Dear Sir-Referring to the complaint of the Washington Heights Taxpayers' Association, which you sent me on the 8th inst., the plan which was submitted by me we believe to be the best for our service, and I am advised by our operating department that our trains do maintain the schedule in service, and do fit in properly south of Ninety-sixth street, notwithstanding Mr. Bolton's statement that they do not.

Furthermore, I do not think the contention of the Washington Heights Taxpayers'

Association is well taken, as they suggest a six-minute interval on the Lenox avenue express service, where the traffic is five or six times larger than that which we receive between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth streets, and the schedule proposed by Mr. Bolton would not facilitate the movement of trains at Ninety-sixth street, but, on the contrary, would cause considerable congestion.

The schedule proposed in diagram "C" very plainly indicates that they are considering the interests of the Broadway line regardless of the service of the entire system, and, in our judgment, should such a schedule be adopted, it would not only demoralize the service south of Ninety-sixth street and on Lenox avenue, but on the Broadway line as well.
