

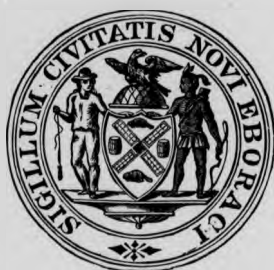

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending December 6, 1884.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 3, 1884—REGULAR MEETING—10 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Viele (President), Wales, Crimmins, and Olhffe.

The following communications were received :

From James Thompson and Josiah A. Osgood, applying for a license to place and operate "swan velocipede boats" on the Central Park lake.

From the Commissioner of Public Works, replying to a communication from this Department in relation to the condition of the sewer basins on streets adjoining Riverside Drive.

From Joseph A. Stárk, applying for permission to establish public conveniences in the principal squares and parks of the city.

From August Braum, applying for the privilege of letting skates and chairs for hire at the Central Park lake during the coming skating season.

From Solomon Berliner and John Paul, petitioning for the opening of One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, between Third and Elton avenues.

From Dennis W. Moran, in relation to the delay in the completion of the work on his contract for regulating and grading One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, from North Third avenue to Willis avenue.

From Mrs. S. A. Ulings, asking that her husband, Thomas Ulings, be reinstated to his former position on the Police Force of the Department.

From Wilson Macdonald, giving a list and an estimate of the cost of repairing statues, groups, and models in marble, bronze, plaster and composition, now in the Central Park.

The President, to whom was referred a communication from James H. Perkins, asking to be allowed for losses claimed to have been incurred in regulating, grading, etc., One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Boston road and Union avenue, made a verbal report, and submitted a report from the Engineer of Construction in relation to the same, stating, that upon examination he had found that Mr. Perkins claimed damages,

1st. On account of suspension and change of grade ;

2d. On account of change in width of Delmonico place ;

3d. For excess of time of Inspectors. That by the change of grade, the quantities were materially altered from the Engineer's estimate as shown in the contract, for which alteration of grade provision was made in the contract.

That in changing the width of Delmonico place the contractor is entitled only to such work as was required to be changed, and recommending that pay be allowed for relaying 221.6 square feet of bridge-stones, at the rate of twenty cents per square foot, which amount should cover the expense of transporting to and from the work 72 square feet that were not required for the change, and that he paid for 33.2 lineal feet of curb-stone, and 26.8 lineal feet of gutter-stone taken and relaid, at the contract price.

That the excess of Inspector's time was fifty days, at \$3 per day, amounting to \$150, and recommending that the same be remitted.

On motion, said report was adopted, and the Engineer of Construction was directed to prepare the final estimate on the work of grading, etc., One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, in accordance with the recommendations made by him.

The Engineer of Construction was directed to remove all impediments in the way of the contractor for grading One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, between North Third and Willis avenues, in order that he may complete his work without further delay.

The Engineer of Construction was directed to confer with the Engineer in charge of sewers of the Department of Public Works, in relation to the sewer-basins on streets adjoining Riverside Drive, referred to in the communication from the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Engineer of Construction was directed to prepare and submit plans and estimates for widening the roadway of One Hundred and Tenth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues, by reducing the width of the park sidewalk six feet six inches.
