DEPARTMENT OF PLANT AND STRUCTURES.

REPORT FOR QUARTER ENDED MARCH 31, 1916.

This quarter saw the beginning of the centrally controlled automobile service now being directed and managed by this department. The central service was started for the purpose of increasing the efficiency of the city's motor service and to bring about economies in the cost of transportation and in the maintenance and repair of transportation vehicles.

The following is a summary of the service provided by the Municipal Garage during the quarter to the departments having an appropriation of service hours provided in the budget for 1917.

Total calls served all departments, 4,483; total calls requisitioned but not served all departments, 141; percentage of calls not served, 3.15; total number of service hours rendered: At 40 cents, 6,750 5-6; at \$1, 2,209 1-12; at \$1.60, 14,616 11-12.

Percentage of allowance for 1916, exhausted by various departments: Parks, Manhattan and Richmond, 12.51; Parks, Brooklyn, 43; Parks, Bronx, 18.37; Parks, Queens, 35.12; Bridges, 9.48; Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, 32.11; Health, 30.70; Docks and Ferries, 13.05; Correction, 11.13; Licenses, 33.44; Taxes and Assessments, 1.57; Tenement House, 7.44; Fire, 10.93; Police, 16.03; Street Cleaning, 48.78; Commissioners of Accounts, 10.61; Board of Assessors, 5.46; Weights and Measures, 97.59; Public Charities, 17.58; Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, 15.51.

Motor equipment from the departments having an appropriation for hours of service in the 1917 budget was to have been turned over by January 1. As a matter of fact the early operation of the new service was hampered by the failure of the departments included to make the transfer of equipment promptly. One of the features tending toward economy of operation made possible by the Municipal Garage is the standardizing of equipment. Of the eighty-two cars turned over by the various departments there were twenty-three different makes. Plans were prepared during this quarter for putting into effect the provision of the budget calling for the purchase of

twenty standard touring cars of a single type and of thirty-four standard smaller cars, part to be touring cars and part runabouts. During the quarter the Garage operated fifty-eight cars with forty-two chauffeurs. Thirteen cars were driven by their users and were assigned to the Department of Parks of Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens.

REPAIR OF ROADWAYS.

On March 17 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated \$144,000 as requested by this department on Oct. 25, 1915, for the permanent reconstruction and repair of the roadway of the Queensboro Bridge. The plan as approved by the Board contemplated the removal of the trolley tracks of the New York and Queens County Railway Company from the roadway and the transfer of operation to the tracks laid on the outer brackets of the bridge. The plan of the department for reconstructing the pavement contemplated the design of a new foundation formed by a combination of timber planking and Portland cement concrete with creosoted wood-block laid directly on the foundation. It further contemplated the re-enforcing of the buckle plates by the riveting of angles to the unsupported fillet of the plate. It is planned that the holes in the inverts of the plates shall be utilized to drain off any water that may reach the underside of the woodblock.

A request of \$60,000 in corporate stock was made on April 11, for the purpose of repairing the roadway approaches of the Williamsburg Bridge. These approaches were originally laid with macadam sandstone. The pavement has deteriorated very greatly and is in need of repair.

Also on Feb. 11 a request for \$70,000 corporate stock was made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of reconstructing the pavement of the main span of the Brooklyn Bridge. This pavement now consists of spruce plank laid on a timber underdeck. It is the plan of the department to lay a woodblock pavement to conform to the design of experimental sections which have been in use on the bridge for two years and have proved successful and economical.

DIVISION OF DESIGN.

Conducted an investigation of stresses for the proposed operation of two elevated railroads and other traffic on the Queensboro Bridge. In addition, studies were made for contemplated changes in roadway and in surface car operation.

Plans for the completion of the Manhattan Terminal of Manhattan Bridge were carried to an advanced stage.

A large amount of time was consumed in checking the shop detail drawings for the structural steel and for foundation and granite plans in connection with the construction of the New Unionport Bridge.

Plans were prepared giving the location, elevations and data connecting the proposed Eastchester Bridge with the surrounding streets. Two separate location plans were prepared for the War Department. Property maps were also prepared showing the assessed valuation of land, etc.

For the Vernon Avenue Bridge specifications were prepared for new rolling segments to be used while the bridge is being repaired.

In addition, traffic counts on all bridges were taken for the year 1915. Numerous maps, plans, etc., were prepared.

BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

On Jan. 16 the operation by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system of Bay Ridge trains across the Brooklyn Bridge was discontinued during all hours of the day and night, excepting a few hours directly after midnight. The bulk of the service was transferred directly to the Fourth Avenue Subway, thus crossing the Manhattan Bridge and proceeding to a terminal under the Municipal Building by way of the Centre Street Loop. In consequence of this transfer of service the number of trains operated across the Brooklyn Bridge has been decreased materially. Observations were taken during the morning rush hours on Jan. 25 and 26 and on March 20 and 22 of the trains operating to a sub-end terminal at the Brooklyn side of the Brooklyn Bridge and count being made of the passengers on these trains who were transferred at the Sands Street Station to other trains crossing the bridge. A special traffic count was also made from 6 a. m. to 10 p. m. of all people passing through the new subsurface connection between the Interborough Rapid Transit Subway Station at the Brooklyn Bridge and the Centre Street Loop Station at Chambers Street. This subsurface connection lies wholly within the basement of the Municipal Building and was opened to traffic by this department following the making of an agreement between the City and the operating companies for maintenance and operation.

A great variety of routine work falls upon the Brooklyn Bridge Division, in view of the fact that constant attention and care must be given the bridge. This work was satisfactorily performed without accident during the quarter. Only minor repairs were made to the elevated railroad tracks, these having been entirely relaid during the preceding period. On the east bound up grade tracks a few rails developed rough sections caused by burning when trains started suddenly and occasioning some slight repairs. Numerous repairs, generally with short rails, were made to the trolley tracks. This track work is in bad condition, many of the rails are low, numerous joints are open and some of the track is out of alignment as a result of the breaking of tie rods and the loosening of spikes.

The contract for installing the corrugated iron roofing over the new storeroom, chauffeurs' room and office of the Municipal Garage was completed January 27. The new all steel roof over the easterly portion of the present garage was also completed; the steam heating pipes being shifted and the old wooden roof removed. Work was started on Jan. 27 and completed Feb. 10 on the contract for about one thousand square yards of cement paving in the old coal yard adjoining the Garage to be used as an extension to the present Garage. Work was started immediately following the tenth on the removal of knee braces and the erection of hangers, rafters and purlins for a new steel roof over this area.

QUEENSBORO BRIDGE.

There was a notable increase in the number of passengers using the elevators at Vernon Ave., which provide access to the surface cars operating on the outer tracks of the bridge. The following table shows the traffic by months compared with the corresponding quarter of 1915:

The public market enclosure between 59th and 60th Sts. and First Ave. and Avenue A, Manhattan, was completed. Work was started on Jan. 24 under permit of the Commissioners of Bridges, dated Dec. 17, 1915. Under permit of the Commissioner, dated Feb. 17, 1916, the Edison Electric Light Company installed wires and conduit for supplying power for the contractor. The work consisted of installing plumbing and draining systems on the 60th St. side, the erection of the steel work in all of the arches and aisle drainage system in the market and concrete work, etc.

MANHATTAN BRIDGE.

After many delays work proceeded effectually at the Manhattan Plaza. The parapet wall was finished, including the panel showing the Buffalo Hunt. No progress was made in laying No. 1 granite, delayed deliveries preventing the progress of this phase of the work. Stairs were completed on the east and west legs of the arches. The roof of the arch and colonnade were completed and were tiled.

The contract for the improvement of the Brooklyn Plaza was practically completed during the quarter with the exception of statuary yet to be erected in front of the pylons. All of the work provided for in the contract is done.

The contract for equipping the westerly upper deck of the bridge with tracks to be used by the Manhattan Bridge Three Cent Line was completed during the quarter and the operation of this service was transferred to the new rails.

WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE.

Work proceeded substantially in completing plans and specifications prepared to provide clearance for the new type ten foot wide cars to be operated over the bridge by the New York Municipal Railway Corporation. At the end of the quarter the bridge was practically ready for such operation.

At the beginning of the quarter the repainting of the structure was seventy-five per cent. complete. During the quarter this work was satisfactorily advanced in spite of the fact that many of the men were employed doing overtime work on snow removal. The bottom deck for the entire west half of the main span and one-half of the bottom deck of the New York Land Span were painted.

The contract for constructing additional entrances to the Bedford Avenue Trolley Station was let to the H. E. Fox Construction Company and was nearly completed. The cutting through of brick walls necessary in order to construct tunnels and a stairway to Driggs Avenue was completed. On March 31st, 82.4 per cent. of the work was finished.

BROOKLYN, QUEENS AND RICHMOND BRIDGES.

At the Hamilton Ave. Bridge on Feb. 4, the armor and insulation on the submarine cable were destroyed due to the passage of a vessel of excessive draft. The cable is required to operate the easterly leaf of the bridge from the operators' house on the westerly abutment. It was necessary to assign extra bridge tenders to this structure and to operate the leaves separately until a new cable was installed and put into service on Feb. 22.

At the Washington Avenue Bridge work is in progress for strengthening the roadway floor in order that it may be adequate to meet the increased weight of the bridge traffic.

On March 11 a portion of a shoe plate at the Vernon Avenue Bridge broke loose from the southeasterly rolling segment or rocker.

HARLEM RIVER DIVISION.

At the Willis Ave. Bridge practically all of the structural changes proposed in connection with the new surface car operation and also the roadway repairs necessary were completed with the exception of some work at the intersection of the Southern Boulevard and the Willis Avenue Approaches. All of the track was laid with the exception of the section here mentioned. The overhead work was finished from 125th Street to 134th Street, and poles were erected on the Southern Boulevard Approach. The new pavement in the southbound track on the main bridge and also in the approaches has been laid. Paving work in the northbound track and between the tracks from the south rest pier to the Southern Boulevard Approach is also completed. A large percentage of the pavement between the eastbound track on the Southern Boulevard Approach has been laid. Contractors working for the Union Railway Company paved a portion of the Bronx Approach from the northbound track to the east curb, between piers 9 and 13.

Under date of Jan. 17, 1916, Rodgers & Hagerty, Inc., entered into a contract with the City to construct a new Unionport Bridge over Westchester Creek. On Jan. 23 the Company landed a lighter at the site and began work. This continued until Jan. 27, after which date no progress was made by the contractors up to the end of this quarter.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED JUNE 30, 1916.

The authorized strength of the police force at the end of the quarter, in all ranks, was 10,849. There were on the rolls, June 30, 1916, in all ranks, a total of 10,605. The following changes occurred in the personnel of the force during the quarter: Retired on application, 3 Captains, 5 Lieutenants, 1 Sergeant, 22 Patrolmen; retired on Surgeons' certificate, 1 Sergeant, 19 Patrolmen; died, 4 Lieutenants, 1 Sergeant, 12 Patrolmen; dismissed, 10 Patrolmen; resigned, 6 Patrolmen, 2 Patrolmen on probation, 1 Matron; dropped from rolls, 1 Patrolman; reinstated, 2 Patrolmen; appointed, 53 Patrolmen on probation; promoted, Lieutenant to Captain, 3; Patrolman to Sergeant, 24.

The personnel of the Department, other than members of the Force, numbered 309 on March 31, and 306 on June 30, 1916.

During the quarter the Medical Officers (Surgeons) of the Department made an aggregate of 12,130 visits to members of the Force absent through sickness, an aggregate of 22,644 days. They made 115 physical examinations of candidates for appointment, and examined 39 members of the force seeking retirement, 22 of whom were found disabled through physical disabilities.

During the quarter a total of 532 disciplinary charges were preferred against members of the Force, and 666 charges were disposed of (including charges pending at the beginning of the quarter). Of these seventeen were filed, in 63 cases the charges were dismissed, reprimands were given in 337 cases, and in 240 cases fines were inflicted, while 9 charges resulted in dismissal from the Department.

The Motorcycle Squad served 4,777 summonses during the quarter.

The total receipts from licenses during the quarter were \$682.50.

A total of 1,308 persons, residents of the City, were reported missing. Inquiries

from outside the City were received concerning 357 missing persons, who, it was supposed, might be in the City. Of those so reported during the current year there were located during this quarter (including those who returned home), 983 residents and 183 non-residents.

The Property Clerk received during the quarter a total of 2,481 lots of lost, stolen or abandoned property and condemned Department property. The estimated total value of property delivered by the Department to claimants during the quarter was \$386,412.41.

There were 398 horses examined on March 31, and 376 on hand on June 30. The Steam Boiler Squad handled during the quarter 3,389 Engineers and 265 Firemen, and tested 3,704 steam boilers.

During the quarter 33 original applications for pension and 8 for relief were granted. Five original applications and one increase application, and one application for relief were denied.

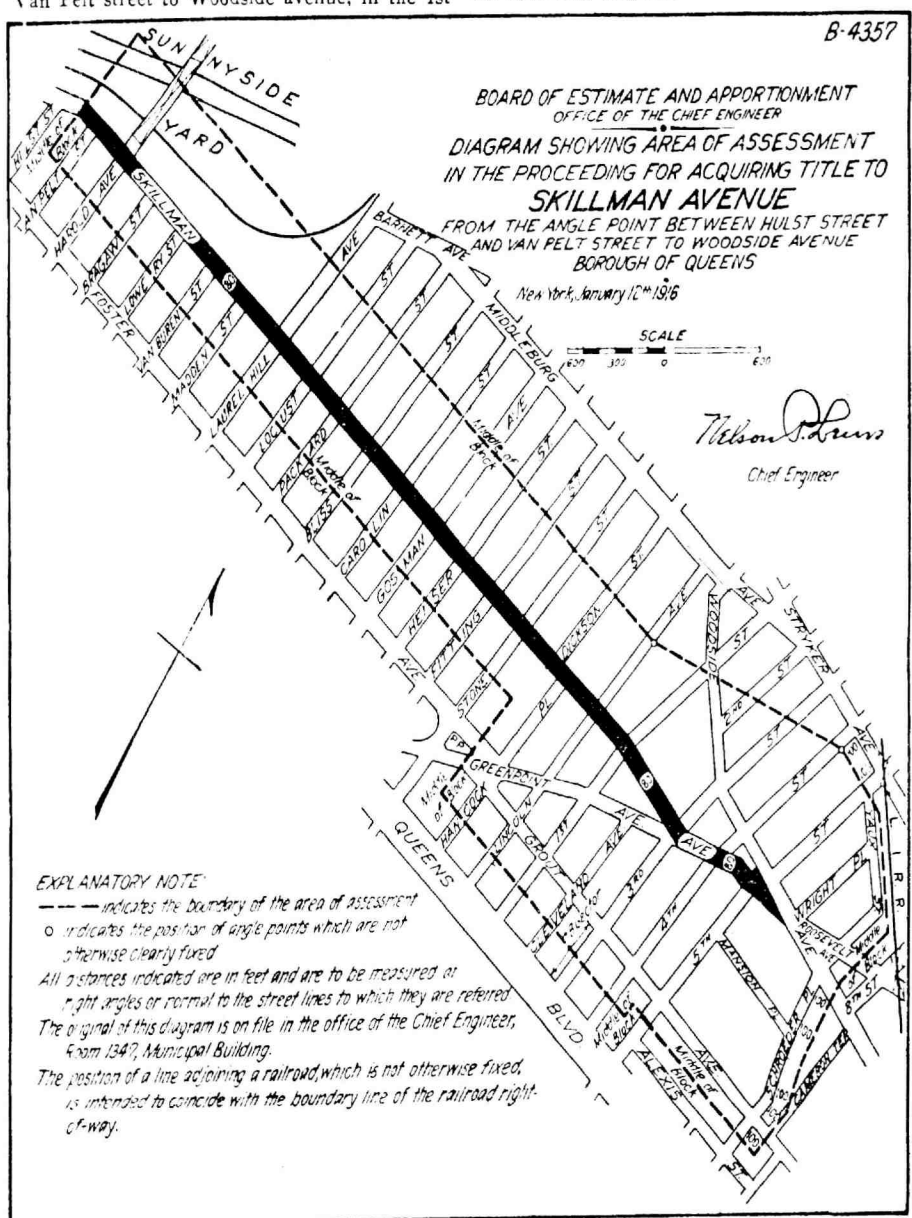

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void or nullify and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
