### Borough of Brooklyn.

Report for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1911.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, The City of New York:

Dear Sir—In accordance with section 1544 of the Charter, the following report is submitted showing operations of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the quarter ending March 31, 1911.

The expense of General Administration and the various Bureaus for the quarter were as follows:

The total mileage of pavements in the Borough on March 31, 1911, was 726,732, of which 397,511 miles were asphalt, 141,708 granite block, 26,031 Belgian block, 27,324 asphalt block, 110,153 macadam, 9,405 cobble, and in addition, wood, iron slag, etc. Considerable work was also done in repairs to macadam and unimproved roads; also in sprinkling roadways with oil and water.

The Bureau of Highways entered into 46 contracts during the quarter, chargeable against the Street Improvement Fund, amounting to \$258,974.70, and 11 contracts chargeable to the Repaving Bond Fund, amounting to \$86,572.10. Receipts on security deposits amounted to \$3,500, with refunds totalling \$4,150. On January 1, 1911, there was a credit balance of \$38,900, and, with refunds made, brought credit balance to March 31, 1911, to \$38,250. This Bureau received \$8,657.37 from the railroad companies for work of paving on railroad streets, where the City performed the work and submitted bills to the corporations for payment. In addition, there has been collected by the Corporation Counsel and transmitted by him direct to the Comptroller the amount of \$11,680.96, and \$65.36 was transmitted by the office of the Borough President, and these items have been credited to the "Repaving" Account C-PB-32.

In addition to 57 contracts registered and entered into for street improvements, at a total of \$345,546.80, there were 4 contracts for supplies and materials for repairs aggregating \$18,607.

There were 27 contracts for regulating, grading and curbing and sidewalks, at a total of \$129,956.73.

Assessment lists to the number of 14 for regulating, grading, sidewalks and paving were made, involving an amount of \$104,391.99, and in addition there were 70 assessment jobs in various stages of completion.

Eighty-seven preliminary estimates for original improvements for local Board action were prepared for regulating, grading, curbing, laying sidewalks, and paving, at an estimated cost of \$663,965, and 36 estimates for grading lots, fencing and laying sidewalks.

The connection gangs repaired 7,381 square yards of various kinds of pavements, and 8,503 square yards were repaired by the repair gangs; bluestone walks, 24,294 square feet; cement walks, 1,923 square feet, in addition to curb and bridging reset by sidewalk gangs, and 2,734 dangerous holes made safe by the emergency gangs.

It might be a most appropriate time to call attention to the fact that fully one-half of all complaints received related to defective conditions existing on flagged walks. During last year an average force of about fifteen flaggers was continued practically all season, and it was impossible to make needed repairs as fast as complaints accumulated. Precedence was given, of course, to such walks as were, on inspection, found to be in a dangerous condition and to defective walks on important thoroughfares. It is estimated that about 60,000,000 square feet of sidewalks are laid in this Borough, of which 11,000,000 square feet are cement.

It is reasonable to state that one-half, or about 25,000,000 square feet is in an unsatisfactory condition, but not considered dangerous or unsafe.

A half-million square feet of repairs a year will no more than even the deterioration of the flagged walks in existence, leaving the general condition of affairs unchanged.

It is hopeless, under the present method, to attempt to improve the condition of sidewalks in the Borough, and the only effective way to produce lasting improvements is either to make the property owners maintain the sidewalks or to include them in the repaving contracts undertaken by the City.

During the quarter the Asphalt Plant laid 19,427.70 cubic feet of wearing surface mixture, and 4,631.25 cubic feet of binder mixture. The total product of the plant for the quarter was 2,953 boxes of wearing surface mixture and 720 boxes of binder mixture.

While the necessity for a Municipal Asphalt Plant is too well known to admit of question, much having heretofore been written on the subject, I take pleasure in the record it has established here for efficiency and the results obtained to insure prompt restoration of street pavements. The fame of the plant has been heralded throughout the country, and the Borough of Manhattan is looking forward to the construction of an asphalt plant there as a solution of their street pavement problem.

### Bureau of Buildings.

Violations of the Building Law were: 229 for defective plumbing and drainage; 1,260 for defective construction and materials; 221 for erecting and altering without permit, and 45 for unsafe buildings.

Notices were issued to remove violations of law to the number of 1,710; to remove unsafe buildings 52, and to repair passenger elevators 45.

Complaints to the number of 68 were received and upon investigation were remedied, except in some instances where complaints were unfounded.

Passenger elevators to the number of 1,983 were inspected and 45 were found not in compliance with the law.

During the quarter 440 plans were filed, affecting 816 buildings, the estimated cost of which is \$5,069,540. Of the number, 19 applications were for 29 tenement houses, costing between \$20,000 and \$50,000; 90 applications for 303 buildings (dwelling houses), estimated cost less than \$20,000; 24 were for 78 tenement houses, estimated cost less than \$20,000; 32 were for 71 stores and two-family

houses, at a total of \$384,000; 94 were for 146 buildings (frame dwellings), at a total cost of \$470,650, in addition to various others.

There were applications filed for alterations to buildings to the number of 1,560 buildings. There were 122 tenements affected, 482 frame buildings, 121 dwellings, and others of a miscellaneous nature.

During the quarter 488 tenement houses were inspected as to plumbing and drainage, and 6,107 miscellaneous buildings inspected as to plumbing and drainage, and the total number of buildings inspected was 17,353.

Twenty-nine buildings, unsafe, were taken down or made safe.

### Division of Substructures.

The operations of this Division were confined to a section of the Borough south of the Navy Yard, bounded by Washington ave. on the east, Lafayette ave. on the south, and Hudson st. on the west. Data and information were furnished from record maps of the Division to the Board of Water Supply in work of selecting economical routes for installation of the large distribution mains (a part of the Catskill Water Supply System). These mains will be installed through about 11 miles of the Borough streets.

A new route has been determined upon for the underground cables maintained and operated by the Postal Telegraph and Cable Co. as a part of their Trans-Atlantic service. The present cable, after leaving Manhattan Beach, is in the way of the improvement of Jamaica Bay, and under the new arrangement this trans-Atlantic cable will leave our shore from Far Rockaway.

### Bureau of Sewers.

During the quarter 21,134.1 linear feet of sewers, of all sizes, were laid, or an equivalent of 4.003 miles. Of this amount, 337.3 linear feet, or 0.064 miles, were reconstructed; the mileage of the Borough was increased by 3,939 miles, which added to the mileage of the sewerage system on January 1, 1911, 854.92, makes the mileage on March 31, 1911, 858.881.

Fifteen thousand five hundred thirty-seven and eight-six one hundred linear feet of 6-inch house connections, or an equivalent of 2.943 miles, were built. The amount of 6-inch house connections built under the jurisdiction of this Department since this system was inaugurated to the close of the quarter is 57,418 miles.

The number of basins built during the quarter was 84. The number now connected with the sewerage system is 10,714.

There were 47 improvements, aggregating an estimated cost of \$463,900, authorized by the Board of Estimate, to be prepared under preliminary authorization.

Seventy-one (71) reports were made, to precede paving, in addition to reports in response to petitions for sewers. Thirty-two (32) were to precede paving, amounting to \$158,050, and the remainder for sewers petitioned for, at a total of \$1,624,900.

Twenty-eight (28) contracts, amounting to \$158,466.98, were completed, and assessment lists were prepared and forwarded to the Board of Assessors. Thirty-four (34) contracts, amounting to \$414,551.65, have been completed, and lists for same will shortly be transmitted to the Board of Assessors.

Permits were issued to make new con-

nections with 544 houses, and 233 permits for repairs to house connections.

Fourteen thousand two hundred ninety-three basins were examined, and 7,017 basins cleaned. The amount of deposit removed was 7,546 cubic yards. The number of feet of lateral sewers examined was 821,695, and 627,820 linear feet were cleaned. The linear feet of large brick sewers cleaned were 1,985, and 1,151 cubic yards of deposit removed. At Caisson No. 2, Sewage Disposal Works, there were pumped 173,348,220 gallons; at Caisson No. 3, 72,029,179 gallons; at Caisson No. 4, 155,272,135 gallons; at Twenty-sixth Wards Disposal Works, 917,240,400 gallons.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

The report of the Superintendent of this Bureau sets forth in detail the work done by this Bureau in the past quarter, showing the number of orders drawn for various Bureaus, statement of moneys expended for supplies and repairs, statement of contracts completed and work done in caring for the various public buildings, court houses, baths, etc., under his jurisdiction.

Contracts to the amount of \$46,413.19 for fuel, egg coal, etc., were entered into.

Work on the construction and equipment of the Municipal Bath House, at Concourse drive and W. 5th st., Coney Island, under contract with the Northeastern Construction Co., is progressing to the satisfaction of the Borough officials. During the first quarter \$2,124.50 was expended on this contract for payment of architects' services.

#### Topographical Bureau.

This Bureau makes surveys, prepares plans and profiles for all original work undertaken by the Bureau of Highways,

determines for all contracts let by that Bureau the amount of excavation, fill, linear feet of curbing, square feet of sidewalks, number of cubic yards of concrete, number of square yards of asphalt, and to furnish contractors with line stakes, grade stakes and monthly estimate. Also does work for use of local Boards, Board of Estimate, Corporation Counsel, and various other departments of the City.

The work of the Topographical Bureau consists of matters relating to the determination, preservation and changes in lines and elevations of public streets, parks, etc.; the preparation of maps for legal opening of streets, maintenance of lines, monuments, records, etc.

Eighty three thousand eight hundred twenty-four feet of profile for regulating, grading, etc., were made for 53 streets; 48,306 feet of line and grade stakes were set for 35 streets; 31,696 feet of damage surveys for five streets.

In addition to the field work a considerable number of maps were prepared and forwarded (office work), showing changes in street lines, closing and laying out streets, maps for filing, maps affecting changes in the established elevations of streets, general sketches for special reports, copies of maps previously prepared and forwarded, and maps showing encroachments on streets, prepared for the Bureau of Incumbrances.

There were 50 plans and profiles, affecting 50 streets, having a total length of 69,483 feet, or 13.348 miles, prepared for regulating, grading, etc., in addition to an extensive amount of work accomplished by the field force.

#### Bookkeeper.

The General Bookkeeper's report shows in detail the financial transactions of the several Bureaus under this Department.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereof at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there,
