SIR-There were 710 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 9, 1886, which is an increase of 72, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 33 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending January 2, 1886, was 682, which is 18.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.97 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,420,511.
