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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held February 25, 1875.

Present—Hon. William H. Wickham, Mayor; Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; and J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain.

On motion of the Recorder, the Mayor was appointed Chairman of this Board for the ensuing year.

The Comptroller submitted the following applications for water grants, which, on motion of the Recorder, were referred to the Counsel to the Corporation to investigate the title of the City to the premises for which said grants are applied for, viz.:

John S. Pierce, for grant of land under water, on the East river, between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets.

James Van Buren, for grant of land under water, on the East river, between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets.

L. S. Hargous, for grant of land under water, on Harlem river, between One Hundred and Twenty-first and One Hundred and Twenty-second streets.

W. F. Rowland, for grant of land under water, on Harlem river, south side of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, two hundred feet east of Fifth avenue.

Nicholas A. Lespinasse, for grant of land under water, on Harlem river, between One Hundred and Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets.

The application of the Board of Education for five lots of ground north side of East Sixty-seventh street, between Lexington and Third avenues, for Public School purposes, was received, and, on motion of the Recorder, referred to the Comptroller.

A communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks, stating that the Dock Department, "in order to proceed with its work of improving the water-front of the City, under the new plans adopted, is desirous to obtain possession of such portion of the water-front, the title of which is not vested in the Corporation, embraced in the district lying between Canal and Barrow streets, on the North river," and asking the approval of this Board for the purchase for and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, of 75 feet of bulkhead adjoining the northerly side of Pier No. 34, and the 50 feet of bulkhead north of Pier No. 36, North river, provided the same can be obtained at the price of \$200 per lineal foot.

On motion, the communication was laid on the table.

A communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to direct the Comptroller to prepare and issue Dock Bonds of the City of New York for one million dollars, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks.

Whereupon the Recorder moved that the said communication be referred to the Comptroller.

Pending the discussion of this motion, the Comptroller submitted the protest of William F. Morgan, contractor, 287 West street, New York, against the action of the Commissioners of Docks, in the matter of the proposals and award of contract for erecting sheds on new Piers Nos. 43 and 46, North river.

The Recorder objected to the reception of this protest, as it contained a very grave charge against the Commissioners of Docks; and moved that a copy of the protest be remitted to the said Commissioners. Which was adopted.

The discussion of the motion to refer the application of the Commissioners of Docks for the issue of Dock Bonds to the Comptroller, was resumed, when the Comptroller proceeded to give his views respecting this application, and protest, when the Chairman decided he was out of order.

The question was then taken on the motion of the Recorder to refer the application of the Commissioners of Docks for the issue of \$1,000,000 Dock Bonds to the Comptroller. Which was adopted, the Mayor, Recorder, and Chamberlain voting in the affirmative, and the Comptroller in the negative.

The Comptroller submitted the following preamble and resolution, viz.:

Whereas, By subdivision 1 of section 6 of chapter 574, Laws of 1871, it is provided that the Commissioners of the Department of Docks "shall possess such powers and perform

such duties * * * * * as shall be established and defined by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York;" and

Whereas, It is provided, by subdivision 8 of the same section, that "the annual expenses of said Board (of Commissioners of Docks), for rent, furniture, supplies, and compensation of Secretary and subordinate officers, clerks and agents, shall not exceed in the aggregate the sum of one hundred thousand dollars;" therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Docks be and they are hereby requested to furnish this Board with a statement of expenditures by them for the purposes above specified, for and during the year 1874; and also to inform this Board of the location of any building or offices they may have hired for the use of the Dock Department, and the amount of rent to be paid for the same annually, and the terms and conditions of the lease of the premises.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Docks be and they are hereby requested to furnish this Board with information as to their operations, on the following points, to wit:

1. A statement showing the cost of new piers built by the Department of Docks, and the rents received on each, with the percentage they yield annually on their cost respectively.

2. A statement of what piers, wharves, and docks are not rented, if any, and the reasons therefor.

3. A statement of rents of piers, wharves, and docks remaining uncollected, if any, and the reasons therefor.

4. A statement of expenditures in 1874, for work which has been performed according to the plan or plans for the improvement of the water-front, formerly adopted by this Board, under the provisions of subdivision 3 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, and what portion has been done by contract to the lowest bidder.

5. Whether any work has been performed in 1874, not embraced in the said plan or plans, and if so, the amount of expenditures therefor, and whether the same was done by contract or otherwise.

The Recorder moved the adoption of the preamble and resolutions.

The Comptroller proceeded to discuss the resolutions, and referred to the matter of receiving proposals at the various departments of the City Government, and the necessity of great care in accepting bids and awarding contracts. Large numbers came to the Comptroller for examination and approval that were seriously defective, giving him great trouble and occupying more or less of his time in ascertaining the character of the sureties offered. He stated that it had been said that he caused delay in the work of the Department of Docks, and made reference to the case of Pier No. 1, and was proceeding with his remarks when the Chairman decided that the Comptroller was out of order, as his statement referred to matters of a personal character.

After some further discussion the preamble and resolutions, on the motion of the Recorder, were adopted.
