Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, April 1, 1913.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Farley, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Drummond and O’Keeffe.

The minutes of the meeting of March 18 were approved.

Bills amounting to \$89,691.53 were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O’Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of March was as follows: Bellevue Hospital, 1,217; Gouverneur Hospital, 179; Harlem Hospital, 184, and Fordham Hospital, 174.

The lists of the equipment required for pavilions I, K, L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital are practically completed. Upon investigation it is found that at the time pavilions A and B were equipped, instead of asking for the transfer of a definite amount for this purpose, a request was made to the Board of Aldermen to change the wording of the original appropriation by inserting the words “construction and equipment” of the new Bellevue Hospital. It would seem desirable that a similar request be made at the present time for these pavilions.

The service at the School for Midwives has increased to such an extent that it is necessary to have an additional Nurse. The Nurses at this school are paid from the regular nursing appropriation, and authority is requested to make this additional assignment.

Some time ago the Board authorized that mattresses be provided for Bellevue and the allied hospitals as the funds would permit. It is estimated that the cost of this equipment would be about \$20,000. Further instructions are requested as to whether to take this amount from the appropriation for maintenance or to ask for revenue bonds for this purpose.

Action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows: It was resolved to request the amendment of the resolutions appropriating corporate stock for the erection of pavilions I and K and pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital by inserting the words “and equipment” after the words “for the erection.” The request for the assignment of an additional Nurse for the School for Midwives was approved, authorizing the General Medical Superintendent to install mattresses in the new buildings as they are constructed, as far as the current funds will permit, and to make provision for such sums as may be required in the Budget for 1914.

Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee reported on the request of Joseph Di Benedetto for an extension of time to complete the construction of the roof ward at Fordham Hospital, and presented a communication from R. F. Almirall recommending that an extension of fifty days be granted. Action on this request was deferred, pending the receipt of a communication from the architect giving the basis upon which he recommends an extension of time.

The Building Committee reported on the request of J. M. Knopp for an additional extension of time to complete the contract for the erection of additional balconies on pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital, and in accordance with the recommendation and that of the architect it was resolved to deny this request.

The Gouverneur Hospital Conference Committee reported that they had approved the appointment of Dr. William W. Carter as Laryngologist to Gouverneur Hospital, with the privilege of membership in the Medical Board. This report was approved.

The Fordham Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Henry C. Hart and Dr. Alfred E. Wood as Assistant Physicians to Out-Patients and Dr. Francis E. Butler as Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients (orthopedic service). This report was approved and appointments made accordingly.

Dr. Brannan and Mr. Paulding reported on the conference with the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board to formulate rules for operating on a larger number of tonsil and adenoid cases, and stated that, in the opinion of the Executive Committee, the Surgeons appointed at Bellevue could take care of all the operations required in these cases among themselves. It was resolved to ask the Executive Committee what men are to be assigned to this work, together with their qualifications for the same.

Communications.

A communication was presented from McKim, Mead & White in regard to the request of J. T. Brady & Co. for estimates on flooring of plastic linoleum, tile and oak for pavilions L and M, and recommending that estimates be taken directly from concerns supplying such flooring. This communication was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication was presented from McKim, Mead & White recommending the acceptance of an estimate amounting to \$71.50 for an additional door between the waiting room and storage room on the roof house of pavilions I and K. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, the acceptance of this bid was approved.

A communication was presented from McKim, Mead & White recommending the acceptance of a proposal to make certain changes in the plumbing work of pa-

vilions I and K, as set forth in a letter from A. L. Webster, Consulting Engineer. The Building Committee reported that they had investigated this matter and recommended that the changes be made. It was resolved to approve the acceptance of the proposition.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital held on March 25 were presented. The request for the appointment of a non-salaried microscopist to the dispensary, the recommendation to establish an evening syphilitic clinic, and the adoption of special blanks for admission were referred to the General Medical Superintendent for report; the nominations of Internes for twenty months’ service were approved; consideration was given to the recommendation that the rule requiring the attendance of a Visiting Physician or Assistant when an anæsthetic is given be rescinded as far as obstetrical cases and cases of abortion requiring curettage are concerned—the anæsthetic to be administered by a member of the house staff who has qualified as an anæsthetist—and action thereon was deferred, pending the receipt of a report from the General Medical Superintendent and the opinion of the obstetricians of the department.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Managers of the Training School held on February 28 were presented. The report that several wards of Harlem Hospital are in need of paint was considered. The General Medical Superintendent was directed to have the wards painted as far as possible by the employees of the department.

A communication was presented from the Department of Finance requesting the transfer of unencumbered balances in corporate stock accounts which are no longer of any use to this department. A communication from the Contract Clerk and Auditor was also presented, setting forth the accounts which have served their purpose and are no longer required. The transfer of these funds was approved.

A communication was presented from the Real Estate Bureau of the Department of Finance suggesting that the Trustees send to the Board of Aldermen a description of the property, by metes and bounds, situated at the corner of Front st. and Gouverneur slip, which is to be used as a site for the new dispensary, etc., for Gouverneur Hospital, it being within the jurisdiction of the Trustees to select the site for this building, subject to the approval of the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It was resolved to send a description of this property to the Board of Aldermen for their approval, as suggested by the Department of Finance.

A communication was presented from the Department of Finance submitting a report of a plan for the central purchase and distribution of supplies for The City of New York, and requesting criticisms thereon. As this was considered worthy of further study, the Secretary was directed to secure a sufficient number of these reports to enable each Trustee to have a copy for his consideration and study.

A communication was presented from Dr. Herbert L. Wheeler recommending the appointment of Dr. Meyer C. Ellenstein as Assistant Visiting Dentist to Bellevue Hospital. This recommendation was approved and Dr. Ellenstein appointed accordingly.

Two communications were presented from the Department of Finance transmitting executed copies of renewals of the leases for the premises at 115 and 117 W. 136th st. for one year from May 1, 1913. These were ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Department of Public Charities stating that their Chief Engineer has given instructions to Pilots and Engineers on boats of that department to be as careful as possible with the blowing off of steam, in order to obviate all future complaints. It was resolved to place this communication on file and to send a copy of it to the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Managers of the Training School held on March 14 were presented. No action was taken on the request for an additional Attendant on the boat “Southfield,” this having been approved at the meeting of the Trustees on March 18 and an Attendant designated by the General Medical Superintendent for this service. The report of the lack of attendance in the erysipelas ward was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

Communications dated March 22 and 25 were presented from the Finance Department requesting an increase of five per cent, in the certification of all contracts for supplies which contain provision that the City shall have the right to increase or decrease the quantity of supplies by not more than five per cent.

A communication was presented from the Contract Clerk and Auditor dated March 27 setting forth the reasons why compliance with this request would seriously inconvenience the department.

After consideration it was moved to inform the Finance Department of the impracticability of complying with their request and to transmit a copy of the letter from the Contract Clerk.

A communication dated March 31 was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission stating that it has no choice in the matter and must disapprove the reinstatement of Louis C. Frees as General Inspector of Construction, and setting forth the reasons therefor. This communication was referred to the Building Committee for report.

The Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital presented nominations for the place of Orthopedic Surgeon to Out-Patients, nominating in the order of preference Drs. Whitbeck, Cilly and Bretz. Dr. Brainerd H. Whitbeck was appointed.

A communication dated April 1 was received from the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board requesting a joint meeting of the Conference Committees and the Trustees for the purpose of presenting a plan to render more efficient assistance in the conduct of the medical and surgical service of the hospital. It was resolved to meet the Conference Committees of the Medical Board on Tuesday, April 8, at 4 p. m., in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital.

Unfinished Business.

Consideration was given to the recommendation that the tile floors at Gouverneur Hospital be repaired, action upon which was deferred at last meeting, and for which a request for revenue bonds was in contemplation. It was resolved to direct the General Medical Superintendent to have temporary repairs made to the floors from the current maintenance funds, and to include in the next departmental estimate provision for the repair of the flooring in all the hospitals of the department where it may be necessary.

New Business.

The President referred to the diet of patients, particularly those placed upon a special diet, who, by reason of their need of building up, should have a wider range of food, and suggested that it would be desirable to have them receive parts of both diets. The General Medical Superintendent was directed to secure reports from all the hospitals and confer with the Visiting Physicians as to the advisability of adopting such a plan.

Reference was made to the manner of serving the meals of the patients, and it was suggested that individual vegetable dishes be provided. This was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

Authority was granted to readvertise for estimates for the construction of the new ward wing extension to Harlem Hospital, and to resubmit the plans to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as soon as the transfer of corporate stock funds requested by the Trustees on December 27, 1912, has been approved.

Reference was made to the need of an assistant in the information office at Harlem Hospital to attend to the increasing clerical work. Resolved to appoint a Hospital Helper as a Clerk at \$25 a month, and to make provision in the departmental estimate for 1914 for a Hospital Clerk. Adjourned.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER.

August 1, 1912.

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I beg to submit report showing the conditions of the water supply in the various Boroughs, and work done in connection therewith, for the quarter ending June 30, 1912:

Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Condition of Supply.

While the rainfall for the quarter was below the average, the concentration of the rainfall in the latter part of the first quarter and the early part of the second quarter resulted in an unusually heavy run-off. All the reservoirs in the Croton Watershed were filled and the water wasted over the New Croton Dam on April 8. This waste continued until June 25 during which time the total waste amounted to 27,643 million gallons.

The low rainfall in June has so reduced the flow of the river that practically the entire draft is now coming from the stored waters, the evaporation being about equal to the flow of the river. While the consumption is more than that shown last year, the effect of water waste prevention work in 1911 is still in evidence, the consumption for the month of June being 21 million gallons less this year than in 1910. Making an allowance for a normal increase per year of three per cent, this is equivalent to a reduction of 40 million gallons daily. Under the present conditions of water supply and consumption there is no reason to anticipate any trouble from lack of water either during 1912 or 1913, even though comparatively severe drought conditions should be experienced either this year or next.

The general character of the water has been excellent, but the growth of organisms in the reservoirs indicates that before fall, trouble will be experienced with taste and odors. This trouble cannot be eliminated before the completion of the proposed filter plant.

Collection System.

The Old Croton Aqueduct was not used during the quarter, although it will probably be required during the summer on account of the increase in consumption, due to hot weather.

The plans and specifications for the filtrations of the Croton supply, at the Jerome Park Reservoir site, were practically completed and were submitted to a Board of Experts, consisting of Messrs. Allen Hazen, George A. Johnson, Frank A. Barbour, W. P. Mason and James H. Fuertes. This Board convened on May 27, and on June 10 submitted its report endorsing the proposed filtration plant as being capable of fulfilling the requirements to furnish a supply of water free at all times from turbidity color or odor, and approving the selection of a rapid sand filter as compared to a slow sand filter. As soon as favorable action can be obtained from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Corporation Counsel, on the form of contract and specifications, this important work can be advertised.

Borough of Brooklyn.

There has been no difficulty in furnishing the requisite supply of water during the quarter, and on account of the comparatively heavy stream flow, several of the

pumping stations have been shut down giving an opportunity to make much needed repairs. From economic considerations, the reduction in the amount of water unnecessarily used or wasted in Brooklyn, was deemed advisable.

Owing to the anticipated completion of the Catskill works in about three years, the useful life of any stations which would be installed to obtain additional supply from the Long Island watershed, would be very short. It is estimated, that including interest and sinking fund charges, the cost of water developed at the present time by the construction of driven well stations on the Long Island watershed, would amount to \$36 per million gallons. If such stations were constructed to furnish water in 1914, the cost would be \$42 per million gallons and if constructed to furnish water in 1913, the cost would be \$56 per million gallons.

It is estimated that the maintenance cost for the present system would be reduced at a rate of about \$24 for each million gallons saved, if the demand for water was sufficiently diminished to permit of the shutting down of some of the small stations now being operated. Under these conditions, it is a saving to the taxpayers, if the waste of water can be stopped by an expenditure not exceeding \$24 per million gallons, up to the time that new works would have to be constructed if the consumption were not reduced. The value of the water saved, when such saving would eliminate the necessity for the extension of the collection system on the watershed, is dependent upon the time when such extension would be required, and as shown above, would not be less than \$36 per million gallons.

Under existing conditions in the Brooklyn system, it is estimated that one inspector working on water waste will effect a reduction of approximately one-fourth of a million gallons daily. The salary of such inspector, together with that of the clerical force required to handle the reports, notices of leaks, etc., is estimated at between \$4 and \$5 per day. It is therefore evidently economical to employ inspectors on water waste in Brooklyn, as long as such inspectors can effect a reduction in consumption equivalent to about one-quarter million gallons daily.

As a preliminary to the water waste inspection work, notices were sent to all premises in the Borough, calling attention to the economical results to be obtained from the elimination of waste of water and calling attention to the proposed inspections and the fines imposed for leaky fixtures. These notices were delivered during June, and have had some effect in reducing the amount of water furnished.

To provide for the water waste inspection work, in July the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to authorize the employment of 40 Inspectors at \$1,100, and 10 Clerks at \$900, and as soon as the necessary authorization is made, it is expected to put this force at work on house to house inspection.

Borough of Queens.

Normal conditions existed in the Borough of Queens during the quarter and no difficulty has been experienced in obtaining the requisite pressure to meet all demands.

Borough of Richmond.

The water supply conditions in this Borough have been normal. The State Water Supply Commission at a meeting held on April 18 inquired into the request made to approve maps of lands purchased for the auxiliary stations to be used in connection with the Southfield developments, and on June 3 approved the request for the authorization to purchase said lands. It will now be possible to proceed with this work which has been long delayed on account of the complications over the purchase of the land.

The attached tables give the more important statistics in relation to the water supply system. Respectfully submitted,

BUREAU OF WATER REGISTER, MANHATTAN.

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—Herein I beg to make report of transactions of this Bureau, in condensed form, for the second quarter of 1912.

Collections—I attach statement of collections for the quarter, compiled from the Cashier's monthly reports. There are two factors which would explain the apparently large shrinkage in frontage rate and meter charges collected. Owing to new legislation changing the water year to conform to the calendar year, the frontage rate charges this year are for only two-thirds of the annual charge. The returns in March have deprived us of the collection of meter charges during this quarter that ordinarily would be paid at this time of the year.

Inspection Division—The average number of Inspectors during the quarter was 92, and their work may be summarized as follows:

Meter readings 65,216
Examinations, inspections and special reports 16,177
Uncompleted assignments 5,964

Total reports to Water Registrar 87,357

Meter Setting Division—During the quarter 5,006 permits were issued to set and repair meters, of which 4,358 were permits to repair meters and 1,248 permits to set new meters.

Complaint Division—During this quarter 1,060 complaints were received for consideration. Of these and others outstanding, 945 were settled during the period with a gross allowance of \$10,355.82, or about 18 per cent. of amount claimed. No allowances were made on 560 of the complaints, and increases were awarded on 13.

Shipping Division—The total number of violations reported during the quarter amounted to 53, of which 27 were picked up by the patrol boat "Croton" and the balance, 26, were turned in by the Shore Inspectors.

Pipe Yard—At the meter testing station during the quarter 6,048 meters were received and tested, 6,274 meters were distributed on permits, 148 meters were rejected on test.

The outside work may be summarized as follows: Meters tested on premises, 668, at an average cost of \$2.65; test-tees installed, 35, at an average cost of \$3.38 for each set; 147 watering troughs were repaired during the quarter at a total cost of \$713.42.

F. T. PARSONS, Deputy Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I respectfully forward herewith signed reports of the various divisions of this Bureau, with the exception of the Control Division, for the quarter ending June 30, 1912. The report of the Control Division is a typed copy of one submitted to me in writing by the Chief of that division, who left the city on vacation July 2.

Your special attention is respectfully called to the report of the Clerk in charge of the Frontage Rates Division, relative to the collections for the quarter, showing the great increase in percentage of collections over the same period in 1911.

The report of the Chief of the Inspection Division shows in detail all examinations and inspections for the quarter. Relative to the large increase in meter settings mentioned, I would state that proper steps have been taken for the prompt initial inspection of the meters, with the object of having the new accounts opened on the meter ledgers as promptly as possible.

I have carefully looked into the matter of combining the Testing Division with the Inspection Division, as recommended by Mr. Rennie, and respectfully recommend that the testing of meters be placed in charge of the Inspection Division, thereby insuring more concerted action on all improperly registering meters, and testing first those meters which the records show should be tested. Should this combination be made, the entire work regarding the testing of meters would be performed more uniformly and smoothly and would eliminate divided responsibility. In addition, a closer observation of the meter testing corps in the field can be made by the Chief Inspector or the Supervising Inspectors while out on their daily tours. The clerical branch of the Meter Testing Division should remain in the hands of Mr. Flanagan, who would receive his orders direct from the head of the Inspection Division.

The total number of letters and communications which were important enough to be numbered and recorded received during the quarter was 1,450. All of this correspondence was received, answered, indexed and properly and promptly filed by Mrs. Lewis and Miss Metcalf, the two Stenographers assigned to the General Office. In addition to this numbered correspondence, there were hundreds of letters on routine subjects which were also properly taken care of by these two ladies, with Miss Bryan and Mr. Droege, of the Inspection and Permit Divisions, respectively. All communications to the Finance Department, certificates of refund, transfer, cancellation and reduction, were prepared in the General Office and there recorded and indexed.

Commencing May 1, 1912, permits for the use of hose were issued on payment of \$5 each, and 458 permits were issued during the balance of the quarter. The issuing of these permits was attended to by the Registrar in person, that he might learn directly the opinion of the public in regard to said issue. In very few cases was objection made to the payment of the fee by those desiring such permits, and I feel confident from the expressions of the taxpayers that the demand for these permits for 1913 will be very great, there being a general feeling of approval of such an issue.

The delivery of 175,000 leak and waste circulars has practically been completed by Boyd's City Dispatch in those sections of the Borough where it was thought that their delivery would be most beneficial to the City, and the best results attained. I again recommend that the necessary additional force of Inspectors, office staff, etc., be furnished this office to follow up by examinations such leaks and waste as may not have been corrected. Dear Sir—The following report covering the work of the Frontage Rate Division for the quarter ending June 30, 1912, is submitted for your consideration:

1912 Ledgers—The amounts of the water rates were extended on the ledgers and returned to the Control Division, the completion of this portion of the work having been held in abeyance owing to the legislation pending at the close of the previous quarter, relative to the change in the water year.

Requisition for Bills—The number of bills issued on requisition showed a large increase as compared with former years, but despite this increase, by continuous night work, all requisitions received were filed without delay or complaint.

Collections—The collections for the month of May amounted to \$411,066.98, approximately 29 per cent. of the total rate entered (\$1,427,984.15), as compared with \$380,411.50 for May, 1911, or 18 per cent. of the total rate entered (\$2,140,021), and for the two months of May and June, to \$555,534.67, approximately 39 per cent. of the entire rate as compared with \$675,489.93 for May and June, 1911, equal to 31 1/2 per cent. of the entire rate. This large increase indicates that several thousand more taxpayers were accommodated in the month of May than in the same month a year ago; and by the end of June, all cash received had not only been posted to the ledgers, but had also been verified with the coupons.

General—The work of the division for the greater part of the quarter was carried on by a staff less in number by three permanent and six temporary Clerks compared with the staff of a year ago, but despite this handicap, the progress made was very satisfactory and was only possible by the unanimous co-operation of the clerical force.

Approximately six hundred more adjustments were entered on the ledgers than in the corresponding quarter of 1911, due largely to the natural growth of the borough and through the changes necessary through the installation of meters.

The matter of the writing up of the 1913 ledgers and of the status of the survey work was fully covered in the last report, and does not call for further comment at this time. Yours respectfully,

Dear Sir—In compliance with your request, I beg to submit the following report of the Control Division for the quarter ending June 30, 1912.

The control of all accounts—Frontage Rates, Meter Rates, etc.—was properly taken care of during the quarter, and on May 1, 1912, the annual rates for the eight months ending December 31, 1912, as per amendment to the law, were computed and taken in control for the current year, as per the Frontage Rate Ledgers for 1912.

An accurate account of all the transactions of the Bureau of Water Registrar were properly recorded and trial balances monthly of all outstanding accounts rendered to the Manhattan office (main) and copies to the Comptroller (Finance Department), as well as all financial statements relating to the Bureau. The quarterly cycle of meter reading sheets for the quarter ending June 30, 1912, show as follows: Book readings sent out to be read by Inspectors, 20,111; special and 90-day readings to be read by inspectors, 2,015; total, 22,126 (90 per cent. of which were good readings and billed), showing an increase over the last quarter of approximately 350 accounts (new), being the number of new meters set during the quarter and placed on meter ledgers.

There were some 3,000 adjustment authorities issued, included in which were about 800 transfer accounts (frontage to meter), 350 of which were new meter accounts, as before stated, and the balance, change of connections, etc.

The collections and meter reading summaries for the quarter were all scheduled and copies of same transmitted to the Finance Department; and the month of May, 1912, was far in excess of May, 1911, in the matter of collections in frontage, causing considerable extra detail work by reason of the fractional part of a dollar (two-thirds).

In conclusion, I beg to call your attention to the fact that not more than 108 meters were unread during the first six months of this year by reason of meters being inaccessible. Respectfully submitted,

Dear Sir—Submitted herewith is a brief summary of all transactions in the Bureau of Water Register, Borough of The Bronx, for the quarter ending June 30, 1912. Supplementing the statement of moneys received for water rents, penalties, permits, etc., the following report of the work accomplished and that now in progress in this Bureau is also submitted.

The 1912 frontage rate books were opened on May 1, and the collections for May and June were as follows:

One hundred and seventy-four thousand three hundred and forty-seven dollars and three cents compared with \$204,591.60 for the same period for 1911, a decrease of \$30,244.57. This decrease is explained by the fact that we are collecting only two-thirds of the water rates this year. Had the collections been for a full year as formerly, we would have shown an increase of \$56,928.94.

The collections for frontage rates, prior year, were \$445.50 for this quarter, as compared with \$27,295.70 for the corresponding period last year.

The decrease of \$26,850.20 is explained by the fact that this year returns to the Receiver of Taxes were made in March instead of August, and the collections made were for charges that had been added to the 1911 records after the returns were made in March.

The collections on meter rates for this quarter were \$76,969.95, as compared with \$70,074.78 for the corresponding period last year, an increase of \$6,895.17.

The meter setting charges collected for this quarter were \$274.01, as compared with \$210.67 for the same quarter in 1911, an increase of \$63.34.

The receipts for building purposes regular for this quarter were \$9,906.46, as compared with \$12,281.97 for the corresponding period of last year, a decrease of \$2,375.51. The building purpose extras show a decrease of \$33.78, the collections for the quarter being \$3,680.65. The taps show a decrease of \$270.50, the collections being \$2,316.50.

Labor and material collections were \$246.20, an increase of \$142.23.

The re-examination is now completed and the results of same were very gratifying, about \$110,000 in round figures having been added to our records.

Meter Testing.

In addition to testing meters and placing test tees thereon, the man in charge of that work I have also engaged in installing and repairing horse troughs and fountains. During this quarter fifty-one horse troughs and fountains have been repaired and seven new, low-cut troughs have been installed.

Sealing Meters.

There have been 1270 new style seals installed to date. The following is a statement of monies received from all sources for the quarter ending June 30, 1912:

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—I beg to submit the following report for the quarter ending June 30, 1912.

Work on the new frontage rate ledgers was completed early in the quarter, and the first day of May found our Frontage Division Clerks and ledgers ready for the work of the new water year.

There has been a noticeable increase in the number of bills called for and paid during the second quarter, accounted for, no doubt, by the fact that taxpayers having occasion to call at this building to pay the first half of their semi-annual land tax bill under the new law, found it convenient to settle for their water bills while at the building, and while current frontage rate bills are for but two-thirds of a year and there have not been the usual prior year collections, owing to return of arrears this year under the new law prior to the beginning of the quarter, collections have not been materially less than those of the corresponding quarter of preceding years, the amount collected being \$53,483.24, as compared with \$59,043.79 for the second quarter of 1911.

One hundred and seventeen new meter accounts were opened, while but eight meters were removed, thus further increasing the proportion of metered accounts noted in previous reports, and as was to be expected, meter rate collections for the quarter increased:

The following summarizes the work of the Inspection Division: 3,399 regular meter readings; 555 special readings; 1,552 examinations; 1,745 inspections; 89 special reports.

Summary of the work of the Meter Setting Division shows permits for: Taps, 195; plugs, 31; connections to private services, 36; building purposes (regular), 151; building purposes (boilers), 5; building purposes (miscellaneous), 12; hose permits (unmetered premises), 15; meter glasses, 14; repairs to service, 129; hose (unmetered premises), 63; new meters, 170; set in place of meters removed, 14; resetting meters, 158; removing meters, 7.

Notices: Building purposes, 41; repair meters, 107; install meters, 23; violation, 20; three day, 39; return permits, 64; leak and waste, 74.

Examinations to bill room: New meter accounts, 117; set in place of meters removed, 20; meters removed, 8; City plumber set permits, 5; City plumber reset permits, 5; N. P. M.'s, 3.

The work of the Bureau is increasing steadily, but that the increase brings with it no decrease in efficiency on the part of the employees is attested by the rarity of complaints made to the office. It will be necessary in the near future to provide additional facilities for the keeping of our records.

With the tapping of our system by new buildings and by old buildings in sections now being rapidly placed within reach of our mains for the first time under the contract which is now rapidly being executed, an appreciable increase of revenue is looked for in the coming months. Yours respectfully,

REPORT OF THE DEPUTY COMMISSIONER, RICHMOND.

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—I beg to submit the following report for the quarter ending June 30, 1911.

While there has been a greater demand, resulting, as compared with the same period of last year, in an increased pumppage of 319,653 gallons daily, that is, a present total average of 8,720,446 gallons per day, our system has proven equal to it. With the advent of hot weather, however, should a break occur at one or more of our large pumping stations, as is possible owing to our inability to hurry installations of needed equipment and replacements (as, for example, boiler which has been lying at Grant City so long awaiting decision of New York office as to just how it shall be connected), the service to the high sections is likely to be crippled.

Earlier in the year we had hoped that we might be able to turn in a number of new wells from the Southfield boulevard, but the Phoenix Construction Company has only just gotten work under way, and it is now practically certain that there will be no relief this summer as a result of their work.

Fifty-eight of the old West New Brighton wells, which were delivering a brackish quality of water, were discontinued when the eight new Madison avenue wells, now about complete and yielding two million gallons daily, had been turned in, but from time to time it has been, and will continue to be, necessary to use some of these wells again to keep up our reservoirs when increased demand develops or breakdowns occur.

While the foremost reason for projecting the temporary station at Grant City was to augment this summer's supply, it is deemed advisable to get this ready even though the wells cannot be connected till fall on the Boulevard, in order that there may be available at the earliest possible date a safe margin of supply over demand. In this connection it is pertinent to remark that the per capita consumption in this Borough is over 102 gallons per day, nearly 25 per cent. of which passes through meters of consumers.

The excavating has been begun for the permanent pumping station at Grant City. Deep Test Well No. 2 at Southfield boulevard and Emmett avenue has been driven to a depth of 233 feet, and when pumped showed a yield of 160 gallons per minute. Driving, suspended since May 26, awaiting receipt of casing, is to be continued.

Driving on Deep Well No. 1 at the Clove Station was discontinued at a depth of 460 feet, and the well is now being connected.

Two of the shallow wells at the Clove reported last quarter as unfinished have been connected and yield 24 gallons per minute; the other two, with six additional, are so advanced that they should be completed during the coming quarter.

The Grymes Hill standpipe, now over half complete, will, it is expected, be completed during the coming quarter.

The large Stuyvesant place main has been completed and put in service from a point about 300 feet east of Weiner place to Hyatt street.

The paving removed in the course of laying suction main to Madison avenue wells through Madison, Post and Jewett avenues was restored.

The rapid progress being made by Murphy Brothers is worthy of high praise. The part of their contract completed includes that beginning at Southfield boulevard, in Parkinson avenue, to Marie street, to Fingerboard road, to Grasmere avenue, to First place, to Clove avenue, to Danube avenue, to Simonson place, to Vanderbilt avenue, to Osgood avenue, to Gordon street, to Grove street, to Court street, to Van Duzer street, to Elizabeth street, to Bay street; also in Southfield boulevard, between Parkinson and Grattan avenue.

The total of low pressure water mains laid during the quarter amounts to 9.21 miles, as follows: 22,792.5 24-inch, 8,601.6 12-inch, 8,154.3 20-inch, 3,847 8-inch, 4,324.2 16-inch, 924.6 6-inch; also 106 D. N. Standard Hydrants; also 311 valves, as follows: One 24-inch, 33 20-inch, 5 16-inch, 15 12-inch, 142 8-inch, 115 6-inch.

It is unfortunate that the contract awarded McAvoy should continue to be held up, as the extensions provided for therein are urgently required, among them being the high-pressure line to the City Farm Colony.

During the coming quarter it will be necessary to forward another contract covering other numerous short extensions greatly needed in various sections of the Borough. I urge that this be approved and contract awarded with all possible expedition. We are constantly receiving petitions for these short extensions and for replacements of outgrown small lines laid by the old companies or by consumers or development companies. Wherever possible, we persuade property holders to do their own hauling and trenching, the Department furnishing the material and caulk, but at best there are few cases where even the urgency of the need persuade the property owner to do that which

pumping station failed to give proper pressure along the lines supplied, while now 90-pound pressure at the station suffices, complaints having ceased.

A falling off in the 1911 frontage assessments to \$96,751 from \$103,228 in 1910, is explained by the increase in the number of metered properties from 2,800 to 3,300, which now, though consuming less than one-fourth of our pumpage, contribute about half of the entire revenue.

There has been a healthy increase both in frontage and meter collections this year, the increase noted for the first quarter having been augmented during the second. In fact, for these six months, Richmond shows the greatest ratio of increased receipts of the five boroughs, namely, 14.68 per cent, a new quarterly record for the sale of ashes of \$215 contributing to this result.

Numerous cancellations continue to be made to correct the hasty and erroneous inspections made at the time we took over the private water systems, when premises not connected with our mains were assessed; \$3,905.14 have been cancelled, and \$2,892.32 added, representing 721 adjustments, this including the re-examinations and charging of new buildings. Cancellations and transfers of 1909 arrears through the Finance Department affected 29 accounts; refunds, 2; changes from meter to frontage rate on request, 16.

Two Clerks handle the meter accounts, billing, debiting and posting on the records about 1,200 accounts each month, the posting of payments being done within 24 hours after receipt.

It is to be hoped that, in future years, returns may be made in March or April as, under present conditions, we are obliged to carry two sets of ledgers during May, June and July, balancing each at the end of each of these months and accounting for prior and current year frontage rates respectively.

The black print maps for the 1st and 2d Wards have been brought up to date, and the coming quarter should see the entire borough finished, if our Draughtsman remains.

Completing, so far as possible, the report of leak and waste campaign partly given three months ago, I would state that 11,584 houses were visited, waste being found in 1268. On a later inspection, 1,050 were found to be O. K. On a third inspection, all but 87 had made the necessary repairs, and these now have our attention.

The summary for the Inspection Division follows: Regular meter readings, 3,213; special readings, 424; examinations, 1,876; inspections, 1,831; special reports, 148. The following summarizes the work of the Meter Setting Division: Permits for taps, 194; plugs, 29; building purposes, 88; boilers, 5; repairs to services, 84; new meters, 200; set in place of meters removed, 29; resetting meters, 151; removing meters, 4; changes, 2; building purpose notices, 265. Notices to: Owners to repair meters, 141; owners to install meters, 42; owners, three-day, 36; plumbers to return permits, 75. Tickets to bill room: For new meter accounts, 192; to set in place of meter removed, 37; meters removed, 2; change tickets, 7; City Plumber repair permits, 8; City Plumber set permits, 10. Bureau of Electrical Inspection reports: Poles erected, 388; poles removed, 263; wire strung, 918 miles; wire removed, 198 miles.

Thence southerly deflecting to the right 122 degrees 24 minutes 8 seconds for 59.22 feet along the westerly line of Mueller street to the southerly line of Perry avenue;

Thence southwesterly deflecting to the right 57 degrees 35 minutes 52 seconds for 1,715.27 feet along the southeasterly line of Perry avenue to the easterly line of Willow avenue;

Thence westerly deflecting to the right 62 degrees 13 minutes 12 seconds for 56.39 feet along the southerly line of Perry avenue to the westerly line of Willow avenue;

Thence westerly for 3,573.49 feet along the southerly line of Perry avenue to the easterly line of Clark avenue, the point or place of beginning.

Fourth. That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, our final report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 27th day of June, 1913, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Fifth. In case, however, objections are filed to any of said abstracts of estimate and assessment, the notice of motion to confirm our final report herein will stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified, and of which notice will be given to all those who have theretofore appeared in this proceeding, as well as by publication in the CITY RECORD, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projections, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
