DEAR SIR—Complaint has been made to this Department by a "Citizen" concerning the condition of the vacant lots on the east side of Kingsland avenue, between Driggs avenue and Meeker avenue. After an inspection by this Department I beg to submit the following estimate that the matter may be referred for the action of the Local Board of the district:

Fencing vacant lots on the east side of Kingsland avenue, between Driggs and Meeker avenues, known as Lots Nos. 9, 10 and 11, Block 235, Seventeenth Ward Map, with a close board fence, six feet in height. Estimated cost of fencing, \$31; assessed value of lots, \$1,700.

From the above inspection it was found that the sidewalks in front of certain of the lots on the block are in need of flagging and I therefore beg to submit the following estimate for reference to the Local Board of the district:

Flagging sidewalk on the east side of Kingsland avenue, between Driggs and Meeker avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 9, 10, 11 and 15, Block 235, Seventeenth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging, five feet in width. Estimated cost of flagging, \$207; assessed value of lots, \$3,500.

Resolved, That this resolution be forwarded to the Board of Public Improvements for its approval.
