### PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 333.

New York City, February 20, 1906.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Patrolmen of the Police Department of The City of New York most respectfully and earnestly urge that you do not encourage, by an appropriation

or otherwise, the holding of a Police Parade, now scheduled to be held some time during the month of May, contending that such parade is the cause of unnecessary expense and danger to the City, and also of considerable hardship to the men of the Department, and in support of this contention they claim:

First—That the amount of ten or fifteen thousand dollars generally expended for stands, music, etc., brings no adequate return, and might be much better used in another direction.

Second—That the City is practically unprotected during the actual time of the parade, and for several hours before and after, owing to the time necessary for the men to get from their respective precincts to the place of formation and to return again after dismissal at the end of the parade. During this time one man on patrol must cover the posts usually covered by six, seven or more men, giving great opportunity for fires and acts of violence to occur without immediate detection.

Third—That, owing probably to the continued unfavorable criticism of the Department by the press of the city, the parade, instead of being an honor to the men participating, humiliates them, as they are continually hailed with derisive cries of "Here come the grafters," "Look at these side door rappers," "See this bunch of fakes," and other similar remarks too numerous to mention.

Fourth—That, during the parade, traffic on the main thoroughfare of the city is at a standstill, and much delayed on all crosstown streets, resulting in great inconvenience and discomfort to the traveling public, which is not necessary or in any way compensated for.

Fifth—That it works hardship on the men in that they are compelled to attend an armory drill once or twice a week for three or four months previous to the parade, on what is supposed to be their own time and while off duty. As a majority of them live a long distance from the armory where these drills are held this drill often means practically the loss of the whole of their off time for that day, and prevents their obtaining the rest needed for the proper performance of their regular duties. In addition to this lost time they are, according to location, taxed from fifteen cents to one dollar each, on the day of the parade, "for ice water and music."

Sixth—That the only apparent benefit of the parade is the opportunity afforded a few of the higher officials to bring themselves more into the "limelight" of public vision.

They in no way object to doing regular police duty to the best of their ability, often losing much of the time they are supposed to be at home, therefore without complaint; often taking long chances of death or injury in the discharge of their duties, as is demonstrated hundreds of times each year; but they do strongly object to being made monkeys of for the gratification of the vanities of two or three of the higher officials.

The days when the parade would be of benefit as a civic pageant are past, and the parade now results only in the humiliation of most of those compelled to participate. They are not soldiers, vain of accomplishments and new uniforms, anxious to show them off; they are only policemen, and they beseech your Honorable Board to, as far as lies in your power, discourage the attempt to make them appear what they are not, that they may give even better attention to the duties they are sworn to.

Dear Sir—During the recent cold weather an investigation was made of the amount of heat furnished in the cars, both surface and elevated, operated in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn. The result of this investigation follows:

The rules of the Interborough and New York City Railway Companies, when complied with, insure the proper heating of cars on those systems. The observation of heating conditions on these two companies' cars has extended continuously during the extreme cold weather from February 5 to date. All of the surface cars, including the crosstown lines, which were inspected, were found comfortably heated. This condition was also true of the cars examined on the elevated lines, and shows that the Interborough Rapid Transit Company are complying with the Board's recommendation, dated February 1, 1905, in reference to heating cars on the Manhattan Railway.

For the above reasons, no recommendation is made to improve conditions of car heating on the New York City Railway or on the Manhattan Elevated Railroad.

Investigation has shown that the surface and elevated cars operated by the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company were not properly heated during the period mentioned above.

All the cars are properly equipped with electric heaters, controlled by a switch, which, when operated, places the heaters in combinations, giving three degrees of heat. When the switch is placed so that the heaters are in the third combination, they furnish the maximum degree of heat, which is sufficient to comfortably heat the cars during zero weather.

On account of a temporary shortage of power furnished from the southern power station during the recent cold weather, the company were only enabled to operate the heaters in the second position during the rush hours, and the cars were not properly heated during those hours in the period mentioned.

It was also found that another cause of improperly heated cars, especially during the morning rush hours, was due to the fact that a number of surface cars are stored in the yards, and that the heat was not turned on for a sufficient period before the cars were put in service.

I am informed by the company's officials that the cause of the shortage of power in the southern power station will be remedied to-day, and the company will then be enabled, when necessary, to operate all heaters in the third position.

To insure the above result, the following recommendations are made:

### Recommendations.

1. That when the temperature reaches a point 15 degrees above zero, all heaters in all cars be operated in the third position, and to remain in that position until the temperature rises above that point. That at all other times a sufficient amount of heat be furnished to properly heat all cars operated.

2. That a sufficient amount of heat be furnished in all cars to properly heat them thirty minutes before they are put in operation.

3. That a weekly statement be made to this Board showing the state of the outside temperature, and the degrees of heat furnished in the cars, during each hour of each day of the week.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Gentlemen—In view of the fact that Livingston street, from Court street to Flatbush avenue, has been recently widened from 50 feet to 80 feet, and that contracts have been let for the improvement of this street at a greater width, I respectfully request that your Board immediately adopt an ordinance fixing the width of the roadway of said street from curb to curb at 50 feet, and the width of the sidewalk from curb to building line at 15 feet.

AN ORDINANCE to fix the width of the roadway of Livingston street, between Court street and Flatbush avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: That the width of the roadway of Livingston street, between Court street and Flatbush avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, is hereby fixed at fifty (50) feet, the curb lines to be parallel with and twenty-five (25) feet distant from the line of the centre of said street, as laid down on the map of The City of New York, and the sidewalks each to be fifteen (15) feet in width from building line to curb.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Sir—The undersigned is the Chairman of the Committee on Buildings of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. You will recollect that he called upon you a few days since, during your session of the Board of Aldermen, and asked a favor of you, to which you replied "kindly put the matter in writing and send it to me." The matter to which I wish to call your attention is as follows:

In the opinion of the architects, the Director and the Assistant Director of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, it will be very wise to have a model made which will display the building as it will appear when fully completed in accordance with our drawings. We are advised by our architects that there are, among the great number of model-makers in New York, only three who could make a really first-class model.

The object of this is to ask if the Board of Aldermen will give us permission to have the model made out of our appropriation without competition. We are advised that the consent of your Board is necessary to this end. Of course we shall submit a limited competition to the three parties above referred to, but we consider a general competition in the ordinary way would be inexpedient.

I expect that the Commissioner of Parks will also join in this request, and we shall ask him to approve this letter.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

I am directed by Commissioner Ellison to inform you that the following report has been made by Professor George F. Sever, Consulting Electrical Engineer of this Department, relative to the resolution adopted by your Board on February 14, 1906, recommending the removal of all overhead wires and poles in the Borough of Queens:

"Replying to your letter of the 19th inst., inclosing copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen in relation to the removal of all overhead wires in the Borough of Queens, and placing of same in subways, I beg to advise you that the Board of Estimate passed a resolution some time in December, appointing Dr. Cary T. Hutchinson, Mr. Nelson P. Lewis and George F. Sever members of a Commission to consider the matter of a comprehensive subway system for Brooklyn and Queens, and the placing therein of all municipal and other wires. This is now being undertaken, but pending the results of this investigation which will not be forthcoming for a long period, I will prepare a list of those streets from which it is most essential that the wires be removed or placed underground.

"To this end I will confer with Mr. J. Burke, the Electrical Inspector in the Borough of Queens, and as I am to make an inspection of the Brooklyn streets on February 28 with Mr. Wynkoop, I will take occasion to visit Queens at or about the same time so as to make a full and complete report."

## Reports of Committee on Finance—

No. 207—(G. O. 44).

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on February 6, 1906 (Minutes, page 642), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of Corporate Stock, \$83,000, for transfer to City of New York of the title to real and personal property of the Normal and Training School of the Borough of Queens, respectfully

## REPORT:

That, by an act of the 1905 Legislature, the Normal and Training School of Jamaica was transferred to The City of New York, and the price to be paid for the property by the City was to be fixed by a commission composed of the Mayor, Comptroller, the President of the Board of Education, of State Commissioner of Educa-

tion and the State Comptroller. This Commission has fixed the price at \$83,000, and this appropriation is for the purpose of paying that price. As this is mandatory, your Committee recommends the adoption of the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of eighty-three thousand dollars (\$83,000) to provide means for the consideration for the transfer to The City of New York of all the right, title and interest of the State of New York in and to the real and personal property connected with the Normal and Training School in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, formerly in the Village of Jamaica and County of Queens, and for examination of title and survey of property.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 2, 1906, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding eighty-three thousand dollars (\$83,000), for the consideration for the transfer to The City of New York of all the right, title and interest of the State of New York in and to the real and personal property connected with the Normal and Training School in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, formerly in the Village of Jamaica and County of Queens, and for examination of title and survey of property, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding eighty-three thousand dollars (\$83,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

That this application is for an appropriation to pay for the Bronx approach for the new Fordham Heights Bridge. The court order has been served upon the Bridge Commissioner and the interest upon same has been computed to the 1st of April. If the money is not paid then the amount will be raised from accruing interest. As this is mandatory matter, and the amount has been fixed by judicial precedence, your Committee recommends the adoption of the ordinance.

## Reports of Committee on Salaries and Offices—

No. 312—(G. O. 47).

The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to whom was referred on February 20, 1906 (Minutes, page 828), the annexed resolution in favor of fixing salary of additional grade of the position of Draughtsman in Department of Docks and Ferries at \$2,100 per annum, respectfully

## REPORT:

Mr. Staniford, Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries, appeared on behalf of the Commissioner and explained that at the present maximum grade of \$1,800 it is impossible to keep some of the best Draughtsmen in the Department, as they are attracted by larger salaries in private employment, and also are led to seek transfers to other City Departments where larger salaries are paid. The Committee thinks that it is highly undesirable to have such a marked disparity of salaries for the same class of work in different Departments, as is shown in the report of Charles S. Hervey, Auditor of Accounts, Investigations Division, which was referred to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, together with its resolution. Mr. Staniford convinced the Committee of the urgency of the situation in his office, and we therefore recommend the adoption of the resolution, but it is the view of the Committee that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should undertake a systematization of the grades of Draughtsmen in the different Departments, and the Committee will likely refer back to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for that purpose any future resolutions regarding this position.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held February 16, 1906, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the establishment of an additional grade of the position of Draughtsman in the Department of Docks and Ferries, and recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, that the salary of said additional grade be fixed at the rate of twenty-one hundred dollars (\$2,100) per annum."

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby concurs in said resolution and fixes the salary of the additional grade of the position of Draughtsman in the Department of Docks and Ferries at the rate of twenty-one hundred dollars (\$2,100) per annum.

The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to whom was referred on February 20, 1906 (Minutes, page 813), the annexed resolution in favor of fixing four grades for salaries of Keepers in Department of Correction at \$800, \$900, \$1,050 and \$1,200 per annum, respectfully

## REPORT:

Commissioner Lantry, the Rev. Mr. Wade, Chaplain of the City Prison and the Penitentiary, and Mr. Dorsey, a representative of the Keepers' Association, appeared before the Committee and explained that the keepers, many of whom have been employed for a long period of years (some as long as 25 years), perform very arduous and confining duties, with long hours of service, and receive and have received the small remuneration of \$800 and \$900 per annum. It is proposed to grade the keepers according to their length of service, something in the nature of the grades in the Police Department, and yet the promotions will not be automatic, as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has amended the resolution heretofore introduced by leaving to the Commissioner discretion in the matter so that relative efficiency may be considered. While the immediate effect of this resolution will be a large increase in the salary account of the Department, the subsequent annual increases will not be so considerable, and the change in system should have a valuable result to the City in stimulating and rewarding efficiency.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the resolution.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 16, 1906:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the provisions of Section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, that the salaries of the position of Keeper in the Department of Correction be fixed at the following rates:

Under two years' service.....	\$800 00
Under four and over two years' service.....	900 00
Under six and over four years' service.....	1,050 00
Over six years' service.....	1,200 00

Provided, however, that no increase of salary under this resolution shall become operative without the approval of the Commissioner of Correction of The City of New York.

## REPORT:

Deputy Comptroller McCooey appeared before the Committee and explained that this resolution creates a new minimum grade of \$1,050, at which new employees will begin. This appears to be a measure of economy, and the Committee recommends the adoption of the resolution.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held February 16, 1906, adopted the following resolution:

It was explained that Mr. Demm does a great deal more work than any other Stenographer in the department and is an especially qualified man; that he is on the eligible list for appointment as a Court Stenographer at \$2,000, and that he has recently declined an appointment in the hope of an increase in his salary warranting his remaining in his present position. The Committee offers no objection to the increase of the salary in the particular case mentioned, but it does object to creating a new grade to which, at the pleasure of the Commissioner or any successor, all of the Stenographers now receiving \$1,200 might be raised. The Committee thinks it inadvisable for the Board of Aldermen to create a grade simply for the purpose of rewarding one employee. There is no legal objection to naming the beneficiary in the resolution, and your Committee prefers such action in this case. There are similar cases pending before the Committee in which a like report may be expected. Dear Sir—As Richmond Borough Hall nears completion, the subject of furniture and furnishings comes up for attention. Of the \$90,000 recently secured for the Borough Hall, a portion thereof is to be used for such furniture and furnishings, which will include desks, tables, chairs, office stools, window screens, water coolers, carpets, mats, window shades, wardrobes, telephone booths, railings, wire screens, mirrors and various other miscellaneous furnishings and fittings.

In furnishing fittings for each of the offices of the building, the requirements of the head of each office will govern the style required to meet the necessities of each particular office or Department. As can be imagined, the necessities of each office will vary the kind and style of furnishings and fittings to be used.

It will be seen, therefore, owing to the diversity of the articles needed, how absolutely difficult it will be to draw specifications that will aptly describe the supplies needed. In this connection, too, the drawing of such specifications and their approval through the various channels of the City will consume at least two or three months. This time, together with the time necessary for the advertising of bids, execution of contracts, registration of contracts, manufacture of the goods and probable delays in their delivery, would mean a further delay of at least six months, making in all at least eight or nine months. We expect now to get into the building about the 1st of April, and it is absolutely necessary, of course, that the offices be furnished and fitted up, ready for use at that time. Such occupancy and use at that time will be absolutely impossible if I am obliged to advertise for the furnishings and fittings.

Owing to the nature of the articles to be purchased, they can be best bought without advertising, because it is impossible, as stated above, to specify most of them satisfactorily, and therefore any competition of prices would to a great extent eliminate the comparison of quality. This would be true, for instance, of all the floor coverings and much of the furniture. It would be to the advantage of the City, both as to quality and cost, if we can shop for these goods and buy them as the result of personal inspection and personal selection; besides, personal selection will make it easier to fill the requirements of the various offices to be fitted.

It is very difficult to state the probable cost of the furnishings and fittings, but it will beyond any doubt exceed the sum of \$1,000. I therefore beg to respectfully ask that I be authorized and empowered to purchase without public letting the necessary furnishings and fittings of Richmond Borough Hall at an amount which will exceed \$1,000, but not exceeding the sum of \$30,000.

President Coler appeared before the Committee and urged a favorable report, stating that the new appointee would be of great use to him in his Departmental policies, and asserting that he (the Borough President) was willing to assume the entire responsibility for the creation of the position. Whereas, It is stated that during 1905 between 500 and 1,000 notices to tenants to install meters were sent out by attaches of the Water Register's Bureau, and later withdrawn for reasons which do not appear upon the public records; and

Whereas, It is charged that hundreds of favored individuals and firms, either through neglect or connivance of Inspectors, are allowed to steal vast amounts of water from the City, and that the Bureau is loosely managed in such a way as to work gross inequalities to the public generally; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be requested to supply to the Committee of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of this Board the following information:

First—How many meters were removed from buildings during the years 1904 and 1905, from what class of buildings such water meters were removed, and the reason for such action.

Second—How many notices ordering meters installed were sent out during the years of 1904 and 1905, the class of buildings to which these orders referred and how many of these orders were withdrawn, and for what reason.

Third—Upon whose authority were these notices sent out and by whose authority were they cancelled.

Fourth—How many buildings in Manhattan Borough are metered, and how many of the buildings so metered are hotels, how many breweries, how many factories, how many business houses, and how many residences.

Fifth—How many meters were installed during the years 1904 and 1905, and how many the two years previous.

Sixth—How many buildings, hotels, breweries, factories, etc., are there in the city without meters and which, under the law, should have them.

Seventh—What means are employed by the Water Register's Bureau to keep itself informed as to the erection of new buildings, and the metering of such buildings, and what means are employed to insure the City against the theft of water in buildings where meters are already installed, and how large is the force of men engaged in these two classes of work.

Eighth—How many cases of the theft of water by the use of secret pipes, or what are known as "by-passes" have been reported to the Department during the years 1904 and 1905, and what action was taken on these cases.

Ninth—How many water bills were reduced during the two years mentioned, and upon what representation.

Tenth—What is the total amount shown by the books of the Department to have been due to the City for water during the years 1904 and 1905, and how much of this amount was collected, how much reported to the Bureau of Arrears, and what disposition was made of the remainder.

Eleventh—How much of the revenues collected during 1904 and 1905 was for metered water and how much for front rates.

Twelfth—What is the nature of the 140 buildings in which the present Register ordered meters installed the first week of his incumbency in office, and why were not meters installed before.

Thirteenth—What are the receipts from water furnished to boats during the past two years as compared to the two years previous.

Fourteenth—If the Register's office has any means outside of the Inspectors to determine whether or not a building should be metered.

Mohn, No. 692 Chauncey street, Brooklyn, under date of January 16, that his name be restored to the list for promotion to Leveler in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, was granted upon his affidavit that he declined promotion to the position of Leveler in that office for the reason that the salary offered him was but \$1,050 per annum.

A communication was presented from W. Bloomer, Esq., editor of the "Bronx Local," dated January 22, requesting that his paper be designated by the Civil Service Commission to receive its advertisements of examinations. The Secretary was instructed to inform Mr. Bloomer that the Commission was of the opinion that the number of papers already designated was sufficiently large to thoroughly advertise its examinations.

A communication was presented from Vernon S. Moon, No. 176 Nostrand avenue, Brooklyn, dated January 20, requesting that his name be restored to the list for Transitman, and transmitting a letter from the Chief Clerk of the Aqueduct Commission to the effect that Mr. Moon had called at that office on April 3, 1905, and declined appointment as Transitman, on the score of location, and that their notice to the effect that he had not reported was incorrect. It was ordered that the candidate's name be restored to the list.

The request of Annie E. McCormack, No. 301 West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, dated January 25, that her name be restored to the list for Attendant was granted, upon her affidavit that she never received a notice to report to the Dock Department in reference to an appointment to that position.

A communication was presented from John W. Davren, No. 31 Ely avenue, dated January 23, protesting against the appointment of any person to the position of Private Secretary to the Superintendent of Sewers, Borough of Queens, and requesting the Commission not to certify the pay-roll of any person rendering such services other than himself, on the ground that he had been dismissed from the position of Private Secretary to the Superintendent of Sewers, Borough of Queens, without a hearing of any kind, or knowledge of any charges being preferred against him, in violation of the provisions of Civil Service Law. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Davren and inform him that the Commission would not certify the pay-roll of any person appointed in his place until the matter of his dismissal had been explained to the satisfaction of the Commission.

A communication was presented from Messrs. Field & Chittenden, attorneys at law, No. 391 Fulton street, Brooklyn, dated January 26, with reference to the case of Edwin C. Goodwin, a Junior Clerk in the Department of Health. It appeared that Mr. Goodwin was appointed a Junior Clerk in the Department of Health on August 11, 1899, at a salary of \$480 per annum, and that at that time he produced proof satisfactory to the Civil Service Commission that he was an honorably discharged veteran of the Civil War; that in 1903 Mr. Goodwin passed examinations for promotion to second grade Clerk and fourth grade Clerk, with ratings of 86.50 and 91.50 respectively; that, notwithstanding the fact that he was a veteran, the same was not noted on the promotion lists, and that several persons were promoted from said lists, over his head. Mr. Goodwin's attorneys concluded by requesting the Commission to take such steps as would have him appointed at once to the position of fourth grade Clerk, to remedy the wrong he had suffered through no fault of his own. After a consideration of the matter the Secretary was instructed to note upon the said eligible lists for promotion to second and fourth grade Clerk in the Health Department the fact that Mr. Goodwin was a veteran, and to address a communication to the Health Department requesting that he be promoted to the fourth grade of clerkship, with compensation equal to that now being received by the other Clerks promoted from that list.

A communication was presented from Messrs. John F. Greegan and William F. O'Connor, dated January 13, requesting that the Commission certify them as eligible for an increase in salary to \$1,500 per annum in the Department of Docks and Ferries, without further examination, on the strength of the examination for original appointment to the position of Stenographer and Typewriter taken by them, in which examina-



tion there was no limit of compensation fixed. The Secretary stated that the candidates had both passed examinations for promotion to \$1,200 per annum, which placed them in that grade, and that he had notified them that in order to be eligible for promotion to the fifth grade it would be necessary for them to take another examination. The request of the candidates was denied.

The Commission then considered a communication under date of January 29, signed by Richard J. Delehanty, of No. 280 Broadway, and four others, requesting the Civil Service Commission to make no further certifications from the eligible list of Deputy Tax Commissioners, on the ground that they were barred from the examination from which the said list resulted, and requesting that a new examination for Deputy Tax Commissioner be held at an early date, in order that those who were unable to take the previous examination could enter the new one. The request was denied, and the Secretary was requested to communicate with Mr. Delehanty and state that the existing eligible list for Deputy Tax Commissioner was formed in accordance with the provisions of the Charter, and although the Charter had been amended by the passage of chapter 330 of the Laws of 1905, it could not be construed as affecting the list now in existence.

The appeal of William J. Tracy, of No. 83 Harrison avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for a physical re-examination for the position of Sweeper, Department of Street Cleaning, was denied, the appellant having been rejected on January 8, 1906, by a Medical Examiner, for muscular weakness.

The Commission then adjourned, to meet on Friday, February 2, at 10 o'clock.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Friday morning, February 2, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

All the Commissioners were present.

A public hearing was held upon the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for amendment of the classification of positions in the competitive class, Part VII., by including therein the title "Heliotroper." Nelson P. Lewis, Esq., Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, addressed the Commission in behalf of the request. There was no opposition and the hearing closed.

A public hearing was held on the request of the Fire Commissioner for an amendment of the classification of positions in the labor class by including therein the following positions:

Core Maker.  
Moulder.  
Carriage-body Maker.  
Rubber-tire Repairer.  
Pattern Maker or Machine Wood Worker.

Hon. John H. O'Brien, Fire Commissioner, addressed the Commission in behalf of the request. There was no opposition to the same and the hearing closed.

The hearing which had been called in reference to the matter of amending the classification of positions in the exempt class in the Police Department, by including therein the title "Executive Clerk to the Commissioner," was postponed pending the action of the Board of Aldermen upon the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment establishing the position.

A public hearing was held upon the request of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for an amendment of the classification of positions in the exempt class under the heading "Bureau of Buildings in Each Borough," by eliminating the title "Chief Inspector," and substituting therefor the following:

Chief Inspector, boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Richmond and Queens.  
Two Chief Inspectors, Borough of Brooklyn.

Mr. David F. Moore, Superintendent of the Bureau of Buildings, Brooklyn, addressed the Commission in behalf of the request. Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the amendment on behalf of that association. The hearing then closed.

A public hearing was held upon the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the competitive class, Part I., by including therein the title "Steam Roller Engineman." After some discussion, Mr. Altman, Private Secretary to the President of the Borough of Richmond, withdrew the application to place the position in the competitive class, and a new application was made, on behalf of the President of the Borough of Richmond, to place the position of Steam Roller Engineman in the non-competitive class. The Commission thereupon ordered a public hearing on same for Wednesday morning, February 7, at 10 o'clock.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meeting held January 30 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the competitive class, Part VII., as fixed by the Civil Service Rules, be and the same is hereby amended by including therein, in Grade I., the following title:

Heliotroper.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the labor class, Part II., as fixed by the Civil Service Rules, be and the same is hereby amended by including therein the following positions:

Core Maker, Fire Department.  
Moulder, Fire Department.  
Carriage-body Maker, Fire Department.  
Rubber-tire Repairer, Fire Department.  
Pattern Maker.

The application of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for an amendment of the classification of positions in the exempt class by including therein, for the Borough of Brooklyn, an additional Chief Inspector of Buildings, was denied.

The Committee on Transfers recommended that the following transfers be approved:

Edward W. Libaire, from the position of Examining Engineer in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts to the position of Assistant Engineer in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

John F. Conway, from the position of Clerk (second grade) in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts to a similar position in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Joseph A. Young, from the position of Junior Clerk (Grade C) in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts to a similar position in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Charles H. Vanderbilt, from the position of Assistant Engineer in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx to a similar position in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

John Langel, from the position of Clerk (third grade), Tenement House Department, to a similar position in the Fire Department.

The recommendation of the Committee on Transfers was adopted.

Maurice J. J. Fahey, No. 15 Water street, West New Brighton, candidate for Patrolman, presented himself before the Commission to show cause why his name should not be stricken from the eligible list for that position under the provisions of Rule VII., paragraph 14. It appeared that the candidate stated in his application that he was born on April 6, 1876, and that, in the course of his examination, he gave the date of his birth as April 6, 1874; that he had been given an opportunity to produce proof which would settle the point to the satisfaction of the Commission, but had failed to do so. After the hearing Mr. Fahey was informed that he would be given one week in which to produce the required proof, and that in the event of his failing to do so his name would be stricken from the list for Patrolman.

Walter Corley, of No. 404 West Fifty-fifth street, candidate for Patrolman, then presented himself before the Commission to show cause why his name should not be stricken from the eligible list for that position under the provisions of Civil Service Rule VII., paragraph 14. It appeared that the candidate had made conflicting statements regarding the date of his birth and, when requested by the Commission to produce a

birth or baptismal certificate, had furnished one bearing the seal of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, Brooklyn, purporting to be signed by the pastor of said church, which certificate the Commission had been informed by Mr. P. D. Byrne, Examiner, he had reason to believe was not genuine, owing to the fact that the pastor's name was misspelled. After hearing the candidate's statements, he was informed that he would be given an additional week in which to furnish a satisfactory explanation of the matter, and in the event of his failing to do so his name would be stricken from the eligible list for Patrolman.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
