



Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1877.

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS,
OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT, NO. 2 FOURTH AVENUE,
NEW YORK, April 2, 1877.

Hon. SMITH ELV, Jr., Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—I have the honor herewith to submit my report of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending March 31, 1877.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for new buildings was 173, and the number of buildings embraced therein was 325. Of these plans 156 were, upon examination, approved, 10 were rejected but subsequently amended and approved, and 7 were wholly rejected. The estimated cost of the erection of these buildings was \$2,764,330. The number of new buildings commenced during the quarter was 216, the number completed 182, and 587 are now in process of erection.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for alterations to buildings was 353, and the number of buildings embraced therein was 394. Of these plans 311 were, upon examination, approved, 25 were rejected but subsequently amended and approved, and 17 were wholly rejected.

The estimated cost of the alteration of these buildings was \$800,865. The number of alterations commenced during the quarter was 262, the number completed 200, and 227 are now in process of alteration. The total amount of money proposed to be expended in the erection and alteration of buildings during the quarter was \$3,565,195, as against \$3,444,936 during the corresponding quarter in 1876.

UNSAFE BUILDINGS.

The number pending on December 31, 1876, was 56, and the number since reported was 299, making a total of 355. Of this number 14 have been taken down and entirely removed, 173 have been repaired and made safe, and 168 are in process of removal or repair.

VIOLATIONS.

The number of violations reported during the quarter was 80, and in 68 of these cases the law has been complied with, and 21 violations reported prior to and pending on January 1 have been removed, making the total number removed during the quarter 89. Eighty-nine cases are now in the hands of the Attorney of the Department for prosecution.

COMPLAINTS.

Received from the public during the quarter, 114; in 49 cases no cause for complaint was found; 13 were removed upon verbal notification given by the Examining Inspector; 47 proved unsafe buildings; and 5 violations of the various provisions of the law of which the owners were duly notified.

FIRE-ESCAPES.

The number of buildings reported as requiring fire-escapes was 407; of these 188 were made to conform to the law upon notice, and 219 are now under process. The number of this class reported prior to January 1, and since removed, is 165, making a total of 353 fire-escapes provided during the quarter.

IRON WORK.

Arch girders tested during the quarter, 68; iron beams, 60; and iron lintels, 9, all of which were approved, having been found capable of sustaining the weight proposed to be imposed thereon.

BUREAU OF FIRE-ESCAPES AND IRON WORK.

WALTER W. ADAMS, Esq., Superintendent of Buildings:

Sir—I herewith respectfully submit a report of the operations of this bureau for the three months ending March 31, 1877.

CHAS. K. HYDE, Chief of Bureau.

The number of buildings reported as requiring additional means of egress in case of fire was four hundred and seven (407); of these, one hundred and eighty-eight (188) were made to conform to the law upon notice, and two hundred and nineteen (219) are now under process.

The number of cases of this class reported prior to January 1, 1877, and since removed, is one hundred and sixty-five (165).

The number of buildings reported as requiring trap-doors and railings to hoistway openings was five (5), and the number reported as requiring iron shutters on window openings was three (3). Of these two (2) were made to conform to the law relating to hoistways, and one (1) building has been provided with iron shutters, leaving five (5) of this class now under process. The number of cases of this class reported prior to January 1, 1877, and since removed, is nine (9).

During the quarter twenty-three (23) cases were sent to the Attorney for prosecution, of which twenty-one were for additional means of egress in case of fire, and two were for iron shutters on window openings. There were also one thousand five hundred and fifty-five (1,555) notices issued. The excess of notices served over the number of cases reported may be accounted for by the fact, that the agent or lessee have to be notified in addition to the owner, and where the proper parties are not found or are non-residents, notices are mailed to their address, if known, and copies posted on the buildings.

By referring to Exhibit "I" it will be noticed that there are four hundred and forty-two (442) cases still in progress of removal. Most of these are cases for which contracts are out and fire-escapes are being made, and also cases which require painting and repairing. Of the cases in progress of removal, one hundred and seventy-seven are in the hands of the Attorney for prosecution.

During the quarter, five thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight buildings have been examined by the Inspectors of this bureau, and, except those reported, have been found to be provided with fire-escapes or not requiring any additional means of escape in case of fire.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court-house, on Wednesday, February 14, 1877, at 2:10 o'clock P. M.

Present—John Kelly, Comptroller; William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation.

Absent—John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held January 17, 1877, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors, with communications dated February 2, 1877, viz. :

1. Manhattan street—Superstructure (Telford MacAdam roadway), from westerly line of Avenue St. Nicholas to the southerly line of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.
2. Thirty-sixth street—Paving with Belgian pavement, from Eleventh avenue to North river.
3. Forty-ninth street—Paving with Belgian pavement, between First and Second avenues.
4. Eighty-second street—Paving with granite-block pavement, from Second to Third avenue.
5. Bloomfield street—Setting curb and gutter stones and flagging, from West street to Thirteenth or Exterior avenue.
6. One Hundred and Sixteenth street—Setting curb and gutter stones and flagging, from Seventh to Eighth avenue.
7. Laying crosswalks at each of intersections of Madison avenue with One Hundred and Twenty-first, One Hundred and Twenty-first, One Hundred and Twenty-second, One Hundred and Twenty-third, One Hundred and Twenty-fourth, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth, One Hundred and Twenty-sixth, One Hundred and Twenty-seventh, One Hundred and Twenty-eighth, One Hundred and Twenty-ninth, One Hundred and Thirtieth, One Hundred and Thirty-first, and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, where not already laid.
8. Fourth avenue and Sixty-fifth street—Laying crosswalks at intersections of.
9. Basins on northeast and southeast corners of One Hundred and Sixteenth street and Sixth avenue.
10. Basins southeast corner of Forty-first street and Seventh avenue, southwest corner of Forty-fifth street and Broadway, northwest corner of Fifty-third street and Sixth avenue.
11. Sixty-ninth street—Regulating and grading, setting curb and gutter stones and flagging, from Third avenue to East river.
12. Avenue A—Sewer between Eighty-ninth and Ninety-second streets, with branches.
13. Centre street—Alteration to sewer, between Pearl and Canal streets.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed relating thereto, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, they were severally confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for setting curb and gutter stones and flagging in Seventieth street, from Lexington to Madison avenue, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated February 7, 1877.

The assessment list being in proper form, and no objections having been filed relating thereto, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the same was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving with Telford-macadamized roadway pavement, setting the curb-stones and flagging the sidewalks in One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, from Seventh avenue to Boulevard, received from the Board of Assessors with communication dated February 2, 1877, and objections filed to the same by Messrs. George H. Peck and Joseph H. Goodwin, and Mrs. A. M. Deen, were also presented to the Board by the Comptroller.

After hearing Mr. Peck in opposition to the assessment, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the objections received in said matter were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for building sewers in One Hundred and Eighth street, between Third and Fifth avenues, with branches, with the objections filed to the same by Messrs. Thomas Monaghan and Joseph Honig, laid over at the last meeting of the Board, was taken up.

After consideration of the objections, and a report of the Commissioner of Public Works relative to the same, dated December 8, 1876, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the said objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for flagging on east side of Eleventh avenue, between Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh streets, with objections filed to the same, by Messrs. Edward L. Donnelly, John McCracken, and John Kline, laid over at the last meeting of the Board, was taken up.

After due consideration of the objections received in said matter, and also a report of the Commissioner of Public Works, dated December 19, 1876, relative to the same, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the said objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller also presented to the Board the assessment list for grading One Hundred and Fifty-ninth or Waverly street, from Third avenue to Elton or Washington avenue, Twenty-third Ward, received from the Commissioners appointed in said matter, February 10, 1877.

No objections having been filed, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for grading One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Third to St. Ann's avenue, with objections filed to the same by Mr. Fordham Morris, of counsel for Kate E. Lyon, laid over at meeting of July 20, 1876, was taken up.

After hearing Mr. Morris, in opposition to the assessment, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the assessment list was again laid over for further consideration.

The assessment list for flagging Sixty-third street, from First to Second avenue, with objections filed to the same by Messrs. Abraham B. Cox, executor, and Jacob G. Sanders, which was referred to the Department of Public Works at meeting of October 21, 1876, for examination and report upon such objections, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Department of Public Works, with communication dated February 5, 1877.

After consideration of the report of the Commissioner of Public Works, and hearing Mr. Henry R. Beckman, attorney, in behalf of the objectors, on motion of the Comptroller, the said assessment list was laid over.

At 3 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.
