

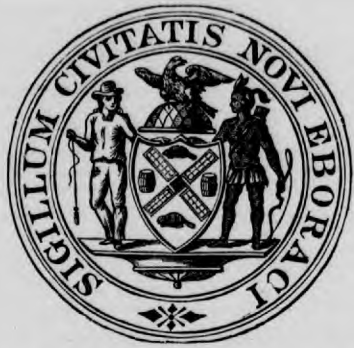

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending August 10, 1878.

Resolved, That Fifty-third street, between Broadway and Seventh avenue, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Approved by the Mayor, August 3, 1878.

Resolved, That Croton-mains be laid in Seventy-third street, one hundred and ninety feet east of Third avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, as provided in section 2, chapter 477, Laws of 1875.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 23, 1878.
Approved by the Mayor, August 5, 1878.

Resolved, That the Croton water-mains and gas-mains be laid in One Hundred and Fourth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues; the Croton water-mains to be laid as provided in section 2, chapter 477, Laws of 1875.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 23, 1878.
Approved by the Mayor, August 5, 1878.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and hereby is authorized to lay Croton mains on Madison avenue, between One Hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, on One Hundred and Fifteenth street, between Madison and Fourth avenues, and on Fourth avenue, between One Hundred and Thirteenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, as provided in section 2 of chapter 477, Laws of 1875.

Resolved, That Croton water-pipes be laid in Forty-seventh street, from Madison avenue 135 feet east, as provided in section 2, chapter 477, Laws of 1875.

Resolved, That Croton water-mains be laid in Forty-third street, from Second to Third avenue, as provided in section 2, chapter 477, Laws of 1875.

Resolved, That Seventieth street, crossing Fourth avenue, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That boulevard lamps be placed on the lamp-posts in front of Mariners' Church, corner of Catharine and Madison streets, in lieu of the old lamps now there, the same to be done under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That the vacant lots on the north side of Seventy-fourth street, between Fourth and Madison avenues, be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That the block of ground bounded by Gansevoort, Little West Twelfth, Washington and West streets, known as part of the "Fort Gansevoort property," be and is hereby designated as a stand for farmers' wagons, for the sale of garden produce, subject to the same ordinances, rules, and regulations as apply to other public places now used for like purposes, and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to carry into effect the provisions of this resolution.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to furnish this Board with his opinion in regard to the powers and duties of this Board to pass an ordinance for the filling and draining of said lots, or for the filling sufficiently to drain them.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to W. Hayes to erect a meat-rack at the curb-stone in front of 180 Madison street, said rack to be at least seven and one-half feet from the sidewalk, the work to be done at his own expense; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Andrew Finck & Son to place a platform scale, 8 x 14 feet, in front of their premises 326 West Thirty-ninth street, in the carriage-way of said street, the same to be on a level with the pavement. Said work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and the permission hereby granted to continue during the pleasure of the Common Council.

First—The amount of labor and materials furnished, and the cost thereof, under and pursuant to the provisions of a resolution approved August 8, 1876, for laying a 48-inch Croton main in First avenue, from Seventy-ninth street to Fourteenth street, and a 36-inch main in First avenue, Fourteenth street to Houston street, Orchard street, Division street, and Pike street to East Broadway.

Second—The amount of labor and materials required to complete the work mentioned in said resolution, with an estimate of the probable cost thereof.

Third—The reason why the said work was suspended more than one year ago, the causes of the present delay, and the length of time yet required to complete the work.

Fourth—The amount of the appropriation now available to pay for the prosecution of this work.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. M. E. Kendall to place an ornamental lamp-post and lamps in front of her premises, No. 1250 Broadway, provided the post does not exceed the dimensions prescribed by ordinance, and the work to be done and gas supplied at her own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks during the week ending Saturday, August 3, 1878.

MEETING HELD JULY 31, 1878.

Present—Commissioners Wenman (President), Wetmore, Conover and Lane.

Directions were given for the repairing of Robbins avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-seventh streets, in the Twenty-third Ward.

The employment of Mr. S. S. Haight, Assistant Engineer, was continued for an additional period of three weeks.

Three old horses, which had become unfit for work, were ordered to be sold.

The hours of 6 o'clock A. M. and 9 o'clock P. M. were prescribed as the periods between which the draws of the bridges over Harlem river shall be opened whenever required for the navigation of the river.

The title of Mr. Frederick Greiffenberg was changed from "Draughtsman" to that of "Assistant Engineer and Draughtsman."

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That James F. Wenman, President of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks be and he hereby is designated and directed to certify and file, in accordance with law, the three similar maps or plans, each comprising a title sheet, index map, field notes and explanatory remarks, and sixteen other sheets, and entitled, "Map with field notes and explanatory remarks, showing the location, width, course, windings and classification of streets, roads and avenues, and public parks or places, within that part of the Twenty-third and adjoining part of the Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, bounded on the west by the westerly line of St. Ann's, Third and Fordham avenues, on the north by proposed streets, roads and avenues, defining a line distant about 400 to 1,300 feet north of the line of the Twenty-third Ward, on the east by the boundary line of the City of New York, and on the south by Long Island Sound and One Hundred and Forty-first street, in Morrisania, designated The Hunt's Point District, as laid out and classified and discontinued and closed by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, and chapter 436 of the Laws of 1876," and dated "New York, March 23, 1878," the said streets, roads and avenues, and classifications of the same, and the said public parks and places, and the discontinuing of streets, being such as to the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks seems most conducive to the public good.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given to Crook's Cornet Band, to play on the Battery Park each Friday evening during the remainder of the season.

Resolved, That the salary of Mr. Edgar B. Van Winkle, Topographical Engineer, be and hereby is fixed at the rate of \$2,500 per annum, to commence on the date of his transfer to his present position.
