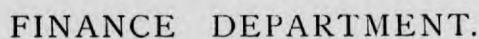

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
 MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
 THURSDAY, December 29, 1881—2 o'clock P. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.
 Present—All the members, viz.:
 Wm. R. Grace, the Mayor of the City of New York; Allan Campbell, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Patrick Keenan, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Thos. B. Asten, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.
 The minutes of the meeting held December 28, 1881, were read and approved.
 On motion, the Board proceeded to the consideration of the Final Estimate for the year 1882.
 The Chairman moved that the sum of \$4,000 be allowed for Contingencies—Department of Public Works.
 Which was agreed to.
 The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the sum of \$50,000 be allowed for Public Buildings, Construction and Repairs—Department of Public Works.
 Which was lost by the following vote:
 Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman) and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.
 Negative—The Comptroller of the City of New York and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.
 The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the sum of \$175,000 be allowed for Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc.—Department of Public Works.
 Which was lost by the following vote:
 Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman) and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.
 Negative—The Comptroller of the City of New York and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.
 The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the sum of \$5,000 be allowed for Tests for Appliances for Suppressing Waste of Croton water—Department of Public Works.
 Which was agreed to.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—To enable this Department to meet urgent demands in respect to the maintenance of the aqueduct, the repairs of pipes and stop-cocks, and the supplies for public offices, I respectfully request the following transfers of appropriations for 1881, viz.:

The sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) from “Aqueduct—Repairs, Maintenance, and Strengthening, Salaries charged to,” to Aqueduct—Repairs, Maintenance, and Strengthening.”
 The sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) from “Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc., Salaries charged to,” to “Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc.”

The sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) from “Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices, Salaries charged to,” to “Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices.”

As the said sums can be spared from the respective appropriations from which they are to be transferred.

Statement showing the Amount of Stocks and Bonds of the City of New York, payable from Taxation, other than Revenue Bonds, issued after 3d day of June, 1878, prior to December 31, 1881, pursuant to statutes authorizing their issue, and the sum to be included in the Annual Estimates in 1882, sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to meet and discharge the said Stocks and Bonds by the time they shall be payable, as provided by section 8 of chapter 383 of Laws of 1878.

Which was ordered to be printed in the minutes.
The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the sum of \$60,000 be allowed for Metropolitan Museum of Art Building.
The motion not being seconded, the question was not taken.

The President of the Board of Aldermen presented a resolution of the Common Council relative to the bill of Frederick W. Loew, late Register, for expenses incurred by him in proceedings before the Governor, for his removal from office as such Register.
Which was read and ordered on file.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$1,400 be allowed for advertising the Official Canvass of Election of 1879.
Which was agreed to.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that an appropriation be allowed for fifty additional Patrolmen—Police Department.
The motion not being seconded, the question was not taken.

The objections to and rectifications of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1882, made by the Board of Aldermen on November 23, 1881, were acted upon as follows:
Resolved, That the action taken by the Board of Aldermen on the following items of appropriations be agreed to:

Fire Department—Reduce the amount appropriated for new apparatus, horses, rents, hose, and all other supplies, from \$230,000 to \$220,000; increase appropriation for Repair Shop pay-roll from \$50,000 to \$58,000; and increase appropriation for Headquarters pay-roll from \$43,110 to \$45,110.

Department of Public Parks—Sewers and Drains—For cleaning and repairing sewers and drains in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, increased from \$5,000 to \$7,500.

On motion, it was,
Resolved, That the Board overrules the action of the Board of Aldermen on the following item of appropriation:

Department of Public Parks—Amend Harlem River Bridges—Repairs, Improvements, and Maintenance, \$20,000, so as to read as follows:

For the repairs, improvements, and maintenance of bridges now over Harlem river, including the rebuilding and maintenance of the bridges known as Farmer's Bridge and Kings Bridge, and including the rebuilding and maintenance of the bridges over Cromwell's creek at One Hundred and Sixty-first street and one Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, over Tebbet's brook, Mill brook, and other streams in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, \$50,000.

On motion, it was,
Resolved, That the Board overrules the action of the Board of Aldermen on the following item of appropriation:

Department of Public Parks—Maintenance Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—Maintenance and government of public places, streets, roads, and avenues, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, including supplies, salary of Superintendent, and wages of all persons employed on the work, be increased from \$35,000 to \$80,000.

On motion, it was,
Resolved, That the Board overrules the action of the Board of Aldermen on the following item of appropriation:

Department of Public Parks—Surveys, Maps, Plans, etc., in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, be increased from \$6,000 to \$12,000.

On motion, it was,
Resolved, That the Board overrules the action of the Board of Aldermen on the following items of appropriation:

Police Department—Insert for a new police station in the Twenty-eighth Precinct, \$40,000.
Salaries of Clerical force, as follows:
To increase the amount of \$45,000 to \$47,100.

On motion, it was,
Resolved, That the Board overrules the action of the Board of Aldermen on the following items of appropriation:

Department of Public Works—Repaving Streets and Avenues (under chapter 476, Laws of 1875)—To increase the amount of \$342,000 to \$450,000.
Laying Croton pipes (chapter 381, Laws of 1879)—Increase the amount of \$235,627 to \$300,000.

On motion, it was,
Resolved, That the Board overrules the action of the Board of Aldermen on the following item of appropriation:

Board of Education—To increase the amount of \$3,500,000, add for two new school-houses in the Nineteenth Ward, \$200,000.

Which was adopted by the following vote:
Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$150,000 be allowed for the College of the City of New York.
Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller moved to deduct the sum of \$2,000,000 from the Final Estimate, being amount of estimated revenues of the General Fund, not otherwise specifically appropriated by law.

Which was agreed to by the following vote:
Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered the following preamble, resolution, and Final Estimate for the support of the City Government for the year 1882:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1881, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-two (1882), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 25, 1881, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 28, 1881; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, the year eighteen hundred and eighty-two (1882), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows:

The Comptroller offered the following :
Whereas, The Board of Aldermen, at a meeting held on November 23, 1881, made certain objections to and rectifications of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1882, which were presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 28, 1881; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment duly considered such objections and rectifications, as provided by section 112 of the Laws of 1873; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in making the Final Estimate for the year 1882, at a meeting held December 29, 1881, overruled the objections and rectifications made by the Board of Aldermen as to some items, and agreed to and adopted them as to two items; therefore

Resolved, That the reason for such action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in regard to each item, are as follows :

Department of Public Parks—Item of "Harlem River Bridges—Repairs, Improvements, and Maintenance," \$20,000, increased to \$50,000.

This was overruled, for the reason that the sum of \$30,000 was deemed sufficient for the purpose.

Fire Department—To reduce the amount for new apparatus, etc., from \$230,000 to \$220,000; to increase appropriation for Repairs Shop pay-roll from \$50,000 to \$58,000, and increase appropriation for Headquarters pay-roll from \$43,110 to \$45,110.

This was agreed to, as the amounts specified were considered necessary.
Department of Public Parks—"Maintenance Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards," increased from \$35,000 to \$80,000.

This was overruled, and \$60,000 appropriated for this purpose, which was deemed sufficient.
Department of Public Parks—Sewers and Drains—For cleaning and repairing sewers, etc., Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, increased from \$5,000 to \$7,500.

This was agreed to, as the increased amount was deemed necessary for this purpose.

Department of Public Parks—Surveys, Maps, etc., Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, increased from \$6,000 to \$12,000.

This was overruled, as it was considered that \$6,000 would be sufficient.

Police Department—For a new police station in the Twenty-eighth Precinct, \$40,000.

This was overruled, in view of the fact that a site for the proposed building had not yet been procured, and the appropriation was not considered necessary. An item had been inserted under the proper head for repairs to the present station-house.

Police Department—To increase salaries of clerical force from \$45,000 to \$47,100.

This was overruled, as the appropriation of 45,000 was deemed sufficient.

Department of Public Works—Repairing streets and avenues (under chapter 476, Laws of 1875),—Increased from \$342,000 to \$450,000.

Laying Croton-pipes (chapter 381, Laws of 1879)—Increased from \$235,627 to \$300,000.

These items were overruled, as the amounts appropriated in the Provisional Estimate were deemed sufficient for the purposes.

Board of Education—Increased from \$3,500,000 to \$3,700,000, to provide for two new school houses in the Nineteenth Ward.

This was overruled, as the sum of \$3,500,000 was deemed sufficient for all purposes of the Board of Education, including the erection of new school buildings.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Chairman moved that the Final Estimate be filed with the Comptroller.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending December 17, 1881, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending December 10, 1881.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 748 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 17, 1881, which is an increase of 68, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 97 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 494 births, 53 still-births, 180 marriages, and 748 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 17, 1881; this shows a decrease of 43 births and 4 marriages, and an increase of 14 still-births and 68 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 78 births and 47 marriages, and an increase of 1 still-birth and 117 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 3; scarlatina, 1; typhus fever, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; apoplexy, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; enteritis, gastritis, gastro-enteritis, and peritonitis, 3; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 13; croup, 3; whooping cough, 7; typhoid fever, 4; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 7; inanition, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 11; phthisis pulmonalis, 24; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 16; heart diseases, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and preterm births, 7; surgical operation, 1; and suicides, 3. The number of deaths from small-pox, erysipelas, cerebro-spinal fever, alcoholism, aneurism, marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, convulsions, and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF UNPAID TAXES, ASSESSMENTS, AND CROTON WATER RENTS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate in this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice by advertisement

for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the date of entry of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS OF 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and 'bureaux,' and discharge subordinates in the same 'department.'"

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1882, viz.:

First.—The Bureau, or the Collection of Assessments, and "The Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1882, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof, the chief officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second.—The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city, and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1882, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
