POLICE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1907.

Police Department of the City of New York,
Office of the Commissioner, No. 300 Mulberry Street,
New York, April 1, 1907.

His Honor the Mayor, City Hall, New York:

Sir—As required by section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending March 31, 1907:

On March 31, the total force was 9,173. In addition, there were on probation 64 Patrolmen, 6 Doormen and one Matron.

The effective force on March 31 was 8,669, 35 being absent with leave, 236 sick, 10 suspended, I absent without leave and 222 detailed.

During the last quarter the losses in the several ranks were as follows:
Retired—I Sergeant; 3 Detective Sergeants, I Roundsman, 41 Patrolmen, making a total in all ranks of 46.
Died—2 Sergeants, I Roundsman, 21 Patrolmen and I Doorman, making a total in all ranks of 25.
Dismissed—9 Patrolmen, 3 Patrolmen on probation, making a total in all ranks

Resigned—II Patrolmen, 5 Patrolmen on probation, I Doorman on probation, making a total in all ranks of 17.

At the beginning of the year there were five vacancies for Inspector, which were filled by the promotion of as many Captains. Promotions were also made to fill the vacancies in the ranks of Roundsman and Sergeant.

Following the policy of restricting the number and curtailing unwholesome activations.

ity of Special Patrolmen, many of their appointments have been revoked, and for the remainder more rigid rules are now in force.

The annual report of the Police Department for 1906 complete, was forwarded to his Honor the Mayor on January 3. I am informed that this is the first time this report has been so promptly forwarded.

The Budget for 1907 having made provision for two additional Police Surgeons, these were appointed from the eligible list of the Civil Service Commission on January

A new inspection district, the Fifteenth, was established in Brooklyn on January 4. This was rendered necessary by the increased growth of the City, and the condensation of population in that locality.

On January 7, a letter was written to his Honor the Mayor, making certain recommendations by the Police Department looking to an entire reorganization of the Detective Bureau, and suggesting other changes. Since that date the said recommendations have been formulated into legislation, which has passed the Assembly and is now pending in the Senate at Albany.

On January 26, the new form of consolidated morning report for the Police Force

At 2 a. m., on Sunday, January 27, a new and so-called "five-platoon system" for patrol work went into effect. This system puts 20 per cent. of the force on duty in the day time, 40 per cent. on patrol during the night, and provides for a continuous

reserve of 20 per cent. The work of the men is so arranged as to be continuous; the off time is also continuous and the men get one day off in five. This system is regarded as the possible limit of reduction in hours of work for the men consonant with the work required of them by the City.

On January 31, the Brooklyn Citizens' Medal for Valor for 1905 was presented by the Police Commissioner to Patrolman Edward J. Quinn, of the Forty-sixth Precinct, at the Borough Hall, Brooklyn.

During the month of February plans were begun and well advanced for the construction of two new station houses; one in the First Precinct (Old slip), and the other in the Second Precinct. For the latter precinct a new site has been obtained by the City, being Nos. 156 and 158 Greenwich street, and Nos. 163 and 165 Washington street, the lot being about 50 by 216 feet, and running through from street to street.

On February 18, two prisoners escaped from the cells at Police Headquarters at No. 300 Mulberry street. One of them was recaptured, but the other is still at large. This calls attention to the insecurity of arrangements for keeping prisoners at Headquarters, and steps have been taken to remedy this.

Owing to the growth of the City and the increased condensation of population, it will be necessary to divide the old Nineteenth Precinct, the Thirty-first Precinct and the Sixty-eighth Precinct in Brooklyn. Steps are being taken to secure quarters for a new station house in each case. This will enable police work to be better done in each of those localities.

It was discovered several months ago that the Executive Clerk to the Commissioner owed considerable money, which he borrowed from various members of the Department and the force. Nothing criminal appeared, however, and as this Clerk was officially competent, nothing was done further than to have him watched. On March 13, the amount of his borrowings was discovered to be so great that he was dismissed and the matter was at once placed in the hands of the District Attorney for investigation.

Steps were taken to render more efficient the men on bicycle duty by transferring the men whose work was not satisfactory and by the careful selection of new men who were required to pass a certain test as to speed and proficiency with their wheels.

In March of this year, special elections were held in the Fifteenth Assembly District, New York County, and in the Fourteenth Assembly District, Kings County, for both of which the customary police services were rendered from the day of registration to the day of election.

The drills of the force in anticipation of the annual parade were begun in March. The 600 men to be added to the force this spring are being appointed as rapidly as a thorough preliminary training for each man will permit, the School of Instruction turning out each month a squad as large as it is practicable to handle at one tion turning out each month a squad as large as it is practicable to handle at one time, averaging from 150 to 200 men.

During the past winter the men were provided with caps instead of the former helmets, and the rough weather justified this change. For the summer season, however, it has been deemed advisable that the men should wear light summer helmets as in

the past.

Sick Time.

The number of lost children received by the Department and disposed of is given in the schedule marked "C."

House of Detention.

The particulars regarding witnesses confined in the House of Detention are given in the schedule annexed marked "D."

Disposition of Property Coming into the Hands of the Police.

Figures showing the value of lost or stolen property recovered and returned to owners, transactions of Property Clerk's office, etc., will be found in the schedule annexed marked "E."

Sanitary Company.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company (Steam Boiler Squad) for the quarter will be found in the schedule annexed marked "F."

Discipline.

The annexed schedule, marked "G," gives in brief a record of disciplinary trans-actions concerning members of the force for the quarter.

Licenses.

The number and character of licenses issued during the quarter, the fees received and the number of applications for licenses denied, will be found in the Schedule annexed marked "H."

Detective Bureau.

The work accomplished by the Detective Bureau during the quarter is shown in the schedule annexed marked "I."

Deaths. The names of the members of the force who died during the quarter, with the date of death, the rank of each and the command to which he was attached at the time of his death, are in the schedule annexed marked "J."

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the Company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within two months thereafter make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, to determine if said railroad ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, unless the period shall be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Seventeenth—All cars which are operated on said railroad shall be equipped with both hand and power brakes.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
