BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment Held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, December 29, 1916, at 12 o'Clock Noon.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; Frank L. Dowling, President, Board of Aldermen; Marcus M. Marks, President, Borough of Manhattan; Lewis H. Pounds, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Douglas Mathewson, President, Borough of The Bronx; Maurice E. Connolly, President, Borough of Queens; and Calvin D. Van Name, President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, presided.

Public Service Commission for the First District—Approval of Agreement Modifying Contract with Interborough Rapid Transit Company (Cal. No. 1).

The Secretary presented three communications dated December 20 and 21, 1916, from the Secretary of the Public Service Commission for the First District, transmitting proposed agreement No. 5, modifying Contract No. 3, providing that the Interborough Rapid Transit Company shall complete the connection between the Lexington Avenue branch of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Line and the Manhattan Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad at the westerly end of the Mott Avenue Station in 149th Street. Also transmitting for the consideration of the Board copy of communication, dated November 6, 1916, from the President of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, setting forth certain understanding as to the basis upon which the cost of this work shall be determined.

(On December 22, 1916, (Cal. No. 209), consideration of this proposed agreement was laid over until December 27, 1916; on the latter date (Cal. No. 49), the matter was laid over until December 28, 1916; and on the latter date (Cal. No. 3), it was laid over until this meeting.)

The matter was laid over one week (January 5, 1917).

President, Borough of Queens—Appropriation for Construction of Incinerators at Flushing and Jamaica and Issue of Serial Bonds (Cal. No. 2).

(On December 28, 1916 (Cal. No. 52), the matter was presented and laid over until this meeting, under Rule 19.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated November 25, 1916, from the President, Borough of Queens, requesting an issue of Corporate Stock for the purpose of the construction of two incinerator plants, one at Flushing and one at Jamaica, Borough of Queens; and the following report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget relative thereto:

December 29, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On November 25, 1916, the President of the Borough of Queens requested an appropriation in the amount of \$225,000 for the acquisition of two sites, the construction of two garbage and refuse incinerators and the employment of architects, in the Borough of Queens, one of said incinerators to be located in the Flushing section and the other in the Jamaica section.

It has been the custom in the past for the Bureau of Street Cleaning to dump the ashes, refuse and garbage collected in certain parts of the borough, upon low lands, under a permit issued by the Board of Health and in accordance with the regulations of said department. This practice has met with very strong opposition, and has in some cases been restrained by injunction, and it is stated that damages have been recovered against the city by reason thereof. The disinfecting of the dumps as a preventive of the spreading of odors and the collection of flies has proven to be inefficient. The borough is growing so rapidly that it is very evident that the practice of dumping on open ground can not be continued very much longer.

An appropriation is available for the construction of a destructor in the Rockaways and one for Long Island City. A destructor is now in operation in Ridgewood, and it appears advisable that funds should be immediately appropriated for destructors for the needs of the well populated sections of Flushing and Jamaica.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution, granting the request to the extent of \$150,000 for the construction of incinerators at Flushing and Jamaica. Respectfully,

Resolved, By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that, pursuant to the provisions of section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) is hereby appropriated for the construction of incinerators at Flushing and Jamaica, Borough of Queens, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens, and that the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue, pursuant to said section 169 of the Charter, serial bonds of The City of New York to the amount of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), redeemable in fifteen equal annual installments, being one-half of such total authorization, and that the remaining one-half thereof, viz., seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) shall be included in annual tax levies in the manner provided by section 189 of the Greater New York Charter; provided, however, that no encumbrance or expenditure by contract shall be made against said sums nor shall bids upon such contracts be advertised for, until after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans, specifications, estimates of cost and forms of such contracts which shall be submitted to said Board by the President of the Borough of Queens, nor shall any architect, engineer, expert or departmental employee be engaged or employed as a charge against such sums, except after approval by said Board of such employment and of the fee or wage to be paid by preliminary and final contract, voucher or budget schedule, which are to be similarly submitted, unless in the case of departmental employees, such employment is in accordance with schedules approved by said Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Department of Plant and Structures—Appropriation for Repaving, Etc., of Brooklyn Bridge and Issue of Serial Bonds (Cal. No. 3).

(On December 28, 1916 (Cal. No. 53), the matter was presented and laid over until this meeting, under Rule 19.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated February 11, 1916, from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures, requesting issue of Corporate Stock for the purpose of repaving the Brooklyn Bridge and reconstruction of roadways in connection therewith; and the following report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget recommending approval thereof:

December 29, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 11, 1916, and on August 19, 1916, the Commissioner of Plant and Structures requested an issue of corporate stock for the repaving of Brooklyn Bridge. This request has since been amended increasing the amount to \$80,000. The Bureau of Contract Supervision reports thereon as follows:

"The Brooklyn Bridge has two roadways, each 16 feet 9 inches wide. Within the limits of each there is a surface car track, leaving the width 9 feet for the accommodation of vehicles. Vehicular traffic on this bridge is, therefore, concentrated to a narrow path. The whole roadway width is planked transversely

with spruce timber laid on a four-inch thick treated yellow pine underflooring longitudinally laid on the transverse steel floor beams of the bridge.

"The cost of maintaining this flooring has been exceedingly high. The plank splinters readily under traffic requiring renewal twice each year, amounting to a replacement of about 300,000 feet.

"The department plans to lay a new type of wood block pavement, which is expected to correct these difficulties. The suitability of the pavement to meet conditions prevailing on the bridge has been developed from experimental sections laid on the north roadway.

"It is proposed to substitute in place of the present underdeck of creosoted yellow pine timber an underdeck of untreated yellow pine. On top of this is to be laid 2½-inch creosoted yellow pine blocks for a wearing surface with fine sand joints. It is also proposed to install "I" beam stringers and their connections to support new seven-inch rails. These rails are to be installed by the railroad company. The stringers are considered by the department to be an integral part of the bridge, which would place their cost upon the city. This question is left open.

"The present track area is now about 1½ inches above the roadway proper. Under the proposed change this area will be on a level with the roadway, and at the same time will be reconstructed in such a manner that the railroad maintenance and repair work can be undertaken without disturbance to the abutting pavement. The railroad company is to supply and lay the wood block pavement and the new rails."

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution authorizing the sum of \$80,000 for the repavement of Brooklyn Bridge and for any necessary reconstruction of the roadway in connection therewith. Respectfully,

Resolved, By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that, pursuant to the provisions of section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the sum of eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) is hereby appropriated for the repavement of Brooklyn Bridge and for any necessary reconstruction of roadway in connection therewith, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Plant and Structures, and that the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue, pursuant to said section 169 of the Charter, serial bonds of The City of New York to the amount of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), redeemable in fifteen equal annual installments, being one-half of such total authorization, and that the remaining one-half thereof, viz., forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), shall be included in annual tax levies in the manner provided by section 189 of the Greater New York Charter; provided, however, that no encumbrance or expenditure by contract shall be made against said sums nor shall bids upon such contracts be advertised for, until after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans, specifications, estimates of cost and forms of such contracts which shall be submitted to said Board by the Commissioner of Plant and Structures, nor shall any architect, engineer, expert or departmental employee be engaged or employed as a charge against such sums, except after approval by said Board of such employment and of the fee or wage to be paid by preliminary and final contract, voucher or budget schedule, which are to be similarly submitted, unless in the case of departmental employees, such employment is in accordance with schedules approved by said Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

President, Borough of The Bronx—Retirement of John Toomey, Assistant Engineer (Cal. No. 4).

(On December 22, 1916, (Cal. No. 34), the Board adopted a resolution granting an annuity in this case of \$839.58.)

(On December 28, 1916, (Cal. No. 54), the President of the Borough of The Bronx called the attention of the Board to the fact that an erroneous computation had been made in the compensation of John Toomey, Assistant Engineer, in the Topographical Bureau, during the last three years of his service, the correct annual rate of compensation having been \$1,950. The grant in this case was recommended by the Committee on Salaries and Grades at the rate of fifty per centum of the annual salary received.)

The President of the Borough of The Bronx suggested that appropriate action be taken by the Board so as to allow Mr. Toomey an annuity of \$975; and the matter was laid over until this meeting.)

(Report of Committee on Salaries and Grades printed in Minutes of meeting December 22, 1916, (Cal. No. 34).)

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 22, 1916, which reads as follows:

"Whereas, John Toomey, employed as an Assistant Engineer in the Topographical Bureau, office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, has been in the employ of The City of New York or of one of the municipalities, counties or parts thereof which have been incorporated into The City of New York, for a period of thirty years and upward, and is physically incapacitated for the further performance of the duties of his position; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the interest of the public service requires his retirement and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of sections 165, 166 and 167 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 669 of the Laws of 1911 and chapter 479 of the Laws of 1912, hereby does retire from active service John Toomey, employed as an Assistant Engineer in the Topographical Bureau, Office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and hereby awards and grants to said John Toomey an annual sum or annuity of eight hundred thirty-nine dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$839.58), being fifty per centum of his average annual rate of compensation for the three years immediately preceding the taking effect of this resolution; this resolution to take effect upon the first day of the month following its adoption, subject to the execution by the annuitant of a general release; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Comptroller of The City of New York be and he is hereby directed to pay said annuity to said John Toomey during his lifetime in equal monthly installments out of the receipts of excise moneys or liquor taxes belonging to The City of New York."

—be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The following was offered:

Whereas, John Toomey, employed as an Assistant Engineer in the Topographical Bureau, Office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, has been in the employ of The City of New York or of one of the municipalities, counties or parts thereof which have been incorporated into The City of New York, for a period of thirty years and upward, and is physically incapacitated for the further performance of the duties of his position; therefore be it

Resolved, That the interest of the public service requires his retirement, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of sections 165, 166 and 167 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 669 of the Laws of 1911 and chapter 479 of the Laws of 1912, hereby does retire from active service John Toomey, employed as an Assistant Engineer in the Topographical Bureau, Office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and hereby awards and grants to said John Toomey an annual sum or annuity of nine hundred seventy-five dollars (\$975), being fifty per centum of his average annual rate of compensation for the three years immediately preceding the taking effect of this resolution; this resolution to take effect upon the first day of the month following its adoption, subject to the execution by the annuitant of a general release; and be it further

Resolved, That the Comptroller of The City of New York be and he is hereby directed to pay said annuity to said John Toomey during his lifetime in equal monthly installments out of the receipts of excise moneys or liquor taxes belonging to The City of New York.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Alder-

men and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Southeast Corner of Pitkin Avenue and Logan Street, Borough of Brooklyn—Amendment of Building Zone Resolution (Cal. No. 5).

The Secretary presented a petition, dated December 22, 1916, of Charles H. Ohlau, of 788 New Lots avenue, Brooklyn, requesting that the plot of ground on the southeast corner of Pitkin avenue and Logan street, Brooklyn, be placed in an unrestricted zone. Which was referred to the Committee on City Plan.

Stebbins Avenue, Between East 167th Street and Home Street, Borough of The Bronx—Amendment of Building Zone Resolution (Cal. No. 6).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated December 28, 1916, from Albert E. Davis, architect, of 258 East 138th Street, submitting petition of fifty per cent. of the property owners of the frontage of both sides of Stebbins avenue, between East 167th street and Home street, Borough of The Bronx, for a change in the building zone regulations so as to permit the erection in this block of a public garage. Which was referred to the Committee on City Plan.

Department of Plant and Structures—Prevailing Rate of Wages for Structural Iron Workers (Cal. No. 7).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated December 27, 1916, from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures, transmitting communication from Charles F. Massey, business representative, United Housesmith's and Bridgemen's Union, No. 40, calling attention to the fact that the prevailing rate of wages for structural iron workers will be \$5.50 per day for eight hours work after January 1, 1917.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

New York Central Railroad Company—Alteration and Improvement of Tracks and Structures on the West Side of the City (Cal. No. 8).

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted by the State Democratic Forum, Inc., on December 28, 1916, opposing the adoption of any plan in connection with the proposed West Side improvement that will destroy or affect the beauty of Riverside Park.

The resolution was ordered filed and the Secretary directed to send a copy thereof to the Committee on Port and Terminal Facilities.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Appropriation from Water Revenues (Cal. No. 9).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated December 12, 1916, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, requesting an appropriation from the Brooklyn Water Revenues for 1917; and the following report of the Committee on Tax Budget recommending approval thereof:

December 28, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 12, 1916, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested an appropriation of \$1,649,947 from water revenues for the year 1917. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"Purpose—To provide funds, pursuant to section 242 of the Greater New York Charter, for the salaries of those employees of the Department chargeable to the maintenance of the Brooklyn water supply system.

"Reason—The 1917 budget includes schedules chargeable wholly or in part to water revenue as follows:

"Finding—The request is proper and necessary."

MATTERS CONSIDERED BY UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

The following matters, not on the Calendar for this day, were considered by unanimous consent:

President, Borough of Brooklyn—Appropriation for Construction of Buildings in and Improvement of New Corporation Yard, Brooklyn, and Issue of Serial Bonds (Cal. No. 12).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated October 19, 1916, from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, requesting an issue of \$20,000 corporate stock to provide for the construction of buildings and improvement of the new Corporation Yard at 19th Avenue and 57th Street, in said Borough; and the following report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget recommending approval thereof:

December 29, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On October 19, 1916, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn requested an appropriation in the amount of \$20,000 to provide for the erection of the necessary yard buildings in the new Corporation Yard at 19th Avenue and 57th Street.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision to which this request was referred on October 21, 1916, reports thereon as follows:

"The 19th Avenue yard is intended to be the central supply and repair yard for the activities in the so-called 'country' district. These activities include the maintenance of macadam pavements, the maintenance of improved pavements such as asphalt and granite; the maintenance of dirt roads, the oiling of roadways, the installation of cesspools, in the absence of other drainage facilities, and the cleaning of macadam pavements.

"For this work it is necessary to keep on hand a considerable supply of broken stone and screenings for macadam, as well as supplies of paving blocks of various kinds. The mechanical appliances used in connection with the activities enumerated above are, approximately as follows: 30 water and oil sprinklers, 20 road machines, 4 macadam road rollers, 3 scarifiers, 2 rotary brooms, 3 sand spreaders, 2 pumps.

"In this territory the central yard was formerly located on 67th Street, near 18th Avenue, where the City leased a plot of ground. Inasmuch as this was leased ground, no previous request had been made for the erection of permanent buildings, as it was not deemed advisable that structures of any permanency be erected on leased ground. In consequence, much of the equipment had to be stored over the winter without any protection other than that afforded by open sheds located in the 67th Street Yard and the Neck Road Yard.

"In 1916, by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, a portion of the property formerly occupied by the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School was assigned to the President of Brooklyn. The total area of the plot is about 41,000 square feet, of which 37,000 square feet is permanently available for corporation yard purposes.

"In this yard at the present time there are three temporary structures, one small office building, one small oil shed, and one temporary structure composed of material removed from the old yard on 67th Street, and re-erected as a closed shed for the storage of cement, tools and as a paint, carpenter and blacksmith shop.

"In its present condition it will be impossible to store in this yard with adequate protection, more than about four pieces of equipment which will be under repair in the temporary shops. All other equipment will have to be left in the open, exposed to the elements, with the possible exception of a small percentage which can be placed under the shed at the Neck Road Yard. There is no other accommodation for this equipment in any of the other corporation yards located throughout the Borough.

"No detailed plans have been prepared. It is proposed to erect a two-story reinforced concrete building, loft type of construction, approximately 70 feet by 80 feet. The first floor is to be used as a blacksmith shop and for the storage of vehicles, tools and road machines. The second floor is to be used for a yard office, a carpenter shop and for storage purposes. It is proposed to make the shops of ample size, so that the equipment under repair can be run into the shop, thereby saving considerable time of the workmen who would be required to move back and forth from the vehicle to the shop in working. On the ground floor it is contemplated making provision for the storage of paving blocks, such as asphalt and wood blocks, which require protection against the elements."

Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens—Appropriation for Construction of Walks and Comfort Station in Forest Park, Queens, and Issue of Serial Bonds (Cal. No. 13).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated December 14, 1916, from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens, requesting authorizations of corporate stock to provide for construction of walks and comfort station in Forest Park, Queens; and the following report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget relative thereto:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 15, 1916, the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens, requested authorizations of corporate stock aggregating \$151,206.75, which included the following items:

The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which the request was referred, reports on these items, as follows:

"The construction of walks in Forest Park is very urgently required, as the major portion of the park is now inaccessible to the public except by walking in the roadways. The use of the roadway of Metropolitan Avenue as a walk will become dangerous, as the construction of a trolley line on this thoroughfare in 1917 will occupy the space now used as a walk.

"It is believed that the authorization of \$22,000 for walks in Forest Park will provide sufficient funds for all the urgent needs contemplated in items one and two.

"The construction of a comfort station at the greenhouse and playground in Forest Park is very urgently needed because of the crowds attending the several flower shows and an intensively used playground, for which there are no adequate provisions.

"The amount requested is reasonable for the construction of a suitable building."

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions authorizing \$22,000 for

walks in Forest Park and \$8,000 for the construction of a comfort station near the greenhouse and playground in Forest Park, respectively. Respectfully,

The Bureau of Contract Supervision reports thereon as follows:

"It is proposed, because of the economy to be effected, to install two electric passenger elevators and an electric ash lift to replace the present hydraulically operated elevators and ash lift.

"The necessity for the proposed installation is caused by the changes, now under contract, in the steam heating plant located in the Borough Hall, which plant is also to serve the adjoining Richmond County Court House when constructed.

"On the recommendation of this Bureau the heating plant in the Borough Hall is being changed from high pressure to low pressure operation. The high pressure feature was only necessary for the operation of the pumps controlling the elevators now in service. This required the plant to be operated during the summer months solely for this purpose.

"The installation of the electric elevators will permit the shutting down of the steam plant except during the heating period, when it will only be necessary to operate under low pressure.

"The sum of \$11,000 is necessary for the proposed installation."

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving of an appropriation of \$11,000 for the installation of electric elevators in the Borough Hall, Borough of Richmond. Respectfully,

Department of Public Charities—Appropriation for Construction of New Buildings and Reconstruction of Existing Buildings, Randall's Island, and Issue of Serial Bonds (Cal. No. 15).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget:

December 29, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 29, 1916, at a meeting of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget the Commissioner of Public Charities requested an authorization of \$1,000,000 for the construction of new buildings and the reconstruction of existing buildings for the New York Children's Hospitals and Schools on Randall's Island.

On August 26, 1915, your Board approved an authorization of \$600,000 for this project.

A plot plan for the future development of Randall's Island has been prepared which shows projected buildings which it is estimated would cost \$4,000,000 to build. The construction of certain buildings, as shown on this plan, which could be built within the amount then available, \$600,000, was approved by the Comptroller on July 17, 1916, in connection with the approval of an architect's contract.

Plans and specifications have been prepared and approved by your Board, bids for which will be opened on January 5, 1917, as follows:

When these contracts are let, and when other work incidental thereto, such as the extension of steam, electric and water connection on the grounds, are made it will probably exhaust the appropriation of \$600,000. Upon the completion of this work it will be possible to house in the new buildings about 640 of the 2,000 inmates of this institution.

It is now proposed to reconstruct certain of the old buildings on the Island to provide modern facilities and accommodations for approximately 1,000 inmates and also to construct new buildings, as shown on the plot plan, heretofore referred to, as follows:

It is estimated that with an appropriation of \$1,000,000 in addition to the \$600,000, all of the buildings enumerated above can be reconstructed or built, so as to provide accommodations for a population between 2,600 and 2,700 inmates.

The advisability of constructing two small kitchen buildings instead of one large one has been shown by the administration of similar institutions in the past. Experience shows that such an institution must be divided into two sections, one exclusively for males and the other for females.

The building proposed for a Mental Clinic at the foot of East 125th street is to take the place of the one now occupying a rented house on East 125th street, and will be operated by the resident staff of Randall's Island, and is considered as a part and portion of the institution on the island. The purpose of locating the building on the mainland is to make it more accessible and also to disassociate it, in the minds of the public, from the institution itself.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the request.

Department of Correction—Appropriation for Completion of New York City Reformatory for Male Misdemeanants at New Hampton, and Issue of Serial Bonds (Cal. No. 16A).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget:

December 29, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 29, 1916, at a meeting of your Committee on Corporate Stock, the Commissioner of Correction requested funds sufficient to complete the New York City Reformatory for Male Misdemeanants at New Hampton.

On July 9, 1914, there was authorized \$425,000 for this project. This appropriation was granted at a time when building materials cost considerably less than they do to-day, and when it was believed that inmate labor could be used exclusively, with the supervision of trade instructors, who would take the place of ordinary keepers or guards. The most expensive part of the institution, but, from the standpoint of care and custody of numbers of inmates, the least remunerative, has been provided out of the original appropriation. In order to secure economical use of the investment, an additional appropriation of \$400,000 should be granted at once, so that the work of the institution may be planned and carried out on the most economical basis.

The Commissioner of Correction has pointed out that in 1910 the City had available appropriations of \$2,200,000 for a huge custodial institution on Riker's Island, which was to eventually cost \$4,000,000, and \$800,000 for a custodial reformatory on Hart's Island. These amounts were rescinded early in 1910, and the appropriation of \$425,000 was made later for a farm colony industrial institution in the country. At that time it was recognized that this \$425,000 would build only the greater part of the custodial section of the proposed institution. It was, however, well understood in 1910 that the farm colony industrial institution, as finally developed, would cost about \$1,000,000 and would be a splendid substitute for the \$3,000,000 already appropriated, and for the \$1,800,000 which was to be appropriated for the two huge old-fashioned institutions to be built on Riker's and Hart's Islands for penitentiary and reformatory purposes.

Experience has shown that it is unwise to attempt to complete buildings difficult to construct through the utilization of inmate labor working under the supervision of paid instructors:

First—Because of the great increase in the cost of materials necessitating the greatest economy in the use of materials.

Second—Because of the necessity of speed in construction which cannot be secured through the utilization of inmate labor, where five inmates are about equivalent to one ordinary laborer on private work.

Third—Because there are not enough inmates to handle the rougher part of construction work, including excavation for building, building of foundations, building of the water plant, building of the sewage disposal plant, building of roads, building of outlying buildings and walks, concrete walls and the like; where 1,000 inmates could have been utilized during the past year and could be utilized for the next five or six years.

The wisest plan appears to be to combine the utilization of inmate labor, working under supervisors, with high-class contract work for the more difficult parts of the construction, and to utilize inmate labor, working under paid instructors, for the rougher construction and other work enumerated above.

Only when buildings now under construction or about to be placed under construction from the proceeds of existing funds, and the additional buildings for which the above appropriations are provided are completed, will it be possible to say that the New Hampton Farms Reformatory plant is able to function as a thorough-going reformatory industrial school type of institution. Not until then will it be possible to conduct the institution on proper economical bases, and to afford facilities for the educational trade school work imperatively demanded of such an institution as stated by the recent inspection report of the State Board of Charities, which board has general inspectional supervision over reformatory institutions in this State.

The appropriation of \$400,000 will provide for all of the permanent structures for the complete plant, except the kitchen and dining hall, for which accommodations now existing will meet all demands for several years.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution authorizing \$400,000 for the completion of the New York City Reformatory for Male Misdemeanants at New Hampton. Respectfully,

Department of Correction—Appropriation for Reconstruction of Industrial Building at Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island, and Issue of Serial Bonds (Cal. No. 16B).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget:

December 28, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At a recent meeting of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget the Commissioner of Correction requested \$30,000 in corporate stock to provide means to reconstruct the Industrial Building at the Penitentiary, Blackwells Island, to serve as a hospital, clearing house and isolation station for male sentenced prisoners.

Pursuant to chapter 526 of the Laws of 1916, the Commissioner of Correction is authorized to designate institutions or parts thereof as clearing houses where prisoners sentenced to the different institutions may be observed and studied for a period of thirty days in order to carry out the provisions of the charter and the State Prison Law requiring the separation of the less hardened from the more hardened offenders and for the segregation of different classes of prisoners in accordance with their ability, physical condition and training.

A large part of the penitentiary has been cleared of prisoners by transfers to other institutions. The need for a hospital-clearing-house type of institution has become imperative. Originally it was planned to erect at the penitentiary on Blackwells Island a hospital to cost \$30,000 which would serve the needs of that institution alone. The Commissioner of Correction, however, has been able to transfer the shops from the present small industrial building at the penitentiary to the larger quarters at Hart's Island and thus to secure a building which, the technical medical advisers have stated, could hardly be better adapted to the needs of this type of institution, if it were built anew, provided minor construction changes were made on the interior to convert the shop rooms into hospital wards. In this building beds and isolation quarters can be provided for a total of 260 persons where they may undergo initial treatment for drug addiction disease, for the two classes of venereal diseases and for tuberculosis in the initial stage, and where the operative cases of men prisoners may be cared for. By this reconstruction, the Commissioner of Correction will be able to secure a clearing house classification institution near the city at a cost of \$30,000.

The advantage of having the clearing house classification institution on an island detached from the city and yet near the city, where the best medical skill may be utilized at a very small cost to the city, is obvious. The advantage of utilizing this institution as against the building of new huge institutions in the country, where it would be impossible for the city to secure the services of specialists in the special fields, is also quite obvious.

Your committee believes that if an appropriation of \$30,000 for this purpose be made it will meet this fundamental need of the city and make it possible for the Commissioner to utilize the services of specialists provided in the budget for 1917 and the voluntary assistance of many other specialists who have signified their willingness to co-operate with the department in putting this important work of the Department of Correction and of the Parole Commission of the City of New York upon a first class operating basis.

Gentlemen—In connection with the project of providing adequate facilities for dealing with women in the penal institutions of the City, the Commissioner of Correction has requested the authorization of \$70,000 in corporate stock to provide means to reconstruct the south wing of the workhouse on Blackwells Island, to serve as a clearing house and hospital institution for women.

This reconstruction will consist generally of removing the cells and constructing three shafts to provide light and air, and the dividing of the remaining space into wards and dormitories for the accommodation of women prisoners.

This reconstruction is a part of a general plan to meet the needs of women prisoners, the details of which are contained in a report (No. 45) adopted by your Board on December 28, 1916.

Department of Public Charities—Appropriation for Additional Buildings at Sea View Hospital and Issue of Serial Bonds (Cal. No. 17).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget:

December 29, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 29, 1916, at a meeting of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget the Commissioner of Public Charities requested the issue of \$105,000 in corporate stock to provide means for the completion of buildings, and for the installation of steam lines, water mains, sewers and other necessary work, at Sea View Hospital, Borough of Richmond.

On September 10, 1914, there was appropriated \$800,000 for "Additional Land and Buildings at Sea View Hospital". The department has prepared plans and advertised contracts for twenty-one pavilions (twelve for males and nine for females) one group building and a dining hall building. The estimated cost of this work was \$554,581.

The lowest bid received for the work was \$722,093.50 or \$167,512.50 over the amount heretofore approved by the Board.

Before these buildings can be used, it will be necessary to extend the steam and electric lines from the present power house and to provide a water supply and sewers. It is estimated that this work will cost \$150,000. The architect fees on the entire project are estimated at \$33,000.

In order that this work may be completed, it will be necessary to make an additional appropriation of \$105,000, the amount requested, which is the difference between the funds available for the entire project and the probable cost, as indicated by bids already received, plus the estimated cost of work not yet advertised, and architect's fees.

"The department is now enlarging the bins for the storage of an increased amount of sand and stone. With these improvements the present conveyors for transporting such materials to the dryers will be entirely inadequate. If additional facilities are not provided the sand and stone must be taken care of by hand, which would be poor economy.

"Funds for the installation of steam-jacketed hoppers are requested in order to facilitate the loading of trucks. At present it is necessary for trucks to wait under the hoppers until the asphalt is mixed before they can be loaded. By heating the hoppers the mixture may be made and temporarily held in the hopper when a slack period occurs between the arrival of trucks. As a time saving proposition this equipment is apparent.

"In the 1917 budget appropriation the allowance for refined asphalt was made on the basis of \$17 per ton, which, it is estimated, would be the price of the product delivered in liquid form to tanks at the plant. Further, an item for the erection of these tanks was included in the departmental request, but was disallowed as being original construction and properly a corporate stock charge.

"It is anticipated that the erection of these tanks will effect a material economy in the cost of the refined asphalt, which is at present being delivered in solid form.

"A temporary dust shed is now in use. Its limited capacity necessitates small and frequent deliveries.

"The electric lighting system is of the exposed type and of a temporary nature, against which violations have been filed. It is the purpose of the department to install a permanent conduit system.

"An addition to the garage is desired to properly shelter the increased number of vehicles which are being operated and to afford sufficient facilities to repair and store various types of equipment.

"All these general improvements are of a permanent character and are desirable for the more effective operation of the plant.

"Instead, however, of rescinding the existing corporate stock balances and reauthorizing them as a new fund, as requested, it is suggested, as the new purpose is the same as that for which the original authorizations were made, that the present resolutions be amended to include the proposed work at the Corporation Yard and Asphalt Plant at 90th Street and Avenue A."

We recommend the adoption of attached resolutions granting the request by the amendment of the existing corporate stock resolutions. Respectfully,

E. 54th St. Bath—Installed new gear wheel on ash elevator and straightened shaft. Rearranged piping to engines. Installed 8 lengths of safety rope and anchors in plunge. Stopped leak in front wall by installing drip pipe and rewaterproofing. Put new wooden platform on platform of ash hoist. Installed on cellar wall in rear of switchboard a 100 ampere water meter. Rehung fixtures in waiting room.

W. 60th St. Bath—Repaired clockwork on Bristol recording thermometer. Made new stuffing box for piston rods, No. 2 engine. Installed new C. I. mains in shower rooms in place of old individual supply system, which was corroded and clogged up. Painted men's and women's shower rooms on 2d floor and toilets on pool floor. Installed angle iron curb around balcony to prevent water draining into pool. Installed new locks on dressing rooms of balcony floors. Installed eight new gas lights on pool floor, to light pool when being filled at night and on dark days. Installed a toilet on the pool floor for the working force of the building. Hung door to employees toilet. Installed screen doors in place of solid doors leading from waiting rooms to pool room. Repaired coal chute. Placed wire screens over radiators around pool to prevent injury to bathers. Repaired skylight gearing.

E. 76th St. Bath—Installed balanced piston valves on both engines to reduce excessive consumption of steam caused by former slide valves. Repaired clockwork on Edson recording steam gauge. Changed piping around water heaters so as to heat water by exhaust steam. Prepared specifications for pipe covering. Erected scaffold for attendant to clean down walls of 2d floor skylight. Installed awnings. Repaired bad roof leak at front of building. Made a number of steam repairs.

E. 109th St. Bath—Repaired and overhauled Metropolitan injector. Made new governor pin for No. 2 engine and new valve stems for both engines. Prepared specifications for pipe covering. Installed awnings. Placed wire guards at bottom of partitions between shower rooms so as to prevent theft. Replaced broken lights of glass in skylight with rough wire glass. Renewed 3-inch suction pipe connecting feed water heater with boiler feed pump with brass pipe.

COMFORT STATIONS.

Battery Park—Installed additional light in boiler room.

Hanover Square—Built new coal bin.

Mail St.—Repaired main entrance door to men's side with a new Bommer hinge; repaired locks and put in good working order.

Chatham Square—Installed a gas stove for cooking purposes. Installed fan and motor of adequate size for efficient ventilation in place of old outfit which was too small. Installed new safety tread on men's stairs. Repaired the north ventilator stack over stations.

Abingdon Square—Made new bearings for exhaust fan motor and set motor in good repair.

Greeley Square—Public Service Commission contractors excavating for the change to station.

Sheriff and Delancey Sts.—Repaired front storeroom door and repaired doors in women's station.

Long Acre Square—Repaired locks.

First Ave. and 125th St.—Repaired rain leaders.

Washington Market—Made two (2) signs to induce washing by handlers of food.

MARKETS.

Washington Market—Installed a power equipment on the hand elevator. Installed new counterweight cables on the southerly freight elevator. Installed new doors to engine room. Painted the West and Vesey St. fronts on the outside. Painted the refrigeration pipes over the stands on the main floor. Painted the vestibules of all entrances and the interior of all entrance doors. Painted the glass of top skylight and of one skylight on Washington St. side to exclude sun. Installed an adjustable interior louver awning under the skylight on the lower level of central section facing south. This adds considerably to the artistic appearance of the market. Removed all temporary storm doors. Repaired rolling platform used for reading meter. Removed old conduit from top of stands. Secured Pyrene fire extinguishers to prevent theft. Inspected cornice and fronts of building and removed all loose and dangerous pieces. Repaired roof leaks. Repaired copper gutter at mezzanine floor.

West Washington and Gansvoort Market—Replaced about 100 yards of disintegrated plaster. Issued open market order to repair 117 chimneys and work started; 39 chimneys repaired to July 1st. Started the work of installing 12 hose outlets on the different streets to flush same and keep them in a sanitary condition. Six of the outlets are installed. Gave out contract to replace 76 leaders from the roof to house sewer below sidewalk; 10 per cent of the work done. Repaired iron awnings where brick arches were removed. Built supply closet for tools. Repaired a number of broken sash chains for double hung doors. Continued repairs to roofs.

Jefferson Market—Electric lighting system seven-eighths completed. Contract work on plumbing contract completed, but work on general contract for alterations has been at a standstill after being about 70 per cent completed. After numerous efforts to have the contract completed by the original contractors, steps are being taken to declare it abandoned, and have it completed by other parties. Painted the awning and the fronts of the building from street to awning two coats lead and oil paint. Painted the unoccupied portion of interior as far as possible. None of this work will be finished until the contract work is completed. Repaired stairs leading up to 2d floor from 6th Avenue side.

Fulton Market—Bade survey of building for remodeling, plans now being drawn.

OPEN MARKETS.

Harlem—Enclosed market with walls and doors. Installed drip pan under ceiling. Installed drainage and water supply systems. Prepared plans and specifications for electric lighting system.

Queensboro—Order given for the lighting fixtures. Enclosed market with steel and glass windows and doors. Installed drainage and water supply systems. Provided hose and couplings for washing floors.

Manhattan—Provided hose and couplings for washing floors.

General—During the quarter the following completed jobs were executed by the Bureau's various squads: Carpenter, 176; electrical, 193; plumbing, 78; steam-fitting, 16; painting and varnishing, 110; roofing, 69; masonry, 50; awning, 55; machinist, 46; total, 918; 363 requisitions and open market orders for the same were issued; 363 check orders were drawn against miscellaneous monthly orders. The patronage of the interior baths for the month of April was 536,583; May, 667,183; June, 785,639; making a total patronage for the quarter ending June 30th, 1916, of 1,989,405.

Bureau of Topography.

Subsurface Work—Progress is being made in a revision of our former method of controlling subsurface surveys and records. An indexing system is being installed covering the subsurface data obtainable from all departments and corporations responsible for underground structures, as well as a card system showing the location of such data on each block. This is intended to simplify the cost of preparing final maps where such information is required.

Vaults—Considerable progress has been made in reporting upon existing vaults, for the purpose of determining upon such cases where additional collections may be made for unpaid areas.

Bench Marks—Much progress has been made in checking up bench marks, whose elevations were in doubt for a long while. Due to the West Side Improvement, this activities had been somewhat neglected. Now, however, we are working steadily in this direction. On account of the great need of these bench marks, the results of such work will be appreciated.

Street Line Determination—We have spent considerable time in working up the section related to the West Side Improvement, south of 14th st. This data is of immediate value in the final agreement between the City and the Railroad Company and will be added to our office files when completed.

Base Line—The work of running a base line along Tenth ave., from 14th st. to 155th st., to be used in connection with our Borough Survey, is being continued. (See 1st quarterly report.)

Speedway—Several studies have been made for a connection between the Speedway and 7th and 8th aves. This will eventually, if carried to completion, result in a water level route to the Northern end of Manhattan, and will require the commercializing of the Speedway.

West Side Improvement—Additional maps, studies, estimates and surveys have been made, to complete the information which we have been furnishing up to date.

Monuments—We have practically completed the section between 204th and 218th sts. near Seaman ave., and will be in a position to set several monuments in that district.

Maps, Records and Printing—Your attention is respectfully called to the great increase over the 2nd quarter of last year, in the activities of this division.

Change in City Map, including change in grade and reports on same—In progress—Durandos Lane: Amendment of lines to conform with lines of Riverside Drive extension plan. Dyckman House Park: Addition thereto. Ft. Washington ave. and Broadway: Elimination of dangerous curves. Inwood Park: Study as to addition thereto. Riverside Drive: Extension, from W. 165th st. to Harlem River Ship Canal; calculations for adjusting present map, preliminary to laying out the final line of the extension. Change in grade in 172d st. and 173d st. between Fort Washington ave. and Haven ave., and in Fort Washington ave., between 172nd and 173rd sts.

Completed—Avenue B and 21st st.: Study as to outlet at Marginal Wharf or Place. Broadway from 218th st. to Harlem River Ship Canal: Study and report for widening; report to Local Board. Bogardus pl.: Study as to change in line. Broadway from Chambers st. to 22nd st.: Resolution for widening roadway. Chittenden ave.: Study and report and estimate on change in line and grade, as proposed by Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Leyden st.: Connection to the Bronx, report on proposed layout. Audubon Park, 155th to 158th st. and the Drive: Study and report and layout submitted to the Local Board. Speedway, including new street connection to 7th and 8th aves.: Study and report for new layout. 12th ave., 29th to 36th sts.: Re submission of map of line and grade to Board of Estimate and Apportionment. 12th ave., 42nd to 51st st.: Re submission to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of map for change in line and grade and closing and discontinuing present 12th ave. from about 42nd st. to about 51st st. This also includes closing and discontinuing 42nd, 43rd, 44th, 45th, 46th, 47th, 48th, 49th and 50th sts., from the westerly line of 12th ave. to some point easterly. Riverside Drive, near Dyckman st.: Study and report for drainage. 4th ave., 32nd to 34th sts. and 33d st. from Lexington to 4th ave.: Map for change in grade, submitted to Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Estimate of cost of construction, etc., for above.

Monuments in Progress—Section between 204th st. and 218th st. and Seaman ave.: Computation and setting of monuments. Fixing and co-ordinating theoretical and physical position of monuments, north of W. 155th st.

Monuments Completed—173d st. and St. Nicholas ave.: Reset monument to surface of walk. 204th st. and Broadway: Reset monument to surface of walk. West End ave., No. 549: Inspection and report as to removal of monument.

Bench Marks—Eighteen miles of new bench marks were established in various parts of the borough, particularly north of Canal st. and west of Broadway. In addition, twenty-five benches were corrected, and tied into primary runs.

Borough Survey and Street Line Determination—In Progress—Nassau and Broad

sts., from South st. to the Brooklyn Bridge. Area bounded by Watts st., 14th st., Greenwich st. and West st., in connection with the West Side Improvement. In connection with this, 40,210 linear feet of building lines were established and tied in. This involved 43,225 linear feet of chaining, and the turning of 51 angles. This embraced 51 square blocks. 60th st. from Avenue A to 5th ave., in connection with subway operations. Area bounded by 5th ave., 57th st., 65th st. and 8th ave., for determination of transverse road.

Subsurface Work—In Progress—Area bounded by Canal, Varick, Broome, Macdougall, Spring and Greene sts., in connection with sewer construction. **Completed**—Platt st.: Study of substructures in connection with proposed route of N. Y. Steam Co. Park ave. and 40th st.: Study of substructures in connection with proposed viaduct; this required detailed surveying and investigation.

624 surveys of openings were made, locating all substructures exposed.

Consultations held with representatives of the various Public Service Corporations, and arrangements are being made for transfer of substructure records for file. Considerable work, in its preliminary stage, has been done, i. e., the installation of an index system covering the various city departments and private corporations likely to be consulted on substructure matters. Much data in the possession of the Sewer Bureau was obtained and filed. Conferences were held with officials of the Consolidated Gas Co., and the Consolidated Telephone & Elect. Sub. Co. at these meetings. The possibility and means of obtaining copies of such field notes, plans, sections, etc., as were in their possession have been discussed with favorable results. Similar meetings are to be held in the near future with other companies. The results of these meetings will form the basis of a separate report.

Sec. 53. Nuisances, conditions dangerous and prejudicial to life or health; duties of owners, tenants, lessees, occupants, and persons in charge of buildings and lots. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or person in charge of any building or premises within or adjacent to the built-up portions of the City of New York, shall keep and cause to be kept the sidewalk, flagging, and curb stone abutting on said building or premises free from obstructions and nuisances of every kind, and shall remove or cause to be removed therefrom all garbage, refuse, filth, dirt, and other offensive material and shall keep such sidewalk, flagging, and curbstone free from garbage, refuse, filth, dirt, and other offensive material; and no such owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or person in charge shall allow anything in, on, or about such building or premises, or any condition arising or existing therein or thereon, to become a nuisance, or dangerous or prejudicial to life or health.

Such garbage, refuse, filth, dirt, and other offensive material removed from the sidewalk, flagging, or curbstone may be piled in the gutter or roadway between the hours of six and eight o'clock in the morning, but shall not be put or placed in, or swept, shoveled, thrown, emptied, or deposited into, the gutter or roadway at any other time.

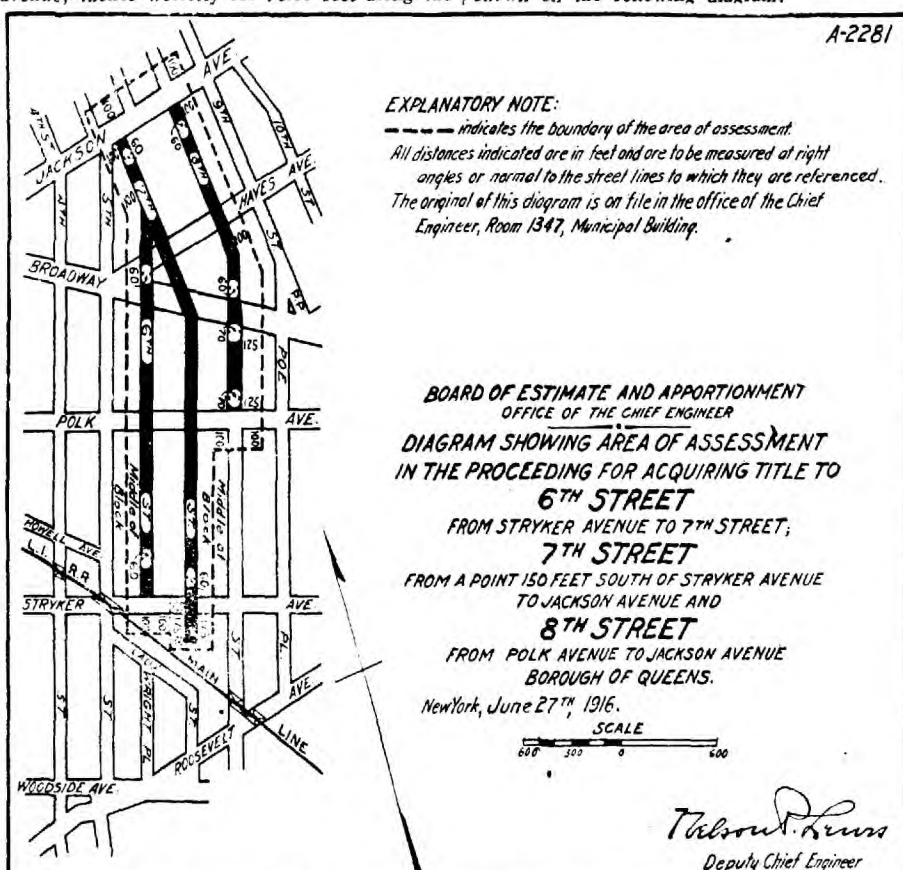

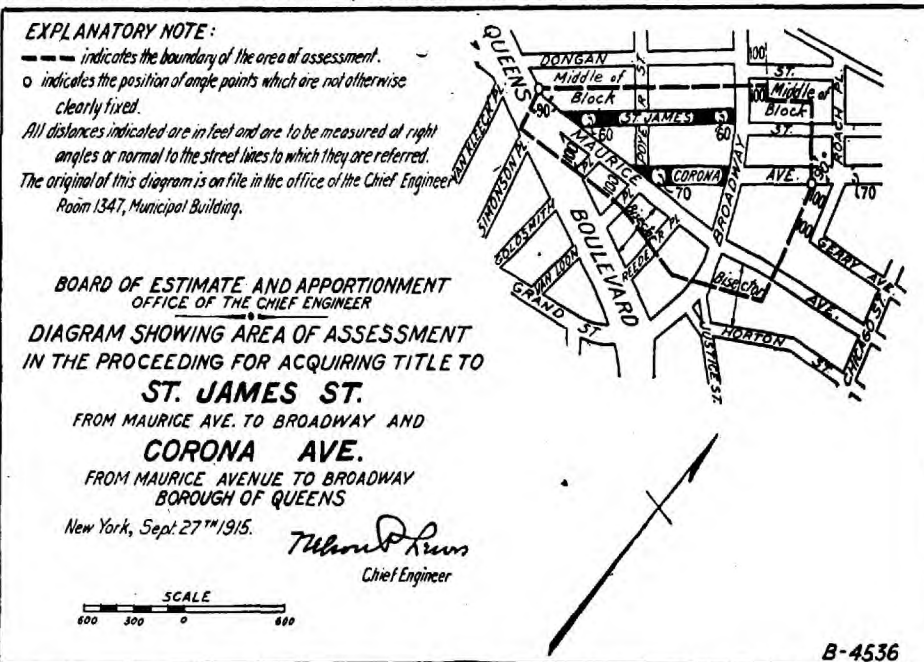

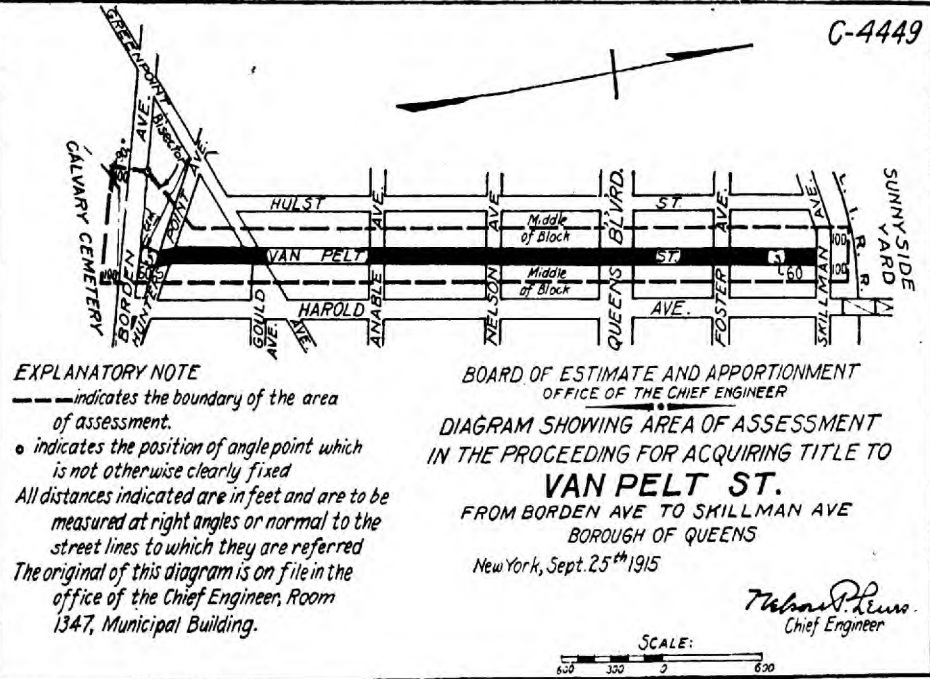

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
