



Bureau of Elections.

Whereas, Sections 1850 and 1852 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, cited as the New York Consolidation Act, require the Board of Police annually, in the months of August and September, to select four persons, two of whom shall be of opposite political faith on State issues from their associates, to serve as Inspectors of Elections, and two persons in like manner of opposite political faith from each other to serve as Poll Clerks in each election district of the City of New York; therefore be it

Resolved, That lists be received and applications are hereby invited, until the 2d day of August next, with name, age, residence, occupation and political faith on State issues, of proper persons for the positions above named, and the names of said applicants to be published in the CITY RECORD, for public scrutiny.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending June 12, 1886, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending June 5, 1886

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 597 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 12, 1886, which is an increase of 20, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 4 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending June 5, 1886, was 577, which is 53.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.89 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,436,089.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY-OWNERS.

IN PURSUANCE OF SECTION 997 OF THE "New York City Consolidation Act of 1882," the Comptroller of the City of New York hereby gives public notice to all persons, owners of property affected by the assessment list for

Gansevoort street widening, between Washington street and West Thirteenth street, and West Thirteenth street, between Gansevoort street and Eighth avenue—which was confirmed by the Supreme Court, March 9, 1886, and entered on the 17th day of March, 1886, in the Record of Titles of Assessments, kept in the "Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," that unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of the assessment, interest will be collected thereon as provided in section 998 of said "New York City Consolidation Act of 1882."

Section 998 of the said act provides that, "If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said Record of Titles of Assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment."

The above assessment is payable to the Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears, at the "Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," Room 31, Stewart Building, between the hours of 9 A. M. and 2 P.
