

The President presented the following additional rules and regulations which, on motion, were

approved and adopted:

In order that complaints from citizens may receive the most prompt attention, they will hereafter have precedence over those made by Department officials. At no time will they be delayed, as a personal convenience, or by accumulation for transmitting, nor will action upon them be deferred for any reason whatsoever. As soon as one has been received and recorded in the office of the Sanitary Superintendent, it will be referred to the proper division, and immediately, always within the same day, transmitted to an inspector. Upon its receipt by an inspector he will make the inspection at once, always within the same day if received before noon, and return it with his report thereon to the Chief of his Division twenty-four hours after the complaint has been received by him. Those of the inspectors of the First Division will be mailed or delivered in person on the day of inspection. An inspector failing in this, from any cause, will indorse upon his report the reasons therefor. Upon its return to the Chief of the Division it will be recorded, and if a cause of complaint has been found to exist, at once transmitted to the Board for the issuing of an order.

Chiefs of Divisions will be held responsible for the observance by those under them of these instructions, and for any delays in their respective offices.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 24, 1885 :

January 24, 1885:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,428.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,340.

During the past week 195 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 39 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 33 permits.

There was issued, under the Sanitary Code 1 miscellaneous permit.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 58 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 49 visits were made, and 49 disinfections and 16 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 13.

The number of vaccinations performed was 792, of which 73 were primary and 719 re-vaccinations

There were seized and condemned 9,345 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 42, the number of analyses of same made, 5, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 8, and the amount of fines imposed

The certificates of 556 births, 54 still-births, 169 marriages, and 650 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 24, 1885. This shows a decrease of 80 births, 14 still-births, and 34 marriages and an increase of 7 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was an increase of 4 births and 58 deaths, and a decrease of 4 still-births and 31 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 4; diphtheria, 2; croup, 2; erysipelas, 7; diarrhœal diseases, 16; cancer, 2; pneumonia, 10; aneurism, 2; convulsions, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 4; suicide, 5, and drowning, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 8; whooping cough, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 10; bronchitis, 3; heart diseases, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, and gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

• The ages of 135 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 201 under two years, 257 under five years, and 49 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 6 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 39.54 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 140 were in institutions, 358 in tenement-houses, 138 in houses containing three families or less, 11 in hotels and boarding-houses, 2 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 120 on the first, 163 on the second, 125 on the third, 73 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 650 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 66 were stated to be single, 170 married, 77 widowed, and the condition of 337 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week is as follows, viz.: City deaths, 650; still-births, 54; bodies in transitu, 8; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 63 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 556 births, 169 marriages, 54 still-births, 650 deaths; 8 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 135 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 12 transcripts of the birth record, 12 of marriage, and 65 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 24, 1885, was 21.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.072, the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,853, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.55 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory. Central Park vatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 615 deaths and still-births, or 87.36 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 23; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 245; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 92; Greenwood (undenominational), 38; Lutheran (undenominational), 96; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 17; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 10; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 15.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending January 17, 1885, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 6; Second, 0; Third, 3; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 8; Seventh, 27; Eighth, 19; Ninth, 23; Tenth, 19; Eleventh, 22; Twelfth, 76; Thirteenth, 16; Fourteenth, 23; Fifteenth, 14; Sixteenth, 14; Seventeenth, 39; Eighteenth, 35; Nineteenth, 117; Twentieth, 30; Twenty-first, 52; Twenty-second, 53; Twenty-third, 12; Twenty-fourth, 1.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 17, 1885, was 624; this is 33 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1884, and 8.2 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.53 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,379,212.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 24.32; Boston, 25.84; New Orleans, 38.47; Richmond, 24.96; Charleston, 42.76; Erie, 7.03; Lowell, 15.28; Worcester, 27.00; Cambridge, 23.00; Fall River, 16.58; Lawrence, 11.42; Lynn, 12.74; Springfield, 13.65; Pittsburgh, 21.38. Monthly returns—District of Columbia, 21.90; Milwaukee, 15.8; Lansing, 15.94; Nashville, 20.16; Macon, 9.82.
