



12th and 15th; and the Park Hospital four times, namely—on the 3d, 6th, 12th and 14th.

On Sunday the 12th inst., having returned from my visit to the 99th street hospital, I found messages both from Bellevue and the Park Hospitals. I first visited Bellevue and performed a critical and capital operation, and then went directly to Park Hospital.

Fortunately, the case at this latter hospital was not so serious as was first apprehended, and no surgical operation was required. I mention this circumstance to explain an unusual delay in responding to the call from Park Hospital.

Third, I have at present no suggestions to make, but I shall not fail to recommend improvements and alterations whenever they seem to be demanded.

Having replied to the questions contained in the resolutions referred to, and believing that they were dictated by a desire, on the part of the Board, to acquaint itself more fully with the present system of management, I will add, that the number of visits made by me to the Reception Hospitals during the year ending January 1, 1874, was 122. (See my annual report, also the Hospital Records.) These visits include many prolonged detentions, for the purpose of applying dressings and making surgical operations.

Since Jan. 1st, I have made 16 visits to the Park Hospital, and, I believe, the same number to the 99th Street Hospital. (The Records of the latter are not before me.) During the time that I have held this office, no call has been received at my house to which I have not responded as promptly as possible and generally immediately. As my services in these hospitals dates from their first organization, (first as a member of the Bellevue Staff, and later as Surgeon-in-Chief), I am prepared to say that they have undergone a steady improvement, and especially since the adoption of the present system inaugurated a year ago, but not fully completed until the present time. In the early part of my experience serious errors in diagnosis were not unfrequent, and such as, if they had not been corrected, must have entailed permanent maiming, if not actual loss of life; errors in diagnosis have become less frequent. The care and management of cases have been of late more satisfactory, and the discipline of the hospitals has improved.

From the moment that I was asked by your Board to accept of my present position, I urged the necessity of competitive examinations as an essential measure of reform, and I am happy to answer you that the event has justified my convictions of their utility.

Rules for the Government of Physicians of City Prison.

Insane patients domiciled in the prison are in charge of the Commissioners, and no fees are to be charged for their examination or for the certificate of their insanity.

Insane patients visited at their residence, or elsewhere than in the prison, will be regarded as private patients of the Physician.

Prisoners when sick are the patients of the physician of the prison in which they are confined, but they may have the services of other physicians in consultation, with the consent of the official physician.

Prisoners dangerously ill may be placed in the hospital of the prison on the written assent of the Warden.

Prisoners shall be furnished with medicines gratis, but they may provide their own medicines with the consent of the official physician.

Hours of duty of physicians from 8 to 10 o'clock, A.M., and thereafter when called for by the Warden.

Resolved, That the proposition of William Ryerson, attorney for Robert Pallett, to use the relief valve, patented by said Pallett, for the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, made to this Department in a communication on the 7th instant, be and the same is hereby declined, and that the Chief of Department be and he is hereby directed to cause the removal of all such valves from use in this Department, as required by the said attorney of Robert Pallett, on or before the 25th instant.

Resolved, That the proposition of Patrick Egan to paint the houses of Engine Companies Nos. 16 and 19, for the sum of five hundred and fifty dollars (\$550) each, be and the same is hereby accepted, and he is hereby directed to do the work under the supervision of the Inspector of Combustibles of this Department.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby directed to arrange for the leasing of the premises No. 125 Mercer street, for the term of five years from the first day of May, 1874, at a rental of two thousand eight hundred dollars (\$2,800) per annum, with the privilege of an additional five years lease from May 1, 1879, at an annual rental or sum which shall be equal to ten per cent. on the then valuation of said lot (as a vacant lot), which said valuation shall be determined by three disinterested persons, familiar with the value of real estate in said locality, one to be chosen by each party to the lease, and they to choose a third person whose joint valuation shall be binding to both parties, provided the sum to be paid as rental for said additional term, be not less than the amount agreed upon to be paid per annum for the first five years.

Resolved, That the Board of Fire Commissioners make application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to set apart a lot 25 x 100 feet on Hamilton Square, for the use and purposes of

this Department, and the erection thereon of a house for the occupancy of an engine company, to be organized for the better protection of that locality from the ravages of fire.

Resolved, That the pay rolls of this Department for the current months, when approved by the respective heads of bureaus, shall be duly certified by the Commissioners, and the Secretary is hereby directed to forward the same to the Comptroller for payment when so certified.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby directed to notify Robert H. Berdell that this Department will not require the premises on 151st street, which the Department leases from him, after the 30th instant, and in consequence, will quit and vacate the same on that date.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office, April 16, 1874.

The assessment list for sewer in Tenth avenue, between Lawrence and One hundred and thirteenth streets, laid over at last meeting of the Board, was taken up.

On motion, the objections to the confirmation were overruled and the assessment confirmed.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, &c., Seventy-fifth street, from Fifth avenue to East River, laid over at last meeting, was taken up. The Comptroller presented to the Board reports of Surveyors as to the manner in which the work was performed.

On motion of the Comptroller it was resolved that the assessment list for regulating, grading, &c., Seventy-fifth street, from Fifth avenue to East River, together with all papers relating thereto, be returned to the Board of Assessors with request that such list be transmitted to the Department of Public Works for re-examination as to the performance of the work; the evidence before this Board establishing the fact that the contract has not been executed in accordance with the provisions thereof.

NEW YORK, April 29, 1874.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH held at its office on the 28th day of April, 1874, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law on the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 183. That no person shall place or deposit garbage, rubbish, or liquid substance of any kind in any box, barrel, tub, cart, wagon or any receptacle whatever used for the reception, the holding or the transportation of ashes; nor shall any one pun ashes in or upon garbage, rubbish or liquid substances, or in any way place together, mix or have in the same receptacle ashes and garbage.

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 55. That no cattle, swine, pigs or calves shall be driven through the streets or avenues of the City of New York, or any of them, except between the hours of eight in the evening and two hours after sunrise of the next morning; nor shall any sheep be there driven except between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and twelve o'clock, noon, of the next day; nor shall more than twenty cattle, or more than one hundred and fifty hogs, or more than two hundred and fifty sheep or lambs be driven together; and they shall be driven only through the following streets, that is to say: Forty-fifth street, from First to Second avenue; Sixtieth street, from Eighth to Tenth avenue; the transverse road through the Central Park at Seventy-ninth street; Ninety-second street, from Third avenue to Astoria ferry; Ninety-fourth street, from Third to Fifth avenue; One Hundred and Tenth street, from Second to Eighth avenue; One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, from Eighth avenue to Manhattan street; First and Second avenues, in their entire lengths north of Forty-fifth street; Third avenue, between Ninety-second street and One Hundred and Tenth street; Fifth avenue, between Seventy-ninth street and One Hundred and Tenth street; Eighth avenue, from Sixtieth street to McComb's Dam Road, in its entire length; Tenth avenue, from Fortieth street to Sixtieth street; Harlem lane, from the intersection of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Eighth avenue to the intersection of One Hundred and Tenth street and Sixth avenue; Eleventh avenue, from Forty-second street to Forty-ninth street; Fortieth and Forty-first streets, from the Hudson river to Teath avenue; and Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth street, between Hudson river and Eleventh avenue.

After the first day of June, 1874, no cattle, sheep, swine, or calves shall be driven across the city between the 10th and 2d avenues, south of 79th street.

It shall not be lawful to drive cattle, sheep, pigs, swine, or calves through any street or avenue south of Forty-fifth street, nor to slaughter any cattle, sheep, pigs, swine, or calves south of said street; nor shall any such cattle, sheep, swine, pigs, or calves be allowed to pass upon or across any sidewalk, or to remain in the streets or avenues, except when being driven in accordance with this Sanitary Code.

Cattle arriving in the City of New York by cars or boats may be driven in accordance with this Code from the place of unloading, being north of Thirty-ninth st., to any existing cattle yard, through the streets and avenues designated, without limit as to number, provided they are accompanied by one attendant, if composed of twenty or any less number of head; by two attendants for more than twenty and less than fifty head; by three attendants for more than fifty and less than one hundred head; and by one attendant for every additional forty head above one hundred.

Such cattle and sheep as shall arrive within the Twenty-second and Thirtieth Police Precinct, as established by the Board of Police, by conveyances that, according to time-tables, should have arrived in season to be driven in conformity to this Code, but the actual arrival of which cattle or sheep has been delayed, without the wrongful act of the owners of the same (or of their agents), may be driven upon the routes herein before designated, when they shall arrive, to any established yards above Fortieth street, upon obtaining a written permit for driving the same (out of the hours fixed by this Code, but otherwise in conformity thereto), at the police station-houses in said precincts respectively, under such regulations as the police authorities may provide.
