REPORTED MORTALITY\* for the week ending December 19, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending December 12, 1885.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 583 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 19, 1885, which is a decrease of 28, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 44 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending December 12, 1885, was 582, which is 45.6 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.34 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,418,114.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerksor subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted
