GENTLEMEN—I desire to ask your Board to transfer from the Contingent Fund of my office for 1876, the unexpended balance, amounting to \$956.34, and from the Contingent Fund for 1877, the further sum of \$1,443.22, making the sum in all of \$2,399.56, to the salary account of the employees

of this office for the current year.

I ask for this for the following reasons:

Ist.—It is necessary to enable me to carry on the business of the office to the close of the year.

2d .- My force is already reduced from what it was at the outset of the year, when I had it as

low as I thought it could be safely made.3d. The business of the office, instead of diminishing with a decreasing force, increases in volume,

3d. The business of the office, instead of diminishing with a decreasing force, increases in volume, with two courts now continuously in session and sometimes three, as is the case at present.

4th. The transfer I ask for is from the contingent fund, which I have administered with the utmost economy. I might have made an apparent reduction of the salary account by employing people outside of the office and paying them out of the Contingent Fund, but that would have been, in my judgment, a more extravagant method of doing the work, and also less efficient. It seemed to me wiser and cheaper to do it as I have done, and I trust that you will grant this application. If the Board deem it necessary, I will consent to have the entire transfer made from the appropriation for "Contingencies," for 1877, and also consent that the Board use the balance of the appropriation for "Contingencies" for 1876, for any purpose it may deem proper.

SECTION 194. That no cattle shall be unloaded from boats, or shall be driven or allowed in the streets, avenues or public places in said city, unless distinctly and legibly marked with a letter, sign or symbol plainly representing the ownership of such animals, which letter, sign or symbol shall have been previously registered in the office of the Sanitary Superintendent, approved by him, and written upon the face of the permit for driving cattle, issued from time to time to the owner of such cattle, under the rules, regulations and ordinances of this Board SECTION 195. That no permit for driving cattle in the City of New York shall be granted to any person save upon the condition that all such cattle shall be distinctly and legibly marked with a mark, sign or symbol, approved by the Sanitary Superintendent, so as clearly to indicate the ownership thereof, and it shall be the cuty of every person applying for or using a permit to drive cattle in said city, to file with the Sanitary Superintendent a correct statement of the mark, sign or symbol employed by him under the provisions of this ordinance.

A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the twentieth day of November, 1877, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional sections of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same are hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

SECTION 196. That it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee, or tenant of any vacant, sunken, or excavated lot in the City of New York to keep the same at all times clean and inoffensive, and to provide around the same a proper tight board tence, not less than six (6) feet in height, so as to effectually prevent the throwing or depositing therein or thereupon of any garbage or offensive thing whatsoever, and also to prevent persons passing from falling into such excavation.

SECTION 197. That no live geese, ducks, or other fowls shall be kept in any yard, area, cellar, coop, building, or other place within the built-up portion of the City of New York, excepting in the public markets, without a permit in writing from this Department.

A PPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fities. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and it unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
