DEAR SIR—Referring to the complaint of the Washington Heights Taxpayers' Association, which you sent me on the 8th inst., the plan which was submitted by me we believe to be the best for our service, and I am advised by our operating department that our trains do maintain the schedule in service, and do fit in properly south of Ninety-sixth street, notwithstanding Mr. Bolton's statement that they do not.

Furthermore, I do not think the contention of the Washington Heights Taxpayers' Association is well taken, as they suggest a six-minute interval on the Lenox avenue express service, where the traffic is five or six times larger than that which we receive between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth streets, and the schedule proposed by Mr. Bolton would not facilitate the movement of trains at Ninety-sixth street, but, on the contrary, would cause considerable congestion.

The schedule proposed in diagram "C" very plainly indicates that they are considering the interests of the Broadway line regardless of the service of the entire system, and, in our judgment, should such a schedule be adopted, it would not only demoralize the service south of Ninety-sixth street and on Lenox avenue, but on the Broadway line as well.

DEAR SIR—I enclose herewith some copies of a revised draft of a bill to provide for discontinuing the use by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company of the surface of certain streets in this borough. This revision has been the subject of discussion between the Mayor and myself, and it has also been submitted to the representatives of the Railroad Company and to gentlemen representing various associations.

With a single exception I think the bill in its present form would be satisfactory to the various parties in interest. The only serious difference is that some of the civic associations interested desire to have a mandatory provision requiring the City to be at the expense of roofing over the whole of the railroad tracks along the Riverside Park, from Seventy-second to One Hundred and Twenty-second streets, and along the whole of the Fort Washington Park.

In the bill as drafted and herewith submitted this question is left to the discretion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK (HEREIN after called the City) acting by its Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners (hereinafter called the Board) contemplates building a certain Rapid Transit Railroad, known as Route No. 9, in Centre street (Manhattan) and other streets in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, including ultimately Delancey street, Grand street, Desbrosses street, Canal street and William street in Manhattan, and Fulton street, Lafayette avenue and Broadway in Brooklyn.

By this advertisement, the City invites proposals to construct that part of said Railroad which is situated in Centre street between Pearl street and Canal street, and in Walker street and Canal street between Centre street and Chrystie street, in accordance with the detailed plans and specifications adopted therefor.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad. There will be four tracks in Centre street and two tracks in Walker street and Canal street, and provisions for spurs turning west into Canal street.
