Population, 59,958.

The Second Assembly District shall consist of that part of the Fourth Senate District of the County of Kings within and bounded by a line beginning at the intersection of Sutter and Williams Avenues, thence along Williams Avenue to Blake Avenue, to Pennsylvania Avenue, to Hegeman Avenue, to New Jersey Avenue, to Vienna Avenue, to Pennsylvania Avenue, to the waters of Jamaica Bay, thence southerly through the waters of Jamaica Bay to a point east of Duck Point Marsh, thence southerly and easterly to the boundary line of Kings and Queens County, thence southerly and westerly along said boundary line south of Barren Island to the Atlantic Ocean, thence westerly and northerly through the waters of the Atlantic Ocean to Ocean Parkway, to Avenue "I," to East 5th Street, to Avenue "I," to East 4th Street, to Elmwood Avenue, to East 3d Street, to Foster Avenue, to East 17th Street,

The Third Assembly District shall consist of that part of the Fifth Senate District of the County of Kings within and bounded by a line beginning at the intersection of the East River, Buttermilk Channel and Congress Street, thence along Congress Street to Columbia Street, to Warren Street, to Clinton Street, to Amity Street, to Court Street, to First Place, to Summit Street, to Hicks Street, to Rapalyea Street, to Hamilton Avenue, to Third Avenue, to Twenty-fourth Street, to Fourth Avenue to Fifty-fourth Street, to Third Avenue, to Fifty-ninth Street, to Fourth Avenue, to Sixty-first Street, to Third Avenue, to Sixty-third Street, to the waters of New York Bay, thence through the waters of New York Bay to the waters of Buttermilk Channel and East River, thence through the waters of East River to Congress Street, the point or place of beginning.

Population, 60,097.

The Fourth Assembly District shall consist of that part of the Eleventh Senate District of the County of Kings within and bounded by a line beginning at the intersection of the waters of the East River and Broadway, thence along Broadway to Berry Street, to South Sixth Street, to Broadway, to Havemeyer Street, to South Fourth Street, to Rodney Street, to Broadway, to Division Avenue, to Harrison Avenue, to Rutledge Street, to Marcy Avenue, to Walton Street, to Wallabout Street, to Harrison Avenue, to Flushing Avenue, to Nostrand Avenue, to Willoughby Avenue, to Spencer Street, to Myrtle Avenue, to Washington Park or Cumberland Street, to DeKalb Avenue, to Navy Street to Lafayette Street, to Raymond Street, to Willoughby Street, to St. Edwards Street, to Bolivar Street, to Raymond Street, to Myrtle Avenue, to Prince Street, to Johnson Street, to Navy Street, to Flushing Avenue, to Clinton Avenue, to Wallabout Channel, to the waters of the East River and thence through the waters of the East River to Broadway, the point or place of beginning.

To comprise and be identical with the territory known as the First and Second Wards, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York.

The second assembly district to consist of the territory bounded as follows:

#### PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 1696.

#### Petition Relating to the Removal of Certain Nuisances from the Streets of New York City.

Witnesseth this humble petition of the owners of stores and shops in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, selling fish and kindred merchandise, particularly in the neighborhood of Mulberry, Mott, Elizabeth and Stanton Streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

We the undersigned, do hereby solemnly petition and pray the Mayor of the City of New York, the Commissioner of the Police Department of New York and the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, that they and each of them heed the grievances and dilemmas of the undersigned as peaceful, law-abiding, honest, true residents of The City of New York and as owners of the premises effected by the petition hereinafter referred to.

We, store keepers and shop keepers, who dealing in the selling of fish and kindred merchandise, beg that the Mayor of The City of New York, Police Commissioner and the Board of Aldermen take up for consideration the terrible, unlawful and unhealthy condition of the streets upon which the undersigned store keepers have their place of business. The business of a fish dealer of necessity brings in to question animal matter, and we do not wish to insult your intelligence in stating before you the question as animal matter, it is most easily and readily capable of becoming decayed and in an unwholesome and unhealthy condition and as a consequence giving forth unhealthful and obnoxious odors and fumes. The undersigned petitioners, beg to acquaint you with the fact that the streets above named, to wit, Mulberry, Mott, Elizabeth and Stanton Streets, are infected with a host of push carts who sell fish, clams and similar merchandise that are exposed to the air, as this fish must be on push carts, they are likely to become infected and dangerous for human consumption. It is a common, every day sight, and the feeling for you petitioners and for citizens and residents of The City of New York, upon passing through one of the streets above mentioned, to be confronted with filthy, dirty carts, consisting of fish exposed to dust to the street, giving forth odors which are unpleasant. That in the course of selling of fish by these fish push cart dealers, they constantly throw off from their carts, dirty, filthy, stinky water, to which even the roughest residents of that section is most unpleasant and lying in the street even for a short period, especially in the summer season, breeds germs and diseases and attacks, and makes insecure the health of the poor children who by necessity are compelled to live in the streets, who on the very ground where this refuse from these push carts are thrown and scattered.

Further, the undersigned being the store keepers in the districts above mentioned, beg you to take into consideration that they are annually paying large sums of money directly and indirectly to The City of New York for the conduct of their businesses in the way of water taxes and taxes generally for the up-keep of the streets of The City of New York and for the paying of the land tax of the buildings where they are tenants. It seems to these petitioners earnestly and humbly coming to your Honors that the undersigned should not equitably be called upon to pay these sums of money for their liability and be at the same time interfered with by street cart peddlers who stand in front of their establishment and divest and turn away from their doors trade largely by reason of the taxes and moneys which they pay directly and indirectly to The City of New York for their proper conduct of their businesses. Instances are numerous of the state of affairs, which are as follows:

Honest, upright residents and citizens of The City of New York have opened stores in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the streets above named and other streets of the city, conducting a general fish business. They have been vested by at least five or six different independent departments of The City of New York and its administration and by at least that number of various inspectors from these various departments and administrations of The City of New York, compelled to undergo rigid examinations, cross-examinations and inspections by these inspectors, and in many cases have been called upon, ordered and forced to make radical changes by their own expense in the construction of their various stores, and are constantly under the supervision of these various departments which these petitioners do not complain of. But these petitioners call your Honorable attention to the fact that while they are strictly accountable to the various inspectors and departments and have in the past and still in the future obey and conform with the orders of these inspectors and departments, still to the minds of these petitioners it does not seem reasonable, and the undersigned ask that your Honors will see it in the clear, equitable light in which these petitioners present the facts that while they are forced to obey these rules, regulations and orders that small push cart dealers who do not have to obey any of these regulations and rules and who of necessity must expose their wares to the elements and whose accommodations of necessity cannot be those of your petitioners must permit these push cart dealers to conduct the similar line of business that these petitioners on different basis, not only to the detriment financially of these petitioners, but also to the detriment of the health of those who buy from these fish dealers their fish and kindred merchandise.

Now comes the other undersigned petitioners who are the owners of the premises upon the streets above mentioned, and say that their vested and fixed rights as owners of premises on the above mentioned streets, and who pay to The City of New York large sums of money for the protection of their property by reason of fire and streets, say that their property rights and vested interests are affected and nullified to a considerable extent by the interference of these small push cart dealers hereinbefore mentioned. They also pay large sums of money to The City of New York for the keeping of the streets clean and in a wholesome condition, and beg that your Honors will look into the question of allowing unresponsible push cart peddlers from backing their carts against the curb directly in front of premises owned by the undersigned, and detracting from the trade and business of the undersigned tenants, and thereby lessening the rental value of the premises. Again the undersigned and owners of the premises beg to present this seemingly anomalous condition of affairs. They pay taxes to The City of New York for the keeping of the streets clean and in a wholesome and healthy condition, and now they find doing their duty honestly and uprightly, paying their taxes to keep the streets in a good condition—small push carts are backed up deliberately in front of their premises and cause them the damage hereinbefore mentioned. It seems that the condition is that the undersigned owners of the premises are paying for a nuisance which is injuring themselves and which the undersigned ask to cease and to be put to an end.

Wherefore the undersigned being owners of stores in the neighborhood above referred to and owners of premises therein, ask that you stop, put at an end and prevent the further continuation of the illegal, obnoxious, unhealthful and unwarranted condition of affairs as these petitioners set forth.

#### Institute of Public Service—Communication in Regard to Efficiency in Police Department and Urging Study of Methods Employed by Said Department.

Institute for Public Service, City Hall Square, 51 Chambers Street, New York City, June 18, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Dear Sir—The failure of the Police Department, with its staff of detectives and Central Office men, to make a thorough investigation of the premises where the Crucifix girl was later found buried, suggests an opportunity for the Board of Aldermen to make a most helpful study.

I refer to a study of the methods employed by the Police Department to follow up complaints of citizens and to see whether the men from precincts or central offices who are sent to investigate complaints have done their work properly, promptly and thoroughly.

If in general this work is thoroughly done it would be a great pity for the town to lose confidence because of failure in one case, however dramatic that case.

If, on the other hand, the method employed is found to have been careless or dilatory, or insufficiently supervised in a large number of cases, there is still time to secure definite commitment of all political parties to a correction of such methods.

Specifically, may I suggest that the Board of Aldermen, which made an investigation of police methods in Mayor Gaynor's term, now call upon the Police Commissioner to co-operate with the Aldermanic committee to list, point by point, these recommendations:

(a) Recommendations made by the Aldermanic police inquiry, which the Department has completely carried out.

(b) Other recommendations which are in process of installation.

(c) Other recommendations which have not been carried out.

(d) Changes in procedure which may be considered necessary by either the Police Department or Aldermanic committee.

#### Industrial Education Survey—Request for Extension of Time for Use of Special Revenue Bonds, \$15,000.

City of New York, Industrial Education Survey, 49 Lafayette Street, Cooper Union, June 13, 1917.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall:

Gentlemen—On April 7, 1916, at the request of your Honorable Board, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution authorizing an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$15,000, the proceeds whereof to be used by a committee to be appointed by his Honor, the Mayor, for the purpose of making an industrial survey for the better guidance of the Board of Education in its extension of industrial education:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Aldermen on March 7, 1916, and approved by the Mayor March 14, 1916:

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds in the amount of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by a Committee to be appointed by his Honor, the Mayor, for the purpose of making an industrial survey for the better guidance of the Board of Education in its extension of industrial education.

"That said Committee be given full power to expend this money in the making of such survey and in directing the same.

"That the appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) herein made shall be for one year from the date upon which it becomes available, in order to insure the completion of the survey and the report thereon within twelve (12) months."

"—and for the purpose of providing means therefor, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue special revenue bonds of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the year of their issue."

At the meeting of the Board of Aldermen on March 27, 1917, the above resolution, upon request of the Survey Committee, was amended so that the time for expending the funds was extended to June 30, 1917.

The Survey Committee now finds that in order to finish satisfactorily the business of the survey and to put its report in final form, that a further extension of time is desirable.

We are, therefore, compelled to request your Honorable Board to further amend the original resolution so as to extend the time for expending the funds from June 30, 1917, to August 1, 1917.

**Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Request for Amendment to Resolution Authorizing Installation of Water Meters in Certain Buildings.**

The City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York, June 15, 1917.

*Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York, N. Y.:*

Dear Sir—Under date of March 30, 1917, I sent you a communication recommending the installation of water meters in "any or all apartment houses in the City of New York." At that time my attention had not been called to the decision of the Court of Appeals in the *Grimmer* case (204 N. Y., 370), defining the term "apartment house" or to the subsequent act of the Legislature (chapter 13, Laws of 1912) amending the Tenement House Law so as to include all apartment houses in one class with tenement houses. The class of apartment houses which I had in mind when I wrote you under date of March 30 is illustrated by the twelve examples given on pages 2 and 3 of my printed letter, beginning with the "Minnewaska" and ending with the "Castleton." Speaking of these, I said (page 4):

"The illustrations given are sufficient to show that if the large apartment houses in the city were required to pay for the amount of water actually consumed, etc."

I order that my recommendation of March 30 should be limited in the manner intended I brought to the first hearing before the Welfare Committee of the Board of Aldermen, held April 27, a proposed amendment in writing which I then and there made a part of the record. The amended resolution now before you reads as follows (new matter in *italics*):

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be and he hereby is authorized to install, or cause to be installed, water meters in any or all apartment houses, *tenements and flat houses having passenger elevators* in the City of New York, pursuant to section 475 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 602 of the Laws of 1916.

The use of the words "having passenger elevators" limits the applicability of the resolution to some 2,100 dwelling houses within Greater New York. I write you this letter so as to make perfectly clear the department's position and recommendation. Most of the opposition developed at the three hearings thus far held by the Welfare Committee proceeded from persons having no interest whatever in the limited number of buildings to which the department from the outset intended its resolution to refer and to which the resolution as amended does refer.

"From January 1 to May 1, approximately six hundred matters were brought before both boards, most of which were petitions and appeals, including only those that have been actually placed on the calendar. In addition to these, it is estimated that about five hundred petitions have been received, which, due to lack of force, it has been impossible to place on the calendar.

"The number of matters pending May 1, 1917, and not disposed of, though some of them may have been partly considered, as indicated on the calendar for the first week of May, amounted to:

"The unfinished work by reason of lack of help, consists of:

"(a) The placing on the calendar of the five hundred (estimated) petitions above mentioned.

"(b) The preparation of four hundred and ninety-one resolutions adopted to date since November, 1916, which it has been impossible to put into final shape for the record and for the administrative officials.

"(c) The completion of the minutes of both boards by the incorporation of the resolutions which it has been impossible to prepare.

"(d) The filing, indexing and binding of the completed records of petitions and appeals disposed of since November 1, 1916.

"(e) The preparation of a proper index to the Bulletin of the Board.

"(f) The preparation of a digest of all decisions of the boards.

"(g) The formulation of the rules that are now pending before the Board of Standards and Appeals.

"(h) The formulation of other rules, for which immediate requests have not been made, but which are required by law or ordinance.

"(i) The investigation of new materials, and the supervision of tests, in connection with proposed rules.

"The Chairman also states that the work to be done by the new Assistant Engineer is: 'To prepare reports on petitions and appeals. At the present time this work is divided between the two Assistant Engineers. An additional Assistant Engineer is necessary in order that the work may be properly attended to. The main work for which the Board of Standards and Appeals has been established—the preparation of rules—has suffered seriously because of the great flood of petitions and appeals that have been filed with the two boards. At the present time there are before the Board of Standards and Appeals, and in the hands of committees of that board, ten rules or sets of rules, to which it has not been possible to give any attention, due to the fact that the Assistant Engineer's time is taken up in the preparation of urgent appeals and petitions. The preparation of these rules requires a great deal of study, investigation and extended interviews. The entire time of one Assistant Engineer is required for this work. For the preparation of reports on appeals and petitions two Assistant Engineers are necessary.'

*"Fees and Commissions—*

"The increase in the allowance for members' fees is due to the fact that the Board is holding one more meeting a week than was planned at the time the Budget was prepared. The sum of \$1,040 to pay the Chief of the Fire Department was requested and disallowed in the Budget, as the intent of the law was not clear. On December 11, 1916, the Corporation Counsel rendered an opinion that this official was entitled to the compensation paid the appointed members for attendance. The other funds requested are for necessary changes and equipment.

"Funding—The largest item of unfinished work, as shown above, consists of about 500 petitions, which are for variation or relief from the Labor Law. These are due to orders reissued by the Fire Department when the enforcement of this law in the City was transferred to it. They had previously lain dormant in the State Labor Department for two or three years, by reason of non-enforcement, as the conditions were not considered dangerous. In a public statement a member of the Board of Standards and Appeals questioned the advisability of reissuing these orders at this time, but the Corporation Counsel rendered an opinion that the matter was mandatory on the Fire Commissioner.

"Since their transfer urgent or special cases have been taken up and disposed of at the request of the Fire Commissioner or other officials. The disposition of all of these cases will have to be a gradual process involving many meetings, as each case is discussed fully at the hearings. The Board disposes of about 23 matters at each meeting. The work of disposing of appeals from Building Superintendents on current construction has not suffered to any extent by reason of lack of help. Of the 54 appeals shown pending on May 1, 34 have been carried from 30 to 60 days or longer, awaiting rules, non-appearance and other reasons. The important work neglected is the formulation of additional sets of rules for construction, operation or equipment, which, when promulgated, will have the effect of reducing the matters brought before these boards. In view of this the Bureau of Personal Service deems it advisable to recommend the addition of an Assistant Engineer at \$2,100 and a Stenographer at \$720, from July 1, 1917. The present force is as follows:

"In addition, this Bureau has the services of an \$1,800 Stenographer provided for the Committee on Buildings of the Board of Aldermen. The office force of the old Board of Building Examiners consisted of 4 incumbents at a cost of \$4,220. In the opinion of this bureau the additional Clerk at \$1,200 and Typist at \$600 are not needed. At the present time the Clerk at \$1,800 is assigned to work of minor importance."

The Bureau of Contract Supervision reports upon the Other Than Personal Service items as follows:

"It was proposed to expend the sum of \$1,901.15 for the purchase of new equipment and for alterations to the offices.

"The incumbents of the two new positions above recommended must each be supplied with a desk and chairs. Only one typewriter is to be purchased, instead of two requested. This, with the elimination of two desks, will reduce the request by the sum of \$132.95.

"It is proposed to cut a doorway through a room, connecting the administrative offices with the appeal room and other offices.

"Maps and atlases are required for the determination of Building Zone appeals and must be accessible at all times.

"Linoleum, shelving, desk lamps, cabinet for building zone maps and two dictaphone dictating machines and one dictaphone transcribing machine are necessary."

Recommendation—In view of the above report, the Committee recommends the adoption of the attached resolutions providing for the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$6,818.20 and for the establishment of the two positions suggested in the above report. Respectfully,

**AN ORDINANCE to amend Paragraph 3 of Section 211 of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to tests of tanks and cylinders used for the storage of gases under pressure.**

*Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:*

Section 1. Paragraph 3 of section 211 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

3. Construction. All tanks and cylinders used for the storage of gas under pressure shall be constructed of rolled, drawn or forged steel, and shall be either seamless, brazed, welded or riveted. Containers now in use and purchased hereafter for storing and transporting compressed gases must be subjected whenever they appear materially weakened by use, but at least once in five years, to a uniform interior pressure test, in which the test pressure must be as follows:

For containers for liquid carbonic acid, liquid nitrous oxide, or blaugas, 3,000 pounds to the square inch;

For containers for liquid anhydrous ammonia, not less than 430 pounds to the square inch;

For containers for liquid chlorine, not less than 400 pounds to the square inch;

For containers for liquid sulphur dioxide, not less than 250 pounds to the square inch;

For containers for carbonated beverages in use at time of passage of this ordinance, not less than 300 pounds to the square inch;

For containers for carbonated beverages manufactured and placed in use after September 1, 1917, not less than 500 pounds to the square inch.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:	
Section 1. Section 2 of article 1 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by repealing the last paragraph thereof reading:	
[i. A garage is a building, shed or enclosure, or any portion thereof, in which a motor vehicle, containing volatile inflammable oil in its fuel storage tank, is stored, housed or kept,] and adding thereto a paragraph reading:	
j. The terms "garage", "storage garage", "non-storage garage", "motor vehicle repair shop" and "oil selling station" shall have the meanings indicated in chapter 10 of this code.	
Sec. 2. Paragraph g. of sub-division 1, of section 72, of article 4, of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:	
g. Every business building exceeding fifty feet in height, used as a garage, motor vehicle repair shop or oil selling station within the fire limits [; every garage within] or the suburban limits [exceeding 600 square feet in area or 15 feet in height, or not located as provided in section 91 of this chapter; and every garage, outside these restricted areas, over 40 feet in height; except that garages not exceeding one story in height may have non-fireproof roofs, and garages not exceeding two stories in height may likewise have non-fireproof roofs, provided the same are covered on the inside with approved fire retarding material in all cases where motor vehicles, with volatile inflammable oil in their fuel tanks, are stored or kept on the upper floor].	
Sec. 3. Section 73 of article 4 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new sub-division as follows:	
3. Special fire protection. In all non-fireproof buildings hereafter erected or hereafter altered or converted to be used as garages, motor vehicle repair shops or oil selling stations the columns and girders, unless of fireproof construction, and all wood floor and roof construction shall be covered and protected on all sides with such fire retarding materials and in such manner as may be prescribed by the rules of the Board of Standards and Appeals, except that when such buildings are not more than one story high, without basement or cellar, such protection shall not be required for the roof construction.	
Existing non-fireproof buildings heretofore occupied as garages, motor vehicle repair shops or oil selling stations shall not be required to comply with the provisions of this sub-division, except as may be specifically provided in rules hereafter adopted by the Board of Standards and Appeals.	
Sec. 4. Section 470 of article 22 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:	
Section 470. Height. Except as may be otherwise specifically provided in this chapter, or in the rules authorized thereunder, no frame building or structure hereafter erected or enlarged shall exceed 40 feet in height, except that buildings used	

in whole or in part as garages, motor vehicle repair shops or oil selling stations shall not exceed 25 feet in height.

*Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:*

Section 1. Paragraph "a" of subdivision 6 of section 215 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following sentence:

*No illuminated sign shall hereafter be erected on any building on Fifth Avenue, Borough of Manhattan, between Washington Square North and 110th Street, nor shall any existing illuminated sign on any such building be enlarged, nor shall any such sign on such building be replaced or reconstructed in part or in whole by the erection of a new illuminated sign or part thereof, whether under the same permit or a renewal thereof or under another permit, except that an illuminated sign not in the nature of an advertisement may be erected and maintained temporarily on Fifth Avenue for a period of not more than one month in connection with the celebration of a patriotic occasion of extraordinary public interest not occurring annually.*

My Dear President—On several occasions I have taken up personally with you the question of an appropriation for certain improvements and betterments in Ludlow Street Jail. I had hoped that by this time some action looking towards a more complete use of that building for jail purposes would be taken. It seems, however, that I am to have sole custody during the rest of my term, and before that term ends, I am very anxious to make certain much needed improvements. They are as follows:

1. The installation of electric lights in the cells and corridors of the prison.

I am not familiar with other County Jails, but I am informed by the Prison Association that Ludlow Street Jail is the only institution in the State where prisoners have to resort to the use of candles to obtain light in their cells. This condition should be corrected.

2. The interior of the prison is badly in need of painting.

The only satisfactory painting work is oil paint, in order that a vigorous application of soap and water may keep the place in a clean and sanitary condition.

3. The beds are badly in need of new springs.

As bed springs can be purchased at any time, I would say that twenty-five (25) bed springs at this time would be sufficient, as only half the jail is in use at a time.

4. The ventilating fan at the top of the airshaft into which the toilets open, is inadequate and therefore useless.

A new one should be installed at once.

For the purposes of drafting the necessary legislation, I have secured one bid which might be used as a basis. Bids are as follows:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter, I respectfully ask your Honorable Board to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$123,750, to provide for deficiencies in the various accounts of this Department, as enumerated below:

Code No. 2652, Food Supplies, \$110,000.

The budget allowance in this code is \$390,000, and is proving entirely inadequate owing to the steadily rising price of every article of food stuffs contained in our dietary, although frequent changes have been made to eliminate the soaring cost of a certain item, such as, rice being substituted for potatoes on certain days, etc.

The cost of flour alone for this Department has risen since 1916 from an average of \$6.17 per bbl. to \$9.05 per bbl., and our annual consumption of this commodity amounts to approximately 12,000 barrels, this increase represents a deficit of \$34,560. It is estimated that our next price will be \$13 per barrel.

Code No. 2654, Forage and Veterinary Supplies, \$8,000.

The budget allowance in this code is \$12,000, based on a horse census of 83, but since Jan. 1st, 1917, in order to carry out an extensive agricultural and construction programme, we have increased the census to 113 horses. In addition to the increased number of horses the cost of forage has risen to an unprecedented price. Oats now cost \$2.87 per hundred as against \$1.69 per hundred in 1916.

We have also purchased chickens and pigs for New Hampton Farms this year, and their feed amounts to approximately \$50 per month.

Code No. 2661, General Plant Supplies, \$2,000.

The budget allowance in this code is \$5,800, but on account of the greatly increased cost of all commodities the fund is depleted and the additional funds are required for the purchase of Electric Bulbs, Cotton

## Code No. 2674, Telephone Service, \$2,000.

The budget allowance in this code is \$5,000, which has proven insufficient, owing to additional extensions and the increased cost of service at New Hampton Farms and throughout the Department. The number of local calls allowed in our contract for the year 1917 is 7,500, while up to the present time this year the Department has averaged approximately 5,500 local messages a month, in addition to toll calls. This shortage will cause an overdraft on our contract later in the year.

## Code No. 2671, Shoeing and Boarding Horses, including Veterinary Service, \$750.

The budget allowance in this code is \$3,076, based on a horse census of 83, but since Jan. 1, 1917, we have acquired 30 additional horses, and the extra money requested is to provide for their shoeing and veterinary services; also to cover an increased cost of \$10 per month for boarding horses, caused by the rising price of forage.

## Code No. 2675, General Plant Service, \$1,000.

The amount requested is to pay for dry cleaning the winter suits of the inmates of this Department for sanitary and economical reasons. Under the present procedure the winter suit is retained by the inmate and when surrendered upon his discharge is absolutely worthless.

It is estimated that the life of a suit will be doubled if it can be taken from the inmate in the Spring and reissued in the Fall, and as the cost of a suit is \$8 it is evident that a considerable saving can be effected by the expenditure of fifty cents per suit for dry cleaning.

The number of local calls allowed in our contract in 1917 is 7,500, while up to the present time this year the department has averaged approximately 5,500 local messages a month in addition to toll calls. This shortage will cause an overdraft on our contract later in the year.

In connection with this request I wish to point out that action was taken the middle of last year to reduce the number of private calls in the department and to list all calls from local institutions, so that the charges could be made for calls for private business. This operated to considerably reduce the monthly telephone bills. Our telephone operator, Miss Becker, is very careful in enforcing the provisions of this general order of the department.

## Code 2671. Shoeing and Boarding Horses, Including Veterinary Service, \$750.

The budgetary allowance in this code is \$3,076, based upon a horse census of 83, but since January 1, 1917, we have acquired 30 additional horses, and the extra money requested is to provide for their shoeing and the veterinary service made necessary. An increased cost of \$10 per month for boarding horses must be provided for because of the rising price of forage. Respectfully,

Dear Sir—On May 28th the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen gave a hearing upon the application of this department for the authorization of \$123,750 in special revenue bonds, pursuant to subdivision 8, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter. The Committee informed me that it had been determined that applications for Revenue Bonds to meet deficiencies due to war conditions should be made with the Comptroller with the provisions of subdivision 7, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter, and that, therefore, application should be made to the Comptroller for all items, save Code 2674, Telephone Service, \$2,000; Code 2671, Shoeing and Boarding Horses, \$750.

Pursuant to subdivision 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby made application to the Comptroller for the issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$121,000, enumerated below:

The budget of the department as finally determined by the Board of Estimate, was made up by estimating costs at the then current market prices. In making up the original estimate of the department we had tried to estimate future market prices. The Board of Estimate, however, believed this was not the best way to make up the budget. In the case of food supplies we made the stipulation for the record.

## Code 2652, Food Supplies, \$110,000.

The budgetary allowance in this code is \$390,000, made up by estimating that raw food would cost sixteen cents per inmate per day, although the actual cost at the time the budget was made was \$0.1768525, which meant upon the then census a shortage of \$80.72 per day, or a deficit of \$29,466.18. On the budgetary basis the cost of food supplies per month was \$32,518.70 for the year 1917. The present cost per month is \$41,722.24, an approximate increase in food costs of 28 per cent.

The department was able to feed prisoners at the rate of 16 cents per day during the years 1914, 1915 and 1916, but that amount was proven inadequate.

In this connection permit me to point out that the newspapers have recently carried a statement purporting to have been given out by Secretary of War Baker on May 21, 1917, in which there is contained the following statement:

"It costs almost three times as much to feed an American soldier to-day as it did during the Spanish-American War. In 1898 the average cost per man was 12.81 cents a day. Now it is 32 cents."

Drastic action has been taken to obviate the great increase in the cost of food stuff:

1. In making bread, a formula providing 20 per cent. corn meal has been utilized, and experiments are now being made with a larger percentage of corn meal.

2. Rice has been substituted for potatoes to a large extent.

3. More drastic action has been taken to eliminate waste of food, particularly bread, although this is uphill work among some of the prisoners, who are of the opinion that only fools should go hungry as long as there is anything to take.

Our purchasing department has taken advantage of every opportunity to obviate the increase of prices:

1. By letting contracts and ordering in supplies to the fullest extent in order to obviate rise in prices.

2. By special arrangements with the Comptroller's office for expediting payments in order to secure better prices and occasional discounts.

3. By demonstrating the promptness of the Department in taking care of supplies delivered.

Notwithstanding our action prices have increased to a remarkable degree. The cost of flour has risen since 1916 from an average of \$6.17 per barrel to \$9.05 per barrel. Our annual consumption of flour amounts to 12,000 barrels, so that this increase in price represents a deficit of \$34,560. We fear that our next contract price will be \$13 per barrel.

## Code 2654, Forage and Veterinary Supplies, \$8,000.

This increase is due only slightly to the increased number of horses to feed and to provide for, but, for the most part, to an abnormal increase in the cost of supplies. The budgetary allowance in this code is \$12,000, based on a horse census of 83, but since January 1, 1917, in order to carry out an extensive agricultural and construction programme the horse census has increased to 113. The cost of forage has risen to an unprecedented degree. Oats cost \$2.87 per hundred as against \$1.69 per hundred in 1916. Additional chickens and pigs have been purchased for New Hampton Farms and their food amounts to approximately \$50 per month. This is a paying investment, however, as eggs are now being produced at New Hampton at about 16 cents per dozen. The cost of producing pigs is likewise small where there has been plenty of labor to care for them.

## Code 2661, General Plant Supplies, \$2,000.

The budgetary allowance in this code is \$5,800, but on account of the greatly increased cost the expenses are doubled and additional funds are required for the purpose of electric bulbs, cotton waste, lubricating oil, toilet paper and miscellaneous articles. The Department has been severely criticised by the State Commission of Prisons for not providing toilet paper and we will again come in for more serious criticism than ever if an additional supply is not provided at once.

## Code 2675, General Plant Service, \$1,000.

This request is occasioned by war conditions. It is because the price of clothing has so increased. The amount requested is to pay for the dry cleaning of the winter suits of the inmates of this Department for sanitary and economic reasons. Under the former procedure, the winter suit of an inmate has been retained by him and when surrendered upon his discharge has usually been absolutely worthless. We hope by the new procedure to save a number of these suits for use. I am informed that the cost of materials if the suits were to be cleaned by our own labor would be greater than the cost of having them cleaned by concerns fully equipped to do such work. The greatest part of the expense, I am told, are the materials used. There is danger that our prisoners would waste so much material as to more than exceed the cost of labor and materials under contract.

It is estimated that the life of a suit would be doubled if it can be taken from the inmate in the Spring and re-issued in the Fall. As the present cost of a suit is about \$8 it is obvious that a considerable saving can be effected with the expenditure of fifty cents per suit for dry cleaning.

I trust that your department will take favorable action upon this request.

The appointment of a guardianship clerk has been rendered imperatively necessary by the new Surrogate's Practice Act, taking effect September 1st, 1914, imposing many additional duties upon the clerks in charge of guardianship proceedings. This work is now being done by the Accounting Clerk, but the business of the office has increased so largely that it is impossible for him to properly attend to that department, and, therefore, a special clerk must be appointed to take charge of all guardianship proceedings and the work incidental thereto.

The additional assistant clerk requested is also made necessary by the large increase in business, as appears by memorandum herewith.

I annex hereto a memorandum, giving the details of the duties performed by the respective clerks for whom increases in salaries are requested, the reasons for such requests and a table, giving salaries paid to the clerks in the New York and Kings County Surrogates' Courts performing similar duties, as compared with the salaries of such clerks in my office.

In New York, the Clerk of the Court, or Chief Clerk, has to assist him a first deputy at \$5,500 and a second deputy at \$3,000. In New York County there is one Assistant Probate Clerk at \$2,400, another at \$2,100; in Kings County an Assistant Probate Clerk at \$2,400. In New York there is an Assistant Accounting Clerk at \$2,000 and in Kings an Assistant Accounting Clerk at \$1,800.

There seems to be no position of Index Clerk in the New York and Kings County

Surrogates' offices. The Index Clerk in my office is virtually superintendent of the record room, having a general supervision over the filing of records, doing all necessary indexing and doing typewriter copying as well. His duties are varied and are, no doubt, such as come under various classifications of Superintendent of Recording Clerks (New York), Superintendent of Indexing (Register, New York), \$1,980; Chief Record Clerk (Register, New York), \$2,100; Supervisor of Indexing (Register, New York), \$1,800; Commissioner of Records, Surrogates' Court (New York), Chief Recording Clerk, \$1,800.

Some of the salaries paid to clerks in the office of the County Clerk, Register, etc., of New York and Kings are as follows:

County Court, Kings County: Chief Clerk, \$7,500; Assistant, \$5,000; two Clerks at \$4,000; two Clerks at \$3,800.

Deputy County Clerk, \$5,000; Deputy County Clerk (Queens), \$4,500. In the County Clerk's office of Kings copyists are paid \$1,500; in the County Clerk's office, New York, copyists would seem to be included in the classification of General Clerk at \$1,000 to \$2,400. In the office of the Commissioner of Records of the Surrogates' Court, New York, the salaries of recording clerks are from \$1,200 to \$1,500.

It will be seen from the foregoing that in many cases the salaries to clerks in my office are less than one-third of those paid to clerks performing similar services in New York and Kings Surrogates' offices. This is, manifestly, an unjust discrimination, as the various clerks in my office must be fully as conversant with the laws and rules governing the practice in Surrogates' Courts as the clerks holding similar positions in other such offices, and, further, in New York and Kings you will notice that the various clerks have a number of assistants to help them perform their duties, whereas in my office each clerk attends to several departments, the present accounting clerk having charge not only of the accounting department, but also of the guardianship and miscellaneous departments and having charge of the order and bookkeeping departments. The probate clerk, in addition to his duties in that department, has charge of all administration proceedings and acts as cashier. The index clerk and copyists act as custodians and searchers, for which special men are provided in other offices. I have no law assistant as provided in the Counties of New York, Kings and Bronx, and the duties of such a clerk are performed by my personal clerk and the Clerk of the Surrogate's Court. I also wish to call your attention to the fact that the two copyists in my office at \$900 per year are the only copyists in the City employ paid less than \$1,200 a year.

I annex hereto general statements of the duties at present performed by each of the various clerks.

*Guardianship Clerk.*

The creation of this position is made imperatively necessary by the growth of the business of the office, which has increased from a total of 933 cases of all kinds in 1900 to 2,603 in 1915, or an increase of nearly 200 per cent. The person appointed to this position must be thoroughly familiar with the statutes and the sections of the code of civil procedure governing the appointment of guardians, their control and the management of the funds coming into their possession. He must keep a card index of each guardian appointed, showing the amount of the estate, pass upon all petitions, applications for allowance, etc., and in February of each year he must make an examination of the accounts filed during the preceding month by such guardians and then go through his card index, send notices to guardians previously appointed and who have failed to comply with the law in filing their annual accounts, and take the necessary steps to compel them to comply with the law as to the filing of their annual accounts. It is a position requiring a man of much ability and will entail much hard and arduous labor.

*Assistant Clerk.*

The creation of this position is made necessary by reason of the great growth of business and the expected growth in future, due to the extension of rapid transit lines into Queens County, one of which will be opened February 1st and another shortly thereafter. The present staff of clerks is hard pressed to keep the work up to date and therefore additional help is required.

As to the lower paid clerks in the office, I wish to call your attention to the fact that the greatly increased cost of living has made it impossible for those clerks to properly maintain themselves and their families, and that this fact has been taken into consideration by the Board of Estimate recently in granting increases in salaries to several hundred city employees in the lower paid grades.

As to the other increases requested, I believe you will agree with me that it is unjust to pay clerks in Queens County one-half or one-third the salaries paid to men rendering identically the same services in the Courts of New York and Kings Counties. The fact that these counties are larger than Queens and the office staffs are proportionately larger is not a good argument against giving similar salaries in Queens, as in New York and Kings each clerk in charge of a department or division has a number of assistants who undoubtedly perform the bulk of the work, leaving to the clerk in charge a general supervision.

Here, each clerk must perform all the duties of his position, must know the laws and the rules governing practice, and the fact that the work in Queens has been carefully and conscientiously performed is attested by all lawyers doing business in the court.

In my attendance at meetings of the Board of Estimate and of the Committee in charge of the preparation of the annual budget I have heard judges of various courts giving as one of their reasons for increased appropriations the fact that the collections for fines, etc., by their courts equal or offsets the amounts asked for by them to pay salaries of clerks, etc. In my office the only amounts collected directly are fees for certificates and certified copies, the proceedings of which are used to pay the salaries of three clerks in the office whose names do not appear in the regular departmental estimate.

There is, however, collected through the agency of my court a transfer tax on estates of decedents. This tax is paid to the State Comptroller and used by him for the purpose of paying the general expenses of the state. As the share of the City of New York of the state's tax amounts to about 70 per cent, it will readily be seen that the tax collected through the agency of my court tends to reduce the amount to be paid by the state to that extent. You will readily see by the following table that the city's 70 per cent. of the transfer tax so collected will far more than pay the entire expense of conducting my court and offices.

*Clerk of the Surrogate's Court.*

The incumbent of the office of Clerk of the Surrogate's Court must be a lawyer or a person of wide and varied experience in the law. He must have a thorough knowledge of the laws and rules governing the practice in Surrogates' Courts; he must be familiar with the decisions of the various courts, and their effects upon the practice. He exercises a general supervision over all of the Clerks in the office (fourteen in number). It is his duty to pass upon all petitions and other papers presented which are referred to him by Clerks in charge of the various divisions established in the office. He must prepare all the necessary forms and blank petitions, citations, decrees, orders, etc., which are furnished to attorneys to preserve uniformity in practice. He also acts as Law Assistant to the Surrogate, there being no special position of Law Assistant in the Surrogate's Court of Queens County. The present incumbent has been in the office for eighteen years.

*Clerk (to the Surrogate).*

The person filling this position must, of necessity, be a lawyer, as an important part of his duties is to assist the Surrogate in looking up decisions, etc. He must look after the correspondence of the Surrogate, keep his books and papers in order and generally do the work that a secretary to a judicial officer is required to perform.

Section 2491 (Added 1914)—Clerk and Deputy Clerk of Surrogate's Court, and Clerks in Surrogate's Office; Appointment; Salary.

By a written order filed and recorded in his office, which he may in like manner revoke at pleasure, a Surrogate may appoint a Clerk of the Surrogate's Court, and

in any county containing a city of the second class, and in the counties of Monroe and Erie, the Surrogate may also appoint a Deputy Clerk of said court.

Each Surrogate may appoint and, at pleasure, remove as many other Clerks for his office, to be paid by the county, as the board of supervisors of his county or, in the City of New York, the Board of Aldermen, authorize him so to appoint.

The board of supervisors or, in the counties embraced within the City of New York, the Board of Aldermen, as the case requires, must fix the compensation of the Clerk or Clerks appointed under this section, and may authorize them, or either of them, to receive for their or his own use, any legal fees permitted to be charged by law. A Surrogate may appoint and, at pleasure, remove as many additional Clerks to be paid by him as he thinks proper.

Added by L 1914 Ch. 443, in effect Sept. 1, 1914. See former Sections 2508 and 2509.

*Court Stenographer.*

Must be an expert stenographer of high speed and liberal education, understand court procedure and the taking of testimony and also be an expert typewriter. Reporting cases in court and transcribing minutes of same.

*Probate Clerk.*

The Probate Clerk must have a thorough knowledge of chapter 18 of the Code of Civil Procedure covering Surrogates' practice, of the Decedent Estate law, a general knowledge of the Real Property Law, of the Domestic Relations Law in regard to adoptions, and must be familiar with decisions of the courts governing practice, etc. Perform the usual duties of Probate, Administration and General Clerk of a Surrogate's Court, which includes receiving and passing upon all petitions for the probate of wills, the granting of letters of administration, applications for adoption and other miscellaneous proceedings in this court. Also examine all sureties on bonds of administrators and trustees to determine their qualifications as to property, etc., to act as surety. Also issue citations in above proceedings when required, and pass upon the proofs of service of said citations before placing cases upon calendar; make a record of each case when filed and of its progress through the court until finally disposed of, and make corresponding entries in a general tickler; take depositions of subscribing witnesses in uncontested will cases, under a special authorization of the Surrogate; receive all fees for recording and certifying papers, and issuing certificates and keep account of same. In the absence of the Clerk in charge of the accounting and guardianship departments, perform his duties in addition to my own. Under an order of the Surrogate, am authorized to sign the name of the Clerk of the Surrogate's Court to citations, letters of administration, guardianship and testamentary, and certificates.

*Accounting Clerk.*

The Accounting Clerk must have a thorough knowledge of Chapter XVIII. of the Code of Civil Procedure covering Surrogates' practice, of the Decedent Estate Law, a general knowledge of the Real Property Law, and must be familiar with decisions of the Courts governing practice, etc. The regular duties of an Accounting Clerk of a Surrogate's Court, which includes the careful examination of all accounts, of executors, trustees, administrators and guardians, the petitions, citations, proofs of service, waivers, releases, orders, powers of attorney, and decrees in connection with the judicial settlement thereof; the regular duties of a Guardianship Clerk of a Surrogate's Court, which includes the careful examination of all petitions and applications for the appointment of guardians and of decrees and orders for allowance, annual accounts, etc., in connection therewith. That in connection with the above duties I am obliged to keep records and enter all cases and proceedings in the general indices provided for that purpose, and to prepare court calendars of cases in which citations are issued and issues raised. I give information to the public concerning all proceedings in my department and call attention to omissions or irregularities therein. I have charge of all payrolls of the Surrogate's Court and the charge of all bookkeeping of said Court, which includes the keeping of the usual set of books of a City department, the issuing of open market orders, the checking of invoices received, the transmission of all payment vouchers, the preparing of all monthly and other statements in connection therewith. In the absence of the Clerk in charge of the probate and administration department I have charge of that department. Under an order of the Surrogate, am authorized to sign the name of the Clerk of the Surrogate's Court to citations, letters of administration, guardianship and testamentary, and certificates.

*Index Clerk.*

Must be an expert typewriter and letterer and understand systems of indexing, recording etc. Prepare all indices of wills, letters testamentary, letters of administration and guardianship, accounts, inventories, guardians' annual account, sale of real estate, etc. Record all wills and decrees and exemplified copies of wills and other instruments recorded in this office, assist in taking charge of record room, obtain papers from files, etc.

*Court Attendant.*

Performing duties of Court Attendant; preserving order and watching attorneys, handling records in record room, searching records for information in answer to letters received, receiving and passing upon papers to be used in court. On court days acting as Clerk of Court, calling jury roll and taking full charge of jurors, and all other duties pertaining to Clerk of Court. The person holding this position must be thoroughly familiar with court procedure.

*Court Attendant.*

Familiarity with court procedure; do the Court Attendant duties as required by law; open court; keep order; attend to the wants of the Surrogate and the lawyers in court. Act as a messenger for the Surrogate and also deliver all papers from the lawyers to the Surrogate at the close of court. I must attend to the filing of all papers used and received in court and also help prepare the calendar and the papers for the next court day.

*Copyst.*

Must be an expert typewriter and understand system of recording, filing and caring for legal papers, books, etc. Recording accounts, released, assignments, conveyances of interest in undivided estates, instruments settling estates, also acting as Custodian, and filing papers, assist in taking charge of record room, obtain papers from files and making searches.

*Copyst.*

The incumbent of this office must be an expert stenographer and typewriter copyst. He writes all the correspondence of the office from stenographic notes; prepares the calendar of cases for court days; prepares all letters of administration, letters testamentary and letters of guardianship, letters of administration with the will annexed, letters of administration de bonis non, limited letters of administration and temporary letters of administration, and make out certificates of the issuance of said letters.

*Copyst.*

Must be an expert typewriter, well educated and understand system of filing and caring for books, papers etc. Record and file all guardianship bonds and decrees; all Surrogate's orders, appointments of special guardians in will and accounting cases. All adoption proceedings; all miscellaneous proceedings. Mark filing case in which papers are filed in tickler. Also act as custodian of record room.

*Assistant Clerk.*

Must be an expert typewriter, well educated, and understand system of filing and recording papers used in court proceedings. Recording all bonds and decrees of administration, notice to creditors, comparing all wills and other papers recorded in this office, and acting as guardian, assist in the preparation of letters of administration, guardianship and testamentary, assist in the office in receiving and looking over papers to be filed.

*Junior Clerk.*

Employee must be an expert typewriter, well educated, and understand thoroughly system of filing, recording and caring for papers, books, etc., constituting the official records. My duties consist of making certified copies of wills, orders, decrees, etc., also exemplify copies of wills, guardianship and administration cases that are filed in this office for use in this State or any other State. I have charge of all supplies and stationery used in this office. Assist in making certificates of letters testamentary, administration and guardianship. Enter cases in general index, write letters and assist in other duties that may be required of me.

*Page.*

Must be a typewriter and understand system of filing papers, etc. My duties consist of running errands, answering telephone, filing letters, help make out certificates; also compare copies for certification, write up fees and general office work and all other duties required by different departments of this office.

the amendment is a good one, there are two features of it to which this Department must respectfully object.

The first feature is that providing for a license fee lower than that charged to any other second hand dealer. I am unable to find any reason why this particular group should pay less than other dealers, especially as the rate was worked out very carefully on the basis of the cost of licensing and regulating all second hand dealers. It is also a fact that when this question was first brought to us by the second hand clothing peddlers, they had no objection to the license fee already fixed in the second hand dealers' ordinance.

The other objection is to the date when the ordinance will become effective, which is January 1, 1918.

In order not to seriously complicate the work of the Department, the ordinance should become effective immediately, or else not before January 31, 1918. This latter date is the expiration date of all second hand dealers' licenses.

If the ordinance became effective immediately, a provision might be included under which a license fee for part of a year might be charged now and the license now issued made to expire on January 31, 1918, when licenses for a full year could be obtained.

If the provision now in the ordinance were retained, a man would be compelled to pay a year's license fee on January 1, 1918, and his license would expire at the end of that month.

I hope that the Welfare Committee and the Board as a whole will see fit to amend the proposed ordinance in the particulars mentioned above. Very truly yours,

Dear Sir—There has been introduced by the Welfare Committee in the Board of Aldermen, in new form, an amendment to the second hand dealers' ordinance, providing for the licensing of old clothes dealers and peddlers. While on the whole

## Section 120. Definitions.

1. *Junkman, junkshop, junk cartman, junk boatman.* Any one dealing in the purchase or sale of junk, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, tin, [or] lead, rubber, paper, rags, bagging, slush or empty bottles, in large or small quantities, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall be deemed to be a junk dealer and his place of business a junk shop. This ordinance shall not apply to persons engaged exclusively in the purchase and sale in large quantities of scrap iron and steel, or woolen rags, or paper stock, but each said person shall annually file with the Police Commissioner and Commissioner of Licenses, a statement, in writing, setting forth the name and address of such person and the character of the business thereof.

2. *Junk cart, junk boat.* Any vehicle in the streets, or any vessel in the waters of the city, used for the purpose of collecting or selling junk, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, tin, lead, rubber, paper, rags, bagging, slush or empty bottles, shall be deemed, respectively, a junk cart or junk boat, and every junk cart or junk boat shall show on each outside thereof the words "Junk Cart" or "Junk Boat," together with the figures of its official number, which] and the owner or owners thereof junk dealers. Any vehicle used for the purpose of collecting or selling any article or articles hereinbefore enumerated shall be furnished, by the Department of Licenses, with a plate, to be affixed to a conspicuous and indispensable part of the vehicle, on which plate shall be clearly set forth the official number of the junk cart with the words "Junk Cart" and the date of expiration of the license, and the design or color of this plate shall be changed at the beginning of each license year, and in the case of a junk boat, the words "Junk Boat" and the figures of the official number thereof shall be painted in white block letters and figures respectively at least [twelve] eighteen inches high and two inches wide on a black background on the stern and also on both the port and starboard sides of the boat, at the forward end thereof; and no person shall do such collecting or selling in any other way or manner than as aforesaid. In the case of a junk boat, there shall be but one person on the boat.

## Section 121. License fee and bond; term.

Every junk dealer shall pay an annual license fee of \$20 and give a bond to the City, with sufficient surety approved by the commissioner of licenses, in the penal sum of \$250, condition for the due observance of all provisions of law and municipal ordinances relating to such dealers, excepting in the case of a junk dealer operating a junk boat, who shall furnish for each junk boat so operated, a bond, with sufficient surety approved by the commissioner of licenses, in the sum of \$1,000 conditioned for the due observance of all provisions of law and municipal ordinances relating to such dealers. Each [junk cart or junk boat] junk dealer operating one or more junk carts or junk boats, shall pay an annual license fee of \$5 for each horse-drawn or power vehicle or for each boat, and an annual license fee of \$2 for each push cart.

All junk dealers' licenses, including junk cartmen [carts] and junk boatmen [boats] shall be issued as of November 1, and shall expire on the 31st day of October next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

## Section 122. Restrictions.

1. *Place.* No junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall carry on business at any other place than the one designated in the license therefor, which place of business shall be within the limits of The City of New York, nor shall he continue to carry on business after such license has been suspended or revoked, or has expired.

2. *Purchases.* No junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall purchase any goods, article or thing whatsoever from any minor, apprentice or servant, knowing or having reason to believe the seller to be such, nor from any person between [the setting of the sun] the hours of 6 p. m. and 7 a. m., [7 o'clock in the morning].

3. *Sales by dealers.* No article or articles hereinabove enumerated, except old iron purchased in lots of one thousand pounds or over, old paper and old rags, shall be sold or disposed of by a junk dealer, including junk boatmen and junk cartmen, until the expiration of 48 hours after such purchase or receipt.

4. *Prohibition as to second hand dealers.* No person, firm or corporation licensed as a second hand dealer shall deal in the purchase or sale of any article or articles enumerated in section 120 hereof, or employ or use a cart wagon, boat or other vehicle for the purpose of collecting any such things or materials.

5. *Other Business.* No one licensed as a junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall be licensed as a pawnbroker or dealer in second hand articles in the city.

6. *No licensed junk dealer, including junk boatmen and junk cartmen, shall purchase or sell any new goods.*

## Section 123. Record of purchases.

Every junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall keep, at his place of business, which place shall be within the limits of The City of New York, a book in which shall be legibly written, in English, at the time of every purchase or sale, a description of every article so purchased or sold, the name, residence and general description of the person or persons from whom such purchase was made or to whom such sale was made, the day and hour of such purchase or sale, and, when the purchase consists of articles from a scow, coal-boat, lighter, tug or other vessel, the name of such scow, coal-boat, lighter, tug or other vessel, and the name and residence of the owner thereof; and such book shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of any police officer, or the mayor, the commissioner or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate, or person duly authorized in writing, for such purpose, by the commissioner or any magistrate, who shall exhibit such authorization to the dealer.

## Section 124. Reports to the police department.

Every junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, upon being served with a written notice so to do by a member of the police department, shall report to the police commissioner, on blank forms to be furnished by the police department, an accurate description of all goods, articles or things purchased or received in the course of business of the junk dealer during the days specified in such notice, stating the amount paid for, and the name, residence and general description of the person from whom such goods, articles or things were received.

## Section 125. Lost or stolen goods.

If any goods, articles or thing whatsoever, shall be advertised in any newspaper printed in the city as having been lost or stolen, and if the same or any such answering to the description advertised or any part [or portion] thereof, shall be or come into the possession of any junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, [he] such dealer, upon receiving written, printed or oral notice so to do, shall give information thereof in writing to the police commissioner, [and state] stating from whom the same was received. Every junk dealer, as aforesaid, who shall have or receive any goods, article or thing lost or stolen, or alleged or supposed to have been lost or stolen, shall exhibit the same, on demand, to any police officer, or to the mayor, commissioner or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate, or any person duly authorized in writing, by the commissioner or any magistrate, who shall exhibit such authorization to such dealer.

## Section 126. Violations.

Any person who shall violate, or neglect, or refuse to comply with any of the provisions of this article, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$20, or by imprisonment not exceeding sixty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, May 2, 1917, at 10.30 A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was called on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by adding to clause 1 of Rule XII, after the word "months," the following:

"except in case of a vacancy caused by enlistment for or a call to military or naval service in time of war or national emergency requiring the use of the armed forces of the United States."

There were no appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensation not exceeding the amounts set forth below (City Institutions)," the following:

Physician for the Examination of Mentally Defective Children, \$1,500 per annum (with maintenance).

The following named appeared in favor of the proposed amendment: Stanley H. Howe, Third Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities; William Burgess Cornell, Medical Director, New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools, Department of Public Charities; Charles L. Dana and Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt, members of the Advisory Committee of the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools, Department of Public Charities. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meetings held April 3, 4, 5 (2) and 10 were approved.

When services are to be rendered of a temporary character, and for a limited period, the appointing officer shall inform the Commission, stating the duration of such period, the rate of compensation and other conditions of employment and may select for such employment one of the first three persons on the appropriate eligible list, who, after due notice of the conditions, are willing to accept certification therefor, but successive temporary appointments under this clause shall be permitted only upon the request of the appointing officer, for reasons to be approved by the Commission, and in no case shall such appointments continue for a longer period than six months, except in case of a vacancy caused by enlistment for or a call to military or naval service in time of war or national emergency requiring the use of the armed forces of the United States."

Resolved, that the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below (City Institutions)," the following:

Physician for the examination of mentally defective children, \$1,500 per annum (with maintenance).

York and Sawyer, 50 E. 41st st., Manhattan, be and they are hereby excepted from examination, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6a of Rule XII, of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, to be employed as consulting architects in the Board of Water Supply for a period of one year from April 16, 1917, at a compensation not to exceed \$3,000.
