Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From April 25 to May 1, inclusive, 49 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 12 at Gouverneur Hospital, 15 at Harlem Hospital and 11 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

A fire drill was held at Bellevue and Harlem Hospitals on April 26 and at Fordham Hospital on April 27, 1909.

Submitted herewith are the reports of the attendance of Visiting Physicians and Surgeons for the month of April, covering the various hospitals of this Department. Practically a full attendance is reported.

Mr. F. A. Ross reports on the results of his inspection of the new Nurses' residence, and recommends the installation of 75 chemical fire extinguishers, 24 sets of fire axes, 24 8-foot fire hooks and red lights at all exits.

In accordance with instructions at a previous meeting a list of men consisting of the higher grade of employees was made up and the individuals were informed that they were expected to serve on the local fire department. A letter was sent to each person on the list that he had been appointed a member of the local fire department and that he should meet Mr. Ross in the storeroom on Friday morning, April 30, at 9 o'clock. The old members of the local fire force were also asked to be present. Mr. Ross met the men at the time designated and reorganized the local fire force.

Submitted herewith is his report, together with the report from Mr. Rickard, who was requested to be present at the time and report all who refused to serve or did not attend in compliance with the notice.

Concerning the matter of moving the large refrigerator from the main kitchen at Harlem Hospital to an adjoining room, another bid has been obtained from the Bramhall-Deane Company, which firm originally installed the refrigerator (the Building Committee having previously obtained a bid from James McLean). It is believed that the Board wishes this refrigerator moved and the acceptance of Bramhall Deane's bid is therefore recommended.

Concerning the establishment of an emergency hospital on the west side, a house on West Fifth street is now being considered which is admirably suited to the requirements. It is estimated that the expense of alterations should be covered by \$12,000, which is the amount allowed by the owner. The rental stipulated is \$5,500 a year. As for equipment and running expenses for the balance of the year, dating from July 1, it is estimated that \$27,000 will be required, made up as follows: Seven thousand dollars for two automobile ambulances, \$5,000 for furnishings, \$7,497 for salaries and \$7,503 for supplies.

Submitted herewith is a note from the Contract Clerk, Mr. Eckstein, stating that transfers are needed in the appropriation of 1908 from Salaries and Wages, Harlem Hospital, \$1,500, to Supplies, Kitchen, Dining Rooms, Laundry and Housekeeping; Salaries and Wages, Fordham Hospital, \$750, to Stable and Ambulances, as per request of the Finance Department, so that invoices forwarded may be charged against contracts instead of Revenue Bond Funds.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To request the Board of Aldermen to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in an amount not to exceed \$32,300 for establishing a relief station on the west side of the City.

At a previous meeting your Board authorized the transfer of \$4,752 to the Department of Public Charities to cover the expense of 33 Nurses supplied by said Department to Gouverneur Hospital. Twenty-eight Nurses only were supplied for the first four months of the year, 33 being supplied only from May 1, leaving a credit to this Department of \$240 for five Nurses for four months.

At a previous meeting it was decided to prefer charges against a Fireman whom Mr. Ross reported as not responding properly to the fire call. On investigation it was found that the man in question was not a Civil Service employee, but merely a Hospital Helper acting as a coal passer. He has been severely reprimanded and warned.

Submitted herewith is a communication from Dr. Charles Norris, Director of Laboratories, outlining a plan for the organization of a Department of Pathological Chemistry for the new Pathological Building when completed. I have had some conversation with Dr. Norris on this subject, and the plan as outlined has my hearty endorsement.

Submitted herewith is a requisition from the General Superintendent of Training Schools to cover the expense incurred for the care of a Nurse who has been ill at the Minturn Hospital for the last month. These expenses were formerly met by the training school. It is recommended that the requisition be approved.

A letter from Miss Goodrich suggesting salaries for the Nurses on the boat "Southfield" is herewith submitted with the recommendation that it be approved.

A letter from Miss Goodrich relating to vacations and leaves of absence in case of illness, etc., is submitted with the recommendation that the suggestions therein be approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was directed to place in the new Nurses' residence 75 chemical fire extinguishers, 24 sets of fire axes, 24 8-foot fire hooks and red lights in all of the exits, as recommended by Mr. Ross.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the bid of the Bramhall-Deane Company on moving the refrigerator at Harlem Hospital, was accepted.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, Mr. Farley was authorized to obtain for the Board of Trustees a refusal of the premises on the best terms possible and to arrange for the privilege of a renewal of the lease.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the transfer of \$1,500 from the appropriation for Salaries and Wages, Harlem Hospital, to Supplies, Kitchens, Dining Rooms, Laundry and Housekeeping, and \$750 from Salaries and Wages, Fordham Hospital, to Stable and Ambulances, such transfers having been recommended by the Department of Finance.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the General Medical Superintendent in reprimanding the Hospital Helper who failed to properly respond to the fire drill was approved.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To send copies of Dr. Norris' plan for the organization of a Department of Pathological Chemistry to each member of the Board of Trustees.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve the requisition of the General Superintendent of Training Schools for the care of a Nurse ill at the Minturn Hospital; to approve of the appointment of the Nurses on the boat "Southfield," at \$720 and \$600 a year; and to approve of three weeks' leave of absence for Graduate Nurses, with an additional day for each two years of service.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From May 2 to May 8, inclusive, 40 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 13 at Gouverneur Hospital, 17 at Harlem Hospital and 11 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

A fire drill was held at Harlem Hospital on May 3, and at Bellevue and Fordham hospitals on May 4.

Mr. Ross reported that on a recent test of the hose at Fordham Hospital 1,500 feet were condemned. It is recommended that 1,500 feet more of cotton rubber-lined hose be purchased for Fordham Hospital.

Several rooms have been vacated at Harlem Hospital by moving the Nurses into another house. A letter is submitted herewith from the Executive Committee of the Medical Board, recommending the disposition of these rooms.

A requisition has been received from Harlem Hospital calling for awnings for balconies and for five sitting room windows. Also a requisition asking that the words "Harlem Hospital" be cut in the stone over the entrances on Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street. It is recommended that awnings for the five sitting room windows be allowed. No recommendation is made at the present time regarding awnings for the patients' balconies. It is recommended that the requisition be approved calling for the words "Harlem Hospital" in the stone over the entrance to the hospital.

The proposed amendment of the Budget is not quite ready. It is recommended that the proposed revision of the Salaries and Wages Schedule be referred to the Finance Committee and the General Medical Superintendent, with power, in order that schedules may be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment without delay. The changes contemplated are to be made entirely within the amount of the appropriation for the year.

It is recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to establish the following grades: Laundryman at \$240, \$300, \$360, \$420, \$480, \$540, \$600; Housekeeper, Training School, \$600; Hospital Helper (Mechanic), \$480, \$540, \$600, \$720; Supervisor or Foreman at \$720. With the exception of the Supervisor or Foreman these places are all classified by the Civil Service Board as non-competitive and are filled by those who appear on our payroll as Hospital Helpers. The establishment of the proper titles will involve no increase in salary.

It is recommended, pending decision relative to granting request for a Chief Clerk in the Central Office, that an extra Clerk be employed, temporarily, at a salary not to exceed \$900.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To authorize the General Medical Superintendent to purchase 1,500 feet of cotton rubber-lined hose for Fordham Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To refer to the Committee of the Month and the General Medical Superintendent for recommendation and report the disposition of the rooms vacated by Nurses.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To obtain estimates on awnings for the balconies of both Harlem and Fordham hospitals, and to approve the requisition for the work of cutting the words "Harlem Hospital" in the stone above the entrance to the hospital.

Resolved, To refer to the Committees on Finance and Officers and Employees the proposed revision of the Salaries and Wages Schedule.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From May 9 to May 15, inclusive, 61 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 11 at Gouverneur Hospital, 22 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

A fire drill was held at Harlem Hospital on May 10, at Fordham Hospital on May 12 and at Bellevue Hospital on May 17.

It is requested by the General Superintendent of Training Schools that, inasmuch as there will be three or four students at the Teachers' College desiring a little practical experience in hospital work, these students be allowed maintenance and board, in return for which they shall render a full day's service each day for as long as they may be here, these students to be used as may be deemed advisable, either as Nurses' Helpers or in the executive department of the training school. This plan will not take effect until the fall, and it is recommended that the General Superintendent of Training Schools be authorized to make such arrangement.

A letter from Dr. Gregory is presented herewith asking for permission to keep a small runabout motor car on the grounds of the hospital, the care of the car and all expense attached thereto to be met by Dr. Gregory.

Submitted herewith is a communication from the Supervising Nurse of Harlem Hospital, accompanied by an anonymous communication calling attention to the fact that in the summer time a great many persons are allowed to congregate on the sidewalk surrounding the hospital grounds with chairs, baby carriages, etc., and asking that the custom be stopped. The Supervising Nurse suggests that a policeman be detailed at Harlem Hospital to obviate this trouble, and her suggestion is approved.

It is recommended that as soon as possible after June 1 the Hospital Helpers employed in this Department as Oilers be replaced by Oilers at wages not to exceed \$3 a day, provision being made for Oilers in the Budget.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From May 16 to May 22, inclusive, 39 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 4 at Gouverneur Hospital, 25 at Harlem Hospital, and 11 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

A fire drill was held at Harlem and Fordham hospitals on May 19.

During the month of April it was found necessary to reject 109 pounds of pork, 40 pounds of lamb loins, 10 pounds of liver, 124 pounds of beef, 99 pounds of steak, 8 pounds of turkey, and 1,418 pounds of chicken.

Submitted herewith is a letter from the American Laundry Machinery Company stating that it is practically impossible for any one except the Troy Laundry Machinery Company to comply strictly with the specifications. The American Laundry Machinery Company claims that its machines are fully equal to those specified and is prepared to install the machines already delivered and allow the use of them until a special machine can be built to comply strictly with the specifications, or furnish at once and install a more expensive machine than the one specified.

It is recommended that the house at No. 223 East Twenty-sixth street, formerly used as the Emergency Hospital, be now used to furnish sleeping accommodations for the night force of male employees under Mr. McHale, who now sleep in dormitory 42, which is very dark, poorly ventilated, and unfit to be used for sleeping accommodations.

In view of the fact that a great deal of difficulty has been encountered in keeping track of the pay roll, as compared with the budget allowances; and, in view of the fact that after having looked into the matter carefully, it is found that there has not been any definite and well defined system for preparing and checking up the pay rolls, a clerk of the Central Office, Mr. Buckley, has been assigned to take charge hereafter of all pay rolls, as he seems to have a better knowledge of pay rolls than any one else in the office. This is believed to be absolutely necessary in order to handle properly the very important matter of pay rolls. Owing to the transfer of Mr. Buckley to this work, it will be necessary to appoint another clerk to do his work in the central book-keeping office, and it is recommended that one of the clerks now employed in that office, who has demonstrated his worth, be increased from \$600 to \$720, and that the new clerk be employed at \$540.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced with the contractors who are to furnish white duck suits for the doctors. On March 12 orders were given for 120 suits. Up to May 6 only three suits had been delivered, and these were not at all satisfactory. Siegel-Cooper were communicated with on May 4 and again on May 7.

In the letter of May 7 they were informed that they would be given two weeks in which to fill all orders which they had received up to that date, and if at the end of that time the suits were not delivered we would buy in the open market and charge against their contract. Up to the present time 27 suits have been delivered; 21 were delivered on the last day of the two weeks, which was Saturday last, May 22, and 6 more were delivered Monday, May 24. This matter is referred to the Board for further action.

Resolved, To write a letter to the Comptroller reporting the rejections on the contract of Messrs. Conron Brothers and asking advice as to the proper steps to be taken by the Board in relieving the firm of its contract for poultry.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve the recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent that the old emergency hospital be used as dormitory for the help now in dormitory 42.

Resolved, To approve the action of the General Medical Superintendent in appointing Mr. Buckley in charge of the payrolls, promoting one of the Junior Clerks from \$600 to \$720, and appointing a new Clerk at \$540.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From May 23 to May 29, inclusive, 20 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 7 at Gouverneur Hospital, 20 at Harlem Hospital, and 20 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

A fire drill was held at Harlem Hospital on May 24, at Bellevue Hospital on May 25 and at Fordham Hospital on May 27.

On May 29 Dr. Alexander requested two special Nurses, one for day and one for night duty, to care for two operative cases who were in a critical condition. Dr. Alexander agreed to pay for the services of one, but inasmuch as the services of both were considered necessary, the Nurses were allowed and your approval is requested.

A bill of \$5.25 has been received from Dr. Eliot, of Gouverneur Hospital, for taxicab hire on the night of May 21.

Regarding the notice from the Finance Department that items other than fresh fruits and vegetables were charged against that account, Mr. Rickard, the Assistant Superintendent, reports that such procedure has been the custom for a long time, but that he will see that it is discontinued. Regarding the bills of the training school, the authorities of the school state that they have been informed that such procedure was strictly proper and that the articles mentioned were for the most part purchased when they were needed in a hurry and when more or less delay was avoided which occurs when the articles are ordered through the regular Bellevue channels. Orders have been issued to discontinue this custom and Mr. Eckstein has been directed not under any circumstances to pass a bill on which articles appear which are not properly chargeable to the fresh fruits and vegetable account.

The City hereby grants to the New York City Interborough Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers, and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, in, upon and along the following named streets, avenues, parkways, highways, public places, bridges and viaducts and crossing intersecting streets and highways, all situated in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, namely:

"First—Commencing at a point on the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street viaduct, between Bradhurst and Eighth avenues and on a line parallel with the westerly line of the Manhattan Elevated Railway Company's station at Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; running thence easterly and along said viaduct to the Central or Macombs Dam Bridge; thence running northerly upon and along said bridge to the westerly approach thereof known as the Sedgwick avenue approach, formerly called Ogden avenue approach, in the Borough of The Bronx; thence northerly on and along said approach to its intersection with Jerome avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Jerome avenue to its intersection with Ogden avenue; thence on and along Ogden avenue northerly to its intersection with Aqueduct avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Aqueduct avenue to Kingsbridge road; thence westerly on and along Kingsbridge road to Sedgwick avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Sedgwick avenue to Boston avenue; thence northwesterly on and along Boston avenue to Heath avenue or Fort Independence street; thence westerly on and along Heath avenue or Fort Independence street to Fort Independence street; thence northerly on and along Fort Independence street to Bailey avenue; thence northerly on and along Bailey avenue to East Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street; thence northwesterly on and along East and West Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to Broadway.

"Second—Commencing at the Rapid Transit station, at the intersection of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street with St. Nicholas avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan; thence on and along said West One Hundred and Eighty-first street in an easterly direction to Washington Bridge; thence along and over Washington Bridge easterly to Aqueduct avenue, Borough of The Bronx; thence northeasterly on and along Aqueduct avenue to Tremont avenue; thence easterly on and along Tremont avenue as it winds and turns to the Transverse road under the Grand Boulevard and Concourse connecting said Tremont avenue; thence easterly on and along the transverse road under the Grand Boulevard and Concourse again to Tremont avenue; thence easterly on and along Tremont avenue to Webster avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Webster avenue upon the tracks of the Union Railway Company of New York City to East One Hundred and Eighty-first street; thence easterly on and along said East One Hundred and Eighty-first street to Southern boulevard.

"Fourth—Commencing at West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, west of Lenox avenue, Borough of Manhattan; running thence easterly on and along said West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street to and over the One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge over the Harlem River to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Borough of The Bronx; thence in an easterly direction on and along said East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to St. Ann's avenue; thence northerly on and along St. Ann's avenue to East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, thence easterly on and along said East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to its intersection with Leggett avenue or Craven street; thence southerly and easterly on and along Leggett avenue or Craven street to its intersection with Dawson street; thence southeasterly on and along Leggett avenue to its intersection with Randall avenue; thence easterly on and along Randall avenue to the Bronx River.

"Fifth—Commencing at Dongan street and Intervale avenue, Borough of The Bronx; running thence easterly on and along Dongan street to Southern boulevard and Hunts Point road; thence southeasterly on and along Hunts Point road to Long Island Sound."

2. The fourth subdivision of section 2 of said ordinance shall be amended to read as follows:

"The New York City Interborough Railway Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money:

"During the first period of this franchise ending on September 30, 1907, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) and shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).

"During the remainder of the original term of twenty-five years of this franchise an annual sum which shall not be less than eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500), and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500).

"In addition to the above, the Company shall pay for the use of the three bridges above described, during the first period of this franchise ending on September 30, 1907, the annual sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for each bridge.

"During the succeeding period beginning on September 30, 1907, and ending ten years from the date of this franchise, an annual sum of two thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250) for each bridge.

"During the succeeding five years of this franchise an annual sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for each bridge.

"During the succeeding five years of this franchise an annual sum of two thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,750) for each bridge, and

"During the remaining five years of this franchise an annual sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for each bridge.

"Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year, after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad; provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sums as the time of the commencement of operation of any portion of the road, before September 30 next preceding, shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law, as it now exists or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successors or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892."

3. Section 6 of said ordinance shall be amended to read as follows:

"The Company shall complete the construction and put in operation a railway upon the entire length of each of the routes hereinbefore described on or before March 24, 1912, otherwise the franchise right and privilege to construct such railway upon the routes or portions of routes not then constructed and in full operation shall cease and determine."

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish, and does hereby abandon and relinquish to the City all its right and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway over the routes, or portions of routes, described in section 1 of said ordinance, approved by the Mayor on March 31, 1903, and amended by contract bearing date of June 25, 1907, but not described in section 1 of said ordinance as amended by this contract, and the Company shall, within one year from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, comply with the provisions of law in regard to the abandonment of the routes, or portions of routes, so abandoned and relinquished, and remove therefrom any and all existing tracks of the Company, otherwise this contract shall be void and of no effect.

Second—This contract shall not become effective unless within thirty (30) days from the date hereof the Company shall pay to the City all sums due pursuant to the fourth subdivision of section 2 of said ordinance, approved by the Mayor on March 31, 1903, as hereby amended.

Third—All the terms and conditions contained in the said ordinance, approved by the Mayor on March 31, 1903, as modified or amended by contract bearing date of June 25, 1907, excepting those which are herein amended or modified, shall remain unchanged, and shall apply to the routes herein described in section 1 of this contract with the same force and effect as when they applied to the routes described in said ordinance, approved March 31, 1903, as amended by said contract bearing date of June 25, 1907, and as though the routes herein described had been specifically described in said ordinance.

Sec. 3. The Company promises, covenants and agrees, on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.
