### LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1881.

#### CHAPTER 30.

AN ACT to amend chapter twenty-seven of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled "An act to designate the holidays to be observed in the acceptance and payment of bills of exchange, bank checks, and promissory notes."

Passed, March 15, 1881.\*

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:  
Section 1. Section one of chapter twenty-seven of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled "An act to designate the holidays to be observed in the acceptance and payment of bills of exchange, bank checks, and promissory notes," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1. The following days, namely: The first day of January, commonly called New Year's day; the twenty-second day of February, known as Washington's birthday; the thirtieth day of May, known as Decoration day; the fourth day of July, called Independence day; the twenty-fifth day of December, known as Christmas day; any general election day, and any day appointed or recommended by the Governor of this State, or the President of the United States, as a day of thanksgiving or fasting and prayer, or other religious observance, shall for all purposes whatsoever, as regards the presenting for payment or acceptance, and of the protesting and giving notice of the dishonor of bills of exchange, bank checks, and promissory notes made after the passage of this act, be treated and considered as the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, and as public holidays; and all such bills, checks, and notes otherwise presentable for acceptance or payment on the said days shall be deemed to be presentable for acceptance or payment on the secular or business day next preceding such holiday. And the days aforesaid shall be considered as the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, and as public holidays for all purposes whatsoever as regards the transaction of business in the public offices of this State, or counties of this State. On all other days such offices shall be kept open for the transaction of business.

§ 2. The title of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "An act to designate the holidays to be observed in the acceptance and payment of bills of exchange, bank checks, and promissory notes, and relating to the closing of public offices."

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

\* Not returned by the Governor within ten days after it was presented to him, and became a law without his signature March 15th, 1881.

#### CHAPTER 32.

AN ACT to authorize and enable the German Free School in the city of New York to mortgage its property.

Passed March 16, 1881.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The German Free School in the city of New York, a corporation duly formed and incorporated under the laws of the State of New York, is hereby authorized and empowered to secure the payment of any debt which may be hereafter contracted for the purposes of altering and repairing its school building in said city by mortgaging all its right, title, and interest in and to said property and the lease thereof; provided, however, that the written assent of at least two-thirds of its trustees or directors be first obtained therefor, which written assent shall first be filed in the office of the clerk of the county where said corporation has its principal place of business.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

*Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.*

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement houses were approved upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted.

Plan No. 795-2, for one five-story tenement, 20 feet by 79 feet, on a lot 20 feet by 83 feet, on the southwest corner of Avenue C and Eighth street, to be occupied by seven families.

Plan No. 823-3, for two four-story tenements, each 28 feet by 68 feet, on lots 28 feet by 102 feet, on the south side of Seventieth street, beginning 100 feet east of Third avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 834-5, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 85 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the north side of Thirty-fourth street, 150 feet west of Seventh avenue, to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 851-52, for one seven-story tenement, of the dimensions specified in the permit, on a lot 57 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of Fifty-seventh street, beginning about 57 feet west of Seventh avenue, to be occupied by twelve families.

Plan No. 898, for two four-story tenements, each 30 feet by 68 feet, with an extension 22 feet by 18 feet, on lots 30 feet by 102 feet, on the south side of Sixty-first street, beginning 200 feet west of Ninth avenue, each to be occupied by nine families.

Plan No. 900, for one five-story tenement, 20 feet by 60 feet, with an extension 10 feet deep, on the south side of Fifty-eighth street, 141 feet 5 inches west of Avenue A, to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 901, for one four-story tenement 26 feet by 60 feet, with an extension 10 feet 9 inches by 16 feet, on a lot 26 feet by 90 feet, at No. 304 Second avenue, to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 902, for three four-story tenements, each 20 feet 5 inches by 52 feet, with an extension 9 feet 6 inches by 11 feet, on lots 20 feet 5 inches by 100 feet 11 inches, north side of One Hundred and Eighteenth street, beginning 395 feet 9 inches east of Avenue A, each house to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 903 for three five-story tenements, each 60 feet deep and 35 feet 6 inches, 32 feet, 34 feet 8 inches wide respectively, on lots of the same width respectively and 73 feet deep, on the west side of Third avenue, beginning on the northwest corner of Eighty-fifth street, each house to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 904, for four four-story tenements, one 21 feet 2 inches by 63 feet, with an extension 10 feet by 17 feet, on a lot 21 feet 2 inches by 100 feet; and three 27 feet by 63 feet, with extensions 10 feet by 12 feet 6 inches on lots of the same width respectively, and 100 feet deep, on the west side of First avenue, beginning on the northwest corner of Sixty-ninth street, each house to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 906, for two four-story tenements, each 25 feet 2 inches by 70 feet, on lots 25 feet 2 inches by 101 feet, at Nos. 229 and 231 East Eightieth street, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 907, for one four-story tenement 20 feet by 55 feet, with an extension 9 feet by 12 feet, on a lot 20 feet by 100 feet, on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, 80 feet west of First avenue, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 909, for one five-story tenement, 26 feet 6 inches by 97 feet, above the first story, on a lot 26 feet 6 inches by 101 feet on the southwest corner of West Tenth and West Fourth streets, to be occupied by sixteen families.

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement houses were disapproved:

Plan No. 908, for a four-story tenement, proposed to be built on the north side of 76th street, beginning 125 feet west of Third avenue.

Plan No. 911, for two five-story tenements, proposed to be built at Nos. 367 and 369 West Twenty-third street.

Plan No. 912, for one five-story tenement proposed to be built at No. 99 Henry street.

The application of John Glass, Jr., to modify the permit heretofore granted in plan No. 237, in so far as to allow one story extensions to each of the five tenements on the south side of Gansevoort street, beginning 85 feet east of Washington street, said extensions to be within 10 feet of the rear line of the lots, was granted.

The application of Thom & Wilson to modify the permit on plan No. 792, in so far as to allow the building No. 213 West Fifteenth street to be five stories in height, was granted.

The application of F. W. Klempt, to modify the permit granted on plan No. 817, in so far that each of the two houses Nos. 227 and 229 Fifth street, may be made 69 feet in depth, was also granted.

Plan No. 910 was tabled for further consideration.

*Sanitary Bureau.*

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 19, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,552, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 616 tenement-houses, 144 private dwellings, 66 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 37 stables, 12 slaughter-houses, 1 uninhabitable dwelling, 3 smoke-houses, 36 lodging-houses, 1 soap manufacturing establishment, 3 lard-rendering establishments, 1 stream, 1 public sewer, 70 yards, courts, and areas, 112 cellars and basements, 191 waste-pipes and drains, 191 privies and water-closets, 3 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 6 cesspools, 3 smoky chimneys, and 8 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 500.

During the past week 172 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 55 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

112 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 119 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 117 houses, 117 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

46 cases of contagious diseases were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The certificates of 484 births, 37 still-births, 200 marriages, and 674 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 19, 1881; thus shows a decrease of 96 births, 17 still-births, and 76 deaths, and an increase of 40 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 47 births, and 3 still-births, and an increase of 50 marriages and 145 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased, 6; whooping cough, 1; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 6; puerperal diseases, 4; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 8; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 22; pneumonia, 4; heart diseases, 6; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 8; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; premature and preterm births, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 4; scarlatina, 13; croup, 3; erysipelas, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; cancer, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; and surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from diphtheria, diarrhoeal diseases, bronchitis, aneurism, cyanosis and atelectasis, suicide, and drowning, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 119 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 190 under two years; 273 under five years, and 44 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 28 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 40.50 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 145 were in institutions, 345 in tenement-houses, 167 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 116 on the first, 167 on the second, 120 on the third, 92 on the fourth, 19 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 671 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents. 80 were stated to be single, 160 married, 71 widowed, and the condition of 363 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 674; still-births, 37; bodies in transit, 11. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 69 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 484 births, 200 marriages, 37 still-births, 674 deaths, 11 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 66 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 39 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 19, 1881, was 38 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.944, the mean humidity was 87, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,287, and the total amount of rain-fall was 2.40 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 625 deaths and still-births, or 87.90 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 14; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 280; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 74; Greenwood (undenominational), 42; Lutheran, (undenominational), 89; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 19; Evergreen (undenominational), 55; Woodlawn (undenominational), 16; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The actual mortality for the week ending March 12, 1881, was 725; this is 225 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1880, and 154.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 31.24 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the United States Census of 1880, being 1,206,577.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 15th day of March, 1881, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional amendments of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same are hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 26 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 26. That it shall be the duty of every person using, making, or having any drain, soil-pipe, passage, or connection between any sewer (or with either the North or East river), and any ground, building, erection, or place of business, and in like manner the duty of the owner and tenant of all grounds, buildings, and erections, a d of the parties interested in such place of business or the business thereat, and in like manner the duty of all boards, departments, officers, and persons (to the extent of the right and authority of each), to cause and require that such drain, soil-pipe, passage, and connection shall at all times be adequate for its purpose, and shall convey and allow freely and entirely to pass whatever enters or should enter the same, and no change of the drainage, sewerage, or the sewer connection of any house or premises, involving changes in the drainage, sewerage, or sewer connection of any other house or premises, unless notice in writing thereof shall have been previously given to this Department.

Resolved, That section 117 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 117. That the owners, lessees, tenants, and managers of every blacksmith or other shop, forge, coal-yard, foundry, manufactory, and premises where any business is done, or in or upon which an engine or boilers are used, shall cause all ashes, cinders, rubbish, dirt, and refuse to be removed to some proper place, so that the same shall not accumulate at any of the above-mentioned premises, or in the apartments thereof, nor the same become filthy or offensive. Nor shall any smoke, cinders, dust, gas, steam, or offensive odor be allowed to escape from any such building, place, or premises, to the detriment or annoyance of any person not being therein or thereupon engaged.

Resolved, That section 148 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 148. That no person shall within this city, without a permit from this Department, carry, remove, or cause or permit to be carried or removed, any person sick with small-pox, or other contagious disease, or remove or cause to be removed, any such person from any building or vessel to any other building or vessel or to the shore, or to or from any vehicle in any part of the city. Nor shall any person, by any exposure of any individual sick of any contagious disease, or of the body of such person, or by any negligent act connected therewith, or in respect of the care or custody thereof, or by a needless exposure of himself, cause or contribute to, or promote, the spread of disease from any such person, or from any dead body.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate in this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

### CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement, for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed, specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property

affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same 'department'."

First—"The Bureau of the Collection of Assessments, and 'The Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents' shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as 'The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents,' and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called 'Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets.'"

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
