REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1906.

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, Foot of East Twenty-sixth street, February 5, 1907.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir-I have the honor to transmit herewith, pursuant to the provisions of section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1001, the report of the Department of Public Charities of The City of New York for the quarter ending December 31, 1906, together with the reports of the heads of institutions under the jurisdiction of the Department for the same period.

Census for the Quarter.

The average daily census of patients in all the hospitals, schools for the feeble-minded, asylums, homes for the aged and infirm and other institutions of the department for this quarter has been 8,010, as compared with 7,811 for the corresponding period of the preceding year. The admissions have been 7,890, as against 7,442, the number admitted during the same quarter of 1905.

Additional Appropriations.

June 30, 1906, a request was forwarded to the Board of Aldermen for an appropriation of \$203,367.75, to meet an anticipated deficiency in some of the appropriations allowed to this department for the year 1906. On October 2 the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$150,000, the proceeds whereof to be applied to meeting the deficiencies in some of the appro-

On November 2 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved of and concurred in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted October 2, to the extent of sixty thousand dollars, for the purpose of providing means to meet the deficiency in the Supplies and Contingencies appropriation, and on November 7 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved of and concurred in, to the extent of a further appropriation of \$78.812.94, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted October 2 to be applied as follows: 2, to be applied as follows:

-making a total additional appropriation of \$138,81294. Several transfers from one appropriation to another were requested from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and all of them were granted.

Supplies.

Coal—Owing to the mildness of the winter of 1905 and 1906—and so far of this winter—there was quite a saving on the quantity of coal used. The money thus saved on coal has been used in purchasing other supplies for the institutions, the cost of which has shown an advance.

Nurses at Kings County Hospital and Cumberland Street Hospital.

The course of training for the Nurses (female) at the Kings County and Cumberland Street hospitals. Borough of Brooklyn, was changed from three years to two years, said change taking effect October 1, 1906. This was decided on after three years' trial of the longer (three-year) course.

The three new spiral fire-escapes—one at the City Hospital (to match the one erected during 1903) and two at the new male Tuberculosis Infirmary, Blackwell's Island—were completed during this quarter, also the new iron fire-escapes on three cottages, Farm Colony, were about finished by December 31, 1906.

Plans and specifications for the new fireproof stairway and passenger elevator in the central portion of the male Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division, were prepared and advertised in the corporation papers, bids to be opened January 9, 1907. Award will be made to the lowest bidder and the work pushed to completion as soon as possible, as this elevator has been a long-felt necessity.

New Buildings, Alterations and Improvements,

October 4, 1906, Mr. Raymond F. Almirall, architect, was requested to prepare plans and specifications for the following new buildings, appropriation for which was granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 5, 1906, and by the Board of Aldermen on July 31, 1906:

In view of the fact that this institution may be removed in the course of a few years, I desire to have these buildings so constructed as to permit of the removal and reconstruction at a minimum cost.

It is my desire to have all of these buildings constructed as simply and expeditiously as possible, and including fees, absolutely within their respective appropriations.

Plans and specifications prepared by the department Architect for the following: Two new isolation pavilions for Randall's Island; estimated cost, \$10,000.

Five new toilet towers for buildings on Randall's Island; estimated cost, \$42,000.

Buildings in course of construction and nearing completion:

Male employees' dormitory, Randall's Island, which is being remodeled and enlarged by the addition of a commodions wing.

Infants' Hospital building, Randall's Island; new sashes and repairs to frames.

New Municipal Lodging House, now building on East Twenty-fifth street, 400 feet east of First avenue, would have been about finished had not great delay been caused by getting a proper foundation for one corner of the building where the boiler pit is to be located. In digging for this pit quicksand was encountered, thus causing a change in the method of construction, for which the contractor claims an extra allowance of \$40,400. The whole matter was, on December 29, 1906, referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion. In the meantime all the work was stopped on said building.

On October 20, 1906, the Art Commission notified this department that it had been requested by his Honor the Mayor, acting under section 637 of the Charter, to pass upon the following buildings for this department:

The preliminary designs for the above buildings were approved by the Art Commission at its meeting held December 11, 1906.

Plans and specifications of new buildings and alteration to existing buildings were submitted to the State Board of Charities, in accordance with the provisions of the Poor Law, as follows:

October 25—Two isolation pavilions, Randall's Island; estimated cost, \$10,000. December 3—Removal of wooden stairway and the erection of a passenger elevator and freproof stairway in the central portion of the male Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division; estimated cost, \$30,000.

December 24—Five toiler towers for buildings on Randall's Island; estimated

December 26-Coney Island Hospital buildings; total cost for the group of six huildings, \$188,000.

Coney Island Hospital.

Site for the new Coney Island Hospital on Ocean parkway, containing about 25% acres. November 3, 1906, the Assistant Corporation Counsel for Brooklyn, Hon. J. D. Bell, notified this department as follows:

"Sir—Herewith I transmit Commissioners' transcript of estimate and report in proceedings brought to acquire title to premises bounded by Ocean parkway, Avenue Y, East Sixth street, Canal avenue and Coney Island creek, in the Borough of Brook-

lyn, as a site for hospital purposes.

"Under the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, these papers should be filed in your Department as of November 5, 1900, and should there remain permanently on file, open to the inspection of all persons interested in the premises sought to condemned.

On December 7, 1906, this Department was again notified as follows:

Avenue Y, East Sixth street, Canal avenue and Coney Island creek, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for hospital purposes, I transmit herewith a certified copy of an order of the Supreme Court, bearing date December 4, 1906, and filed and entered in the office of the Clerk of the County of Kings on December 5, 1906, confirming the report of Commissioners of Estimate in the proceedings brought to condemn said lands, and taking the costs and expenses of the proceeding, other than the expenses incurred by the City for expert witnesses and searches.

"Said order has been duly obtained and its provisions should be complied with.
"I call your attention to the fact that the transcript of estimate in this proceeding was heretofore filed in your office August 14, 1906, and that, after the hearing of objections thereto, said transcript was refiled and the final report herein filed, in your office on November 5, 1906, and now remains there on file.

"I further call your attention to the fact that in accordance with the provisions of section 1440 of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, the Board of Estimate and Appor-

tionment on December 3, 1905, adopted a resolution that title to the lands in question and all interests therein should vest in The City of New York on December 9, 1905.

"I therefore bes to advise you that said awards draw interest at the rate of 6 per cent, per amoun from the date of the vesting of title in the City to said premises, to wit, December 9, 1905, to the date of payment thereof.

"I also inclose a certified copy of the bill of costs and expenses in the proceeding as taxed by a Justice of the Supreme Court.

The awards by these Commissioners amounted to \$115,000, and the expenses to \$1,237, and this Department was requested to pay this bill of costs. As this Department never requested the City to purchase this property by private sale or condemnation proceedings, the whole matter was referred on December 15, 1906, to the Corporation Counsel's office in the following letter:

"Dear Sir—Your valued communication of the 7th inst, with relation to acquiring title to lands on Ocean parkway, near Coney Island, for hospital purposes, with notice to pay the bill of costs for the same, amounting to \$1,237, was duly received and has had careful consideration. It also appears that the Department is required to pay the cost of the property amounting to \$15,000, and subject to certain mortgages, liens and unpaid taxes aggregating a large additional amount. As I am unable to find in the records of the Department any evidence to show that anyone authorized to act for it has ever requested the purchase of such property, and am informed by those who should know about the matter that such request was never made, I am at a lins to know what my duties are in the premises, and should appreciate further emlightenment on the subject. It is my understanding that my predecessor, Commissioner Tully, in a communication to the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 13, 1904, requested that a piece of the property in question, supposed to belong to the City, be turned over to the Department as a site for the proposed Coney Island hospital, but it does not appear that he asked to have any property purchased for such purpose, and the Department did not have then, and has not had since any moneys for such purpose.

"Further than this, when notice of the condemnation proceedings was first brought to my attention, I sent word to this effect by the Second Deputy to the office of the Corporation Counsel in Brooklyn, which then had charge of the matter, and received answer to the effect that there would be no charge to the Department.

The renewal of the lease of the lodging house No. 308 First avenue, which was requested under date of August 20, 1906, of the Sinking Fund Commission, was granted at a meeting held October 10, 1906. This renewal was made necessary because of the delay in constructing the new Municipal lodging house on East Twenty-fith street, east of First avenue, the contractors for which were notified on December 23, 1905, to proceed with the work. It was to be completed in 240 working days, but, as previously stated, they have been greatly delayed.

The Board of Aldermen on October 30, 1906, adopted a resolution allowing this Department to make a contract with the contractor who was building the dormitory for male employees at the Metropolitan Hospital for extra plumbing to comply with the regulations of the State Board of Charities, at a cost not to exceed \$1,365, without public letting.

December, 7, 1906: Keys to the annex building used by the Long Island State Hospital for the Insane at Flatbush, Brooklyn, were turned over to this Department. This is one of the group of buildings used by the State Hospital for the Insane in Flatbush.

New Positions.

On October 3, 1906, the following request was forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"Gentlemen-I would respectfully request that the following new positions, with the salaries stated, for which you have already made specific appropriation, he established in this Department, in addition to the positions and salaries heretofore established, under the provisions of section 50 of the Greater New York Charter:

"1. A Confidential Stenographer, per annum, \$1,500.

"2. A Confidential Inspector of Food Supplies, per annum, \$1,500.

"Your Honorable Board approved of and concurred in, to the extent of \$12,935, on May 25, 1906, the resolution adopted by the Board of Alderman April 10, 1906, requesting the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$14,170.01, the

proceeds whereof to be applied to paying the salaries of one Confidential Stenographer, one Confidential Inspector of Food Supplies and other classes of employees (grades for which have previously been established by your Board) of this Department, as per my request of March 27, 1906, to the Board of Aldermen,

Increase in Pay of Pilots.

On October 4 the following letter was forwarded to His Honor, the Mayor:

"Hon, GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York, the City Hall,

"Dear Sir—The letter to you from Mr. Luther B. Dow, general manager of United Harbor No. 1, of the American Association of Masters and Pilots of Steam Vessels, with relation to the pay of Masters and Pilots in this Department, which you caused to be referred to me, has had consideration.

"In answer permit me to say that there is no law, by local enactment or otherwise, compelling this Department to pay \$1,620 a year to Masters, and \$1,400 a year to Pilots, as Mr. Dow seems to claim in his letter. The facts are that the Department has grades for Pilots at \$900, \$1,050, \$1,200, \$1,350, \$1,400 and \$1,620 per annum, the last two grades being 'additional' established in December, 1905, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

"The Department is at present paying the two principal Pilots these additional rates, the Master of the Brennan' getting \$1,620, and the Master or Pilot of the 'Fidelity,'

\$1,400 a year.

"Other Pilots serving as Assistants on the 'Brennan,' the Department's largest boat, are receiving \$1,200 a year each, while those on the smaller ferryboats or launches, the 'Mulry' and the 'Wickham,' receive \$000 per annum.

"In my opinion all of the men. excepting the four who are paid \$000 a year, are getting what may be justly regarded as the maximum of the prevailing rate of wages, particularly when it is considered that they also receive their meals when they are at work.

particularly when it is considered that they also receive their meals when they are at work.

"I am, therefore, not in a position to recommend that these Pilots be paid any higher wages at present at least, except as they may earn them through promotion.

"In the cases of the four Pilots running the ferry launches 'Mulry' and Wickham,' I am of the opinion that they should have \$1,200 a year, and in the Departmental estimate for 1907. I am asking that this amount be granted to them.

"It is always gratifying to me to be able to pay good wages to good men in this Department (such as the Pilots are required to be), particularly as the Department's greatest handicap is its relatively low wages. But in view of the paramount need of better compensation for the Hospital Helpers, so as to secure a reputable grade of service, as well as because of many other pressing needs, I cannot recommend any greater compensation for the Pilots than is hereinbefore indicated.

"The counsel for the association which Mr. Dow represents, has been asked for proof that the Department is not paying the prevailing rate of wages to Pilots, but such proof has not been furnished.

"In conclusion permit me to say that I shall be glad to give consideration to any further statements that the representatives of the association may wish to make with relation to this matter, but as at present advised, I can see no legal ground for their contention.

Sea View Hospital, Borough of Richmond.

On October 12, 1906, bids were opened "for providing all labor and materials required for the excavation, masonry, steel and iron, roofing and metal work, carpentry, glazing, painting, hardware, electric work and all other work (except plumbing, heating, elevator machinery and ears, electric wiring and fitting up of the diet kitchens and utility rooms)," as set forth in the drawings and specifications for the construction and completion of eight ward buildings of the Sea View Hospital, situated on certain property owned by The City of New York, on the south side of the Manor road, township of Castleton, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York. There were six bidders, the lowest being Waters & O'Connell, No. 103 East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, for \$1,265,000. As this amount was larger than the amount estimated, all bids were rejected.

On October 12, 1906, an injunction was filed against this Department, and also against the Comptroller, forbidding the awarding of the contract for the Sea View Hospital. This was filed before the bids were opened. The matter was referred the same day (October 12) to the Corporation Counsel for his attention.

We have as yet heard nothing from you with relation to this matter, and as the need for this hospital is very great and urgent, I shall be greatly obliged if the proceedings to be taken to dissolve this injunction can be expedited as much as possible.

On October 23, 1906, bids were opened for the transportation and burial of the pauper dead in the Borough of Queens. There were only two bidders, the lowest being Henry Schlitz, of No. 722 Metropolitan avenue, Brooklyn, for \$5.50 per body.

On October 29 bids were opened "for furnishing all labor and materials required for the complete alteration and repairing, with the complete plumbing work, complete electric wiring and fixtures and complete heating work, of the Department of Public Charities building situated at No. 327 Schermerhorn street, Borough of Brooklyn (Central office, Brooklyn)." There were only two bidders, the lowest being Daniel J. Ryan, of No. 723 Third avenue, Brooklyn, to whom the contract was awarded the same day at \$37,215.

On October 29 bids were opened "for furnishing and delivering 250 tons of ice." There were three bidders, the lowest being the American Ice Company, to whom the contract was awarded at \$3,50 per ton on the same day.

On November 19 bids were opened "for furnishing all the work, labor, services and materials required for the extermination of rats and mice, and for the extermination of roaches and water bugs. There was only one bidder, the Brown Insecticide Company, which proposed to do all the work for \$350, and the contract was awarded to it on November 20, 1906.

On December 10 new naphtha lamps were installed by the Bureau of Lamps and Gas, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, along the road between the office building of the Home for Aged and Infirm Blackwell's Island, and the store-house. These were lighted for the first time December 10. With these lamps about all of the roads on Blackwell's Island are now lighted, which makes night traveling on the island as safe and comfortable as in the city.

During this quarter requests were made of the Department of Docks and Ferries

October 1-To repair the Morgue dock at the foot of East Twenty-sixth street, which was damaged by the steamer "Thomas S. Brennan" on September 27; also to make necessary repairs to the dock at the bakery on the east side of Blackwell's This was granted and the work ordered.

October 5—For permission to place a float stage at the loot of East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, as a landing place for the Randall's Island ferry. This was denied, because the Manhattan State Hospital objected, claiming that it would interfere with the landing of their boats at this point for the Ward's Island ferry service.

October 19—Permission was requested to place a waiting room 12 feet by 14 feet on the pier at North Second street, Williamsburg, Brooklyn; also permission to build a shed on the pier at the foot of Summerfield avenue, Mariner's Harbor, Staten Island. These two piers are used as landing places for the department boat "Fidelity," which goes to Staten Island three times a week with supplies and inmates for the Farm Colony.

To which reply was made as follows:

November 10—To repair, where necessary, the dock sheathing just outside of shed at the East Twenty-sixth street dock; also to remove the present float stage at the East One Hundred and Twentieth street dock and anchor in its place the new float stage now lying at Randall's Island; also to repair where necessary the decking and piles of the dock at East One Hundred and Twentieth street and at Randall's Island; and also to make the necessary repairs to the inboard end of the coal dock at Randall's Island. This was granted and order issued by the Dock Department to have this done.

November 30—To redrive and renew piles where necessary at the north end of the sand dock, also to replace two new cleats and set the mooring post at the coal dock; both at the Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwell's Island, on the east side.

December 20—To repair the rangers, decking and deck sheathing on the inboard end of the Twenty-sixth Street Pier, so that the Department of Charities may be able to renew the sills for the office building of the Bureau of Dependent Adults.

December 29—The matter of acquiring a new dock for the ferry landing near Forty-ninth street and East river was taken up with the Department of Docks and Perries in the following communication:

"Hon. JOHN A. BENSEL, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, Pier

"A." North River:

"Dear Sir—Under date of October 22 we wrote to you requesting that a suitable dock be built between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets. East river, for a landing place for the boats of this department that run every half hour between said point and Blackwell's Island. This was asked because the dock at present used by this department at foot of East Fifty-second street is very inaccessible owing to the height of the street above the river at this point. There is a long flight of stairs leading from the street to the dock which in winter is exceedingly dangerous to the many thousand passengers that cross to the island at this point.

"You replied under date of November 10 that as the Department of Docks and Ferries does not own the property between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets. East river, our request for the construction of a dock at this point could not be complied with.

with.

"My object in writing further on this subject is to ask if you will not kindly take up the question of the City acquiring this river front property between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets. This is a valuable piece of property and we have no doubt would amply repay the expenditure, at the same time give to this department landing facilities it so much requires at this point of Manhattan Island. A dock near Forty-ninth street would give better and easier access to the lines of transportation.

"I would say further for your consideration in this connection that our boat lands at this Fifty-second street dock every half hour between 7 a. m. and midnight. During the year 1905, 176,477 passengers were carried on this route, with every indication of carrying more this year, for during the first six months of 1906 95,372 passengers.

On the first day of each calendar month, or as soon thereafter as possible, the Superintendent of each institution of the department in the Borough of Manhattan shall turn over to the Commissioner, through the Private Secretary, all property, except clothing, of deceased patients and immates of such institutions.

The Superintendent of the institutions of the department in the Borough of Brooklyn shall likewise turn over all such property to the Second Deputy Commissioner of the department, and the Superintendent of the institutions in the Borough of Richmond shall turn over the property of patients or immates of institutions in that borough to the Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults of the said borough.

When making a transfer of such property a complete list thereof shall be made in duplicate, one cupy to be retained by the Commissioner and the other signed by way of receipt and returned to the institution, and such list shall, when practicable,

be in typewriting.

3. The Superintendent shall be personally responsible for all such property while it is under care at the institution and until it is transferred to the Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner or the Superintendent, as the case may be.

4. Such property shall in no case be transferred to any other person, all such transfers being the function of the Public Administrator.

5. The Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner and the Superintendent, as hereinbefore indicated, will, as soon as practicable after the first of each month, transfer all such property, unless claimed by the department by way of reimbursement, to the Public Administrator, taking an itemized receipt in due form for such property.

(Re: Patients and Inmates of Institutions.)

Ordered, That rules and regulations with relation to patients and inmates of institutions, adopted April 5, 1902, are hereby adopted in amended form as follows:

1. In the admission of patients or inmates the names and addresses of two relatives or friends, living at different addresses if possible, shall be secured. Names and addresses of relatives or friends visiting patients or inmates shall be taken on each such visit and posted to the patient's record.

2. Heads of institutions shall in every case send notice to relatives or friends in case serious illness unexpectedly develops. This shall be done in city homes as well as in hospitals.

in hospitals.

3. In case of surgical operations the written consent of the patient, if of years of discretion and in a condition to give such consent, shall always be secured. In all cases of minors the written consent of the parent or parents shall be secured unless the visiting physician shall state in writing that it is necessary to perform such operation at once. The written statement of the visiting or attending physician to the same effect shall always be secured in case of an adult who is not in a condition to give such consent. Whenever the consent of the parent or relatives cannot be secured in advance and an emergency operation is necessary, they shall be immediately requested to call at the institution or notified that such operation has been performed.

4. In Manhattan and The Bronx all death notices shall be sent to the Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults. They shall be sent at once by telephone between the hours of g and 4, and all deaths occurring after 4 p. m. to 9 à. m. of the following morning shall be reported promptly at 9 a. m. by telephone. In all cases a written death notice with names and addresses of friends, so far as known, shall also be sent by the head of the institution to the Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults.

2. The said Property Clerk shall thereupon enter in the book kept for such purpose the name of the patient or immate, the date of his or her entry in the institution, the date on which the property is turned over and a detailed list of such property. After such entry the patient and the Property Clerk will sign their names in the place provided therefor in the said book.

3. When the patient or inmate is too ill to sign his or her name in the said book, then two witness shall sign their names instead.

4. When the patient or inmate is without property an entry to that effect will be made in the hook and the patient will sign his or her name to such statement.

5. When the patient or inmate leaves the institution, the Property Clerk shall return his or her property to the said patient or inmate, who shall acknowledge the receipt thereof in the space provided for such acknowledgment in the said book.

Ordered. That the attention of all officers and employees of the Department be

Ordered. That the attention of all officers and employees of the Department be and the same is bereby called to the following provisions of chapter 370 of the Laws of 1890, as the same has been amended, known as and constituting "the Civil Service Law," which must be strictly enforced:

"Section 23. * * * No person in the civil service of the State or of any city or civil division thereof is for that reason under any obligation to contribute to any political fund or to render any political service, and no person shall be removed or otherwise prejudiced for refusing so to do. No person in the said civil service shall discharge or ottomote or reduce, or in any manner change the official rank or compensation of any person in said service, or promise or threaten so to do for giving or withholding or neglecting to make any contribution of money or service or any other valuable thing for any political purpose. * * * "Section 24. Political Assessments Prohibited—No officer agent clerk or em-

or withholding or neglecting to make any contribution of money or service or any other valuable thing for any political purpose.

"Section 24. Political Assessments Prohibited—No officer, agent, clerk or employee under the government of the State of New York or any civil division or city thereof shall, directly or indirectly, use his authority or official influence to compel or induce any other officer, clerk, agent or employee under said government or any civil division or city thereof, to pay or promise to pay any political assessment, subscription or contribution. Every said officer, agent, clerk or employee who may have charge or control in any building, office or room occupied for any purpose of said government or any said division or city thereof, is hereby authorized to prohibit the entry of any person, and he shall not knowingly permit any person to enter the same for the purpose of therein making, collecting, receiving or giving notice of any political assessment, subscription or contribution; and no person shall enter or remain in any said office, building or room, or send or direct any letter or other writing thereto, for the purpose of giving notice of, demanding or collecting a political assessment, nor shall any person therein give notice of, demand, collect or receive any such assessment, subscription or contribution; and no person shall prepare or make out, or take any part in preparing or making out, any political assessment, subscription or contribution with the intent that the same shall be sent or presented to or collected of any officer, agent or employee, subject to the provisions of this act, under the government of the State of New York, or that of any civil division or city thereof, and no person shall knowingly send or present any political assessment, subscription or contribution to or request its payment of any said officer, agent or employee. Any person who shall be guilty of violating any provision of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor."

Furthermore, the right of

Furthermore, the right of every employee to exercise the duties of citizenship as he chooses must in every case be recognized and respected throughout the entire Department. At the same time, employees are requested to remember that it is particularly essential in a Department like this, charged with the care of thousands of sick and otherwise dependent persons, to refrain from such partisan activity as would be likely to provoke the resentment of any interest and thereby prove injurious to the Department.

(Re: Duties of Superintendents, Deputy Superintendents and Stewards of Hospitals and Institutions.)

Ordered, That the following rules and regulations governing the duties of Super-intendents, Deputy Superintendents and Stewards of hospitals and institutions of the Department of Public Charities he and they are hereby adopted, to take effect December 1, 1906:

I.-Duties of Superintendents of Hospitals and Institutions.

 The Superintendent is the chief executive officer of the hospital or institution with which he is connected, and except us otherwise provided or modified, shall be with which he is connected, and except as otherwise provided or modified, shall be responsible for and exercise general supervision and control over (a) the buildings, grounds, furniture, equipment, appurtenances, fixtures, stock, supplies and all other property of the hospital or institution; (b) the officers, Nurses and other employees; (c) all patients and immates of the hospital or institution. He shall make monthly requisition on the Commissioner, in accordance with the provisions of section 679 of the Greater New York Charter and the rules and regulations of the department, for all articles deemed necessary by the said officer to be used in the respective institutions under his charge, and shall keep an accurate record of the same.

2. The Superintendent shall reside in the hospital or institution, or in an adjacent building on the grounds thereof. His hours of active duty shall be from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., with an hour's intermission for luncheon, and he shall be on duty at such other times as may be necessary in case of emergency. He shall not be absent from duty during these hours without the consent of the Commissioner in writing. The Superintendent is required to sleep at the hospital or institution, or in an adjacent building on the grounds thereof, unless absent on leave with the consent, in writing, of the Commissioner, in order to be prepared to take charge of the hospital or institution in case of fire or other emergency.

of the Commissioner, in order to be prepared to take charge of the hospital or institution in case of fire or other emergency.

3. Whenever the Superintendent leaves the hospital or institution, whether by day or by night, he shall notify the Deputy Superintendent in writing of such contemplated absence, at the same time stating its probable duration, but he and the Deputy Superintendent shall not be absent at the same time, and a record in their own handwriting, showing their attendance and absence, shall be kept at the office of the hospital or institution in a book provided for that purpose.

4. The Superintendent, and in his absence the Deputy Superintendent, shall enforce the rules and regulations established by the Commissioner for the government of the hospital or institution. If any person employed in such hospital or institution shall disregard the rules and regulations, or otherwise misbehave, it shall be the duty of the Superintendent to report the offender in writing to the Commissioner, with such recommendation as may be deemed wise. If such offender is a house physician or a house surgeon, or one of their assistants, he shall also be reported to the Committee of Inspection, and the Superintendent may suspend such offender until action can be taken by the proper authorities. If such offender be a member of the nursing force of a hospital or institution with a training school for Nurses or attendants, he or she shall also be reported to the Superintendent of such school, and the Superintendent of the hospital or institution may also suspend such offender until action can be taken by the proper authorities.

Nurses or attendants, he or she shall also be reported to the Superintendent of such school, and the Superintendent of the hospital or institution may also suspend such offender until action can be taken by the proper authorities.

3. The Superintendent, or at his request the Deputy Superintendent, shall visit every ward and department of the hospital or institution at least once a day, and shall note the quality and quantity of food and other supplies furnished, the cleanliness, ventilation and general sanitary condition of the ward or building, the care of the patients, and any repairs, changes or other matters requiring his attention. He shall also visit the kitchens from time to time to see that the food is properly prepared, cooked and served, and that a sufficient quantity is provided for all patients or inmates, as well as for all officers and employees.

6. The Superintendent shall bring promptly to the attention of the responsible heads of the several departments of the bospital or institution, in writing, with a request for their action, anything requiring action on the part of such officer or employee, which it shall be the duty of the Superintendent to see is taken promptly. Matters pertaining to the medical administration of the institution shall also be brought to the attention of the Committee of Inspection.

7. The Superintendent shall receive at least once a week, on the forms provided for that purpose, reports from the various heads of the aliministrative departments of the hospital or institution regarding their work, and shall keep the same on file. In case of emergency such reports shall be made at once.

8. The Superintendent shall see that all officers and employees of the administrative departments of the hospital or institution are properly instructed as to their luties, particularly in the case of fire or other emergency, and shall see that such duties are negarity discharged by them.

istrative departments of the hospital or institution are properly instructed as to their luties, particularly in the case of fire or other emergency, and shall see that such duties are properly discharged by them.

9. The Superintendent is particularly charged with the duty of seeing that all the apparatus, hose and other equipment of the hospital or institution designed for use in case of fire is inspected and tested weekly, and that all employees are required to take part in a fire drill at least once a week and are familiar with the use of such apparatus and equipment, as well as with the proper method of escape from the building by outside fire-escape or otherwise, in the event of fire or other disaster.

10. The Superintendent shall familiarize himself with the rules and regulations of the Board of Health which are applicable to the hospital or institution of which he is the head, and shall see that such rules and regulations are at all times strictly observed.

steered.

11. The Superintendent of every hospital and institution of the department shall also familiarize himself with and shall carefully respect and observe the provisions of the Poor Law (chapter 225 of the Laws of 1806) and State Charities Law (chapter 546 of the Laws of 1806), providing for the visitation of public institutions of charity by the State Board of Charities and the State Charities Aid Association. He shall allow the representatives of such bodies free access to all parts of the hospital or institution, and shall furnish and freely permit them to secure from employees or otherwise such information with respect to the administration of the hospital or institution as they may desire, in accordance with the provisions of law.

12. The Superintendent shall sign all requisitions for supplies, which he shall carefully examine for the purpose of seeing that they are proper in form, quantity and otherwise, and he shall also see that they are obtained as promptly as possible. He shall also sign all bills, discharges and passes.

13. It shall be the special duty of the Superintendent to prevent the misuse as well as the improper and inequitable distribution of supplies, and particularly of the wines and liquors provided for the use of patients. He shall take care that no wines or liquors are furnished for the use of patients. He shall take care that no wines or liquors are furnished for the use of patients, except by direction of the Attending or the House Physicians or Surgeons.

14. The Superintendent shall receive, classify, transfer and discharge all patients in accordance with the rules and regulations of the medical department of the hospital accordance with the rules and regulations of the medical department of the hospital

in accordance with the rules and regulations of the medical department of the hospital

or institution.

15. When an inmate is discharged the Superintendent shall enter his name in a book provided for that purpose, stating in the case of a patient his disease and whether he was cured, improved or incurable, and in the case of an inmate whether he cloped or was disorderly, with the date of the discharge and the name of the person to whom or of the institution to which the patient or inmate is surrendered or transferred.

16. The Superintendent shall promptly notify the nearest relatives or friends of patients or inmates who are dangerously ill. On the decease of a patient or inmate the Superintendent shall cause the name, time of death and the name of the attending physician or surgeon to be entered in the register, and the body of the patient or the inmate to be taken to the dead house and there safely kept until transferred to the Morgue. The Superintendent shall immediately notify the Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults by telephone, and also in writing, of such death and of the names and addresses of the persons to be notified in accordance with the rules and regulations of the department,

17. The Superintendent shall see that certificates are duly and promptly executed in cases of death, except Coroner's cases, and shall have duplicate certificates furnished

without cost to relatives or others interested when the same are properly requested. In Coroner's cases it shall be the duty of the Superintendent to notify the Coroner's office immediately.

18. The Superintendent shall see that accident and all supposed insane or other dangerous cases receive prompt attention. He shall report forthwith to the Commissioner any accident, casualties or other unusual occurrences,

19. Whenever a patient or inmate is desirous of conversing with any spiritual adviser the Superintendent shall see that such person is promptly notified of the re-

quest.

20. The Superintendent shall take prompt action on all requests or complaints that are brought to his attention, and shall communicate in writing to those properly concerned a report of the action taken by him with respect to such requests or com-

21. The Superintendent shall see that boats or carriages placed at his service for business purposes are not put to any other use or purpose. The small boats in service at the island hospitals and institutions are intended for the use of attending

- service at the island hospitals and institutions are intended for the use of attending and house physicians in emergencies when the ferryboats are not running, and are expected to be restricted as closely as possible to this use.

 22. The Superintendent shall conduct the correspondence of the hospital or institution of which he is the executive head in accordance with the instructions of the Commissioner and the rules and regulations of the Department. or to sleep in any part of the hospital or institution, except by permission of the Commissioner.

30. The Superintendent shall be held responsible for all moneys, valuables or other property found in the possession of patients, and shall see that all such moneys, valuables and other property are carefully safeguarded and disposed of strictly in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Department.

31. These rules shall apply to the Deputy Superintendent whenever he is acting in the place of the Superintendent during the latter's absence from duty.

II.—Duties of Deputy Superintendents of Hospitals and Institutions.

1. The Deputy Superintendent is the assistant executive officer of the hospital or institution with which he is connected, and in the absence of the Superintendent he shall perform all the duties and possess the powers and responsibilities of that office. Except as otherwise provided, he shall be responsible, under the direction of the Superintendent, for the assignment and oversight of the male employees, and for such other matters as shall be devolved upon him by the Superintendent. He shall be the statement of the statement of the shall be devolved upon him by the Superintendent. see that the employees are punctual in their attendance, that they perform their duties efficiently and in a courteous manner, and that they are properly uniformed and at all times present a neat, clean and respectable appearance. He shall promptly report to the Superintendent any dereliction of duty or misbehavior on the part of any employee.

employee.

2. The Deputy Superintendent shall reside and sleep in the hospital or institution or in an adjacent building upon the grounds thereof, in rooms assigned to him by the Superintendent, with the approval of the Commissioner. His hours of active duty shall be from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m, with an hour's intermission for luncheon, and he shall be on duty at such other times as may be necessary in case of emergency. He shall not be absent from duty during these hours without the consent in writing of the Superintendent. The Deputy Superintendent shall not be absent from the hospital or institution at the same time as the Superintendent, and a record in his own handwriting, showing his attendance and absence shall be kept in the office of the hospital or institution in a book provided for that purpose.

3. On the morning of each working day he shall make a written report to the, Superintendent showing where the workmen are placed and the nature of their work,

Superintendent showing where the working day he shall make a written report to the, which report shall be placed on file in the office of the hospital or institution.

4. He shall keep in the office a book known as "the repair book," in which officers and employees shall enter a memorandum of all repairs needed; he shall consult the same daily, and shall see that such repairs as are needed are made promptly. He shall compile the quarterly labor report, and such other reports of the work under his jurisdiction as the Superintendent may require.

He shall see that the buildings are kept in good repair and painted as often

as may be necessary.

6. He shall see that the grounds are laid out and beautified with trees, shrub-

6. He shall see that the grounds are laid out and beautified with trees, shrubbery and flower beds; that the grass is mowed and the lawns, roads and grounds are kept in good order and free from litter.

7. He shall exercise careful supervision of the farm and vegetable gardens, where such exist at the hospital or institution, and shall see that the crops are properly planted, cared for, harvested and distributed; that the stock, if any, is given proper care and food, and that the farm is economically managed. Special care shall be exercised to retain only such stock as will yield profitable returns for its care and feeding.

8. In the absence of the Steward, or in case of a vacancy in such position, the Deputy Superintendent shall, unless otherwise provided, perform all the duties pertaining to such position.

taining to such position.

III.-Duties of Stewards of Hospitals and Institutions.

1. The Steward is responsible, under the Superintendent, for the receipt, care, landling and distribution of all food, clothing, furniture and ward supplies. He shall check, weigh and carefully examine all articles received by him, keeping an account of them in his receipt book, and shall certify the invoices as correct in quantity and quality where such is the case. He shall issue supplies only on the written order of the Superintendent, and shall keep such orders on file.

2. He shall promptly reject any deficient, had or false article, making a written report thereon to be forwarded to the Superintendent for transmittal to the Commissioner.

On the first of January and on the first of July he shall make an inventory in duplicate, on the forms provided for that purpose, of all supplies, stock, furniture tools and other movable property, one copy to be sent to the Commissioner through the Superintendent, and one to be preserved on file in the hospital or institution.
6. The Steward shall have charge of the storeroom, and shall see that the same is kept clean and well arranged, and that the supplies are properly and conveniently shelved or otherwise stored. The storeroom shall be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. The Steward shall be on duty from 7 a. m., or as much earlier as may be necessary to receive goods, and especially meats and other perishable articles in person, until 5 p. m.

7. He shall fill without delay all orders issued by the Superintendent for food, clothing or other supplies. If the articles required to fill any requisition are not on hand he shall report the fact to the Superintendent at once.

8. In the absence of the Deputy Superintendent, or in case of a vacancy in such position, the Steward shall perform all the duties pertaining to that office, unless some other employee is detailed to such duty.

(Re: Powers and Duties of the Commissioner of Public Charities, under the Provisions of the Greater New York Charter and the General Poor Law, Chapter 225 of the Laws of 1896.)

Ordered, That for purposes of record and publication the following definition and interpretation of the powers and duties of the Commissioner of Public Charities be and the same is hereby adopted and placed in the files of the Department as General

and the same is hereby adopted and placed in the files of the Department as General Order No. 49.

The duties of the Commissioner of Public Charities, who is the head of the Department of Public Charities, as provided in section 658 of the Greater New York Charter, are such as are specifically set forth in the provisions of said charter, and particularly in sections 658 to 691 thereof, inclusive, and in sections 1543 and 1544, as well as in the provisions of the General Poor Law, the same being chapter 225 of the Laws of 1806, with amendments, and in other general and special laws and ordinances amplicable thereto.

applicable thereto.

1. (Section 659.) The Commissioner has power to establish general rules and regulations for the administration of the Department and the government of the in-

2. The Commissioner has power to appoint, and in his discretion to remove, not more than two deputies, to be known as First Deputy and Second Deputy, and is required to define their duties.

3. The Commissioner, within the limit of his apprepriation, has power to appoint and remove, subject to the requirements of the Civil Service Laws, such subordinate officers and assistants as may be necessary for the efficient performance of his duties as Commissioner.

as Commissioner.
4. (Section 660.) The Commissioner has jurisdiction over and is required to take charge of and to establish and enforce rules and regulations for all institutions

take charge of and to establish and enforce rules and regulations for all institutions within the jurisdiction of the Department.

5. (Section 66t.) The Commissioner is required to certify that children supported in private institutions at public expense have been received and retained therein pursuant to rules and regulations established by the State Board of Charities.

6. The Commissioner has all the authority concerning the care, custody and disposition of insate, feeble-minded, sick, infirm and destitute persons heretofore conferred on the Board of Public Charities and upon the several Commissioners of Public Charities, and is subject to the same obligations and duties except as modified by the charter.

charters, and is subject to the same obligations and duties except as modified by the charter.

7. The Commissioner is the Overseer of the Poor of the City. As such, he is governed by the provisions of the Poor Law with relation to Overseers of the Poor.

8. The Commissioner has no power to dispense any form of autdoor relief except as provided in the chapter of the charter relating to the Department, but has power to pay the cost of the removal or transportation of any person who may come under his charge whenever, in his judgement, the City will be relieved from an unnecessary or improve charge.

or improper charge.

9. The Commissioner is required to make provision for the temporary care of vagrant and indigent persons and to provide for an investigation into their circumstances, causing vagrants to be brought before a magistrate pursuant to law.

10. (Section 663.) The Commissioner is required to investigate the circumstances

of persons admitted to an institution under his charge and of the near relatives of such persons.

11. The Commissioner is required to cause all inmates of the institutions of the

Department to be classified.

12. The Commissioner is empowered to establish schools or classes for the in-

12. The Commissioner is empowered to establish schools or classes for the instruction of inmates.

13. (Section 664.) The Commissioner has power to commit, to indenture, place out, discharge, or transfer children in his custody or placed by him in an institution as a public charge, whenever in his judgment it shall be for the best interests of the child so to do.

14. The Commissioner may employ any duly incorporated charitable institution or society, and may reimburse such institution or society for any expenses, other than salaries, actually incurred in the placing out, supervision and transfer if necessary of children who are public charges.

salaries, actually incurred in the placing out, supervision and transfer if necessary of children who are public charges.

15. The Commissioner has powers with relation to minors committed or otherwise placed under his charge as were on the first day of January, 1898, vested by law in the corresponding officers of the cities of New York and Brooklyn and the counties of Kings, Richmond and Queens, mentioned in section 662.

16. The Commissioner cannot commit children to any institution which shall have been certified by the State Board of Charities to have failed to comply with the rules and regulations of such Board, nor to any institution outside The City of New York, unless such institution shall have been certified by said Board to be properly protected from fire and other dangers.

from fire and other dangers.

17. (Section 665.) The Commissioner may appear, either by clerk or counsel, on all hearings or proceedings for the commitment of children. He is required to investigate the circumstances of their relatives, whose duty it is to relieve and maintain them, and to file with the court or magistrate a statement in writing of such fact or facts as, in the opinion of the Commissioner, render it proper or improper that such child should be supported as a public charge.

18. (Section 669.) The Commissioner is required to keep and preserve a proper record of all persons who shall come under his care or custody and of the disposition made of such nersons, together with copies of any instrument of indenture or agree-

record of all persons who shall come under his care or custody and of the disposition made of such persons, together with copies of any instrument of indenture or agreement executed by him. He is also required to keep and preserve such records of all persons who are inmates of private institutions who are accepted by him as proper charges upon the City.

19. (Section 671.) The Commissioner is required to provide and maintain as may be necessary, suitable rooms or wards for the reception, medical examination and temporary care of persons alleged to be insane, for the boroughs other than Manhattan and The Bronx.

20. (Section 672.) The Commissioner has power, provided an appropriation has

20. (Section 672.) The Commissioner has power, provided an appropriation has been made therefor, to enlarge or alter the buildings occupied by the institutions of the Department, and to make all needful repairs to buildings and property under his control

21. (Section 673.) The Commissioner has charge of the Potters' Field and has power to lay out additional Potters Fields or other public burial places for the poor or strangers. The Commissioner is empowered to cremate hodies of deceased pagers.

where relatives do not object to such cremation.

22 (Section 674.) The Commissioner is required to keep accurate and detailed accounts in a form approved by the Comptroller of all moneys received and expended by him, the sources from which they are received and the purposes for which they

are expended. The Commissioner is required, on or before the first day of September in each year, to prepare an itemized estimate of his necessary expenses for the ensuing fiscal year, to be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The Commissioner is prohibited from incurring any expense for any purpose in excess of the amount appropriated therefor, and from expending any money for any purpose other

than that for which it was appropriated, 23. (Section 675.) The Commissioner is required to advertise in the Cirv Recomo and the corporation newspapers for not less than ten days for proposals for such articles and supplies as shall be necessary to be used in and for the relief and support of the poor of the City, and which cannot be supplied by the Department or the Department of Correction, and to award contracts for the same to the lowest bidder, who shall give adequate security for the faithful performance of such con-

24. The Commissioner is empowered, in case of an emergency or in the purchase of perishable articles, to purchase without calling for competition at a total expense not excreding three thousand dollars a month, but is required to enter in a book a detailed statement of the facts which rendered purchase by contract impracticable.

25. (Section 676.) The Commissioner is authorized and empowered to insert in his annual estimate an item for the relief of the poor, adult, blind, not to exceed seventy-five thousand dollars and to distribute the sum so appropriated each year in uniform sums not to exceed one hundred dollars to any one person.

26. (Section 677.) The Commissioner is empowered to request the Department.

26. (Section 677.) The Commissioner is empowered to request the Department of Correction to detail inmates of the correctional institutions to perform necessary work, labor and services in and upon the grounds and buildings which are under his

charge.

27. (Section 678.) The Commissioner is authorized to permit the reception and treatment of non-residents in hospitals under his jurisdiction, provided they shall pay such sum for board and attendance as may be fixed by the Commissioner and that they shall not be received to the exclusion of patients who reside in New York. The Commissioner is required to collect and pay over such moneys to the Chamberlain once every mouth and to report the same to the Comptroller of the City.

28. (Section 679.) The Commissioner is required to receive and pass upon requisitions from the superintendents of institutions under his charge.

29. (Section 680.) The Commissioner is required to receive weekly reports from the superintendents of institutions under his charge.

30. (Section 682.) The Commissioner is required to fix the hours of labor required of inniates of the institutions of the Department, and is empowered to direct the punishment of those who violate the rules and regulations. The Commissioner is empowered to cause delinquent inmates to be brought before the court for commitment to the Workhouse or the Penitentiary as a disorderly person.

31. (Section 683.) The Commissioner is empowered to approve the manner in which dependent persons are supported by relatives legally chargeable with their care.

mitment to the Workhouse or the Lements, and the approve the manner in which dependent persons are supported by relatives legally chargeable with their care, and may apply to the court in case the relatives of a poor person fail to maintain and relieve him as provided.

32. (Section 684.) All bastardy proceedings are to be conducted by and in the name of the Commissioner, and the amount collected is to be paid to bim and be by him applied to the care of the child or of the child and its mother, and is to be accounted for by him in a manner to be approved by the Comptroller. The Commissioner is authorized to compromise bastardy and abandonment cases,

33. (Section 685). The Commissioner is authorized to receive moneys in abandonment cases.

34. (Section 687.) The Commissioner is empowered to institute proceedings upon any bond or recognizance given in abandonment proceedings and any moneys recovered in any suit, action or proceeding, is to be paid to the Commissioner and to be by him applied and expended for the support of the wife and children for whom provision is thereby made. Undertakings are for the inture appearance of the defendant or for the ball to pay to the Commissioner a specified sum in the event of his failure to (Section 687.) The Commissioner is empowered to institute proceedings upon

35. (Section 688.) In the name of the Commissioner an action may be brought when such an undertaking is forfeited to recover the amount specified therein, which shall be applied and expended for the support of the wife and children or either or any of them of the person charged with the offense. Said money shall be paid to the Commissioner by the person with whom it is deposited upon presenting to him a certificate from the City Magistrate certifying to the forfeiture thereof.

36. (Section 689.) The Commissioner is to be served with notice of appeal taken by the defendant, and may appear by Clerk or Counsel upon the hearing of such appeal. The Commissioner is authorized to take an appeal to the Court of General Sessions. Such appeals are to be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

37. (Section 690.) Upon proof by affidavit of the Commissioner that he is unable to serve a summons upon a surely in an action brought for a default in the terms of the bond, or that the same cannot be satisfied, the Magistrate may issue a warrant for the arrest of the defendant and require him to give security or he committed under the original order and conviction. (Section 688.) In the name of the Commissioner an action may be brought

38. (Section 691.) The Commissioner may apply to the Court for a warrant for the arrest of the defendant in bastardy proceedings where a recovery cannot be had on an undertaking, or where the original undertaking shall have been complied with, or if money deposited in lieu of bail is exhausted and the bastard still needs support, and the court shall make an order for a new undertaking, or shall commit him, as provided by the Code of Criminal Procedure.

39. (Section 1544.) The Commissioner is required to render quarterly, annual and other reports, as may be required, to the Mayor with relation to the work of the Department.

40. Except as the same are modified by the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner, as Overseer of the Poor of The City of New York, is governed by the requirements of the General Poor Law of the State, chapter 225, of the Laws of 1895, with relation to the care of poor persons.

While it is apparent that the carrying out of the details of the work devolved upon the Commissioner must for the most part be delegated to various officers and employees, the more important duties particularly assigned to the Commissioner personally are the following:

(a) The establishment of general rules and regulations for the administration

of the Department and the government of the institutions under its jurisdiction.

(b) The appointment of two Deputies and the defining of their duties.

(c) The appointment and removal of subordinate employees and assistants.

(d) The approval of requisitions for supplies which the heads of the institutions

of the Department are required to submit in accordance with the provisions of section 679 of the Greater New York Charter.

(e) The compromise of bastardy and abondonment cases.

General Order No. 50.

(Re: Provisions of the Sanitary Code of the Board of Health of The City of New York.)

By request of the Board of Health of this City,

Ordered, That attention be and it is hereby called to the following provisions of the Sanitary Code of the City (a copy of which is sent to you herewith), with relation to infectious diseases, which must be catefully observed by officers and employees of this Department:

"Section 133. It shall be the duty of every physician to report to the Department of Health, in writing, the full name, age and address of every person suffering from any one of the infectious diseases included in the list appended, with the name of the disease, within twenty-four hours of the time when the case is first seen:

"A. Contagious (very readity communicable): measles, rubella (rothen), scarlet fever, small-pox, varicella (chicken-pox), typhus fever, relapsing fever.

"B. Communicable: Diphtheria (croup), typhoid fever, Asiatic cholera, tuberculosis (of any organ), plague, tetanus, anthrax, glanders, epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, leprosy, infectious diseases of the eye (trachoma, suppurative conjunctivitis), puerperal septicemia, erysipelas, whooping cough.

"C. Indirectly communicable (through intermediary host): Yellow fever, malarial fever.

rial fever.

"Section 134. It shall be the duty of the Commissioners or managers or the Principal, Superintendent or Physician of each and every public institution or dispensary in this City to report to the Department of Health, in writing, the full name, age and address of any person suffering from any one of the infectious diseases included in the list appended, with the name of the disease, within twenty-four hours of the time when the case is first seen:

"A. Communicable: Influenza, lobar pneumonia, broncho-pneumonia, infectious diseases of the gastro-intestinal canal (dysentery, cholera morbus, cholera infantum, summer distribueas of infants).

"B. Parasitic Diseases of the Skin: Scabics, tinea tonsurans, impetigo (conta-

summer diarrhoeas of infants).

"B. Parasitic Diseases of the Skin: Scabies, tinea tonsurans, impetigo (contagious), favus.

"Section 135. It shall be the duty of every physician to report forthwith, in writing, to the Department of Health, the death of every person who dise from, or while suffering with any infectious disease, and to state in such report the specific name and type of such disease.

"Section 138. It shall be the duty of the Commissioners or managers, or the Principal, Superintendent or Physician of each and every public and private institution or dispensary in this City to report to the Department of Health, in writing, or to cause such report to be made by some proper and competent person, the name, age, sex, occupation and latest address of every person afflicted with tuberculosis, who is in their care or who has come under their observation, within one week of such time. It shall be the duty of every person sick with this disease and of every person in attendance upon any one sick with this disease, and of the authorities of public or private institutions or dispensaries, to observe and inforce all the sanitary rules and regulations of the Board of Health for preventing the spread of pulmonary tuberculosis.

"Section 139. Whenever an Inspector of this Department shall report in writing that any person is sick of any infectious disease, under such circumstances that the continuance of such person in the place where he or she may be is dangerous to the lives of other persons residing in the neighborhood, the Santary Superintendent, an Assistant Sanitary Superintendent or the Chief Inspector of the Division of Contagious Diseases, upon the report of the Medical Inspector of the Department, may cause the removal of such sick person to one of the hospitals under the charge of this Department or to a hospital delegated by the Board of Health.

"Section 140. In every public hospital or dispensary in The City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms for the temporary isolation of persons suffering from any of the following infectious diseases, measles, diphtheria (croup), scarlet fever, small-pox, chicken-pox, epidemic cholera, typhus fever, rubella (rötheln), plague and whooping cough; and such persons shall immediately be separated from other persons at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the Physician or Physicians, and of the officers and managers of every hospital or dispensary to cause a report to be immediately made to the Department of Health of The City of New York of every person afflicted with any one of the infectious diseases herein specified who comes to their knowledge, and to have such persons properly isolated from other persons. properly isolated from other persons.

"Section 143. No person shall within this city, without a permit from the Board of Health, carry, remove or cause, or permit to be carried or removed, any person sick with any infections disease, or remove or cause to be removed any such person from any building or vessel to any other building or vessel or to the shore, or to or from any vehicle in any part of the city. Nor shall any person, by any exposure of any individual sick of any infectious disease, or of the body of such person, or by an negligent act connected therewith, or in respect of the care or custody thereof, or by a needless exposure of himself, cause or contribute to or promote the spread of disease from any such person or from any dead body.

Attention is particularly called to the foregoing provisions of the Sanitary Code which call for reports to the Board of Health; for the isolation of patients having infectious diseases, and prohibit the removal of patients having such diseases without a permit from the Board of Health.

Reports in writing are to be made to the undersigned with reference to any fur-ther equipment or supplies that may be necessary to carry out these requirements of the Sanitary Code which it will be the purpose of this department at all times to enforce.

3. The First Deputy Commissioner shall inspect the institutions, departments and bureaus and properties of the department in the Borough's of Manhattan. The Bronx and Richmond at least monthly, and shall see that the provisions of law and the rules and regulations governing the same are carefully observed

4. The First Deputy Commissioner shall promptly bring to the attention of the Commissioner in writing the facts with regard to any evil, defect or abuse in the work of the department, or of any employee thereof, that may come under his notice, with his recommendations for remedying the same. In pursuance of these duties he shall give special attention to the food and other supplies of the department and to the punctuality, deportment and industry of all employees in the boroughs named. He is authorized and empowered to bring charges against any such employee who fails to observe any of the rules and regulations of the department, and to suspend from duty any such employee pending the result of such charges.

5. The First Deputy shall pass upon all requisitions for supplies and repairs in the boroughs hereinbefore specified, in accordance with the rules and regulations of the department governing requisitions.

6. Special duties shall from time to time be devolved upon the First Deputy as circumstances may require.

The Second Deputy Commissioner shall inspect the institutions, departments, bureaus and properties of the department in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens at least monthly, and shall see that the provisions of law and the rules and regulations of the department governing them are carefully observed.

4. The Second Deputy Commissioner shall promptly bring to the attention of the Commissioner in writing the lacts with regard to any evil, defect or abuse in the work of the department, or of any employee thereof, that may come under his notice, with his recommendations for remedying the same. In pursuance of these duties he shall give special attention to the food and other supplies of the department and to the punctuality, deportment and industry of all employees in the boroughs named. He is authorized and empowered to bring charges against any such employee who fails to observe any of the rules and regulations of the department, and to suspend from duty any such employee pending the result of such charges.

5. The Second Deputy shall pass upon all requisitions for supplies and repairs in the boroughs hereinbefore specified, in accordance with the rules and regulations of the department governing requisitions.

6. Special duties shall from time to time be devolved upon the Second Deputy as circumstances may require.

Ordered, That the following rules and regulations with respect to general, special and other requisitions be and they are hereby adopted, covering all boroughs and institutions, in conformity with the provisions of section 679 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"Each Superintendent. Warden or chief officer of every institution under the charge of the Commissioner shall make his requisition in writing on the Commissioner for all articles deemed necessary by the said officers to be used in the respective institutions under his charge, and shall keep an accurate account of the same."

1. Requisitions shall be known as "General Requisitions," "Special Requisitions," "Engineers' Requisitions are to be made on the forms furnished by the department for that purpose, and are to be fully and accurately made out. In accordance with the provisions of the Charter hereinbefore quotted, all such requisitions are to be made upon the Acting Commissioner, without whose written approval endorsed thereon no requisition of any kind shall be granted, nor any order based thereou issued, nor expense incurred, except in actual emergencies.

3. General requisitions are to be made on the 15th of each month for the common and ordinary maintenance supplies for the succeeding calendar month. The quantities called for on such requisitions are to be based on the assumption that the allowance for the succeeding calendar month will be received on the first or the second of such month. The officer in charge of the storehouse of the borough from which such estimate comes will indicate by a blue check mark such items as are neither in stock nor under contract, and where practicable by alteration in black lead such items payable from stock or from the proceeds of contracts as seem to be in excess of the monthly pro rata quantities allowed to the related institutions upon yearly estimate allowed or contract entered into by the Commissioner.

Each institution, family or household drawing supplies will be required to submit a separate estimate for such supplies, which, as approved, will be paid directly from the appropriate storehouse of the department.

The requisition is then to be submitted to the Dictitian to pass upon, in conformity to the established dictary, and finally to the respective Deputy Commissioner for his approval, so that it may be submitted to the Commissioner on before the 20th of the month preceding that to which the requisition relates.

4. The general requisition should include everything involving expense for ordina

propriate column.

carefully estimated and the amounts set down in pencil and duly footed up in an appropriate column.

Care must be taken not to submit on any general requisition items which are proper for special or other requisitions, as such error will be likely to delay action.

5. Special requisitions are to be issued under the following circumstances, and, so far as practicable, are to follow the routine for general requisitions:

A. When the call is for unusual articles or things or for unusual quantities, involving the expenditure of considerable sums, or for any reason requiring special attention from the Commissioner or the Acting Commissioner.

B. When the call is really an urgent one, upon the prompt consideration of which any matter of importance depends.

C. When the expense is to be met from some special appropriation.

Except in cases of actual emergency, or where haste is really important, such requisitions shall be limited to the first and the fifteenth of each calendar month.

6. Engineer's requisitions are to be made on the 15th of each month for the succeeding month and are to have, in addition to the approval of the Superintendent and the Deputy Commissioner, the written approval of the Supervising Engineer, before submission to the Commissioner for his action. All items that properly belong to the Engineer's Department are to be separated from the general and the special requisitions, and any advertisements necessary for the same are to be prepared by the Supervising Engineer and to be included in regular calls for that class of supplies.

7. Medical and surgical requisitions are also to be made on the 15th of each month for the succeeding month, and are to have, in addition to the approval of the Superintendent and the Chairman of the Commissioner, the written approval of the Pharmacist in charge of the General Drug Department, before submission to the Commissioner for his action.

8. Every requisition for an item of supplies or repairs for a new article or for

8. Every requisition for an item of supplies or repairs for a new article or for one seldom furnished, or for an increase in the amounts of any article regularly furnished, as well as for any other item or article naturally calling for special consideration on the part of the Commissioner, or in his absence of the Acting Commissioner, shall be accompanied by a memorandum letter addressed to the Commissioner clearly explaining the need of such article, which shall be attached to such requisition. All requisitions for articles not heretofore furnished or for articles seldom furnished, the estimated cost of which is in excess of fifty dollars, should be submitted on the special requisition blank.

furnished, the estimated cost of which is in excess of fifty dollars, should be submitted on the special requisition blank.

Every requisition, whether general or special, for any article for which there is urgent and immediate need, shall be accompanied by a letter addressed to the Commissioner, setting forth the occasion and nature of the emergency. All requisitions are filled as far as possible from outstanding contracts. Requisitions for articles for which there are no outstanding contracts will be filled by advertising and awarding new contracts whenever practicable, as the Department is limited in the amount of its open market purchases. Heads of institutions, in sending in requisitions, should indicate any article not included in existing contracts, in regard to which the delay occasioned by advertisement and execution of a new contract would occasion hardship to such institution. Heads of institutions will be held responsible for such hardships unless the emergency character of the requisition is indicated when the requisition is submitted.

g. All requisitions are to be made in triplicate, of which two copies are to be transmitted in due form as herein provided for the approval of the Commissioner, and the third copy retained on file at the institution in the binder provided for that

10. Whenever any requisition shall have been approved by the Commissioner or the Acting Commissioner, the alterations which shall have been made will be copied

by the General Storekeeper upon the duplicate form. This will then be returned to the officer issuing it, who will take note of the changes and forward the document to the borough storehouse, there to be retained on file in the binder provided for such purpose, special requisitions following general requisitions in order of date.

Such officer will then issue distribution orders to the appropriate storehouse, based upon but not in excess of such approved requisition, and the person in charge of such storehouse shall fill them. The Purchasing Agent will proceed to buy such articles as may be indicated for purchase and to secure from the City Record such supplies as are procurable therefrom without cost to the Department.

11. Heads of institutions, in making requisition for any particular article shall farward a full description of such article, and where possible shall refer to the catalogue, page and number, for the purpose of identification, as for example: "One oak table, length, height, width and thickness of top of same. States Prison Catalogue, page." page.

12. Heads of institutions are warned against calling upon the storehouse for supplies which are not on duly approved requisition, altering requisitions after they have been submitted, and making special requisitions for things that should be on general requisitions, except in an emergency.

13. Heads of institutions in making requisitions for supplies shall confine themselves to such requisition, and if any item is not received, it shall be their duty to write to the Commissioner with relation thereto, at the same time giving the date and number of the requisition referred to and the folio and line numbers of the items, and not to place the item or items on another requisition unless so authorized by the Commissioner or the Acting Commissioner in writing.

14. Every bill, invoice, credit voucher or other evidence of acquisition or transfer of value, relating to any institution, shall be entered on the record thus made at the institution, Borough Storehouse and Bureau of Supplies on the line or lines whereon is expressed the call for the related article or articles, and no bill or invoice shall be certified until it shall have been so entered. Heads of institutions and others whose duty it is to certify to the correctness of bills are enjoined to make certain that the article or service furnished is in all respects in conformity with such bills and the specifications, if any, upon which the order for such article or service was based, and the total shall be added and the footings carried forward from sheet to sheet and from "General" to "Special" month by month until the end of the year.

15. Officers in charge of storehouses will at all times see that a sufficient and not excessive stock of all non-perishable goods under contract, or procured from the Stare or County Prisous pursuant to law, shall be maintained at all times to the end that all duly authorized calls thereon, may be paid promptly on the first business day

arrival, with the name of the boat and the quantity of coal on board, must be sent at once to the storehouse.

7. All requisitions other than calls upon the General Drug Department and the weekly requisitions for daily supplies of meats, fish, poultry, bread and rolls, must pass through the related Borough Storehouse. The exceptions must be sent, in one case to the Acting Chemist, and in the other, in the Borough of Manhattan, to the General Storekeeper, and in the Borough of Brooklyn to the Storekeeper, which officers shall preceed to order in such supplies as are thereon granted. 19. Requisitions by the Superintendent upon the Steward for issuing supplies shall be in the form of requisition books provided by the Department for such purpose, one of which shall be kept in each ward, and one for each afficer's family or other group of persons to and for whom sumplies are issued. The nurse or other person with whom the requisition originates shall enter in the requisition book so provided, a detailed statement of the articles and supplies needed, so far as practicable a separate page being used for each day, the date being indicated and the requisition signed by the said nurse or other person with whom it originates.

In institutions in which there are training schools for nurses, the requisition shall be signed by the Superintendent of the school before being submitted to the Superintendent of the hospital or institution for his approval.

20. Except as otherwise provided, every Steward, druggist or other person issuing supplies shall enter in a set of books, one for each ward and for each officer's family or other group of persons to or for whom supplies are issued, to be kept by him in his office for that purpose, a duplicate statement of the articles and supplies furnished on each such requisition, stating the amount of each article furnished and the date, and shall require thereto the signature of the person actually receiving from him such articles or supplies.

1. The Dictitian of the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools is responsible to the Superintendent for the work of all Cooks, Waitresses and other helpers employed in the Dietary Department. She must assign their work, supervise its execution, criticise the condition of their workrooms, uniforms, personal appearance and conduct while on duty, arrange for their off-duty time, instruct them when needlal, and make any recommendations concerning them to the Superintendent.

2. She shall inspect daily the condition of the dining-rooms, kitchens, cupboards, ice-boxes, ranges and all equipment of the department, and give instructions for the care of the same, having full authority to enforce her instructions.

are of the same, having full authority to enforce her instructions.

3. She shall make daily inspection of all raw and cooked food materials and see that they are properly cared for; that excess quantities are accounted for, and that only the minimum waste occurs. She shall personally see that all foods for inmates and employees of the various grades are carefully prepared and properly distributed, with minimum waste.

with minimum waste.

4. She shall visit all patients' and inmates' dining-rooms at least twice each week, observing the service of the food, the disposition of excess quantities and waste of food, making any criticism or suggestion in writing to the Superintendent.

5. The Dictitian shall be responsible to the Committee on Diet of the Medical Board for carrying out the specific dictaries approved by this committee. She shall make a note of all changes and omissions in the dictaries, with reasons therefor, and report the same in writing to the committee as often as required. The Dictitian shall prepare an authine for the lessons in dictetics to be given by her to the classes of the Training School, and she may from time to time suggest changes in it. All of which shall be submitted to the Committee on Diet for approval.

The Dictitian shall have entire charge of the pupils of the Training School during their hours of duty in the diet kitchen, planning and criticising their work. She

shall keep a record of the work done by each pupil, which shall be reported in writing

shall keep a record of the work done by each pupil, which shall be reported in writing to the Supervising Nurse.

6. She shall be responsible for carrying out the dictaries approved for the institution and shall exercise her judgment in adapting meals of all employees to the conditions existing at any time.

7. After the ward diet summaries have been approved by the Superintendent as conforming to the ward diet sheets and the physician's order, they shall be brought in the office of the Dictitian at 3 o'clock on the day preceding the one on which they are to go into effect. The Dictitian shall supervise their summary for the use of the kitchens and storetooms and shall take any criticism which she may make on any requisition to the proper source for adjustment.

8. The Dictitian shall visit employees' dining-rooms during their hour of service of meals and correct any error in service of the food she may observe. Any complaint from any source regarding the work of the dictary department shall he promptly and personally investigated by the Dictitian. The Dictitian at any time may recommend to the Superintendent the employment of, the discharge of, or the modification of compensation of any employee in her department.

9. The Dictitian shall supervise the preparation of food in the special dict kitchen, and make to the Supervising Nurse any recommendations concerning the work, equipment or the Nurses and Helpers employed there.

10. At all times the Dictitian shall see that responsibility for the work to be done is properly placed, and in case of her absence she shall designate some person in her department to act for her. She shall leave the island during duty hours only with the knowledge and approval of the Superintendent.

11. The Dictitian shall report to the Dictitian of the department any criticism regarding the condition of or amounts of supplies received; any suggestions for extraordinary repairs or improvements, and any radical changes in the number or compensation of employees, after same have received

Vacancies on the committee arising in any other way than by expiration of a member's term shall be filled by election for the unexpired term.

II. The member of the committee serving the last year of his term shall be its chairman.

III. The Committee of Inspection shall be the executive committee of the Medical Board in the execution of its rules and orders and shall exercise full supervision over all departments of the hospital. All questions involving the discipline of the house staff shall be referred to it. All business of the Medical Board with the Commissioner and with the heads of the departments of the hospital shall be carried on through it. The Chairman of the Committee of Inspection shall approve all requisitions on the Commissioner for medical and surgical supplies, and shall make such reports as the Commissioner may require in the interest of the hospital.

IV. The committee shall hold at least one meeting a month, shortly before the meeting of the Medical Board, and such others as may be called by the Chairman.

V. It shall make a written report at each meeting of all actions taken. At the annual meeting of the Medical Board this report shall contain a statement of the number of visits made by and the minimum number required of each attending physician and surgeon during the year with leaves of absence granted by the Medical Board.

The Examining Committee.

The Examining Committee.

I. The examining committee shall consist of the pathologist and four other members to be elected as follows: Following the adoption of these rules two members shall be elected to serve for two years and two to serve one year. Thereafter at each annual meeting two members shall be elected to serve two years. They shall elect their own chairman from the members serving the last year of their term.

II. This committee shall conduct all examinations for positions on the house staff, determine the time and place of same and shall recommend to the Medical Board for appointment by the Commissioner successful candidates in the order of their merit.

Attending Physicians and Surgeons.

Attending Physicians and Surgeons.

I. The attending Physicians and Surgeons shall be appointed as follows: When a vacancy occurs on any service of the hospital the President of the Medical Board shall appoint a committee, consisting, if possible, of two members of the Board representing that service and one other member, three members in all, who shall canvass the applicants and present the names and qualifications of all candidates to the Medical Board at its next regular meeting. A list of candidates to be voted on shall be sent with the call to the meeting. This list of candidates with their qualifications and a recommendation of one of them for appointment shall be sent to the Commissioner. In order to be qualified for appointment candidates for the position of Attending Physicians and Surgeons must be graduates of medicine of at least eight years and must have been identified for at least five years with that branch of medicine to which they seek appointment. seek appointment.

11. The Attending Physicians and Surgeons shall have the entire direction of the treatment of the patients, they shall also supervise the conditions of their wards, the behavior of nurses and orderlies, the nursing and the character of the food of the

behavior of nurses and orderlies, the nursing and the characters.

III They shall be required, as a minimum of their services, to visit their wards as follows: In medicine, three times a week; in surgery, three times a week; in genito-urinary surgery, three times a week; in obstetrics, twice a week; in genito-urinary surgery, three times a week; in dermatology, twice a week; in laryngology and otology, twice a week; in neurology, twice a week; in ophthalmology, twice a week.

IV. At each visit to the hospital they shall record their names in a book kept at the hospital for the purpose.

V. In case of absence for over two weeks they shall offer their service to their colleagues on the division and only if declined by them, to the assistant. In case of contemplated absence for such period they shall, in advance, notify the Chairman of the Inspection Committee of their intention and of the disposition made of their service.

VI. Failure of an Attending Physician or Surgeon to do two-thirds of his yearly duty without previous permission of the Medical Board shall be considered equivalent to resignation from the hospital. In determining the number of visits during the year no more visits per week shall be counted than the minimum prescribed in

the year no more visits per week shall be counted than the minimum prescribed in Rule 3 of this section.

VII. Transfers to other services of the hospital shall be made only upon the signature of the Attending Physicians and Surgeons. Complaints of irregularity or injustice in transfer shall be referred to the Committee of Inspection for investigation and adjudication. In case of emergency or of a contagious nature or of mistakes in the distribution of the patients by the examining officer, the Attending Physician or Surgeon may direct immediate transfer through his house physician or surgeon. All transfers shall be promptly reported to the hospital office.

VIII. It shall be the duty of the Attending Physicians and Surgeons to investigate and report in writing over their signature to the Committee of Inspection any incompetency or insubordination on the part of any member of the house staff or nurse in his wards.

Assistant Attending Physicians and Surgeons.

There shall be Assistant Attending Physicians and Surgeons as determined

by the Medical Board.

II. Candidates for appointment as Assistant Attending Physicians or Surgeons must be graduates in medicine of five years and shall be recommended to the Com-

must be graduates in medicine of five years and shall be recommended to the Commissioner for appointment by the Medical Board upon unanimous vote of the attendings on the division to which they seek appointment.

III. They shall visit the hospital as specified in Rules 2 and 3 of the previous section, when called upon to do so by the Attending Physicians and Surgeons, but they shall not be required to take charge of the service for a period of more than two weeks without previous notice of at least one month.

An Assistant Orthopedic Surgeon may be chosen by the Medical Board. He shall rank as an assistant in general surgery and shall so act when called upon. He shall also carry out mechanical orthopedic treatment on patients in any ward of the hospital when requested so to do by the Attending Physician or Surgeon.

The Pathologist,

I. The Pathologist is director of the Strecker Memorial Laboratory. He shall have entire charge and be held responsible for all apparatus, instruments and all the pathological material and shall supervise the proper preservation of the same. He shall approve all requisitions on the Commissioner for laboratory supplies, which approval in this instance only shall take that of the Chairman of the Committee of Inspection.

II. All records and specimens are the property of the institution and are open at all times to inspection and study from members of the Medical Board and the house

staff, but no record or specimen is to be removed from the laboratory without consent

staff, but no record or specimen is to be removed from the laboratory without to fit the pathologist.

III. Adequate notice of autopsies to be performed shall be sent to the attending physicians and surgeons from whose ward the case has come.

IV. In case an attending physician or surgeon is unable to be present at an autopsy, all material will be kept fresh at his request to the pathologist or one of his assistants for two days. Individual organs and tissues only shall be kept in a preservative at special request for a longer time.

V. Reports on clinical specimens are to be given promptly to attendings and the staff in a suitable form and record of such examinations are to be kept. Special chemical, microscopical or bacteriological examinations of specimens from cases in the wards shall be made at the request of the attending physician and surgeons by the assistant pathologist, when directed by the pathologist.

VI. The pathologist shall have a right to give instructions in pathology in the Strecker Memorial Laboratory, and shall have the privilege of using the material of the institution for that purpose.

institution for that purpose.

VII. He may use the Strecker Memorial Laboratory for work of his own and original research, and acknowledgment shall be made to the institution in all publications coming from it.

The Assistants in Pathology.

Assistants in pathology shall be recommended by the Medical Board to the Gommissioner for appointment or nomination by the pathologist. They shall do such duties as are assigned to them by the pathologist, who shall also determine their rank in

the laboratory.

II. In case of absence of the pathologist he shall, having notified the chairman of the Inspection Committee, designate one of his assistants to act for him.

III. They shall have standing and privileges of members of the house staff.

The House Staff.

I. There shall be appointed by the Commissioner of Public Charities, on nomina-tion of the Medical Board, as previously provided, a specified number of graduates in medicine who shall be known as the house staff.

II. Their individual duties, time of service and ranks shall be determined by the Medical Board, and at the end of satisfactory service they shall receive a diploma of graduation. Any member of the staff who fails to complete the required term of service shall not be entitled to this diploma. They shall live in hospital quarters provided for them, and shall receive in addition their board and washing, but shall not be

allowed any other emoluments, perquisites or fees whatsoever.

III. Their commission may be canceled at any time by the Commissioner at the recommendation of the Medical Board if their work should prove unsatisfactory.

IV. They shall not be engaged in any other business than that of the hospital, nor shall they practice outside of the hospital.

V. The house staff shall consist of house officers, seniors, juniors and special assistants.

V. The house staff shall consist of house officers, seniors, juniors and special assistants.

VI. The house officers shall enter upon their duty after a satisfactory service as juniors and seniors. The time of these services is to be determined by the Medical Board subject to the approval of the Commissioner. They shall select their services according to the standing determined by the entrance examination.

VII. The house officers shall have charge, under the control of their attending physician or surgeon, of their individual services and be held responsible for them.

VIII. Seniors and juniors shall act as assistants to the house officers and perform such duties as are assigned to them by him.

1X. The house officers shall, as soon as practicable after admission, see each new patient and order such treatment as may be found necessary until the arrival of the attending physician or surgeon.

the attending physician or surgeon.

X. They shall visit each and every patient in their wards at least every morning

X. They shall visit each and every patient in their wards at least every morning and evening, morning rounds to commence promptly at 9 a. m., and they shall be prepared to report the state of each patient to the attending physician or surgeon.

XI. House officers and their staff are required to accompany their respective attendings in making rounds. Seniors and juniors shall accompany the house officers on their morning rounds unless it shall become necessary to detail them to other duties, and they shall also be accompanied by the head nurse.

XII. No operation shall be performed by any member of the house staff without permission from his visiting surgeon, except in cases of emergency when delay would be attended by serious danger to the patient. In such cases the attending surgeon shall be notified in detail as soon as possible, and the house officer shall file with the superintendent, to be transmitted to the Committee of Inspection, a full description of the case.

superintendent, to be transmitted to the Committee of Inspection, a full description of the case.

XIII. If they, their seniors, juniors or special assistants shall leave the hospital, they shall enter in a book kept for that purpose the exact time of their departure and return, but they and their seniors shall not be absent from the hospital at the same time without permission from the Chairman of the Inspection Committee, nor shall more than half the number of house officers be absent from the hospital at the same time without such permission. They shall be notified by the seniors, juniors and special assistants whenever they wish to leave the hospital. No member of the house staff shall leave the hospital grounds on week days between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. without special permission of the Chairman of the Committee of Inspection.

XIV. The regular yearly vacations of members of the staff shall be determined by the Medical Board and granted by the Committee of Inspection. Special leave of absence may be given by the Chairman of the Inspection Committee.

XV. No member of the staff shall entertain any guest in his quarters or in the hospital for a period exceeding twenty-four hours, without permission of the Chairman of the Inspection Committee and of the Commissioner in writing.

XVI. Special Assistants shall have the official staff rank of Juniors, and at the expiration of a satisfactory term of service shall receive a certificate of such service.

Hospital Rules.

Hospital Rules.

The hospital is to be divided into the following services:

First and second medical divisions. The surgical division. The gynecological division.

The genito-urinary division. The obstretrical division.

The ophthalmological division.
The laryngological and otological division.
The dermatological division.
The neurological division.

The neurological division.

The distribution of patients to these divisions shall be as follows:: All cases requiring treatment for internal diseases and that do not belong to the special services as hereafter specified, shall be assigned to the medical divisions. All cases requiring operative or other surgical treatment, and which do not belong to one of the special surgical services hereafter specified, shall be assigned to the surgical division. Women requiring treatment for diseases of the external genitals, excepting venereal diseases, and of the uterus and appendages, shall be assigned to the gynecological division. All patients suffering from venereal diseases of the external genitals, discases of the urethra, male genital organs, prostate, bladder and operations of the kidney shall be assigned to the genito-urinary division, excepting cases of syphilis, in which there are secondary or tertiary skin lesions. All cases requiring treatment chiefly for diseases of the skin, and including the skin manifestations of syphilis shall be assigned to the dermatological division. All patients requiring treatment chiefly for the eye and for the nose, throat and ear, shall be assigned to the ophthalmological and otological and laryngological services respectively. All patients with diseases of the nervous system who do not require immediate surgical treatment or immediate treatment for internal diseases, shall be assigned to the neurological division. All maternity cases, excepting those suffering from diseases the nature of which would render them unfit for care in the maternity wards, shall be assigned to the obstetrical division. division.

II. No patient, except accident cases and employees of the hospital, shall be received and treated in any ward of this hospital unless admitted through the central examining office at Twenty-sixth street, and patients who are in emergencies referred to the hospital by the attending Physician or Surgeon over their own signature, and subsequently reported to and accepted by the Commissioner as a public charge.

III Employees of the hospital requiring medical and surgical treatment shall be

III. Employees of the hospital requiring medical and surgical treatment shall be admitted to the wards of the hospital only upon written request of the Superintendent and after examination by the physician in charge of the reception office. Cases of

accident shall be reported at once to the Physician in charge of the reception office and be examined by him before they are sent to the wards.

IV. No operation shall be performed, except in cases of emergency, unless notice is sent at least twelve hours prior to the operation to the hospital office. In any medical or surgical case of emergency the house officer shall request the immediate attendance of the attending Physician or Surgeon, of if he cannot be found, of any other attending Physician or Surgeon of that division, or if neither can be found, of the Assistant.

V. Clinical instruction may be given by the atending Physicians and Surgeons on patients under their care.

VI. Requests for extra or special Nurses shall be made to the Superintendent of the Training School, upon the authority of the Attending Physicians or Surgeons. Failure to receive the required Nurses shall be reported in writing to the Committee of Inscretion.

of Inspection.

VII. All requisitions for new instruments or hospital apparatus shall be made to the Committee of Inspection over the signature of the attending Physician or Surgeon. All medical or surgical supplies shall be ordered from the Apothecary over the signature of the house Physician or Surgeon, who shall be held responsible for

VIII. The diet of all patients shall be prescribed by the attending Physicians or Surgeons, and shall be supplied on their authority only.

IX. Patients shall be discharged from the hospital under the authority and by the signature of the attending Physicians and Surgeons, and in no other manner. Cards thus signed, together with the ward records of the case, shall at once be transmitted to the office.

mitted to the office.

X. The hospital office shall be promptly notified by the house Physician or Surgeon of all patients seriously ill or in extremis. Cases of suspected contagious diseases shall be reported at once to the office and isolated.

XI. Upon the death of a patient the house physician or surgeon shall be immediately notified and the body shall not be removed from the ward except upon his ambority.

Amendments.

Except as otherwise provided by the Commissioner, none of these rules shall be amended, added to or repealed, except upon two-thirds vote of the Medical Board present at a meeting, the call for which issued at least one week in advance, shall have contained notice of such proposed action, and with the approval in writing of the Commissioner,

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENTAL DIETITIAN.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner:

December 31, 1906.

Dear Sir-Herewith I bog to hand you my report for the fourth quarter of the year.

Organization. On October 1, Miss E. Grace McCullough was reappointed as Dietitian in this Department and assigned to the New York City Home for Aged and Infirm, Blackwell's Island, a vacancy having existed there for some months.

November 1, Mrs. Frances C. Aldred, Dietitian, was transferred from the Metropolitan Hospital to the Kings County Hospital, Brooklyn, to succeed Mrs. Florence Lee, Dietitian, whose resignation took effect on that date. The Civil Service Commission being unable to furnish us with names of Dietitians eligible to appointment, it was impossible to appoint a successor to Mrs. Aldred at the Metropolitan Hospital, and Miss Amelia McNaughton, Pupil Dietitian since June 1, was appointed Acting Dietitian, at \$600 per year, until such time as a regular appointment could be made arrangements were made for Miss McCullough to come from the City Home and teach classes in cookery at the Metropolitan Training School for the five lessons remaining in the term. remaining in the term.

Rules and regulations governing the duties of the Dictitian at the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools were adopted and promulgated December 4, as Special Order No. 47 (see appendix "A").

Further progress has been made in the reorganization of the kitchen force at City Hospital, by creating the position of Fry Cook, at \$30 per month, thus affording the Chef additional assistance and insuring more careful preparation of food for employees.

Buildings and Equipment.

At the New York City Home for Aged and Infirm, plans are made for converting a small room off one of the hospital wards into a special diet kitchen, where special cooking can be done by a Nurse for the patients most in need of it. This room will probably be equipped soon after the first of the new year.

Plans are completed for a new kitchen and dining room building at the City Hospital, Blackwell's Island.

Plans for the improvement of the service of food in the general dining room at the New York City Home for Aged and Infirm, by means of rearrangement of dining room furnishings and the installation of steam tables, are under consideration.

Dietaries and Food Supply.

A dietary for the inmates of the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools was tentatively adopted and promulgated October 30, as Special Order No. 42 (see appendix "B."). This dietary offers improvement upon the previous one by providing liberally for fruits and cereals, and for greater variety in the preparation of meats. An increased allowance of cereals and fruits is required, and probably a reduction in meats can be made to compensate for this. No difference is made for the various classes of immates, i. e., sick children, feeble-minded children and idiots, but it is expected that after a trial of this dietary, it would be possible to say just what differentiation of diets is advisable. tiation of diets is advisable.

A book providing for the record of food inspections made at Twenty-sixth street pier has been ordered. This book provides spaces for the following information: Article ordered, quantity, date for which ordered, date received, contractor's name, destination, inspected by, if rejected, why? when sent to institution. The necessity for this book arises from the fact that several people are inspecting food supplies and it is sometimes difficult to fix responsibility for these inspecting of feed run.

Improved specifications have been recommended for certain articles of food sup-ply to be advertised for the year 1907, as follows: Baking powder, cocoa, gelatine, truits, vegetables, a greater variety of fresh fish and an extension of the season dur-ing which meats should be covered with burlap.

Teaching of Classes.

At the New York City Training School for Nurses the following classwork has been conducted by myself:

Two last lessons of the term in chemistry for the August probationary class. Five lessons in the principles of cookery for the October probationary class. Five lessons in general elementary chemistry for the October probationary class. Six lectures in dietetics for the intermediate class of twenty-one members. Eight lessons in bacteriology, completing the term of ten lessons begun in September for the junior class of two sections.

APPENDIX "A."

Special Order No. 47-

December 4, 1906.

(Re: Duties of the Dictitian of the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools, Randall's Island.)

Ordered, That the following rules and regulations governing the duties of the Dietitian of the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools of the Department of Public Charities be and they hereby are adopted to take effect December 10, 1906;

1. The Dietitian of the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools is responsible to the Superintendent for the work of all cooks, waitresses and other helpers employed in the Dietary Department. She must assign their work; supervise its execution; criticise the condition of their workrooms, uniforms, personal appearance and conduct while on duty; arrange for their off-duty time; instruct them when needful; and make any recommendations concerning them to the Superintendent.

z. She shall inspect daily the condition of the dining rooms, kitchens, cupboards, ice boxes, ranges and all equipment of the Department, and give instructions for the care of the same, having full authority to enforce her instructions.

She shall make daily inspection of all raw and cooked food materials and sec that they are properly cared for; that excess quantities are accounted for; and that only the minimum waste occurs. She shall personally see that all foods for immates and employees of the various grades are carefully prepared and properly distributed.

4. She shall visit all patients' and inmates' dining rooms at least twice each week, observing the service of the food, the disposition of excess quantities and waste of food, making any criticism or suggestion in writing to the Superintendent.

5. The Dictitian shall be responsible to the Committee on Dict of the Medical Board for carrying out the special dictaries approved by this committee. She shall make a note of all changes and omissions in the dictaries, with reasons therefor, and report the same in writing to the committee as often as required. The Dictitian shall prepare an outline for the lessons in dictetics to be given by her to the classes of the Training School, and she may from time to time suggest changes in it. All of which shall be submitted to the Committee on Dict for approved.

The Dictitian shall have entire charge of the pupils of the Training School during their hours of duty in the diet kitchen, planning and criticising their work. She shall keep a record of the work done by each pupil, which shall be reported in writing to the Supervising Nurse.

She shall be responsible for carrying out the dictaries approved for the in-stitution and shall exercise her judgment in adapting meals of all employees to the conditions existing at any time.

7. After the ward diet summaries have been approved by the Superintendent as conforming to the ward diet sheets and the physician's order, they shall be brought to the office of the Dietitian at 3 o'clock on the day preceding the one on which they are to go into effect. The Dietitian shall supervise their summary for the use of the kitchens and storerooms and shall take any criticism which she may make on any securities to the same and storerooms. requisition to the proper source for adjustment.

8. The Dietitian shall visit employees' dining rooms during their hour of service of meals and correct any error in service of the food she may observe. Any complaint from any source regarding the work of the dietary department shall be promptly and personally investigated by the Dietitian. The Dietitian at any time may recommend to the Superintendent the employment of, the discharge of, or the modification of compensation of any employee in her department.

9. The Dietitian shall supervise the preparation of food in the special diet kitchen, and make to the Supervising Nurse any recommendations concerning the work, equipment, or the nurses and helpers employed there.

ment, or the nurses and helpers employed there.

10. At all times the Dietitian shall see that responsibility for the work to be done is properly placed, and in case of her absence, she shall designate some person in her department to act for her. She shall leave the Island during duty hours only with the knowledge and approval of the Superintendent.

11. The Dietitian shall report to the Dietitian of the Department any criticisms regarding the condition of, or amounts, of supplies received, any suggestions for extraordinary repairs or improvements, and any radical changes in the number or compensation of employees, after same have received the approval of the Superintendent.

12. The Dietitian shall revise and sign all daily, weekly and monthly requisitions for food supplies on the storekeeper of the institution, and she shall also revise the weekly and monthly requisitions and the yearly estimate for food supplies sent to the General Storekeeper of the Department before submitting them to the Superintendent.

13. The Dietitian shall inspect the condition of all sources of food supply produced in connection with the institutions of the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools, and shall make any reports or suggestions relating thereto in writing to the Superintendent of these institutions.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACTS.

Male Dormitory at Metropolitan Hospital.

This work should have been completed during December but a delay in obtaining the woodwork and red metal partition standards held the building back so that it will be about February first before the contract will be closed. The work remaining to be done is as follows:

Varnishing of woodwork, hardware to be put on, marble and tile work to be completed, floors laid.

Female Dormitory at City Hospital.

Had it not been for the slow progress of the plumbing work this building could have been in use by now, but the plumbing contractors were so slow in starting their work that the whole job has been delayed so that the work will not be finished before early in February.

To please the Master Plumbers the plumbing contract was let separate from the general building contract, but the experience on this work recommends letting the entire job as one contract and I respectfully submit this proposition for your consideration.

Remodeling Male Dormitory, Randall's Island.

This work has been going ahead very well and should be entirely completed early in February.

New Sash and Repairs to Frames, Infants' Hospital, Randall's Island.
This work has been very slow and has caused much annoyance and loss of time but I am of the opinion that two weeks will find the contract finished.

New Fire Escapes, Three Cottages, Farm Colony.

This contract progressed very slowly, by reason of the inconvenience of getting material to the site and difficulty of retaining workmen. At present there is but the setting of the stone platform at the start of the stairs and ought to be finished very shortly.

REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS, BOROUGHS OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

Dear Sir—In forwarding the report of this Bureau (Morgue included), for the quarter ending December 31, 1906, I beg to call your attention to the following facts:

During said quarter, 2,850 applicants for admission to hospitals were sent to the Examining Physician of this Department, for examination as to their eligibility for admission to the hospitals connected with this Department; 293 children sent to institutions for children on Randall's Island; 835 persons sent to the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm; 2 applications for admission to the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm disapproved.

There were 318 children discharged from the institutions on Randall's Island.

This Bureau issued 20,050 passes to visit Blackwell's and Randall's Islands; 710 tickets for meals were given to persons awaiting disposition of their cases.

Transportation was afforded to 120 sick and destitute persons, to reach their homes, thereby preventing them from becoming charges upon the City and County of New York.

There were 21 sick and destitute persons committed to the State Alms House, Blackwell's Island, for care, awaiting the action of the State Board of Charities.

There were 512 persons sent to the Municipal Lodging House; requests were made for the examination as to sanity of 148 men and 126 women; 58 deaf mutes were admitted to institutions for same; 59 were admitted to the New York Institution for the Blind.

for the examination as to sainty of 148 men and 126 women; 58 deaf mittes were admitted to institutions for same; 59 were admitted to the New York Institution for the Blind.

There have also been sent, from this Bureau, 16 patients to the Craig Colony for Epileptics, Sonyea, N. Y.; 11 to the State Custodial Asylum for Feeble-minded Women, Newark, N. Y.; 8 to the Syracuse State Institution for Feeble-minded Children, Syracuse, N. Y.; 26 to the New York State Hospital for Incipient Tuberculosis, Ray Brook, N. Y.

In addition, this Bureau has examined 7.633 cases of applicants for admission to hospitals and homes other than our own, to be cared for there at the expense of the City and County of New York, of which 1.735 were rejected as improper charges.

This Bureau has also taken 262 complaints of abandonment, of which 81 were granted requisitions and 181 treated at this office; 74 non-support applications; 60 bastardy cases sent to the Court of Special Sessions; 39 bastardy cases not sent to court; 18 discharges from the Workhouse.

Payments in abandonment and bastardy cases, during the quarter ending December 31, 1906, have amounted to \$44,946.35, and disbursements in same, \$41,004.50, thus saving that much to the taxpayers of the City and County of New York.

Total number of cases (including the passes issued to visit Blackwell's and Randall's Islands) handled by the Burcau of Dependent Adults for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, during the quarter ending December 31, 1906, 34.258.

This Bureau has charge of the Morgue, at foot of East Twenty-sixth street, and the Harlem Morgue, at foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street, both in the Borough of Manhattan. During the three months ending December 31, 1906, 2.665 bodies were received, of which but 1,213 were huried by friends.

REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S BUREAU.

New York, December 31, 1906.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir-I have the honor to submit herewith the report of the Children's Bu-

Dear St—I have the motor to submit herewith the report of the Children's Bureau for the quarter ending December 31, 1906.

During this quarter there were fifteen hundred and sixty-six (1,566) children proposed for commitment, of which two hundred and four (204) were recurrent cases. During the same period this bureau reinvestigated the cases of twenty-four hundred and ninety-eight (2,498) children at present in institutions as public charges. The sum of seven thousand six hundred and sixty-five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$7,665,25) was received during the quarter from parents having children in institutions as partial public charges.

There are many propositions to commit children of parents who have gone back to their native country for their health. The application is generally made after the departure of the parent. When such an application is made for the commitment of children, the parent making the application is asked the question, "Where is the father or mother of these children?" as the case may be, and the reply is generally, "Oh, he has gone back to the old country for his health." Asked where he got the funds to enable him to make the voyage, the reply invariably is that friends or a charitable society furnished the money. There seems to be plenty of money available to send sick husbands back to their native country for their health, but very little money for their wives and children while the men are absent.

Now, the difficulty in these cases is this: When the absent parent learns that his children have been placed in an institution, and you may be sure that he does learn of it, he is in no hurry to return home, after he regains his health, to resume his parental responsibilities, whereas if he had entered a hospital in this City for treatment he would be discharged as soon as cured, and when he resumed work his children mould be discharged to him and the City relieved of the expense of their care and maintenance. But with parents on the other side of the ocean that is another proposition.

I am of the opinion that the thing greatly needed in this City is a Court of Domestic Relations, where all cases of failure to support wives and children could be adjudicated. In many of these cases women do not get the consideration their cases merit. I know of a case recently passed upon by one of the Courts where a woman with two children was allowed the munificent sum of six dollars per month to support two children; the result of this order was that one of the children quickly became

a public charge. In numberless other cases old offenders—in the matter of non-support of wives and children—are paroled to pay their wives a certain sum of money per week and then usually the man disappears and the mother of the children applies to place the children in an institution at public expense. But if perchance she locates her husband before applying for the children's commitment, she presents herself to the Court where her husband was ordered to pay, only to find very often that the Magistrate who passed upon her case has left the Court and will not sit again for a week or two. In the meantime she can do nothing but wait until that particular Magistrate returns to the bench, as it seems to be the ethics of Court work that one Magistrate will not take up the case of another Magistrate, and doubtless there are good reasons for not doing so. But in the meantime the delinquent parent again disappears, and so it goes on, with the result that thousands of children have become public charges, simply because men are not held to a more rigid enforcement of their parental responsibilities.

With a Court of Domestic Relations in operation all this could be changed. The

The Magistrate assigned to such a Court could give his personal attention to these cases, not only at the initial hearing, but later, if the man fails to live up to the order of the Court. At present the latter phase of this work is usually left to a probation officer and the result is far from satisfactory, and I have no hesitation in saying that such a Court well administered would make unnecessary the commitment of at least five hundred (500) children yearly, and this is a conservative estimate. Every child over two years of age committed to an institution costs the City two dollars and twenty-five cents (\$2.25) per week, and the average length of time a child remains in an institution is about three (3) years. Assuming that the aforesaid five hundred (500) children remained public charges for three (3) years, we find that the expense to the City would be \$175,500. It seems to me that the above figures advance a very good argument that there should be such a Court in operation.

I have no criticism to make of the present Board of City Magistrates; I realize that they are now taxed to the utmost to handle the vast amount of work coming daily before them, and for that reason they have not time to go into the details of non-support cases in order that an equitable decision may be made in each case. All such cases should be thoroughly investigated. I have known of cases where women have applied to the Court for the arrest of their husbands on the ground of non-support and after the men were placed under an order to pay their wives a certain sum of money weekly, it developed that the men had been compelled to leave their wives on account of their vicious habits of living, and subsequently the children whom they were bonded to support were taken from the mothers and arraigned in the Children's Court and committed to an institution for no proper

cases.

Report of the Municipal Lodging House, No. 398 First Avenue, for Quarter Ending December 31, 1996.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I beg to present for your consideration the report of the Municipal Lodging House for quarter ending December 31, 1906.

In addition to tabulated statistics covering this period, I beg to say that, owing to unforeseen conditions, all work on our new building on East Twenty-fifth street has been brought to a complete stop through the inability of the contractors to find a solid foundation to sink spiles on the northeast corner of the plot; the iron and brick work in the meantime to the height of three (3) stories was more or less completed on about 75 per cent. of the ground, when the entire work was halted until such time as ways and means may be found to overcome this serious problem.

Employment Bureau.

Many of the institutions in our Department as well as Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have been supplied with Mechanics, Helpers, Scrubwomen, etc.

Requests from nearly all of the prominent hotels are being constantly received for Cleaners and Scrubwomen; in fact, the demand from this source is at all times larger than the supply.

No one, either man or woman, is sent to fill any vacancy whose record is unfavorable on our books.

Precautions Against Fire.

Employees, as usual, are being continually schooled as to their duties in case of fire; the day Engineer trains the day force and the night engineer the night force. All fire extinguishers and other fire apparatus throughout the institution are inspected at regular intervals.

Supplies of all kinds received from the storehouse, meat department and bakery during this quarter were, as usual, of very good quality.

Requisitions.

Requisitions for supplies, repairs, etc., have been acted upon promptly, and in a very satisfactory manner by the officials at the Central office having charge of

Disposition of Inmates.

Reports, etc., as to the disposition of such inmates referred to the Bureau of Dependent Adults, the Children's Bureau and the Wayfarers' Lodge and Woodyard have been received as usual without delay.

Charitable Societies.

All communications, requests, etc., to and from charitable organizations and interested individuals have been acted upon promptly and courteously.

Conduct of Employees.

Taking into consideration the fact that we fed, lodged, bathed, fumigated clothing and rendered medical and surgical aid when needed to 11.584 men, women and children of all nationalities and creeds during this quarter, I think I have every reason to feel proud, on the whole, of the conduct of the officers and employees of this institution (about 66 per cent, of the latter are unpaid).

The repairs to surgical instruments and apparatus amounted to \$301.66.

We have continued to supply Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the Department of Correction with medicines and surgical instruments. The two Departments have replaced the supplies furnished by the equivalent purchase of a few expensive articles of large consumption.

The preparation of sterilized and chromicized catgut for the hospitals has been discontinued, and the manufacturing bureau has turned out a great variety of pharmaceutical preparations. These comprise 400 gallons fluid extracts and tinctures, 475 gallons elixirs and syrups, 1,100 gallons liniments, 300 gallons mixtures, 400 pounds of ointments, 75 pounds powders, and 2,000 gallons of distilled water.

During the quarter nine nurses graduated; one nurse was dropped for illness but was restored to the roll after a month's rest; one head nurse resigned to take another position, and one pupil nurse was dropped, unable to continue with her duties.

Of the eight probationers who composed the August class, six completed the three months' probation period, all passing the examinations satisfactorily, and were appointed as pupil nurses of the School November 1. October 1, the last class of the year was received, consisting of nine pupils. Eight passed the entrance examination, one was dropped as unsatisfactory and seven have gone through their course of probation and passed the necessary examinations and are recommended for appointment as

year was received, consisting of nine pupils. Eight passed the entrance examination, one was dropped as unsatisfactory and seven have gone through their course of probation and passed the necessary examinations and are recommended for appointment as pupil nurses of the School. The usual semi-annual examinations of all the classes were held during the month of December. The nurses all made very satisfactory records.

October 27, the annual commencement of the Training School was held. The exercises were carried out along the same lines as formerly. Forty-six diplomas were presented, also prizes to the pupil of highest standing in each grade, also special prizes for the lecture course to four of the pupils. The badges of the School were not presented to the pupils by the Department this year.

During the month of December the Superintendent was given a month's leave of absence for recreation. During her absence Miss Silver had charge of the school, Miss LeFebyre, First Assistant Superintendent, having fallen ill on December 8, and at the present date is still in a serious condition.

Our supplies during the quarter have been of good quality, but there has been quite a little trouble about the time of their delivery, so many things being rejected and time lost in having them replaced. The Thanksgiving dinner was a very good one, and much enjoyed by the inmates of the Home.

For Christmas \$145 was donated by the Island Mission towards special Christmas cheer for the patients, and \$100 by Mrs. Elbridge T. Gerry. These amounts were used for the patients and receipted bills sent to the donors, with an itemized account of expenditures. It has been customary to present every inmate of the Hospital and Home with a little remembrance on Christmas Day, and this was followed out as usual, the women of the Hospital receiving warm shawls for their shoulders, and the men socks, which could be used when discharged from the Hospital.

The new women's dormitory is near completion, the wood trim, plumbing and steamfitting is being pushed as rapidly as possible, and from present indications the building will be turned over during the month of February, 1907.

The two wings of the old Klondike Building have been torn down and material remove to bake house at City Home. This completes the demolition of all the old buildings, with the exception of a small part of a building known as the O. P., which is used as a Carpenter shop; this will be abandoned as soon as the old boiler plant is

A new road has been projected between the new boiler house and the men's dor-mitory; sufficient stone has been acquired from the Penitentiary quarry and is on the ground; the work will be pursued as opportunity presents itself.

An unusually large amount of painting has been accomplished during the past quarter, the entire two upper floors having been thoroughly renovated. The usual ordinary repairs have been executed and properly reported.

There were in this hospital September 30, 1906, 321 male and 237 female patients, making a total of 558. During the fourth quarter 2,294 cases were admitted, of whom 1,696 were males and 598 were females, making the number under treatment 2,017 males and 835 females, a total of 2,852. Of this number 834 were discharged recovered, 938 as improved, 165 as unimproved, 192 were transferred to State hospitals for the insane, 192 died and 531 remained under treatment December 31, 1906, of whom 369 were males and 162 were females.

The death rate based on the total number under treatment was 6.73 per cent.

In the maternity service 36 women were confined, giving birth to 18 male children and 16 females. There were two still births.

The number of visits made by the visiting staff was 509, and 64 major operations were performed.

Dear Sir—I have the honor herewith to submit to you the quarterly report of the Kings County Morgue, for the quarter ending December 31, 1906.

The number of bodies received was 149, of which number 121 were identified and 28 were not identified. Of the number identified 57 were interred by the County, making total interred by County 85, including the 28 unidentified. The remaining 64 were interred by relatives or friends.

REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS, BOROUGH RICHMOND, FOR THE QUARTER ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1906.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner of Public Charities, New York City: Dear Sir-I have the honor to herewith submit a report for the three months

ending December 31, 1906.

It is with deep regret that I mention in this report the death of Mr. Thomas Kenny, Sr., Superintendent of this Bureau, who died December 26, 1906.

The tabulated report will show that the number of dependent children remaining

The tabulated report will show that the number of dependent children remaining in institutions and families September 30, 1906, was two hundred and fourteen (214). The number committed to institutions during this quarter was eight. Of this number seven were committed by City Magistrates and one by the Department. Six children were committed to board in families (by reason of the closing of the County Branch of the Nursery and Child's Hospital, and also being refused admission to institutions on account of lack or room), thus making the total number in institutions and families during the quarter two hundred and twenty-eight (228).

The number of children discharged during the same period was thirty-one (31), leaving the number remaining in institutions and families December 31, 1906, one hundred and ninety-seven (197).

I am sorry to-report that owing to the ill-health of the late Superintendent of this Bureau, who had previously made the reinvestigations of children in institutions, that there are no reinvestigations on file in this office for the quarter.

HEBBERD, Commissioner: Dear Sir-I have the honor to herewith submit my report for the New York City Farm Colony for the quarter ending December 31, 1906. The following repairs and improvements have been made during the quarter: A steam-heating apparatus has been installed in the Superintendent's house. Electric lights have also been installed in the Superintendent's house, the house being lighted before by kerosene oil. The house has also been equipped with stantoners, take tionary tubs. The old range which was in the Superintendent's kitchen has been removed and replaced by a No. 9 Boynton's Lakewood range. The fire escapes on the three cottages have been completed. The cottages, male dormitory, Superintendent's residence and women's building have all been reguttered. A hand-power elevator has been installed in the barn, a great convenience in hoisting of grain, feed, wagons, etc. Storm windows have been placed on the windows on the north and west sides of the cottages, thereby doing away with considerable of the cold which the inmates experienced in the previous winters, One of the wings of the old stone building, formerly occupied by the Baker, who resigned on December 1, has been fitted up as quarters for the male employees, this being more comfortable than their previous quarters in the male dormitory. Work has been commenced on the laying out of a new road leading to the cottages from the main road. This is progressing quite rapidly, considering the weather The women's dormitory has all been thoroughly renovated, also the laundry. A butcher was hired to alter, kill and dress pigs for the holidays. The inmates this quarter have been employed in grading, carting coal to the various buildings, harvesting, spreading manure, whitewashing, general cleaning up of the grounds and various other occupations. Thanksgiving and Christmas were both during this quarter. On these days the inmates were served dinner of the following: Menu-Fresh park turkey, masked notations masked turning release crapheries. Menu-Fresh pork, turkey, mashed potatoes, mashed turnips, celery, cranberries apples, oranges, grapes, nuts, wafers, coffee cake, tea, coffee, bread and butter. Very respectfully, HENRY JETTER. LAYING OUT APPROACH TO BLACKWELL'S ISLAND BRIDGE, MANHATTAN,

The following report was presented from the Committee, to which was referred, on November 2, 1906, the matter of suggesting a suitable approach to the Blackwell's Island Bridge, on the Manhattan side:

REPORT No. 4722.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sin—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on November 2, 1906, a public hearing was given upon a plan for the widening of Second avenue, between East Fifty-seventh and East Sixty-first streets by adding 100 feet to its westerly side, and for laying out the remainder of the block bounded by East Fifty-ninth and East Sixtieth streets, Second and Third avenues, as an approach to the Blackwell's Island Bridge. At the conclusion of the hearing the matter was referred to a committee Island Bridge. At the conclusion of the hearing the matter was referred to a committee consisting of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Chief Engineer of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, Mr. O. F. Nichols, Consulting Engineer to the Department of Bridges, and Mr. J. O. B. Webster, Chief Engineer of the Borough of Manhattan.

Your Committee begs to report that they have had several meetings and have carefully considered the plan upon which the hearing was given, together with an alternative plan consisting of the widening of Third avenue, between East Fifty-seventh and East Sixty-first streets, by adding forty feet to its easterly side, the widening of East Fifty-ninth street, between Second and Third avenues by adding sixty feet to its northerly side, and the restriction of the plaza, or approach, in front of the Blackwell's Island Bridge to a length of 200 feet between East Fifty-ninth and East Sixtieth streets.

and East Sixtieth streets.

A careful examination of the tax values for the year 1906, indicates that the probable expense of these two plans would be so nearly the same that we cannot predict which would be the more costly. The alternative plan above referred to contemplates the leaving of a block 140 feet in width and 370 feet in length, between Second and Third avenues, and between East Fifty-ninth and East Sixtieth streets. After considerable discussion and careful consideration, your Committee believes that the original plan upon which the hearing was given is preferable, although a slight modification of that plan is suggested. The lots on the westerly side of Second avenue, between East Fifty-seighth and East Fifty-eighth streets have a depth of but sixty feet, between East Fifty-eighth and East Fifty-ninth streets they have a depth of sixty-five feet, while between East Sixtieth and East Sixty-first streets their depth is seventy feet for one half the block, and seventy five feet for the remainder. The widening of 100 feet suggested in the original plan was doubtless proposed in the belief that the avenue lots had a depth of approximately 100 feet, and that little expense would be saved by making the widening less than the full depth of the lots, We find, however, that if this widening is made sixty-five feet there will be a saving of property having an assessed value of \$125,000, and your Committee believes that of property having an assessed value of \$125,000, and your Committee believes that a widening to the extent of sixty-five feet will be ample, and we beg, therefore, to recommend that a new hearing be given for a widening of Second avenue, between East Fifty-seventh and East Sixty-first streets by adding sixty-five feet to its westerly side, and that the remainder of the block, bounded by East Fifty-ninth street, East Sixtieth street, Second avenue and Third avenue, be laid out as an approach to the Blackwell's Island Bridge.

Hun. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman at the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Six—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on November 1, 1906, recommending a change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Church avenue, between East Eleventh street and Ocean parkway. Church avenue has already been placed upon the map of the City east of East Eleventh street and has a width of 70 feet. From East Eleventh street to Ocean parkway, a distance of five short blocks, an old road has been in use for a great many years and is occupied by trolley tracks. The property abutting upon this road has been partially improved and it appears to have a width of 60 feet.

It is now proposed to give this old road a position upon the map of the City by extending the lines of Church avenue to include the same. The street will have a width of 70 feet in the section east of Coney Island avenue, and the map submitted proposes a width of 80 feet through the remainder of its length.

The trolley line already referred to enters a tunnel in the block between East Seventh street and Ocean parkway, crossing the latter street below grade. In my judgment a width of at least too feet should be provided in this block because of the occupancy of a considerable portion of the width by the tunnel portal, and I would recommend that a public hearing be given, not only upon the plan submitted by the Local Board, but also on an alternative one providing for an increased width between East Seventh street and Ocean Parkway.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York: GENTLEMEN—In order to reach the street level at the terminus of the Manhattan Bridge with a reasonable grade, the underside of the structure over Sands street comes within five feet of the present surface of the street; it will therefore be necessary to lower Sands street and Jay street on both sides of the intersection of Jay and Sands streets, and I therefore respectfully request that your Honorable Board will authorize the change of the city map in the Borough of Brooklyn so as to change the grade of Sands and Jay streets to conform with the accompanying plan, 39-14, and to conform to the following description:

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Siz—Under date of December 27, 1906, the Commissioner of Bridges has submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a plan for a change in the grade of Sands street, between Pearl and Bridge streets, and of Jay street, between High and Prospect streets, Borough of Brooklyn, in order to permit the carrying of the roadway of Sands street beneath the structure of the Manhattan Bridge, which it would be impossible to do without the lowering of the street grade or the raising of the bridge roadway, the latter of which is entirely impracticable.

The proposed change consists in lowering the grade 8.66 feet, and will result in a gradient of 3.04 per cent on Sands street between Pearl and Jay streets, and a gradient of 1.24 per cent. between Jay and Bridge streets. On Jay street the new grade will be 2.45 per cent. between High and Sands streets, and 0.683 per cent. between Sands and Prospect streets.

I have communicated with the President of the Borough asking whether there is any objection to the proposed change, and under date of January 3, 1907, he has forwarded a report from the Bureau of Highways stating that the changes proposed are satisfactory to him.

I see no reason, therefore, why they should not be approved, and such action is recommended after the necessary public hearing.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Six—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District. Borough of The Bronx, adopted on November 15, 1906, recommending a change in the map or plan of The City of New York by widening East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, between Park and Washington avenues.

The intention of this resolution is to make the lines of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street include all of the old road known as Fletcher street, the same being accomplished by increasing the width of the street 2,2 feet on its southerly side. East One Hundred and Eighty-second street as laid out has a width of 50 feet, and title to it has been acquired under proceedings confirmed in 1905. A considerable portion of the property on the southerly side of the street has been improved.

I am advised that owners of property have experienced great difficulty in securing a satisfactory guarantee of title in making conveyances for the reason that their land is deprived of frontage upon the street laid out upon the map of the City, by reason of the failure of the map to include Fletcher street, already referred to.

The map shows that there is a break in the alignment of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street at Washington avenue, and that a street has been laid out east of

Eighty-second street at Washington avenue, and that a street has been laid out east of Washington avenue with a width of 52.2 feet, and forming a direct continuation of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, between Washington and Park avenues, as now proposed, and that through this block the street has a width of 52.2 feet.

It has already been frequently pointed out that the policy of changing the map of the City so as to include old roads generally results in a mutilation, and for that reason is objectionable. In this case, however, a very desirable widening is provided, and I believe that there can be no question as to the dedication of the strip in question to public use. I am advised that no buildings encroach upon the land to be included within the street area, but the map submitted shows that steps encroach not only upon this strip, but also upon the land already acquired for street purposes.

The change in the map is recommended after a public hearing.

WIDENING EAST ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FIRST STREET, THE BROWN.

The following petitions, resolution of the Local Board of Morrisania, Borough of The Bronx, and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

Before the Local Board, District of Morrisania,

In the Matter

The petition for the widening of One Hun-dred and Sixty-first street, from Brook avenue to Third avenue.

Memorandum in Favor of the Petition.

The improvement asked for by the petitioners, to widen One Hundred and Sixty-first street, on its northerly side, from Brook avenue to Third avenue, about 35 feet.

The land to be taken for the improvement consists of two parcels; one having a frontage on Third avenue of about 35 feet, running to the power house, and having a depth on One Hundred and Sixty-first street of about 120 feet, and the other having about the same frontage on Brook avenue, and a depth on One Hundred and Sixty-first street of about 127 feet. street of about 117 feet.

As the land on the northerly side of One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between Brook and Elton avenues, now belongs to the City, and it has been paved between those points to the full width, the result of opening asked for would be to practically make One Hundred and Sixty-first street a wide street for its length west of Third avenue, and would make a suitable improvement in this congested locality,

Reasons Why the Improvement is Necessary and Desirable at This Time.

Reasons Why the Improvement is Necessary and Desirable at This Time.

First—The splendid, commodious and ornamental Court House Building, which has been so carefully designed, is located on the property on the southerly side of One Hundred and Sixty-first street, at Third avenue and Brook avenue. Its southerly, westerly and easterly exposures are on wide streets, well suited to display its architectural heauty, as well as to provide a plentiful supply of much needed light and air, while its northerly and longest side will, unless One Hundred and Sixty-first street is widened, have a frontage on a street little better than an alley, and when the northerly side of One Hundred and Sixty-first street is built up, its proportions will be hidden and from that side it will have but little advantage of light, air and view, which is so necessary to a building of this character. I am sure that the skillful architect who designed this building, in view of the conditions existing at Morris High School, by fronting on a narrow street, will be far from satisfied with the results of his efforts if the building shall front on a narrow and insignificant street. It is well known to all the members of this Board that it is now being strongly urged to widen One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street for the sole purpose of giving a fair and appropriate vista for this school building. A repetition of this stupendous blunder in regard to the Court House would hardly had excuse.

Second—One Hundred and Sixty-first street, from Cromwell avenue east to Brook avenue the lands on the northerly side are owned by the City, was widened and campleted September 1, 1906, so that it only needs the widening of a single black, to provide a grand thoroughfare from east to west, which would be suitable to the congested centre through which it passess.

Central or Jerome avenue, on the west, is the source of this thoroughfare, from whence the stream of population flows over to Third avenue, and so on east to Woodstock, which is rapidly becoming a city in it

Third—There is perhaps no other locality in the Borough of The Bronx, save at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, where there is now, or will be in the near future—and particularly when the new Court House is completed—a greater interchange of passengers from the surface cars to the "L" road, and vice versa, than at One Hundred and Sixty-first street and Third avenue, and it is only retarded now by the fact that One Hundred and Sixty-first street is too narrow at this point at the present time for a double track. If the street is wideend, and the double track laid so as to afford means of running cars at shorter intervals, the traffic would be doubled. so as to

fourth—It may be suggested that the land to be taken is very valuable, and that the expense would be great, and assessments correspondingly large, but there are several answers to this proposition:

(1) If the cost of acquiring the land be great at the present time, it will be much greater in the near future, and particularly after the erection of costly buildings. Private interests, however great, must give way to public necessities, all land in the State of New York is held subject to the higher sovereignty of the State, to be exercised by right of eminent domain for the benefit of all the people.

(2) If the costs of this improvement were to be assessed upon the property benefited, the area of assessment would necessarily be great, and the assessment widely distributed.

distributed.

(3) The improvement would be such a great general benefit to the entire borough—and, in fact, to the entire City and the traveling public of the entire City—that all, or at least a greater part, of the expense would be properly borne by the City at

(4) The people owning property which must necessarily come within the district of assessment and bear a full share of the burdens are the ones who are petitioning

for this improvement.

for this improvement.

Fifth—The reasons why One Hundred and Sixty-first street was not widened all the way to Third avenue were freely discussed and well understood at the time.

(1) One Hundred and Sixty-first street was at that time a practically local and unimportant street, which could not cross Third avenue for the reason that it would be too near the present One Hundred and Sixty-first street, or Grove Hill.

(2) Because of the great costs of opening a too-font street east of Third avenue in that locality, and because of the prohibitive grade, which could never he made feasible except by bridging Eagle avenue, again which was undesirable.

(3) Because at that time the new Court House had not been located or projected, and it was not the central point of traffic as it is at the present time and will be in the near future, and it was thought that the traffic from the elevated road to the eastward could be suitably accommodated by passing through One Hundred and Sixty-first street, or Grove Hill, to Woodstock.

(4) In order to afford a wide street running from east to west, without the necessity of widening One Hundred and Sixty-first street, the project was conceived

and found much favor of widening One Hundred and Sixty-first street to Elton avenue, and then running into One Hundred and Sixty-third street, which was widened too feet from Washington avenue to Westchester avenue. Almost everyone supposed that this would afford an easy access to the City on the hill at Woodstock and to the east of it, but when One Hundred and Sixty-third street was graded east of Third avenue, it was found that the grade from Third avenue to Cauldwell avenue was prohibitive for heavy traffic, and east of Cauldwell avenue was necessarily such a succession of hills and valleys as to be practically useless for laden vehicles, and that it could not be used by fire engines, all of which go through One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and its distance from the "L" station resulted in diverting practically all the traffic cast of Third avenue up the easy grade of the present One Hundred and Sixty-first street, so that the very object of widening of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street to take the traffic of One Hundred and Sixty-first street has been defeated by natural obstacles presented.

Seventh—It may be claimed that a wide street will be more noisy than a narrow one on account of the increased amount of traffic, and that the proceedings of the courts would thereby be disturbed.

The very statement of such an objection admits the necessity of widening—it ad-

The very statement of such an objection admits the necessity of widening—it admits the necessary increase of traffic, which your petitioner presents as a cogent argument in favor of the improvement.

ment in favor of the improvement.

But with the new and improvements now being laid in this borough, the noise would be minimized, and could not certainly be as great as now caused by the "L" roads, and the rattling over Belgian pavement of Third avenue.

It seems ridiculous to have a 13-foot sidewalk for a million-dollar Court House, especially when Third and Brook avenue sidewalks will be at least 10 feet or more.

The length of One Hundred and Sixty-first street, from Jerome to Third avenue, is almost one mile, all of which is 100 feet wide, except this one block between Brook avenue and Third avenue. The block between Cromwell and Jerome avenues is parks on both sides, and can be changed as may be necessary.

Finally.

For these and many other reasons it is respectfully submitted that the improve-ment in question is a public necessity, and should be approved and recommended by this Board.

Dear Sim—There is now before your Honor and the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment a measure relative to completing the widening of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and this association, being both directly and indirectly interested in every part of the ward, respectfully petitions your Honor and the Honorable Board to take favorable action in the matter which is of the greatest importance to the whole borough.

This association has for many years endeavored to have that very important thoroughfare widened from east to west and has succeeded in its work except as to a small strip of land claimed by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, which strip of land was never acquired by that company for railroad purposes but purchased by Mr. W. H. Vanderbilt and the Hon. Chauncey Depew as individuals and it was never used for railroad purposes, and the association has for many years waited for an opinion of the Corporation Counsel in the premises for the purpose, if necessary, to take measures in law to compel the surrender of that strip of land urbring it under condemnation proceedings. Next obstruction comes from an individual property owner holding title to the northwest corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-first street.

property owner holding title to the northwest corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-first street.

The opposition of that gentleman has prevented the widening of the street from Brook avenue to Third avenue.

The street, except the small space above referred to, is now one hundred feet wide from the extreme westerly end east to Brook avenue, and from that avenue to Third avenue, a distance of one block, it is fifty feet wide, and on the southerly side of this block the City is now constructing a court house at an expense of many hundred thousand dollars.

It seems strange that such opposition in the interest of one property owner under such circumstances can be considered for a moment. Here the City constructs and will maintain a modern court house, and three sides of it will face thoroughfares muchundred and more feet wide and the fourth side a fifty feet wide lane simply for the benefit of one individual who intends establishing a saloon within a few feet of the northerly entrance to such court house, but the people do not think that your Honor and the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment will favor such proposition and the association repeats its request that the petition in the matter now before your Honor and the Honorable Board will be favorably considered.

Sira—The accompanying petition addressed directly to the Mayor as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by Mr. John N. Decker, Chairman of a Committee of property owners, under date of October 18, 1906, asks the Board to initiate a change in the map of the City by widening East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between Third and Brook avenues, to make it correspond in width approximately with that portion of the street between Elton avenue and Brook avenue. It is stated that a similar petition has been presented to the Local Board of the Morrisania District, and after a public hearing was disapproved by the Local Board on a divided vote. The reason assigned for this widening is that East One Hundred and Sixty-first street is one of the most important east and west streets in the Borough, that being the first street north of the great Mott Haven yard of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, it is obliged to accommodate an unusual amount of traffic, while the street as it approaches Third avenue, the most important north and south street in the Borough, is reduced by successive changes, first from 100 to 83 feet and again from 83 feet to 50 feet, which is its width through the short block between Brook and Third avenues. It is further pointed out that on the westerly side of Third avenue, just south of One Hundred and Sixty-first street, the City is building a handsome, commoditous and expensive court house, and that the narrow street now existing between Brook and Third avenues is entirely inadequate for the traffic which it is called upon to accommodate.

Subsequent to the receipt of this petition, namely on December 7, 1906, the Local Board of the district adopted a resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that a public hearing be given in the matter of laying out this widening of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street; so that, although the

Local Board has taken no action formally approving of the plan, it has formally referred it to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consideration.

There can be no question that the statements contained in the petition accurately represent the facts. East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between Third and Jerome avenues is a very important street, occupied by a double-track surface railroad. Its importance has been recognized by widening it to 100 feet for the entire distance west of Elton avenue, and its contraction for the one short block before reaching Third avenue is a serious inconvenience to the public which is obliged to use this street. Action by the Local Board is not required under the Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment having full power to initiate such a proceeding for a change in the map of the City. The proposed widening is designed to follow existing property lines, and while it will result in a somewhat irregular street having a width of 87 feet at the westerly end of the block and of 83 feet at its easterly end, it is doubtful if this irregularity will be noticed, especially in view of the fact that on the northerly side of the street, between Elton and Brook avenues, are two small open spaces, while on the southerly side of the street, between Brook and Third avenues is the new court house site.

It is therefore recommended that a date be fixed for a public hearing, and that

Six—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated September 27, 1906, advising that the Local Board of the Morrisania District, at a meeting held on September 20, 1906, recommended a change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out a public park bounded by Sedgwick avenue, Cedar avenue and West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street.

This resolution is accompanied by a petition signed by a large number of residents in the vicinity, who through one of their number state that the matter of petitioning for a park in this vicinity has been held in abeyance for many years, pending the final location of the Morris Heights Railroad station. They now ask that the parcel described in the resolution, the same facing the station, be set aside as a public park. At about the same time this petition was drawn the owner of the property at the intersection of Cedar avenue and Sedgwick avenue began the erection of a six-story apartment building, and the same is now practically finished. Besides this building there are five others on the property. The area designated has a frontage of about 300 feet on Cedar avenue, of about 240 feet on West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, and of about 455 feet on Sedgwick avenue. Cedar and Sedgwick avenues have been improved, and the construction of the steps along the line of West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, which has been authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is nearly finished. The area of the land which it is proposed to take is equivalent to about twenty city lots 25 by 100 feet, and the assessed valuation of the same for the year 1906 was \$38,300, of which \$0,900 was charged to buildings. This figure, however, does not include the value of the brick apartment house already alluded to. I think there is no question but that the total cost of acquiring this property would be in the vicinity of \$100,000. The petitioners call attention to the fact that owing to the change in the grade of Cedar avenue, several of the buildings would have to be raised, for which reason the City would probably be liable for damage. They advise that the owners of these buildings would be willing to remove them to another location in the vicinity.

The section in which the proposed public place is to be located is at the present time only sparsely built up, and in my judgment it would be a serious mistake to lay out a public place to comprise an area which has been so largely built upon, even if a public place were needed in the vicinity. It might be proper to call attention to the fact that the University Park, already owned by the City, is but a short distance north

Rutledge street was laid down upon the man of Long Island City adopted in 1873, and extends from Freeman avenue to the park above mentioned, a total distance of four blocks and lies 200 feet west of Vernon avenue and between the latter street and the East river.

Sue-Herewith are transmitted two resolutions of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, of the Borough of The Bronx. One of these, adopted on March 1, 1006, initiates proceedings for acquiring title to the land required for widening the following streets:

Sedgwick avenue, between Fordham road and Bailey avenue. Bailey avenue, between Sedgwick avenue and Albany road. Albany road, between Bailey avenue and Van Cortlandt Park.

The resolution also provides for acquiring title to Heath avenue, between West One Hundred and Eighty-ninth and West One Hundred and Ninety-first streets, and the public place between Heath avenue and Bailey avenue, south of West One Hundred

The second resolution, adopted on June 14, 1906, initiates proceedings for acquiring title to the land required for widening Kingsbridge road, between Bailey avenue

Spuyten Duyvil creek.

On January 26, 1906, changes were made in the map of the City by widening Sedgwick avenue, Bailey avenue and Albany road through the limits described in the opening resolution now presented, and also for changing the location of Heath avenue and for laying out the public place included in the same resolution.

On May 4, 1906, the map was also changed by providing a widening of Kingsbridge

road, between Exterior street and Bailey avenue.

The resolutions now presented provide for acquiring title to the land added to the street area by reason of these changes in the map. For the reason that Kingsbridge road immediately adjoins Bailey avenue, I would recommend that both resolutions

road immediately adjoins Bailey avenue, I would recommend that both resolutions be made the subject of a single proceeding.

The resolution of March 1, 1906, affects a street system having a length of about two miles and making practically a continuous highway intended to serve as an outlet for the low lying section of the borough east of the New York and Putnam Railway, this artery to have a width of 100 feet throughout, excepting only the section immediately north of the junction of Bailey avenue with Albany road, opposite East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, where a slightly greater width is provided Sedgwick avenue, as heretofore legally opened, has a width of 80 feet, while Bailey avenue and Albany road have already been opened to a width of 60 feet. Heath avenue, or Harlem river terrace, is to have a width of 60 feet through the block included within the limits of the proceeding and almost all of the land lying between it and Bailey avenue is to be acquired under the resolution as a public place.

it and Bailey avenue is to be acquired under the resolution as a public place.

The widening of Sedgwick avenue, Bailey avenue and Albany road includes the old streets as now in use and as improved, and the widenings proposed affect land on both sides of the streets on Sedgwick avenue and on Bailey avenue, while Albany road is widened entirely on its westerly side. Twenty-four brick and frame dwellings

encroach upon the land to be acquired.

encroach upon the land to be acquired.

The change in the map of the Kingsbridge road west of Bailey avenue already alluded to provides for increasing its width on the southerly side by the addition of a triangular area having a frontage of about 30 feet on Bailey avenue and about 250 feet on Kingsbridge road. The object of the change was evidently to secure a more direct connection of the lines of Kingsbridge road where the same crosses Bailey avenue. The street has already been legally opened with a width of 100 feet.

The changes already made in the map and to which the opening proceedings relate are intended to meet the future needs of the locality affected, it having been deemed wise to anticipate such needs at this time and before property values rise to such an extent that widenings would become practically prohibitive.

The resolutions now presented naturally follow the changes made in the map, and their adoption is recommended. It is also recommended that title be acquired in fee, and that all of the costs of the proceeding for acquiring title to the Harlem river terrace, and that 50 per cent, of the costs of the proceeding relating to the remaining streets and to the public place, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property to be benefited, and that the remainder be assumed by the City at large. This relief from assessment is based upon the provisions of the rule adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 25, 1902, affecting streets having a width of more than 60 feet. of more than 60 feet.

SIR-On April 20, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the opening of Chauncey street, between Hoyt and Winthrop avenues, in the Borough of Queens, but inasmuch as the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment had not been appointed before the amendment of the Street Opening Law, the resolution has been returned by the Corporation Counsel for reauthorization.

The action of April 20 last was based upon a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, adopted on September 20, 1905, and in the report submitted upon that resolution it was shown that the proceeding would cover five blocks of a street laid down at a width of 60 feet, and that following the rule of the Board the entire cost should be assessed upon the property benefited.

On September 20, 1905, the same Local Board also adopted a resolution initia-ting proceedings for the opening of Goodrich street, between Plushing and Win-throp avenues. This resolution has not been considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but inasmuch as Goodrich street is the next street northwest of Chauncey street, and as the limits of the proceeding cover the entire length of the street, which is one block longer than Chauncey street, owing to the fact that Chauncey street ends at Hoyt avenue and the block between Hoyt and Flushing avenues is undivided, and inasmuch as the amended Street Opening Law distinctly avenues is undivided, and inasmuch as the amended Street Opening Law distinctly provides that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may combine different resolutions of the Local Boards in a single proceeding, it would seem wise to take advantage of this condition and to make Chauncey and Goodrich streets the subject of one proceeding. Lawrence street, lying immediately southeast of Chauncey street, is also being opened, but the area of assessment has not yet been fixed.

In the case of nearly all streets in this part of the Borough of Queens which have a width of 60 feet, the areas of assessment have been confined to one-half the block on each side of the street opened, and as both of the streets under discussion are 60 feet wide, I see no reason why they should not be considered entirely local and the district of assessment so restricted.

Commissioners were duly appointed to determine the damage to be awarded to owners of property to be taken for the proposed street opening, before whom your petitioner appeared in November, 1004, and from that time until the present has, from time to time, attended with counsel and witnesses, and given proof as to the value of the said property to be taken, so owned by him, and also when the City offered its proof with respect to the same matter. That all proof by the City and by your peritioner as to the value of the lands and premises taken is now before said Commissioners, and that nothing further is to be done in said proceedings with respect thereto, except for the Commission to make its award of damages for the various properties of your petitioner affected.

Third—That the proceedings of said Commission, by reason of the large number of parcels affected and persons interested, have already taken nearly two years, and are yet for from completion, and, as your petitioner is reliably informed and believes, said Commission will require at least eighteen months longer to complete its work

That the City has taken possession of the property formerly owned by your petitioner, represented by Damage Nos. 228 to 236, as shown on said diagram, being Nos. 580, 597, 593, 595, 597, 590 and for Fulton street; that on said premises so taken possession of by the City are three-story buildings used for business purposes, and that since July 1, 1905, the City has collected the rents from the same, and your petitioner and his cestul que trusts have been deprived of all income from said premises. That many of said parcels so taken possession of by the City are covered by mortgages, the interest on which your petitioner has been compelled to nay as well as premisms on fire many of said parcels so taken possession of by the City are covered by mortgages, the interest on which your petitioner has been compelled to pay, as well as premiums on fire insurance policies held by the mortgages as collateral to said mortgages. That the beneficiaries of the trusts held by your petitioner are people of moderate means, largely dependent upon the income they received from the rentals of these properties for their support, the loss of which is a great hardship.

Fifth—That as your petitioner is informed and believes, he and Mrs. O'Flyn are the only persons who have not received compensation for property that has been actually taken possession of by the City for the extension of Flatbush avenue.

Sixth—Your petitioner further shows that these proceedings are brought under title 4 of the Charter of The City of New York, relative to "Opening Streets and Parks." and that section 985 thereof, among other things, provides:

"That said Commission may, when authorized by a majority vote of all the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, make up and file a preliminary abstract of their estimate of damages, separate and apart, embracing either the entire lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises to be acquired, or successive sections or parcels thereof, and ascertain and estimate the compensation to be made thereon, and make a separate report in reference thereto. Such separate or partial report shall be made in the same form and manner, and such proceedings shall be had in respect thereto as in respect to the report of the Commissioners relative to the entire lands taken and assessed as herein provided for, except the final or last separate report shall contain the assessment for benefits."

Your petitioner further shows that in this proceeding there will be no assessments for benefits, inaspuch as your Honorable Body has decided that the City at

large is to pay for all damages.

Your petitioner urges upon the attention of your Honorable Body the serious situation in which your petitioner, as trustee, is placed, by reason of the facts and circumstances above set forth, and submits that the case here presented is one peculiarly calling for the application of the relief provided in this above quoted.

Wherefore your petitioner respectfully asks your Honorable Board to authorize said Commission to ascertain and estimate the compensation for the lands and property taken from him for the extension of Flatbush avenue, and make a separate report in reference thereto.

Six-The accompanying petition of Mr. George Powers, dated October 23, 1906. requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment acting in the acquisition of the property needed for the extension of Flathush avenue, between Fulton and Nassau streets, to make a separate report covering that portion of the street lying between Fulton street and DeKalb avenue.

The reasons given for this request are that the property within the lines of the street on this block was vested in the City by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apporticmment on July 29, 1905; that since July 1, 1905, the City has collected rents for the same; that a large proportion of it was owned by a trust estate which has been deprived of all income from the property since the City took possession; that many of the parcels are covered by mortgages, the interest on which the trustees of the sates have somewheld to pay and that they have also been obliged to pay the estate have been compelled to pay; and that they have also been obliged to pay premiums on five insurance policies held by the mortgagees us collateral; and that the beneficiaries are people of moderate means, largely dependent upon the income from the rentals of these properties for their support.

Before reporting upon requests of this kind it has been the invariable practice of your Engineer to request the Corporation Counsel's office for information and advice as to whether the granting of petitions for the vesting of title or for the making of partial reports would in any way complicate the conduct of the proceeding in progress, or would embarrass the City. Such a course has been followed in this case, and the Corporation Counsel, under date of January 5, 1907, has advised the Secretary that there seems no reason why the request in this case should not be granted.

This block includes the Montauk Theatre property, which was purchased by private agreement and has been paid for, and there seems no reason why the Commissioners should not be authorized to make a separate report upon the remaining parcels. This would enable the City to save the interest on the awards which is now running and permit former owners to secure the sums already awarded them without further delay.

Between Mermaid and Surf avenues a rough roadway is in use and a few buildings have been erected upon the easterly side of the street. Between Surf avenue and the beach a wide, unshaped road is in use and several houses have been erected upon each side of the street, these including the building of the New York Children's Aid Society. At the beach a two-story frame building used as a hotel has been erected wholly within the lines of the Street.

The records of the Topographical Bureau show that proceedings for acquiring

the lines of the street.

The records of the Topographical Bureau show that proceedings for acquiring title to the street were confirmed in 1850. The attention of the Borough authorities has been called to the encroachment of the building already referred to, and inquiry has been made as to the ownership of the same. In response to this inquiry I am advised that since the date of opening the street the water line has receded about not feet, and that it is upon this location that the botel has been built. There has been some dispute as to whether the City or the adjoining owner should collect the rental from this structure, but the last payment was made to the adjoining owner.

The attention of the Corporation Counsel has been called to this case, and in an opinion presented to the President of the Borough on September 13 last it is held that the "accretions made at the foot of the original street and across its entire width, belong to the City, and the street terminates at the ocean now, as it did at the time it was originally opened."

The Corporation Counsel also shows that the dispute which arose between the tenant of the building and the adjacent owner did not in any way affect the City's title.

Under these conditions the approval of the resolution is recommended, the work to be done comprising the following:

10,000 cubic yards grading.
4,240 linear feet curbing.
1,000 linear feet timber bulkhead.

The estimated cost of construction is \$14,000, and the assessed valuation of the land to be benefited is \$67,800.

This resolution affects a length of a little over two blocks of West Twenty-third street. Between Neptune and Mermaid avenues, the easterly half of the street is in use as a rough wagon road, while the westerly half through a large portion of the block is under water, a bulkhead having been built along the centre of the street. A few frame houses have been erected through the section adjoining Mermaid avenue. Between Mermaid and Surf avenues a rough roadway is in use and a few buildings have been erected upon the easterly side of the street. Between Surf avenue and the beach a wide, unshaped road is in use and several houses have been erected upon each side of the street, these including the building of the New York Children's Aid Society. At the beach a two-story frame building used as a hotel has been erected wholly within the lines of the street.

the lines of the street.

The records of the Topographical Bureau show that proceedings for acquiring title to the street were confirmed in 1800. The attention of the Borough authorities has been called to the encroachment of the building already referred to, and inquiry has been made as to the ownership of the same. In response to this inquiry I am advised that since the date of opening the street the water line has receded about 100 feet, and that it is upon this location that the hotel has been built. There has been some dispute as to whether the City or the adjoining owner should collect the rental from this structure, but the last payment was made to the adjoining owner.

The attention of the Corporation Counsel has been called to this case, and in an opinion presented to the President of the Borough on September 13 last it is held that the "accretions made at the foot of the original street and across its entire width, belong to the City, and the street terminates at the ocean now, as it did at the time it was originally opened."

The Corporation Counsel also shows that the dispute which arose between the tenant of the building and the adjacent owner did not in any way affect the City's title.

Under these conditions the approval of the resolution is recommended, the work to be done comprising the following:
10,000 cubic yards grading.
4,240 linear feet curbing.
1,000 linear feet timber bulkhead.
The estimated cost of construction is \$14,000, and the assessed valuation of the land to be benefited is \$67,800.

The statement was made at the meeting that this block had been improved some years ago under an assessment proceeding, and no action was taken, but the matter was referred to the Comptroller for investigation and report. At the meeting held on June 15 last, such report was submitted, in which it was shown that in 1877 an assessment was levied for the grading, curbing and guttering of Degraw street, between Classon and Washington avenues, the total expense of the improvement being about \$1,300, and the matter was referred to the President of the borough has addressed a communication to the Board, stating that the original assessment, which covered the cost of regulating, grading, curbing and guttering, amounted to \$1,500.26. That improvement did not cover the roadway, and the borough President proposes that, if the City is willing to pay a portion of the cost of the improvement now contemplated, that proportion be fixed at one-fourth, the total estimated cost being \$5,000.

The improvement which was made and assessed in 1877 was of the crudest and cheapest kind, with rough curbing and a few feet of cobblestone guttering. The length of the block in question is 420 feet, so that, if the entire cost of the paving and the curbing now proposed were assessed upon the property owners, the entire expense, including the improvement of 1877, would be \$6,500, or about \$16 per linear foot measured along the centre of the street, equivalent to an assessment of \$8 per foot front, or \$160 for each twenty-foot lot. Signification of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on June 27, 1906, initiating proceedings for grading the Boulevard, between Webster avenue and Broadway, in the First Ward.

Proceedings for acquiring title to the Boulevard, from Vernon avenue and Broadway to Nott avenue, were authorized on March 31, 1905. On April 20 last the construction of a sewer was authorized in the street between Webster avenue and Broadway, a length of six blocks, the same coinciding with those covered by the grading resolution now presented; at this time provision was made for vesting title to the street in the City on July 2 last. The street has been approximately shaped between Webster and Washington avenues, and a few houses have been erected upon the abutting property. Between Washington avenue and Graham avenue a wagon path is in use at the present time and about a half dozen frame houses have been erected upon each block. North of Graham avenue the land is low and marshy. Curbing and flagging have been omitted from the resolution, the same undoubtedly being partly due to the fact that a great amount of filling will be required in sections, making it unwise to place curbing until after the same has been given time for settlement, and partly for the reason that the valuation of the abutting property would not justify a complete improvement. improvement,

Under these conditions the approval of the resolution is recommended, the work to be done comprising the following:

2,000 cubic yards excavation.

60,000 cubic yards filling.

The estimated cost of construction is \$43,100, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$88,000.

GRADING GRAND STREET, QUEENS.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel, and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

DEAR Sin-I have a communication from Mr. John H. Mooney, Assistant Secretary, dated April 23, 1906, in which he enclosed, by direction of your Board, a copy of a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, recommending the grading, curbing and flagging of Grand street from Maiden lane to Kings County line, together with a copy of the report of the Engineer of your Board, and desired me to advise your Board whether the City is in a position to authorize the improvement in the street, or whether it will be necessary to institute proceedings to acquire title. to acquire title.

to acquire title.

It appears from the report of your Engineer that Grand street was laid out to a width of 80 feet, on November 13, 1903, on the Maspeth Map, a map of part of the Second Ward, Borough of Queens, adopted on that date.

Chapter 637 of the Laws of 1874—a special act for the opening and improvement of Grand street, in the City of Brooklyn, and the extension of the same into Queens County, which extension includes the part under consideration—provided for the appointment of three Commissioners whose duty was to open Grand street, in Brooklyn, and extend the same in Queens County and to widen the same to a width of 80 feet in Queens County, and further provided for the grading of the same to its full width and macadamizing it in the centre to a width of sixteen feet for its entire length.

These Commissioners were directed to cause correct maps of said street, as extended and widened for its full length, to be filed in the offices of the Clerks of the Counties of Kings and Queens, respectively.

Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were accordingly appointed by an order dated June 27, 1874, and entered on the 19th day of June, 1874, and the order confirming the report of the Commissioners in all respects is dated and filed March 22, 1875.

confirming the report of the Commissioners in all respects is dated and filed March 22, 1875.

The original papers were filed in the office of the Clerk of Kings County, and the certified copies of the report and order of confirmation, with assessment and benefit maps, were filed in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens, Jamaica.

Annexed to the report, as filed in Jamaica, were the following maps:

1. "Map of Grand street, from Newtown Creek to Metropolitan avenue."

2. "Map of Grand street extension from Newtown Creek to Newtown Village, Queens County, New York, surveyed in August, 1874, by E. M. Conklin."

3. "Assessment map of Grand street extension from Newtown Creek to Newtown Village, Queens County, New York, surveyed in October, 1874, by E. M. Conklin."

Subscribed to Map No. 2 above mentioned, is a certificate signed by the Commissioners that they have laid out the public road or highway mentioned in said act, commencing at the terminus of Grand street, in the City of Brooklyn, E. D., and extending to the Village of Newtown, at Moore's corner, Queens County, and a further certificate that in laying out the said road or highway they have followed the route prescribed by the said act, and that the map mentioned is a correct map of the same. The report shows that the following awards were made and the following assessments levied:

It also appears that the street so acquired conforms with the recently adopted map of this part of Queens and that by the proceedings under such act an easement was acquired to Grand street to its full width.

The position, orders and maps do not furnish a technical description to show the exact width of the street, from which probably arises the inquiry whether the street is dedicated.

There seems to be no doubt, however, that there has been a practical location of this avenue and it has now been in use for many years, is paved in part with granite blocks and occupied by a double trolley road.

I have no doubt that the City has a sufficient right in Grand street to authorize the improvements recommended by the Local Board of the Newtown District. Very respectfully,

The Corporation Counsel under date of June 12, 1906, has presented an opinion showing that title to the street was acquired under formal opening proceedings, which were confirmed in 1875. He also advises that there is a "sufficient right in Grand street to authorize the improvements recommended by the Local Board of the Newtown District."

District."

In my previous report upon this improvement it was shown that the street is in use at the present time and is occupied by a double-track trolley road throughout its entire length, the same comprising nearly two miles. The Mount Olivet Cemetery has a frontage of about 1,500 feet on the southeasterly side of the street, and aside from the area occupied by the cemetery the abutting property through the northeasterly half of the street has been partially improved. In the southwesterly section only a few buildings have been erected. The trolley tracks through a portion of the length are properly located, while in other sections they are placed on the sides of the roadway. The street has been paved for its full width in sections, while in other sections the pavement is only laid in the centre of the street; in the latter sections the curb is lacking. The grading called for in the resolution is partly required in the sidewalk spaces, the same through portions of the street not having been shaped, and I am also advised that some grading will be required in the roadway, the existing grade not fully coinciding with that established in 1903.

I see no reason why this improvement should not be authorized, and would recom-

I see no reason why this improvement should not be authorized, and would recommend such action, the work to be done comprising the following: 10,000 cubic yards filling. 13,900 linear feet new and old curbing.

85,000 square feet flagging.

On November 16, 1906, a map showing the temporary sewers described in this resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Title to the unnamed street extending from Jackson avenue to St. Paul's avenue was acquired under proceedings confirmed on July to, last. On December 14, last, proceedings were authorized for acquiring an easement to the land required for the outlet of this system, but the owners of the property have given consent for the construction of the sewers pending the determination of the awards to be paid them under this proceeding. No one of the other streets has yet been legally opened and no one of them, with the exception of Bay street, has yet been placed upon the map of the City. With the resolution, however, there are presented affidavits showing that all of the streets named and not yet legally opened have been in use for periods ranging upward from twenty years, these affidavits including Bay street as now in use. The lines of Bay street as mapped do not agree with the lines of the street as now in use, but the map shows that the lines of the sewer will fall wholly within that portion of the street which is unquestionably dedicated.

This improvement relates to the Stapleton section and is one very much needed, a large population being at the present time without sewerage facilities. The total length of the system provided under the resolution is a little over a mile and a half. I would recommend the approval of the resolution, the work to be done comprising the following:

Gentlemen—Your Board, at its meeting held May 18, 1906, on the motion of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, laid over the matter of the laying out of an extension of what is known as University Park, lying between Sedgwick avenue. Cedar avenue and the prolongation of the northerly line of West One Hundred and Eighty first street, in the Borough of The Bronx, the matter having been referred to a special committee composed of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the Comptroller and the Engineer of the Board at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held May 0, 1906. A report of the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer is printed in the minutes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment (see minutes, Estimate and Apportionment, 1906, page 1207).

A communication was transmitted to the President of the Borough of The Bronx, under date of October 23, 1906, in order that he would inform me of his views in relation to the matter, in order that the same could again be presented to your Board for action, and in reply thereto, under date of October 31, 1906, he transmits a report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx in which it is stated that this matter was recommended by the Local Board as an addition to the University Park Extension, and that it was also recommended, on November 16, 1905, that a park approach be laid out between Cedar avenue and Harlem river terrace, so as to make a direct connection between the University Heights station and the University through this park and park approach, and concludes stating that this approach improvement seems to be a very desirable one, and he believes that it should be carried out, and that the expense will not be very great considering the amount of benefit which will be derived.

The Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in recommending that a public hearing be had in relation to changing the map of the city by extending the limits of the park commonly known as University Park, lying between Sedgwick avenue and Cedar avenue, and southerly of the northerly side of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street produced, and also the laying out of a street fifty feet in width between Cedar avenue and Harlem river terrace, states that a new station is now being built at West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, or Fordham Heights, by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, it being erected as a part of the plan for the elimination of grade crossings along the lines of the said railroad, the present station being located somewhat further to the north at the crossing of Fordham road. He further states that the City has already laid out and acquired as a park the steep slope in front of the University, between Sedgwick avenue on the east and Cedar avenue and the Harlem river terrace on the west, and that there are several hundred students at the University who use this station every day, and when there are important athletic games on the University field there are thousands of people who are obliged to follow a circuitous route to reach this field from either the present or the proposed station.

The addition to the park has an average length of about 240 feet and an average width of about 200 feet, equivalent to 19½ city lots of 25 by 100 feet each, the present assessed valuation of which is \$23,500, all of which is for land, there being no improvements.

The Chief Engineer states that the street which it is preposed to land, there being no improvements.

The Chief Engineer states that the street which it is proposed to lay out is 50 feet in width, and the grade would be such that it would be almost prohibitive for vehicles, although they might use it, so that a greater width is not necessary, and even

Six—The accompanying resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, on July 18, 1906, provides for changing the lines of Van Alst avenue, between Hoyt and Winthrop avenues, by moving the street 25 feet east of its present position.

Van Alst avenue was originally laid out upon the map of Long Island City at a width of 150 feet, and on June 23, 1905, after a public hearing, a plan was adopted reducing the width of this street from 150 feet to 100 feet, between Hoyt and Winthrop avenues, this width agreeing with that of the street south of Hoyt avenue. The owners of the abutting property are very anxious to improve this street at their exowners of the abutting property are very anxious to improve this street at their expense under private contract, but upon investigation it was found that directly in the centre of the street as now laid out there are several large gas mains. I am also advised that a franchise already exists for the laying of a double-track surface railroad in this street. To place this railroad immediately over the gas mains would probably be unwise; to change the locations of the gas mains would be difficult and would require a long time. The East River Land Company, owning most of the abutting property on both sides of the street, in order to expedite this improvement, has asked for the shifting of these lines 25 feet eastwardly, and if this were done the large gas mains in the street would occupy the same position relative to the street lines that they do south of Hoyt avenue. The connection with the portion of the street south of Hoyt avenue will be as advantageous if the lines are changed as it is at present, and inasmuch as the abutting owners appear to favor the plan I can see no objection, and it is recommended that the plan submitted be approved after the necessary public hearing.
