The President then read the following address, which was, on motion, ordered to be printed and made part of the minutes:

No. 7.

Gentlemen of the Board of Aldermen:

In opening the session of the Board elected for the years 1904 and 1905, I will only briefly refer to a few of the important matters which will come before us.

The message of his Honor the Mayor, which will be read to you, is doubtless a very comprehensive summary of the City's financial condition, and a clear and concise review of the City's departments. The various committees, to be announced hereafter, will, I am confident, take up the questions suggested by the Mayor, and after giving to them serious consideration put in force such ordinances and other legislative proceedings as may bring his recommendations to a proper fruition.

There are many propositions which will come before you in the next two years in the matter of public improvements, and I am confident you will give to all of them your best thought and attention; for while the initiative may be undertaken by other branches of the City government, notably, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the ways and means of fulfillment and execution must be concluded here in the Board of Aldermen.

The question of transportation, both of passengers and freight, will be one of the most important, if not the most important, question which will demand your attention, and these facilities can best be enlarged by the extension of the underground transit system, by additional means of interborough communication in the matter of tunnels and bridges, and an expeditious and sufficient ferry service; and these improvements should be of a substantial and lasting character and will contribute largely to the development and progress of our City.

The betterment of our water front and the perfecting of our dockage facilities, enabling us to accommodate at a reasonable cost the vessels entering this magnificent harbor from every quarter of the civilized world, is another most important problem pressing for solution, and as this class of improvements will produce revenues of such a character as to make it a question of simply loaning the City's credit, there should be no hesitancy in bringing them to a speedy completion.

The enlargement of our public park system is another proposition which will claim your attention, as this is a matter which contributes to the comfort and welfare of the hard-working and industrious even more than the pleasure of those of our citizens who are in positions of affluence and ease.

The recent appalling holocaust at the Iroquois Theatre in Chicago excites our profound sorrow and should not pass unheeded as a terrible and impressive warning. If there is any legislation needed at our hands to prevent a repetition of that awful catastrophe in this City, it should be promptly and effectively ordained.

While it is our sincere endeavor to treat the minority with every courtesy and consideration, and to gladly welcome the advice and co-operation of its members, we cannot forget that the Democratic majority to a large extent will be held responsible for what is done, or left undone here, and we cannot escape that responsibility.

Let us discharge our duty with the single object of serving the public welfare with a fairness of purpose, fearlessly remembering "he serves his party best who best serves his country."

No. 8.

By Alderman McCall—

Whereas, The entire civilized world has been shocked by the terrible catastrophe which befell so many people by the burning of the Iroquois Theatre in

Chicago, on the afternoon of Wednesday, December 30, 1903, eliciting a sympathy so widespread in its nature as to indicate the kinship of the human family; and

Whereas, This dire calamity, bereaving as it does hundreds of families, severing home ties, and bringing to an unfortunate end relations between husband and wife, father and child, sister and brother, and arousing a pang such as has not in long time moved Christendom; therefore

Resolved, That the City of New York, by and through its chosen representatives in the Board of Aldermen, in first meeting assembled, does hereby extend to the people of the City of Chicago, Illinois, and the families of those who have suffered irreparable loss, most heartfelt sympathy on the affliction which has befallen them; further

Resolved, That a copy hereof, suitably engrossed and duly authenticated by the City Clerk, be transmitted to his Honor, Carter H. Harrison, Mayor of the City of Chicago, with the request that the same be promulgated in said city.

No. 9.

By Alderman McCall—

AN ORDINANCE to further insure the safety of patrons and employees of theatres, music halls, opera houses and other places of public entertainment within the limits of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. In addition to any and all existing laws, regulations, rules and ordinances concerning theatres, music halls, opera houses and other places of public entertainment, every theatre, music hall, opera house or other building intended to be used for theatrical or operatic purposes or for public entertainment, for the accommodation of more than three hundred persons, shall have a proscenium opening, as provided by section 109 of the Building Code of The City of New York, which proscenium opening shall be provided with a fireproof metal curtain, or a curtain of asbestos or other fireproof material, approved by the Department of Buildings of The City of New York; Which said fireproof curtain shall be raised at the commencement of each and every performance and lowered at the close thereof.

And in addition thereto the said fireproof curtain shall be lowered at the close of each and every separate act of said performance.

Sec. 2. Any and all stage scenery and fixtures of every kind, permanent or temporary, before being stored or used in any theatre, music hall, opera house or other place of amusement accommodating more than three hundred persons, must first be rendered thoroughly fireproof by chemical treatment or otherwise.

Sec. 3. Every owner, lessee, manager, superintendent, agent of any such theatre, music hall, opera house or other place of public entertainment, and all persons who shall violate this ordinance or fail to comply therewith or any requirement thereof, shall severally for each and every such violation and non-compliance respectively forfeit and pay a penalty in the sum of fifty dollars.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

Which was referred to the Committee on Buildings, when appointed.

No. 10.

By Alderman McCall—

Resolved, That a committee of five members be appointed by the President to inform his Honor the Mayor that the Board of Aldermen for the years 1904 and 1905 has been duly organized to transact public business, and that it is ready to receive any message he may desire to communicate.

I intend at this time to do no more than to generalize on certain municipal matters, because I purpose later to submit to you a detailed statement of the condition and the needs of the several departments of the City government.

I am to-day only complying with the time-honored custom of addressing you, and through you the public, at your first legislative session.

For many years the popular interest seems to have been concentrated upon the problems of public health, public education, street cleaning, and the police. Every public-spirited official should be glad that such has been and is the fact.

But I believe that the public mind has been so absorbed with these evident as well as vital questions as to ignore the equally vital, if not as apparent, problem of municipal finance.

As the incidence of taxation for the support of the municipal government is shifted to the people as a whole, the questions of the City debt, the cost of government and of the system of taxation under which we live are of great concern and should be of the very first interest to every citizen.

A wider knowledge of our financial system can bring nothing but good to the City. A greater interest on the part of the taxpayers—and the entire population pays the taxes—in how the revenues are raised and expended, must necessarily result in an increased share of responsibility on the part of the administration, and a more direct feeling of accountability by the public officials to those who have given the trust to them.

In this rapidly growing municipality, whose debt margin in constitutionally limited, there ought to be some fixed fiscal policy which should, in its general features, govern all administrations regardless of party attachments. Such a policy can be put in operation only after the awakening of popular interest in the importance of the question.

In a supplemental message I shall discuss the problem at some length, in the hope that I may thereby convince the public of its importance.

In initiating public improvements, the needs of the present should be considered before the needs of the future.

In gauging the financial capacity of the City when embarking upon new enterprises, material necessities should first be met.

New York must be made healthy and clean and safe before it is made beautiful.

I consider that I am exceptionally fortunate in having as my principal colleagues in the administration Mr. Grout and Mr. Fornes. Their familiarity with the finances of the City warrants the expectation that a policy of just conservatism will improve existing conditions.

Schools.

The administration is confronted with a most difficult problem because of the inadequacy of the present school accommodations. The solution of this problem cannot wait on our convenience.

I intend to give my immediate attention to the matter, with the idea of adopting the speediest method of relief. The demands of modern life are so exacting that our children of school age must not be deprived of a moment which should be devoted rightfully to the education which is to fit them for their places in the world. After a conference with the department officials, and an examination of the question, I shall lay the matter before you in detail.

Bridge Terminals.

The problem that rises in the handling of traffic at the terminals of the Brooklyn Bridge, especially during the so-called "rush hours," is not new to you.

Relief here is another pressing need and cannot be had too soon. The task is stupendous, but it neither can be avoided nor delayed.

The administration will address itself to the question at once.

Street Cleaning.

Until I have had an opportunity to observe the workings of the Department of Street Cleaning I shall not be in a position to address you upon the subject.

Appreciating, however, the importance of clean streets, and aware of the popular verdict of his administration, I have invited the gentleman who served as the head of the Department under my predecessor to remain at his post.

I shall, however, in a supplemental message, again speak to you on this important matter.

Water Supply.

Provision for an additional water supply is a subject demanding prompt attention. Waste of water should be prevented; but there must be no restriction upon its use for all proper and necessary purposes. The health of the City and the comfort of our people depend upon an ample supply of pure water, and safety from fire demands that water shall be always ready for an emergency, in abundant quantity and under sufficient pressure. There should be no unnecessary delay in providing for such a supply adequate in all respects to the future needs of the City.

Police.

An extensive observation of the moral conditions of the great cities of Europe and America has convinced me that this City is better than any of them. Nevertheless, we cannot boast if its moral state falls below the standard which should be set for the metropolis of our country.

We cannot complacently assume that we shall not suffer deterioration unless we strive earnestly to maintain a high standard. A cosmopolitan city like New York cannot be conducted on the same plan as a provincial town. Every attempt to so conduct it will fail and will result in a disrespect of law.

Some evils can be eradicated and some cannot. Some evils, unhappily, are incident to human nature itself. But they should not be allowed to parade before the public, and no partnership should be permitted between those charged with the suppression of vice and those who live by law-breaking. In the endeavor to accomplish anything in this direction, spasmodic effort can avail but little. Only constant vigilance can produce satisfactory results. The methods employed should not be sensational, or for the purpose first of winning applause, but earnest and sincere, so as to be thorough and permanent in their effect.

I am convinced that it is no unreasonably critical spirit which has for years been charging that officials high in the Police Department have connived at the maintenance of certain public evils for their personal gain.

A vigorous and persistent effort will be made to sever any such relations between law-breakers and those sworn to enforce the law.

I appeal to all our citizens, and especially to those who supported my candidacy, to aid in purging the Department of such men and practices.

It would be useless for me to appoint to the command of this Department a mere disciplinarian or a doctrinaire. I have intrusted the office to a man of such character as to inspire the respect of his subordinates and the confidence of the public, and of

such discernment as to make it unlikely that he will be the victim of imposition or deceit.

In this, as in any other department, everything desired cannot be accomplished at once. Intelligent effort directed to one evil at a time must before long result in a general improvement.

I ask for the Police Commissioner the patience and the assistance of the public.

The vast majority of the members of the police force are worthy of our confidence. Their lives are not easy, whether considered morally or physically. Contact with crime does not tend to individual improvement. I believe that, so far as possible, consideration should be shown to them, so that, like all other government employees, they may have a reasonable amount of leisure from their very exacting duties.

The best results cannot be obtained, either in public or private business, except by the hearty co-operation of every employee.

I admonish the heads of all the departments of the City government, while maintaining strict discipline, not to be so needlessly harsh or exacting as to cause discontent among their subordinates.

I shall expect and require from all the departments complete unity of purpose for the good of the City.

I have confidence in the integrity and ability of every one of my appointees, and I assure them of my earnest support. The public expects from each of them the faithful performance of his trust, and I shall exercise all the power conferred upon me in the Charter to insure the efficiency and the honesty of the administration of every department.

I pledge to you, the Honorable Board of Aldermen, my co-operation in your every lawful endeavor, and I ask from you the same consideration for myself.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.
The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaux or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
