REPORT ON THE MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS DURING THE YEARS 1914 AND 1915.

March 2, 1917.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, The City of New York:

Dear Sir—Under date of June 7, 1915, there was submitted to you by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, pursuant to subdivision 6 of section 151 of the City Charter, a report upon the cost of the Department of Parks in 1913 and 1914.

That report dealt with the organization of the department, with its duties, and principal functions, as set forth in the City Charter, sections 605 to 630, inclusive, the areas and locations of the various parks and the cost of operating and maintaining them.

This report exhibits for 1914 and 1915 the following information:

1. The tax budget appropriations for the Park Department and the institutions maintained therein.
2. The organization of the department.
3. The cost of maintaining the department in 1914 and 1915 on a per acre basis.
4. The cost of maintaining the department by boroughs, and the functional costs in each borough.
5. Overhead costs.
6. Receipts.
7. General remarks.
8. Appendices A, B, C, D, showing the cost of maintaining each park, parkway, driveway, etc.

1. Tax Budget Appropriations, 1912 to 1916, Inclusive.

Each of the four divisions of the Park Department keeps separate accounts and records and renders an annual report of the cost of its operation and maintenance.

The appropriations for the several boroughs for the past five years, excluding about \$30,000 annually for the Park Board, but including the appropriations for various museums, botanical and zoological gardens, etc., maintained in connection with the parks, have been as follows:

The percentages of increase in these years (1916 over 1912) in the Boroughs of The Bronx and Queens were 0.45 per cent. and 3.94 per cent., respectively, whereas the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond and the Borough of Brooklyn show decreases of 9.95 per cent. and 26.29 per cent., respectively.

The greatest reduction in the number of employees (178), in the amount appropriated for personal service (\$192,734.42) and in the percentages of such reductions, 18.02 and 21.65 respectively, were in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond. Brooklyn and Queens both show an increase in the number of employees, but a decrease in the amounts appropriated for personal service. Bronx shows a decrease in the number of employees, but the percentage of decrease in the appropriations for personal service is less than the percentage of decrease in the number of employees.

3. Cost of Maintaining the Park Department in 1915, the Park Acreage, and the Cost of Maintenance Per Acre.

The figures hereunder exhibit by boroughs the total cost of maintaining the Park Department, with the exception of the Park Board, in 1915, and also the cost thereof to the city per acre of park territory. The results will be somewhat misleading, as the total costs include also the cost of caring for parkways and driveways.

Note—The costs per acre in the Boroughs of The Bronx and Queens are low by reason of the large amount of unimproved park acreage included therein. It is claimed that natural conditions make it more expensive to maintain Central Park than Prospect Park, and possibly the higher cost per acre in Manhattan as compared with Brooklyn may be so accounted for. A more likely reason, however, for the difference in cost per acre is the larger proportion of unimproved park land in Brooklyn.

The item "Privileges," includes besides the moneys received for boating, carousel, refreshment and newsstand privileges, etc., rents for various buildings on park property occupied as restaurants; "Permits and Fees," are for bay window projections, lockers in golf and tennis houses, golf permits, camp sites, etc. The receipts for "Restoring and Repaving," consist of deposits made by plumbers, etc., to defray the cost of restoring street openings. The item "Miscellaneous," includes sale of firewood, planting trees in city streets, Zoological Garden receipts and damage to department property.

The decrease in the Brooklyn receipts for privileges is due mainly to the payment of but \$1,000 a year for the carousel in 1915, as against an average return of approximately \$5,000 a year for the ten years preceding, and the payment in 1915 of but \$5,000 a year for the boating privilege as against the \$8,500 a year received theretofore. These reductions were made on account of the erection by the concessionaires of new buildings which are to belong to the city. In connection with the boating privilege, the rate charged per hour for use of boats was reduced from 50 to 25 cents.

It is quite clear, however, that if the City had itself erected the buildings in question, it could have made much more advantageous terms. This method of financing the City's needs should be discontinued.

General Remarks.

In connection with the foregoing the following recommendations and comments are made:

1. That steps be taken to secure legislation to put the entire park activities under the direction and control of a single commissioner. This should make for a reduction of overhead charges, the standardization of methods and the more economical handling of personal service and supplies.

2. That constant attention be given to the problem of reducing the percentage of overhead charges to the direct expenses incurred, especially in connection with the individual parks. In a number of instances there are increases in the overhead expenses, while the direct expenses have decreased. While it may be argued that the decreased direct expenses are attributable to more supervision, this conclusion does not necessarily follow. In Brooklyn there has been a decrease in the overhead charges in every park.

3. Careful preliminary planning and estimating of the cost of new work to be done should help to control and reduce its cost.

4. Decreases in both the overhead and the direct charges of all of the divisions of the department indicate that increased attention is being given to the financial problems involved.

The purport of the foregoing recommendations has been communicated to the Park Commissioners. In reference to them Commissioner Raymond V. Ingersoll states as follows:

"Under 'General Remarks' it is recommended that the department be consolidated under one Commissioner. Probably you would not be especially interested in my own opinion on this subject. I doubt whether much saving could be accomplished in that way. It would be necessary to have several Deputy Commissioners, and it is absolutely essential that the Park Department in each of the larger boroughs should be directly and responsibly in touch with different sections of the borough and with the individual park properties. There are some respects in which the activities of the Park Department cannot be thoroughly standardized. Much individual attention to special requirements and demands of the public must be given. The Manhattan Park Commissioner having complete jurisdiction in Brooklyn would seldom be able to get to the consideration of certain matters which need to be taken up and decided immediately. If a comparison is made between the maintenance budgets of the various departments for the year 1913 and for the year 1917, it will be found that a reduction of about 23 per cent. has been made for parks, Brooklyn, and an equivalent percentage of reduction for parks, Manhattan. This decrease is also being achieved in spite of the fact that during the past three years we have been doing out of our maintenance budget a considerable number of small improvements which under previous administrations have been done either out of corporate stock or not at all. This is a larger showing than can be found in any other department except Docks and Ferries, where conditions were peculiar. In parks, Brooklyn, this reduction has been brought about in spite of the operation of new properties, increase in recreation activities and higher prices for materials. I doubt whether any department can show less overhead expenditures in proportion to the expenditures for actual work than is the case with our department. I also doubt whether any greater reduction in the budget would have been possible had the departments been consolidated three or four years ago." Respectfully submitted,

Manhattan—Principal Increases.

(a) Fort Washington Park—Increase, \$1,358.86; due to repairs and operation of comfort station \$653.46; increase of music, \$505.76; repairs to dwellings, \$143.31, and \$56.33 increase in operating force of park.

(b) Highbridge Park—Increase, \$1,681.11; due to the restoration of trees, labor and botanical supplies, \$1,061.43. In the 1914 report Reservoir Oval Playground was shown up as a separate playground, the cost of operating being \$363.54. In the 1915 report it was combined with Highbridge Playground; so therefore a decrease will be shown in 1915 against Reservoir Playground. There being no music allowed in 1915 there is a decrease of \$345. Due to the increased labor of cleaning and supervision there is an increase of \$456.19. Other general park properties, repairs amounted to \$103.69, due to repairs of park hydrants, etc.

(c) John Jay Park—Increase, \$1,755.16; due to the increased labor force and playground attendants in operating the playground, \$1,102.13; also increase in operating the building of labor force, \$1,124.19, and a decrease in music allowance. A new field house was opened in December, 1914, the operation of which is the cause of the increase.

(d) Morningside Park—Increase, \$1,240.01; due to the general repairs of walks and roads, which were in poor condition.

(e) Mount Morris Park—Increase, \$1,128.81; due to the general overhauling of the comfort stations.

(f) Piers—The piers were transferred to the Department of Parks from the

Department of Docks and Ferries in 1914 and the increase in 1915 is due to the longer season in 1915 than in 1914, and all repairs being made by the Department of Parks to buildings, etc. This work until 1914 was performed under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

(g) Indoor Playgrounds—These were activities transferred from the old Public Recreation Commission under the provision of Chapter 574, Laws of 1915. All charges for the operation of these gymnasiums were formerly made against the old Public Recreation Commission.

(h) Street Trees—Increase, \$3,554.74; due to the extra force of climbers and pruners employed in pruning, spraying and the removal of dead wood, in an effort to properly maintain the 15,000 trees in Manhattan and upwards of 200,000 street trees in Richmond. An inventory was also made of street trees in Manhattan. The large annual loss in trees from lack of force to preserve them made such action imperative.

(i) Shops—Increase, \$3,564.94; due to increased force of labor working on general repairs of shop building and machinery. So many old buildings were badly run down that this work was very necessary.

(j) Eighty-Sixth Street Shops—Increase, \$5,181.14; due to the transfer of the stables to a more central point in the park—97th St. Yard—and the overhauling of the old stable at 86th St., so that it may be used as a central storeroom, thus effecting a saving in the centralization of stores and shop functions.

(k) Park Board—Increase, \$1,466.48; due to the fact that the office of Secretary to the Board was vacant until April 10, 1914, and also to the increase of service rendered by a clerk and a stenographer.

The Bronx—Principal Increases.

(a) General Administration—Increase, \$2,337.70. Due to purchase of three additional automobiles (Fords), \$1,254.00. Cost of operation and maintenance of these machines, \$1,591.07. Decreases in other items amounted to about \$500.

(b) Crotona Park—Increase, \$8,797.48. The cost of maintenance of this park is really a decrease by \$3,825.31 under 1914, but new improvements, principally in tennis courts, cost \$12,622.79, making a net increase of \$8,797.48. These improvements were made in order to meet the increased demand for recreational facilities in that section.

(c) Van Cortlandt Park—Increase, \$42,537.38. Due chiefly to the increases in the following functions: Care of roads, resurfacing Moshulu Avenue, Grand Ave-

nue, Deer Park Road and Golf Links Road, \$30,500.48. Improvement of Moshulu (new) Golf Links, \$6,343.32. New tennis courts, etc., \$6,337.10. Total, \$43,180.90.

(d) Crotona Parkway—Increase, \$14,664.04. Due to increase in care of roads, \$11,409.08, which represents labor and hired teams to the amount of about \$3,000.00, and highway material, such as broken stone, screenings and tarvia. The balance of this increase represents chiefly erection of more than 12,000 feet of 2-inch and 3-inch rail fence from 173rd Street to 182d Street, the cost of which was \$2,700.00.

(e) Roads in Botanical Gardens—Increase, \$2,257.69. During the spring of 1915 almost all of the territory of Bronx Park proper was transferred to the jurisdiction of the Botanical Society. A similar amount was charged to Care of Roads, Bronx Park, during 1914. In 1915 the charges to roads in Bronx Park showed a larger decrease than the above increase in the cost of roads in the Botanical Garden.

(f) Care of Trees in City Streets—Increase, \$1,469.47. Due to general increase in service and additional laborers for pruning trees.

(g) General Park Equipment—Increase, \$5,762.67. Due in part to purchases as follows: Snow plows, \$465.00; two auto lawn mowers, \$2,600.00, and gasoline wagon loaders, \$700.00, a total of \$3,765.00. The balance of the increase is due to large expenditures for labor and material in repairing road rollers, derricks and hoisting machines by reason of the extensive road work in 1915.

(h) Shops (Overhead)—Increase, \$6,568.98. This increase is due to the necessity of extending the shops to provide for a saw mill and an enlarged blacksmith shop, the cost of which was as follows:

(a) General Administration—Increase, \$4,995.85; due principally to the purchase of automobile trucks and cars, by the use of which the expenditures during the year for hire of trucks and carts have been reduced by \$27,527.52.

(b) Bushwick Playground—Increase, \$2,539.44; due to a backstop for the baseball diamond; two temporary ponds for skating rinks; a new wading pool, 25x60 feet, and the planting of a large number of trees, shrubs and vines.

(c) Highland Park—Increase, \$2,676.33. The increase in expenditures was mainly due to the improvement of 28 tennis courts, the thorough repair of the Old Dutch Farmhouse for use as a tennis club house and lunch room; extensive additions to the flower garden about the building; the grading and seeding at the easterly end of the park and the planting of trees.

(d) New Lots Playground—Increase, \$1,206.36; due to the installation of new double handball courts, renewal of playground, making of an artificial skating pond and planting of trees.

(e) Betsy Head Playground—Increase, \$17,045.55. This playground was taken over from the Recreation Commission during the early part of the year. The expenditures were principally for operation and maintenance of the playground and maintenance and operation of the children's house, wading pool and bathhouse, and the installation of a temporary skating rink.

(b) Highland Park—Increase, \$885.95. Due to reinforcing roads, repairing paths and care of trees.

(c) Kissena Park—Increase, \$2,562.46. Due to construction of tennis courts and rustic features.

(d) Kings Park—Increase, \$2,008.90. Due to the improvement of lawns for playground activities.

(e) Small Parks and Gores—Increase, \$1,616.56. Due to the improvement of Baisley's Park.

(f) Ashmead Park—Increase, \$433.33. Due to increase in personal service.

(g) Leavitt Park—Increase, \$2,559.80. Due to filling in swamp land.

(h) Rainey Park—Increase, \$488.43. Due to provision made for baseball playing.

(i) Trees in City Streets—Increase, \$2,837.77. Due to the employment of twenty-one additional laborers at \$2.50 per diem as Climbers and Pruners in pruning, spraying and planting new trees in the Borough. The supervision expense was decreased \$4,488.76.

(j) Greenhouses and Nurseries—Increase, \$5,798.27. Due to development of Forest Park and Kissena nurseries, offset by a decrease in the cost of greenhouse operation.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT OF THE RELIEF FUND FOR THE YEAR 1916.

January 24, 1917.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, City of New York:

Sir—I have the honor to transmit to you herewith a report of the New York Fire Department Relief Fund for the year 1916, as required by section 789 of the Charter. This report contains a statement of all of the receipts and disbursements made on account of this fund during the year and also a list of the names and residences of all beneficiaries, together with the amounts paid to these beneficiaries.

There was, during the year 1916, an increase of 150 in the number of annuitants and of \$106,126.62 in the annual pension roll. On Dec. 31, 1915, there were 1,770 annuitants on our pension roll and the payment from the fund amount to \$1,126,996.37. On Dec. 31, 1916, the list of annuitants contained 1,920 names and the annual charge was \$1,233,122.99. Retirement on pension of officers and members of the uniformed force numbered 170 during 1916. During this year also 65 widows, guardians and dependents of officers, firemen and retired members were added to the pension rolls, making a total of 235 annuitants. This increase in the number of annuitants, however, was offset by the drop from the rolls owing to deaths and revocations of 85 annuitants (47 officers and firemen and 38 widows, guardians and dependents of officers, firemen and retired members).

The pension roll at present numbers 1,061 retired officers and firemen, 34 relieved men and 825 widows, guardians and dependents, a total of 1,920.

Although there was an increase of \$106,126.62 in the pension roll, there was an increase of only \$58,514.38 in the sum which had to be raised by revenue bonds. The remainder of the increase in the pension roll was made up by increases in collections on account of the 2 per cent. tax on foreign fire insurance and collections from the issue of permits by the Division of Combustibles. There was an increase of \$46,300.22 in the collections from foreign fire insurance companies and an increase of \$58,233.94 in the amount realized from the issue of combustible and explosive permits. The latter increase was due to the energy with which the Bureau of Fire Prevention and the uniformed officers of the Fire Department co-operated in inspecting all places where explosives and combustibles are stored and requiring these places to secure permits. There was a falling off of \$21,931.13 in the amount realized by this fund from excise taxes. This is due to the increased demands made by other pension funds upon this class of taxes. I would call your attention to the fact that the receipts of the pension fund from excise taxes is being reduced year by year. In 1913 our relief fund received \$545,000 from this source. In 1914 it received \$525,000. In 1915 the amount was reduced to \$500,000, and this year it was reduced to \$478,068.87.

The increase in the foreign fire insurance tax cannot be relied upon in 1917, as it was due to the fact that the collections in 1916 covered a period of sixteen months instead of twelve months. Therefore, it is extremely likely that the amount necessary to be raised by the issue of revenue bonds on account of this fund will be considerably more during the year 1917 than during the year just closed.

Amendments to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held Jan. 30, 1917, the following resolutions were adopted:
Resolved, That Regulations Governing the Establishment, Conduct and Maintenance of Private Schools in the City of New York, and relating to Section 222 of the Sanitary Code, adopted by the Board of Health on April 25, 1916, and amended by the said Board on May 31, 1916, be rescinded.

Resolved, That the following Regulations Governing the Establishment and Maintenance of Private Schools, relating to Section 222 of the Sanitary Code, be adopted:
Regulation 1. *Applications for Permit; Certificates from Fire Commissioner and Superintendent of Buildings.*—Every application for a permit to establish or maintain a school shall be made upon an official blank furnished for such purpose by the Department of Health.

Upon receipt of an application for a permit to maintain an existing school, the said Department shall notify the Fire Commissioner and the Superintendent of Buildings of the Borough in which the school is located, of the filing of such application.

Every applicant for a permit to establish, after Jan. 30, 1917, and maintain a school shall procure from the Fire Commissioner and the Superintendent of Buildings of the Borough in which such school is to be located, respectively, a certificate to the effect that the building and premises for which a permit is desired comply with all fire and building laws, ordinances, rules and regulations applicable to schools. Such certificates shall be filed with the Department of Health at the time the application for a permit is made.

Regulation 2. *Lighting.*—Each classroom shall be properly lighted by means of windows or skylights of sufficient size and number to permit an adequate supply of natural light to be diffused to all parts of the classroom, and every such classroom shall be equipped with artificial means of illumination and shall be adequately lighted by such means during the evening sessions and at all other times when the influx of natural light is inadequate.

Regulation 3. *Ventilation.*—Proper and sufficient ventilation by natural or mechanical means, shall be provided in each classroom, and such ventilation and a proper degree of temperature shall be maintained at all times during school hours. Where a classroom is ventilated by natural means, at least two hundred (200) cubic feet of air space shall be supplied for each person, and, where a classroom is ventilated by mechanical means, the air of such classroom shall be displaced by fresh air at the rate of fifteen hundred (1,500) cubic feet per person per hour.

Regulation 4. *Floor Space to Be Provided.*—Fifteen (15) square feet of floor space shall be provided for each person in a classroom.

Regulation 5. *Toilet Facilities.*—Suitable and separate waterclosets, conveniently located in properly ventilated compartments, with adequate facilities for hand washing adjacent thereto, shall be provided for each at the number of such waterclosets to be provided for each sex shall be regulated as follows:

Male. One (1) watercloset for every twenty (20) male scholars registered. Two (2) waterclosets for every fifty (50) male scholars registered. Thereafter at the rate of one (1) watercloset for every additional forty (40) male scholars registered. Provided, however, where urinals are provided for such male scholars, one (1) watercloset less than the required number may be provided for each of such urinals, except that the number of waterclosets in such cases shall not be reduced to less than two-thirds (2-3) the required number.

Females: One (1) watercloset for every twenty (20) female scholars registered. Two (2) waterclosets for every fifty (50) female scholars registered. Thereafter at the rate of one (1) watercloset for every additional forty (40) female scholars registered.

Regulation 6. *Desks and Seats.*—All seats in classrooms used by the pupils shall be provided with backs, and such seats and all desks shall be adjusted so as to avoid any unhygienic attitudes on the part of the pupils.

Regulation 7. *Room, Closet or Lockers for Children's Outer Clothing.*—A room, a closet, or lockers, adequately ventilated and lighted, shall be provided for the care of the pupils' outer clothing.

Regulation 8. *Drinking Water to Be Provided.*—An adequate supply of drinking water shall be provided by sanitary means.

Regulation 9. *Sanitary Conditions.*—The premises shall be maintained in a sanitary condition at all times, and no room used for classes shall be used for sleeping or living purposes.

Regulation 10. *Minimum Age of Attendance.*—The minimum age at which a child shall be permitted to attend school shall be four (4) years.

Regulation 11. *Period of Attendance.*—The attendance of children under the age of ten (10) years in classrooms shall be limited to four and one-half (4½) hours.
The attendance of children between the ages of ten (10) and fourteen (14) years in classrooms shall be limited to six (6) hours.
The attendance of children between the ages of fourteen (14) and sixteen (16) years in classrooms shall be limited to eight (8) hours.

Recommendation—That Department accept as second means of exit the following: Grant until May 1 for erection of two stories to present 2-story addition, making same 4 stories; accept horizontal exits as per 79-19 on 2d, 3rd, 4th floors, opening in wall equipped with fireproof door, 5th floor, leading to 4-story roof, opening in wall leading to fire escape and iron stairs to roof of 4-story addition, same to be equipped with self-closing fireproof opening outwardly, the doors on 2nd, 3rd, 4th floors to lead to stairway in Beaver st. building, and the stairway in Beaver st. building to be continued to roof with bulkhead to make same accessible, 5th and 6th floors, exemption from fireproof passageway to street, accepting present stairway when above exit in Beaver st., provided from each floor.

Premises affected, (2) Bliss; appellant, Borden's Farm Product. 3—Enclose stairs fireproof. 4—Reconstruct stairs of fireproof material. 5—Additional exit. 2-story non-fireproof building erected Oct. 1, 1913, open lifts, no sprinkler; no fire alarm; no combustibles; occupancy above 1st floor, none. Exits: One unenclosed interior stairway, constructed of wood, 34 inches wide, 10 inches rise, 9-inch tread; building irregular, containing 3,974 sq. ft.; only males employed.

Recommendation—Re No. 5, accept a fireproof door opening outwardly from 2d floor onto roof of one-story section, in place of window now provided, with stationary or counterbalanced awning stairs from one-story receiving roof to ground; waiver of Nos. 3 and 4 while occupancy remains as of this date.

Premises affected, (3) Bowerstown; appellant, H. W. Lewis & Co. 5—Inside sanitary water-closet (flush). Saw mill, with 5 or 6 male employees when in operation; outside privy in fair condition provided; appellants state they are about to make alterations to construction of mill, inasmuch as flush w. c. must be located where there is no danger of freezing, same will be installed in addition when constructed.

Recommendation—Extension of time until June 1, 1917, to erect addition with proper inside flush w. c. or a chemical w. c. to be provided by that date.

Premises affected, (4) Cooperstown, 55 Grove st.; appellant, John F. Brady & Co. 7—Provide inside sanitary flush water-closet. Have outside privy; permission asked for extension of time until spring to see if Village Board will provide a sewer, petition for installation of which has been made.

Recommendation—To July 1, 1917, to provide inside sanitary flush w. c. or install chemical water-closet.

Premises affected, (5) Fort Edward, Broadway, rear; appellant, J. G. Kimm. 1—Additional exit. 2—Sink with running water. 3—Suitable and convenient water-closet. 3-story; no sprinkler; combustibles carried; no fire alarm; 1 man occasionally employed above 2d floor. Exit: One interior unenclosed stairway. Grist mill used only for grinding feed. 3d floor visited once each day to oil machinery; r. r. trestle runs alongside of building at 2nd floor level, from 2d floor a large door opens on this trestle, making building practically 2 stories high. Mill building has no water supply or sewer; water-closet and wash sink provided in appellant's store on same lot with grist mill.

Recommendation—While present conditions remain, treat building as two stories high, and accept wash sink and running water. Not sufficient closet in building on same lot, waiving orders.

Premises affected, (6) Kingston, 14-16 Thomas st.; appellant, Herbery Brush Mfg. Co. 1—Prohibit factory occupancy above 2d floor. 7—Provide at least two means of exit. 4-story non-fireproof building used as brush factory; sprinkler installed; combustibles carried; no fire alarm; 8 males employed on 3d floor; 8 males employed also on 4th floor. Exit: One interior unenclosed stairway; imperfect fire escape on side of building with fireproof opening

6 feet 3 inches high by 3 feet 8 inches wide; balconies from 2d to 4th floors pitched at 72 degrees; f. p. doors and windows not closing; door at floor, obstructs passageway when open; balconies 3 feet wide by 10 feet long; stairs from 4th to 2d floor 18 inches wide; 2d floor to ground 30 inches wide, pitched at 50 degrees; distance between well and wall, 15 inches.

Recommendation—Inasmuch as building is sprinklered, with but 8 males on each of the 3rd and 4th floors, accept fire escape as compliance with No. 7 when all doors and windows have been made self-closing and door to 2d floor balcony placed at easterly end and arranged so as not to obstruct said balcony when open. Order No. 1 automatically waived when work done on No. 7 as called for.

Premises affected, (7) Kingston, 140-160 Hasbrouck ave.; appellant, Aaron Katz. 2—Proper safety device on elevator car. Hand power elevator used for hoisting bags of rags from 1st to 2d floors, distance of 10½ feet; elevator car supported by two steel cables, lifting capacity indicated as 2,000 lbs.; maximum load carried, 800 lbs.; no one permitted to ride on car; shaft properly enclosed, both 1st and 2d floors and openings protected by gates.

Recommendation—Waiver of order.

Premises affected, (8) Little Falls, Mohawk st.; appellant, Luca Gas and Electric Co. 13—Post "Not an Exit" sign on f. e. 15—Additional exit. 3-story and basement, non-fireproof building, open lot; sprinkler installed; combustibles carried; no fire alarm; one person employed on 3d floor at times. Exit: Interior stairway; doors open in, are not self-closing; no egress from roof; imperfect front fire escape, balconies connected by inclined ladder; non-fireproof openings 5½ feet by 3 feet; remote.

Recommendation—Accept f. e. on condition that not more than two persons be permitted to go to 3d floor for storage at any one time; no one allowed to work on 3d floor; "Exit" sign posted.

Premises affected, (9) New York City (Verified petition), 312 E. 3d st., rear, Manhattan; appellant, William Weiss. 6—Provide suitable and convenient w. c. on 3d, 4th, 5th and 6th floors for use of females; same to be separate and apart from that used by males, and to be properly screened, lighted and ventilated. 6-story rear tenant factory building with but one means of exit, viz.: imperfect exterior stairway; one water-closet located in workroom on each floor; same used by both sexes employed on that floor.

Occupancy: Floor, 6th; tenant, York & Sherman; goods manufactured, men's coats; males, 8; females, 1; waterclosets, 1. Floor, 5th; tenant, Samuel Spandau; goods manufactured, men's coats; males, 8; females, 3; waterclosets, 1. Floor, 4th; tenant, Samuel Schwartz; goods manufactured, men's coats; males, 8; females, 2; waterclosets, 1. Floor, 3rd; tenant, Solomon Rosenfeld; goods manufactured, vests; males, 3; females, 0; waterclosets, 1. Floor, 2nd; vacant. Floor, 1st; vacant.

It is proposed to set aside water-closet in workroom of Samuel Spandau on 5th floor for exclusive use of females on 4th, 5th and 6th floors. No females being at present employed on 3d floor. This would necessitate setting aside water-closet on 4th or 6th floors for exclusive use of males. The only means of reaching 5th floor from 4th and 6th floors is by means of an imperfect open exterior stairway, thus exposing employees to outdoor temperature and the elements in passing to and from waterclosets.

Recommendation—In view of the small number of employees of each sex, permission given to set aside water-closet on 5th floor (in workroom) for exclusive use of females on 4th, 5th and 6th floors, and set aside water-closet in 4th floor workroom for exclusive use of males on 4th and 5th floors on condition that the appellant file with this Department the written permission of the tenants of 4th and 5th floors that said water-closets will be set apart as above specified and will be accessible at all times to said employees, and further that the exterior stairway be enclosed to protect said employees from the elements and exposure to temperature, while there be no increase in occupancy of either males or females on these floors.

Premises affected, (10) Olean; appellant, Clark Bros. Co. 3—Cleaning room for chipping of castings. It is stated that the cleaning of castings is done at night. In this event, a cleaning room is not necessary. There is provided a partition of wire mesh, which is little protection to others when chippers are at work on factory floor; cleaning barrels have exhaust system with dust going to collecting bins on the outside of the foundry; sand blast room is entirely enclosed.

Recommendation—Waiver of order on condition that all cleaning of castings and blowing out of cores be done at night, and further that instead of wire mesh they erect a three-sided solid partition, each side to be eight feet in length, thus forming a hollow square, and see to it that all chipping is done within this enclosure.

Premises affected, (11) Oneonta, 32-34 Broad st.; appellant, Chas. Smith. 1—Prohibit factory occupancy. 2—Additional exit. 4-story non-fireproof factory building; open lifts; no sprinklers; combustibles; no fire alarm system installed; occupancy above 2d floor, one occasionally. Exits: One interior stairway, unenclosed; no egress from roof; imperfect rear fire escape, with non-fireproof openings 5½ x 3 feet; exits remote.

Recommendation—While present occupancy and conditions obtain, the acceptance of the present balcony fire escape, with wooden floors and straight ladders between balconies, on condition that such a ladder be provided from 2d floor balcony to ground, and further that no more than two males be permitted at any one time to go to either the 3rd or 4th floors, and then only to get or deposit stock.

Premises affected, (12) Oswego, 84 E. 1st st.; appellant, Herman L. Bates. 1—Sanitary flush water-closet for females; one-story, no cellar, area 550 sq. ft., used as small printing shop; occasionally one girl employed to operate press; the tenant goes across the street or next door, as does also his male employees.

Recommendation—Compliance with order by installation of a chemical w. closet.

Premises affected, (13) Poughkeepsie, 375 Mill st.; appellant, Francis Burdett Warring. 1—Two w. c.'s for 3d floor females. 2—2 additional wash basins for females and 1 for males. 3d floor. 3—Paint brick walls and woodwork of halls. 6—Self-closing gates, 5 feet 6 inches high at basement elevator entrance at No. 1. 66 to 75 females on 3d floor, 4 waterclosets provided. Order should have called for two additional w. c.'s. No. 2 appeal from last clause requiring wash basin for males. 2 males employed on this floor who use wash basin on floor below. No. 3 building comparatively new, stair hall enclosure just completed; woodwork has been filled with oil or varnish, brickwork, cement and woodwork all in clean and sanitary condition. No. 6, Present gate 3 feet 6 inches high, 11 inches from shaftway line.

no dressing room; No. 2 building comparatively new, woodwork filled with oil or varnish filler; walls are of brick. All walls and woodwork in clean and sanitary condition; record on file shows No. 3 to be complied with.

Recommendation—No. 1 to be complied with; No. 2 waived.

Premises affected, (15) Chili-Scottville road; appellant, Rochester German Brick and Tile Co. Plants located on Brooks ave., Gates. Provide inside sanitary flush waterclosets for use of employees. Provide wash sinks and running water. These plants are located where there is no sewerage, and the nature of the soil is such that a cesspool would not be satisfactory.

Recommendation—Accept outside vault waterclosets on condition that a sufficient number be provided and that same are kept in clean and sanitary condition, at all times, also accept a "Service Building," wherein will be provided a washroom and lunchroom, same to be adjacent to kilns on south side, wash room to be of ample size, properly lighted and to contain at least 20 inches of enameled sink space with running water for each 15 persons employed.

Premises affected, (16) Gates, Brooks ave.; appellant, Rochester German Brick and Tile Co. Plants located on Brooks ave., Gates. Provide inside sanitary flush waterclosets for use of employees. Provide wash sinks and running water. These plants are located where there is no sewerage, and the nature of the soil is such that a cesspool would not be satisfactory.

Recommendation—Accept a washroom to be located adjacent to water trough; to be properly lighted and contain 20 inches of enameled sink space with running water for each 15 persons employed, and accept outside vault waterclosets while present conditions obtain, provided a sufficient number be installed and same are maintained in a clean and sanitary condition at all times.

Premises affected, (17) Rochester, 635 St. Paul st.; appellant, Rausch & Lomb Optical Co. Reduce occupancy 6th floor Building No. 7 or provide additional means of exit therefrom. 6-story building, sprinklered, fire alarm system installed, 244 on 6th floor; a 46-inch h. e. inch fireproof enclosed stairway, a 60-inch h. e. to be provided from 6th floor to roof of 5-story building, known as 3a, and from thence to roof of 5-story building known as 5a, with access to fireproof enclosed stairway in building 5a.

Recommendation—When horizontal exit is provided, allow occupancy on each 18 inches of width instead of 22 inches.

Premises affected, (18) Rochester, 367 Orchard st.; appellant, Alderman-Fairchild Co. 1—Arrange Nos. 1 and 2 stairway doors to open outwardly or be double-swing doors. 4-story fireproof factory building; open lofts; sprinkler installed; combustibles carried; fire alarm signal system installed; occupancy above the 2d floor, 116. Exits: Two interior stairways enclosed with fireproof partitions; openings equipped with self-closing sliding doors; no egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exit on 2d floor.

Recommendation—Order to be complied with or doors to be kept open at all times and openings equipped with double-swing wooden doors to prevent draughts and accumulation of smoke in halls in event of fire.

Premises affected, (19) Rochester, 10 Graves st.; appellant, F. P. Vanloesen Co. 3—Additional exit, 5-story; open lofts; sprinkler installed; one source of water supply; combustibles carried; no fire alarm system; occupancy above the 2d floor, 2. 1st floor used for mercantile purposes, with 2 employees; 2d floor factory, not more than 6 employees; 3d, 4th, 5th floors storage, not more than two employees on all 3 floors. Exits: No. 1, interior stairway unenclosed; no egress from roof; straight ladder fire escape and balconies with straight ladder terminating on top roof of one-story garage; exits remote.

Recommendation—Provide stationary ladder on wall of building near end of roof of one-story garage which shall extend to ground, accepted while present occupancy and conditions obtain.

Premises affected, (20) Rochester, 57 Gorham st.; appellant, Empire Moulding Works. 4—Exhaust system for dust from machinery. Only 3 or 4 machines that would be required to be connected to exhaust; machinery used for little, sometimes not more than 2 hours daily, and then only at intervals; 6 employees in plant.

Recommendation—Waiver of order if canvas enclosures are installed around machine tables to prevent spread of dust.

Premises affected, (21) Saratoga Spa, So. Franklin and Ash sts.; appellant, Tarrant Mfg. Co. 1—Cease factory occupancy on 3d floor. 2—Two additional means of exit, 3-story non-fireproof building used for manufacturing of heating kettles; building 40 x 60 feet; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; no one regularly employed above 2d floor; 3d floor is used for storage and visited occasionally for storing or removing material. Exit: One interior unenclosed stairway at westerly end of building.

Recommendation—A stationary ladder to be provided alongside of doors used for hoisting purposes, same to extend from 3d floor to ground at easterly end of building.

Premises affected, (22) Shortsville, Main st.; appellant, Pape Machine Co. 3—Additional exit from 3d floor. 3-story non-fireproof building, open lofts; no sprinklers; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy above 2d floor, 4. Exits: an interior stairway running along the northerly fire wall and extending from 1st to 3d floors; a stairway running from 1st to 2nd floors along the southerly fire wall on one side and from 2d to 3rd floors on the other side of same fire wall, stairway along the southerly wall from 1st to 2nd floors. An opening in each fire wall 42 inches wide on all floors, protected by double fire doors. No egress from roof.

Recommendation—Accept while present occupancy and condition prevail; an exterior wooden stairway from 2d floor to ground, located at westerly end of building; orders 2 and 3 to be waived, and when No. 4 has been complied with as above.

Premises affected, (24) Yonkers, 64 Main st.; appellant, Kenneth Mackay & Co. 1—Fire alarm signal system. T. F. 4-story building; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy above 1st floor, 26; largest number ever employed, 42; building, 23 x 58 feet in area. Exits: One interior stairway not properly enclosed with fire resisting partitions; imperfect horizontal exits on 3d and 4th floors.

Recommendation—Class B system according to requirements of Rule 375.

Premises affected, (25) Yonkers, 226 South Broadway; appellant, Samuel Chadburn. 10—Vestibule waterclosets, 25—Buffs in elevator pit. Waterclosets located in 2d floor workroom where only males are employed; carriage hoist type elevator, hydraulic power; slow running; takes 1 minute 50 seconds to travel 13 feet; car platform about 20 feet long.

Recommendation—Waiver of No. 10 while only

males employed on 2d floor; waiver of No. 25 while present conditions prevail.

Premises affected, (26) Little Falls, 44 W. Main st.; appellants, Chas. A. Ross, Abram Zoller. 17—Additional exit, 2-story fireproof factory building erected since Oct. 1, 1913, and used as a garage; no sprinklers; combustibles carried; no fire alarm; occupancy above 1st floor, 3; one interior stairway not enclosed with fireproof partitions; no fireproof passageway to street; stairway at rear of building; in the rear of the building opposite the stairway is a platform with stairs to top of hill; no exit from front of building at 2d floor.

Recommendation—Acceptance of fire escape on easterly wall toward the front of building.

AND it appearing from the facts above set forth that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardships in carrying out the provisions of the law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Commission on the premises noted herein, and that in granting the variation recommended in each case the spirit of the law and of the rules and regulations will be observed and public safety secured for the employees in such buildings, and


