

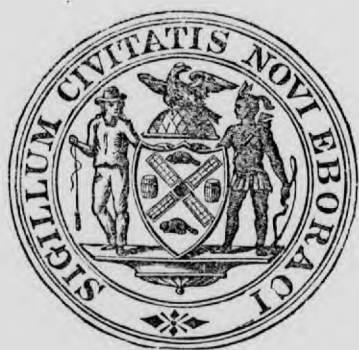

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Aug. 15, 1885.

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Common Council be and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause three hundred copies of all laws relating particularly to the City of New York, passed at the last session of the State Legislature, to be printed in the usual manner in document form, for the use of the offices of the Corporation and others, the expense, if any, of procuring copies of such laws not to exceed the usual fees, and to be paid by the Comptroller from the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 28, 1885.
Approved by the Mayor, August 10, 1885.

Resolved, That One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, from Twelfth avenue to the North river, be paved with trap-block pavement and that crosswalks be laid where required, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 28, 1885.
Approved by the Mayor, August 10, 1885.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 58 of article IV. of chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 58 of article IV. of chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, is hereby amended by inserting after the figure 58 the figure 1, and by striking out the compound word "twenty-five" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "one hundred," and by striking out all after the word "recovered" and inserting the following: "in an action by the City of New York against such person, agent, owner or employer in any court of competent jurisdiction, unless a permit shall be first obtained from the Registrar of Permits, upon the payment of a fee of one dollar and upon such conditions and with such security by bond or otherwise as may be approved by the Mayor, to save the city harmless from any loss that may occur, or damages that may be done while exercising the privilege granted in such permit."

"2. To persons, firms or corporations engaged in a business requiring the frequent or constant hoisting or lowering of merchandise or materials, the Registrar of Permits shall on the filing of such satisfactory security, to be approved by the Mayor as aforesaid, and on the payment of a fee of twenty-five dollars, grant a general permit to such person, firms or corporations permitting him or them to hoist, raise or lower the goods, property, merchandise or materials therein described, on the outside of any and all buildings, for the term of one year thereafter. Nothing in this subdivision contained shall affect the right in any case to obtain a single permit under subdivision 1."

"3. In every case it shall be the duty of all persons, firms or corporations while engaged in such hoisting or lowering over any sidewalk, roadway or public place, to give warning on such sidewalk, roadway or public place by two conspicuous flags or placards, on which shall be inscribed in letters, at least six inches long, the word 'danger.'

"For every failure to comply with this provision there shall be a penalty of twenty-five dollars, recoverable by the City of New York in any court of competent jurisdiction, against any person, firm or corporations guilty of such violation."

So that said section, when so amended, shall read as follows:

"Section 58. 1. No person or persons in the City of New York, whether agent, owner or employer, shall suffer or permit any cask, bale, bundle, box, crate, or any other goods, wares or merchandise, or any boards, planks, joists or other timber, or anything whatsoever, to be raised from any street, on the outside of any building, into any loft, store or room, or to be lowered from the same, on the outside of any building, by means of any rope, pulley, tackle or windlass, under the penalty of one hundred dollars, to be recovered in an action by the City of New York against such person, agent, owner or employer in any court of competent jurisdiction, unless a permit shall be first obtained from the Registrar of Permits, upon the payment of a fee of one dollar, and upon such conditions and with such security by bond or otherwise as may be approved by the Mayor, to save the city harmless from any loss that may occur or damages that may be done while exercising the privilege granted in such permit."

"2. To persons, firms or corporations engaged in a business requiring the frequent or constant hoisting or lowering of merchandise or materials, the Registrar of Permits shall, on the filing of such satisfactory security, to be approved by the Mayor as aforesaid, and on the payment of a fee of twenty-five dollars, grant a general permit to such person, firms or corporations, permitting him or them to hoist, raise or lower the goods, property, merchandise or materials therein described, on the outside of any and all buildings for the term of one year thereafter. Nothing in this subdivision contained shall affect the right in any case to obtain a single permit under subdivision 1."

"3. In every case it shall be the duty of all persons, firms or corporations while engaged in such hoisting or lowering over any sidewalk, roadway or public place, to give warning on such sidewalk, roadway or public place by two conspicuous flags or placards, on which shall be inscribed in letters, at least six inches long, the word 'danger.'

"For every failure to comply with this provision, there shall be a penalty of twenty-five dollars, recoverable by the City of New York in any court of competent jurisdiction, against any person, firm or corporations guilty of such violation."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 31, 1885.
Received from his Honor the Mayor, August 10, 1885, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Dreisacher & Co. to erect and keep an awning, of tin or other light metal, or canvas, in front of their premises, No. 2071 Third avenue; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 31, 1885.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, August 10, 1885, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to William Munnice to place and keep a stand for the sale of fruit, soda-water, sandwiches, etc., on the sidewalk, inside the railing, at the Forty-second street entrance to the distributing reservoir, provided such stand shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the street by the public, such permission to continue only for the 8th day of August, 1885.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 31, 1885.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, August 10, 1885, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to L. Hammel & Co. to place and keep a thermometer on the lamp-post in front of No. 35 Maiden Lane, to be about four feet high and eight inches wide; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 4, 1885.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, August 10, 1885, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to A. M. Hyatt to place and keep two stationary ash-boxes on the sidewalk, near the curb-line, in front of Nos. 778 and 780 Tenth avenue; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That on account of the death of General Grant, the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to properly drape and decorate the buildings in charge of his Department, at an expense not exceeding four thousand dollars, without public letting, and chargeable to the appropriation for "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices."

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 11, 1885.

Approved by the Mayor, August 14, 1885.

Whereas, On the day of the lamented General Grant's funeral, when the streets of our city were thronged with over two millions of human beings, the property and homes of our citizens were preserved in security, their comfort provided for, and the peace of the city maintained, through the masterly arrangements of the Board of Police Commissioners; and

Whereas, Through the able generalship of Superintendent Murray and the efficiency of the Police force, a line of over 250,000 persons was maintained in perfect discipline and marshaled in marching order on our public streets through the busiest hours of the day and night, without any suspension of travel or traffic, and without a single mishap or accident; and

Whereas, The funeral ceremonies of General Grant attracted hundreds of thousands of visitors to our city, and the disorder and crime usually incident to such an influx of strangers was averted by the energetic and discreet action of Inspector Byrnes and the force under him; and

Whereas, All of the facts recited in the foregoing preambles reflect the highest credit on the character and discipline of the Police force, and show that under its new regime the Police Department has reached a standard of efficiency hitherto unattained, and superior to that of any force in the world;

Resolved, That we formally tender to the Board of Police Commissioners, and through them to the Police force of the City of New York, our sincere thanks for the faithful manner in which they discharged their duties during the trying period of the reception and final interment of General Grant's remains; and that in thus conveying the thanks of the Common Council, we do so with the assurance that we voice the sentiment and hearty appreciation of the citizens of the City of New York.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be forwarded to the Board of Police Commissioners.

Resolved, That the Department of Public Works, for the artistic taste displayed and the expedition used in draping the City Hall and other public buildings; the Department of Street Cleaning for the activity evinced in cleaning and sprinkling the miles of public streets and avenues included in the route of the funeral procession, and the Department of Public Parks, for the executive ability and energy manifested in completing the tomb and practically adding another park to the number of our public places, by the improvement of that portion of Riverside Park in which the temporary tomb of General Grant is located, within less than the short period of two weeks, are also severally entitled to the unqualified praise of the municipal authorities, and we hereby, for ourselves, and in behalf of the people of this city, tender to each of the Departments above named that commendation and praise to which their invaluable services in this regard so pre-eminently entitle them.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks, held July 30, 1885.

Present—The full Board.

The Board met in Executive Session.

On motion of Commissioner Matthews the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That full power be given to the President and Commissioner Stark to make such changes in the working force of this Department as they may determine to be for the best interest thereof.

From Twombly & Co.—In reference to and stating that the bath located on the south side of the Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, obstructs the use of the slip thereat. The Dock Superintendent to be directed to examine and report.

From Wm. J. Rainer, Foreman of Floating Property—Inclosing physician's certificate as to his inability to perform his duties, and requesting a further leave of absence. Referred to Executive Session.

From Simon Stevens, attorney for private owners—Protesting against the continuance of the dump at Pier 12, East river, and asking that the slips between Piers 12 and 11 and between Piers 12 and 13 be dredged at the expense of the Department of Street Cleaning.

Whereas, The said Providence and Stonington Steamship Company have recently removed to Pier, new 36, North river, and do not require the further use of the premises in question, therefore be it

Resolved, That the permit heretofore on June 3, 1885, granted to the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company to use and occupy the said premises be revoked, and that permission be and hereby is granted to the Catskill Evening Line to use and occupy on and after August 1, instant, during the pleasure of the Board, the south side of Pier, old 33, North river, together with the platform adjoining the said premises, recently erected by the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company, provided they pay therefor compensation at the rate of \$7,500 per annum, to be paid quarterly in advance on the first days of August, November, February and May, during the period that this permit may remain in force, and also provided that all structures erected thereon shall revert to and become the property of the Corporation of the City of New York, upon the revocation or sooner termination of this permit.

The Secretary stated that the pay rolls for the month of July, 1885, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$7,407.31, and the pay rolls of the general repairs and construction force for the half month ending July 31, 1885, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$6,003.42, had been approved and audited and that he had forwarded the same, together with proper requisitions for the amounts, to the Finance Department for payment, his action was approved.

The following Watchmen were also suspended, to take effect on August 15, 1885: John Crandall, William Cringle, Michael Hens, Patrick McFadden, Terence McGough, Christopher Cassidy, Albert G. Lawson, John J. Murphy, Jr., and William Strowbridge.

Commissioner Stark offered the following resolutions redistricting the water-front of the city and assigning Dock Masters to the districts designated.

Resolved, That in order to provide for the proper supervision of the water-front of the city, and the care of the wharf property committed to the charge of this Department, and also for the prompt berthing of vessels thereat, and the collection of wharfage accruing for the use of the same, it is deemed advisable and proper that the water-front of the city of New York be and hereby is arranged and divided into eleven districts, as follows:

District No. 1, East river—From Castle Garden on the Battery to and including the west side of Pier 16 East river, Wall Street Ferry.

District No. 2, North river—From Castle Garden on the Battery to and including the north side of the ferry premises the foot of Desbrosses street, North river.

District No. 3, East river—From the west side of Pier 16 to and including Pier 45, East river.

District No. 4, North river—From the north side of the ferry premises at foot of Desbrosses street to and including the Pier at the foot of Thirteenth street, North river.

District No. 5, East river—From the east side of Pier 45, to and including Pier 69, at the foot of Tenth street, East river.

District No. 6, North river—From the north side of the Pier at Thirteenth street to and including the Pier at the foot of Thirty-fourth street, North river.

District No. 7, East river—From the north side of Pier 69, at the foot of Tenth street to and including the Pier at the foot of Fifty-fourth street, East river.

District No. 8, North river—From the north side of the Pier at Thirty-fourth street to and including the Pier at the foot of Fifty-seventh street, North river.

District No. 9, East river—From the north side of the Pier at Fifty-fourth street to and including the south side of Ninety-second street, East river.

District No. 10, North river—From the north side of Pier at foot of Fifty-seventh street to Yonkers, on the North river, and from Spuyten Duyvil Creek, North river, to Kingsbridge on the Harlem river.

District No. 11, East river—From the south side of Ninety-second street, East river, to and including Bronx river, and also Harlem river, from East river to Kingsbridge.

Resolved, That the assignment of Dock Master to each of the districts so designated be and is hereby made as follows:

District No. 1.—Charles H. Thompson.

District No. 2.—George W. Wamaker.

District No. 3.—Edward Abeel.

District No. 4.—John M. Smith.

District No. 5.—Eugene McCarthy.

District No. 6.—John W. Brown.

District No. 7.—Bernard Kenney.

District No. 8.—Joseph B. Erwin.

District No. 9.—Joseph F. Sharkey.

District No. 10.—Abram Duryee.

District No. 11.—John Callan.

Resolved, That each of the Dock Masters assigned to duty in the said districts so designated be and hereby are required and directed to file a bond in the penal sum of \$1,000, with sureties, to be approved by the President of the Board, conditioned for the faithful performance of their duties as such Dock Masters.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution take effect from and after August 8th instant.

On motion, it was also ordered that Henry C. Freeman, Clerk to Surveying Force, be transferred to serve as clerk to the Engineer-in-Chief, such transfer to take effect on August 15th instant.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

The actual mortality for the week ending August 1, 1885, was 824, which is 13.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.58 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,400,933.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN TO property-owners of the City of New York that, by the New York City Consolidated Act of 1882, among other matters relating to Croton water rates and affecting all properties liable for Croton water charges, is embraced the following, in "Title 2, Duties and Powers of the Department of Public Works as to Procuring and Distributing Water":

§ 350. The Commissioner of Public Works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents. * * * * *

Such rents shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings, respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water, said rents shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as provided by law.

It becomes my duty to state that on and after the first day of April, 1885, all extra charges, such as steam-engines, bakeries, barbers, bathing-tubs, boarding-houses, boarding-schools, building purposes, horses, horse-troughs, hotels, porter-houses, taverns, etc., printing offices, stone cutting or dressing, slaughter-houses, dyeing, water-closets and urinals, laundries, restaurants, soda fountains, extra families, oyster and coffee saloons, water by meter measurement, meters and meter setting, and all other purposes for which the use of Croton water is chargeable according to law, are liens, and unless paid on or before the 30th day of April next must be returned to the Clerk of Arrears, with the amount due on each lot.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
