The certificates of 785 births, 59 still-births, 212 marriages and 740 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 11, 1888. This shows a decrease of 21 births, to still-births, 226 marriages and 91 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1889. There was an increase of 190 births, and a decrease of 2 still-births, 92 marriages and 11 deaths. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, aneurism and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 134 were in institutions, 430 in tenementhouses, 157 in houses containing three families or less, 11 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 126 on the first, 174 on the second, 158 on the third, 89 on the fourth, 37 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth ; 724 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 16 non-residents; 95 were stated to be single, 196 married, 81 wildowed, and the condition of 368 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 11, 1888, was 26.4 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.824; the mean humidity was 93, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,486, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.97 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Whereas, The Society of Old Brooklynites, of the City of Brooklyn, has presented a petition to the Congress of the United States for the erection of a monument on Fort Greene, in said city, to commemorate the virtues of those Martyrs of the cause of Liberty who died on board the prison ships at the Wallabout during the war of the Revolution; and Whereas, In the opinion of this Common Council, it is the duty of Congress to fitly commemo-rate the manly virtues and stern patriotism of more than twelve thousand citizens of the United States, who, when prisoners of war, refused to purchase their lives by enlisting in the service of the enemy, and preferred death to dishonor; therefore Resolved, That this Common Council heartily indorse the patriotic efforts of the Society of Old Brooklynites, and earnestly request the members of Congress from this city and State to favor, by all honorable means in their power, the passage of the bill now pending for the erection of the proposed monument in honor of the 'Mattyrs of the prison ships.'' Resolved, That a certified copy of the foregoing preamble and resolutions, under the seal of the city, be forwarded to every member of Congress from this city.
