



Resolutions.

That copies of the tract on diphtheria, already printed by this Board, be transmitted to those in charge of cases of this disease.
That the Sanitary Superintendent order inspections to be made as far as possible of all cases of this disease, with a view to ascertain and eradicate any local cause (the Committee to whom this was referred having ceased their inspection).
That in the opinion of this Board it is necessary to the preservation of the public health, and the prevention of disease in the district near One Hundred and Fifty-first street, that the nuisance complained of between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, in the said street, from want of proper and sufficient sewer, be at once remedied; and that a sewer be constructed in One Hundred and Fifty-first street, such that all the drains of the houses and stable in One Hundred and Fifty-second street, and at the northwest corner of Eleventh avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-first street be made to discharge therein.

That a copy of the report of Assistant Sanitary Inspector Comfort be forwarded to the Corporation Counsel, and he be respectfully requested to have the necessary measures taken to have the said street declared open, and the above-mentioned sewer constructed.

That the application for relief from order No. 2428, on premises 78 Warren street, be enforced.

That the complaint against Swift & White, contractors, be dismissed.

That Order No. 3287, on premises 134½ Ludlow street, be extended to October 25, 1875.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized and directed to transfer the following-named Assistant Sanitary Inspectors to the Temporary Vaccinating Corps from October 10, 1875: William F. Lane, Edward C. Passmore, Joseph T. O'Connor, and John B. White.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 9, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,067, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 1,021 tenement houses, 137 private dwellings, 70 other dwellings, 14 manufactorys and workshops, 14 stores and warehouses, 53 stables, 77 slaughter-houses, 1 offal dock, 11 manure dumps, 19 fat-rendering establishments, 1 stock yard, 1 roadway, 26 sunken and vacant lots, 81 courts, yards, and areas, 87 cellars and basements, 85 waste-pipes and drains, 207 privies and water-closets, 82 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 33 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 2 violations of the Code, 1 piggery, 4 dangerous chimneys, 14 other nuisances, 23 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 777.

During the past week 63 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

26 permits have been issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

98 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 47 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 35 houses, 35 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

20 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 1 dead body to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending October 9, 1875: Typhus fever, 3; typhoid fever, 24; scarlet fever, 17; cerebro-spinal meningitis, 3; measles, 3; diphtheria, 109; and small-pox, 31.

11 tanks and 2,067 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending October 9, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending October 9, 1875: Calves (case), 4 carcasses; sheep, 1 carcass; beef, 35 pounds; poultry, 192 pounds; and fish, 4,300 pounds.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held October 6, 1875.

Present—Hon. William H. Wickham, Mayor, (Chairman); Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Magnus Gross, Esq., Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the bids for Ferry Franchises received September 23, 1875, in response to the advertisement of September 7, 1875, as follows, viz:

Ferry (franchise only) from the foot of Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, L. I., or five years. Shepherd Knapp and Edward S. Knapp, \$1,500 per annum, for term of ten years.

Ferry (franchise only) from the foot of Barclay street, North river, to Hoboken, N. J., for two years. Hoboken Land and Improvement Company, W. W. Shippen, President; two and one-half per cent. on the gross receipts at Barclay street.

Ferry from foot of Grand street, East river, to Grand street, Brooklyn, E. D., including such wharf property as shall have been heretofore used by the ferry run from these points; for ten years, subject to payment of \$2,000 per annum, for first five years, and \$3,000 per annum, for second five years, rent.

The New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company, James A. Asleck, Secretary, \$3,000 per annum for first five years, and \$4,000 per annum for second five years.

Ferry from the north side of Twenty-third street, East river, as now occupied, to Green Point, L. I., for five years, subject to \$2,000 per annum rent.

Shepherd Knapp and Edward S. Knapp, \$3,500 per annum for term of ten years.

Ferry from foot of Desbrosses street, North river, to Jersey City, N. J., for one year, subject to \$3,000 per annum rent.

Associates of the Jersey Company, A. L. Dennis, President, \$1,000 per annum.

Ferry from the foot of Chambers street, North river, to Pavonia, N. J., for one year, subject to \$15,000 per year rent.

Erie Railway Company, H. J. Jewett, Receiver, two and one-half per cent. on gross receipts, in addition to \$15,000 rent.

On motion of the Chamberlain, the following resolutions, submitted by the Comptroller, were adopted, viz:

Resolved, That the franchise of the ferry from the foot of Barclay street, North river, to Hoboken, New Jersey, for the term of two years, from October 1, 1875, be awarded to the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company, at an annual rent of two and one-half (2½) per centum on the gross receipts; and that the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to prepare a lease therefor, with the usual covenants, and in accordance with the terms of the advertisement of the Corporation sale of ferry franchises of September 23, 1875.

Resolved, That the franchise of the ferry from the foot of Chambers street, North river, to Pavonia, New Jersey, be awarded to H. J. Jewett, as Receiver for the Erie Railway Company, for the term of one year from May 1, 1875, at an annual rent of two and one-half per centum on the gross receipts, subject to fifteen thousand dollars per year rent, as fixed by the Department of Docks, for the use of the pier or wharf property belonging to the city; and that the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to prepare a lease therefor, with the usual covenants, and in accordance with the terms of the advertisement of the Corporation sale of ferry franchises of September 23, 1875.

Resolved, That the bids received for the following-named ferries, viz:

First—From the foot of Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, L. I.;

Second—From the foot of Grand street, East river, to Grand street, Brooklyn, E. D.;

Third—From the foot of Twenty-third street, East river, to Greenpoint, L. I.; and

Fourth—From the foot of Desbrosses street, North river, to Jersey City, New Jersey;

—not being in accordance with the terms of the advertisement made by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of September 7, 1875, be and the same are hereby rejected, and that the Comptroller is hereby authorized to re-advertise and to take all other necessary measures to lease the franchise of the said ferries, such measures to be taken in accordance with the conditions approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at their meeting held April 1, 1874.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the application of the Board of Education, for site for Grammar School, east side of Lexington avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth street, submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz:

Resolved, That the premises commencing at the northeast corner of Lexington avenue and Sixty-seventh street; running thence north along the easterly side of Lexington avenue 100 feet 5 inches to the line of the centre of the block between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets; thence east along such centre line 125 feet; thence south, parallel to Lexington avenue, 100 feet 5 inches to the north-easterly line or side of Sixty-seventh street; and thence west along the northerly side of Sixty-seventh street, 125 feet to the point of beginning, be and the same are hereby assigned to the Board of Education of the City of New York, for the erection of an edifice for a grammar or primary school, and for the use of said Board during the time that such premises are occupied and used for common school purposes.

The application of James W. Beekman, for quit-claim or gore of land corner of Fourth avenue and Sixty-fifth street, to remove cloud from title, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Counsel to the Corporation.

The following applications were received and referred to the Comptroller, with power, viz:

Application of John Walsh, to have money paid by him on lots Nos. 54 and 55 Fort Gansevoort property (sale of October 1867), returned to him with interest.

Application of executrix of Morty Forhan, to be allowed interest on money paid on lots Nos. 12 and 13, Fort Gansevoort property (sale of October, 1867), to date of possession, to be credited upon the interest due upon the bond and mortgage on said lots.

Application of executors of estate of Adam Treadwell, deceased, for return of amount overpaid on account of "Street Vault," southeast corner of Greenwich and Murray streets.

Application of Man & Parsons, on behalf of the heirs of Adon Smith, "for a release from any right claimed by the city," to certain lots between One Hundred and Eighth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, near the First avenue, Harlem river.

A communication was received from Fitz John Porter, Esq., Commissioner of Public Works, in relation to claim of Bradish Johnson & Sons, for return of portion of the water rent paid for the year ending May 1, 1875, on premises in West Sixteenth street, occupied as a sugar refinery, all operations in said refinery having ceased before November 1, 1874; which, on motion, was laid over for consideration.

A communication was received from Fitz John Porter, Commissioner of Public Works, in relation to the continued use of two lots, Fort Gansevoort property, by the Department of Public Works as a Corporation Yard; which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

The following communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks, viz:

CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS,
NEW YORK, September 1, 1875.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to advise that at a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held this day, the following preamble and resolution was adopted:

Whereas, This Department having decided to proceed with the work of building new Pier No. 42, North river, with adjoining bulkhead, it is deemed advisable that an alteration be made in the width of said pier, as laid down on the plans adopted by this Department; be it, therefore,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of the act, passed May 16, 1872, entitled An act to amend certain provisions of law relating to wharves, piers, and bulkheads in the City of New York, application be and the same is hereby made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to change the plans as adopted by said Commissioners and the Commissioners of Docks, so that two (2) feet may be taken from the southerly side of new Pier No. 42, North river, and 13 feet taken away from the northerly side of said pier, making the width thereof 75 feet, instead of 90 feet, as at present laid down; and that tracings of the pier referred to be transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

Pursuant to said resolution enclosed herewith please find tracings in duplicate.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby consent to and approve of the proposed alteration in the width of Pier No. 42, North river, as designated in the foregoing resolution of the Commissioner of Docks.

The following communication from the Commissioners of Docks was also received, viz:

CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS,
NEW YORK, October 6, 1875.

Hon. WILLIAM H. WICKHAM,
Chairman, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I have the honor to advise, that at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Board governing this Department, held this day, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, This Department, on or about the 1st of June, 1875, entered into an agreement with the Erie Railway Company, as per resolution adopted by this Board on the 14th of July, to lease for a term of years certain wharf property to be constructed on the new plans, as adopted by this Department, on the North river, located in the vicinity of the premises at the foot of Chambers street, North river, now occupied by said company for ferry and terminal purposes; and

Whereas, It is the intention of this Department to erect in front of the 560 feet of bulkhead included in said lease, three new piers of the dimensions hereinafter stated, and to be located upon the lines not laid down on the plans for that district of the water-front heretofore adopted by this Board and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; therefore it is

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby respectfully requested, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 738 of the Laws of 1872, to consent to and approve of the following changes in the width and location of the proposed piers, as shown on the accompanying diagram, to wit: That the lines of new piers, Nos. 19, 20, and 21, as laid down on the map prepared by this Department, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 27th April, 1871, be changed and annulled, and that in place thereof be substituted the lines for three new piers, to be also designated as Piers 19, 20, and 21, and to be of the following dimensions, to wit: Pier 19, 600 feet by 60 feet; Pier 20, 596 feet by 100 feet; Pier 21, 589 feet by 100 feet; the northerly line of proposed Pier 19 to be about 48 feet north of the northerly line of Pier 19 now established; the southerly line of Pier 20 to be distant about 160 feet from the northerly line of new Pier 19, as proposed to be established; and the southerly line of Pier 21 to be distant about 200 feet from the northerly line of Pier 20, as proposed to be established.

APPROVED PAPERS.

Orainances, Resolution, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending October 9, 1875.

Whereas, From the result of the deliberations of the State Board of Equalization, based on the estimates of the valuation of the State Assessors, it is evident, that under the present system, no relief will be afforded the City and County of New York, but the unequal ratio of State taxes, burdened upon it for years, continued; and

Whereas, It is well known that the value of real estate in the City of New York, as estimated for the years 1873 and 1874, and on which the State Assessors have based their ratios of assessment,

has depreciated full twenty-five per cent., if not more, in the city, while the same cannot be said of the counties, and the State Assessors, as far as it concerns the City of New York, have wholly disregarded this fact, and its enunciation as expressed in the estimates of our local assessors, showing the full value of the city property to be one billion three hundred and ninety-four million four hundred and eighty-eight thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars, against one billion nine hundred and thirty-five million twenty-one thousand five hundred and forty dollars, as in the table of the State Assessors; and

Whereas, The exhibit of the State Assessors, made before the State Board of Equalization, shows that, while they have added to the full valuation of property as presented by our local assessors not less than five hundred and forty million five hundred and thirty-two thousand five hundred and seventy-four dollars, they at the same time have diminished the valuation of local assessors in other cases, as, for instance, in Cayuga County, the home of State Assessor Fowler, from forty-six million two hundred and twenty-five thousand seven hundred and nine dollars to thirty-eight million seven hundred and forty-two thousand and ninety-three dollars; in Seneca County, the home of State Assessor Hadley, from twenty-two million eight hundred and forty-four thousand and twenty-five dollars to nineteen million six hundred and seventy-seven thousand five hundred and ten dollars; and in Albany, Erie, Onondaga, Steuben, Washington, and other counties, the homes of one or another member of the State Board of Equalization, reductions from the valuation of the local assessors have been made by the State Assessors amounting to from seven to ten and seventeen millions of dollars in several single cases; and

Whereas, By this arbitrary, unjust, and self-interested proceeding of the State Assessors, and a majority of the State Board of Equalization—Lieutenant-Governor Dorsheimer, State Treasurer Raines, and State Assessor Briggs, from Kings County, only voting in favor of justice and fairness—one million two hundred and fifty-four thousand four hundred and seventy-six dollars more taxes have been put upon this city than could be justly claimed by the State, while the rest of the State has been unduly relieved from the same amount of taxation, burdening on the city for the value of its assessed property eight million twelve thousand three hundred and eighty-six dollars, where it should have been six million seven hundred and fifty-seven thousand nine hundred and ten dollars, and telling off the balance of the State with seven million seven hundred and fifteen thousand and ninety-six dollars, instead of imposing upon it eight million nine hundred and sixty-nine thousand five hundred and seventy-two dollars; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board, as the representative of the citizens and taxpayers of the City and County of New York, do earnestly protest against the continued unjust treatment this overburdened community, in spite of all protestations, is receiving at the hands of the State Assessors and the State Board of Equalization;

Resolved, That the Committee on Finance be and is herewith instructed to give this matter of State taxation their due consideration, in order to suggest to this Board such remedies as in their opinion may tend to relieve this city from a continuance of such unwarranted extortion;

Resolved, That the thanks of this Board, and of the citizens at large, are due to the Commissioners, George H. Andrews, Wilson G. Hunt, and Isaac Sherman, appointed agreeably to a resolution of this Board by his Honor the Mayor, and with a view of convincing the State Assessors and the State Board of Equalization of the wrongful burdens imposed upon this city for a number of years, and of impressing them with the justice of final relief, said Commissioners having spared no efforts, by means of facts and arguments submitted to the aforesaid State Boards, to attain such end;

Resolved, That the Commissioners aforesaid are herewith requested to submit to this Board, directly or through his Honor the Mayor, a full report of all such matter and facts as in their opinion may aid this Board in continuing its exertions in the same direction.
