BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Synopsis of Proceedings.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, December 5, 1911. Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs, and Stern, Trustees; and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused—Mr. Farley.

The minutes of the meeting of November 21, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved.

Bills, amounting to \$19,814.28, were presented for approval, and were authorized to be forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

It is respectfully reported that Minnie Ransom, a pupil nurse, was transferred on November 22 to the Minturn Hospital suffering from diphtheria.

It is respectfully recommended that Dr. Theron J. Vosburgh be appointed Resident Physician on the alcoholic service, as successor to Dr. Bishop, resigned, and that application be made to the Civil Service Commission for approval of this appointment without examination; also that of Dr. Miner C. Hill as Resident Physician on the children's service. Dr. Hill has been acting as Resident Physician for several months. Beginning on January 1, his name will appear upon the regular pay-roll, and the approval of his appointment by the Civil Service Commission will be necessary.

Further investigation has been made of the moorings of the boat "Westfield." A communication has been received from the Department of Docks and Ferries, and in their opinion it is unnecessary at the present time to replace the piling. Mr. Harkins visited the boat with a representative of that Department, who stated that with new ropes attached to the piles which are there at present the boat will be secure for such length of time as it will be in use. He further states that the hull of this boat is in such condition that the length of time that we will be able to use it is very uncertain, and that in his opinion it would not be wise to expend any further money upon the same. In view of this report, it is recommended that the condition of this boat be thoroughly examined, and that if it is unsafe and beyond repair some action be taken either to abandon it altogether or to replace it.

It has long been the custom for several of the departments, principally the psychopathic, alcoholic and prison wards, out patient department, and tuberculosis division of the social service bureau, to submit monthly reports directly to the Medical Board. It is recommended that in the future these reports be submitted to the General Medical Superintendent, and by him transmitted to the Medical Board.

It is requested that a revision of schedules be made to cover the employment of additional Nurses at Gouverneur Hospital for the month of December, in anticipation of the taking over of the nursing service at Gouverneur on January 1. This involves the transfer of \$348.32.

A communication has been received from Dr. Gregory, Resident Alienist in charge of the alcoholic service, in which he makes the following suggestions for the betterment of this service:

First—That the structural changes which are still under way in ward 34 be completed as soon as possible;

Second—That suitable provision be made for the care of the critically ill and delirious patients in ward 30 by providing for these patients and for those in ward 8 in some part of the hospital that is now used as a ward or for some other purpose;

Third—That a clerk be provided whose duty it shall be to keep the records and do such other work as may be assigned to him by the Physician in charge;

Fourth—That two additional Internes be provided for this service to serve for a period of six months;

Fifth—That an additional salaried Assistant be allowed for this service at the rate of \$600 per year;

Sixth—That a request be made to the Board of Magistrates, or the Chief Magistrates, to have one of their body visit the prison wards at stated periods and dispose of such cases as may be submitted for their consideration;

Seventh—That action be deferred in the matter of excluding so-called "rounders" pending a further report from Dr. Gregory, waiting action by the newly created Board of Inebriety in this matter.

Practically all of the matters contained in this communication have been discussed with Dr. Gregory, and the plans for the greater part of them have been definitely worked out.

The transfer of Miss Ransom to the Minturn Hospital was approved.

The recommendations in regard to Dr. T. J. Vosburgh and Dr. M. C. Hill were approved.

The General Medical Superintendent was directed to arrange for a thorough examination of the day camp "Westfield" and to report at next meeting.

The recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent in regard to the reports to the Medical Board was adopted.

It was resolved, to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to revise the salary schedules as recommended by the General Medical Superintendent.

All the suggestions contained in the report in regard to the alcoholic service were approved, and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to take the necessary steps to put these into effect.

Reports of Committees.

The President reported the progress which had been made in regard to the preparation of the plans for the extension of Harlem Hospital, and stated that Dr. Goldwater had expressed a desire to resume his duties and his willingness to review these plans and any other plans before the Board, in addition to those of the new Bellevue Hospital.

It was resolved, to ask Dr. S. S. Goldwater to resume his duties as Expert on Hospital Construction, upon the same terms and conditions as before, on January 1, 1912, or as soon before that as possible, and to request his advice and assistance in the preparation of the plans for all the construction work now contemplated by the Board.

The President reported an interview which he had had with the Comptroller and Borough President of Manhattan in regard to the purchase of additional land as a site for a dispensary, power plant and Nurses' residence for Gouverneur Hospital, and stated that in accordance with the suggestion made by the Comptroller he had requested that the sum of \$50,000 be transferred from an unexpended balance in the appropriation for Pavilions L and M to a new fund to be established for the purchase of a site for the purpose referred to. This action was approved.

The Committee on Supplies submitted a list of bids received on November 28 for meats, fruits and vegetables, and surgical supplies required for the remainder of the year 1911. It was resolved that the lowest bid be accepted in each instance.

The President submitted a list of bids received on December 5 for the installation of machinery in the new laundry building at Bellevue Hospital, as follows:

It was resolved to defer action on these bids until next meeting.

A communication, dated December 1, was received from Dr. Joseph W. Walsh, Dean of the Fordham University Medical School, embodying the points submitted by him verbally at last meeting in regard to the facilities for clinical instruction at Fordham Hospital. Dr. Healy, President of the Medical Board, together with Dr. Higgins

and Dr. Welch, appeared before the Board in regard to this communication, and stated that it was the desire of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital that every possible facility for teaching should be granted the Fordham Medical College, but recommended that the power of appointment of members of the visiting staff should not be granted the college. These members of the Medical Board also referred to the duties and responsibilities of students who act as clinical clerks or surgical dressers, and Dr. Harry Moses, House Surgeon on the First Division, was called and reported the practice in regard to these clerks and dressers at Bellevue Hospital. It was resolved to defer action thereon until next meeting.

At this point the President left the meeting and the chair was occupied by Mr. O'Keeffe.

Communications.

Communications were received from McKim, Mead and White, dated November 23 and December 4, relative to the question of which section of the new Bellevue Hospital should be built next, in order that provision therefor could be made in the corporate stock budget. The communications indicated that there were many factors to be considered before a decision could be reached, and they were therefore referred to the Building Committee for recommendation.

Two communications, dated November 23 and 25, were received from R. F. Almirell, transmitting plans and specifications for the proposed Nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital. It was reported that these had been reviewed by the President, the Chairman of the Building Committee, and the various officers of the hospital, and that they had also been examined by Mr. Frees, Inspector of Construction. A report from Mr. Frees was received in regard thereto. It was resolved to approve the drawings and specifications, subject to amendments so as to include suggestions contained in Mr. Frees' report.

Communications dated December 1 and 4 were received from the H. C. Vogel Company, contractors for the installation of a sprinkler system in Bellevue Hospital, requesting an extension of time of thirty days on account of the delays occasioned by their desire to proceed with the contract with as little noise and inconvenience to the patients as possible. Granted.

The minutes of a meeting of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School held on November 17 were presented. The resolution in regard to the instruction of Italian and German to Nurses was noted. It was resolved to reply that, while thanking the Board of Managers for the generous offer to defray the expenses of these classes, this would not seem to be necessary, in view of the resolution adopted by the Trustees on September 19, 1911, on this subject.

It was reported that the President, in accordance with a communication received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor on November 28, had requested the Comptroller to reduce the reserved balances on the six contracts named therein. The action of the President was approved.

A communication dated November 29 was received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor, transmitting a copy of specifications for Kosher meat required for the day camp "Westfield" during the year 1912. These specifications were approved, and authority was granted to advertise for bids.

A communication dated November 22 was received from Miss Blanche Potter, Chairman of the Women's Auxiliary of the Bellevue Tuberculosis Clinic, requesting permission to publish an advertisement for old clothing for tuberculosis patients. It was reported that the President, after reading this article, had approved the request. This was approved.

A communication dated November 29 was received from the Art Commission, transmitting certified copy of a resolution approving the designs for the extension of Harlem Hospital.

A communication dated November 29 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copy of a resolution approving the plans and specifications for the construction of pavilions I and K of the new Bellevue Hospital. It was resolved to grant authority to advertise for bids for the construction of these pavilions.

A copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on November 14 was received, authorizing the purchase of an electric truck in the open market without public letting, at a cost not to exceed \$4,000. The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to arrange for the purchase of a truck accordingly.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a list of Special Nurses, who had been authorized at Bellevue Hospital from November 21 to December 4. The appointment of these Nurses was approved.

A communication dated December 4 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copy of a resolution adopted by that Board on November 29, approving a report of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Superintendent of Buildings of the Borough of Manhattan dated November 23, relative to the changes recommended by the Fire Department, in order to secure better fire protection at Bellevue Hospital, referred to in the minutes of October 17, 1911. The report denied authority to make all the changes suggested by the Fire Department, particularly those affecting the old buildings. It was resolved not to ask for an appropriation with which to carry out the recommendations previously made by the Fire Department, and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to take the necessary steps at once to carry out the recommendations contained in the report of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a communication dated December 5, received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor, stating that despite the appropriation of \$5,000 revenue bonds, provided by the Board of Aldermen to meet the deficit estimated in his communications of August 11 and 28, the books disclosed that there would still be a deficit of \$32,000 in the appropriations for the current year. The letter further recommended that a transfer of funds be requested as follows:

This communication was referred to the Finance Committee, with power to request the transfer and an additional appropriation in Revenue Bonds in the amount which may be considered necessary after investigation.

The General Medical Superintendent also presented a communication dated December 5, from the Contract Clerk and Auditor, requesting a reduction in Contract No. 28,581 of \$1,350, and in Contract No. 30,546 of \$500. It was resolved to request the Comptroller to make the reductions referred to.

A communication dated November 27 was received from the Board of Managers of the Training School, in reply to the letter sent by the President on November 16, relative to the criticisms of the subjects discussed in the annual report of the Training School. This communication was referred to the President and Mr. O'Keeffe.

A communication dated December 4 was presented from the Anderson-Martin Electric Company, transmitting a sworn statement as to the fire in the factory of their sub-contractor, referred to at last meeting, and asking that an extension of time of five weeks be granted instead of three, as originally requested. It was resolved to grant the Anderson-Martin Electric Company an extension of time of thirty-five consecutive calendar days from the date set for the completion of their contract.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital held on December 1 were presented. The reference to the loss of histories was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for his action; diplomas were authorized to be awarded to the retiring internees as recommended by the Medical Board.

A communication dated December 1 was received from McKim, Mead & White relative to the crooked trees planted at Bellevue Hospital by the Charles L. Doran Constructing Company. This communication was referred to Mr. Robbins with power.

Two communications dated November 23 were presented from the State Board of Charities, together with reports of inspections by that Board of the out patient departments at Harlem and Fordham hospitals. Copies of replies sent by the President on December 1 were presented and approved, and the reports were referred to the General Medical Superintendent with directions to take the necessary steps to correct the violations reported therein.

Unfinished Business.

Further consideration was given to the recommendation of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital that an Interpreter be appointed at that hospital. It was resolved to deny this request, inasmuch as an investigation showed that there are now twenty-eight employees in Gouverneur Hospital who speak languages other than English and whose services as Interpreters could be secured at any time.

The recommendation of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital that salaries be paid to the physicians in the out patient department was considered, and it was resolved to reply that, inasmuch as the Budget for 1912 has been established, it is impossible to do anything at the present time, and that the Trustees are not inclined to believe that it is necessary to pay salaries to men in the out patient department, and that the situation at Gouverneur Hospital, where salaries are paid, is very different from that in any of the other hospitals of the Department.

Mr. Paulding reported that since last meeting he had learned that the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital as recently as August 1, 1911, sent to each member a copy of the rules regarding the admission of patients, and that therefore he had not taken action upon the resolution adopted at last meeting on this subject. The action of the Secretary was approved and it was resolved not to send the rules to the members of the Medical Board as was previously proposed.

Reference was made to the minutes of June 23, 1911, relative to the award of a contract to John T. Brady & Co., and it was reported that the architects had prepared and forwarded a form of agreement on August 31, 1911, and that the Corporation Counsel had advised that the correct procedure would be to write the contractors to the effect that the interpretations were as stated in the proposed supplemental agreement and to get an acknowledgment in writing from the contractors that they agreed to accept these interpretations. A copy of a communication sent to the contractors by the General Medical Superintendent on October 13 in accordance therewith was presented, together with a letter received from the contractors dated October 14, accepting this interpretation.

New Business.

It was resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer \$300 from an unexpended balance in the salary schedules to another fund, in order to provide an increase in salary for Mr. Dinwiddie, Investigator, as previously authorized.


