## Building Districts and Restrictions.

In the Matter of the Adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of

(1) Regulating and limiting throughout the City of New York the heights and bulk of buildings hereafter erected and regulating and determining the area of yards, courts and other open spaces, and dividing the City into districts to carry out the purposes of said regulations, pursuant to the provisions of Section 242a of the Greater New York Charter, and

(2) Regulating and restricting throughout the City of New York the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, and dividing the City into districts to carry out the purposes of said regulations pursuant to the provisions of Section 242b of the Greater New York Charter.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to all persons interested in the above entitled matters, and to the owners, lessees and occupants of all buildings and lots, and improved and unimproved lands within the City of New York, and to all others whom it may concern, to wit:

First—The Commission duly appointed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of Sections 242a and 242b of the Greater New York Charter, have filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment their FINAL RE-PORT containing, among other matters, a proposed resolution designed to provide the above described regulations. This report will be open to the inspection of the public during office hours, in the office of the Secretary of the Committee on City Plan of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Room 501, Municipal Building, until June 19, 1916.

Second-The Board of Estimate and Apportionment will hold a public hearing on the FINAL REPORT AND PLANS submitted by said Commission, at 10:30 a. m. on JUNE 19, 1916, in Room 16 of the City Hall, at which time and place an opportunity to be heard will be afforded to all persons interested.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held May 31, 1916, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Section 144 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended and made to read as follows:

Section 144. Cooking, eating and drinking utensils to be properly cleansed after being used. All utensils used in the preparation, service and sale of any food or drink intended for human consumption shall be properly cleansed after being used, and no such utensil shall, under any circumstances, be used a second time unless it shall have been, after the previous use thereof, so cleansed. In such cleansing the use of water which has become insanitary by previous use is

prohibited. The term "properly cleansed" as herein used shall be taken to mean cleansing after each use in a solution of soap powder or soda in hot water and the employment of friction supplied by means of a brush r other suitable implement, followed by rinsing in clean hot water; by sterilization; or by some other equally effective method.





Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the separate of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expira-

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any clier person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of A'dermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other efficet of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as conbecome interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any porton of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated because are in all perpents true. herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the adver-tisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of of the Greater New York Charter.
