The following communications were received from the Sanitary Superintendent: First—Weekly reports of the Sanitary Superintendent. Ordered on file. Second—Weekly reports from the Willard Parker, Reception, Riverside and Kingston Avenue hospitals. Ordered on file.

Third—Certificates in respect to the vacation of premises at No. 35 East Broadway and No. 84 Bowery, Borough of Manhattan.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot No. 35 East Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, has become dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants,

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 35 East Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, be required to vacate said building on or before October 30, 1906, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

And further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot No. 84 Bowery, in the Borough of Manhattan, has become dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the drainage

thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 84 Bowery, in the Borough of Manhattan, be required to vacate said building on or before October 30, 1906, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

And further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent.

The work done along the line of the aqueduct, during the quarter ending June 30, 1905, has been as follows:

Division No. 1—The work on this division has consisted of cleaning screens in the new gate house; collecting and removing dead fish and driftwood from the shores of the lake; keeping the roads and gutters around new gate house clear of grass and weeds; building a telephone line from the Keeper's house to the new gate house, and from there to Cornell Dam, and removing the poles of the old line.

Division No. 2—The work on this division has been building dry stone retaining walls; taking down the derrick at Shaft No. 5; building wooden cross-road bridges; looking after telephone line and removing old telephone poles; building, repairing and painting fences; filling and grading and making screens for the aqueduct.

Division No. 3—The work on this division has been building, repairing and painting fences and cutting grass.

Division No. 4—The work on this division has been building a retaining wall and excavating, filling and grading for the same; building, repairing and painting fences; cutting grass, hauling stone, cleaning cross walks, culverts, drains and gutters, and cleaning up aqueduct grounds.

Division No. 5—The work on this division has been building retaining walls and filling, grading and excavating for the same; building, repairing and painting fences; cleaning culverts and gutters; cutting grass and cleaning up line of the aqueduct. A water gauge has been put in at the Dunwoodie gate house.

Division No. 6—Work on this division has been building and repairing fences; cleaning machinery in the gate house; taking up the old board walk; filling and grading and cleaning around head house on the new aqueduct, and cutting the grass.

Division No. 7—The work on this division has been repairing the Keeper's house; repairing the steps leading down from the High Bridge reservoir; pointing the brick-work in the old aqueduct and in the furnaces at One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street pumping station; painting in the Keeper's house and in the tower; cleaning the surface of the water of the High Bridge reservoir; keeping the bridge stairs and line of the aqueduct clean and the grass cut.

Division No. 8—The work on this division has been putting in new window sash in south gate house and new toilet at the One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street gate house; painting at the Ninety-eighth street pumping station; cleaning slope walls; setting fence posts; cleaning the screens at the north and south gate houses; cleaning the air cocks at Eighth avenue and Ninety-seventh street; cleaning blow-off cocks at Ninety-seventh street and Transverse road; painting 1,200 fence posts; cutting grass on the banks of the reservoir; cleaning screens of Ninety-second and Ninety-third street gate houses; keeping the surface of the water clean; patrolling Central Park reservoir and pipe lines.

Titicus and Amawalk Reservoirs—The work done in the Westchester Division of the Croton watershed has been as follows:

The forces at Amawalk and Titicus dams have been engaged in repairing the posts and rail fences around the reservoirs; building new fences and repairing fence gates.

Flashboards, 24 inches high, have been placed on the spillways at both reservoirs, at Amawalk on June 23 and at Titicus on June 30, and this will increase the storage capacity at Amawalk 394,000,000 gallons; at Titicus, 450,000,000 gallons. Total, 844,000,000 gallons.

Water samples have been collected each week and sent to the laboratories at Katonah and Brooklyn.

A sanitary patrol has been maintained.

East Branch Reservoir—The work at this reservoir has been cleaning gate houses, gate valves and vaults; cutting brush and gutters on the banks of the reservoirs; cleaning roadway at Sodam Dam; rebuilding stone fence wall; putting in riprap along the river; building and repairing fences; painting masonry and coping of dam; repairing road near Milltown and collecting samples of water each week for the laboratory.

The work on the East Branch improvement is progressing nicely, and can be finished by the expiration of the extended time if vigorously pushed.

West Branch Reservoir—The work at this reservoir has been cutting brush between auxiliary and main dams; repairing the road across the causeway and the road between Carmel and Boyd's; repairing fence wall across the causeway; laying paving at the iron bridge at the upper end of the reservoir; repairing the roadway across the Whang fill at the north end of the reservoir; repairing and straightening fences; repairing the slope paving on each side of the roadway on the Whang fill; collecting and burning driftwood; repairing and trimming the edge of the macadam roadway across the auxiliary dam; fixing drains and paving ditches at the edge of the slope of the embankment; rebuilding stone fence wall; cleaning gates and gate houses; collecting water samples each week for the laboratory, and patrolling twice a week the reservoir shore and streams to Westchester County.

On April 13 flashboards, 20 inches in height, were put on the lip of the spillway of the West Branch reservoir.

Boyd's Corner Reservoir—The work at this reservoir has been painting fences, covers of gate valve, vaults and iron work in the tower; cleaning the gate-valve vault; relaying riprap at the top of the slope; cutting grass and weeds in front of the dam and along the road sides near the reservoir; collecting water samples each week from Boyd's reservoir, White Pond, Cold Spring and Black Pond brooks and sending same to the laboratories at Katonah and Brooklyn. Boyd's Corner and the streams running into it have been patrolled regularly twice each week.

Middle Branch Reservoir—The work done at this reservoir has been as follows:

Cleaning road, culverts and ditches; excavating and putting in riprap along the highway embankment and putting in surfacing material in the roadbed; repairing highway bridges; building and repairing fences; cutting brush and weeds; cleaning gate valves and their vaults; collecting samples of water each week and sending them to the Katonah laboratory.

The reservoir and streams have been patrolled three times each week.

On April 5 flashboards, 12 inches in height, were put on the lip of the spillway of the Middle Branch reservoir.

Lake Mahopac—The outlet channel and the dam have been kept in good order, and the water in the lake is at high water mark.

Kirk Lake—The outlet channel and dam have been kept in good order. A leak developed in the dam, but the same has been repaired, and the dam is now tight. The lake is full to the high water mark.

A new bridge over the outlet of Kirk lake has been built.

Muscoot river has been patrolled regularly to the County line.

Lake Glenelida—The flume at the outlet of Lake Glenelida is in good order. The road wash has been removed from the large catch basin on the shore of the lake, and the fences have been repaired. The lake is now full to the high water mark.

Lake Gilead—The flume and the channel are in good order. The embankment east of the flume has been repaired. The lake is full to high-water mark.

Barrett's Pond—The gate and masonry flume are in good order. The embankment at the north end of the flume has been repaired, the channel cleaned and the brush and weeds cut.

White Pond—The fence, stone wall and channel wall have been relaid. The outlet channel fence walls, dams, etc., are in good order. The brush and weeds have been cut and the shores of the lake have been frequently patrolled.

Electrozone Plant at Brewster—The electrozone plant has been operated continuously during the quarter. Six thousand linear feet of disposal trenches were opened and cleaned, the tile cleaned and relaid, and the ditches refilled; 400 feet of distributing ditch cleaned out and the sidewalks repaired. The large vault at the end of the sewer was cleaned out and 45 cubic yards of material removed. The boiler at the plant has been tested by the machinist in charge and found to be in good condition.

Contract for Improvement of East Branch Reservoir—The following amount of work has been done during the quarter by the contractor, Clinton Beckwith, on the improvement of the East Branch Reservoir:

150 cubic yards rock excavation.

11 cubic yards earth excavation.

665 cubic yards of embankment.

7 cubic yards of cut stone masonry.

1,253 cubic yards rubble range masonry.

395 cubic yards concrete masonry.

290 cubic yards dry stone paving and wall.

4,502 linear feet of fence wall.

Bronx River System, Maintenance and Repair—The force of employees have been engaged in cleaning Rye Pond Reservoir and Wampus Pond. The fence wall between Kensico Reservoir and highway on the east side of the reservoir has been finished. Stone has been gotten out for the rip-rap on the east shore of Kensico Reservoir. The guard-rail along the east side of the Reservoir has been repaired and painted. The last condemned house (Sand's house) has been destroyed. The conduit and reservoirs have been patrolled during the quarter.

Pollution at Mt. Kisco, Bedford, etc.

On my first preliminary inspection of the watershed I visited the sewage disposal works at the Montefiore Home at Bedford Station and ascertained that the works were entirely inefficient and that the sewage from the home was a serious menace to our water supply.

On May 23 I called the attention of the Superintendent of the Montefiore Home to the existing conditions, advising him that the plan adopted "in its present condition is entirely unsatisfactory and unsafe" and specifically stated the changes necessary, on which this Department would insist, to eliminate all danger. The Directors of the Montefiore Home showed the utmost willingness to act in accordance with the recommendations of the Chief Engineer and, after several conferences with the representatives of the Bacterial Sewage Purification Company, with whom the Montefiore Home had a contract for the installation of the plant then existing, I prepared a complete plan for the proper treatment of the sewage, embodying the recommendations above mentioned, which was forwarded to Superintendent Rosenberg of the Montefiore Home, on June 28 for their consideration, so that the work might be commenced without delay. In my communication transmitting these plans, I stated:

"The installation of the filter beds and the chemical plant thus shown should be completed without delay, in order to remedy the existing conditions which constitute a grave danger to the water supply of the City. In the meantime, as the matter is one of extreme urgency and gravity, I have directed that a temporary apparatus for chemical treatment be installed. This will be done by setting two hogsheads just in front of the septic tank so that a chloride of lime solution can be introduced at that point. I have ordered the hogsheads and also three drums of chloride of lime to be delivered at that point and will pay for the expenses of this material and attend to the proper erection and connection of the hogsheads, assuming and expecting that you will take charge of the preparation of the solution and proper treatment until the permanent plant is erected, and also expecting that all further expenses for the materials and chemicals will be paid for by the Montefiore Home.

"The proposed method of temporary chemical treatment consists in the use of 160 pounds of lime dissolved in 200 gallons of water, thoroughly stirred and allowed to settle, after which the clear solution is gradually run off into the septic tank. Two hogsheads are provided so that one may be allowed to settle while the other is in use. The solution should be run in so that the entire 160 pounds will be used during twenty-four hours, after which the second solution will be drawn upon while the sludge from the first hogshead is being removed.

"After the permanent plant is installed, the chemical treatment will consist of the addition of the same amount of lime to the tank, after which 133 pounds of soda ash will be slowly introduced and the mixture allowed to settle. By this means sodium hypochlorite will be employed instead of hypochloride of lime. In this manner a perfectly soluble material will be introduced and the clogging of the pipes prevented. This treatment also prevents any unsightly appearance due to the precipitate of lime and also prevents an increase in hardness in the effluent.

"In view of the existing conditions there, which constituted a grave menace to the public health of the City, I have no doubt you will realize the imperative necessity of immediate action to carry out the works outlined above without loss of time."

I found also that at Mt. Kisco there was immediate danger of pollution from the drainage of lands in part occupied by the cheap dwellings of tenants previously removed from plots condemned by the City for the protection of the stream. These tenants had simply removed these buildings a few feet away and therefore the sources of pollution were not abated. Not enough land had been condemned and I immediately prepared plans to condemn the lowlands, which it is not possible to sewer under the proposed plans, and in the district known as "Under the Mountain" enough land was taken up the slope of the hill to make it sure either that no buildings would be erected higher up, or that, if so erected, they could be sewerized. A map showing the five parcels of land to be condemned in order to protect the stream was forwarded to the Commissioner on May 23, 1905. The assessed value of these lands, for the purpose of taxation, as taken from the Town Clerk's books, was \$70,000, not including the Roman Catholic Church (Plot No. 50), which is exempt from taxation.

Where complaints have been received of muddy or impure water, the hydrants have been blown off regularly at lowest points in vicinity from which complaints were received, and occupants of premises notified of time hydrants were being blown off.

Pressures.

Owing to the number of 6-inch mains yet to be found in the distribution systems of Manhattan and The Bronx, and to some 4-inch mains also in the latter borough, the pressure in many districts is unsatisfactory for domestic use and entirely inadequate for fire protection, especially when hydrants are connected to these small mains. In all contracts now prepared 8 inches is the minimum size of main adopted for residential districts, and the smaller diameters will be eliminated as speedily as possible. For mains supplying hydrants, unless the circumstances warrant an exception, 12 inches will be adopted.

We have recording gauges at six repair companies, but these are too few and the records have not been properly filed and in other cases are lacking. For the proper remodeling of the distribution system a much larger range of observation and more complete and carefully prepared records are needed. I recommend that the Fire Department be requested to grant us permission to install recording gauges at some of the fire engine houses selected with regard to location, so that the pressures taken there will represent those in the vicinity, the gauges to be 8 inches, recording pressures up to 70 pounds. I have adopted this plan in Brooklyn. In case of fire, an examination of the charts would show the effect on the pressure. Recording gauges are to be placed also at our various pipe yards alongside of the ordinary pressure gauges.

Emergency Gangs.

Reference was made in the last quarterly report to the necessity of organizing emergency night gangs that would be on hand in case of breaks, thus avoiding the delays and extraordinary loss incurred hitherto from lack of making such a provision. Application was made for the requisite appropriation to organize these gangs, and the Board of Aldermen, on the 20th of June, passed the necessary resolution authorizing the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$40,200, the proceeds thereof to be applied to the immediate organization and assignment to duty of the night force at the seven repair stations in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Break on Park Avenue Main.

In order to facilitate the construction of the subway on Park avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, the water in the 48-inch main was shut off and the main placed out of service. Subsequently this main was seriously damaged by an explosion in the subway tunnel in 1902. In spite of repeated communications from this Bureau, the repairs of this main had been delayed by the Rapid Transit Commission or their representatives, who did little or nothing in the matter until some two or three months ago, as I understand it. On June 10 this Bureau was informed that these repairs had been completed (no test having been made, as far as we can ascertain, of the pipe before it was covered, nor any facilities having been given to this Bureau to inspect the pipe either during construction or after completion and before the trench was filled). On the night of Saturday, June 10, at the request of the subway contractors, the employees of this Bureau turned on the water in the 48-inch pipe on the easterly side of Park avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, on the statement of the contractors for the subway that the repairs had been properly made and that the main was ready for use. In turning on the water in the main the 30-inch gate at Third avenue and Forty-second street was used, opening it only to a small extent, say about nine inches. After the water had been thus turned on the section was patrolled by the employees of this Bureau until about 5 o'clock on the following (Sunday) morning, to see if they could discover any evidence of leaks or other defects, but none appeared up to the time when our men left the watch, as aforesaid. At about 3:30 p. m. on Sunday, June 11, notice was received at this Bureau from the police of the Twenty-third Precinct that there was a large leak at Park avenue and Forty-second street. Our Repair Gangs proceeded to this location, and, having ascertained that the leak was from the 48-inch main on which the pressure had been turned the night before, the water was entirely shut off from the main.

Two communications were addressed by the Chief Engineer to the Rapid Transit Commission on June 12 and June 13, notifying them of the break in the main they had repaired and partially relaid less than fifteen hours before the water had been turned on, and requesting them to immediately dig up and uncover the main from Fortieth to Forty-second streets, so as to thoroughly inspect it and ascertain its condition, and to proceed at once with the necessary repairs. The Rapid Transit Commission were requested to advise us when this work would begin in order to detail an Inspector from this Bureau to examine the condition of the mains and to make the necessary arrangement for preliminary tests on the same before it was finally recovered by the contractors for the Rapid Transit Commission. Mr. George S. Rice, Chief Engineer of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, in his letter of June 16, acknowledged the receipt of the communications from the Chief Engineer of the 12th and 13th of June and stated that immediately on being notified of the break he had ordered the contractors to at once repair it. He also forwarded, however, a letter received from Mr. S. L. F. Deyo, Chief Engineer of the Subway Construction Company, making the general allegations that it had not been shown that the break was due to any improper work done by the Subway Company and that it was not proven that the break had been due to such improper work either by the contractors or sub-contractors, and that the presumption was that in view of the age, quality and design of the pipe it was more probable that the leak was the result of its own inherent condition and not due to any disturbance by the contractor. Mr. Deyo therefore begged that his letter be submitted to the Rapid Transit Board and that no further requirement should be made on the contractor for the repairs until the matter had been definitely passed on by the Board.

The Secretary of the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, on June 12, in a communication to Commissioner Oakley, acknowledged the receipt of the communication of the Chief Engineer in regard to the break, stating that the matter was already receiving the attention of their Chief Engineer.

The Law Department, on June 13, addressed a communication to the Commissioner requesting a thorough investigation of the causes of the accident to determine the cause of the break which occurred, work done by the Repair Gangs, and all and any information that might be of use to the City in passing upon any claims that might be filed for damages. The damages to the tunnel, according to the statements of the Chief Engineer of the Subway Company, were unimportant, but it has been alleged that considerable damage to private property was experienced.

It will be necessary to thoroughly uncover and expose the pipe in order to determine the cause of the break. a full report on which will be made as soon as the facts are ascertained.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Work Done in Borough of Queens During the Quarter.

As to the general condition of the system as at present constituted, I would report the same to be in good order throughout this borough. During the past quarter, owing to the many changes made in the grades of various streets, it has been necessary for our repair gangs to be employed not only in attending to their general duties, but also to be engaged in lowering mains in the different streets where grades have been changed. Strict attention, however, has been given to the hydrant service, and the same is in good working order at the present time.

In reference to the water supplied to this Department in Long Island City, I would say that the two City pumping stations in the First Ward are each furnishing an average daily supply of about 800,000 gallons.

The Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company are furnishing daily about 250,000 gallons. The Citizens' Water Supply Company (our main source of supply) are now delivering daily about 4,600,000 gallons.

At the present time the supply received from the City stations and from the Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company can be looked upon, I feel, only as fire streams, yet I find it very essential that the supply received from the Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company be maintained, for the reason that in very warm weather, or when the supply from the Citizens' Water Company is reduced through accident or otherwise, we can call upon this company to make up the deficiency, this being done only in case of emergency.

The Engineering Corps connected with this office has been engaged during the last quarter on work preparatory to the commencement of the contract lately awarded to Messrs. Norton & Dalton, also in preparing plans, estimates, etc., for work to be done under appropriation for laying new mains in this borough, which work we desire to complete previous to the coming winter.

In reference to contract lately awarded to Norton & Dalton, I would inform you that we have received the first shipment of pipe on same, and expect to commence the work of laying as soon as sufficient pipe is delivered.

The Clinton Beckwith contract for laying mains in Jamaica, Jackson, Nott avenues, etc., has been completed, and final estimate has been mailed to this office.

The Corporation yards in this borough are in good order, and supplied with necessary pipe and fittings for repair work.

Distribution System, Borough of Richmond.

No repairs were required during the quarter on the mains, hydrants and gates in the Borough of Richmond.

MECHANICAL DIVISION.

BOROUGHS OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

Jerome Avenue Pumping Station.

A sink, with all necessary connections, has been placed in the boiler room. Lockers for the Enginemen, Oilers and Firemen have been constructed, and a neat shed has been built over the platform scales located on the outside of the coal house.

The work, under contract with Henry R. Worthington, of covering and lagging the boilers, steam and hot water piping and the heated parts of the engines, is progressing satisfactorily.

The Snare & Trest Company, under their contract, have completed the work of placing the cast iron floor plates around the engine beds, of constructing an opening in the engine room floor, of building stairways and platforms to the basement and to the water ends of the pumps, and of placing a hood over the suction tank in the engine room.

As the pumping engines installed by Henry R. Worthington could not be put under steam, started up and run until the 48-inch supply line to the pumping station from gate house No. 4 of the Jerome Park reservoir was completely installed, the contract was held in abeyance, and as a result an extension of time, until September 1, 1905, was requested by the contractor, Henry R. Worthington. This extension of time was duly granted by the Department.

Owing to the inadequacy of the operating force in this station, the plant was operated only eight hours per day, from March 6 until March 24, from which date it was put on a regular daily service of 24 hours. The service was extended to the Williamsbridge and Wakefield districts, and supplanted the supply which previously was obtained from the New York and Westchester Company. This supply was then discontinued. After making the proper connections to the distributing mains, this service will be extended, where practicable, to the remaining high sections in The Bronx.

At the present time all the high areas in The Bronx are dependent for their water supply entirely upon the Jerome Avenue Pumping Station; areas in the Borough of Manhattan, at approximately the same elevation as the high service in The Bronx, are almost entirely dependent upon the tower service of the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Pumping Station.

It is to be recommended that, at the earliest date, these two services be connected together by appropriate sized mains, so that either one may be temporarily supplied from either one of the two stations above mentioned, thereby removing the danger of a water shortage in either service, in case of serious accident in either station.

One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Pumping Station.

The general repairs in this station, which were stopped during the last quarter and held in abeyance pending the authorization of the spending of money for this purpose, the amount of which would exceed \$1,000, were continued on June 2; such expenditure being duly authorized by the Board of Aldermen previous to that date.

During the time of the suspension of these repairs, owing to a leaky condition existing in the condenser and in the primary main exhaust heater, Worthington engine No. 6 had to be shut down, and these repairs could not be made until after June 2, after which date the engine was put back in service. Similar repairs were then made to Worthington engine No. 5, and that engine was returned to regular service.

Blake engine No. 2, which had been in continuous service since its installation in 1896, was then taken out of service, and on it general extraordinary repairs and renewals were made.

On Blake engine No. 1, tower service, repairs were completed and the engine was put into excellent condition for service.

On the No. 8 boiler leaky seams were caulked, all the tubes were rerolled and three new tubes were put in place. Boilers Nos. 10 and 11 had flues and tubes rerolled. New stop valves were placed on boilers Nos. 5, 6 and 7.

A new 2½-inch valve was placed in the boiler room, on the boiler feed pump connection. A new joint was made on the bonnet of the 10-inch valve in the main steam line to the Blake engines. These repairs necessitated shutting down of three of the Blake engines.

Repairs were made to the coal conveyor, as follows: A new chute was placed in the hopper, so new conveyor buckets were put in place and two new pins were installed on the digger of the coal hoist.

New joints were made on the main throttles of engines Nos. 2 and 4. A new throttle valve was placed in the steam line to No. 3 engine, and the jacket piping of this engine was repaired.

The 4-inch auxiliary steam line from the Nos. 1 and 2 batteries of boilers to the tower service engines (Nos. 1 and 3) was completed, and in the event of it becoming

necessary to shut down the remainder of the Blake plant for repairs to the main steam line, it is now possible to keep either one of these engines in service. Several times in the past, repairs to this main steam line have necessitated the shutting down of the whole of the Blake engines.

During the quarter the boilers were regularly taken off and cleaned and the same are now in good condition.

Ninety-eighth Street Pumping Station.

During the quarter, the steam ends and piping of No. 2 engine were neatly lagged, the lagging was varnished and the main steam lines in the engine room were painted.

The sidewalls of the engine house basement, the vault under the sidewalk, and the tunnel between the boiler room and the coal house were whitewashed, and the engine and pump foundations, stairways, piers and oiler's lockers, the boiler-breechings and the water ends of No. 3 engine were painted.

New brick steps from the basement floor to the air pump pits of engines Nos. 1 and 2 were built.

Jacket return pipes of engines Nos. 1 and 2 were renewed, and new valves were placed in the hot and the cold water pipes in the basement of engine room.

The air compressor in the basement of engine room was overhauled, repaired and repacked, new steam valves and piping were placed, and numerous other small repairs were made throughout the plant.

An auxiliary feed line was run to boilers Nos. 1, 2, 5, 6, 7 and 8. The old feed water heater in the boiler room was overhauled, cleaned, repaired and the joints made up new.

New blow-off valves and piping were placed on boilers Nos. 1, 2 and 5.

Repairs were made to the grate bars and frames in furnaces of all the boilers. The piping and fittings were renewed on the water columns and gauges of boilers Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8.

The brickwork in back connections of boilers Nos. 1 and 2, and the arches and breast plates in boilers Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8 were renewed. The brick paving in front of all the boilers was renewed.

Brackets were set into the walls of the engine room and boiler room, and the locomotive headlights (to be used in the event of the gas failing) were set on same.

Early in the year No. 3 engine was taken out of service, and extensive repairs were started on same; but, owing to the stoppage of all work of this nature until June, this engine is still out of service, the repairs to same being now in progress.

The boilers in this station were regularly taken off and cleaned during the quarter.

High Bridge Pumping Station.

No repairs were made at this station during the quarter, nor was the station in commission.

Repairs to Engines.

Reference was made in the report for the previous quarter to the generally bad condition of the engines at the Pumping Stations at One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and Ninety-eighth street, which was such as to threaten the continuity of the water supply and constitute a source of danger. Bills for work done had also accumulated, which the Comptroller's office refused to pass, as they exceeded in the aggregate the limit of \$1,000, as provided by the Charter for such payments without contract. In view of this unsatisfactory condition, after conferring with the Comptroller, the Chief Engineer recommended that authority be obtained from the Board of Aldermen for the expenditure of a given amount of money to repair these engines without the necessity of previous letting, it being impracticable beforehand to determine the extent and nature of the repairs required in an engine, and it being, of course, imperative that these repairs should not be delayed, thus jeopardizing the service, such action being all the more urgent in view of the conditions then existing. At the request of the Commissioner, the Board of Aldermen therefore, on May 23, authorized, and his Honor, the Mayor, on June 2, approved, a resolution authorizing the expenditure of \$35,000 for repairs to engines and other devices without public letting. We will now proceed to draft requisitions and obtain bids for the proper and economical overhauling, reassembling and general repairs of these engines, so that they may efficiently and economically do the work for which they are intended, and we will also pay the expenses of the bills which had accumulated after these have been thoroughly examined and verified.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Tottenville Pumping Station.

During the quarter the work of overhauling and repairing No. 1 Worthington pump was completed.

Steam and hot water piping in the station was covered.

The work of building the coal house was started May 1 last, and the house is now ready for the roof covering.

The wagon scales were repaired.

Small repairs were made in the station and to the deep well pumps.

The reservoir was cleaned out during the quarter.

The work of placing steam separators at each deep well pump and trapping same is progressing.

During the quarter the boilers were regularly taken off and cleaned.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

First Ward.

Pumping Station No. 1.

The work of installing surface condensers, oil separators and primary feed water heaters in the main exhausts of both pumping engines, and of setting and connecting air pumps, is not progressing as rapidly as it is desirable to have it, for the reason that the contractors, Frank McSwegan & Sons, had difficulty in getting the condensers and some special castings.

The work on engine No. 2 has been completed.

Two new valve rods were placed in engine No. 2.

The storehouse, outhouse and back of boiler house were painted.

The boilers and feed water heaters and purifiers were regularly cleaned during the quarter, and this plant is now in first-class condition.

Pumping Station No. 3.

During the quarter all pipe connections on the feed water heater were made up new.

Air and vacuum pumps on engine No. 2 were overhauled.

Damper regulator connections were repaired.

A new cross-head was ordered for No. 1 engine.

New plungers were placed in the feed pump.

The smokestack seams were filled and the stack was painted.

This plant, except for making some repairs to engine No. 1, is in first-class condition.

During the quarter the boilers were regularly taken off and cleaned.

Third Ward.

Flushing Pumping Station.

The contract entered into with the Snow Steam Pump Company of Buffalo for furnishing and installing a three-million-gallon pumping engine has been completed, and the duty test of the engine was made April 1.

The contract entered into with the Hudson Engineering and Contracting Company for driving wells and installing an air-lift system has been completed, all but making the final test.

The contract entered into with James A. Stevenson for building a new boiler house and placing a monitor on the engine house roof is now progressing, after a delay of almost one year on the part of the contractor.

The contract entered into with Frank McSwegan & Sons is not progressing as rapidly as we should like to have it. The delay is due to the difficulty the contractor is having in getting certain castings made.

Engine No. 1 in this station is apart, undergoing extensive and much needed repairs, and it is necessary to run the new engine continuously until the old engine is in commission again. For the reason that we have to keep the new engine in continuous

service the contractor is prevented from painting this engine, and therefore he cannot complete his contract with the City until the old engine is in service again.

An order has been issued to wire and equip the plant with electric lighting fixtures, and when this work is completed it will be a much needed improvement.

Repairs were made by the Department men to the 5-inch steam line from the boilers to the header.

Lumber has been ordered with which to repair the temporary house over the air compressor.

During the quarter the inlet gates from the stream to the pond were thoroughly and completely sealed with masonry walls and embankments, and it is now absolutely impossible for any of the stream water to find its way into the pond, except by overflowing the banks in time of freshet.

Materials have been ordered with which to make the necessary connections to enable us to pump direct from the wells at this station, should it become necessary to do so, as it would in the event of serious mishap occurring to the one air compressor installed with the air lift system.

Bayside Pumping Station.

The contract entered into with the firm of Ryan & McFarren for building an extension to the present engine house and building new boiler and coal houses is about complete.

An order has been issued to wire and equip with electric lighting fixtures the new plant.

The materials have been ordered for the proposed new flooring in the engine room.

The carpenter built a runway for the new coal house.

The Department painter is at work painting the dwellings attached to the station.

During the quarter the use of the waters from Oakland ponds was discontinued, and as a result this station now depends for its source of supply solely upon the yield from the driven wells, which yield is so inadequate for the requirements of the Ward that it is impossible, without the assistance of Whitestone station, for Flushing and Bayside stations to keep the pressure normal.

Whitestone Pumping Station.

On June 21 this station was put into service again. We were enabled to operate it since the above date by temporarily pressing into service firemen with engineers, licenses, and laborers, pending the appointment of the regular operating force requested.

During the quarter a general storehouse was built at this station by the Department men.

The pumping machinery in this station was repaired and repainted during the quarter.

The work of placing the pressure regulating device and connections on the College Point stand pipe is completed, and materials are ordered to place a temporary shed over same.

As stated in the report for the last quarter, the large balance in supplies is due to the fact that no coal bills have yet been paid under the appropriation for 1905, and that bills for expenses in the early part of the year have not yet been rendered. It will be noticed that the surplus for supplies, however, has decreased from \$160,418.68 for the last quarter to \$135,293.51 for the present quarter, showing a difference of \$34,125.17. It is apparent from the above figures that there is still a margin to our credit in the items for supplies and salaries submitted in the Budget.

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As stated in the last quarterly report, this surplus is simply apparent, and is due to the fact that the pay of five Laborers at the Laboratory has been taken out of the Water Revenue Fund during both the first and second quarters, after which it will be charged to the Tax Levy Budget. This mode of procedure is necessary to make up the deficit which would result otherwise in the Tax Levy Budget, equal to the amount by which the appropriation was cut down, as above explained.

at the Hempstead Storage Reservoir during the first six months has been 16.91 inches, or at a rate of slightly less than 34 inches per annum, which is about three-fourths of the average yearly rainfall, and only about two-thirds of the rainfall that we have had for the past few years. This low rainfall was not unexpected, and, on the contrary, it should probably continue for several years, as we have had an unprecedented series of high rainfall years. The result of the low rainfall will, of course, mean a much diminished supply from our watershed, and the probable necessity of reducing the pressure within the City.

General Condition of the Supply.

The reduction in consumption during the past quarter, as compared with the consumption during the cold months, has not been as great as was anticipated, the consumers using and wasting more water than was expected.

The average daily consumption for the first six months of this year, as compared with the first six months of 1903 and 1904, is shown in the following table:

As our daily increase in consumption in the ten (10) years from 1895 to 1904, both inclusive, was only 28,600,000 gallons per day, it will be seen that the increase in consumption in the last two years has been abnormal. This increase, in conjunction with the decrease in the rainfall, will unquestionably result in our having extreme difficulty in furnishing sufficient water to meet the consumption, including the present waste. An appeal to the consumers and a careful inspection should secure a reduction in the waste sufficient to enable us to meet the actual needs of consumers until the additional supply from our proposed infiltration galleries is available. Should the above measures, however, fail to check the waste sufficiently, a reduction of pressure within the City limits may become indispensable.

During the quarter water has been drawn from the Hempstead Storage Reservoir practically since May 27, the number of days for May and June during which water was drawn being as follows:

The rainfall for this quarter has been very light, particularly in May, when the rainfall at the Hempstead reservoir amounted only to 1.07 inches. The total rainfall

Even with this draft on our Storage Reservoir the supply was not equal to the demand, and the water fell in the Distribution Reservoirs. The total reduction during the quarter in the water stored in our Hempstead Reservoir and in our Distribution Basins amounted to 187,710,000 gallons.

The reduction in the stored water commenced on May 16. The total amount in storage on May 15 was 683,460,700 gallons, while the total amount in storage on July 1, 1905, amounted to 675,110,100 gallons, making a reduction in storage of 308,296,600 gallons. This amount of water was drawn from storage during a period of forty-six days, the daily draft amounting to 6,702,100 gallons.

We cannot utilize the water in the Storage Reservoir below a depth of about 4 feet, as the water in the conduit must be carried at an elevation equivalent to the level of the Storage Reservoir at this depth, in order to give the necessary supply at the Ridgewood Station. Assuming 4 feet as the minimum depth in the Storage Reservoir, and taking a depth of 10 feet in our Distribution Reservoirs as being the minimum depth to which it would be reasonably safe to draw them, we must assume about 200,000,000 gallons to be the amount of water that must be kept in storage and which is not available for consumption. This would leave us at the present time about 475,000,000 gallons of stored water available for our use, and at the rate at which the storage has been drawn down since May 15, this water would last for seventy-one days.

This is really a more favorable presentation of the situation than is the true condition, because we have during the past quarter been able to draw from the rainfall of previous seasons, but the amount available will rapidly decrease during the summer months, and the situation that now confronts this Department is an extremely serious one, and one which it is difficult to make the general public appreciate. Although the entire City of New York will probably be short of water for several years, the Borough of Brooklyn, having a small storage capacity on its watershed, feels the dry weather sooner than its sister Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. But, on the other hand, we have more opportunity for quickly increasing our supply by extending our system for utilizing the underground waters of Long Island and by the possible extension into Suffolk County. In reference to the latter, it would be well to make an earnest effort to determine once for all whether or not the City can take from Suffolk County the underground supply, as has been asserted, and what rights, if any, it may have to take any of the surface supplies. The construction of works is not a matter of weeks or months, and the requisite time to complete it is much greater in Municipal than in private works, so that no time should be lost to anticipate the probable needs and make adequate preparations to meet them.

It will be seen that practically no water was wasted during the entire quarter, even though the Millburn Station was run for part of the time at a reduced rate of pumping.

This table shows the rapid dropping off toward the latter part of the quarter in the amount of water available from our new watershed, in spite of the fact that the Wantagh Infiltration Gallery furnished a comparatively large supply, amounting, during the month of June, to an average of 4,371,000 gallons per day.

We were unable to run the driven well stations on the new watershed except for a limited period at two of the stations on account of the lack of the necessary Engineers and Stokers to man these stations. The stations were run as follows:

Matowa, May 24 to June 30.

Massapequa, June 28 to June 30.

There have not been any new sources of supply added to the system during the quarter, except the Wantagh Gallery, where the contractors have resumed work, and from which, as previously stated, quite a large supply has been obtained during the latter part of the quarter. It is hoped that this work can be carried on, so as to utilize to the fullest extent the supply which can be derived from its construction. The work done to date indicates that a large amount of ground water can be obtained from this gallery, and that the water is of excellent quality.

We have, by washing the clear stream and forest stream wells, increased the yield from these stations by about 1,000,000 gallons per day each, and we have increased the yield from the Oconee station by about 400,000 gallons per day, this increase being drawn from new shallow wells.

While our pumps at the New Lots station have been run at practically their maximum safe speed, we are now working on a connection between the new deep wells and the existing suction main, so as to utilize the supply from the deep wells, thus reducing the vacuum and the slip of the pumps. We expect to complete this work by July 2.

No further work has been done on the proposed new conduit running from Massapequa to the Ridgewood reservoir, as we have been awaiting the opinion of the Corporation Counsel as to our right to use the public highways, and awaiting as well the necessary appropriation.

DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM.

General Condition.

Owing to the increased draft and the limited amount of water, there has been a reduction of the pressure throughout the greater part of our distribution system, thus causing complaints by some of our citizens of lack of sufficient water. The reduction in pressure has been most keenly felt in the Bay Ridge, Fort Hamilton and Dyker Heights localities, as the summer draft for Bensonhurst, Bath Beach and Coney Island has been unusually heavy. The new 20-inch main laid on Harway avenue for supplying the Coney Island district was completed sufficiently to turn the water through it on June 18. But it was impossible to continue its use to supply the section of Coney Island east of West Seventeenth street, as the increased pressure due to this main caused such a great increase in consumption that no water was obtainable on the high sections of Dyker Heights, Fort Hamilton and Bay Ridge. We are therefore using the 20-inch main only for the Sea Gate supply, and, in case of fire, the repair gang

on the island has been notified to open the gates so as to immediately give the necessary supply for fire purposes. Although a great improvement on previous conditions, the present ones are not ideal, but can only be bettered by additional trunk distribution mains leading from the Fort Hamilton avenue main into the districts affected. Contracts are now being prepared for these mains, and it is expected that the work can be done either in the late fall or in the early spring. Additional trunk mains should be provided from the Ridgewood reservoir or Ridgewood engine house to a point about on a line drawn from Myrtle avenue and Broadway to East New York avenue and Albany avenue. We have in general ample trunk main capacity leading from the Ridgewood system below this point, but from approximately this line to the reservoir the velocity in the 48-inch and 36-inch mains is higher than is desirable and results in a loss of head which should be avoided by additional mains. It will, however, be useless to put in these additional mains unless we can obtain sufficient increase in supply, or its equivalent—sufficient decrease in the water wasted—to enable us to meet the demands of the system under the present pressure. We have not as yet been able to utilize to its full capacity the new main on Myrtle avenue, owing to inadequate supply. This is another manifestation of the oft-denounced evil of needless waste of water, owing to which additional pressure now means a large increase in consumption, without commensurate benefit to the consumer, and owing to which the citizen who is now careful of the water is differentiated against under the present system, as his neighbor may waste the water without any adequate check on such waste.

While on this subject, it may be well to refer to a provision of our regulations under which the use of water with hose for washing off sidewalks and sprinkling yards is declared illegal, and which can be claimed as a legitimate use of water. Under our present regulations, there is no charge made for this use of water, it being prohibited unless a meter is placed on the premises. We formerly obtained a large income from the charge made for this use of water, but when the regulations were changed, requiring the meter, we lost this income, and did not obtain any adequate return for such loss, as the use of the water continued, even though it was in violation of our regulations. To enforce this regulation would mean a large corps of Inspectors, and their employment would not give adequate return. Unless we are going to meter all consumers, I think that it would be better policy to return to a general charge for the use of water with the hose and rescind the regulation regarding the installation of meters where the hose is used.

The heavy draft during the summer months of the seashore sections at Coney Island, Bath Beach and Bensonhurst is greater than the supply furnished by the Gravesend and New Utrecht stations, and Ridgewood water is consequently furnished during the summer months to Bay Ridge and Fort Hamilton, while in the winter months the driven well water is furnished. The resulting change in the direction of flow in the mains stirs up the sediment and has caused complaint in the Bay Ridge and Fort Hamilton Districts. In order to minimize the trouble, the hydrants are blown off so as to remove the dirty water in the pipes.

Since the death of Mr. Henry Hawkes, Superintendent of Repairs to Distribution and Complaints, on May 16, the work of which Mr. Hawkes had charge and which is distinctly a part of the work of the Chief Engineer's Bureau, has been under the personal supervision of Mr. Robert Van Buren, Principal Assistant Engineer. Greater economy and efficiency are secured by this consolidation and much confusion and loss of time, in certain cases, has been and will be avoided.

Extension of Distribution.

A contract for extension to distribution has been prepared covering nine streets and avenues, the estimated amount of pipe to be laid being as follows:

In some of the streets in which mains are to be laid under the above contract there are at present existing mains, new mains being laid to give additional supply for fire service, the contract covering the streets in the Greenpoint and Hunters Point sections of the borough.

We have under preparation an additional general contract for laying small distribution mains in the outlying districts, as well as a contract for the trunk mains required in these districts, as already mentioned.

Rapid progress has been made in laying small water mains under the contracts with Daniel Douglass dated January 9, 1905; and Isaac Harris, assignee for Murphy Bros., dated February 24, 1905.

In addition to the work done by these contractors, the Department has had a gang employed laying mains and has also had mains laid and hydrants set by the gangs employed in the repair yards.

The laying of these new mains with their appurtenances has practically eliminated all complaints from our citizens, and with the general form of contract under which Mr. Harris is working we are able to install the mains within a short time after the petition for new mains has been received and favorably reported on. A continuation of this form of contract should prevent, in the future, practically all cause of complaint and the builder would be certain to obtain the water before his house was constructed and he was ready to utilize the supply.

During the quarter petitions for 29 streets and avenues were received and 15 were reported on unfavorably. These petitions covered the laying of 1,074 feet of 16-inch pipe, 6,819 feet of 8-inch pipe and 2,833 feet of 6-inch pipe, making a total of 10,726 feet.

Removal and Relaying of Mains.

The removal and relaying of existing tuberculated mains has been actively prosecuted by Mr. M. J. Dady, under his contract dated January 22, 1904, who has now practically completed this work, there being only a very few feet of 20-inch mains to be laid on Myrtle avenue and some cleaning up and paving to be done.

A contract was forwarded during the quarter for removing and relaying mains on Wythe avenue and adjacent streets, from Flushing avenue to North Tenth street. This contract covers all the money at present available for this work and the streets in which the mains are to be replaced were determined after consultation with the Fire Department. The great importance of this new work can hardly be overestimated and it is hoped that a liberal appropriation may be available for continuing the work.

The 20-inch main in Adams street and the 24-inch main in Water street were changed in order to permit the construction of the anchorage of the Manhattan Bridge. The work was done by P. J. Murray & Co., under contract with the Bridge Department. The work was done, however, under the supervision of this Department, and according to the plans submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer. Portions of the 20-inch main in Adams street and of the 24-inch main in Water street were removed, and new 20-inch and 24-inch mains were laid along the new lines of the streets. A new 6-inch line was also laid. The work was begun on May 20, and will be completed about the first week of July. The following is a summary of the work done:

New Hydrants on Existing Mains.

Bids were received for cutting in about 350 double nozzle hydrants on the existing 30-inch and 20-inch mains, these mains being located mainly in the lower section of the borough. When the distribution system was originally planned it was not considered advisable by the Engineers to have hydrants on mains any larger than 12 inches in diameter. While this may have been good practice, considering the fire apparatus that was available in those days, and the comparatively few mains that were available to supply the City, it should not be adhered to any longer. In order to utilize for fire purposes the abundant supply of water which can be furnished by these large mains, we have, therefore, prepared the present contract, and expect to place hydrants on all the large mains, 30 inches and smaller in diameter, throughout the City as soon as the appropriations warrant.

The present contract covers more than one-half the hydrants required for the entire work. It is expected that the contractor will be able to commence work during the coming quarter.

Sixteen-Inch Mount Prospect Fire Service Main.

The laying of this main has been completed by Mr. Isaac Harris, the following work being done during the quarter:

HIGH PRESSURE FIRE SERVICE SYSTEM.

Main System.

The work of installing the mains and appurtenances for the high pressure fire service main system has made slow progress owing to the difficulty the contractor, Mr. John J. Cashman, experienced in obtaining the necessary steel castings. It seems likely that the difficulty experienced, which was mainly due to the foundry where the order was placed being inexperienced in this work, has been overcome and the work can now progress without undue delay.

Test pits have been made along the line of the proposed mains, to give definite information as to the subsurface obstructions to be met with, and the location of the main in each street will be determined by these test pits, the main being laid to avoid interference as far as possible with existing subsurface structures.

Ground was broken for the trench for laying the mains on Sullivan street June 27, 1905, and during the quarter the following amount of work has been done:

525 linear feet of 12-inch pipe laid.

2 12-inch stop-cocks set.

No test has yet been made on the mains, but during the quarter tests were made on the flange joints, and it was found that no difficulty need be anticipated in making the joints tight up to 750 pounds pressure if necessary.

The tests of the hydrants were completed on April 5, the final test being made at the Ridgewood Engine House on the hydrant submitted by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company, which was the only hydrant which had complied with the specifications. This hydrant passed the test satisfactorily, and I therefore recommended its acceptance, although the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company were the highest bidders for the hydrant. In selecting the hydrant for this high pressure work the item of cost is comparatively unimportant, the main factors being safety, durability and ease of operation of the hydrant. The severe test to which the hydrant was subjected showed that the award of the hydrant to simply the lowest bidder without any test would have been detrimental to the City's interests.

The completion and advertisement of the contracts for the pumps and motors to be used at the high service pumping stations was considerably delayed owing to the length of time consumed in consultations with the fire insurance interests before these contracts were made. These consultations were deemed advisable by his Honor, the Mayor, and the Commissioner.

The specifications have finally been printed with slight modifications from the original ones and bids have been asked for, which will be received on July 19.

We have not yet received the final printed copies of the specifications for the buildings for the high pressure stations, but these are now in the hands of the printer. As the construction of the stations will only take about one-half of the time necessary to complete the pumps and motors, the stations should be ready before the contractor for the machinery is ready to place the same.

A contract for laying an additional 20-inch main as a suction supply main for the reserve station at Willoughby and St. Edwards street, and for a 30-inch main as a suction supply main for the station at the corner of Furman and Joralemon streets has been advertised and the contract awarded to the lowest bidder, Mr. John J. Cashman. These mains will be completed before the stations are erected.

Work has been advanced on the contracts for the salt water suction mains, and also on the contracts for the electrical feeders and for other minor installations required in connection with the high pressure fire service system.

After consultation with Commissioner Woodbury of the Street Cleaning Department the location of about 237 street flushing hydrants was fixed, these hydrants to be connected to the high pressure fire service system. It is expected that the contract for furnishing and installing these hydrants will be prepared during the coming quarter. The advisability of these hydrants has been seriously questioned and their installation will be in the nature of an experiment, their retention in use being determined by actual working conditions and results.

It should also be added that the appropriation asked for the installation of the high pressure fire system in this borough did not provide for these sprinkling hydrants, so that probably an additional appropriation may be required to cover, at least partially, their cost.

Coney Island System.

The work of constructing this system has been carried on throughout the quarter, and it is expected that it can be put in use by the early part of July.

The laying of the mains, setting of hydrants and gates has been completed, but the Borough Construction Company, which has the contract for furnishing and laying the mains and appurtenances, has experienced a great deal of difficulty in making the tests prescribed in the contract. The laying of the mains was extremely difficult on account of the nearness of the tidewater to the street surface, especially along Surf avenue and walks to the south of Surf avenue. When the trench was excavated for the new main, both the house and main sewers, water and gas pipes and electric ducts were found to be very near the level of tidewater, and, as it was necessary to lay the main some distance below the surface, to avoid danger of freezing, and also damage to the main from traffic, the 16-inch main was laid below the underground water level for the major portion of the distance between West Fifth and West Seventeenth streets. As the material is fine sand, it moves very rapidly when excavation is made below the water level, and it was almost impossible to prevent sand from entering the pipes and interfering with the proper operation of the gates and hydrants. The result has been that a great deal of trouble has been found in making the gates and hydrants tight under the test pressure, which is 50 per cent. above the maximum working pressure allowed. This difficulty of testing the mains has been felt more severely on account of the heavy summer traffic along Surf avenue, and the inconvenience caused both to the visitors to the Island and the business men along Surf avenue by the trench over the water main not being repaved.

The contractors for the engines and pumps, B. Franklin Hart, Jr., & Co., had both their gas engines and pumping engines completed, ready to ship, when the weather permitted the work to be resumed, but they were delayed in placing the machinery on account of the delay in erecting the building. The shop test of the gas engines was made by Mr. Kenneth Torrance, in charge of our Ridgewood and Line pumping stations, the results being as follows:

The pumps and engines have now all been set up and connected, and will be ready to be run in a few days. The construction of the building has been very slow. The contractor, Mr. Christopher Nally, has experienced great difficulty in obtaining both mechanics and material suitable for the work, and, while the building is now up, the roof and the interior portion has not been completed.

The completion of this station will greatly relieve the existing conditions of inadequate fire protection at Coney Island, and should prevent any extensive conflagration such as has visited the Island at several times in past years, causing a great financial loss to the owners of the property, as it has been almost impossible to obtain insurance at rates which were not prohibitive.

PUMPING STATIONS.

Mt. Prospect.

The average amount of water pumped during the quarter at the Mt. Prospect Pumping Station was as follows:

A new 6,000,000 gallon turbine centrifugal pump that was being installed by the D'Olier Engineering Company was completed, and the preliminary run made by the contractors from April 3 to April 10. This run proved satisfactory, and the official test was made from April 21 to April 22 by Mr. Reginald Pelham Bolton, the expert appointed by the City. The result of this test was as follows:

Total pumped in 24 hours, 6,546,899 gallons. Duty per 1,000,000 B. T. U.—82,156,433 foot pounds.

The contract requirements for this turbine and pump were that it should pump 6,000,000 gallons per day of 24 hours, with a duty of 85,000,000 foot pounds of work per each one million B. T. U. consumed by the engine and auxiliaries. It will be seen from the table that the engine and pump exceed the contract requirements, as far as capacity is concerned, but as the duty shown was less than 85,000,000 foot pounds, according to the terms of the contract, a deduction of \$400 from the price bid was made.

The operation of this engine has been very satisfactory since it was put into service, with the exception of the noise caused by the gears running at a very high speed. The gear case is now being covered with a sound-proof material so as to reduce the noise, which at present is objectionable to the residents in the immediate vicinity when the windows of the engine room are open.

The 8-inch steam main supplying the tower engine room is in very poor condition and a requisition has been made for replacing this main with a smaller one. An investigation of the steam used for the station showed that the steam traps were passing a large amount of steam and the installation of the new traps has resulted in a decided economy in the consumption of coal.

The coal sheds of boiler room have been rewired and the inside electrical wiring of this station is now in first-class condition.

Gravesend and New Utrecht.

These stations have been run as usual, and provision is now being made for installing the additional temporary boiler at the Gravesend Station, so as to increase the supply from this station and facilitate the abandonment of the New Utrecht Station. Owing to the expected abandonment of the latter station no repairs have been made to the engines or boilers except those imperatively required to keep the plant in operation. The contracts for remodeling the Gravesend Station are in the hands of the printer, and bids should be received during the coming quarter.

Ridgewood Station.

During the quarter the engines have been run almost continuously, as the consumption has been very high. A preliminary test of the engines showed that the Worthington triple expansion engines had a slip of several per cent., but as it was deemed advisable to check up the results obtained by the weir with the results obtained from the Venturi meters, no correction was made in computing the amount pumped. The figures, therefore, show a somewhat greater consumption than would be obtained if the correction had been made for the slip in these pumps.

Owing to the exceedingly small reserve in pumping capacity at this station, it was deemed advisable to have the old horizontal engine, located in the temporary pit adjoining the new engine house on the east, and known as Engine No. 49, repaired. A requisition has been drawn on Henry R. Worthington, the builder of this engine, to make the necessary repairs, and it is expected that the engine will be in shape to run in the latter part of the coming quarter.

The forms of contract and specifications for the new centrifugal unit are in the hands of the printer, and bids should be received in August.

The Davidson engines have been used with only two of the units in operation on account of the remodelling of the boilers supplying this plant. This work is being done by E. Rutzler, and he has nearly completed the remodeling of four of the boilers.

The two new 200-horse power boilers furnished by Beggs & Co. were fitted and connected up by our men and were put in operation early in June. We were thus enabled to have Morris boilers Nos. 1 and 2 put out of service and turned over to B. F. Hart, Jr., & Co., this company having the contract for remodeling the ten Morris boilers.

The Morris boilers are in an extremely unsatisfactory condition, the leakage of steam being so great that it has been very difficult to keep up the steam to the required pressure. Boilers in the Bigelow and the Strong batteries were cleaned and washed as required and minor repairs made. The roof to the south side station has been repaired, and the roof over the coal shed on the north side has been completed.

New Lots.

This station has been running continuously, but the wells are in rather poor condition and it has been difficult to keep up the level of water in the reservoir. To add to the supply five new deep wells were connected up, and will be put into service about July 1. These wells draw their supply from beneath the clay bed, but do not interfere with the shallow well supply. The contracts for remodeling and rebuilding this station have been forwarded to the printer, and it is expected that work will commence in the fall.

Line Stations.

The necessary repairs have been made to the engines, boilers and building at the line stations to keep them in good running condition.

At the Oconee station four new shallow wells, consisting of a four-inch brass strainer, surrounded by four inches of gravel, have been connected up and have added a half million gallons daily to the supply.

Repairs to Driven Wells.

The following work has been done by the driven well gang during the past quarter:

At the Forest Stream station, thirty-one 2-inch wells have been pulled up and replaced with 2-inch asphalt lined wrought iron pipe and new single gauze slotted strainers. The tops of the wells vary from 26 feet 4 inches to 38 feet 8 inches, and the wells yield from 42 to 70 gallons per minute. Forty 2-inch wells have been pulled up and redriven, after being cleaned, to a depth of from 25 feet 4 inches to 34 feet 6 inches. These wells yielded from 30 to 52 gallons per minute with a hand pump.

At the Clear Stream pumping station, forty-five 2-inch wells were put down and replaced with new strainers, the wells being driven to a depth of from 32 feet 6 inches to 35 feet, and yield from 33 to 48 gallons per minute. Twenty-seven wells have been pulled up and redriven to depths varying from 35 feet to 37 feet and yield from 18 to 52 gallons per minute with a hand pump. One well was pulled up and redriven to a depth of 33 feet at the Engineer's house.

At Oconee pumping station, three wells have been put down by first sinking a 12-inch casing, then placing within the casing a 4-inch brass strainer 12 feet long, connected to 4½-inch pipe. The space around the casing and strainer was filled with gravel and the casing withdrawn. These wells have been sunk to a depth of from 43 feet 9 inches to 46 feet and have shown that they would furnish a large supply of water.

At Jameco pumping station, preparations have been made for cleaning the deep well plant and placing new strainers in the deep wells. At the Spring Creek station

four 4½-inch to 4-inch wells similar to those sunk at Oconee have been put down, the depth of the wells varying from 44 feet to 50 feet.

At the Flushing pumping station, two 2-inch test wells were driven to depths of 65 feet and 70 feet, respectively.

Ponds, Conduits and Reservoirs.

The usual work of patrolling and cleaning the ponds, conduits and reservoirs has been carried on as usual. Owing to the increase in the algae growth in the Ridgewood reservoir, basins Nos. 2 and 3 were cut off on June 30, the water being pumped through the by-pass and through basin No. 1.

The following schedule gives a summary of the work of cleaning closets and cesspools done by the Department during the quarter, to prevent pollution of the surface supplies:

Surveys of Land for Protection from Pollution.

The field work has been completed on locating the property along Schodack brook, which it is anticipated that the City will purchase in the future.

Work is now being carried on along the Simonson's streams, surveys being made of the property where the danger from pollution is greatest.

Water Analyses.

During the quarter there have been 1,446 samples of Brooklyn water analyzed, while the total number of analyses of water from all the boroughs, including Brooklyn, made by the Mount Prospect Laboratory, have been 2,631. Besides this work the following examinations and analyses have been made:

The chlorine continues very low, as we have not yet commenced to draw heavily on the driven wells. The water has been in a very satisfactory condition during the quarter.

Infiltration Galleries.

The work on the Wantagh Infiltration Gallery has been carried on during the quarter, the work done covering the laying of 508 linear feet of 36-inch pipe east of the pump well and 771.5 feet of 36-inch pipe and 121.75 feet of 33-inch pipe west of the well. The total amount laid to date has been 866.5 feet of 36-inch and 122.5 feet of 33-inch pipe west of the pump well and 1,510 feet of 36-inch pipe east of the well. This makes a total length of gallery of 2,499 feet, and there is yet about 9,800 feet to be laid. The contractors have furnished a supply of about 4,500,000 gallons per day from this gallery during the month of June, besides having pumps located at the ends of the gallery where the work of laying the pipe was progressing, the water pumped from the trench being wasted.

The contracts for the Massapequa Gallery are in the hands of the printer, and it is expected that bids will be received for this gallery some time during July.

The water from these galleries is greatly needed for the City's supply, and additional galleries will be planned and commenced as soon as the appropriations warrant.

Filter Beds.

The Hempstead and Forest Stream Filter Beds have shown extremely satisfactory bacteriological results and the cost of filtering has been very low. A contract has been prepared for the 20-inch drain pipe to be laid from the Forest Stream Filter Beds to a point below the dam, so that the beds can be washed instead of being scraped.

Mechanical Filter Beds.

The Baisleys and Springfield plants have furnished water of a satisfactory quality, although some trouble has been experienced with algae growth. The cost of filtering these plants is fully three times greater than the cost of filtering with the slow sand filters, and the bacterial results are somewhat better from the slow sand filters than from the mechanical filters.

New Work.

In my report of April 11, 1905, I requested that appropriations be granted for the extension and improvement of the water works system, as follows:

I have been advised that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has authorized an appropriation of \$3,390,000 for the Borough of Brooklyn, thus making a reduction of \$1,700,000. As, in accordance with the specific instructions from the Commissioner of the Department, the items included in the above schedule comprised only work urgently needed, it is to be regretted that the above reduction was made, as it will be necessary to cut down the amounts required for the improvements of the distribution system; also probably a portion of the new conduit from Massapequa to Ridgewood, and other items required to increase the efficiency and adequacy of the supply. It becomes, therefore, still more urgent, as already stated in a previous part of this report, to secure the necessary authorization to use the appropriation of \$500,000 originally granted for repairs to the Millburn reservoir, and also the surplus of about \$150,000 which was left from the appropriation for the additional pipe conduit. These amounts will make up a good portion of the reduction made in the appropriation requested. It is to be hoped that the Board of Aldermen will take prompt action in approving the authorization of the necessary bond issues for new works.

Law Suits.

There have been no cases brought to trial during the quarter, but a survey was made of the farm of Mr. J. Selover, near the Jameco Pumping Station. Several cases were on the calendar, but were not reached by the end of the quarter.

Office Room and Force.

It is much to be regretted that the increased force requested for this borough has not yet been appointed, as we are compelled to neglect some of the routine work and delay the submission of reports, plans and specifications owing to the lack of the necessary force.

A rearrangement of the rooms allotted to this Bureau on the top floor of the Municipal Building has made it possible to slightly increase the space available for the engineering force, but the total space occupied is utterly inadequate for properly and efficiently carrying on the work and taking care of the maps and reports. I earnestly renew my recommendations to secure, without loss of time, the much needed additional room.

On the 1st of April I was appointed Chief Engineer of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond, and directed to continue as Acting Chief Engineer for the Borough of Brooklyn.

Dear Sir—In accordance with the requirements of section 1542 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897 (City Charter), I herewith submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the three months ending June 30, 1905.

Exhibit "A" is a statement showing the amounts expended and incurred during the second quarter of the year 1905, for the lighting of public and department buildings, the fitting up, lighting and maintenance, etc., of public lamps, and the necessary expenditures of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the lamp account, showing the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued by each gas and electric company during the quarter, a total of 78 new gas lamps, 3 new Welsbach naphtha lamps, 27 new electric lamps, and 94 new Welsbach naphtha lamps have been lighted; 793 old gas lamps, 3 naphtha lamps and 14 Welsbach naphtha lamps have been relighted; 1,924 gas lamps, 15 naphtha and 9 electric lamps have been discontinued. The total number of lamps lighted June 30, 1905, was 31,034, of which 572 were ordinary open flame gas lamps, 22,474 single Welsbach gas lamps, 4 double Welsbach gas lamps, 4 cluster Welsbach lamps, 1,438 naphtha lamps, 1,012 Welsbach naphtha lamps and 5,530 electric lamps.

Exhibit "C" is a statement showing the candle power of the gases supplied to the city by such of the gas companies as are within reach of our photometric stations.



vated, and over or under the railroad tracks so depressed or elevated, with all turnouts, sidings or tracks necessary to secure the continuous connection of portions of such surface railroad. In the event that any such turnouts, sidings or tracks shall extend beyond the lines of the right of way of such railroad corporation whose tracks have been so depressed or elevated in or upon any of the streets or highways aforesaid, such turnouts, sidings or tracks so extending beyond the lines of such right of way shall only be constructed upon condition that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded, and the consent also of the local authorities having the control of that portion of such street or highway upon which it is proposed to construct such turnout, siding or tracks, shall be first obtained. Eleventh.—That the tracks for an electrical railroad have been laid upon the aforesaid right of way of the said railroad, over or under the said improvement, with the exception of the following portions thereof, viz:

1. From the westerly side of Bedford avenue to a point midway between Nostrand avenue and New York avenue.

2. From a point opposite Columbus place to a point near Louis place.

3. From a point opposite Olive place to a point nearly opposite Alabama avenue, with the exception of the portion of the south side of Atlantic avenue, between Snediker and Georgia avenues, occupied by the tracks of the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company, over which the Long Island Railroad Company has the right to operate.

At these points, where either the cuts are located (being the portions of said right of way by which the trains from the depressed subway reach the surface), or the inclined portion of the elevated structure extends from the grade of the avenue to a place where there is sufficient headroom for the cars to pass thereunder. At these points the existence of these obstacles make it impossible to operate a continuous railroad upon the surface of said right of way.

Twelfth.—That in order to secure a continuous connection and operation of said surface railroad, it is necessary that a turnout or siding, consisting of a single track on each side of said right of way, should be constructed in the various portions of Atlantic avenue lying between the points aforesaid, and also that the same should be connected with the tracks of the street surface railroads intersecting the same. That such sidings and connections have been duly located, and that the portions of the streets proposed to be occupied thereby are, and the general line of the improvement is designated on the blue print hereto annexed, marked "A," Drawing No. R-4. Maps showing each one of such sidings in detail are also hereto annexed, marked "B," "C," "D"; maps "E" and "F" show the location of the poles carrying the electric wires.

Thirteenth.—That your petitioners are advised and believe that under the statutes aforesaid, and under the provisions of law relative to the subject, your petitioners are authorized to construct said turnouts and sidings and to operate an electric railroad over the same in connection with the line constructed upon the surface of the aforesaid right of way as aforesaid, upon obtaining the consent of the local authorities of The City of New York, and the consent of the majority of the owners of the property abutting on said sidings, or, in lieu of the latter, the consent of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.

Fourteenth.—That your petitioners have used diligent efforts to obtain the consent of the majority of said abutting owners, but have been unable so to do, and are now about to apply to the Appellate Division for its consent in lieu thereof.

Fifteenth.—That the portions of Atlantic avenue over which the petitioners desire to obtain the consent of the City to operate is only a very small portion of the entire route of the proposed railroad, the remainder being upon the property of your petitioners.

That this proposed railroad will be a trolley railroad of the most modern character, and its construction and operation will be a great public convenience, and will, as your petitioners are informed and believe, largely enhance the value of the property abutting on Atlantic avenue and of that in the vicinity. That your petitioners believe that a rental of one hundred dollars (\$100) a year for a franchise to operate each of four turnouts, or the aggregate annual rent of four hundred dollars (\$400) (which represents a capitalization of four per centum of \$10,000), would be a reasonable rent to pay for such privileges, and your petitioners hereby offer to pay the same to the City for its consent to such construction.

Wherefore, your petitioners respectfully pray that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will grant to the Nassau Electric Railroad Company and the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, the consent of The City of New York for the construction of a double track electrical railroad to be laid on the surface of Atlantic avenue in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, one track thereof to be laid on each side of said avenue in the portions thereof adjoining the places where the right of way of the Long Island Railroad Company above mentioned is obstructed by the elevated and depressed tracks, to wit:

1. Leaving the said right of way at a point forty (40) feet westerly from the westerly side of Bedford avenue, and thence running with a single track on each side of the line of the said right of way and the inner rail of said tracks to be about four (4) feet distant therefrom, to a point about one hundred and fifty (150) feet easterly from the easterly line of Nostrand avenue, and thence curving inward, intersecting the said right of way and connecting with the tracks thereon.

2. Leaving the said right of way at a point about opposite the easterly line (if extended) of Columbus place, and running with a single track on each side of the line of the said right of way and the inner rail of said tracks to be about four (4) feet distant therefrom, to a point about opposite to the easterly side of Cooper place (if extended), and thence curving inward, intersecting the said right of way, and connecting with the tracks thereon.

3. Leaving the said right of way at a point approximately at the centre of Stone avenue, or Eastern Parkway Extension, and running with a single track on each side of the line of the said right of way, to a point about opposite the easterly curb line of Alabama avenue (excepting the portion of the southern side of Atlantic avenue between Snediker and Alabama avenues, occupied by the existing tracks of the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company, over which the Long Island Railroad Company has the right to operate); thence curving inward into the said

right of way and connecting with the tracks laid thereon.

4. Together with the right to erect and maintain the necessary poles, wires and appurtenances, the poles supporting the wires by which said cars are to be operated to be placed as far as practicable within the limits of the right of way aforesaid.
