Resolved, That in view of the statement made by Dr. Henry D. Braun, in a communication to the President of this Board, dated September 22, in respect to the offensive odors in the vicinity of Forty-third street and First avenue, all permits to slaughter-houses in that locality to melt fat or manufacture fertilizers be and are hereby revoked.

A complaint received from his Honor the Mayor in respect to premises west side of West End avenue, Sixty-sixth to Sixty-seventh street, and the report thereon, were referred to the Superintendent of Police.

Work Performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the Week ending September 22, 1894.

There were 13,636 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 562 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 372 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 58 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 5 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to Scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 11 permits.

The 665 deaths represent a death-rate of 17.59, against 19.40 for the previous week, and 19.21 for the corresponding week of 1893.

The decrease of 68 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 5 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 11 from diarrheal diseases, of 13 from phthisis, of 10 from diseases of the nervous system, of 23 from diseases of the digestive organs, and of 11 from violence, partially offset by an increase of 10 in the deaths from heart diseases.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, and the deaths from measles and scarlet fever were scattered over the city.

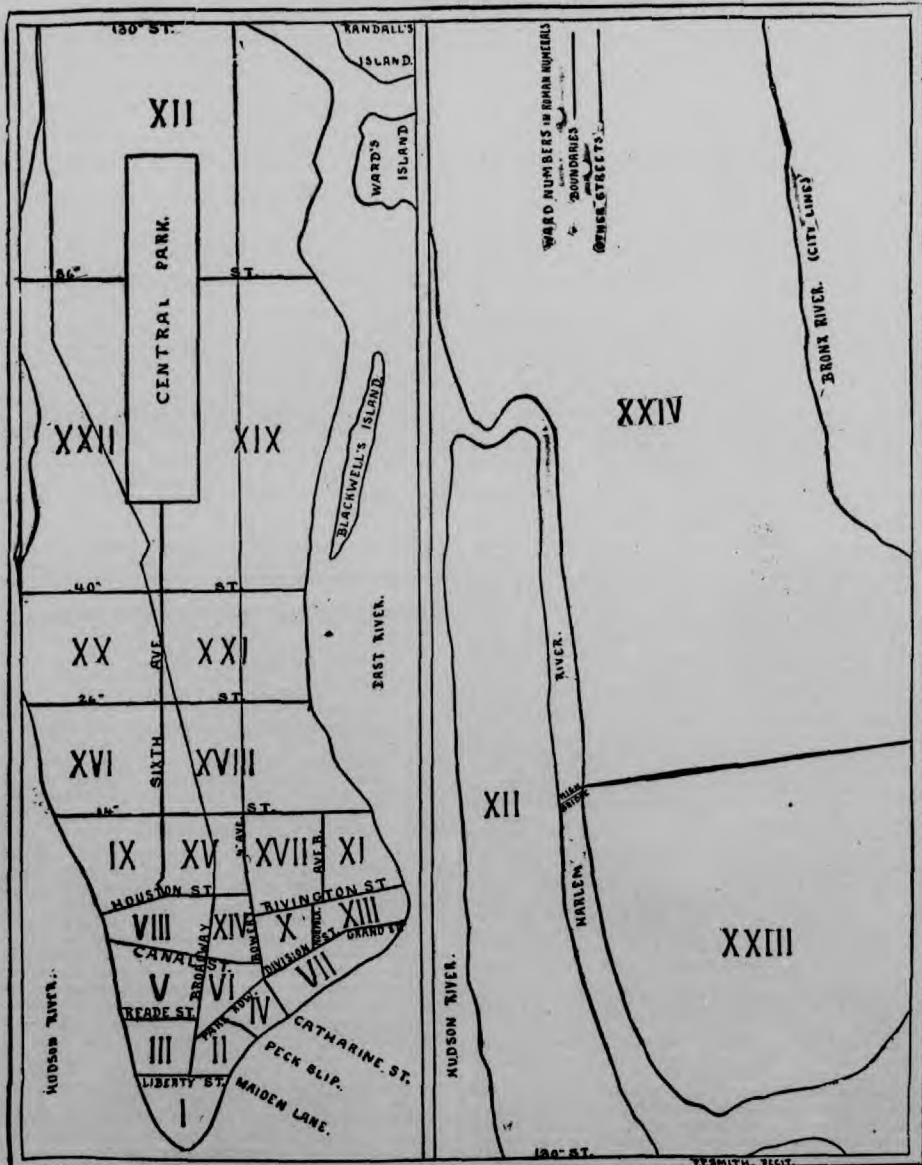

The 690 deaths represent a death-rate of 18.22 against 18.58 for the previous week and 20.28 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked increase, chiefly in diphtheria, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 107, 18, 23, 25 and 10 against 80, 8, 21, 33 and 6 for the previous week, a total of 183 against 148. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Seventh and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Twenty-fourth Ward. The increase of measles was most marked in the Tenth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Thirteenth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twelfth Ward, and the decrease in the Sixteenth Ward. Fourteen of the 25 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 7 of the remaining 11 were below Fourteenth street, east of Broadway. Seven of the 10 cases of small-pox were below Fourteenth street, east of Broadway.

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).
