SIR—In the action entitled as above a temporary injunction was granted by Mr. Justice Gaynor, on the 5th instant, restraining the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from passing or adopting resolutions purporting to amend, rescind, alter or modify the resolutions of the late Board of Public Improvements, and an order to show cause was also granted why the injunction should not be made permanent until the trial of the action.

The case was argued before Mr. Justice Gaynor on the 10th instant, and the papers were then submitted.

Mr. Justice Gaynor has just handed down a decision denying the motion for the continuance of the temporary injunction.

An order has been entered accordingly on this day, which also vacated the temporary injunction.

This suit, therefore, does not in any way prevent the Board of Estimate and Apportionment taking such action as it may deem proper.

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment having at its meeting of June 20, referred to the Engineer the matter of acquiring title to a new park in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, for investigation as to whether the proposed approach to Bridge No. 3 would encroach upon the park, I would report that I have examined both the plans and the elevation of the proposed bridge and find that the property to be acquired will not come within twenty feet of the nearest corner of the park, and that at this point the roadway will be about thirty feet above the present street level, while the highest part of the structure will be about fifty-eight feet above the present surface. It will not, therefore, interfere with or lessen the value of the proposed new park.

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed change of lines, who have appeared, and such proposed change of lines was duly considered by this Board, now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York, by changing the lines of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street from Sedgwick avenue to Tee Taw avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the lines of the aforesaid street as follows:

East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, between Sedgwick avenue and Tee Taw avenue, to be shifted northerly; and the south side of the changed East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to be on the land of the Webb's Academy and nearly coincident with the division line of the properties of the Webb's Academy and the New York Orphan Asylum. The street to be sixty feet in width.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York, by changing the lines of the above-named street, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for its action thereon.

Sir—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, initiates proceedings for the change of grade on Twentieth street, between Vanderbilt street and Tenth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn. This change is petitioned for by the property owners, in which petition it is stated that the "proposed change will save the City thousands of dollars in damages over the old official grade," which, in some cases, would bring the street grade on the level of the tops and upper stories of the houses. The resolution is also accompanied by a copy of the petition protesting against the change of grade "except The City of New York exempt us from all assessment for said change of grade, and also that the City of New York pay to us all damages which our property will undoubtedly sustain by such change of grade."

Proceedings to change the grade on Twentieth street were instituted by the Board of Public Improvements, but the necessary action was not taken by the Municipal Assembly. It is alleged that the present legal grade would badly bury a number of houses on the street, and inasmuch as some of these houses were built and the street was in use for some years before the grade was fixed, damages would have to be allowed in either case. I do not think, therefore, that the City would be involved in any more expense, if as much, by changing the grade as by allowing it to remain. I would recommend that a hearing be given in the matter and submit the plan and technical description for that purpose.

DEAR SIR—My attention has been drawn to the fact that application is to be made for the opening of East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, from Locust avenue to the East river.

If my information upon said subject be correct, I desire, in behalf of the Port Morris Land and Improvement Company, which owns all of the land which would be taken in such a proceeding, to seriously object to any such steps being taken at the present time. In our judgment, it is more in the interest of commerce, and, consequently, of greater benefit to the Port Morris section and the Twenty-third Ward at large, to retain intact this piece of bulkhead property. The plot now lying between the south line of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street and the centre line of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street is bulkheaded to a point where there is a depth of water of nearly thirty feet, and is to-day, we believe, almost the only piece of property east of the immediate neighborhood of the Third Avenue Bridge which is available at all times for the commercial uses of the public. There is no commerce west of us which renders necessary the heavy expense to which the property owners in that neighborhood would be subjected if the City condemns a valuable strip of sixty feet of land, with its costly bulkhead. The City already owns the water front at One Hundred and Thirty-second, One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets, and has not yet utilized its ownership by the construction of piers or bulkheads at the end of any of these streets. When the Dock Department finds a profit in utilizing these premises, no doubt they will be improved. In the meanwhile, with the opportunities that the City has at its command to furnish docks when the needs of commerce call for them, it seems an infinite pity to break into the one plot in that neighborhood which offers good facilities for the landing of excursion boats, or the unloading of sloops, schooners, barges, etc., to supply the building operations of the district.

Again, the condemnation of such a strip works a material injustice to the

parties whose land is taken, for the reason that it is worth more to the owners to sell as a piece of commercial property than the net amount that they will receive under condemnation. If the Commissioners award a price which they deem a fair value of the land, then, with the large amount of territory which our company controls, we find that about two-thirds of the amount which we receive is assessed back on our own property, and we do not get a dollar more per lot for the lots so assessed, by reason of the fact that a new street has been opened. In the matter of the opening of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, this company received payment for the land taken by the City, but will be obliged to turn back to the City Treasury about 75 per cent. of this amount, which has been assessed on our other lands. The net result you will see is that we derive about twenty-five cents on the dollar for the land that was taken.

In view of these conditions, we submit, Mr. President, that the time has not yet arrived when the commercial interests of the Twenty-third Ward require the taking of action upon the opening of any more streets to the East river, between One Hundred and Thirty-second and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets.

There has already been addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of May 27, a petition from the Port Morris Land and Improvement Company, by Thomas S. Bassford, their attorney, stating that they protested to the President of the Borough of The Bronx against the institution of proceedings to open this street. They also state that they are the owners of the land which would be taken, and that the separation of such property will be a "detriment to their private and commercial interests" and a great benefit to the commercial interests of the public at large. They ask, therefore, that the Board place fifty per cent. (50 per cent.) of the cost and expense of the improvement upon The City of New York.

I find upon investigation that East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street is now regulated and graded, curbed and sewered to Locust avenue, on the east side of which there is a fence barring access to the water front. The petitioners for the improvement have a manufacturing establishment on the south side of the street east of Locust avenue, and there seems no reason why the City should not acquire title to the street all the way to the water front. As the protestants own all of the land to be taken, they will receive all of the award, and I do not believe they will be injured. The petitioners, on the other hand, will be assessed to pay the award, of which they will receive none, but are ready to do so for the benefit received. I cannot see wherein this differs from other cases of street openings, but believe that the benefit to abutting property will be substantial, and I cannot recommend that the City at large bear any portion of the expense. The street is laid down on the Final Maps of the Borough of The Bronx, and a resolution instituting opening proceedings is hereto attached.

This triangular plot faces Evergreen Cemetery on the north and two large car barns on the south. Adjoining the latter on the west are the elevated railroad coal pockets. The property comprises block No. 3481, section No. 6 of the Kings County land map, and also a very small triangular plot formed by the intersection of Bushwick avenue, Gillen place and Highland boulevard. There is one frame building on the property, and the whole area is valued by the Tax Assessors at \$6,410. The location is within one-half a mile of the Ridgewood Park and within one thousand (1,000) feet of the plot at the junction of Fulton street and Broadway, where it is also desired to lay out another public place. It will be seen that this public plaza will be surrounded on all sides but one by a hideous car barn, coal pockets and a cemetery, and a more unattractive place could not very well have been selected. The petition, however, that is presented asking for it bears eighteen signatures. I cannot see that it would be any benefit to the city at large and believe that if laid out and acquired it would be proper to assess the cost upon the abutting property. SIR—The Local Board of the Bushwick District, at its meeting held May 22, 1902, passed a resolution initiating proceedings to alter the map or plan of The City of New York, by laying out a public place or park to be known as Jewell square, which is shown on a plan accompanying the resolution. It will be seen by reference to this plan that the proposed new park would consist of a narrow triangular block, bounded by Fulton street, Broadway and the property of the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company, now used as a station and transfer point at the East New York loop, also an irregular portion of another block, the result being that a considerable part of the park would be bounded by private property, and to make it entirely available, a portion of the park would have to be opened as a street. The assessed value of the property it is proposed to take is \$93,000, and the park to be acquired would be very irregular in shape, being bounded by eleven different side lines, besides being bisected by Fulton street with a double track surface railroad, while it would be bounded on the Broadway side by one elevated railroad with a car barn behind it, on William place and Fulton street by another elevated railroad, and at its western extremity by the transfer station of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company.

If it is advisable to establish a park in this neighborhood, it seems to me that it could be more effectually done by acquiring the entire triangular block bounded by Williams place, Fulton street and the East New York avenue. This would be compact in shape although elevated road structures would be much in evidence on the two streets. The estimated cost of this block is \$77,700.

In order to bring the matter up for discussion if so desired, I submit a resolution and technical description calling for a public hearing.

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Bushwick District, passed on May 22, 1902, initiates proceedings to regulate and pave Furman avenue, with granite block pavement, between Bushwick avenue and the tracks of the Manhattan Beach Railroad. An examination of the papers in this matter, which, beside the resolution, included a copy of a petition, a copy of a report of the Engineer of the Bureau of Highways, and affidavits as to the legal status of the street, shows that the petition asked for paving with asphalt or Belgian block, that the report of the Engineer is strongly against the use of Belgian block, as it is an antiquated and unsatisfactory type of pavement, and urges that if stone block is used, it should be granite. This report also included an estimate for macadam, and the fact was brought out that no sewer had yet been built in the street; still the Local Board passed the resolution for paving the block with Belgian. It seems to me that the laying of any stone pavement in advance of the construction of the sewer is very unwise and should not be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. I beg, therefore, to recommend that the matter be referred back to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn in order that proceedings may be instituted to build a sewer, and that if he thinks wise, granite block should be substituted for Belgian.

SIR—On May 29th, I made report in connection with the resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, passed on March 27, 1902, providing for the regulating, grading and paving with granite block on concrete foundation, of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Lincoln avenue to the west side of the New York and Harlem Railroad property. Inasmuch as this improvement involved a certain amount of repaving which could not be assessed upon the abutting property owners, although the greater part of the street had never been paved by assessment, I recommended that the matter be referred back to the President of the Borough of The Bronx for further information, or a plan showing the extent of the paving which could be assessed, and of the repaving. This information has been furnished in detail, a plan showing the location of the paving and the repaving being hereto attached, and I would suggest that the improvement be authorized, such authorization applying only to the work which is properly assessable, the cost of such repaving as is required to be provided for from the amount raised by the issue of bonds and allotted to the Borough of The Bronx for that purpose.

The estimated amount of the assessable work is as follows:

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—I am constantly embarrassed by inability to find certain maps and records

which are said to have been filed with the Board of Public Improvements and which it was directed by section 243 of the Greater New York Charter should be "transferred to, kept and maintained in the office of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

The Topographical Bureau of the entire city was formerly closely connected with the Board of Public Improvements and I am informed that many of the atlases, maps and other property which belonged to the Board of Public Improvements were removed from the offices occupied by it to the office of the Topographical Bureau of the Borough of The Bronx. I am also told that there were a horse and two wagons, used by the Chief Engineer to the Board of Public Improvements, who was also Chief Topographical Engineer.

Some office furniture, a number of books and wall maps are said to have been retained by the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Manhattan, who now occupies the offices formerly used by the Board of Public Improvements, having taken possession thereof on January 1, 1902.

The revised Charter provides that all such plans, books, records, maps and other property should be transferred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

While there is now no proper place for filing of these plans, a suitable case can be readily prepared, and I would recommend that the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx be requested to furnish a statement of the property now in their possession (or that of anyone under their control), formerly in the office of the Board of Public Improvements or attached thereto, and that such maps, plans, etc., be transferred to this Board, where a place for their accommodation shall have been provided.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
