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## BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

### WASHINGTON HEIGHTS DISTRICT.

At a meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Washington Heights District, held February 5, 1907, the following members were present:

Aldermen Davies, Grifenhagen and President Ahearn.

The President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of constructing sewer in West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, between Eighth and Bradhurst avenues.

On motion, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the CITY RECORD that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board, at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, by the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To construct sewer in West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, between Eighth and Bradhurst avenues; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

The President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of paying West One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, from Broadway to Buena Vista avenue.

Mr. J. N. Buttery appeared in favor.

On motion, this matter was laid over for two weeks.

The President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out for use of pedestrians a highway 10 feet in width, extending from Terrace View avenue to Kingsbridge avenue.

On motion, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the CITY RECORD that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board, at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, by the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an alteration of the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out thereon for use of pedestrians a highway 10 feet in width, from Terrace View avenue to Kingsbridge avenue; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

On motion of Alderman Grifenhagen, resolution for the following was introduced:

To fence vacant lot at the southeast corner of One Hundred and Sixty-first street and Broadway.

Which was adopted.

The President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out an alteration of the map or plan of The City of New York so as to include within the lines of West One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street a triangular plot of ground at the intersection of Broadway, Audubon place and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street.

On motion, this matter was laid over for two weeks, abutting property owners to be notified.

The President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out a widening of Boulevard Lafayette, between One Hundred and Seventy-seventh and One Hundred and Eighty-first streets, and a widening of One Hundred and Eighty-first street, between Boulevard Lafayette and Buena Vista avenue.

On motion, this matter was laid over for two weeks.

On motion of Alderman Davies, the Board adjourned until February 19, 1907.

Resolved, That the following sanitary ordinance be and is hereby adopted and added to the Sanitary Code, to be known as section 183:

Section 183. It shall be the duty of all persons having in their possession bottles, cans or other receptacles containing milk or cream, which are used in the transportation and delivery of milk or cream, to clean or cause them to be cleaned immediately upon emptying, and no person shall use or cause or allow to be used any such receptacle for any purpose whatsoever other than the holding of milk or cream, or receive or have in his possession any such receptacle so used or which is unclean or in which milk or cream has been allowed to stand until offensive.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
