

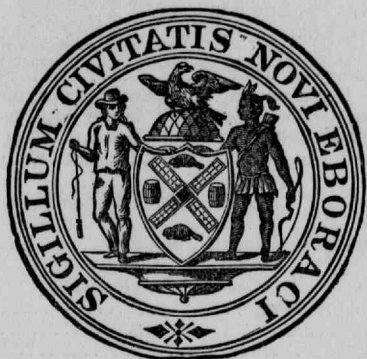

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, January 4, 1894, at 11 o'clock A. M.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 28th ultimo were read and approved.

Simon Sterne, attorney for the Hudson Tunnel Railway Company, was present and requested an additional extension of time of the order of September 8, 1893, revoking the permit to occupy the reclaimed land south of Pier, new 42, North river.

On motion, the time was extended until February 1, 1894.

William H. Burke was present and advocated a reconsideration of the revocation of the permit granted John Anton, November 29, 1893, for a dump at One Hundred and Tenth street, East river, and submitted a petition favoring such action.

John F. McIntyre, attorney, appeared in opposition and filed a petition protesting against said revocation.

The Engineer-in-Chief, to whom was referred on the 28th ultimo the application of Moses Engle for an extension of time to complete the work of removal of Pier, old 29, North river, under Contract No. 467, reported on Secretary's Order No. 13463 suggesting the propriety of notifying said contractor to complete the work as quickly as possible.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From Henry Keteltas—Requesting a valuation of his property foot of Corlears street, East river.

From P. Haag—Respecting the sale to the City of property between Ninetieth and Ninety-first streets, East river.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file.

From his Honor the Mayor—Requesting the Board to take action to relieve the poor and distressed of the City.

On motion, the Secretary was appointed Treasurer of the fund and authorized to receive contributions from the employees.

From the Department of Public Works—Respecting the necessity of raising the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, Harlem river, to the grade of said street.

On motion, Bernard Campbell, lessee, was notified to do the necessary work under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments—Requesting to be informed of the dates of the deeds to the City of the property near the foot of Jay street. Notify said Department that they are in the custody of the Comptroller.

From the Health Department—Requesting the Board to change the location of a float at North Brothers' Island and the runway and float foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work, if necessary.

From the Commonwealth Ice Company—Requesting permission to repair weigh-house foot of West Eleventh street. Permit granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From William F. Cunningham—Offering to purchase the right to fill in between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, East river. Notify said applicant that the matter has been disposed of.

From Benjamin Griggs—Requesting a berth for the steamer "W. V. Wilson" for the ensuing summer, on the south side of Pier, old 57, North river. Permit granted to continue only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the P. Diver Association—Requesting a permit for derrick on the north side of Pier, new 29, East river, for the purpose of delivering coal free of charge to the poor. Application granted, provided the Dockmaster can furnish the necessary space.

From H. M. Loud—Requesting a remission of wharfage on schooners delivering timber to the Department under Contract No. 450. Application granted.

From the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, lessee—Agreeing to pay for the use of the Pier foot of West Fifteenth street from December 21, 1893, to January 1, 1894, and requesting that the lease of said Pier commence on the latter date. Application granted.

From William D. Wheelwright and Charles R. Hewitt—Requesting an extension of time to complete the delivery of sawed yellow pine timber under Contract No. 448. Time extended as requested, provided the written consent of the sureties is filed in this office.

From Colin McLean—Requesting an extension of time to complete the work of building a crib bulkhead on the westerly side of Riker's Island. Upon the recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, the time was extended until February 1, 1894, provided the written consent of the sureties is filed in this office.

From the Hoboken Ferry Company:

1st. Requesting permission to extend its ferry rack at Christopher street out to the pier-head line of 1890. Permit granted, work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

2d. Requesting the Department to do certain work in connection with the extension of Pier, new 43, North river, in accordance with plan submitted, and agreeing to pay the cost thereof. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work and report the cost for collection.

From the Treasurer:

1st. Recommending that the offer of Thomas J. Cummins, of the 28th ultimo, to furnish a weekly circular of Albany news, be declined. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Reporting that arrangements have been made with Thomas Smith to do the required filling in to the extent of 10,000 loads at Forty-fourth street, North river, for the sum of \$1,000. Report approved.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending December 30, 1893.

2d. Submitting cost of extension to Pier, new 38, North river.

3d. Reporting cost of extension to Pier, new 36, North river. The Treasurer authorized to collect from the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company.

4th. Respecting a bill from James D. Leary for extra material furnished in repairing the derrick "City of New York." Referred to the Chief Clerk.

5th. Reporting a sunken canal-boat in the slip north of West Fifty-third street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove and report cost for collection.

6th. Reporting the non-removal of the stable under the dumping-board foot of West Sixteenth street, in accordance with the order of October 4, 1893. The lessee directed to remove at once.

7th. Approving plans for the erection of a shed on the Pier foot of West Fifteenth street by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, lessee.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey to erect and maintain a shed on the Pier foot of West Fifteenth street in accordance with the terms of the lease of said Pier; said shed to be erected in accordance with the laws and regulations in such cases made and provided, and in conformity with the plans and specifications submitted therefor, which are hereby approved, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, said shed to become the property of the Corporation of the City of New York at the expiration or the sooner termination of the lease of said Pier, free of all claims of every kind whatsoever; provided, however, that the said Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall, within ten days after receipt hereof, signify its acceptance in writing of the terms and conditions.

8th. Reporting the non-removal of the brick dumped overboard from the scow "Sadie F. Hoagland" at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-third street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove and report the cost for collection.

9th. Reporting the non-commencement of repairs to the Pier foot of Horatio street, North river. The Secretary directed to transmit copy of the order of October 4, 1893, to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, sub-lessees.

10th. Reporting repairs required to the Pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

11th. Reporting repairs required to Piers, new 20 and 21, North river, and the pavement at the entrance to Pier 18, East river. Lessees directed to repair.

12th. Reporting damage to the outer end of Pier, old 41, North river, by the ferry boat "Hudson City." The New Jersey Steamboat Company directed to repair.

13th. Recommending that the time for the completion of Pier 42, North river, under Contract No. 434, be extended to December 24, 1893. Recommendation adopted.

Resolved, That the agreement with Babcock, Lary & Co. dated July 27, 1893, for doing dredging at Ninety-first street, East river; foot of Dey street, North river; foot of Warren street, North river, and Park Place, North river, be and is hereby cancelled.

Whereas, Application has been made by Michael Mitchell, lessee, for dredging at the Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street; and

Whereas, This Board considers dredging to the amount of five thousand yards necessary;
Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to make requisition for dredging to the extent of five thousand yards at the Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street.

No. 13369. As to the dredging required at Pier 55, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition.

No. 13382. Repaired temporary approach to Pier, new 60, North river.

No. 13424. Placed a sign at the outer end of the Pier foot of West Thirteenth street, prohibiting the landing of vessels thereat.

No. 13428. Tested one barrel of cement for W. R. Grace & Co.

No. 13436. Repaired pavement at the inner end of Pier at West Fifteenth street.

No. 13437. Repaired the Pier at West Forty-seventh street.

No. 13439. Built an incline from the grade of the pavement to the deck of the Pier at West Eleventh street.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repair, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage), on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall therefor be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

All such deposits, except that of a successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If a successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

Permission will not be given for the withdrawal of any bid or estimate, and the right is expressly reserved by the undersigned city officers to reject any or all bids which may be deemed prejudicial to the public interests. Galleries to be provided for accommodation of visitors.

The accommodation for officers, company-rooms, lockers, janitor's quarters, etc., to be suspended on Fourteenth and Fifteenth street fronts, in order to secure the greatest space on the ground floor for drill-room.

Consideration to be given to the necessary heating and lighting, the latter to be by combination gas and electric fixtures. Gun racks and lockers to be provided for all the companies.

In order to secure conformity of drawings it is suggested that they be made on a scale of one-eighth of an inch to a foot.

The entire cost of the building, including all work and materials necessary to complete the same in every respect, both interior and exterior (other than fixtures for lighting, furniture for galleries, company and administration rooms, and which will be otherwise provided for), shall not exceed \$285,000, including the Architect's fees.
