The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,527, as follows: 5 public buildings, 577 tenement houses, 174 private dwellings, 70 other dwellings, 21 manufactories and workshops, 23 stores and warehouses, 66 stables, 1 pier, 43 slaughterhouses, 1 market, I wool-pulling establishment, 9 fat-rendering establishments, I public sewer, 3 lime kilns, I garbage dump, 8 manure dumps, 35 sunken and vacant lots, I glycerine works, I stock-yard, 45 yards, courts, and areas, 62 cellars and basements, 85 waste pipes and drains, 145 privies and water-closets, 122 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 8 cesspools, 4 smoky chimneys, I piggery, II other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 617.

During the past week 93 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

61 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 41 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 38 houses, 38 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

448 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 26, 1878. This is a decrease of 57 compared with the preceding week, and the lowest weekly mortality since June 8. The actual number of deaths for the week ending October 9, was 506, and the average number of deaths for the corresponding week of the past 5 years was 506.2 The death-rate per 1,000 inhabitants would therefore be 24.19 for the week, the population estimated at 1,087,645.

The most noticeable decrease in the mortality during the week was among diseases of infantile life, the deaths of children under 5 years of age being 44 less than the number reported during the preceding week; the diseases which also showed a decrease compared with the previous week were, scarlatina, I; typhoid fever, 7; diarrhoæl diseases, 27; cancer, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 6; pneumonia, 4; marasmus and scrofula, 7; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, I; diseases of the nervous system, I3; inanition, I; rheumatism and gout, 3; aneurism, I; cyanosis and atelectasis, I; and premature and preternatural births, 4. Croup increased I, whooping-cough, I; malarial fevers 5; puerperal diseases, 2; alcholism, 2; bronchitis, 7; heart diseases, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; and enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 5.

SIR—There were 448 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 26, 1878, which is a decrease of 57, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 19 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending October 19, 1878, was 506, which is 0.2 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.19 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,087,645.
