To the President of the Board of Aldermen:

DEAR SIR—As Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Hall of Records Association, I beg to call your attention to the fact that a resolution for the issuance of Corporate Stock to the extent of \$2,250,000 for the purpose of a new Hall of Records Building is before your Body. The agitation for a Hall of Records began in November of 1896 and resulted in the passage by the Legislature in 1897 of the laws authorizing the erection of the building in question. As you are aware, the structure as planned will accommodate not only the Register's Office, but the County Clerk's Office, Tax Office, Surrogates' Office, Comptroller's Office and the Law Department of the City. The property-owners of New York, of whom three thousand of the most important are enrolled in our association, resent strongly the delay in connection with this matter. They feel that it not only inconveniences the public and vastly increases the burdens of the taxpayers, but also puts in jeopardy public documents of immeasurable value.

It seems unnecessary to recall the condition of the present Register's Office, with its property records overcrowded in an antiquated building, or the stagnation in the County Clerk's and Surrogates' offices, a menace to their valuable documents and a source of great inconvenience to all who are forced to do business in them. In fact, the conditions are simply intolerable, and the matter calls for immediate action, which will furnish relief. Having been successful in inducing the State authorities to appropriate the money, the City executives in co-operating in forwarding the plans, we now turn to you and ask you, without further delay, to pass the resolutions which will furnish the funds to insure the completion of the work.

There can be no valid reason why you should not vote in favor of this bond issue at once and relieve the City from the continuance of the expense and danger to which it is exposed by your inaction.

6. The Manhattan Railway Company shall place and maintain, at its own expense, proper and sufficient electric lights to light the street under said structure or bridge, to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies.

7. The Manhattan Railway Company shall keep said structure or bridge at all times in a safe and secure condition, and shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Highways to save The City of New York harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by the negligence of said company during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of erecting said structure or bridge.

Whereas, It has been ascertained and determined that, in the said portion of Morris avenue, south of East One Hundred and Seventy-second street, and for a considerable extent, there exists a swamp across which Morris avenue is in process of being regulated and graded, and it has been ascertained and determined after careful examination that the nature of the said swamp is such that there is a constant settling of material deposited therein along the line of said Morris avenue, through which the said sewer would have to be constructed, and that such settlement is likely to continue for a period of at least two years, subsequent to the completion of the regulating and grading of said Morris avenue at the said point; and

Whereas, It has been further ascertained that it would not be feasible to drive across said swamp for the foundation of the said sewer, for all of which reasons it is deemed advisable that the said sewer should not be constructed along said Morris avenue at the present time, since said construction might result in a total loss of the work through the breaking and sinking of the sewer if constructed; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of Sewers has recommended that the said portion of said sewer in Morris avenue be omitted from the work required of the contractor under the said contract, and that the rest of the sewer contemplated by the said contract having been finished to the satisfaction of the said Commissioner, of accepted by the City and the contractor be discharged from all obligations under said contract with respect to the said portion of the sewer in Morris avenue proposed to be omitted; and

Whereas, This Board did, in conformity with notice published, accord public hearing thereon, at which no person appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that compliance with said petition would be for the best interests of this city; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject-matter of the petition its prompt and favorable consideration and action.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board thereof, at its meeting held October 19, 1900, the petition of the Business Men's Association of Far Rockaway, in Fifth Ward of said Borough, that this Board recommend their desires for the adoption of a system of numbering houses, as a pre requisite to the obtaining of free postal delivery in said section, as therein set forth; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject-matter of the petition such prompt consideration and action as will cause favorable response to be made to the requirements of the petitioners and the residents in said section.

Communication received from Deputy Commissioner of Public Lighting, etc., of this Borough, dated October 16, 1900, as response to complaint of unsatisfactory public electric lighting of streets in and from Flushing into Little Neck, and lighting in Maspeth, and which contained the following:

"They (the company) now assure me that their plant is in perfect order, and there will be no further trouble."

—was read and placed on file; whereupon it was represented that no change for the better has taken place, which statement was ordered to be communicated back to the said Deputy Commissioner.

Communication from Long Island Railroad Company, dated October 1900, promising to give consideration in the matter of complaint as to its crossing at Atlantic Avenue and Union place, in Brooklyn Hills, being not sufficiently safeguarded, was read and filed.
