at commencement of quarter, number received, discharged and disposed of, the amount of fines received from Special Sessions and ten City Magistrates' Courts, which have been paid to the City Chamberlain, as section 1530 of the Greater New York Charter requires.

And in the event that the said railway company shall not, prior to the 2d day of August, 1915, construct its main line south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street and to the Harlem River, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in office, may fix and finally determine such additional compensation as shall be imposed upon said railway company because of such failure."

Second—The Westchester Company hereby agrees to assume all liability to any person or company by reason of the execution of this contract by the City, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever, either to persons or companies, on account of the same, and the Westchester Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City may be compelled to pay by reason of this contract.

Sec. 3. The Westchester Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish to the City all of its rights and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon or across the streets on the portions of the route described in the said ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by the ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, and which are not covered by the description of the new and amended route as herein described, and which are not shown on the map of the amended route dated June 17, 1908, entitled "Survey map and profile of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company for New York County, New York, Section 1, Section 2 and Section 3," which map was filed in the office of the County Clerk of New York County on June 17, 1908.

Sec. 4. The Westchester Company promises, covenants and agrees, on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.
