At the meeting of the Bay Ridge Local Improvement Board, held April 18, 1902 the following resolutions for improvements were passed: Ninety-sixth street, construction of sewer in Ninety-sixth street, between Third and Marine avenues, and in connection with the same, opening the street as follows Ninety-sixth street, opening Ninety-sixth street, between Third avenue and the Shore road. Eightieth street, construction of sewer in Eightieth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues. Eighty-ninth street, construction of sewer in Eighty-ninth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues. Fort Hamilton avenue, construction of sewer in Fort Hamilton avenue, between Sixty-fifth and Sixty-sixth streets, and outlet sewer in Sixty-fifth street, south side between Fort Hamilton and Tenth avenues. Sixth avenue, construction of sewer in Sixth avenue, between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets. Mermaid avenue, construction of sewer in Mermaid avenue, between West Fif teenth street and Stillwell avenue. Mermaid avenue, grading and paving Mermaid avenue, between West Fifteentl street and Stillwell avenue, Sixtieth street, regulating and grading Sixtieth street, between Second and Third Sixtieth street, opening Sixtieth street, between Second and Third avenues. Twelfth avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-fifth streets, regulating and grading curbing and guttering the street and laying cement sidewalks thereon. Seventh avenue, grading and paving Seventh avenue, between Forty-first and Forty third streets, with asphalt pavement. I welfth avenue, regulating, grading and paving with macadam pavement Twelfth avenue, between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-second streets. Fifty-third street, regulating, grading and paving Fifty-third street, between First and Second avenues, with granite block pavement.

Shore road, altering the map of The City of New York by changing the lines of the City of New York by changing the li the Shore road, between Seventy-first street and Bay Ridge avenue, and initiating Amending proceedings for cpening East Eighteenth street, between Avenue and Gravesend Neck road, by reducing the width of the proposed East Eighteenth street from sixty feet to forty-eight feet, by taking out of proposed street the wester ly twelve feet thereof where the lines of said street encroach on the right of way of the New York, Brooklyn and Manhattan Beach Railway Company, so as to make the westerly line of said East Eighteenth street the present easterly line of the railroad company's right of way. Resolution passed rescinding resolution of March 19, 1902, for opening Eighty-third street, between Tenth and Stewart avenues. Resolution passed requesting Board of Estimate to rescind pending proceeding for opening Eighty-third street, between Fourth avenue and Shore road. Resolution passed to open Eighty-third street, between Tenth and Stewart avenues, and between Fourth avenue and Shore road. Sixtieth street, grading vacant lots on the south side of Sixtieth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, also on the west side of Fourth avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, known as Lots Nos. 10 and 11, Block 951, Thirtieth Ward map. Thirty-sixth street, flagging sidewalks on the south side of Thirty-sixth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, known as Lots Nos. 12 and 28, Block 697, Eighth Ward map, with single course of cement flagging.

Thirty-seventh street, flagging sidewalks with cement on the south side of Thirty-seventh street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, known as Lots Nos. 10, 12, 32 and 38, Block 701, Eighth Ward map.
Twenty-fourth street, flagging sidewalks with cement on the north side of Twenfourth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 42 and 4 Block 649, Eighth Ward map. Thirty-seventh street, grading lot on the south side of Thirty-seventh street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, known as Lot No. 32, Block 701, Eighth Ward map. Thirty-seventh street, flagging sidewalks on the north side of Thirty-seventh street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, known as Lots Nos. 1, 40, 34 and 55, Block 697, Eighth Ward map, with a single course of cement walk five feet in width.

Thirtieth street, flagging sidewalks on the south side of Thirtieth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, also on the east side of Third avenue, between Thirtieth and Thirty-first streets, known as Lots Nos. 8 and 11 to 19, inclusive, Block 672, Eighth Ward map. Forty-eighth street, flagging sidewalks on the north side of Forty-eighth street, Letween Fifth and Sixth avenues, known as Lots Nos. 65 and 67, Block 766, Eighth . Fifty-eighth street, flagging sidewalks on the north side of Fifty-eighth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, known as Lots Nos. 47 to 54, inclusive, Block 848. Eighth Ward map. The following resolution was laid over: East Nineteenth street, opening East Nineteenth street, from Emmons avenue to Avenue W, and Avenue X, from Ocean avenue to East Eighteenth street up to Manhattan Railroad tracks, and recommendation from the Bureau of Highways that the opening limits of East Nineteenth street be extended from Gravesend Neck road to Emmons avenue.
