MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

City of New York-Office of the Mayor,)

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—I return herewith, with my disapproval, a resolution adopted by your Honorable Board on July 31, 1906, as follows:

Resolved, That permission be given and the same is hereby given to Berthold Mucke, to place, keep and maintain an ornamental clock on the sidewalk at the curb in front of his store, situate at No. 2633 Eighth avenue, said clock not to be used for advertising purposes, and said permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

In passing on this question it is perhand impraterial whether or not the possible.

In passing on this question it is perhaps immaterial whether or not the provision that the clock shall not be used for advertising purposes has any real meaning, inas-

much as it is very certain that Mr. Mucke does not intend to make a present to the public of a clock, but intends, on the contrary, to place the same in front of his store and to inscribe upon the same his name for the purpose of attracting customers.

Whether or not the clock is to be used for advertising purposes, this resolution is fatally bad for several reasons.

The powers of the Board of Aldermen in regard to such matters are derived from section 50 of the Charter, which gives to that body the power "to regulate the use of the streets for signs, signposts * * * posts for telegraph or other electric wires, and other purposes."

The erection of a clock is not apparently covered by the portion of the section cited, but even if it is there still remains a fatal objection to the ordinance.

The subsequent portions of the section in question contain these provisions:

"The Board of Aldermen shall not have power to authorize the placing or continuing of any encroachment or obstruction upon any street or sidewalk, except the temporary occupation thereof during the erection or repairing of a building on a lot opposite the same. * * The Board of Aldermen shall not pass any special ordinance in relation to any of the matters mentioned in this section. All ordinances in relation thereto shall be general ordinances which may either apply throughout the whole City or throughout specified portions thereof. * * * All general ordinances relating to authorized structures, encroachments or obstructions in or upon the streets or sidewalks * * shall fix a definite license fee for every such authorized structure, encroachment or obstruction * * * "

Gentlemen—By direction of the Central Federated Union, I desire to call your attention to a grievance lodged by the International Union of Pavers and Rammersmen against the New York City Railway Company, in which said company is charged with keeping its tracks in such a condition that they are a menace to the traveling public. Dear Sirs—Pursuant to the request contained in the resolution of your Board adopted February 6, 1906, in relation to the property on Wall and William streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, occupied as a Custom House and known as Lot No. 1 in Block 27, Section 1, on the land map of the Borough of Manhattan, by which resolution the Corporation Counsel was requested to inform your Board upon the following points:

In the years 1900 and 1901 the assessment was by name against the National City Bank; in the year 1890 against United States Custom House, and in each of the other years against United States Government.

3. In each of the years 1890 to 1905, inclusive, the property, although assessed as required by law, was marked "Exempt," and no taxes were levied thereon.

4 and 5. The reason assigned for non-payment of taxes and for the absence of any effort to collect "the taxes due and unpaid on the aforesaid property" is that no tax was levied for any of the years in question.

Since your resolution was transmitted, the general question of the taxation or exemption from taxation of the Old Custom House property has been the subject of consideration in Congress, and it is now commonly known that the property was sold by the United States Government in 1899 and was bid in by the National City Bank at the sum of \$3,265,000. No deed appears to have been given by the United States to the bank, for the reason that there still remains due and unpaid a balance of \$50,000 on the original selling price.

When, in the year 1900, an application was filed in the Department of Taxes and Assessments to exempt the property from taxation on the ground that the bank was not the owner of the property, and that the title was still in the United States, the matter was referred to the Law Department of the City and the Corporation Counsel advised, under date of May 5, 1900, that, if the United States was the owner of the premises on the second Monday of January of that year, the assessment was void.

As there has been no apparent change in the situation since 1900, the Department of Taxes and Assessments has continued the exemption on its books.

skape, shall not be less than three-sixteenths of an inch in width or length at its narrowest point.

It shall not be lawful for any person, copartnership or corporation within The City of New York to offer or expose for sale or give away any production commonly and popularly known as confetti in packages of any size or dimensions which contain any of such confetti of more than one color in one package.

It shall not be lawful for any person, firm or corporation within The City of New York to sweep or gather from the streets or avenues or walks within said City of New York any confetti which theretofore had been used, and to sell, offer or expose for sale or give away, or in any manner use such confetti so gathered.

It shall be presumptive evidence of the violation of this section for any person, firm or corporation in The City of New York to have in his or its possession confetti in packages or otherwise which contain confetti of more than one color. The City Magistraies of The City of New York shall have power, authority and jurisdiction to hear, try and determine any charge against any person, firm or corporation charged with violation of this ordinance. If any person, firm or corporation shall be found guilty of violation of any provision of this ordinance he or it shall, upon conviction, be sentenced as follows:

For the first offense, ten dollars fine or ten days in the County jail, or both such fine and imprisonment. For the second offense twenty-five dollars fine or twenty-five days in the County jail, or both such fine and imprisonment. For the third or subsequent offense one hundred dollars fine or three months in the County penitentiary, or both such fine and imprisonment.


