 $\rm DEAR$ SIR —I have the honor to make the following report of labor performed by inmates of this Institution during the quarter ending September 30, 1880.

OUT-DOOR IMPROVEMENT.

Digging and screening sand for new wing and loading sand for Blackwell's Island; unloading and carting ice and gas coal for both institutions; unloading brick and lumber for new wing; cultivating farm; digging, cleaning, and housing vegetables; repairing and grading paths and roads; screening and carting ashes; digging up sewer-pipes; keeping roads, paths and walks in order and repair.

CARPENTERS' DEPARTMENT.

Making stairs for annex fire-room, three new doors and water-closets for annex, and changing all locks in same building; repairs to floors, walls, and wainscots in Wards L and M; repairing wagon and making new rungs, standards, and booms for coal carts, new gate to horse lot, new racks for kitchen ice box, new fence to workhouse water-closet, new backs for masons' and painters' ladders, 542 teet of new moulding for 46 windows, 50 feet of new shed for hog-pen, 10 new water pail stands for wards, new shelves in washhouse, and partition in hospital; fences repaired around exercise yard; general repairs to locks, doors, and windows throughout the institution.

PAINTERS' DEPARTMENT.

Painting 26 iron bedsteads ; varnishing and painting Wards A, B, D, K, G, I L, and M ; painting bath-tubs in wards of main building and annex ; nine new water pail stands painted ; general work in wards ; putting in 240 panes of glass.

MASONS' DEPARTMENT.

Relaying flags in annex cellar; repairing walls in Wards in E, B, M, N, and D; whitewashing and repairing cellings in Wards C, H, I, L, and M; walls scraped in Ward L; relaying flags in kitchen floor; steps reset at outer entrace of working wards door; walls and cellings washed, scraped, and repaired in attendants' dining-hall; iron bars set in pantry windows in Wards B and H; new register set in Ward H; pointing up joints of back portico; general mason work and repairs throughout building and cellars.

ENGINEERS' DEPARTMENT.

PLUMBERS' DEPARTMENT.

LABOR REPORT FOR THIRD QUARTER.
