#### To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:



The 644 deaths represent a death-rate of 16.93, against 17.36 for the previous week and 18.39 for the corresponding week of 1893. Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, chiefly in small-pox, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 150, 47, 88, 14 and 7, against 152, 52, 72, 28 and 45 for the previous week, a total of 306 against 349. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Twelfth, Seventeenth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Fourteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Eleventh and Thirteenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventh Ward. Six of the 14 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 3 of the remaining 8 were below Fourteenth street. 
