SIR—There were 1,102 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 16, 1887, which is a decrease of 174, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 210 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending July 9, 1887, was 1,188, which is 196.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 41.66 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,482,886.
