FROM JOHN C. SHAW, ATTORNEY AND COUNSELLOR AT LAW, Nos. 106 AND 108 FULTON STREET, New York, March 25, 1902.

To Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, No. 280 Broadway, City:

My Dear Mr. Grout—I send you a clipping from yesterday's World. Whoever got this idea in his mind must have been ignorant of the fact that the Harlem River waterway was condemned by the United States Government under special act of the Legislature. The only jurisdiction over this waterway is in the United States Government, and there is no power in any department of the city government to dike the Harlem River, except in accordance with these plans

If the people who are behind these plans mean that they want a bulkhead built aiong the Harlem River, it is in the power of the Dock Department to do so. The only legal plan that is now in existence for this neighborhood is what is known for the building of the Exterior street, which is a street 70 feet wide, laid under an

act of the Legislature passed in 1852, see Chapter 285. The City has conveyed all its lands behind this 70-foot street under various water

grants to various property owners, among whom is one of my clients, "Mary G.

Of course, it goes without saying that the City has no right to interfere with any of this so-called swamp land except through condemnation proceedings.

I should like to be heard on behalf of my client if the mater comes in any way officially before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

HARLEM BOAT CLUB MAY GET A PARK.

John E. Dear Sir-I beg to call your attention to the fact that on August 21, 1901, the Committee on Buildings of the Board of Education, opened bids and awarded a contract for the heating and ventilating work at the Wadleigh High School, which is now in course of construction at One Hundred and Fourteenth to One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, near Seventh avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for the sum of \$52,981.

This award was, on September 21, 1901, approved by the Board of Education (see Journal, pages 858-59), and requisition was made upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the above named sum. On October 15, 1901, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved of the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$74.544 for the payment of the above named heating contract, and also of a contract for \$21,563 for installing electric wiring, fixtures and electric bell system, etc., in the same building, and authorized the issue of stock to be made when authority therefor would have been obtained from the Municipal Assembly.

A contract for the main sewers and drains, known as Sanitary Contract No. 1, High School of Commerce, was awarded to John Spence for \$1,593, on November 13. 1901, and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 6. 1901, but has not, as I understand it, been presented or passed by the Board of Aldermen.

DEAR SIR-The following is a copy of letter handed to us by messenger from your

ofice: "At your request we will agree to cut the opening for dumb-waiters in The City Prison, as shown on plans, and do all the mason work in connection with the same for the sum of three hundred and sixty dollars (\$360), no bull-nose brick to be

used, however. We only do this to facilitate the work as the sum agreed on is less than cost. We also propose to cut the holes required for steam heating in steel walls of cells for fifty cents(50c.) each. The number of holes required in cells, we believe, is ninety-six (96) and not more than 11/8 inches in diameter; but in case more or less are required we have given you the estimate per hole."

We beg to state that we have examined into the question of the value of the work

to be done necessary for cutting nine openings in the dumb-waiter shaft looking into the cell blocks of the City Prison and we find that \$360 is a fair price for same.

In regard to the holes required for steam heating pipes in steel walls of cells to be cut, we believe that 50 cents each is a fair price for same, and we would recommend that you direct Messrs. P. J. Carlin & Co. to proceed with the work.

SIR—Hon. Thomas W. Hynes, Commissioner, Department of Correction, in communication under date of March 5, 1902, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requests that the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) be allowed, pursuant to the provisions of section 3 of chapter 626 of the Laws of 1896, chapter 642 of the Laws of 1897 and section 170 of the amended Greater New York Charter, for the

following work at the New City Prison: For cutting out openings for dumb-waiters at the City Prison, and all mason work in connection with same, and for cutting out the holes required in steel walls of cells, in connection with steam heating.

The Commissioner states that the number of holes to be cut in cells is uncertain; an amount somewhat greater than may be needed is asked for, in order to cover requirements of the contract.

He also incloses proposal of P. J. Carlin & Co., with the proper consent of the sureties to do the work, and a certificate of the Architects that the offer is just and reasonable

In reply I would report that I consider that both of the above-noted works should be done by P. J. Carlin & Co., in connection with his contract for the construction of the steel cells in the New City Prison, as they are either shown on the plans or specified in the contract, and would refer you to the following sections of the contract substantiating my views:

1. Paragraph 14, on page 8, in regard to co-operation of plans and specifications. 2. Paragraphs under head of plumbing holes, etc., on page 14, which state that holes must be drilled for vent, register openings, etc., and also "and this and all other cutting

3. Paragraph on page 20, marked dumb-waiter shaft, in which it states that at

each opening in shaft, dumb-waiter doors are to be put in. The contractor, P. J. Carlin & Co., claims that this work of cutting out openings for dumb-waiters and the cutting out of the holes required in steel walls of cells, in connection with steam heating, is not included in his contract, and Commissioner Hynes,

Department of Correction, has given no decision on the matter. Since there is a difference of opinion as to the interpretation of the contract, I concur with the Commissioner, in order to not delay the work, to provide for the expenditure, do the work, and determine at the completion of Carlin's contract whether

it should be charged to the contract. The contract of P. J. Carlin & Co. for the construction of the steel cells in the City Prison, amounts to \$310,000, and pursuant to section 3 of chapter 626 of the Laws of 1806, alterations and changes can be made with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, provided that such alterations shall in no case involve or require an increased expense greater than 5 per cent, of the whole expenditure provided for in said contract.

The total amount of the contract, as stated above, being \$310,000, 5 per cent, this amount is \$15,500, and the amount of the work asked for is only \$500,

which is well within the limit allowed by the law.

The requirements of the law having all been fulfilled, and the work, in my judgment, being necessary to hasten the completion of the New City Prison, think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly give its approval to the work, as requested by the Commissioner of Correction.

Murray Street, Calvin Place and Pearl Street, Second Ward.

Curbing, flagging and macadamizing.

President Cromwell stated that, concerning the first petition, as above, the curbing and flagging must be embraced in one resolution, and the macadamizing in a separate resolution; but, as he had not yet obtained certain proof that the streets named are city streets, no action could be taken, and the petition would be laid ove: until the next meeting.

Which was assented to.

Beach Avenue, Sometimes Known as Cedar Grove Avenue, Fourth Ward.

Macadamizing from its point of intersection with New Dorp lane southerly and to a point where the centre line of Marine Way intersects said Beach avenue.

Mr. William M. Mullen appeared on behalf of Mr. Edward Hett, the petitioner, and said that he was informed that the improvement asked had been provided for in the road bond issue of the former town of Southfield.

President Cromwell said that he would instruct the Commissioner of Public Works to investigate and inform him if this were the case.

Mr. Mullen stated that, if no funds were available and assessment were denied,

Mr. Hett would ask to be permitted to macadamize the street at his own expense. The secretary and the general agent of the St. John's Guild, which owns property on both sides of Beach avenue south of Marine Way, addressed the Board with regard to continuing the macadam the entire length of the street, and were supported by Mr. Rosenberg and others.

Mr. Cromwell stated that a new petition would be necessary to cover the southerly part of Beach avenue before the Local Board could take action on the whole street, and recommended that, if there were no dissent, Mr. Hett's petition be laid over until other petitions could be presented.

On the information and recommendations embodied in said report, the following three resolutions were moved by Alderman Gillies and seconded by Alderman Shea, and were carried on call of the roll as follows:

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby recommends that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment direct the Corporation Counsel to take the necessary steps to acquire for use as a public street a strip of land about 200 feet by 50 feet adjoining Tompkins avenue,

as shown on the map of Amos street, now on file in the office of the County Clerk of the County of Richmond. Whereas, That part of Amos street in the Fourth Ward which lies between Bay

street and Cross street is named for improvement in the road bond issue of the former town of Southfield, and Whereas. There is a balance in this fund sufficient to do the work, and the

plans and specifications are ready for letting, be it

Resolved. That the work of the regulating, grading, etc., of Amos street in the Fourth Ward, to be paid by assessment as petitioned for, shall extend from Cross street to Tompkins avenue only.

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby recommends to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, that the gas and water mains be extended the full length of Amos street in the Fourth Ward, and the fire hydrants be placed at proper intervals, and that the street be provided with lights, so that it may be lighted at night.

Complaint was made to the Local Board by citizens of Tompkinsville that sewer connections which had been severed during the construction of the Arrietta street sewer had not been re-established with either the old or the new sewer by the contractor, and, it was alleged, had not been permitted by him.

President Cromwell referred the complainants to the Bureau of Sewers. Complaint was made to the Local Board that street lights are not properly distributed for public safety on Ocean avenue and the Old Town road.

MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD, FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

President Cromwell stated that he had called this meeting at the request of a number of citizens who desired to protest against the sale of the Seamen's Retreat property at Stapleton, in the Fourth Ward, to the United States Government for the permanent establishment of a marine hospital, and to ask the President of the Borough and the Local Board to send an official protest to the House of Representatives against entertaining any bill or any clause of a bill designed to accomplish such

The President further stated that he had some time ago put himself in communication on this subject with members of the House of Representatives, and

specially with the Congressman for the Seventh District, and that he had strong urged the serious injury to the community which would result from permanently t ing up a large area of land so that necessary streets could not be cut through, as of establishing a marine hospital in the heart of an important and growing redential district of the borough.

He stated that he had heard a rumor that a clause authorizing the purchase the Seamen's Retreat property for the purpose indicated had been added to the Sundry Civil Appropriation bill which had just been reported from Committee, has at once sent for a copy of that bill, and that in reply he had received from the pr vate secretary of Congressman Lessler a letter, which he read to the Board and the delegation of citizens:

House of Representatives, United States, Washington, D. C., March 31, 1902.

Hon. GEORGE CROMWELL, St. George, S. I., New York City:

Dear Sir-In the continued absence of Mr. Lessler, I forward you under separa cover a copy of the Sundry Civil bill, now before the House, in relation to the estal lishment of a United States Marine Hospital at Stapleton. I can state the following facts bearing upon the status of the matter:

The Sundry Civil bill contains no provision for such hospital. At the last momen the Committee on Appropriations decided that the incorporating of an item appropriating \$250,000 for said hospital would be irregular in view of the fact that the House rules provide that expenditures involving the purchase of land and erection obuildings for marine hospitals shall be provided for in separate acts, and the bills fo the same shall be referred to the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce. Il proposition for the Stapleton hospital was not acted on.

I have been unable to find any separate bill providing for the Stapleton hospita Surgeon-General Wyman did appear before the Appropriations Committee, and h

argument in favor of the hospital appears in the printed hearings.

The status of the marine hospital proposition may be summed up as follows:

There is no project for a marine hospital at Stapleton now before any committee of Congress. If the Treasury authorities or any one else desires to get an appropriation for such hospital a separate bill will have to be introduced, and such bill will be r ferred to the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, of which Mr. Hepbur is chairman. If any one desires to lodge a protest against such hospital, said protes must be sent to the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce.

I cannot obtain just now a copy of the hearings before the Committee on A propriations.

tion as follows: Whereas, Information has been received that a bill has passed both houses of the State Legislature to provide for payment of assessments for benefit in ten annua installments instead of immediately after the completion of the work; therefore, be

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The Cit of New York, hereby asks the Mayor to approve said bill, as a measure conducive to the best interests of the city and borough.

The President stated that the chief reason for urgency on this bill at this tim was its application to the large assessment for the construction of the Arriett street sewer, and his desire that the people assessed should be protected in the property. He explained that as the work has not yet been completed, and as the as sessment will not be apportioned and levied for some time, the law will lighten th burden of the taxpayers in this instance.

On call of the roll the above resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative-Alderman Maloy, Alderman Gillies, and the President.

Negative-None. A petition was handed to the President for the laying of a water main on th and immediate action was asked.
