MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

City of New York—Office of the Mayor, }
May 22, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, without my approval, resolution adopted by your Honorable Body May 9, 1905, entitled

“Resolution permitting the Briquette Coal Company to lay tracks.”

This resolution permits the Briquette Coal Company to lay, maintain and operate two narrow-gauge railroad tracks across Front street at Stapleton, in the Borough of Richmond, and provides as compensation for the privilege such amount as shall be fixed and determined and deemed to be equivalent therefor by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

In order to avoid confusion and the possible necessity for the passage of a second resolution relating to this matter, I think that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should first fix the terms and pass upon the compensation for this privilege. It might well happen that when the Board of Estimate considers the matter some change might be made in the requirements relating to the laying of tracks and the operation of

this railway which would require a new resolution to be passed by your Board. In that event there might be two resolutions and two licenses where there should be but one.

It is therefore quite necessary, in my opinion, that the Board of Estimate should, as I have said, first pass upon the terms and compensation for such privilege before your Board finally acts in the matter.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Briquette Coal Company to lay, maintain and operate two narrow-gauge railroad tracks, as shown in the accompanying diagram, across the carriageway and connecting said company's dock property on the one with their factory property on the other side of Front street, Stapleton, in the Borough of Richmond, the said tracks to be used only for the purpose of facilitating the conveying of material to and from said company's dock and factory; the rails to be used in laying said tracks to be of a pattern approved by the President of the Borough of Richmond, and to be laid and maintained flush with the surface of the street so as not to interfere with vehicles and pedestrians; all the work of laying the tracks, paving between the rails of the same, and for a distance of two feet outside thereof, to be done at the expense of the said Briquette Coal Company, under the direction of the President of the Borough of Richmond, provided, further, that the said Briquette Coal Company shall pay to The City of New York, as compensation for the privilege, such amount as shall be fixed and determined and be deemed as equivalent therefor by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The permission hereby granted to be exercised only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, without my approval, resolution adopted by your Honorable Body May 9, 1905, entitled:

“Resolution to number and renumber buildings on the west side of Amsterdam

avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets.”

It has recently been held by Justice MacLean, of the Supreme Court, in the case of Van Ingen vs. the Hudson Realty Company, that the Board of Aldermen may not devolve the discretion committed to its exercise by section 50 of the Charter, in regard to its power to regulate the numbering of houses and lots in the streets of The City of New York, upon anyone else. Justice MacLean rules that the Board should exercise that power either by specifically designating the numbers, or by devising and adopting a rule in accordance with which such regulations should be carried out, either by a committee or functionary of its own body, or by a municipal official.

In view of this decision, the accompanying resolution is defective, in that it attempts to delegate to the President of the Borough of Manhattan the powers which can be alone legally exercised by the Board of Aldermen.

Spytten Duyvil road, from Two Hundred and Thirtieth street to railroad station.

Two Hundred and First street, from Webster avenue to Anthony avenue.

Sedgwick avenue, from Boston avenue to Van Cortlandt avenue.

Van Cortlandt avenue, from Sedgwick avenue to Albany avenue.

Sedgwick avenue, from Fordham road to Bailey avenue.

Riverdale avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirtieth street to city line.

Burnside avenue, from Webster avenue to Sedgwick avenue.

Robbins avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-fourth street to Westchester avenue.

Summit avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-first street to One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street.

Lind avenue, between Sedgwick avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street.

One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from Concourse to Jerome avenue.

Lind avenue, from Birch street to One Hundred and Seventieth street.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of The Bronx is of opinion that if this work is done by men employed by the City directly, and not through a contractor, the result will be a great saving to the City in reducing the cost of said repaving, of remacadamizing, from about 90 cents per square yard to about 60 cents per square yard; and

Whereas, This Board has been advised by letter from the Corporation Counsel, dated May 16, 1905, that the work may legally be done in the manner requested by the President of the Borough, provided the authority so to do is obtained pursuant to section 419 of the Greater New York Charter by a vote of three-fourths of the members elected to the Board of Aldermen; now therefore be it

“Dear Sirs—On May 1, 1902, when the designations and salaries of all persons in this Department were revised and fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and Board of Aldermen, my predecessor, for the sake of uniformity, changed the designations of some of the Typewriters in this office to ‘Stenographer and Typewriter.’ It now appears that because of circumstances which probably did not occur to Mr. Rives, an injustice has been done to some of these persons, and I respectfully request that their designations be changed back from ‘Stenographer and Typewriter’ to ‘Typewriting Copyist.’ The persons to whom I refer and the dates of their appointments are as follows:

“Mary Doran Byrnes, appointed August 1, 1892.

“Minnie E. Flood, appointed November 15, 1895.

“Catherine H. Duffy, appointed October 5, 1896.

“Josephine McGown, appointed June 18, 1900.

“Margaret T. Pyne, appointed December 26, 1901.

“Each of these persons is an expert Typewriter, and although at one time they possessed a knowledge of stenography, they have necessarily been kept employed continuously for years on typewriting work exclusively, and have therefore lost much, if not all, of their speed and skill in stenography. The result is that when an examination for promotion is held among the Stenographers and Typewriters, they are not able to compete with other employees receiving the same salary, and are therefore deprived of any chance to obtain promotion. The work done by some of these Typewriters is of a much more important character than the work done by some of the Stenographers, and, because of that fact and also on account of the length of their service, they are entitled to compete for increases of salary.

I therefore request that your Board pass a resolution changing the designation of these persons as I have indicated, but as it will be necessary for me to have their salaries fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, I suggest that the resolution be expressed in substantially the following language:

“Resolved, That the designations of Mary Doran Byrnes, Minnie E. Flood, Catherine H. Duffy, Josephine McGown and Margaret T. Pyne, Stenographers and Typewriters in the Law Department, be changed to ‘Typewriting Copyist.’ This resolution to take effect upon the date of the adoption of a resolution by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, fixing the salaries of these persons.”

I have asked each of the young ladies to indicate her willingness to accept the changed designation and their consent is attached hereto.

On the 5th inst. I received a communication from the Civil Service Commission, stating that at a meeting held on the 5th inst. this resolution was adopted:

“Resolved, That the designation of Miss Mary Doran Byrnes, Miss Minnie E. Flood, Miss Catherine H. Duffy, Miss Josephine McGown and Miss Margaret T. Pyne, employed in the Law Department, be changed from Stenographer and Typewriter to Typewriting Copyist, such change to take effect upon the date of the adoption of a resolution by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, fixing the salaries of these persons.”

I now respectfully request that your Board adopt a resolution in substantially the following form, and transmit the same to the Board of Aldermen for its approval:

“Resolved, That the salaries of Typewriting Copyists employed in the Law Department be fixed at the same respective amounts as the salaries of Stenographers and Typewriters in that Department in the same Civil Service grades.”

The purpose of this resolution is simply this: On May 1, 1902, the designations of several Typewriting Copyists in this Department were changed to Stenographer and Typewriter, and the Civil Service Board has now consented that the original title of Typewriting Copyist be restored, but as the salaries of persons employed as Typewriting Copyists in the Law Department have never been fixed by your Board and the Board of Aldermen, as required by law, a general resolution is necessary in about the form that I have suggested in order that no question may be raised as to the payment of the salaries of the persons affected. As the resolution will merely affect the designations of these five persons, and will not affect their salaries in any way, I presume that your Board will have no objection to the proposed resolution, but if any objection should appear I will be glad to furnish any further information and explanation that your Board may require.

Sir—On March 16, 1905, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$500,000 to provide means

“for the acquisition of sites and erection of buildings thereon for the use of the Fire Department,” which resolution was concurred in by the Board of Aldermen, by ordinance adopted April 4, 1905, and approved by the Mayor April 10, 1905.

I have the honor now to request that the resolution be amended so as to read “for the acquisition of sites, the erection of buildings thereon and for additions and alterations to buildings already erected for the use of the Fire Department,” for the following reasons:

During the past few years a number of buildings of this Department have been practically rebuilt under such a provision incorporated in resolutions of this character. These alterations cannot properly be classed as repairs, as the result is a building of much greater value than was the old structure, even when first erected.

The amount allotted for repairs to fire apparatus houses—of which there are approximately 200—in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, Brooklyn and Long Island City, in the Borough of Queens, from the appropriations made to this Department for “Apparatus, Supplies, etc.” by your Honorable Board is necessarily so limited that it is impossible to do any rebuilding or material alterations therewith.

Plans have already been prepared and specifications written for additions and alterations to a number of Department apparatus houses, but progress in this direction is necessarily stayed, pending favorable action upon this application.

No. 1983.

Communication from the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, Transmitting Resolutions as to Route and General Plans of a Rapid Transit Railway Along Thirty-fourth Street and Under the East River in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens. May 22, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York was heretofore duly organized pursuant to chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended, and since such organization it has conducted the inquests and investigations necessary to determine whether it is for the interest of the public and of the City that a rapid transit railway or railways for the conveyance of persons and property should be established therein; and after such inquests and investigations has duly determined by resolutions adopted the 18th day of May, 1905, by the concurrent vote of at least six of its members, that a rapid transit railway hereinafter described, in addition to any already existing, authorized or proposed, is necessary for the interest of the public and the City, and has duly determined and established the routes thereof and the general plans of construction; and it herewith transmits to your Honorable Body certified copies of the routes and general plans so determined and established.

Briefly stated, the proposed route runs through Thirty-fourth street, in Manhattan, from the East river to the Hudson river, passing under the present subway in Fourth avenue and at a sufficient depth under the several north and south avenues to permit other subways to be constructed over it. It will have no track connections with any rapid transit lines in Manhattan, but it is expected that joint stations will be placed at the intersections of the principal avenues so as to facilitate transfers of passengers. So far as this Board has power to do so, it will require free transfers at all such points.

A separate section diverges from the main stem of this route between Second and Third avenues and runs on a descending grade to pass under the East river to what was formerly Long Island City. The terminus in Queens will be in Jackson avenue, near Borden avenue. At this point the various trolley lines converge, thus making transfers easy to and from the proposed subway. A physical connection can also be arranged, if it is found desirable, with Route No. 10 in the comprehensive scheme of this Board,—that being a subway uniting the Williamsburg Bridge with the Blackwell's Island Bridge.

The route now submitted to your Honorable Body is entirely in subway or tunnel, the rails being for the most part about forty feet under the surface. In all respects, except its depth, and possibly some minor details of construction, it will be very similar to the subway now in operation.

It is proposed to take authority to build four tracks in Manhattan and two under the East river and in Queens.

This route forms a part of the comprehensive scheme which has already been called to the attention of your Honorable Body in a communication from this Board, dated May 15, 1905, relative to routes on Third, Lexington and Seventh and Eighth avenues, in Manhattan.

It is intended to transmit to your Honorable Body, at an early date, the First avenue and Ninth avenue routes in Manhattan, and also several routes in Brooklyn and Queens, and further routes in The Bronx. Reference may be made to the above communication for the general considerations which have led this Board to the adoption of so large a project; and also as to the intentions of the Board respecting contract requirements.

So far as the present route is concerned, its advantages appear to be too obvious to call for argument. It will reach and serve such important points in Manhattan as the new Pennsylvania Railroad station, Herald square, with its neighboring shops and theatres; the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, and the East Thirty-fourth Street Ferry. In Queens, it will enable passengers by any of the steam or trolley lines now coming to the ferry to get quickly, and with only one change, to Manhattan; and it will carry them without change to points in Manhattan where they can transfer to any of the north and south railroads, and thus reach rapidly and conveniently any part of the City.

The proposed route is therefore submitted to your Honorable Body for approval. In witness whereof this Board has caused its seal to be hereto affixed and these presents to be signed by its President and Secretary this 22d day of May, 1905.

Resolutions Adopted May 18, 1905.

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York has determined that a rapid transit railway or railways for the conveyance and transportation of persons and property in addition to those already existing, authorized or proposed, are necessary for the interest of the public and of The City of New York, and should be established therein as hereinafter provided; and

Whereas, This Board has duly made the inquest and investigation necessary or proper in the premises and all such inquests and investigations as are necessary or proper for such determination;

Now therefore, This Board by the concurrent votes of at least six members does hereby adopt the following route or routes for an additional rapid transit railway or railways in The City of New York, and does hereby determine and establish the said additional route or routes thereof as follows, and does hereby adopt a general plan of construction of the said railway or railways, the route or routes of which are herein provided, and does in such general plan hereby adopted, show the general mode of operation and such details as to manner of construction as may be necessary to show the extent to which any street, avenue or other public place is to be encroached upon and the property abutting thereon affected.

This Board, in adopting the said route or routes and general plans, expressly reserves all the powers in relation to the construction of the said route or routes which are conferred upon it by section 34 of the Rapid Transit Act. In particular it reserves the right to contract for the construction of the whole road or all the roads provided for in the following plans in a single contract; or by separate contracts, executed from time to time, to provide for the construction of parts of said road or roads or for the construction at first of two or more tracks over a part or parts of such road or roads, and afterwards of one or more additional tracks over a part or parts of such road or roads, as the necessities of The City of New York and the increase of its population may, in the judgment of this Board, require; or to provide in a contract for any part of such railroad that, at a future time, upon the requirement of this Board, the contractor shall construct the remainder or any part of the remainder of said road as the growth of population or the interests of the City may, in the judgment of this Board, require.

Routes.

A route lying wholly within the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens and made up of several sections as hereinafter described. The said sections are as follows:

Section I. A route the centre line of which shall begin at a point under East Thirty-fourth street east of First avenue and not more than three hundred feet distant therefrom; and shall run thence westerly under East Thirty-fourth street and West Thirty-fourth street to a point at or near the intersection of West Thirty-fourth street with the westerly line of Ninth avenue.

Section II. A route the centre line of which shall begin at or near the intersection of the centre line of West Thirty-fourth street with the westerly line of Ninth avenue at the westerly end of Section I. above described; and shall run thence westerly under West Thirty-fourth street to a point at or near the intersection of the centre line of West Thirty-fourth street with the line of the marginal wharf constructed along the North or Hudson river.

Section III. A route the centre line of which shall begin at a point in the Borough of Manhattan on the centre line of Section I. above described under East Thirty-fourth street between Second and Third avenues; and shall thence run easterly under and along East Thirty-fourth street, and substantially parallel with but at a lower level from Section I. above described, to a point between First and Second avenues; there curving northeasterly and passing under East Thirty-fourth street and private property to a point in the westerly side of First avenue about fifty feet northerly from the intersection of said westerly side of First avenue with the northerly side of East Thirty-fourth street; thence under and across First avenue to a point in the easterly side thereof about seventy-five feet northerly from the intersection of the said easterly side of First avenue with the northerly side of East Thirty-fourth street; thence under private property and East river to the Borough of Queens and to a point in the said Borough near but south of the intersection of Borden avenue produced with the easterly side of East river; thence to a point in Borden avenue near the intersection of the southerly side of Borden avenue with the easterly side of Front street; thence easterly under and along Borden avenue, curving northeasterly into Jackson avenue, and running to a suitable terminal point between the intersection of Jackson avenue with Borden avenue and of Jackson avenue with Fifth street, at which a connection can be made with a subway to be hereafter constructed running from the Borough of Brooklyn and northeasterly under and along Jackson avenue.

Plan of Construction.

The general plan of construction hereby adopted for the foregoing routes is as follows: In Sections I. and II. above described, there shall be four tracks. In Section III. there shall be two tracks.

All of the above mentioned tracks in Sections I. and II. shall be placed in subway substantially parallel with each other and on substantially the same level, except that wherever required by special necessities of surface or subsurface structures or other special or local necessities, any one or more of the tracks may be raised above or depressed below the level of the other track or tracks. These limitations shall not apply to the tracks in Section III.

The tracks shall be placed in general under the central part of Thirty-fourth street, so far as may be practicable and convenient, but wherever required by special or local necessities the tracks or any one or more of them may be diverted as far as necessary to one side or the other of the said street; provided, however, that no wall of the tunnel or part thereof (except at stations, station approaches and places of access to subsurface structures as hereinafter provided) shall be within the distance of five feet of the exterior line or side of the said street.

The roof of the tunnel in Sections I. and II. above described shall be at least twenty feet below the surface of First avenue, Second avenue, Third avenue, Lexington avenue, Park or Fourth avenue, Fifth avenue, Broadway, Seventh avenue, Eighth avenue and Ninth avenue. The roof of the tunnel joining Section III. above described shall be at such a depth as shall be necessary to pass at a suitable gradient under the East river. At other points of the route the roof of the tunnels may approach the surface more closely and may be as near the surface as street conditions and the grades necessitated by convenience of operation will permit.

The tunnels above described shall in no case be less than thirteen feet in height in the clear.

The roof of the said tunnels shall be of iron or steel with brick or concrete arches, supported when necessary by iron or steel or masonry columns and resting upon masonry walls; or the roof shall be a masonry structure; or the whole of the lining may be of metal.

Adjacent tracks shall be connected by necessary and suitable switches and connections, and an additional track for siding accommodations may be constructed not to exceed in length one-quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway. There may also be two additional terminal tracks near First avenue and two between Ninth and Tenth avenues and two near Eleventh avenue.

The tracks may at any point of the said route be placed in the same tunnel; or there may be separate tunnels for one or more tracks as shall be most convenient.

The tracks shall be of standard gauge, that is to say, of the width of four feet and eight and a half inches between the rails. There shall be a width in the tunnels not exceeding fifteen feet for each track in addition to the thickness of the supporting walls, except that at stations, switches, turnouts and crossovers the width may be increased.

Stations and station approaches shall, in general, be near the intersections of the several avenues, and shall be built under Thirty-fourth street or the intersecting avenues immediately adjoining private abutting property or through or under private property to be acquired for the purpose; provided, that no part of any intersecting avenue shall be used for a station approach at a distance greater than seventy-five feet from the exterior line or side of Thirty-fourth street, except in Broadway and Sixth avenue, where station approaches may be constructed to connect with subways or subway stations at Thirty-third street and Thirty-fifth street, and except also in Park or Fourth avenue, where a station approach may be constructed to connect with the present subway station at East Thirty-third street.

Wherever along any part of the route above described it shall be necessary for the proper maintenance or accommodation of pipes, wires, sewers or other subsurface structures, the removal, construction or reconstruction of which shall be rendered necessary by the construction of the subway, the width of any tunnel or subway may be enlarged on either or both sides by an additional width on each side of the route, not to exceed fifteen feet on either side, provided, always, that the limits hereinbefore provided as to the distance of the tunnel from the exterior line or side of Thirty-fourth street shall be observed. All or any pipes, wires, sewers or other subsurface structures may be placed in suitable galleries to be constructed within the additional widths hereinbefore permitted. At each avenue where accommodation for pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall be those provided within the tunnel, the tunnel, in order to provide convenient access to the same, may have, within the limit of the sides or exterior lines of such avenues, an additional width on each side of the routes not to exceed fifteen feet.

Pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures at any part of the said routes shall be removed or disturbed only when necessary for the construction and operation of the railway before referred to, and if removed or disturbed shall be placed under the several streets in such manner and in such location that the use and service thereof shall not be impaired. Such pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall be left or shall be so arranged as to give free access for their repair or alteration, or for the placing with them, so far as there may be space, of new pipes, wires, sewers and other like structures, and for making connections between the same and abutting buildings at any time.

The manner of construction shall be by tunneling or excavation under cover, except in places where this Board shall give express permission to construct by open excavation.

Mode of Operation.

The general mode of operation of the route or routes above described shall be by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels, and the motors shall be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour for long distances, exclusive of stops.

Definitions.

The word "street," wherever used herein, shall include an avenue or public place. The words "Rapid Transit Act," wherever used herein, shall be taken and held to mean chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, entitled "An Act to provide for Rapid Transit Railroads in cities of over one million inhabitants," as amended by chapter 752 of the Laws of 1894 and other acts of the Legislature.

Maps and Drawings.

It is further

Resolved, That the three maps and drawings entitled "Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York—Routes and General Plan," one of the said drawings being marked "Key Map No. 5, Borough of Manhattan," and two being marked "Manhattan No. 5," sheets Nos. 12 and 13, are hereby adopted as showing the foregoing routes and general plans for convenience merely, and that said maps and drawings are not to be deemed a part of the description of the routes or a part of the general plans, for any purpose whatever.

Section I. There shall be so many Surveyors appointed for this City as the Board of Aldermen shall from time to time think proper.

Sec. II. The City Surveyors so to be appointed, before they respectively enter upon the execution of the said office, shall take an oath well and truly to execute the same.

Sec. III. Whenever in the proper administration of the duties of his office, the President of any Borough in this City may require the services of a City Surveyor in laying out and regulating streets and roads in said City, making maps and surveys for street opening proceedings, laying out and surveying grounds for the purpose of building thereupon, and to advise and direct concerning the same, he shall have the authority to employ such one of the City Surveyors as he may designate for that purpose.

Sec. IV. The City Surveyors employed by any Borough President shall receive compensation therefor as follows, nor shall any Surveyor's bill be paid unless the same be first certified by the Borough President so employing him:

For a preliminary survey in regulating a street or avenue or for making a country road, for the first line of levels, three cents per linear foot measuring through the centre of the street, avenue or road, and for each additional line of levels, one cent per linear foot, to be measured in the same manner.

For a preliminary survey in filling sunken lots, one dollar and fifty cents per lot of two thousand five hundred square feet.

For grading, when done alone, five cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For grading and setting curb and gutter, when done under the same contract, eight cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For grading and setting curb and gutter and flagging or paving, when done under the same contract, eleven cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For setting curb and gutter alone, three cents per linear foot along the line of the work done.

For setting curb and gutter and flagging or paving, when done under the same contract, but not in connection with the grading, nine cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For flagging, when done alone, three cents per linear foot along the line of the work done.

For setting stakes, making final survey, etc., in the filling of sunken lots, one dollar and fifty cents per lot of two thousand five hundred square feet.

For fencing, including preliminary survey, three cents per linear foot.

For making a country road, ten cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the road.

For establishing a new grade line, one cent per linear foot, measuring along the line.

For making the necessary surveys and furnishing all necessary copies of damage maps in street opening proceedings, three cents per foot, measuring along the exterior line of the street or avenue and along all boundary lines of each parcel included within said street or avenue lines, and for assessment lists and maps for street opening or other improvements, three cents per linear foot of map front, it being understood that the surveyor shall, in every case, furnish quadruple lists and maps without additional charge.

A surveyor employed by either of the said Borough Presidents to make a survey, the compensation for which is not otherwise provided, shall receive such compensation as shall be certified by the Borough President so employing him.

Sec. V. In all cases of street improvements, when the same is required, a projection or profile and such drawing and calculations shall be furnished to the said Borough President as may be required by him, without extra compensation.

A surveyor shall be entitled to receive payment for a preliminary survey, on the completion of the same to the satisfaction of the Borough President employing him. He shall receive payment for all services on the completion of the work and its acceptance by the Borough President.

Sec. VI. The amount paid for any of the services mentioned above, whenever the same shall have been rendered in relation to any improvement or work for which an assessment may afterward be made, shall be included in such assessment.

Sec. VII. A surveyor shall be entitled to receive ten dollars for every certificate for payment to a contractor on any work done by contract made upon public advertisement and letting, which shall be paid by the Borough President making the contract, and except as herein otherwise provided, no surveyor shall be entitled to any payment for a certificate to a contractor.

The amount so paid for a certificate shall be deducted from the payment to be made to the contractor on account of the work certified to be done.

Sec. 2. Hereafter the Fire Department, the Police Department and the Health Department of The City of New York shall cause to be installed at each and every station of the Subway Division and Elevated Division of the Interborough Railway Company a fire, police and hospital call station.

Sec. 3. Hereafter, with the approval and consent of the Interborough Railway Company, the Fire Department, the Police Department and the Health Department of The City of New York shall give to each and every station agent or ticket seller key or keys of said Fire, Police and Health Department station calls. It shall be the duty of said station agents or ticket sellers in case of fire or a breach of the peace or in case of an accident or injury in the Subway Division or Elevated Division of the Interborough Railway Company to call up either of the above-mentioned Departments as in his judgment it shall seem to be expedient.

Sec. 4. The Board of Aldermen, with the consent and approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, shall appropriate sums of moneys from time to time for the construction and maintenance of said fire, police and hospital call stations as above mentioned.

Sec. 5. The Fire, Police and Health Departments shall have full control over the operation, construction and maintenance of the wires, conduits and apparatus that may be necessary to be used in the construction of said stations above mentioned.

Sec. 6. Hereafter anyone using, tampering or interfering with the call stations or keys of the fire, police and hospital call stations, except as hereinabove mentioned, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and for a violation of this ordinance shall be subjected to a fine of ten dollars or in default of said fine ten days' imprisonment in the City Prison.

Sec. 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN No. 320 BROADWAY, ON FRIDAY, APRIL 28, 1905.

There were present:

Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding; John H. Starin, Vice-President; Comptroller Edward M. Grout and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon, Charles Stewart Smith and John Claflin.

George L. Rives, of Counsel; George S. Rice, Acting Chief Engineer, and Alfred Craven, Acting Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

Commissioner Morris K. Jesup sent word asking to be excused.

Minutes of the preceding meeting, that of the 20th of April, 1905, were read, and it was moved that they be approved.

Ayes—President, Vice-President, Comptroller and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon, Charles Stewart Smith and John Claflin.

Nays—None.

Carried.

Bill of William Barclay Parsons, for services in March, including a trip to Albany and subsequent correspondence with a Committee of the State Assembly, and disbursements, amounting in all to \$109.95, was presented.

The following resolution was moved:

The Board then gave a public hearing on the application of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to four-track its Second Avenue Elevated Line and construct a subway extension through Chrystie, Canal, etc., streets, to West street.

William A. Clark, representing the City Club; S. C. Mead, Secretary of the Merchants' Association; Calvin Tomkins, representing the Municipal Art Society; David Steckler, representing the East Side Rapid Transit Association; C. B. Stover, for the East Side Civic Club; Mr. Gaffney, for the Civic Club on East Thirty-fourth street; J. Aspinwall Hodge, representing property-owners; Hamilton M. Dawes, for the Schermerhorn estate; W. W. Niles, representing certain Bronx property-owners; Benjamin F. Romaine, for property-owners; A. Wiggers and Frank Eberhardt, in behalf of the House and Real Estate Owners' Association of the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, spoke in opposition to the proposed franchise.

G. A. Rogers, M. M. Goldsmith, C. Huth, Dr. Bernhard Lazarus, Alderman J. C. Meyers and John de Hart favored the application.

A communication of Max E. Schmidt, Chief Engineer and General Manager of the Continuous Transit Securities Company, was presented as follows and referred to the Committee on Plans and Contracts:

CONTINUOUS TRANSIT SECURITIES COMPANY,
No. 45 BROADWAY,
NEW YORK, April 25, 1905.

To the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York:
GENTLEMEN—We respectfully ask permission to submit for your consideration the following points with reference to the proposed subways in the neighborhood of Thirty-fourth street:

At the meeting of your Honorable Commission on last Thursday, April 20, 1905, neither Mr. Cassatt nor Mr. Rea, on behalf of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, expressed any preference for a four-track railroad under Thirty-fourth street, nor did they in any way oppose a moving platform. They stated that they appeared at the meeting with a desire not to favor or oppose any private interests. They argued that

a four-track route, which would pass their station and run to the upper east side without a change of cars, would be a very desirable accommodation for their passengers. In reply to a question by your President, they stated that it was immaterial to their interests whether the cross-over of such a route was laid through Thirty-fourth or any other street.

Your Committee on Plans has laid out the four-track route desired by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and has placed the cross-over on Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, thus leaving Thirty-fourth street free for an independent crosstown subway from Ninth avenue to the East river. No argument was advanced at the meeting why this arrangement of routes should be disturbed. As a matter of fact, we know of no argument that can be cited in favor of such a course: but there are many valid reasons why the routes should remain as they are.

The most important of these reasons are:

First—That a large number of prominent property-owners on Thirty-fourth street have petitioned your Commission to lay out an independent crosstown subway under that street.

Second—That the City will secure two good routes in place of one.

Third—That the independent crosstown subway, if equipped by us with moving platforms, will be built without expense to the City.

Fourth—That competition, both in the bidding for the contracts and later in the traffic of passengers, will be largely increased, if both routes are built, and

Fifth—That with both routes in existence, by virtue of our transfer agreement with the Interborough Rapid Transit Company and the transfer to the surface lines proposed by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, Pennsylvania Railroad passengers will have the choice of transportation on every north and south bound line in the City for a single fare of five cents.

The Metropolitan Railway Company, if it secures the contract, proposes to build an extensive underground passenger station under Herald square. We submit that such a passenger station can be made much more effective, as a distributing and competing centre, with a through train service on Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets and a moving platform, intersecting all other north and south lines, on Thirty-fourth street, both means of travel being made accessible to passengers from the proposed station, under Herald square. Moreover, transfer privileges can be extended by us to any successful bidder of future subways intersecting Thirty-fourth street, so that there will be a uniform transfer rate of five cents over all such intersecting routes.

We respectfully submit that the criticisms which were made at the meeting against the moving platforms cannot be substantiated when the constructive details of the present apparatus are considered. Such criticisms, we trust, will have little weight when compared with the testimony of such eminent engineers and traffic experts as George S. Morison, Lewis B. Stillwell, General Charles W. Raymond, Charles Paine, General Eugene Griffin, Stuyvesant Fish and William F. Merrill, all of whom have at various times appeared before your Commission as indorsers of the moving platform system. We would say, however, that if against the expectation of these reputable experts, it is found that the moving platforms, after being installed, cannot render the service, we shall be quite willing at our own expense, to make what changes, if any, may be required, in the Thirty-fourth street subway, so that it may be utilized for whatever method of transportation the City may desire.

The President reported that he had addressed letters to the Governor and to the Speaker of the Assembly, urging the passage of bill to amend the Rapid Transit Act, which had already passed the Senate, providing that the term of lease of future rapid transit railroads need not be limited to a minimum of thirty-five years, eliminating the arbitrary provision for cash or securities deposit and also the arbitrary tax exemption clause, and that replies had been received from them, which were read.

Certified copies of order of Justice Truax, dated March 23, 1905, giving an allowance as counsel fee to Thomas S. Bassford, as attorney for Fordham Morris and others, in the matter of acquiring lands at the northeast corner of Worth and Elm streets, for rapid transit purposes, amounting to \$600; and of an order by Justice Truax, granting an allowance and costs to Elizabeth Scriven Potter, in the matter of easements in Broadway, between One Hundred and Twenty-second and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, for \$375, were presented, and the Secretary was directed to call upon the Assistant Corporation Counsel in reference to this matter.

A communication from the Mayor, inclosing letter of John C. Shaw, as to the condition of pavement at Lenox avenue, was read, and the Secretary was instructed to send a suitable reply to Mr. Shaw, explaining that the difficulty here arose out of a dispute between the subcontractor and the surface railway company.

Letter of the Chief Engineer was read as follows, and he was requested to confer with the Interborough Rapid Transit Company with a view of ascertaining if such company would consent to the cost of the proposed addition being capitalized and considered as extra work under contract dated February 21, 1900:

NEW YORK, April 26, 1905.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

MY DEAR SIR—The owners of Nos. 76 to 80 Broadway, known as the Union Trust Building, originally had vault lights in front of their building of a different pattern from that now in use at the subway stations, and the owners of the building, through their engineer, have requested that we restore the old form of vault lights. We do not consider this form of vault light as good a type as that used on the rapid transit work. During snowy weather, however, they are apprehensive of the tendency of the vault lights to become slippery, and to obviate this it has been proposed that some carborundum buttons be placed in front of the entrance to the building. I recommend, therefore, that, in front of this building a space over an area 15 feet by 18 feet, be fur-

nished with these buttons, at a cost of \$175, and that this expenditure be authorized as an extra to the contract.

Letter of the Acting Chief Engineer was read as follows, and referred to the Committee on Plans and Contracts:

NEW YORK, 25th April, 1905.

A. E. ORR, Chairman, Committee on Plans and Contracts:

MY DEAR SIR—As we are to commence the study and preparation of detailed plans and specifications for the new routes in a very short time, I wish to invite attention to my appointment, in December last, as Acting Chief Engineer, and to respectfully allude to the fact that there are several matters in connection with the work upon which, owing to delay in effecting a permanent organization, action has been somewhat retarded. During the coming summer there will probably be construction amounting to between two hundred and three hundred million dollars to be designed, and I should like very much to arrange for the proper conduct of the work, and would respectfully request that you make the position of Chief Engineer a permanent one, and that the salary be commensurate with the position. I would also ask to be permitted to call attention to the fact that within the last twelve months I have acted as Chief Engineer for two-thirds of the time.

Counsel reported as to the wires of the New York Telephone Company and the New York Edison Company on the viaduct structure in the Borough of The Bronx as follows:

The Telephone Company wrote under date of April 4 that during the past three months they had been removing their circuits and guy wires attached to the viaduct structure, and that all such attachments had been removed, with the exception of eight guy wires intended to hold certain poles in place. They requested a permit from the Acting Chief Engineer that these attachments might continue as at present existing. Under advice of counsel about April 24, the Acting Chief Engineer signed a permit to the New York Telephone Company, as requested, which was made revocable on thirty days' notice.

The Edison Company at first contended that their wires attached to the structure were placed as directed by the Resident Engineers of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, and expressed an unwillingness to take any steps in regard to the matter. Finally they receded from this position, and under date of April 26, they wrote to this Board, requesting that these attachments might be approved and that permission might be granted to make additional attachments hereafter, from time to time.

Counsel stated further that he would continue the negotiations with the Edison Company on the basis of the Board's willingness to grant revocable permits on proper terms.

Counsel reported that progress had been made in the preparation of forms of resolutions for the new routes and plans for final submission to the Board. It was decided to have a meeting of the Committee of the Whole, to consider these matters, on Thursday, the 4th of May, at 2.30 P. M.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
