ssive terms and continuous administration,  
and speaking of their pleasant relations  
and harmonious work together, and then  
asked Alderman Cole to assume the chair  
and put the resolution to vote.

It was adopted unanimously and with  
enthusiasm.

Alderman Cole then moved the following  
resolution, which was also adopted:

Whereas, Maybury Fleming has kept the  
records of this Board since its organiza-  
tion and during his incumbency of this po-  
sition he endeavored himself to the members  
of this Board;

Resolved, That the members of the Local  
Board as at present constituted do hereby

Resolved, That they wish for him a suc-

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

December 23, 1913.

Hon. MICHAEL J. DRUMMOND, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I herewith submit the report of the Secretary for the quarter ending September 30, 1913:

## Census.

The average daily census of patients and inmates in the hospitals, schools for the feeble minded, asylums, homes for the aged and infirm and other institutions of the Department for this quarter has been 10,257, as against 9,799 for the corresponding period of the preceding year.

The average daily census of employees in the Department during the quarter was 2,980, including therein the Nurses of the different institutions, their average daily census being 385.

## Payroll Changes.

During the quarter 3,241 changes occurred among an average of 2,856 paid employees, as follows:

Appointments, 1,615; promotions, 136; resignations, 714; transfers, 109; dismissals, 667.

## The Hunter Island Convalescent Home.

The Hunter Island Convalescent Home was opened on August 19, 1913. There are twenty-four rooms in the building and it can accommodate about fifty patients. The inmates cared for are convalescing mothers and their children and are received from the different hospitals of this Department. Female convalescent patients only are received. At the present time there are sixteen patients being cared for in this Home.

On August 1 the Department of Parks turned over for the use of this Department the Twin Island House on Twin Island, Pelham Bay Park, for a summer home and place of recreation for poor children and their attendants. This house will be used in conjunction with the Hunter Convalescent Home.

Request will be made in the Departmental Estimate to be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year 1914 for sufficient funds to renovate and open up this new house.

## In General.

There were six general and twenty-four special orders issued during this quarter and forty-two propositions accepted and awarded for work costing not over \$1,000 in each case. All of which is respectfully submitted. Respectfully yours,

## REPORT OF THE AUDITOR.

December 8, 1913.

Hon. MICHAEL J. DRUMMOND, Commissioner:

Sir—I have the honor to report upon the work of this Bureau at the close of the quarter ended September 30, 1913.

Statements have been sent to you showing the general ledger accounts in balance, the condition of the appropriation accounts at the close of the quarter, the aggregate of funds available at September 30, 1913, and the details of the fiscal transactions conducted during the current year.

There is no doubt, in the mind of the compiler, that in more than 50 per cent. of the cases coming under the notice of this Bureau the destitution is caused by intemperate and vicious habits of living on the part of the parents of children proposed for commitment.

Death, 27.92 per cent.; illness, 35.87 per cent.; desertion, 20.89 per cent.; imprisonment, 1.92 per cent.; intemperance, 1.02 per cent.; lack of industry, thrift or judgment, 4.66 per cent.; miscellaneous, 7.72—100 per cent.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

A report, dated December 4, was presented from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, requesting authority to reinstate Patrick J. Gough in the position of Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry under section 1543b of the Charter. The request was granted.

A report, dated December 4, was presented from the Chief Medical Officer of the Fire Department, stating that the following named candidates for the position of Fireman had been rejected in the medical examination: Rupert F. ## BOARD OF WATER SUPPLY.

December 31, 1913.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor of The City of New York, Executive Chamber, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—We submit the report of the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York for the year ending December 31, 1913:

**Disbursements and Liabilities**—Disbursements for all purposes during the year exceeded \$20,000,000, bringing the total amount disbursed by the Board since its organization on June 9, 1905, to \$109,000,000. Known liabilities at this writing are \$21,000,000, and the total obligations to date aggregate \$130,000,000.

**Construction Progress**—The impounding of water in Ashokan Reservoir was commenced on September 9. The Catskill Aqueduct is 99 per cent. completed from this reservoir to Croton Lake, which supplies the Croton Aqueducts; hence, it would now be possible to make Catskill water partially available at any time, if an emergency should demand it, although the whole aqueduct and its reservoirs will not be fully completed for a few years. Between Croton watershed and Hill View Reservoir, just north of the City line, but three short gaps in the aqueduct line, about 2,000 feet in total length, remain uncompleted. From Hill View Reservoir to the terminal shafts, in Brooklyn, the City tunnel is 75 per cent. completed.

The value of work completed and now in progress under contracts aggregates \$98,000,000, of which \$78,000,000 has been done to date, and work amounting to nearly \$14,000,000 was done during 1913. There remain to be awarded, in order to complete the first development of the Catskill supply sufficiently to deliver 250,000,000 gallons of water daily to the five Boroughs, contracts to the value of about \$7,000,000, nearly all of which will be begun and prosecuted during the year 1914.

**Ashokan Reservoir**—At the Ashokan Reservoir work proceeded regularly on the wings of the Olive Bridge dam, on the Beaverkill and West Hurley dikes and on the dividing weir and its discharge channel. The opening through Olive Bridge dam, left to pass the flow of Esopus Creek during construction operations, was plugged on September 9. In the West Basin territory the two Bushkill bridges, Traver Hollow Bridge and Esopus Bridge, were completed and opened to public travel. In the East Basin territory Stone Church Bridge was completed. The grading for the 40 miles of substituted new highways around the reservoir was nearly completed, and the foundation and bottom courses for the road surfacing begun.

**Ulster and Delaware Railroad**—The Ulster and Delaware Railroad Company, by the terms of its agreement with the City, executed June 15, 1911, completed the construction of its new roadbed on the north side of the reservoir and has practically removed all of its property from within the reservoir site. The first train passed over the new location on June 8.

**Kensico Reservoir**—At Kensico dam the Contractor completed the installation of a large and efficient construction plant. Work was concentrated on the excavation for the foundation of the dam, the manufacture of concrete facing blocks and the placing of cyclopean masonry in the dam. About 38 per cent. of all masonry has been placed in the dam, about 315,000 cubic yards having been laid from April 23 to date—a remarkable record.

**Hill View Reservoir**—Progress here is still exceeding contract requirements, the reservoir as a whole being 80 per cent. completed. Excavation and the construction of embankments are about 93 per cent. completed, representing the handling of 2,700,000 cubic yards of material. Of the concrete lining on slopes and bottom, 57 per cent. of the former and 45 per cent. of the latter, an aggregate of 1,500,000 square feet, are laid. The dividing wall, containing the by-pass aqueduct, is completed except for an opening to allow work trains to pass.

**Silver Lake Reservoir**—This, the terminal reservoir of the Catskill Water System, with a capacity of 400,000,000 gallons, will also serve as a distributing reservoir for Staten Island, and lies about 2 miles southwest of St. George. The contract for the construction of this reservoir was awarded August 19, and work was promptly commenced.

**Hudson River Crossing**—The lining of the Hudson River tunnel and its shafts on either side of the river was completed, except for bolting on the cover of the east shaft, thus closing the last gap in the aqueduct between Ashokan Reservoir and Croton Lake.

**City Tunnel and Pipe Lines**—Of the total work to be done within the City limits, 94 per cent. is under contract (including Silver Lake Reservoir), 69 per cent. is completed, and a large proportion (30 per cent.) was performed during the year. In the City tunnel, extending from Yonkers to Brooklyn, the rock excavation is practically finished, 37 per cent. of the concrete lining is done and 4 out of the 24 shafts are nearing completion. Over three miles of 66-inch steel pipe and over seven miles of 48-inch cast-iron pipe (a portion of the conduits extending from the ends of the City tunnel in Brooklyn) were finished during the year and turned over to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for operation in connection with the existing distribution system.

**Assessment of City's Lands**—There still continue the very unsatisfactory conditions arising from the inequitable assessment of the City's waterworks structures on lands outside the City limits, used not only for the Catskill, but for the Croton water system as well. For the year 1913, upon the holdings of the City acquired for Catskill water supply purposes alone, increases in assessed valuation aggregated \$22,500,000. This increment represents solely the value of construction works and reflects no increased worth to the land.

The existing law, which it is claimed permits these conditions, became effective in 1901, when, in revising the City Charter, the clause exempting from taxation those structures necessary for a municipal water supply, was stricken out of section 480. In efforts to correct these abuses, the City has expended considerable sums in litigation; it has, besides, paid heavy taxes.

No permanent relief from these injustices could be secured through the courts, as new schemes of exaction were continually introduced by the different local Assessors, and the Courts were unable to keep pace with them. The Courts, further, had openly declared that it was not for them, but for the Legislature, to remedy the evils.

To restrict the local Assessors to a fair and equitable rule for levying the assessments against property necessarily acquired for the purposes of a municipal water supply, and to prohibit them from unjustly and unfairly taxing aqueducts and other waterworks structures under and above the surface, the Board caused the introduction of bills into the Assembly and the Senate, which amended the General Tax Law by exempting from taxation all dams, aqueducts and like works necessary for a municipal water supply, but which would, on the other hand, tax all lands so acquired at a valuation not higher than that of similar improved lands in the immediate vicinity within the tax district.

This measure was approved and recommended by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and had the endorsement and support of the Chamber of Commerce, the Merchants' Association and of the various civic organizations of the City. The President of the Board of Water Supply and I. J. Beaudrias, Special Corporation Counsel, appeared for The City of New York at a hearing held before a joint Committee on Taxation and Retrenchment at Albany, N. Y., on February 5, 1913, and presented both oral and printed arguments in support

of this measure. Unfortunately, strong opposition from the Counties affected held it up, and after two readings it was allowed to die in committee.

Regarding the assessment of the aqueduct structure, the Appellate Division, in a recent decision, directed such assessment to be stricken from the roll as illegal. The case was taken to the Court of Appeals by the towns interested.

Should this case be finally decided in the City's favor, the effect of the desired law will be secured; otherwise, further efforts to correct the inequities must be pressed.

**Esopus Sewer Bill**—Nuisances of various kinds directly contaminate Esopus Creek and its tributaries. Numerous outhouses are located so close to the streams as to require their immediate removal, while factories, as well, discharge spent chemicals and other waste matters directly into the channel. These conditions as disclosed by reports from the Engineers in the field and supplemented by personal investigations by the Commissioners of the Board, demand that the control of the watersheds be vested in The City of New York to protect its new water supply from pollution. The Board, therefore, caused the introduction into the Legislature of an amendment to chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905, directing the Board of Water Supply to make plans for the water supply "which shall prevent actual or probable contamination or pollution of the same." The bill was to empower the City to formulate rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the State Health Department, for the protection of the water supply and to construct the sewerage systems indispensable for that purpose. It also directed municipalities and occupants of lands within the watersheds, under penalty of a fine, to make use of these sewerage facilities.

The bill received the endorsement and support of the Merchants' Association, but failed to pass.

**Suffolk County Sources**—In view of the entirely satisfactory progress upon construction of the first stage of the Catskill Water System, by which at least 250,000,000 gallons daily will be obtained from the development of the Esopus watershed, sound business policy dictated the further development of the Catskill Mountain sources before the extension of New York's waterworks in any other direction.

Increasing the Catskill supply to the full capacity of its aqueduct, i. e., at least 500,000,000 gallons daily, entails but a moderate capital expenditure and involves no perpetual pumping charges, because the Catskill Aqueduct reaches the City line at an elevation of nearly 300 feet above sea level. Need for the development of the Suffolk County sources having lost its urgency from the early availability of Catskill water in Long Island, the Board recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the petition of the City to the State Conservation Commission be withdrawn, which action was accordingly taken.

**Westchester County Supply**—Existing statutes provide that municipal corporations in Westchester County may secure water from the Catskill supply at the rates prevailing in New York City; but local interests drafted Assembly Bill No. 1575, Int. No. 1433, which the Board opposed, as it practically transferred the authority for fixing the water charges from the officers of The City of New York to the State Conservation Commission. This might easily lead to the municipalities of Westchester County being supplied with water from the Catskill Aqueduct at a rate less than that paid by the consumers of water in New York City. The section it was desired to modify already represented a compromise, which was reached between The City of New York and Westchester County when the original act was passed; and it would have been an injustice to the inhabitants of New York City, who have spent vast sums to construct their water supply system, a large proportion of which has been paid to the inhabitants of Westchester County for damages, to have allowed this amendment to pass. It died in committee.

**Highway Regulation**—The Board caused to be introduced into the Legislature bills amending the statutes under which the Board operates, giving the City the power to promulgate and enforce reasonable rules and regulations to prevent the improper and destructive use, particularly by traction engines, of the highways constructed by the City in Ulster and Westchester Counties.

This is of considerable importance to the City, as the abuse of these highways would cost the City continuous expenditure over and above what normal maintenance and repair would necessitate.

The bills, though meeting with no opposition, were not reported by the committees in charge of them and failed to pass.

**Exhibits**—At the International Building Trades' Exposition held during the summer at Leipsic, Germany, the Board, by special request, exhibited maps of its works, diagrams of its general and sanitary organizations, together with about 70 framed photographic enlargements of its construction work in progress and of various phases of sanitation connected with both its contractors' camps and the communities affected by construction operations. The exhibit was awarded a Diploma of Merit by the authorities.

The total force of the Board now consists of 1,184 employees, a reduction of 230 during the year, which decreased the total amount of salaries paid nearly \$260,000. The force is divided, approximately, as follows: Administration, including Commissioners and their Secretaries, 66; Police, 303; Engineering, 685; Laborers, 130.

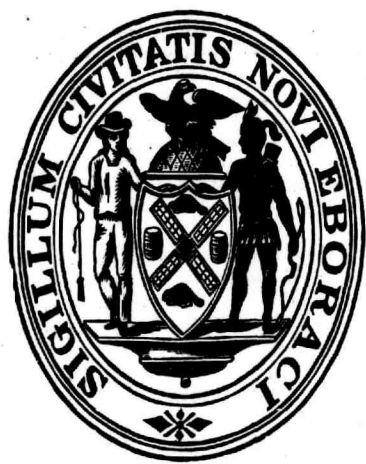

The proposed amendment to the amended new plan in the vicinity of Pier No. 26, East River, near the foot of Catherine Slip, Borough of Manhattan, consists in discontinuing or cancelling the proposed ferry structures between Piers 26 and 27, East River, as shown on the plans adopted by the Board of Docks in 1898 and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund February 3, 1899; also in changing the length, width and location of Pier No. 26, as shown on said plans; also the establishment of lateral inshore extensions on both sides of the proposed amended pier, to wit:

The proposed amended plan contemplates the discontinuance or cancellation of proposed ferry structures, comprising platforms, piers and racks between Piers 26 and 27, as shown on the amended plan adopted by the Board of



Docks in 1898 and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund February 3, 1899.

The location of Pier No. 26, East River, is hereby amended so that its westerly side shall occupy a location 128 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly side of Pier No. 25, as shown on the amended plan adopted by the Commissioner of Docks June 18, 1906, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund July 18, 1906.

The width of Pier No. 26, as proposed to be amended, shall be 45 feet instead of 40 feet, as shown on the aforesaid plan.

Pier No. 26, as proposed to be amended, shall extend from the bulkhead line adopted by the Board of Docks in 1898, southerly to the pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1901.

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of a line parallel to and distant 100 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Vernon avenue and the southerly line of the Queensborough Bridge approach; running thence southeasterly along the southerly line of the Queensborough Bridge approach and its southeasterly prolongation to its intersection with a line parallel to and distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Jackson avenue; thence southwesterly along said parallel line to its intersection with the southeasterly prolongation of a line parallel to and distant 490 feet southwesterly from the southwesterly line of Harris avenue; thence northwesterly along said southeasterly prolongation and parallel line to its intersection with a line parallel to and distant 100 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Vernon avenue, thence northwesterly along said last mentioned parallel line to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said supplemental and amended abstracts, our final supplemental and amended report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the City of New York, on the 20th day of March, 1914, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Fifth—In case, however, objections are filed to any of said supplemental and amended abstracts of estimate and assessment, the notice of motion to confirm our supplemental and amended final report herein will stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified, and of which notice will be given to all those who have theretofore appeared in this proceeding, as well as by publication in the City Record, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in

the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and the City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beams, holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application thereof at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
